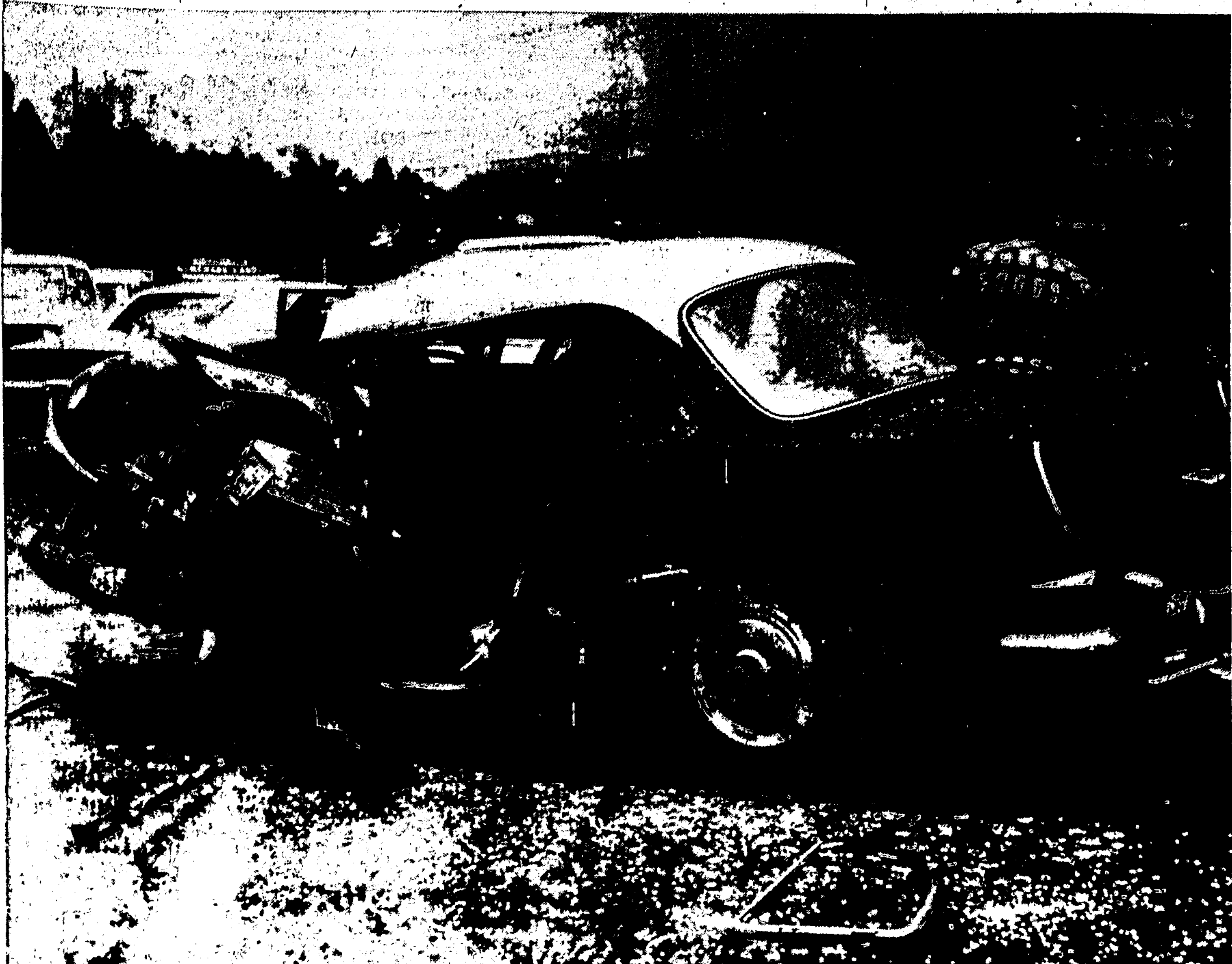

## ONE DIES—

### Holiday Accident

A seventy-three year old long time Ruidoso area resident, Henry Oliver was pronounced dead on arrival at the Ruidoso-Hondo General Hospital, Tuesday afternoon at 1:55 p.m., by Lincoln County Coroner Dr. W. D. Horton following a two-car collision on Sudderth Drive.

The accident marked the first fatal traffic mishap during the long 5-day Fourth of July holiday weekend and according to many long time residents, the first 4th of July fatal accident they can remember, happening in Ruidoso.

The accident, reported to the Ruidoso Police Department shortly after 1:30 p.m., involved Oliver's small foreign made automobile and a late model car driven by a 16 year old Denton, Texas youth. Neither the driver of the Texas licensed vehicle or the passenger in the car, also 16 and from Denton, Texas, were injured in the mishap.

Oliver reportedly was heading east in the outside lane of Sudderth Drive, over one hundred yards from the Carrizo Hill intersection, when he apparently swerved into the Texas car which was heading west. Following the impact the two cars came to a stop thirty feet from each other with the Texas car nearly facing in an easterly direction. The front of Oliver's car was totally mangled as a result of the impact.

The Ruidoso resident was pinned inside of his automobile for nearly twenty minutes as Ruidoso Police officers, headed by Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens, Jr., Ruidoso Firemen and other volunteers worked to remove him from the wreckage.

In addition four off-duty Ruidoso Police officers went immediately to the scene and assisted in traffic control as the heavy holiday traffic was backed up in both directions. Two New Mexico State Police units also assisted in the traffic control.

Two Ruidoso Fire Fighting units were also called to the scene to assist in removing Oliver and because of the fire hazard created by leaking gasoline from Oliver's car. There was no fire nor was the equipment used other than as a precautionary standby.

Ruidoso Police officer Gayle Knapp investigated the accident and to date reportedly has issued no citations.

Oliver's death was Ruidoso's first traffic fatality in nearly a year when a California man lost

### Ruidoso Council Approves New Paving District Resolution, No. 3

The Ruidoso Village council, Thursday, June 29, unanimously approved a new paving district for Ruidoso, Number 3, which calls for a \$815,549 paving project that will affect some 3,600 parcels of property and will add around twenty miles of asphalt paved streets within the corporate limits.

