1970-72 Ruidoso Village Council Holds Final Meet

The final session of the 1970-72 Ruidoso Village Council, Thursday, March 9, concluded in complete harmony in contrast with their stormy beginning two years ago. At the conclusion of the final session all outgoing elected officials expressed their congratulations to the newly elected mayor and trustees, Mayor-elect Leon Farrar, and trustees Ab Gunter and Don Riley.

Ruidoso Village Clerk-manager James L. Hine read a prepared statement to the governing body which stated, "In behalf of all the Village employees, we wish to say thanks to those who will no longer be a member of the governing body. We appreciate your service, dedication and cooperation in your role as a member of our team in the continuous struggle to meet the needs of our community—Thank you!"

Following the agenda's routine business the council's only other official action was the approval of Mayor George P. White's recommendation of the employment of LeRoy Randolph in the Village Sanitation Department and passing village Ordinance 72-1 regarding providing compensation for the village elected officials.

The new council will hold its first organizational meeting Monday, March 20, in the council chambers of the village municipal building. The next regular meeting of the governing body is scheduled for Thursday, March 30.

Hospital Board Holds Regular Meet

The Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Board met Monday to study bids opened last Friday. Due to the large volume of bids, the board has delayed acceptance of the bids until further consideration can be given them.

Large Group of School Patrons Visit Trustee Board Meet Monday

Fifty visitors were present Monday evening for the regular meeting of the Ruidoso Municipal School board of trustees held in the high school gym. Many of the visitors were reportedly at the meet to hear an explanation of the board's decision not to renew the contract of Harold Longan as principal of the Ruidoso High School.

In answer to the questions, by Mrs. Van White regarding the decision of Longan's discipline in the high school, board president Dave Parks stated that the board had acted on the recommendation of superintendent Pat Valliant and that both principals and the superintendent were required to offer such recommendation concerning the renewal of contracts for all personnel in the school system.

Mrs. White stated that she had received conflicting statements concerning discipline as the reason for not renewing Longan's contract and that she felt the public should be informed of the true facts in the decision.

Parks noted that the board had studied the situation very carefully before making the decision and he felt that, to question the parties involved in public, would only lead to embarrassment of those involved.

Jo Perryman stated that she felt that the majority of students in the schools were well disciplined and were a credit to the schools.

Parks then asked if there were any other comments, and there being none, the board adjourned to executive session for the discussion of teachers' contracts for the coming year.

Following the executive session, the board voted to retire all teachers with the exception of one, who was put on a probationary status. All teacher's aids were rehired and, in the maintenance and custodial department, all were rehired with the exception of Wallace Hinkle.

Action taken preceding visitors' business included:

* Reading of a contract from Dean & Mound for the auditing work.

* Vote to contract for a Driver's Education car at \$300 per semester. The board noted that this year would be the first that a car had not been furnished free of charge.

* Approved warrants and vouchers.

* Accepted the resignation of Virgil Whittington at the end of the school year.

* Heard a report on the progress of the building program

from Superintendent Pat Valliant.

* Noted that a call for bids on remodeling would be issued March 20 with bid opening set for April 13. Valliant stated that several special meets would be required before final detail was completed for the project.

* Approved the continuation of the special education program at White Mountain School and the beginning of such a program in the Nob Hill School. Heard Marie McNeil, teacher for the White Mountain program, explain the purpose for the program. Valliant noted that the program will be supported by state funds.

* Valliant stated that he would be attending budget workshops and Johnson-O'Malley workshops the balance of the week in Albuquerque.

* Discussed contract for the Indian bus route and decided that an attempt would be made to secure an Indian driver for the route.

* Open classroom concept at Nob Hill school was discussed and Parks stated that the board does not intend to go to the open classroom at the present time but that the building would be remodeled so that the school may go either traditional or the open concept. The board voted to reserve controls of any change in the teaching methods.

* The board again issued an invitation to any parent to visit the schools.

The next regular meeting of the board of trustees will be held April 11, 7:00 p.m. at the school administration office.

Family Food Budget Explained by NMSU

Where does all the food money go? If you're a parent, you already know that your offspring eat up a considerable portion of the food budget.

And if you stop to think, it's a good thing that feeding the children is on a pay-as-you-go basis, says Louise Garrett, extension nutrition specialist at New Mexico State University.

For instance, consider feeding a child in a four-member family. If the family's food spending falls in line with USDA's moderate-cost plan, that child would run up a food bill of about \$8,500 by the time he is 18.

Miss Garrett explains that the moderate-cost plan is one of four USDA food plans — the others are economy, low-cost, and liberal — that can help gauge the quantities of food needed for individuals of specified age and sex at the level of spending the family can afford.

Say a family of four has two elementary school children. At the moderate-cost level, the family would spend about \$40 a week for food at home, with the children's share about \$9 each. If these children are a boy and girl, their food bill would run about the same — until the age of 9. Then a gap in the eating pattern appears: the girl's food bill peaks at about \$11 a week between ages 12-15; the boy's runs about \$13.50 a week between the ages 15-17.

The size of the family is also a factor, according to Miss Garrett. The two-child family with a net income of \$8,000 would probably spend at the moderate-cost plan level. Add two children to the same family, and the spending per child would fall in the low-cost category.

Food costs per individual in large families are lowered about 10 per cent by savings gained through buying and cooking in large quantities. All these costs refer to 21 meals a week prepared at home. They don't include the cost of candy bars, ice cream cones, or little friends invited to dinner.

