# Eighteen Candidates File - Four Positions Open

Tuesday at 5:00 p.m., the deadline for filing as a candidate in the March 7 Municipal Election, the official sound was automatically released declaring the Call To Political Arms. For some, the sound was an enthusiastic atomic-like blast and for others only a mere toot.

Regardless of the response to the Call to Political Arms, the race has officially begun and within hours, maybe minutes, after the 5:00 p.m. deadline for filing, stockpiles of political ammunition began to be unleashed. And like the response to the official sound to begin, the reaction varied in the type of political ammunition to be used, some with Tea and Torpedos and others with Ruidoso Rockets, some with Two Edged Swords, and others with a special Love Potent Gas. One hopes that only the latter weapon will be used.

With eighteen candidates, each seeking one of the four available positions in the municipal government and with only 800 plus registered voters of which 700 plus are anticipated to vote, it looks like the individual with the most friends has a clinch to win, which does not necessarily assure the elected positions the best possible selection. Plus the fact that with eighteen running and considering their voting families and relatives it doesn't leave many of us left to decide.

Of the eighteen who officially declared their candidacy Ruidoso voters certainly will have a varied selection from which to select their choice. For example, the candidates include landmen, busmen, airmen, horsemen, groceryman, gasmen, fuelmen, shoemen, schoolmen, clergymen, and retiredmen.

About all I can add, since the majority of the candidates are personal friends of mine, is the old cliché, may the best man win and Brethren and Sisters . . . Keep It Clean and Respectful and obey all of the political highway signs, Yield, Stop, Slow Down, School Zone.

### U. S. SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR Morton's Visit To Reservation Both Historic and Beneficial

The first official visit, Friday, Jan. 28, of a United States Secretary of the Department of the Interior to the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation in around sixty-eight years proved to be both historical and beneficial towards the Tribe's continual economic development program.

U. S. Department of the Interior Secretary Rogers C. B. Morton, in a special ceremony by the Mescalero Apaches honoring the national figure, told the several hundred in attendance of a special grant of \$228,977 from the Department of

the Interior. The secretary stated, "It is my pleasure to award the Mescalero Apache Tribe \$228,977 from the Department Land and Water Conservation Fund . . . for the development of recreation facilities at the Eagle Lake and Silver Lake area. This is one of the first such grants to be made directly to an Indian Tribe."

He continued, "Together with the matching funds contributed by the Tribe and the Four Corners Regional Commission, these monies will provide hunting, fishing and outdoor recreation opportunities for visitors to the reservation and, most important, for the Tribe these areas will be a source of jobs and income."

Also in attendance was New Mexico Governor Bruce King who informed the Tribe that the Four Corners Regional Commission was awarding the Mescalero Apache Reservation a \$60,000 and a \$30,000 grant for the development of both Eagle Lake and Silver Lake.

King stated of his administration, "We want to do our very best to solve the problems of the Indian people throughout the state."

Another highlight of Secretary Morton's address to the Mescaleros was that "he had just received confirmation" that the Bureau of Reclamation and the Bureau of Indian Affairs have agreed to provide the funds necessary to relocate the existing power lines in the Cieneguita Tourist Triad Complex. The power lines, reportedly holding up the major multi-million dollar resort hotel complex construction, will cost an estimated \$100,000 to be relocated. The Tribe will furnish the ground work in a cooperative effort with the departments involved.

Morton told his listeners that this was the very first grant of its kind in the history of the federal departments.

In reference to the Eagle Lake and Silver Lake grants, Morton concluded his remarks by stating, "This is one of many projects we are undertaking to assist the Indian people in their goals of self determination and self sufficiency. I congratulate you (the Mescalero Apache Tribe) on your achievements. They will make the coming years more fruitful and more promising for those who follow you."

### In Addition— Ruidoso Downs Has Seven File

The fact that there is history in numbers appears to have taken on greater significance, at least in Ruidoso Tuesday, as a historical record number of Ruidoso residents, eighteen in all, filed as candidates for one of the four positions open in the forthcoming March 7th municipal election.

This is the greatest number of registered voters ever to file for an elective position during a Ruidoso municipal election. In the last municipal election, 1970, ten candidates officially filed and one formally announced as a write-in candidate making a total of eleven seeking the usually four open positions.