In passing the formal resolution, calling for the new paving district, which will cost around \$4.30 a front foot for each property owner affected, the council also set August 7 at 8:00 p.m. as the date and time for the first Public Protest Meeting. The special meeting will be held in the council chambers of the Ruidoso Municipal Building.

Darrel Fowler, President of Stern Bros. & Co., Albuquerque, Village financial consultant, advised the governing body that a legal notice pertaining to the property owners involved will be published three consecutive weeks beginning July 14. He also told the council that all property owners listed on the official assessment tax roll, according to bonding attorney representatives, will be notified by mail of the paving district, ten days prior to the public protest hearing.

In other matters the council accepted the bid of L. F. Jennings, Ruidoso, to furnish aviation fuel, July 1, 1972 through June 30, 1973, for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport. Jennings submitted a bid of 20.1 cents per gallon for 80-97 octane rating and 22.1 per gallon for 100/130 octane rating. Jennings was the only aviation fuel distributor to submit a bid to the Ruidoso governing body.

The council also reviewed a letter received from Tom Jones, Ruidoso, and president of the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association, Inc., regarding a new raw water storage reservoir north of Ruidoso. Jones' letter, dated June 13, stated in part, "I would like to ask the Village to consider a joint venture with the Association in the construction of the proposed 'Hightower' dam approximately two miles west of Alto, New Mexico."

Jones continued, "I personally feel this location of additional storage is far superior to any of those presently being considered, primarily because of the elevation necessary to serve the proposed new treatment plant, and secondly because the land is already owned by the Association."

side of White Mountain Road near the Airport. West subdivision, was approved for annexation by the governing body.

The council also discussed at length the habitual problem regarding the traffic control at the intersection of Sudderth Drive and Mechem Drive. The council was advised that a survey was conducted by the New Mexico State Highway Department last spring but no response had been received to date regarding the highway department's findings.

It was unanimously agreed by the council that something must be done in the very near future to correct the situation. It was noted that several accidents have occurred at the often "bad scene" including Tuesday's, June 27, accident involving a Tahoka, Texas youth on a motorcycle. The youth was taken to a Lubbock, Texas hospital with reportedly multiple leg and hip injuries as a result of the incident.

During the official regular meeting the elected officials expressed their appreciation to James L. Hine, Ruidoso Village Clerk-Manager, for his work in preparing the 1972-73 Village Budget. The budget was approved by the New Mexico State Local Government Division, Mayor or Farrar advised the council, with but very few minor changes. He concluded by expressing his thanks to Hine.

Jack Kamnady, Ruidoso Village engineer, presented a plan owned by the White Mountain Development Company to be considered for annexation into the Village. The plan, containing around sixty-seven acres and located on the east side of Mechem Drive and the north

### Arson Suspected In Ruidoso PD Officer's Home

Many Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs residents reportedly are both shocked and extremely disturbed over Friday night's June 30, suspected arson which caused extensive damage to the home of Ruidoso Police officer and Mrs. Bobby Bradley. The Bradleys live in Ruidoso Downs Heights subdivision in Ruidoso Downs.

State and local law enforcement officers, since midnight Friday, have been trying to piece together information of the mysterious fire which was reported shortly after 11:00 p.m. by Bradley when he returned home.

Ruidoso Downs Deputy Marshall George Gup-ton, who is heading the investigation, reported that he found evidence of arson in at "least seven places," each in separate areas of the five room residence.

In addition Deputy Marshall Gup-ton stated that he found two small cans of Sterno, a flammable jelly-like substance, each with a fuse and located in each bedroom. The officer's report revealed that both of the cans had a burnt cigarette laced between matches of a book of matches and found upon the top of each of the lidless containers, but was unsuccessfully used as a fuse in that the Sterno did not ignite.

The officer's report also stated that an odor of kerosene was noted throughout the house and one of the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department officers stated that it appeared that "someone had poured kerosene on the carpeted floor of the hallway."

Ruidoso Downs Fire Chief Jay Posey notified the New Mexico State Fire Marshall's office in Santa Fe shortly after midnight Friday. The State Fire Marshall ordered Deputy Marshall Gup-ton to both seal and post the house until his investigation was complete. The State Fire Marshall arrived in Ruidoso Wednesday.

Cost estimate of the damages to the frame dwelling cannot be determined until after the State Fire Marshall's investigation. It was noted by fire department officials that the interior of the house and most of the contents had been severely damaged by fire, smoke and extreme heat.

Bradley has been a member of the Ruidoso Police Department for around eighteen months and is a long time resident of the Ruidoso area. Observers said that he had not been linked with any particularly controversial matters in connection with his

### Bond Set At \$7,500 For Two Men Charged In Magistrate Court

Two Ruidoso area men were arraigned before Ruidoso Magistrate Judge Austin A. Pritchett, late Monday afternoon, charged with contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor and Statutory Rape.

The charges were authorized by Clero-Lincoln County District Attorney Norman Bloom, Alamogordo, as the result of an incident in Ruidoso last weekend.

The two men, Billy Ray Davis, 20, Ruidoso, and Frazier Pope, 21, Ruidoso Downs, both pleaded not guilty to the charges.

The two men were ordered held in custody of the Lincoln County Sheriff Department pending the outcome of their Preliminary Hearing or the posting of \$7,500 bond monies each.

Ruidoso Police Officer Jerry Fennell, Sunday, around noon, July 2, recovered a wooden crate, containing over twenty-four individual packages of Methyl Bromide, out of the Cedar Creek in the eastern portion of Paradise Canyon. The crate appears to be a World War II type with the individual packages measuring six inches in length and one inch square.  
Efforts to find the person or persons who dumped the crate in Cedar Creek have been unsuccessful by the Ruidoso Police and Environmental Improvement Agency Officer, Mike Richardson. A search of the area has been made by local authorities and additional investigations are currently underway by the Ruidoso Police Department and the Environmental Improvement Agency Officer, Richardson stated this week, "Anyone in the area finding what they think might be Methyl Bromide containers, should immediately contact the Ruidoso Police Department, phone 257-4333 or Michael Richardson, Ruidoso Municipal Building, phone 257-4014."

## News 'N Notes

A lot is being said about high food prices these days, but few explanations are being offered other than accusations as to who is to blame.

