Ruidoso Schools Host Seminar

A Career and Vocational Education Seminar was held Wednesday and Thursday at the White Mountain School with fifty superintendents, principals and vocational specialists in attendance. The seminar, under the guidance of Dr. W. Harty and Associates, a consultant firm employed by the State Department of Education, drew visitors from every school in Lincoln and Otero Counties.

Dr. Kenneth Densley, vocational education specialist with the California State Department of Education, was featured speaker for the two day event. Bob Gordon of the New Mexico Department of Education assisted with arrangements for the seminar.

The program given at the meet is scheduled to be presented to all school districts in the state.

H. W. Harty noted that his firm was contracted to provide speakers and materials for seminars and that top men in their fields, from throughout the country were selected to direct the meetings.

An Open School Concept seminar has been scheduled for February at Clovis.

In a most sincere manner to our good friend, James L. Hine, Ruidoso Village Clerk-Manager, who early last month agreed to participate in the selection of the roster for the 1971 New Mexico Distinguished Public Service Awards Council, Hine was awarded the highly honored title in 1970. To top it off, our distinguished Village official was not only asked to be on the awards council, but this week also received a personal letter from New Mexico Governor Bruce King. Governor King expressed his appreciation to Hine for giving his time to serve on the council. All I can say is that we are all proud of Jim Hine, not only because he is an absolute credit to our village and that he is on the governor's personal mailing list, but also because he is a friend of Fred Nichols.

Six Warriors Chosen For All-State Team

The Ruidoso Warriors, Runner-Up to the Jal Panthers in Class AA football for 1971, were honored twice by the Associated Press for their fine showing this season. Ruidoso landed four players on the All-State Class AA football squad, and to top it off, Coach Doyle "Tiny" Howell, in his first season at the helm for the Tribe, was picked as the Class AA Coach of the Year.

Named from the Ruidoso squad to the elite were two seniors and two juniors. Corky Conley, senior, 200 pounds, was named as an offensive tackle. Another senior, David Boehm, 165, landed a berth as an offensive end, with Crickett Level, 230 junior, was named to the defensive list. Selected as quarterback for the All-State team was Ruidoso's Blaine Miller, a 180 pound junior.

Gaining Honorable Mention to the All-State squad was Reeves McGuire, 123 pound end, on offense and Corky Conley rated an Honorable Mention to the defensive squad as a defensive end.

Howell, in his first season as head mentor of the Ruidoso Warriors, came from the perennial Class AA powerhouse, the Jal Panthers, molded the Warriors into the District title then the Warriors swept past the Clayton Yellowjackets on their way to the chow-down battle for the No. 1 AA team in the state, only to fall before Coach Howell's former team.

Miller named quarterback for the All-State team had a phenomenal passing record for the 1971 season. He attempted 168 passes and hit on 88, with one-fourth of his completions going for TD's, passing for 22 touchdowns for the season. Miller also scored nine touchdowns, 111 for yardage, picked up 100 extra yards and also split the uprights on one field goal.

He also played safety on defense. Corky Conley, 200 pound offensive tackle, was one of the reasons Ruidoso went all the way to the state finals. He opened up nice holes in the forward wall for the hard-charging backs of Coach Howell. Conley was one of the men that went both ways for the Warriors, as a tackle on offense and covered a lot of ground from his defensive end spot.

Crickett Level, tipping the scales at a mere 243 pounds, played nose guard on defense and opposing ball carriers made the mistake of trying to run, toward his position and found themselves looking up at the lights from below with Level draped across their bodies.

Construction on the new building, designed by W. C. Krueger, architects, is expected to start within the next 90 days.

Under terms of the development plan, the new building will be owned jointly by ABC Development Co., a partnership of 14 prominent businessmen and Security Realty Corp., a New Mexico corporation owned by BSI. The two groups, each owning 50 per cent, entered into a joint venture to build the structure.

The 150,000 square foot building and the two-square block area on which it will be constructed will be known as the "American Bank of Commerce Complex."

The new structure will feature an extended first story, with a narrower white-columned tower extending 12 stories above it. The rest of the two-block site will initially include drive-up windows and parking facilities.