Strangely enough, of the eighteen candidates only three are currently serving in the present municipal administration and to add to the uniqueness, two of the three, Mayor George P. White and Trustee Elmer Pirelli, are seeking reelection, both to positions other than the one they now hold. The third, Trustee Don Riley, was appointed to the council five months ago to fill a vacancy on the governing board and is seeking election to the normal four-year term as Village Trustee.

In the 1970 Ruidoso Municipal Election there was a record number of votes cast, 711, of the eight hundred plus registered voters in the corporate limits of the village. It is expected that this year's election will top the 1970 total as an estimated 850 plus registered voters will qualify to cast their lot March 7th. There are 1,002 registered voters in the three Ruidoso voting precincts, around two hundred of which live outside of the corporate limits of Ruidoso and cannot vote in the municipal election.

The four municipal elective positions open and their length of term are mayor, two-year term, two village trustees, four-years each, and one municipal judge, two-year term.

The first person to file as a candidate recorded at 8:01 a.m., was Ruidoso Trustee Elmer Pirelli who declared his candidacy for mayor. At 8:02 a.m. Ruidoso Mayor George P. White officially signed a statement declaring his candidacy for the Ruidoso Municipal Judgeship. The last resident to file, a candidate for mayor, filed shortly before the 5:00 p.m. deadline, and was Lloyd L. Davis, Jr.

Positions on the official ballot will be drawn after Feb. 11, the date set as a deadline for candidates who wish to withdraw from the election.

The annual event, sponsored by the Humane Society of Lincoln County in Ruidoso, according to Humane Society president Joe Truitt, gives residents a chance to personally meet the candidates and question them regarding municipal issues.

The women are asked to bring a box supper for two to be donated to the Humane Society. The supper will then be auctioned to the highest bidder with the proceeds going towards the Lincoln County Humane Society program in Ruidoso.

The Ruidoso Downs village clerk, Hazel Lawing, reported that seven Ruidoso Downs residents

### "No Dumping" - "No Trash" Law To Be Enforced

Michael Richardson, Lincoln County Environmental Improvement Agency officer, announced this week that immediate court action will be imposed upon those convicted of disposing of refuse and trash on unauthorized property. Richardson called attention to area residents "dumping trash" in the Gaviñan Canyon area as well as other supposedly "isolated" locations near and in the corporate limits of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

Richardson also stated "No advance warning is necessary and that those suspected and convicted of dumping refuse or trash of any kind will be prosecuted in the court."

Regulation No. 3, adopted by the New Mexico Water Quality Control Commission, 1968, states "No person shall dispose of any refuse in a natural watercourse or in a location and manner where there is a reasonable

probably that the refuse will be moved into a natural watercourse by leaching or otherwise.

The regulation defines "refuse" to mean "materials including all waste food, swill, carrion, slop and all waste from the preparation, cooking and consumption of food and from the handling, storage and sale of food products, the carcasses of animals, junked parts of bodies of automobiles, waste paper, paper cartons, tree branches, yard trimmings, discarded furniture, cans, oil, ash, bottles and all other unwholesome material."

Richardson stated Thursday that legal authorities associated with the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Agency, Santa Fe, notified him that he had the legal authority to file criminal action in Magistrate Court against those suspected of dumping refuse or trash.

The ornamental plants around your home need pruning and training annually to make them beautiful. The type and amount will vary greatly, so it's

very important that you understand how to prune each plant on your property. To understand the proper pruning methods, you'll have to study, practice and observe. Study the plant, its growth habits and flowering characteristics. Practice removing stems and branches. Observe the effect of your pruning job on the shape, vigor, flowering, etc., of the plant. Proper pruning makes your plants look young, vigorous and beautiful for many years. Think of your plants in groups rather than individually. Group in your mind all plants having similar growing and flowering habits, or which have similar uses. Each group requires a special type of pruning. It is easier to remember the special pruning methods for particular groups of plants than for each individual plant.

All plants can be classified as evergreen or deciduous. Evergreen plants retain their leaves or needles throughout the year. Deciduous plants drop their leaves in the fall and replace them in the spring. Evergreens are divided into narrow-leaved and broad-leaved plants. Deciduous plants are divided into groups which produce flowers in early spring or stems grown the past year, and those which bloom later on new wood.

