The 1971 Ruidoso High School Warrior football team, coaches and managers will be honored Monday night, Dec. 13, with a Warrior Appreciation Dinner. The special event, sponsored by a group of Ruidoso men, is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. at the Villa Inn Motor Hotel, Ruidoso.

Special speaker for the dinner will be Berl "Coach" Huffman, Lubbock, Texas, currently Director of Public Relations for the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association and ranked among the top sports banquet speakers in the nation.

The Ruidoso Warrior team with the New Mexico State Class AA Runner-Up Crown and Warrior head football coach Doyle Reed recently was named the New Mexico State Class AA Coach of the Year. Around sixty-five players, coaches, school officials and special guests have been invited to the special event honoring the Warriors.

A 1923 graduate of Trinity University where he played halfback, Huffman first joined the Texas Tech staff in 1935 as a freshman football coach and head coach of basketball and track. He interrupted his coaching career for four years of service in the Air Force during World War II and then returned to Tech as assistant football coach and head basketball coach.

He left Lubbock in 1947 to become head coach at the University of New Mexico, a post he had until 1952 when he became manager of Albuquerque's Chamber of Commerce. He later directed the New Mexico Economic Development Commission and left that post to direct the Alamo Industrial Development Corporation.

He rejoined the Texas Tech coaching staff in 1961 as freshman football coach and head basketball coach. He remained on the Tech coaching staff until his appointment with the Ex-Students Association.

At their Homecoming meeting in 1968, the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association Council unanimously selected Huffman to be awarded Honorary membership in the Association. This is the highest award the Association can bestow on a non-alumnus. In the long history of the Association only four other people have received this honor.

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

My son-in-law says his children "goof" off when they do not weed the bottom of the garden. One of his pupils ruin an experiment they have "goofed" it.

Another "goofed" when she forgot to salt the cats. Did you ever try to eat cats without salt? They are distasteful enough at their best.

Nevertheless here are some really true "goofs".

A person put in a long distance charge call to a Mr. Goff but did not have his number. The operator was rather talkative—some seem to know only two words: number please. She asks how to spell the name and was told GOFF. She immediately asked information for a Mr. GOOF and was told they only had a Goff listed. The operator said she guessed that would do as it sounded better anyway.

There was the misunderstanding German lady who came over from the old coun-

try with her husband and the first words of the English language she learned to speak were, "I don't know." They went to a dance and when the young man asked her to dance, she said, "I don't know." All she could say was, "I don't know." After two or three of these barking out confused, her husband finally told her to German what they said.

It will take many "goof ups" and mistakes — just as we experienced, before they learn. Some even take a life time.

The coming generation should rise up and ban together secretly. They are co-operating with the authorities in some places. Every chance or knowledge they have of buying alcohol or dope should be reported. Girl Scouting Objectives Explained

"We, the members of the Girl Scouts of the United States of America, united by a belief in God—do dedicate ourselves to the purpose of inspiring girls with the highest ideals of character, conduct, patriotism and service that they may become happy and resourceful citizens." This statement taken from the preamble to the constitution of the Girl Scouts of the U. S. A. states very concisely the purpose of Girl Scouting.

A Brownie Scout says "I promise to do my best to love God and my country, to help other people every day, especially those at home." Junior,

Cadette and Senior Scouts say "On my honor, I will try to do my duty to God and my country, to help other people at all times, to obey the Girl Scout Laws."

In Ruidoso at the present time there are one hundred and four girls and adults who have made these promises and are working toward fulfilling the purposes of Girl Scouting. All adult members are volunteers who give most generously of their time, talents and energy. There would be more registered girls in Ruidoso if there had been more adult volunteers willing to give of themselves. In addition, one professional staff member provides specialized training for all volunteers and administrative services on a full time basis.

Any girl, age 7 through 17, is eligible to become a member. The program is an informal, educational one based on the needs and interests of girls. Six principles underlying all activities are considered so fundamental to Girl Scouting that they have been termed the "foundation elements" of the program. They are the Girl Scout Promise and Laws, service, citizenship, international friendship, troop management, and health and safety. These foundation elements permeate the program in all four age levels, and are woven into a wide range of activities centering around the arts, the home, and the out-of-door.