"Consumer demands and tastes have increased drastically over recent years," says Mary Ellen Payne, County Home Agent with New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service. "Higher quality foods are demanded and more convenience items are requested. Variety and convenience are key words in the present state of food products."

Non-food items are also getting a larger share of every dollar spent at the supermarket, Mrs. Payne notes. Recent studies indicate that about 28 cents of each dollar spent at food outlets goes for non-food items. For example, more total money is being spent at supermarkets for paper products and foil than for eggs.

With consumers demanding

more processing and special packaging, prices of products on the grocery shelf may be quite high compared to a few years ago, the home agent explains. In many cases, home preparation may be the answer to high food prices.

The old adage of "you get what you pay for" may never be more true than it is today, x-rays; the Hospital Auxiliary for the club, to the Ruidoso Woman's Club and everyone that called.

Where do the other 84 cents of the take-home dollar go? How about a new or second car, a camper, color television, eating out and all the other luxuries we enjoy? The prices of many of these things have increased more rapidly than prices of food items, yet we are not as conscious of such increases, Mrs. Payne adds.

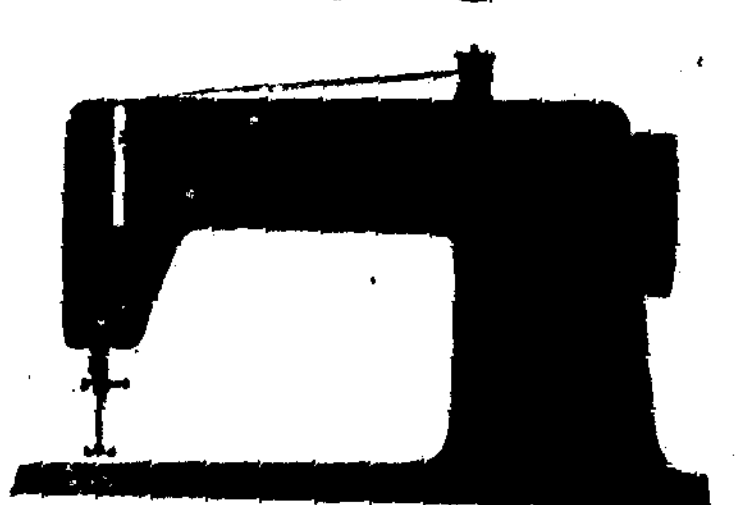
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### Aspenade Committee Holds Regular Meet

### Permits Necessary For Forest Areas

The Forest Service announced today that daily permits still are necessary for use of designated recreation charge areas on National Forest lands.

Congress has not yet reinstated the "Golden Eagle" passport program.

The announcement of the continuing requirement for "user permits" was made to clarify possible misunderstanding about the Interior Department's interim "National Parklands" and "Golden Age" passports. Permits issued by The National Park Service are valid only at charge areas administered by that agency, not on National Forests which are administered under the Department of Agriculture.

The permit cost for use of National Forest camp and picnic sites throughout New Mexico and Arizona is \$1 per day for each noncommercial vehicle. The exceptions are seven highly developed areas where fees are \$2 per day.

Permits are available from self-service dispensers at the entrance to each camp or picnic area. It is the responsibility of the user to obtain and display the permit or run the risk of a fine. Patrolmen do not sell permits.