Light pruning on broad-leaved evergreens can be done any time. Severe pruning is best done during the winter months. Narrow-leaved evergreens such as pines and junipers are best pruned in late spring following the first flush of growth. Do not prune spring-flowering deciduous shrubs before flowering.

George Hancock, now serving an appointed term on the Ruidoso Downs Village Council, has announced that he will seek election to that body in the upcoming March 7 election.

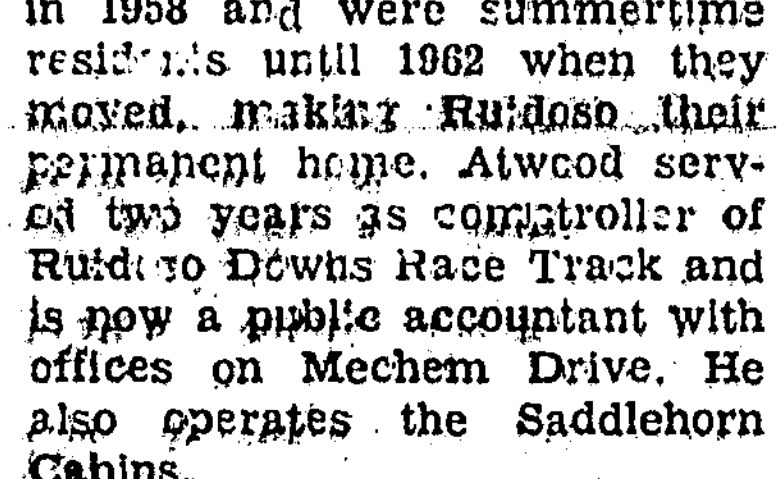

## West Texas Futurity Set For April 9

The 1973 running of the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park will carry an estimated purse of \$150,000.

This projection was announced over the weekend following a meeting between Sunland Park officials and members of the racing committee of the Quarter Horse Assn. of West Texas.

The staging of the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park is a joint project between the track and the Quarter Horse Association. The 1972 running, scheduled for Sunday, April 9, will offer an estimated purse of \$100,000.

The '73 edition is planned for April 8. Distance of the Futurity is 330 yards.

Among the details finalized over the weekend was the switching of the original nominating deadline to June 1, 1972. The nominating fee is \$25. (Last year, the original nomination came due on July 1.)

In another development, Sunland Park doubled the added money from \$2,500 to \$5,000.

Plans for the 1973 running of the West Texas Derby at 400 yards were also finalized. The original nomination payment of \$75 was again set for Oct. 15. The event will be run on April 1, 1973, offering an estimated gross purse of \$25,000.

The added money will be increased to \$3,000.

Plans are also in the works to establish a major stakes for older horses. Like the West Texas Futurity and the West Texas Derby, the new event will be a co-operative venture between Sunland and the Quarter Horse Assn. of West Texas. The initial running is being pointed toward April 29, 1973.

Sunland Park was represented at the meeting by General Manager Art Johnson and Racing Secretary Pete Drypolcher. "The response to both the Futurity and the Derby has been excellent," Drypolcher commented. "The strength of the Futurity is indicated by the fact this year's purse—the first time the Futurity will be offered at Sunland Park—will reach the prestigious \$100,000 level."