Since the community of Ruidoso does not have a United Fund, the Council needs the support of special efforts for funds such as will be conducted Dec. 11. These funds go towards camping, training, books and supplies for the troops, program activities, developing a day camp site, and professional services.

The Service team in Ruidoso consists of Mrs. Roy Mayo, neighborhood chairman, Mrs. James L. Wimberly, troop organizer, and Mrs. Dale Wynn, troop consultant. The District Advisor is Mrs. R. C. Woodcock of Alamogordo.

County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

The use of codling moth attractant in timing of codling moth spray was discussed at a meeting in Delta, Colo. recently. Research has shown that properly timed sprays can get better control. Also if every acre sprays the number of applications can be reduced from five to two. (The codling moth produces the worm in the apple.)

A proposed program for New Mexico, Colorado and Utah was outlined at the meeting. There would be about 130 of these traps available in this area. Traps will be placed in every ten acres of orchard. New units for the traps will be furnished weekly. The old traps will be returned for a complete record of the results and at the same time put on a computer. These traps are only to be used to control the codling moth itself. In Colorado they have found the codling moth moved up to three miles in its lifetime, or one quarter mile in a day.

to pay a fine of \$10 and costs or shall undergo imprisonment for not more than two full days. The SMV emblems are available from local machinery dealers and farm supply stores. Farmers will probably want to purchase several, although one for each machine is not needed. The signs are mounted on a spade which fits into a bracket on the implement; mount one of the inexpensive brackets on each piece of equipment and move the SMV emblem to the specific implement that must be operated on a highway.

After the yard has been mowed for the last time this fall, the homeowner should prepare the lawn mower for winter storage. First, clean the mower. Remove the hood or blower housing from over the fly wheel. Remove dirt and trash from the cooling fins and on other mower parts. Clean dirt and oil from the engine and housing by using a grease removing chemical, kerosene or hot soapy water. Do not use gasoline for cleaning. It is very flammable and also causes a "burning sensation" to the skin. Be careful not to get water or cleaning agents inside the engine.

Remove the spark plug and place a small quantity of oil in the cylinder. One or two teaspoons should be enough. With the spark plug out, crank the engine causing it to turn over several times. This allows the oil to coat the cylinder walls and piston rings. Replace the spark plug leaving the plug wire off for safety.

Store the mower in a clean, dry place that has good air ventilation. Finally, winter is an ideal time to lubricate the wheels, do some spot painting and sharpen the mower blade. With these things done, the mower will be ready to go next spring.

Even bugs and beetles like a cozy fire in the fireplace on a cold winter evening. That's why they are likely to hitch a ride inside on an animal of firewood. When a log is cut, it is a warm, moist place for them to live. These pests are carried into the house along with wood that is not burned immediately. The warmer temperature makes the insects think

it's spring. They "wake up" and start to look for food. Controlling these pests while the logs are stored outside usually is not practical, as there are too many of them. The best way to prevent insects from causing trouble inside your home is to keep logs and kindling outside until you are ready to put them on the fire. Unless the wood is brought in the house quite a while before it is used, the insects will not have time to respond to the warmth indoors.

A pile of cut logs stored outdoors often provides a winter home for several kinds of troublesome insects, especially the many varieties of beetles that make their home in tree trunks and under bark. These insects include bark beetles, powder-post beetles and several of their near relatives. Wood-dwelling beetles usually do not attack painted or varnished wood, such as clapboard or millwork of a house. So be careful about keeping firewood indoors too long. Leave the firewood—and the insects asleep outdoors until you are ready to put the wood on the fire.



Aircraft Must Be Registered By March 1, 1972

A plan to register all aircraft from a red, white and blue hot air balloon owned by Sid Cutter, Albuquerque, to a Lear Jet owned by Anderson Oil Company of Roswell, went into effect recently when the New Mexico Aviation Department mailed out registration forms to some 1500 New Mexico aircraft owners.

Deadline for registration is March 1, 1972 with a penalty levied on aircraft owners who fail to register by that date.

Bob White, Director of the Aviation Department, said that Federal Aviation Administration records reported over 1500 aircraft in New Mexico which include Cutter's patriotic colored balloon, gliders, helicopters, home built aircraft, experimental aircraft and gyrocopters.