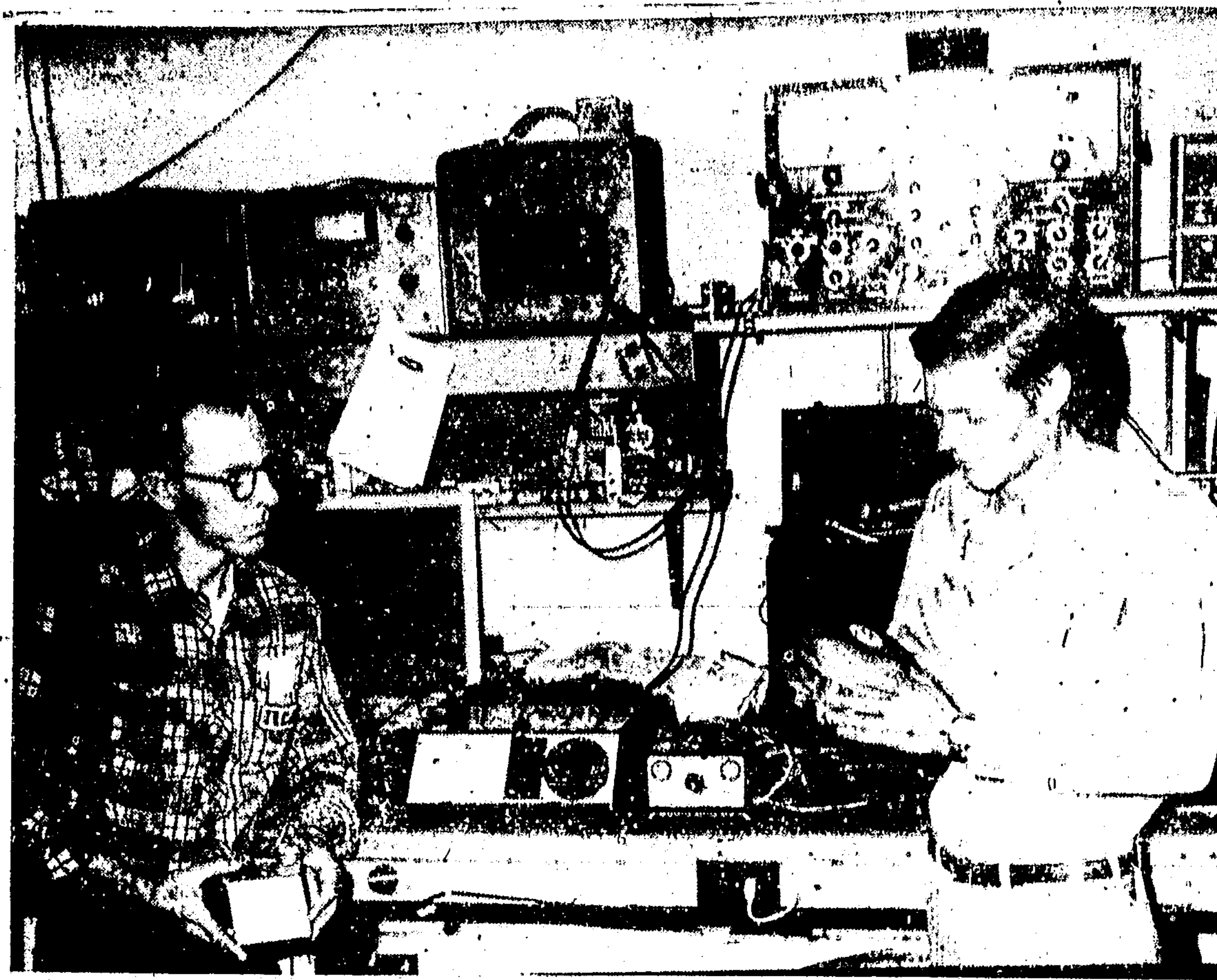

LEANDRO VEGA, JR.

Leandro Vega, Jr., 40, Lincoln County native and former Lincoln County Sheriff, 1965-68, formally announced this week that he will be a candidate for the Lincoln County Sheriff's position on the Republican Party Ticket in the New Mexico Primary Election, June 6th.

Vega, a law enforcement officer for over twelve years, many of which have been in conjunction and in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He has been officially certified, as required by N. M. State statutes, as a qualified law enforcement officer to serve in New Mexico.

In addition to his official certification, Vega also holds eight state recognized diplomas received following his attending special studies in law enforcement seminars and special schools. The newly announced candidate for sheriff also has attended an average of two specialized law enforcement seminars per year during his twelve years plus of law enforcement work.

Currently serving in the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department as Under-Sheriff, Vega stated in announcing his plans

to seek the elective office, "Good and impartial law enforcement has been my personal aim and goal since my first law enforcement assignment over twelve years ago." He continued, "From the very beginning, I made a pledge to myself to attend every possible law enforcement training school and special training seminar so that I could be both aware of modern methods of law enforcement and up to date to changing criminal laws so that I could do my very best to enforce the laws, protect our people and solve crimes."

Vega holds at least four New Mexico Law Enforcement Officer Training School Certificates, all of which were under the sponsorship of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They include specialized studies in Advanced Latent Fingerprint Techniques, Classification Course in Fingerprinting and Mob and Riot Control and Defensive Tactics. Vega also has been officially certified by the New Mexico State Health and Social Services Department to administer the SM-7 Mobile Breath test for those suspected of driving while under the influence of alcohol.

He has also attended and earned at least four diplomas from New Mexico Sheriff and Police Association's sponsored special training schools. They include Command and Supervision Diploma, Burglary and Armed Robbery Police Training Course, Narcotics Special Enforcement Diploma and a Law Enforcement Homeless Seminar Diploma.

Vega is a long time member of the National Sheriff's Association, the New Mexico Sheriff's Association and is also a member of the American Legion having served in the U. S. Army, which included a tour of duty in Europe. He also was on the staff of the Sierra Blanca Boys' Camp at Fort Stanton.

I am a candidate for the Republican nomination for County Commissioner, District 3. I would like to help continue the good work of the retiring Commissioners and their predecessors.

In past years, not in New Mexico, I have held offices in municipal government. In New Mexico I have worked for our state government in Santa Fe, and with district attorney offices here in Lea County, and in the judicial district for Grant, Hidalgo, and Luna Counties. During that time some experience with county government has been gained.

The reappraisal program now being worked on in Lincoln County is important to all of us here. The foregoing experience and that as a lawyer generally have given me some knowledge of assessing problems and procedures. This experience might be helpful in the implementation of the reappraisal program.

I would like to see more local control over real estate tax rates. Legislation can be requested allowing maximum tax rates to be set, and that would require voter approval to raise. This would be particularly timely with reappraisal. Such rate or rates in the first place, should be based upon total assessments under the reappraisal program, and should be set for raising the approximate amount of money as in the immediate past.

In general I believe in more local control over local affairs, Santa Fe and Washington having enough to do on state and national problems. County officials can properly lobby for more power to set county salaries and staffing. Contrary to our present state laws, law enforcement people and administrative heads in the smaller counties may sometimes need higher pay than in larger counties. Because of smaller staff-

ing they need to be completely capable themselves in every area of their work. In a real sense this may sometimes call for better qualified key people than in larger counties where there can be more delegation and specialization.

A zoning ordinance for the entire county should be studied and had. This so as to keep the best of what we have, for our own living enjoyment, and well as for tourism. And so as to provide for any business developments that will not be detrimental, or that could be detrimental if uncontrolled as to location.

These and other issues will be discussed during the campaign.

Postal Examination Set For Clerk Position

GRASSROOTS OPINION

According to the Idaho Power Company, the country's generating system helps to keep your electric clocks at the correct time. The utility company notes that, "Some years ago, electric companies throughout the country agreed to use a standard of 60 cycles per second for a frequency of alternating current power generation. Today, electric clocks in the nation count seconds at the same speed. To make sure, time of a master clock in Canton, Ohio—accurate to within a few thousandths of a second—is constantly compared with that of a clock operated from the nation's power systems. If these clocks vary by two seconds, notice is given to all electric utilities to change generation slightly to correct the time. The frequency of an electric motor that drives a clock is driven by the frequency of the alternating current. If it receives 59 cycles per second, it runs slow. If it receives 61, it runs fast. It must receive 60 cycles per second."