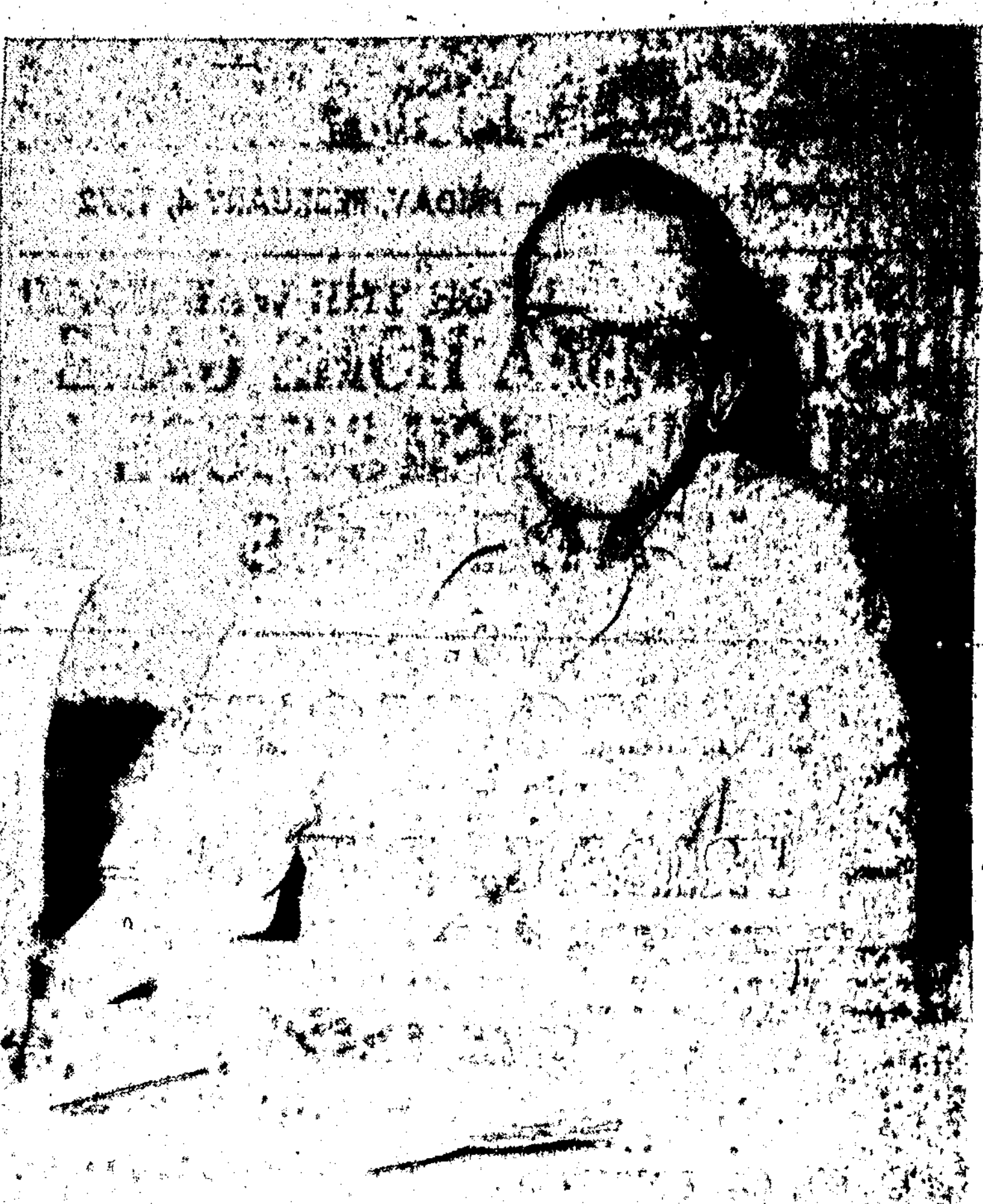
Experience in both high school and the elementary grades are a part of the background of Tom McNeill, sixth grade teacher at the Nob Hill School.

McNeill attended public school at Dexter and completed his education by earning his BA and MA degree at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. He and his wife, Marie, have three children — a married daughter, Mrs. Pat Courier of Roswell; a married son, Tom McNeill, a student at New Mexico State University, and Cindy, a Junior at Ruidoso High School.

McNeill noted that a good line of communication between parents, teachers and students is necessary for the best possible education and explained the "contract" system in use by his class. A contract is drawn up by the teacher and student and co-signed by the parent. The contract pledges that the student will complete a certain level of work in the subject and is renewable on completion. McNeill stated that the system seemed to be working quite well with his students.

Diagnosis of the needs of individual students and an attempt to concentrate on those particular needs is important to balance successes and failures to encourage the students of the class.

As an example, science students are allowed to select subjects for research that interest them rather than having rigid assignments. The prepared report is then graded not only on

## Inside The Capital

SANTA FE — New Senate  
President Pro Tem I. M. (Ike)  
Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sier-  
ra, says long distance interstate

truckers' taxes and fees should be boosted by the legislature. A 20-year legislator, Smalley, a Deming lawyer, says interstate truckers pay proportionately less truck taxes and fees than smaller intrastate motor carriers.