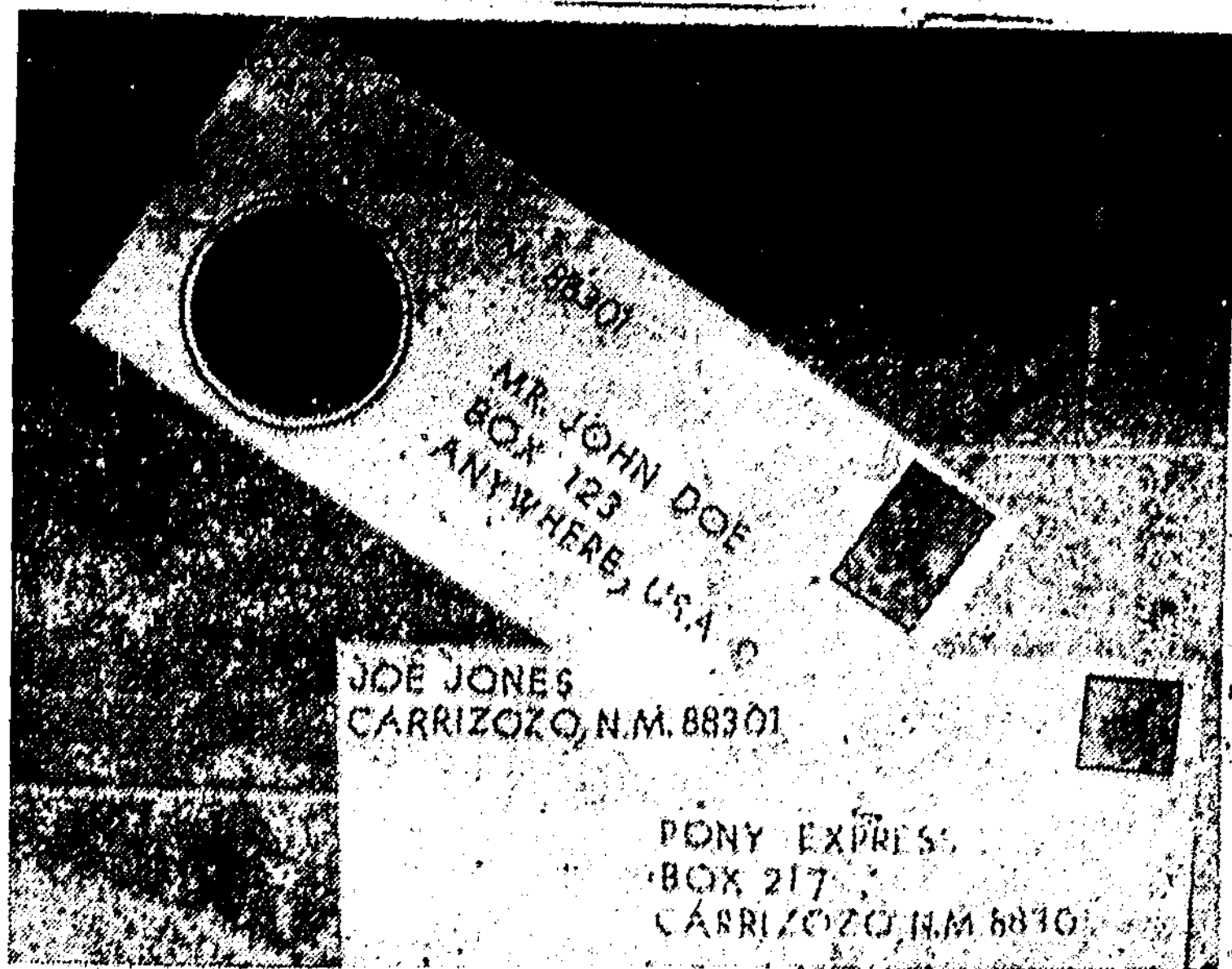

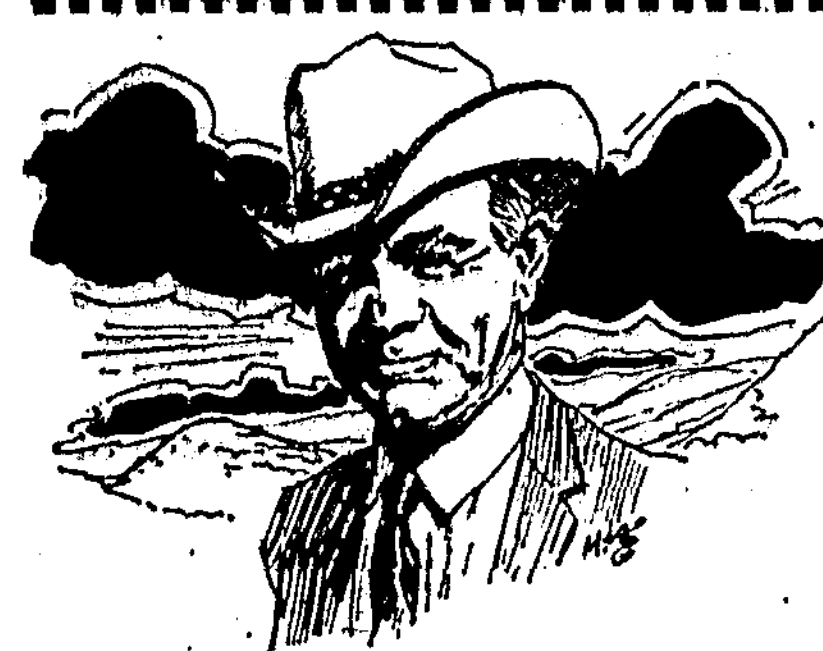

So now with so many fields and meadows, and hillsides of new grass, we can actually see more of our beautiful world.

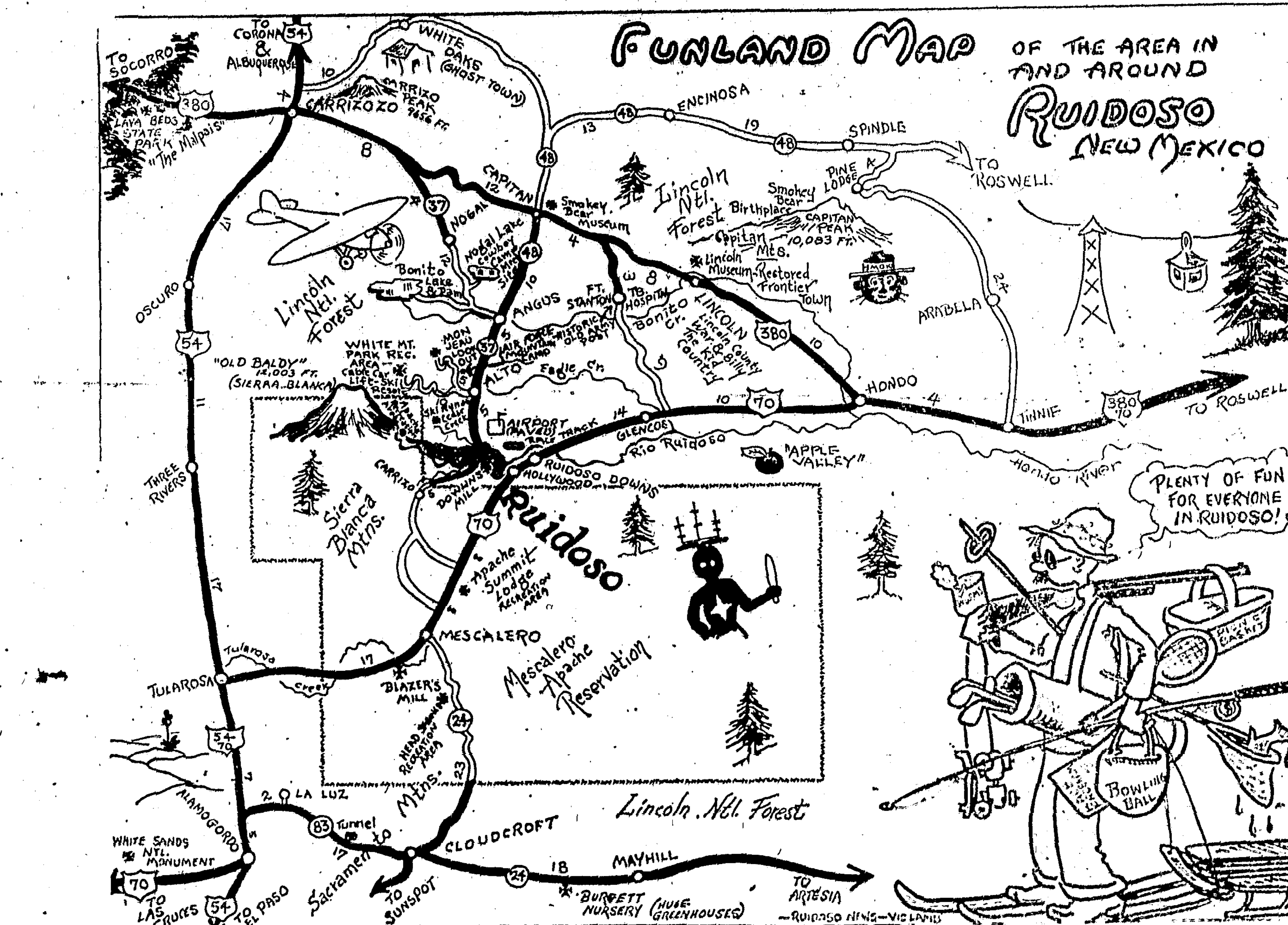
### ART IN PETRIIFIED WOOD

### Still Transfer Time For College Students

Have you put off the decision about entering college this fall? About transferring to another school? There is still time—but not much.