In fact, everything man made that flies, with the exception of kites, will be expected to register with the Department.

White said that he feels that the new registration process should run smoothly and added that any aircraft owner desiring information or assistance should write or phone the New Mexico Aviation Department in Santa Fe, P. O. Box 578, or phone 827-2000.

Ruidosoan Receives Plaque For Deeds "Beyond the Normal Call"

It's Saturday morning, Dec. 4, 1971, just seven months to the day, and nearly to the hour, Indian relics in a cave high in the mountain near the lake.

The three Ruidosoans decided to climb the 8,000 feet to the caves in search of the Indian artifacts. After the two hour plus climb to the cave all they found was a log ladder and had to proceed to return down the mountain when Cooper, who was carrying the ladder, fell.

In falling over huge rocks Cooper's left ear was nearly covered in two, his face was badly cut, his jaw out of place, and he was unconscious and bleeding profusely. Jansen and Gutierrez gave the injured man first aid as best as they could and Spall immediately went ahead of the two men to both clear a path and relocate the vehicle.

Jansen and Gutierrez literally carried Cooper down the nearly two miles of mountain rocks, cliffs and through the heavy brush on the mountain to the vehicle. The rugged terrain made it impossible to use an improvised stretcher. In all, the rescue took nearly two hours.

Upon reaching the vehicle the four men got out for a small hospital in Namuquek, Mexico. The 35-mile trip to the hospital took over three hours because of the rough area. Most of the way they traveled on foot paths and on several occasions and for great distances they made their own roads through the rugged countryside.

The severity of Cooper's injuries required him to stay in the local hospital here for 12 days.

When asked if he planned to go back to Lake Tinterarro, Mexico, and the little village nearby with its population of around 60, where there are no doctors, no automobiles or trucks, only horses and wagons, and where the people live in an extreme primitive condition, Cooper replied, "Yes, absolutely yes."

The inscription on the plaque stated:
To Dean Jansen
Who, on May 4, 1971 saved my life by displaying Courage, Bravery and Friendship Far Beyond the Normal Call;
I shall Always be Grateful and Indebted.
Signed, Jim F. Cooper

A similar plaque, inscribed in Spanish, will be forwarded to a Mexican man, Cruz Chavez Gutierrez, 66, who together with Jansen carried Cooper down the mountainside. The other Ruidosoan who assisted in the rescue mission was Jack Spall.

In relating the incident Cooper stated that the three, Cooper, Jansen and Spall, had gone to Lake Tinterarro, Mexico on a fishing trip. Not having any

rescue down the mountainside took nearly two hours.

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Inside The Capital

The 1972 Legislature meeting Jan. 13 will receive a default insurance bill, a proposal to hike taxes, a measure to centralize bookkeeping duties of 24 state examining and licensing boards and a series of education bills. Drug abuse legislation will also be introduced.

Rep. Advino Castillo, D-Colfax County, is vice chairman of an interim committee that will consider a compromise modified no-fault insurance bill in Santa Fe Dec. 17-18. Under no-fault insurance most claims are paid promptly by the policyholder's insurer without negotiation or litigation. The New Mexico insurance industry says the proposed bill would cut auto insurance premiums 15 per cent.

Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, is chairman of the drug abuse committee chafing legislation after extensive hearings. Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, is vice chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee that will sponsor highly controversial truck increase proposals again. The LFC received bill drafts on the legislation last week with alternatives. A decision on the LFC's recommendation to the legislature will be made later this month.

Sen. John Morrow, D-Union-Coffey-Harding, is on the Examining and Licensing Committee that proposes to centralize administrative duties of many state examining and licensing boards for public convenience and more efficiency.

House Majority Leader David Salzman, D-Union-Mora-Harding, is chairman of the Legislative School Study Committee. The LSSC proposals for the 1972 Legislature, Salzman says, are these: A 9 per cent increase in public school money; a boost in special education money for about 37,000 New Mexico children; allow \$25 to each school district for textbooks for each new student; a law to expedite a takeover of a malfunctioning school system by the State Education Department and State Public School Finance Chief Harry Wugalter. Salzman said more vocational education money and equality among schools will also be sought from the legislature in the coming 30-day session.