Rep. Ralph Petty, D-Lincoln-Sierra, favors "killing the whole truck tax bill." In original form the bill "calls for as much as an 800 per cent increase for big interstate trucks and more than 100 per cent for some small intrastate trucks," Rep. Petty says.

Petty voted for Roswell Republican Rep. Colin McMillan's House amendment, approved by only 36-34, to cut added truck taxes and fees from \$6.5 million to \$2.5 million a year. The hot fight over the bill continued this week.

The McMillan amendment vote included: For the cut from \$6.5 to \$2.5 million increase: Reps. Petty, John Bigbee, R-DeBaca - Guadalupe - Torrance; George Blocker, D-Jal; Robert Johnson, R-Clovis; Clifton Moreland, D-Quay; Hoyt Patilison, R-Curry; Ralph Pruitt, R-Clovis, and William Upton, D-Deming (Luna-Hidalgo Counties).

Against: Reps. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen; Alvin Castillo, D-Colfax County; Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas; David Salzman, D-Union-Mora-Harding, and Alfonso Vigil, D-Ranchos de Taos. Sen. Smalley says of his new president pro tem's post: "It's a good job. The work flow of the Senate is moving very smoothly. There have been very few disputes on bills in committee before they come out on the floor."

He said the Wednesday (Feb. 2) cutoff introduction date for bills will allow time for printed bills to be returned for adequate consideration in the 30-day legislative session. Sen. Smalley says: "There seems to be a very sincere effort by all committees to take care of their work as quickly as possible."

Smalley says district, Court of Appeals and Supreme Court judges should receive pay raises. He believes the amount will be compromised between Gov. Bruce King's \$7,000-a-year recommendation and the Judicial Council's \$12,500 proposal. Salaries are \$20,000, \$21,500, and \$22,500 now.

Sen. Smalley introduced a King administration capital improvements bill that includes \$140,000 for an academic classroom at Carrier Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children at Truth or Consequences. Largest of 11 items on the \$5 million-plus list are \$1,562 million to finish the state microwave radio system and \$1.5 million for a new building to house the Motor Vehicle Department and Revenue Bureau in Santa Fe.

Smalley, the University Study Committee chairman, strongly supports a pending USC bill in the House authorizing \$10 million in property tax bonds for books for state universities' libraries. He said requests came from students to the USC at statewide hearings last fall.

Rep. Petty will strongly oppose in the House the increased horse race track bill that cleared the Senate 23-18. Petty says the boost is unnecessary because the state expects a \$18 million general fund surplus June 30.

He said total New Mexico

tracks' pari-mutuel tax payments jumped 23 per cent last year over 1970. "The base on the pari-mutuel handle is broad enough that taxes should never be raised," Rep. Petty said.

The Senate-approved bill would add a total of \$232,210 a year to state revenues. The effect on Ruidoso Downs: Pari-mutuel tax, up \$9,941; admissions tax, up \$82,830; 20 per cent of "breakage," up \$35,701, and 50 per cent of unclaimed pay tickets, up \$9,269.

The effect on La Mesa Park, Raton: Pari-mutuel tax, \$143, 537, unchanged from 1971; admissions tax, up \$11,702; 20 per cent of "breakage," up \$13,039, and 50 per cent of unclaimed pay tickets, up \$4,465.

The Senate vote on the racing tax revenue increases included: For the bill: Sens. Tibbo Chavez, D-Belen; Finis Heidel, D-Lovington, whose district includes Jal and Eunice; Smalley; C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, and Bob Wood, D-Curry-Roosevelt.

Against: Sens. John Conway, R-Lincoln-Otero; Aubrey Dunn, D-Lincoln-Otero; Odie Echols, D-Curry-Roosevelt; John Morrow, D-Union-Harding-Colfax. Sen. Emmett Hart, D-Quay-De-Baca-Guadalupe, was excused from voting because he has a financial interest in a New Mexico horse race track.

Ex-State Sen. Joe Skeen, R-Piache, Lincoln County, predicted the House will kill the racing tax boost bill. Skeen represents New Mexico Horse Breeders Association as a registered lobbyist.

The Legislative Finance Committee sponsored the bill. In retaliation Rep. Petty introduced a bill, co-signed by Rep. Moreland, raising LFC membership from 7 to 15-9 representatives and 6 senators. He said the House vote will be close on the racing tax increase.