Some 6,000 openings still remain in New Mexico colleges and universities for late-deciding freshmen and 11th hour transfer students, according to a May survey conducted by the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE).

According to the WICHE study, application deadlines for the fall semester range from July 1 to September 11 at 15 New Mexico higher education institutions.

An open door admission policy is becoming increasingly popular among western colleges. Nineteen institutions reported open admissions for this fall.

College officials point out, however, that vacancies are open only to students who meet the individual college's entrance requirements. And if a student has already applied to a college or university and has been turned down, he should not reapply at that college.

The WICHE study, which canvassed 443 undergraduate institutions throughout the 13 western states, reports that approximately 146,000 vacancies are still available for entering freshmen and transfer students. (A total of 287 western institutions responded to the survey, with 237 reporting vacancies for completely applicants.)

The following two-year colleges in New Mexico have openings for commuting freshmen and transfer students: Eastern New Mexico University, Clovis; Branch College, Oct. 1 deadline; New Mexico State University at Alamogordo, Aug. 18; New Mexico State University at Carlsbad, Sept. 1; New Mexico State University of San Juan, Farmington, Aug. 29, and New Mexico Junior College, Hobbs, Sept. 11.

New Mexico Military Institute (men only), Roswell, has openings for dormitory freshmen, deadline not given.

The following four-year universities have openings for commuting and dormitory freshmen and transfer students: University of Albuquerque, deadline Aug. 1; College of Santa Fe, Aug. 1; Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, Aug. 1; Eastern New Mexico University, Roswell, Aug. 1; New Mexico Highlands University, Las Vegas, Aug. 1; New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, July 20; Western New Mexico University, Silver City, Aug. 18; New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, Socorro, Aug. 1, and University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, July 1.

Details on vacancies in colleges and universities throughout the 13 western states are available from: College Vacancy Survey, WICHE, P. O. Drawer F, Boulder, Colo. 80302.

WICHE is a public agency which helps the 13 western states work together to increase educational opportunities for western youth, to improve programs of universities and colleges, to expand the supply of specialized manpower, and to inform the public of higher education needs.

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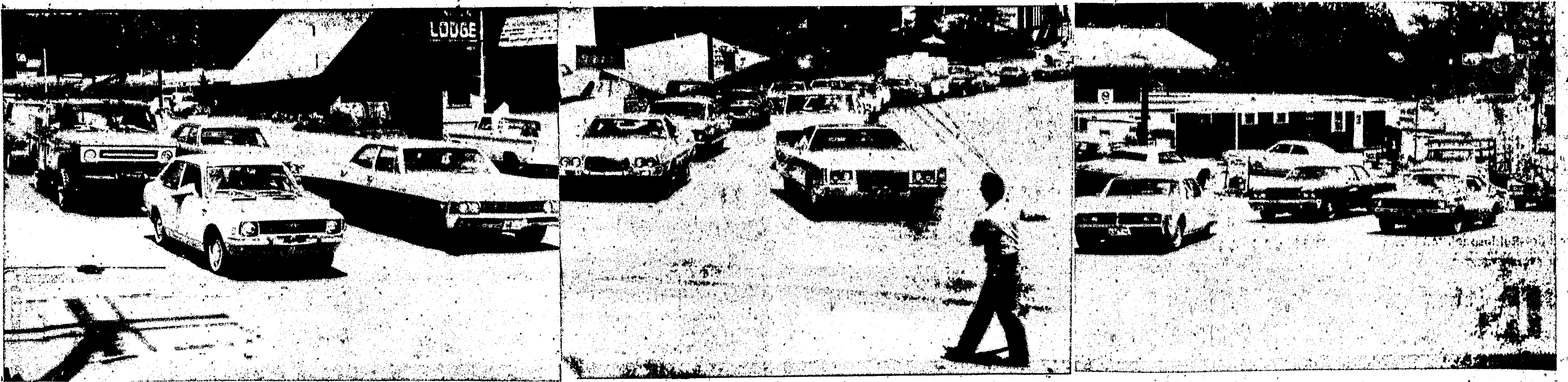

### County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

A yellowing of ornamental plants at this time of year usually means that there is an iron deficiency in the soil. Known as iron chlorosis, this deficiency causes ornamentals to become light green, yellow or white in the areas between leaf veins. The more severe the deficiency, the paler the color, with acute shortage causing browning and eventually death of the plant.

Most soils contain sufficient iron, but often becomes unavailable to plants because of high soil pH or excess lime in the soil. Symptoms resembling iron deficiency may also be induced by over-watering, poor drainage or compacted soil.

There are two principal types of iron-containing materials which can be used to supply iron to plants. These are iron chelates (pronounced key-lates) and organic compounds containing iron in soluble forms, such as ferrous sulfate (also called copperas). Either of these materials are available at most garden supply stores. Iron-containing materials can be worked into the soil near the base of the shrub or tree, or may be dissolved in

water and sprayed onto the foliage. Follow the instructions and rate recommendations of the manufacturer. It is important to make applications at the first appearance of chlorotic symptoms. Recovery is usually slow in severe chlorotic plants.

Soil conditions which render

iron unavailable to plants may also have similar effect on zinc. Plants suffering from zinc deficiency usually develop a "witchesbroom" type growth at the terminals. Terminal growth is weak, thin and short. Leaves are light-green to yellow, small, distorted or puckered. Small or zinc chelate, available from

Ruidoso Downs,  
Sunland Park  
Set Dual Race

A two-part quarter horse stake exclusively for juvenile fillies has been slated for Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

The novel idea was approved over the weekend during the meeting of the New Mexico State Racing Commission at Ruidoso.