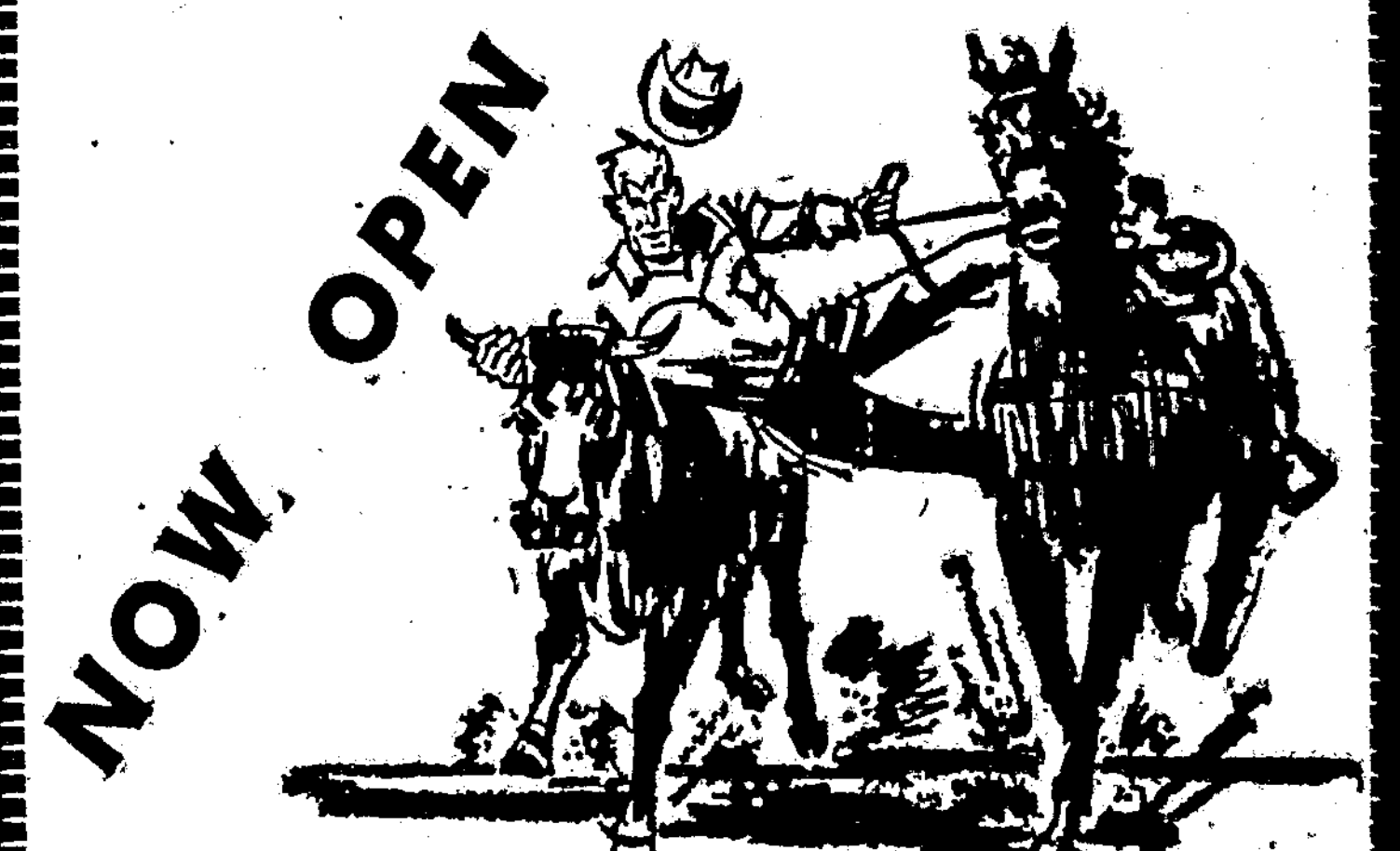

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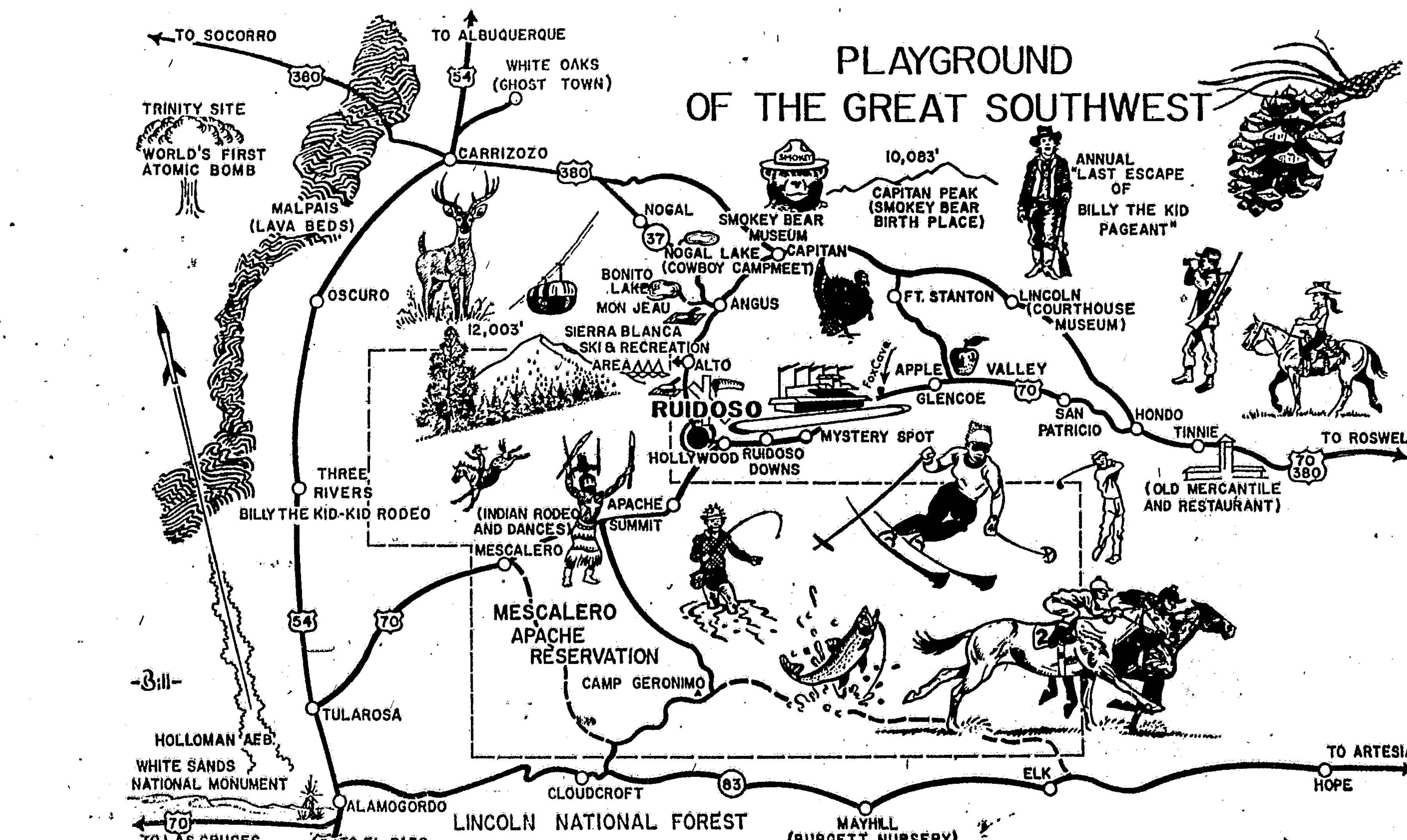