A settlement conference on the major Permian Basin natural gas price case is set to resume Feb. 8 in Washington. New Mexico seeks a sharp price boost.

Famariss Oil and Refining Co., Hobbs, settled a Santa Fe District Court suit with Navajo Refining Co. of Artesia out of court on purchase of state royalty oil. The Famariss firm operates a refinery at Monument in Lea County. Navajo attorney Joel Carson of Artesia said the Famariss company had been buying all available state royalty oil. Under settlement terms Famariss will sell part of the state royalty oil to Navajo Refining. Navajo had sued Famariss and Lea Commissioner Alex Armijo on Famariss' 1967 and 1971 state contracts to buy state royalty oil. Navajo had offered a higher price.

Gov. King asked the legislature to allow the state to take its gas royalties in gas instead of cash on future leases on gas produced on state lands. The purpose: "To make certain New Mexico is not shortchanged in a gas shortage."

## CONWAY from the CAPITAL

### STATE SENATOR JOHN E. CONWAY

This past weekend was probably the last one this Session during which we did not meet on Saturday. I had planned on being home, but on Monday my wife, Dorothy Anne, called with the bad news that our 9-year old son Matthew had come down with the mumps. Since I hadn't had them, we decided that I would stay in Santa Fe this past weekend. At this time I don't know when I will be back home this Session as we will be meeting on Saturdays and we have two more boys who have been exposed to the mumps.

As I wrote last week, one of the important bills this Session is the mobile home tax bill. I had the New Mexico Taxpayers Association compute the tax on a \$6,000 mobile home which would then be on the tax rolls at \$2,000. This is their estimate of your tax by cities in the two counties I represent: Alamogordo, \$61.70; Tularosa, \$86.54; Clarendon, \$86.50; Ruidoso, \$103.18; Ruidoso Downs, \$66.98; Carrizozo, \$124.18; Corona, \$35.94; Hondo, \$71.94; Capitán, \$101.94.

At the present time most mobile home owners are paying \$20.50 per year for a license. As you readily see, if you live in Carrizozo you are faced with an increase of six times what you paid in 1972.

I am going to offer an amendment to the bill to reduce the tax to 50% of the tax rate for 1973, 75% for 1974, and then it would be the full rate in 1975. Most of the mobile home owners I have talked to indicated they very beneficial experience for feel an increase is warranted, but I am sure none of them are thinking in terms of a 600% increase. This bill will assess a

mobile home at the same rate as houses are now assessed and attempts to have all home owners paying at the same rate.

The bill will probably come before the Senate on Monday so when you read this we will have already voted. If I can't get my amendment to the bill, I will vote against it.

The land subdivision bill has received considerable attention in the House this week. It was heard in the Natural Resources Committee last Thursday and Friday, and several amendments were made to it. I will summarize it next week if it has reached the Senate.

I sent out 2,000 questionnaires at random to residents of Lincoln and Otero Counties on several of the issues before us this Session. Cost prohibited me from sending one to every resident as I would have liked to. The last question was: "Should the laws on marijuana be relaxed?" The responses are running ten to one "no". In one of my last columns I will list all of the questions and the percentages of yes-no responses.

I hope that any of you who want to discuss any legislation with me will call my office in either Ruidoso or Alamogordo, as I am in daily contact with these offices. Those numbers are in Ruidoso, 257-4678, and in Alamogordo, 437-1840. ## Tax News

### Exemptions Can Be Claimed By All Your Dependents

April 17th looms nearer, and taxpayers who have put off preparing their income tax returns will have to come to grips with that Form 1040 they have desperately been avoiding. It's a cinch they'll remember to claim their children as exemptions. But will they remember to claim other eligible dependents?

Not always. In their rush to beat the deadline, says H & R Block, America's Largest Tax Service, taxpayers have been known to forget all types of legitimate deductions, including relatives whom they support.

If you have certain close relatives living with you or whom you supported for the entire year, and they did not file a joint return with anyone else,

you may be able to claim a \$75 dependency exemption. In order to claim this exemption, your dependent may not have earned over \$75 in gross taxable income, and you must have contributed more than half of the total cost of his support. The Internal Revenue Service defines the cost of support to include, among other items, payments for food, clothing, shelter, entertainment, and medical care.