The race, billed as the Ruidoso-Sunland Twin Sister Futurities, carries a purse of \$10,000-added and is expected to reach a gross total of about \$150,000 in the initial runnings.

"We feel there is a strong need for a race of this type, and our discussions with horsemen have indicated enthusiastic support for the idea," remarked Ruidoso General Manager Richard Thompson.

The new futurity also represents another unique idea—for New Mexico, at least—in that horsemen need not indicate the name or breeding of the nominees at the time of the initial payment. In this regard, Thompson noted, the new futurity is similar to a successful format now being used at Hollywood Park and Santa Anita.

The first part of the Twin Sister Futurities will be run at Ruidoso Downs on July 1, 1972. The distance is 350 yards, the weight, 120 pounds. The trials will be staged on June 22.

The trials for the second half have been slated for Oct. 20, 1973, at Sunland Park, with the final booked for Oct. 28. The distance for the Sunland edition will be extended to 400 yards. Track officials are projecting an estimate gross of \$75,000 for each half.

All subscription fees, sustaining fees and late nominations will be divided equally between each Futurity.

Under the "nominate now—name later" format, original nominations at \$400 each will be accepted through Dec. 1, 1972. On April 1, 1973, a sustaining fee of \$200 is due. The name or breeding must be declared at this time.

Late nominations will be accepted through April 1, 1973, at a fee of \$1,200.

The entry fee for each trial is \$500.

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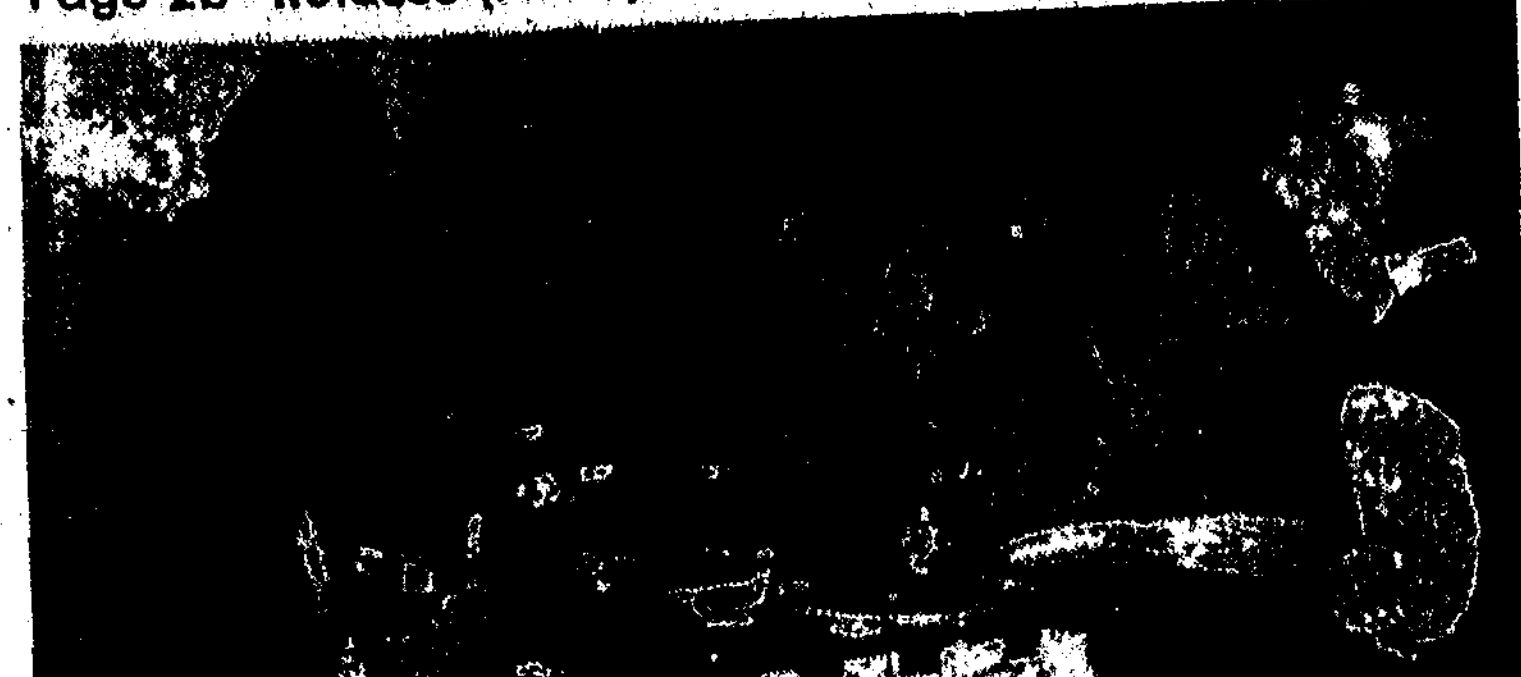

## New FHA Policy On Home Loans

Many additional families in New Mexico are now eligible for rural housing loans from the Farmers Home Administration, FHA State Director Carroll Hunton announced today.  
"In families where both husband and wife are employed," Hunton explained, "the new policy permits half of the wife's gross income to be excluded in determining whether the total family income is within the maximum limit for loan eligibility."  
For example, the husband is the principal source of income with \$6,000. His wife earns \$4,000. His entire income, plus half of his wife's or \$2,000, total \$8,000. This is within New Mexico's moderate income level of \$8,000, so the family may be eligible for a Farmers Home Administration loan.

James V. Smith, National Administrator of Farmers Home Administration, emphasized that newly eligible families must demonstrate that they otherwise merit FHA financing, and that credit is not available from regular commercial sources.  
"The new policy will assist families in which the wife's income is needed to improve the standard of living. Note that if the wife is the principal breadwinner, the rules does not apply. This change will in no way affect our expanding service to low-income families," Smith said.  
Loans may be made to families that will buy or build homes in open country or towns of up to 10,000 population, and who are not able to secure credit from regular commercial sources. Complete information is available from the local Farmers Home Administration office in the Roswell Federal Building, Room 168.