Morris told the news conference, followed by a luncheon at the Four Seasons Motor Inn, that projected plans for the new ABC complex include development of an Agricultural Credit Corporation, a Minority Enterprise Small Business Investment Corporation (MESBICO), and Security Development Corporation as authorized by the 1968 legislature.

Headquarters offices of BSI will still remain in Alamogordo, Morris said. In planning the new structure in Albuquerque, American Bank of Commerce will serve as primary tenant, renting one-third of the space. The remaining two-thirds will include the allied financial institutions described above, and general office space.

BSI presently owns controlling interest in American Bank of Commerce; Citizens State Bank in Vaughn; Security Bank and Trust, Alamogordo; First State Bank — Rio Rancho Estates; American Bank of Carlsbad, and Security Bank in Ruidoso.

American Bank of Commerce Tells Headquarters Building Plan

Thomas G. Morris, chairman of the Board of the American Bank of Commerce, recently announced detailed plans for a \$4 million, 13-story headquarters office building in downtown Albuquerque.

Unveiling architect's renderings and a three-dimensional model of the modern structure, Morris said the site would be bounded by Lomas on the north, Roma on the south, Second St. to the east and Third Street to the west.

It will be only a block from Albuquerque's new \$9 million convention center. Franking Morris as he made the announcement were Malcolm Pease, president of the American Bank of Commerce and Ted A. Beffell of Alamogordo, president of Bank Securities, Inc.

Bank Securities Inc. presently holds controlling interest in ABC and five other New Mexico banks and is in the process of filing with the board of governors of the Federal Reserve System for authority to acquire three other banks, First National of Portales, First National of Roswell and Liberty National of Lovington.

There are two games on slate for each of the nights as the Warrior "B" team will take on the Socorro "B" and the Hatch "B" Friday and Saturday nights respectively. Game time is 8:00 p.m. for the "B" game and 7:30 p.m. for the varsity non-conference tilt.

In Tularosa Tuesday night the Ruidoso "B" team came from behind and walked away with their first win as many starts as they defeated the Tulle "B" team, 63-47. Joe Bob McGuire

led the "B" team scoring with a game total of 17 points. Dick Underwood and Clyde Reynolds racked up 13 points each. The Warrior "B" team is coached by Thurman Sanchez.

County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNDAF

Making sure that your heating system is in good shape before winter can be time well spent. Here are some suggestions:

Oil burners should be checked over by an experienced service man. Fuel filters often need a new element installed and the burner may need adjusting for maximum efficiency. The fuel to air ratios must be correct for good heating at minimum cost. Flame passages should be cleaned of soot deposits.

Gas heaters and furnaces also need attention. The safety devices should be fully operative. Be sure the main gas supply is controlled by the safety pilot device. The chimney flue must be clear to vent gas appliances outside the building. If an unusual collection of condensed water appears on walls or ceiling, have the flue opening checked. Use no heater that is not fully vented. If the gas flame is yellow, have the burner air adjustment checked. If you have a forced hot air furnace, replace the air filters now for full flow of heated air and to reduce dust circulation. In some situations, addition of a humidifier for more healthful air conditions during winter may need consideration.

On hot water systems—bleed air out of the lines if assorted gurgling noises are heard when circulatory pump runs. Cleaning radiators or coils and dust greatly increases heating efficiency. If these are baseboard units, use a vacuum cleaner with a crevice tool for the job. If you have a cold spot in the house, use an automatic electric heater, either portable or one which can be built in.

Your Social Security
How may I file a request for Medicare payment? When should I file for a payment? Where do I get the forms to file a request for payment? Where do I send the request for payment? What can I do if I can't pay the doctor bills? According to Bob Noble, social security field representative, these questions are commonly asked by persons covered by Medicare.

Medicare is now more than five years old and still there are those not fully aware of its protection. Anyone who may be eligible for some Medicare benefits, or if he has a parent, relative or friend who may be eligible, should contact his nearest social security office. The trained representatives there will be glad to answer questions and to help process a request for Medicare payment. Under the law there are some time limits for claiming a refund of medical expenses. For example, if a patient received medical services between Oct. 1, 1969, and Sept. 30, 1970, he must file his claim for any payment due by December 31 of this year.

Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

The 1972 Legislature could dissolve into a Chinese long war over taxes and reapportionment. The severance tax would be converted into a mining facilities tax. Basis for the tax would be gross income from gross production required in an Internal Revenue Service report. A resources production tax on the mining industry would replace the property tax. This levy would also be geared to an IRS report listing gross income from gross production. Over-all state revenue would not change sharply but amounts paid by specific mining industries and companies would be revamped greatly. A positive-negative surplus is also bound to set off sparks.

The curtail on the state income tax would be varied to fit the amount of revenue the state needs. Computations would be made annually at each legislative session. Another key bill represents a tax credit for low income families. Credit on state income taxes would be allowed for gross receipts and excise taxes paid by low income families.

The state could pay a refund to some families which had no income. Also bound to ignite fireworks is a bill to wipe out elected county assessors and hand the job of appointing them to county commissioners.

The 45-bill tax package shaped up by the Professional Tax Study Committee must clear the interim Legislative Tax Study Committee. The legislative panel will send actual tax recommendations to the legislature Jan. 18.

Meanwhile, District Judge Edwin Fetter of Santa Fe upset the legislative apparatus by ruling the 1971 Senate and House Reapportionment Acts were invalid. Newly appointed Judge Fetter, a Democrat named by Gov. Bruce King, said population deviations were too great between legislative districts.

Judge Fetter directed the legislature to try to reapportion itself again. Meanwhile, he retained jurisdiction of the suit filed by ex-Gov. David F. Carrigo, a Republican. A U. S. Dis-

trict Court in Albuquerque also decided to keep jurisdiction of another suit challenging the 1971 legislative reapportionment.

Some House districts likely to be reshaped under the state district court edict: Veteran Rep. George Blocker's Lea County House District. The norm or ideal population for a House district is 14,310 population. Blocker's revised district counts 16,646 population. It is underrepresented by 16.34 per cent. Jal and Eunice are in the district.

The new Quay-Union Counties House district may not fit guidelines either. The district has 16,826 population. It is 10.00 per cent over the ideal size. Rep. Clifton L. Moreland, D-Tucuman, represents Quay County alone now.

House Majority Leader David Galman, D-Buena Vista, represents Union, Mora and Harding Counties.

A new Lincoln-Guadalupe Counties House district is 12.44 per cent below the norm with 12,620 population. Rep. Ralph F. Petty, Jr., D-Ruidoso, represents Lincoln and Sierra Counties now. Guadalupe County is in a district with DeBaca and Torrance Counties represented

by Rep. John Bigbee, R-Escondido.

The Luna-Hidalgo House district may be revamped. The district is 14.88 per cent over the norm with 16,440 population. Rep. William J. Upton, D-Deming, represents Luna and Hidalgo Counties.

The Union-Harding-Collax Counties Senate district is 18.31 per cent below the Senate population standard with 18,443 residents. The Senate population norm is 22,077. Sen. John L. Morrow, D-Capulin, represents the district.

The new Lincoln-Catron-Socorro Senate district is a substantial 13.63 per cent below the standard with 19,621 residents. Freshman Sen. Adan Rivera, D-Socorro, represents Catron, Torrance and Socorro Counties now.

At present two senators represent both Lincoln and Otero Counties - Aubrey Dunn, D-Alamogordo, and freshman John Conway, R-Alamogordo. The double representation was eliminated in the 1971 law.

The new DeBaca-Roosevelt Counties Senate district could be reshuffled. It is 15.73 per cent below the population standard with 19,026 population.

The two new senate districts in Curry County could be reworked. They deviate from ideal population per district by 12.89 and 12.26 per cent.

The Senate district represented by I. M. (Ike) Smalley appears to fall well within population guidelines. Smalley represents Hidalgo, Sierra and Luna Counties with total population of 23,629, only 4.66 per cent above the norm.

But Valencia County District 30, represented by Senate Majority Leader Tibbo Chavez, D-Beck, is 17.44 per cent below the population standard with 18,638 residents.

The Taco-Mora Counties district represented by Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taco, is close to the standard with 22,189 population, only 1.71 per cent under the ideal level.