Certain types of income received during the year, such as Social Security payments, are not counted as taxable income. However, they still must be considered as being funds available for support, when you are trying to determine whether you contributed more than half of the support.

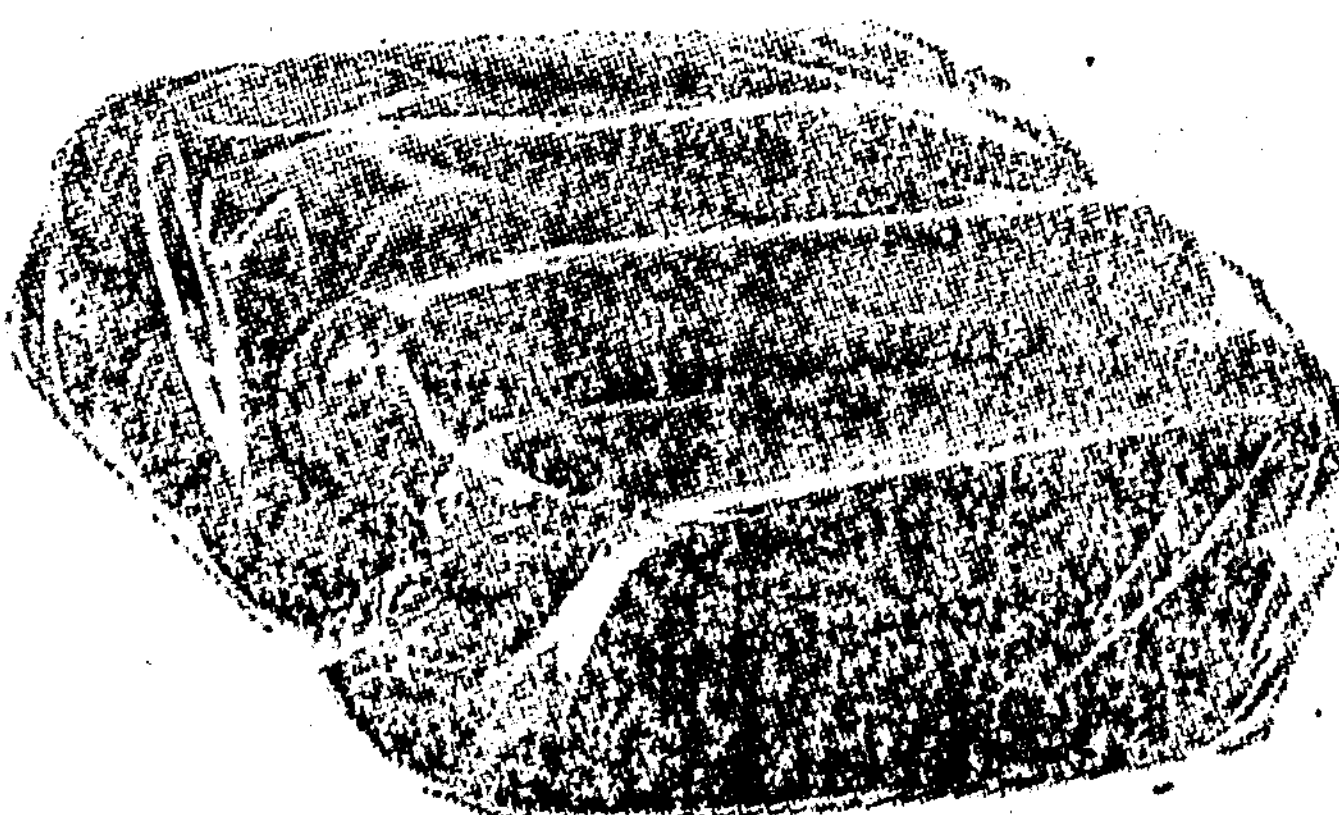
Suppose an uncle lives part of the time with you and part of the time with other relatives. If you and at least one other person contribute major support (each individual contributing

10% or more of the cost of support) join together to file Form 2120 (Multiple Support Statement) then one of you will be able to claim the full \$75 dependency exemption for your uncle. This can only be claimed to claim the exemption.