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# Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

A divided, 18-vote McGovern-Wallace New Mexico Delegation will head this weekend for the 4-day National Democratic Convention opening Monday in Miami Beach.

Wallace alternate John Hemery, 62, of Luna County explains why he asserts the Alabama governor's cause. Hemery, an accountant, says: "Very importantly law and order. His stand on what the Supreme Court has done to favor the criminal rather than the victim. My sympathy is with the victim."

"I'm with him on states' rights and the lessening of federal bureaucracy. We should get federal government back to the people or it will fall over. On foreign aid I can't see giving hard-earned taxpayers' money to countries that will spit on us."

"I'm with Wallace on foreign aid. I would certainly cut down foreign aid and use that money on domestic issues. I'm with him on defense. We can't afford to cut defense spending to the danger level which I think Mr. McGovern is trying to do."

"I'm absolutely against amnesty." Hemery calls South Dakota Sen. George McGovern's \$1,000-per-person proposal "a political year gimmick." He says

McGovern "knows perfectly well Congress would never accept it."

Hemery, born in British Guiana, backed Wallace in 1968 but could not vote because he was not a U. S. citizen. He became a naturalized citizen in 1970 so he could support Wallace actively. Hemery was Luna County Wallace vice chairman and treasurer in the primary campaign this year.

Hemery "definitely favors welfare for those who need it." He also supports "giving work to those who are able-bodied, even work in the community." But he says: "I don't believe in giving money to people to just sit around when they are able. There are very definitely abuses going on."

Hemery backs Wallace's tax reform program. He says wealthy people and corporations "don't pay their share." He believes middle income people "are paying more than their fair share of taxes now."

We asked Hemery if New Mexico Wallace and McGovern delegation members share common ground. He says: "It would be pretty nearly impossible to do that. They are diametrically opposed. One is left and the other is right."

"I could personally not ever support McGovern. I would vote for President Nixon if Nixon and McGovern are the presidential candidates." Hemery says Nixon will carry Southern New Mexico if Nixon and McGovern are the presidential nominees.

Wallace carried Luna County and 18 others in the primary June 6. Wallace polled 900 Luna County votes to 493 for Sen. Humphrey and 456 for McGovern.

Wallace delegate Dortha Moore, 35, of Tucuman details her Wallace support. Her husband, Charles, is a transport truck driver. Mrs. Moore says: "The first concern is the fact we should be getting people back involved in taking care of their own problems."

"We have a lot of problems—tax reform, law and order, the crime rate. I believe in states' rights and individual rights. We seem to have more of them taken away from us every day. We're paying the bills and getting the least out of it."

Mrs. Moore says: "Gov. Wallace brought this to our attention. I want the Democrats to get back on the right track and

"I disagree with the liberal leadership. We're not a party of welfare and looting people." Mrs. Moore soundly whacked the National Democratic Party platform as it stood unfinished at the weekend.

She said: "I think Castro or Lenin could run quite well on this platform the way it is right now. If we could change it to where it gives us working people a chance and Mr. McGovern would give his pledge to stand behind it, then I would be glad to vote for him."

"Evidently he doesn't care that we have this rising crime business. He seems to be appealing to the minorities. I disagree with this. I believe the Democratic Party should represent the majority."

"We are out for liberty. We should work to win in November. That's my goal." Mrs. Moore was Quay County Wallace chairwoman in the primary campaign. Wallace swamped opponents in Quay County June 6. He polled 1,407 votes to 509 for Humphrey and 411 for McGovern. Mrs. Moore has been a Democrat all her voting life.

State Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, and Ted Raff of Los Lunas talked in Santa Fe with state officials about Los Lunas Public Schools. Raff, recently retired Los Lunas postmaster after 38 years of service, is on a Los Lunas Schools parents' committee. Rep. Luna is on the Los Lunas Board of Education.

They talked with State Auditor Frank Olmstead, Toney Anaya, Gov. Bruce King's administrative assistant; School Transportation Director C. B. Lemon and Deputy State Schools Supt. Weldon Ferrin.

Gov. King removed Mrs. A. N. (Jackie) Spencer, Carrizozo Republican, from the State Corrections Commission. King said the reason was an "inharmonious relationship" with other commissioners. Two years remained on Mrs. Spencer's term. Mrs. Spencer said she was removed because of her criticism that the commission was not doing its job. Gov. King asked Mrs. Spencer to resign before he removed her. She refused.

Mrs. Spencer strongly commended Corrections Secretary Howard Leach and called him a "progressive administrator." Alvin Stockton, Raton Republican, resigned April 11 from the Corrections Commission. King named Clayton banker Rex Reeves, a Republican, to replace Stockton. The commission has been controversial.