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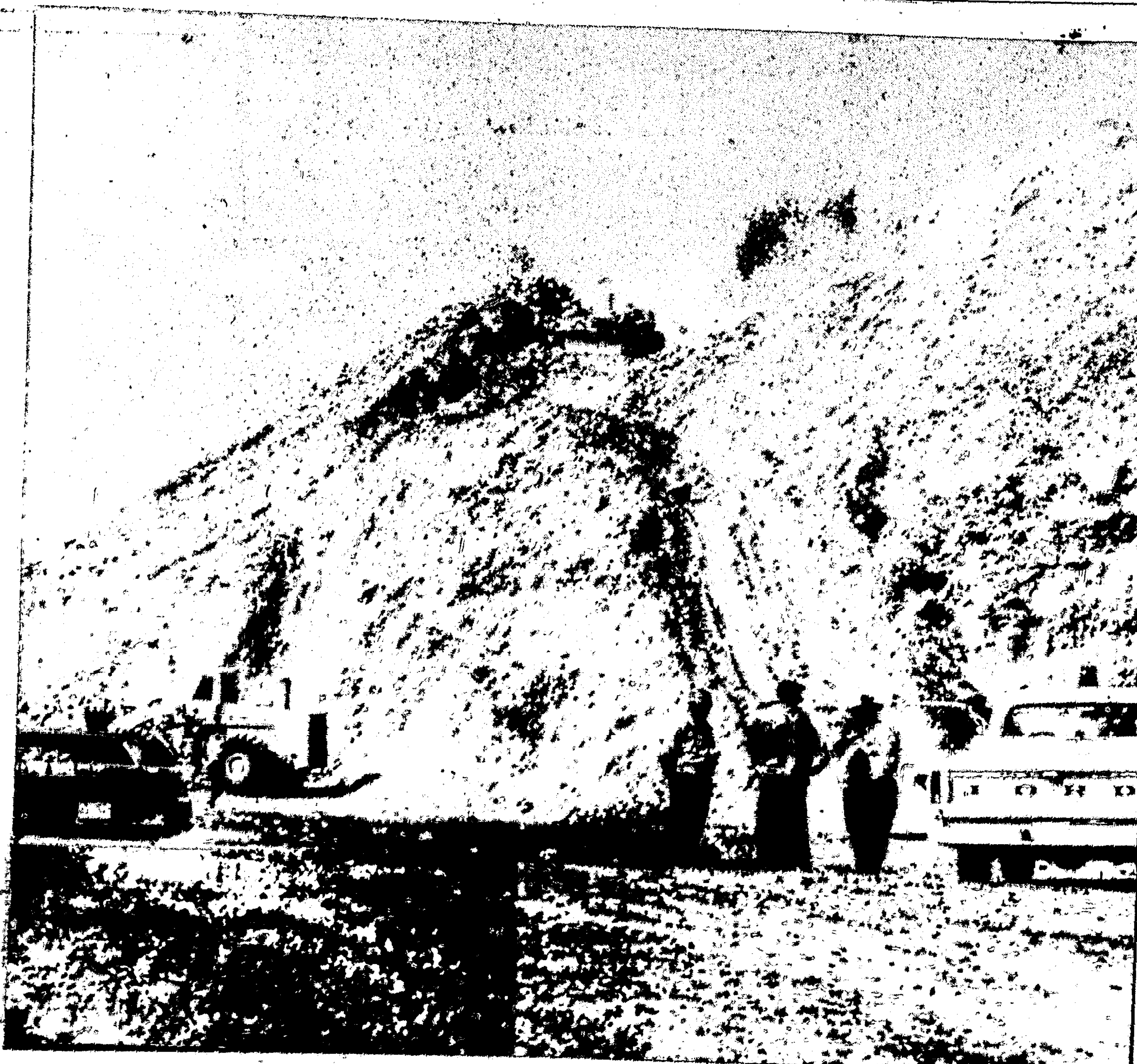

Price Freeze Questions and Answers

Q. Are dividends and interest subject to legal restraints under the Economic Stabilization Program?

A. No. However, the Committee on Interest and Dividends, established by the President, will formulate and execute a program for obtaining voluntary restraints on selected interest rates. The Committee will also continue the voluntary program for the restraint of dividend payments, subject to possible changes of standards and coverage.

Q. How long will the second phase of the Economic Stabilization Program last?

A. No time limit is being set. The objective is to end the program as soon as possible, but it will be kept in operation until the pattern of sharply increasing prices and wages has been broken. It will be ended when stability has been restored to the economy. It is incumbent upon the Congress and the Administration to take whatever steps are necessary to prevent organized labor or management from work stoppages or strikes against the public interest. . . . Legislation should be forthcoming to bring some means of bringing settlements whenever strikes are threatened in the transportation industry so vital to the public interest. Certainly the outrageous losses resulting to farmers and others dependent on shipping, rail, air and other industries call for compulsory settlements that would be binding on both sides fair to the public and the economic interests of the entire country. . . . Important overseas markets, essential to the economy and welfare of the nation and region, have already been lost. . . . There is no rhyme or reason for permitting a relatively small number of people to cripple the majority and the economy of the region and the nation."

to recommend steps to insure that the program is not necessarily prolonged.

Q. Service charges such as utility, parking meter and bridge tolls were subject to Phase I while licenses and fines such as vehicle licenses and parking tickets were exempt. Does the same situation apply to Phase II?

A. Yes. Unless specifically altered by regulations or published rulings, policy rulings issued by the Cost of Living Council and interpretations issued by the Office of Emergency Preparedness continue to be applicable after Nov. 13, 1971.

Q. Will raw agricultural products, such as fresh fruit and vegetables, be excluded from the standards for prices set by the Price Commission?

A. Yes, just as during the freeze, raw agricultural products will be excluded.

Q. How will prices and wages be controlled by the Price Commission and the Pay Board?

A. The Price Commission and the Pay Board have published standards and criteria for the control of all prices and wages which will be covered during the post-freeze program. In addition, the economy will be divided into three parts or tiers

for different surveillance and reporting procedures.

Certain large firms and collective bargaining units that are of critical importance for the control of inflation will be required to notify the Board or Commission in advance of proposed wage or price increases.

Other large economic units will be required to report periodically on their prices, employee compensation, and other matters as may be specified.

The behavior of prices and wages in the remainder of the economy, comprising the largest number of economic units (usually smaller firms), will be monitored by spot-checks and investigations of complaints by the Internal Revenue Service.

Position 1 (Eight year term).

Position 2 (Four year unexpired term).

Three Judges of the Court of Appeals.

One eight year term.

One four year unexpired term.

One two year unexpired term.

New Decal Design Noted In Restaurant Grading System

A traffic signal series of color and new decal design feature modernized identification grading signs for New Mexico food-service establishments, Larry J. Gordon, Director of the Environmental Improvement Agency announced.

The decals are cooperatively displayed in food-service establishments as part of the EIA's Consumer Protection Program with the food-service industries. The grades are fixed according to the establishment's attention to sanitary quality of operation and safety as it relates to the health and well-being of employees and consumers. For example, upon achieving top sanitation and safety status, restaur-

ants and other food-service establishments are awarded Grade A which appears in a green decal. Those establishments not meeting minimum structural requirements, thus increasing the potential for contamination of food during storage, preparation and service are graded B which appears on a yellow decal. Grade C, a red decal, is issued when an establishment is found to be operating under unsanitary conditions, thus placing its future operation in serious doubt.

Carl Henderson, Chief of the Consumer Protection Section, said the EIA's food-protection program under Gerald Martino includes furnishing the grading decals to all food-service establishments.

"Visibly posted grade cards serve as a quality notice of the permit holder and indicates to

every consumer, citizen and visitor alike, the sanitary conditions that may be encountered," Martino said.

"Any grade other than Grade A should serve as warning to the consumer that the establishment does not meet safety standards and that there is a greater opportunity for the consumer to contract a food-borne illness," Gordon said.

The EIA's policy of notifying local news media when a food-service establishment is downgraded and again when it is upgraded to comply with minimum standards will be continued, Gordon said.

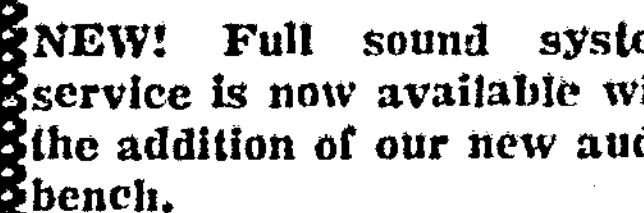

Results have been announced for the various members of the Junior Racers in competition the past two weeks.