The LFC received an encouraging state money report. It projects state general fund revenue this fiscal year at \$270.560 million, up \$10.1 million over fiscal 1971. The fiscal 1973 revenue forecast is \$294.690 million, up \$1.1 million over the present fiscal year that will end next June 30.

Carrie Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children at Truth or Consequences seeks legislative authority to build a \$300,000 education building - \$140,000 in a general fund appropriation and \$160,000 allocated but unused in the present fiscal year.

Administrator Charles J. Ederer told State Budget Chief Lloyd Frost: "The existing school facility is small, inadequate and non-functional, consisting of four rooms totaling 3,040 gross feet and approximately 2,000 square feet of usable teaching area." The present building accommodates 33-45 children.

Carrie Tingley Hospital's proposed 1973 operating budget totals \$1,110,376. Included is \$725,320 for salaries and \$123,600 for supplies and materials. The hospital would add two employees to its roster of 123 staff members - an associate surgeon and orthopedic resident with combined annual salaries of \$33,812. Ederer said the associate surgeon is needed because of major expansion of crippled children service clinics.

The State Board of Finance loaned \$5,000 to the Sierra-Catron-Socorro-Torrance Counties Judicial District and \$2,000 to the Valencia-Sandoval Counties Judicial District to finance jury trials. Court Administrator John Carmody told the board funds are so scarce in the Sierra-Catron-Socorro-Torrance district for jury fees new District Judge Edmund Kase has canceled most jury trials until January. The legislature will be asked to vote money to repay the loans.

The Legislative Finance Committee will investigate the multitude of state consulting contracts. Included in the maze are three at Los Lunas Hospital and Training School.

Ex-State Sen. Joe Skeen of Pinacho, Lincoln County, is among six Republican 1972 U. S. Senate prospects who will sponsor a poll and decide from results the potential candidates that should withdraw from the crowded race.

Big, personable Skeen was the 1970 GOP lieutenant governor candidate. He was a state senator 10 years in 1961-70 and was GOP floor leader.

The House district norm is 14,310 population. Upton's Luna-Hidalgo district counts 16,440 population, 14.88 per cent over the norm. He says this "is too much but it is not as bad as some others." Rep. Upton supports consolidation of bookkeeping functions of the 24 state examining and licensing boards.

He says detailed land use control legislation is needed. He would hand county commissions authority to adopt and enforce

land use control regulations in each county in compliance with a state law. With the \$19 million expected state general fund surplus Rep. Upton would spend part to buy the Public Employees Retirement Association building near the Capitol complex or other real estate in the vicinity. Upton favors completing the state radio network for law enforcement officers. The revised cost of \$1.55 million requires legislative approval. He would postpone action on no-fault insurance to 1973.

Environmental Improvements

WATER POLLUTION
In a mountain community like Ruidoso or Ruidoso Downs, there are many ways in which a stream can become fouled and polluted.

Some of the more obvious sources are dirt and silt due to run off from raw land under construction, solid waste and garbage thrown or dumped into the stream or its tributaries, chemical discharge directly into the stream and natural fouling from an over abundance of organic matter in the water way.

The worst source of water pollution in the Ruidoso area is from raw sewage. Raw sewage is not the final water which is discharged into the Ruidoso River from the Ruidoso sewage plant. That water has been biologically treated to the extent that it is as clean if no cleaner than the river water. Raw sewage is untreated household waste water which is discharged into the stream either at ground level or through the soil from improperly constructed cesspools and privies. Septic waste water sometimes helps the living community in a stream. It acts like a fertilizer and causes plant life to multiply rapidly. This can be over done though, causing too much plant life which upsets the stream's ecological balance which then

causes other life forms such as fish to die. The main concern with septic water is the spread of serious disease due to anyone, especially children, coming into contact with the contaminated stream water. Some of the worst human diseases, such as typhoid fever, are spread this way.

Within the next three months studies will be conducted on the Rio Ruidoso in an attempt to locate point sources of any type of contamination. The parties found responsible for polluting will be issued a warning notice and if necessary, legal action will be taken. Along with this survey, the village, in conjunction with the county environmentalist, will continue its program of eliminating outdoor privies which do not conform to state law and city ordinance.