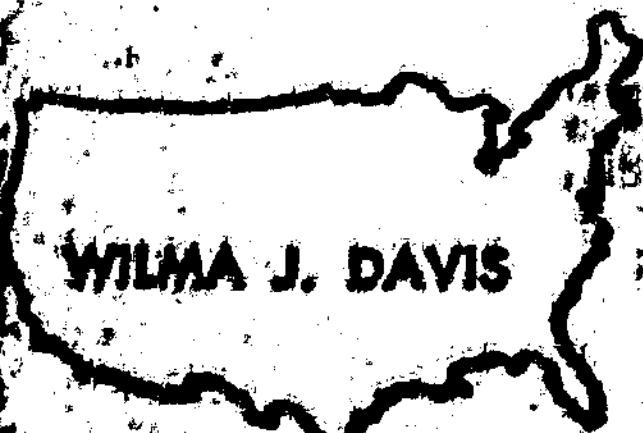

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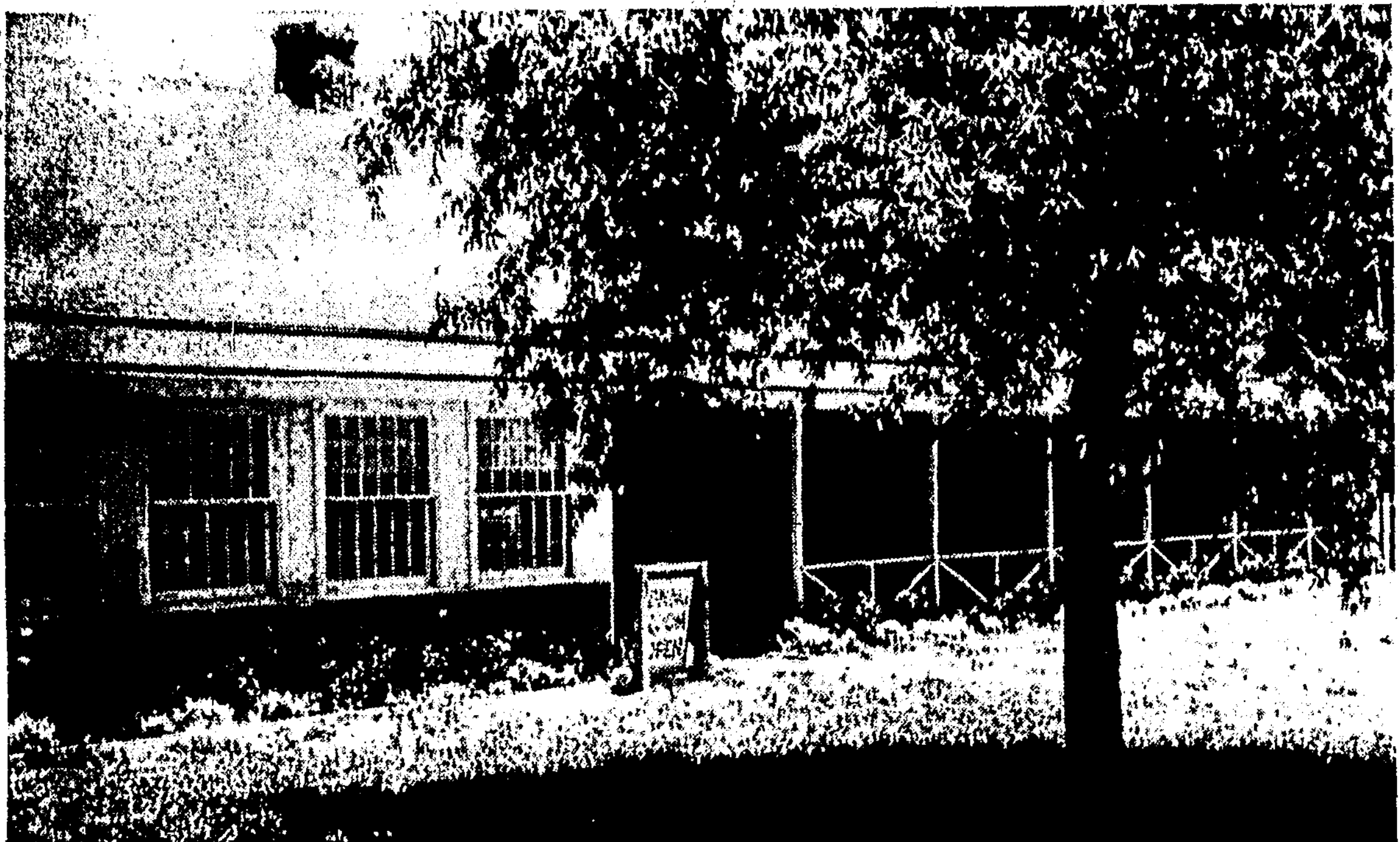

## SOCIAL SECURITY

The basic premium rate for the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up from \$5.60 to \$5.80 a month beginning June 1, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative.

The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills and a variety of other medical expenses for people 65 and over. The program is funded by individual premiums matched by the Federal Government.

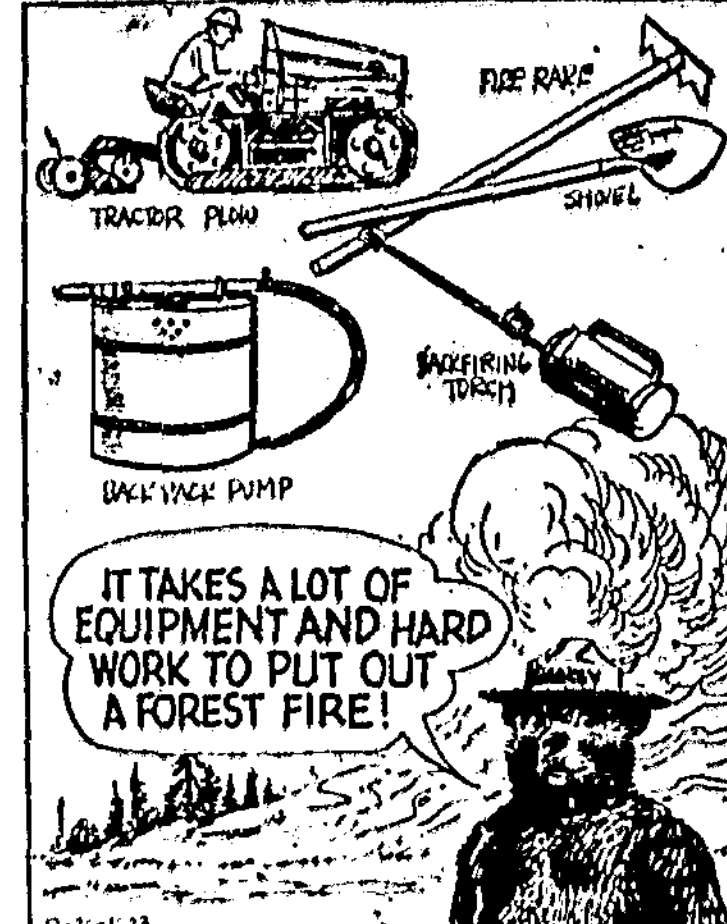
The 20-cent increase in the premium in July compares to a 30-cent increase in 1971 and a \$1.30 increase in 1970. The low increase this year reflects savings in the administration of

Medicare as well as lower anticipated medical costs because of the Price Commission's guidelines limiting physicians' fee increases to an average 2 1/2 percent a year," Mrs. Graves said.

The Medicare law requires an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program. The premium rate is adjusted to cover the estimated medical expenses of Medicare patients during the 12 months beginning July 1.