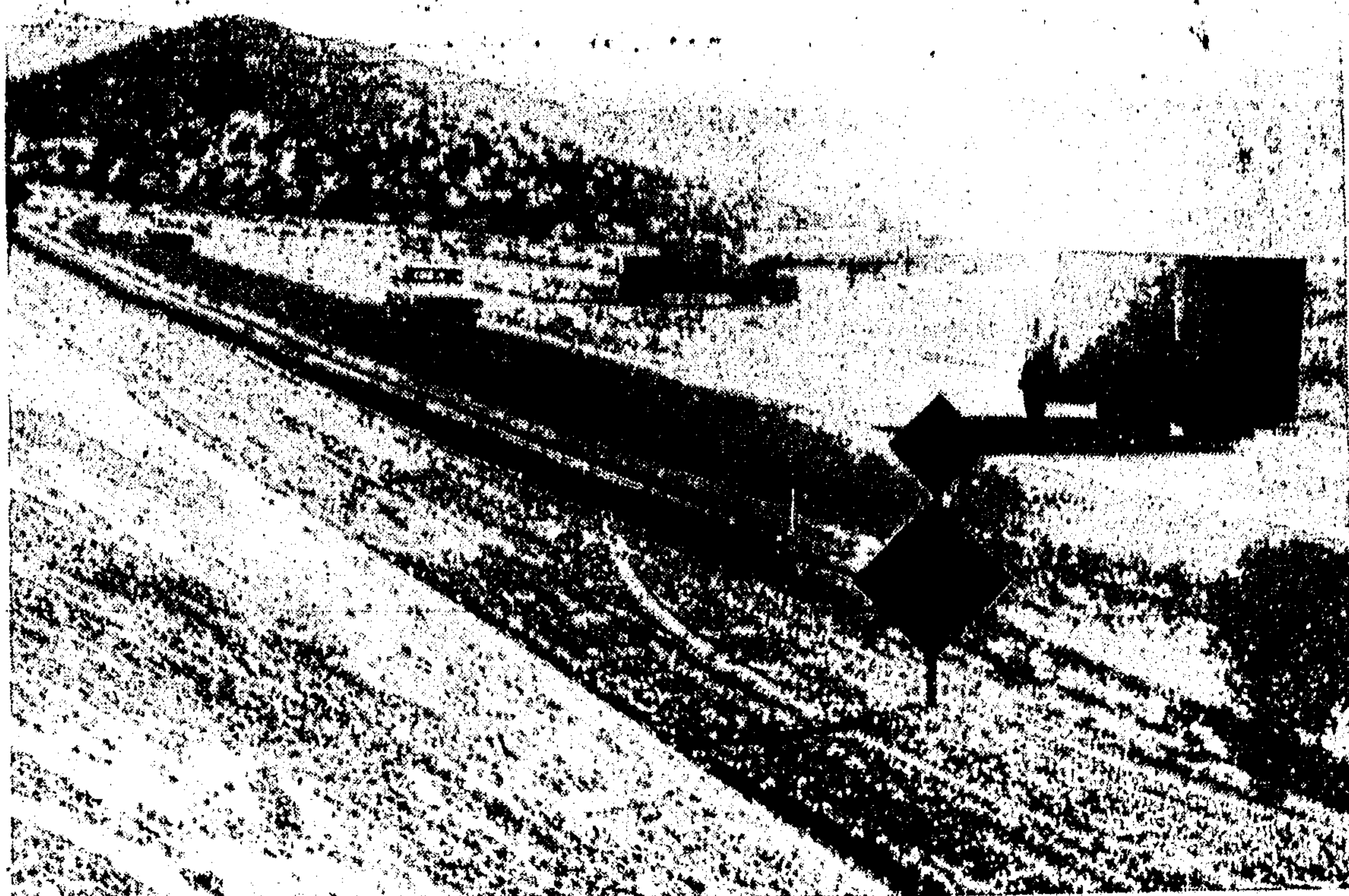

NM Pilots to Aid In Detection of Dope Smuggling

A new program developed to enlist the aid of New Mexico pilots in the detection of narcotics smuggling by airplane was announced today by Capt. T. J. Chavez, of the Narcotics Division of the New Mexico State Police.

Called "RANSA" or "Report Aerial Narcotics Smuggling Activities," the program will ask New Mexico's 5400 pilots to report to the Narcotics Division suspicious activities involving the use of aircraft including reports of aircraft seen landing on roads at roadside strips other than airports and in the fields.

The "RANSA" program will be publicized by posters to be placed at airports throughout the state listing phone numbers for pilots to call and the information requested.

Several pilot organizations, including the New Mexico Aviation Association and the New Mexico Professional Flight Instructors Association, have promised support to the program, along with the New Mexico Flying Review.

Narcotics Division personnel will meet with pilots groups throughout the state to discuss the program and wallet size cards listing the "RANSA" program telephone numbers will be issued.

Captain Chavez stressed the fact that the names of persons giving information would not be divulged and that those desiring to remain anonymous could call the "RANSA" number and give information on aerial narcotics smuggling activities without further contact with the office. Rewards for information will also be offered.

Captain Chavez said that narcotics smuggling by air is on the increase in New Mexico, Arizona, California and Texas and that the Narcotics Division has already received valuable information from New Mexico pilots who want to combat air smuggling.

The "RANSA" program was developed through the cooperation of the New Mexico Aviation Department and the Federal Aviation Administration. Both agencies have endorsed the "RANSA" approach to the problem.

The "RANSA" phone number is 527-5122 in Santa, New Mexico. It is suggested that you identify yourself as calling "RANSA" and all collect calls will be accepted.

Special Cancellation Told For Apollo 16

The U. S. Navy's Manned Spacecraft Recovery forces in the Atlantic and Pacific will cancel and cancel philatelic mail for the April 16, 1972 launch of Apollo 16.

The special Apollo 16 covers will be processed through designated coordinators at Norfolk, Va., and Honolulu, Hawaii. From the Hawaii site, First Day covers will be forwarded to the recovery ship.

Atlantic covers sent to Norfolk will be processed through the local Post Office, which will use the standard "U. S. Postal Service" cancellation device.

The cancellation will not contain the name of an Atlantic recovery ship, since the Atlantic Recovery Force composition will not include a ship with postal facilities.

To ensure adequate time for handling covers, collectors throughout the world should send PRE-STAMPED, SELF-ADDRESSED envelopes to the appropriate coordinator before

other law enforcement agencies.

Inside The Capital

Election activity heated up across New Mexico as the April 4 filing day drew near.

Ruben Pankey of Monticello, Sierra County, is a prospect for the Republican nomination for the U. S. House in big District 2. Pankey is president of New Mexico Cattle Growers Association and an ex-member of the State Board of Finance. He is a rancher and a longtime active Republican.

Three other Republicans showed interest in the U. S. House District 2 race but State GOP Chairman Tom McKenna did not identify them. Stelner Mason of Tucuman, longtime active Republican was mentioned as a possibility for state corporation commissioner.

Mrs. Thelma Immon, Deming Republican, will not run for reelection to the State Board of Education. A former Democrat, she represented Luna, Hidalgo and Grants Counties on the

board before the 1972 legislative redistricting of the 10 seats. Mrs. Immon, a rancher, reportedly may run for the GOP nomination for the State House in the Hidalgo-Luna Counties district. Rep. William J. Upton, D-Deming, will seek re-election in the realigned district.

District 32 spans all of Hidalgo County with 4,734 population and 8 Luna County precincts with 10,149 residents.

Asked whether he will seek re-election, Rep. Ralph Petty, D-Ruidoso, says: "I doubt it. However, I'm not 100 per cent decided either way. I dislike having to campaign in a whole new district when I'm so busy." Petty, a second-term representative, is vice-president of Security Bank of Ruidoso.

Reapportionment placed Reps. Petty and John Bigbee, R-Enclino, in District 50—all of Guadalupe County and part of Lincoln, DeBaca and Torrance Counties.

Sen. I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra, presided as co-chairman at a meeting of the Legislative Council in Santa Fe. Sen. Finis Heidel, D-Lovington, was renamed Tax Study Committee vice chairman pending his consent.

District Judge Edwin L. Felter of Santa Fe approved the provisional legislative reapportionment plan for use in 1972 elections. He retained jurisdiction of the reapportionment case. Judge Felter did not rule on a major switch in reapportionment bills set for 1974 to enumerate districts.

Estimated precinct populations are the basis for the provisional plan. House District 61 in Lea County spans Eunice Precincts 71 and 72, Jal Precincts 73, 74 and 75, Oil Center Precincts 76 and Hobbs Precincts 35, 36, 52, 53 and 54.

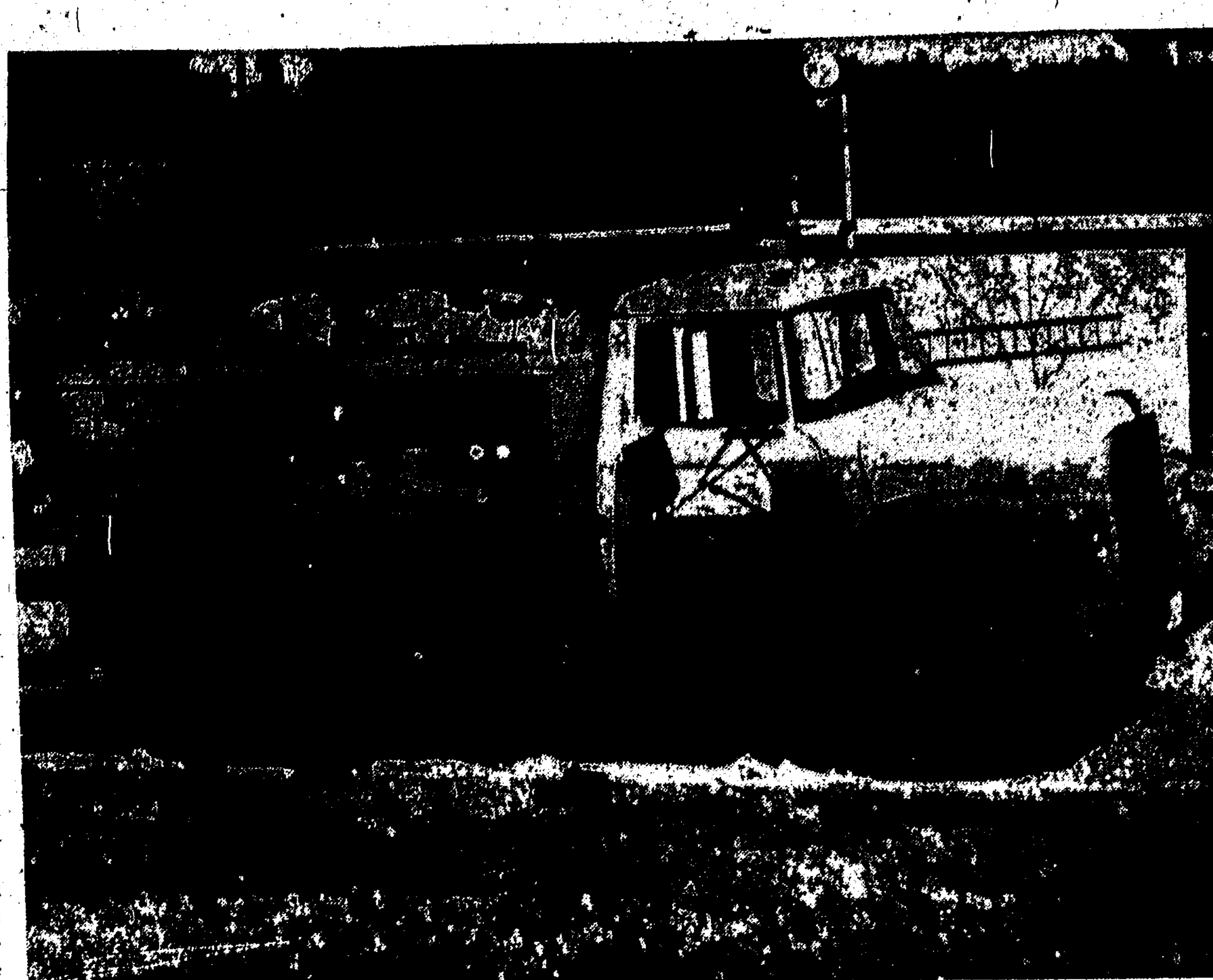
Rep. George Blocker, D-Jal, lives in the district but plans to retire from the House. Some 7,500 southern Hobbs population is in the new district. The district is in an alternate plan accepted by Judge Felter. Felter rejected a Lea-Curry-Roosevelt Counties electoral district plan. It shaped six House districts within the counties and called for another representative to be elected at large in all of the three counties.

The approved plan carves out seven House districts within the counties. Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry County, is in District 63 that covers 13 Curry, 4 Lea and 2 Roosevelt County precincts. Pattison complained the district includes Lea County courthouse at Lovington. He said the district stretches 150 miles from Grady to Lovington.

Pattison whacked Republican legislative leaders. The four leaders live in Albuquerque and Roswell. The approved alternate plan placed Rep. Robert Johnson in an all-Clovis district of 11 precincts. Johnson is a Republican. It puts Rep. Ralph Pruitt, R-Clovis, in a district of 11 Curry County precincts and a Portales precinct. Ten of the 11 Curry County precincts are in Clovis. A federal census area in Valencia County listed 1,160 Laguna Reservation Indians in an enumerator district that is uninhabited. Action was deferred because enumerators districts will not be used until at least 1974.

The Laguna Reservation population lives in a House district represented by Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, under the enumerator district plan. But Laguna land is divided between districts represented by Reps. Luna and Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, in the enumerator district plan.

Former Atty. Gen. Earl Hartley said a motion was filed by Shell Oil Co. and the State of New Mexico for the Federal

County Agent's Column

Wool sold in Artesia recently for 33 cents a pound. This is about ten cents above last year. Indications are that the staple fine wools are going to be in the most demand this year. I understand that a new fabric using 80% wool is coming out. It is a "single" knit and it requires a 3-inch staple fine wool for the best product.

I have heard of some offers of 35 cents a pound but no actual sale. The first wool sale in Roswell will be March 21 and it will give us a better idea on the wool market.

R-R-D

I saw some pink in the apple trees around Hondo this weekend. If the warm weather continues they will be in bloom in another week to ten days. This is at least three weeks earlier than normal. Let's hope for some cool weather to delay the blooms.

The peaches are in full bloom. Any freezing weather below 29 degrees will likely kill the fruit crop.

R-R-D

If you think of landscaping as planning, planting and construction to achieve pleasing results, you have half the job of landscaping completed. Planning developing and drawing a design that can be followed, should be the first stage of any good landscaping project.

Purpose of landscaping include: shade, wind protection, screens, boundaries, living partitions, ground covers, wall covers, hedges, foundation plantings and providing a background setting for the home. Effects the gardener should strive to achieve include: comfort, beauty, color, natural setting and accent.

Steps to achieve these purposes and effects include: planning, preparing a plant list, protection and care. Add to the list "lots of patience". Landscapers and gardeners will find a treasure chest of ideas on planting and plans at the Lincoln County Extension Office in Carrizozo.

Power Commission to hear the Permian Basin natural gas rate case directly without a FPC examiner hearing.

Bypassing an examiner hearing would expedite a decision in the key case affecting natural gas prices at the wellhead in the Permian Basin in Southeastern New Mexico.

Hartley said: "In the long run, they're going to have to look at the boiler-type users who could just as easily convert to some other type of fuel." Hartley, representing New Mexico in the case, says present supplies of natural gas will last about 10 years.

If big, boiler-type industries converted to another type of fuel, the supply would last 50 years, he said. Hartley added: "That's another reason for saying: New Mexico gas should be selling at commodity prices."

A ruling on the motion for a direct FPC hearing was expected soon.

The State Racing Commission was cool toward a Santa Fe Downs plan to collect the 10-cent state admission tax on passes to New Mexico horse tracks. Santa Fe Downs said the track is considering 25-cent tickets for use of free pass patrons. The proposed division: Ten cents to the state as tax, 10 cents to a fund for purses for New Mexico-bred horses and 5 cents for the track for administrative costs. A new law broadens application of the 10-cent tax.

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Runnels Reports On Federal Spending In Lincoln County, '71

The Federal Government spent a total of \$1.5 billion in New Mexico and \$8.1 million in Lincoln County during fiscal year 1972, according to a report released by Congressman Harold Runnels, D-NM.

"The 1971 figures represent a \$2 million increase in federal expenditures credited to Lincoln County compared to the previous year," Runnels said.

The report, annually prepared by the Office of Economic Opportunity for the executive office of the President, contains a detailed state and county breakdown of all federal expenditures for the year.

In releasing the figures, Runnels said he wasn't doing so to claim any credit for the expenditures in Lincoln County or to imply that he supported all of them.

"I am reporting these figures simply because I believe every citizen should know the impact the Federal Government has on his immediate area and what funds are being spent by the various agencies," Runnels said.

The Federal Government's largest expenditure in Lincoln County was \$2.5 million for the Department of Health, Education & Welfare. This included \$1.2 million for Social Security Old Age Survivors benefits.

Expenditures by other federal agencies included \$1.8 by the Department of Defense; \$1.3 by the Department of Agriculture; \$569,343 by the Department of Interior and \$428,712 by the Veterans Administration.

Also included in the expenditures was \$212,920 which was Lincoln County's share of the national debt.

Your Social Security

The social security tax contribution rate for 1972 remains the same as it was for 1971 according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative.

The rate is 5.2 percent for the employee and 5.2 percent for the employer who by law is required to match employee contributions. The contribution rate of 7.5 percent for self-employed persons also is the same as it was for 1971.

Mrs. Graves explained that effective with 1972, the maximum taxable earnings covered by social security increased from \$7,800 to \$9,000. This increase in the earnings base will tend to increase the amount of benefits payable as workers pay on this new maximum. The amount of social security monthly cash benefits is based on average yearly earnings covered by social security. The increase in benefits will also affect eligible dependents of retired, disabled, or deceased workers, who pay on the new maximum.

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FACULTY REVIEW-

E. R. (Dick) Dunagan, sixth grade teacher of Nob Hill, has been chosen for this week's Faculty Review. Dunagan has taught in the Ruidoso School system for 14 years and he and his wife reared their two children, "Dingo" and Pat in the Ruidoso area. "Dingo" is now serving as president of the Student Council and Pat was president of the organization last year.

Dunagan began his teaching career with the Engle, N. M. school and has also taught in the El Paso, Texas and Weed school districts. He earned his BA at UTEP in 1950 and his Masters in 1952.

Each of the male teachers at the Nob Hill School take turns of 9-weeks each instructing P. E. for the boys and Dunagan is just completing his turn. Next year he will have the full time job of Physical Education teacher.

A favorite project of his class, in which the whole school participates, is the hatching of eggs in the donated incubator. At the present time the class has both quail and chicken eggs incubating. As the process progresses, students in the class candle the eggs and note the changes in growth. After the chicks are hatched, students are sometimes allowed to take them home overnight or over the weekend.

A few years ago the girls of the class constructed a potter's wheel from a discarded washing machine, and the class now works in clay. A kiln is used to fire the figures and other work. Students purchase their own clay and are allowed to take the pieces home. While the girls in the class were preparing the

potter's wheel, the boys were tearing down a small gas motor and repairing it as their project. Who says learning can't be fun?

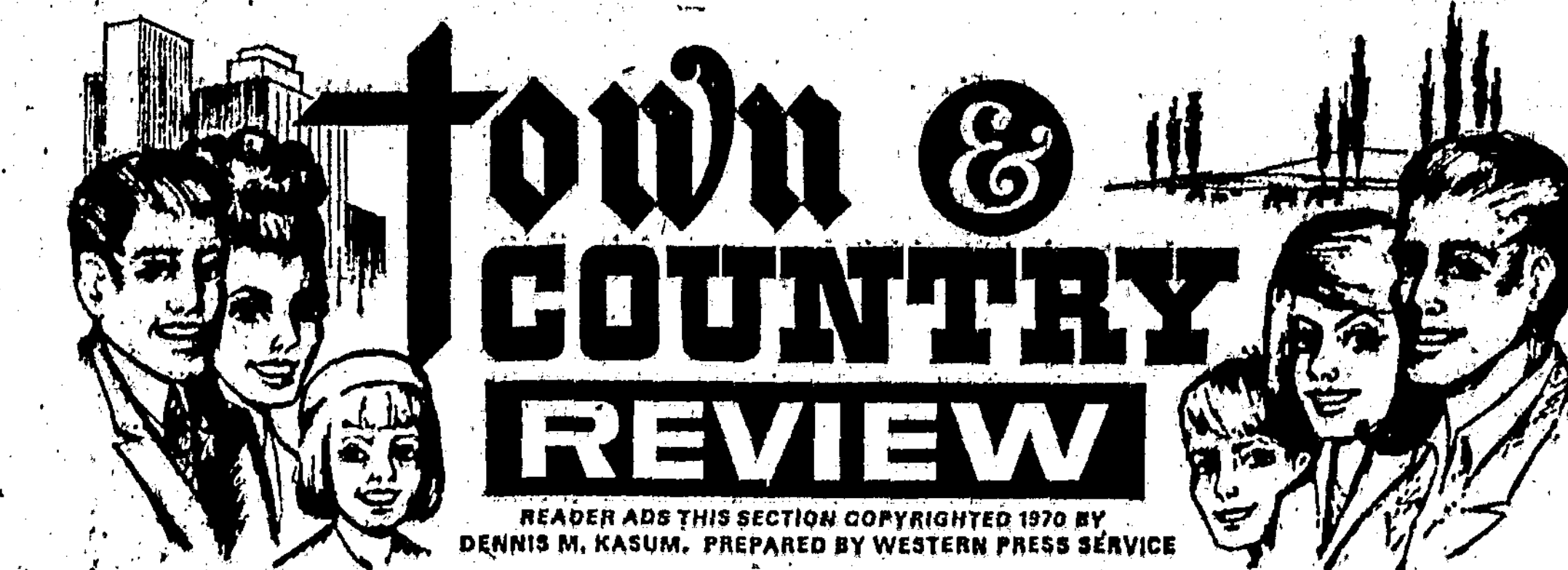

PLAY AT YOUR OWN RISK
Eddie and the corner grocer were boon companions. Often, when business was slow, the two men would engage in friendly scuffling around the store. One day, the grocer shoved Eddie a little too vigorously. Eddie lost his footing, fell against the counter, and cracked two ribs. That ended their friendship. In short order, Eddie sued the grocer for damages on grounds of assault and battery. But a court turned him down, saying his claim was barred by the doctrine of "assumption of risk."

This doctrine has wide application in all kinds of playful and recreational activities.

"One who takes part in a sport," said one court, "accepts the dangers that are obvious and necessary, just as a fencer accepts the risk of a thrust by his antagonist."

Most often, the doctrine has been applied in golf. Thus:

A golfer shanked an iron shot, and his ball struck another player standing far to the right. Admittedly, he had not yelled "Fore!" before taking his swing. Nevertheless, he could not fairly have foreseen danger to anyone so far out of range.

Results: a court ruled that the victim should not collect damages. The court said this was the kind of risk he had assumed by going onto a golf course in the first place.

But the doctrine does not apply to risks that are not "natural" to the sport—that are due instead of somebody's misconduct.

In another case two fishermen were sitting in a rowboat when one, trying to make a backward cast, hooked his companion in the cheek. Sued later for damages, he sought refuge in the doctrine of assumption of risk. "Accidents," he said, "will happen."

But the court said accidents like this will not happen if fishermen are reasonably careful with their hooks. The victim had not assumed a risk, said the court, that was preventable by plain common sense.

When my daughter from California, visits me, she brings along some of her home canned fruits, jams and jellies; also a good supply of dates. Rather than just eat them as they are I like to use them in dainties and delicacies, to make them last longer.

You may like to try some of the recipes I use:

—Date Squares—

First Part
1/2 lb. dates, chopped fine,
1/2 cup sugar,
1/2 cup water.

Boil two or three minutes. Cool. Stir in 1/2 cup thick jam and 1/2 cup chopped nuts.

Second Part

1 1/4 cup uncooked oats,
1 cup whole wheat flour,
1/2 cup white flour,
1 cup brown sugar, packed,
1 teaspoon soda,
1/2 teaspoon salt,
1 1/2 sticks of oleo.

Mix second part until crumbly. Spread 1/2 of mixture in a greased 11x8 pan. Cover with the date mixture and top with other 1/2 of crumbs. Pack down lightly. Bake until light brown; in moderate oven. When cool, cut in squares.

—Jelly Caramel Nut Pie—

Cream 3 eggs yolks, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup oleo. Add 1 tbsp. flour, 1/2 cup firm jelly and 1 tsp. vanilla. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and pour in unbaked crust. Cover with 1 cup pecans. Bake slowly.

Separate butter flake rolls into 4 rounds each. Fit 4 around sides of greased muffin tins. Fill with any jam, marmalade or apple sauce. Bake until done and serve with whipped cream.

—Old Fashioned Jelly Roll—

3 eggs,
1 cup sugar,
1/4 tsp. salt,
2 tbsp. cold water,
1 cup flour,
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder,
1/2 grated lemon rind or 1 tsp. vanilla, added last.

Cream ingredients until smooth and thick. Bake in greased and floured flat pans at 325 degrees. Turn out on foil or waxed paper; trim hard edges; spread with firm jelly or jam and roll up. Store in refrigerator until firm when sliced.

Fine Levied For Unauthorized Burn

James C. Rayburn of Alvarado, Texas, and Carrizozo, was found guilty in U. S. Magistrate Court in Alamogordo on March 11, 1972, of violating National Forest regulations. He was fined \$50 by Judge Thomas Sadenaw for constructing and maintaining a mining access road on the Smokey Bear Ranger District without a permit.

Rayburn is employed by Robert B. Means, Jr., of Carrizozo, claimant of the Means Group Mining Claims in the Jicarilla Mountains. Unauthorized construction of roads for prospecting and dubious mining ventures has been a problem on the Smokey Bear Ranger District for many years, according to a statement made by District Ranger Tom Goodrich. "The roads are usually constructed, then abandoned

within a short period of time. The result is accelerated soil erosion, a scar on the landscape and damage to the watershed."

Goodrich said, "Any road construction, or maintenance of a road, for any purpose whatsoever on the National Forest must first be approved by the Forest Supervisor. Following approval, a Special Use Permit will be issued."

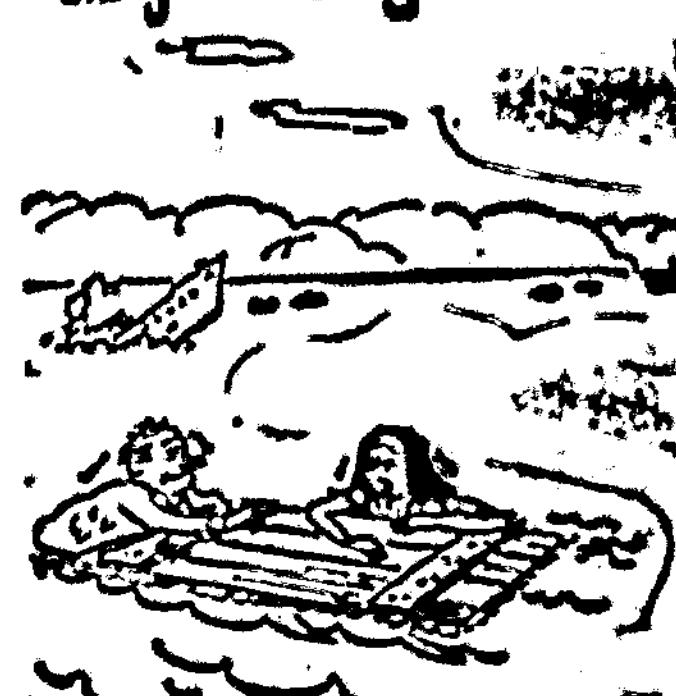

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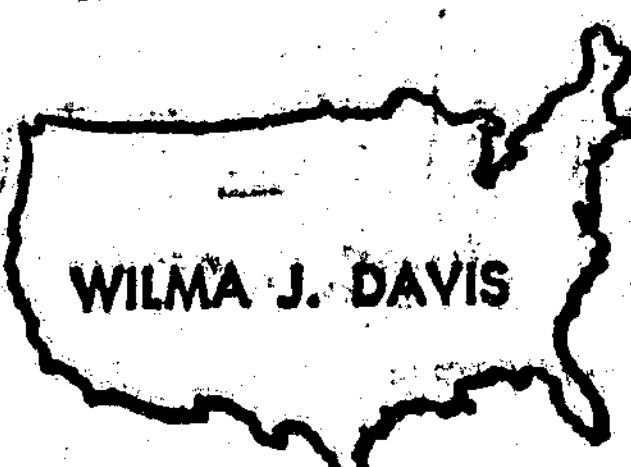
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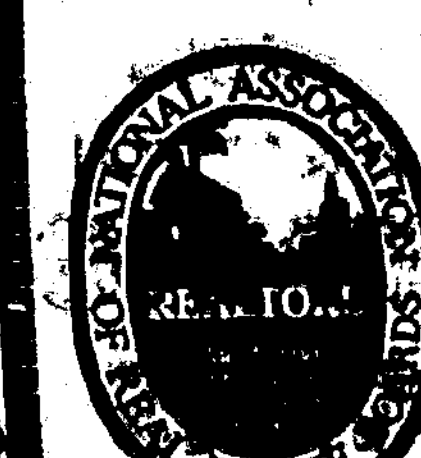
