TRAFFIC LIGHT SOON!!

The two practically inseparable spectacles, scheduled for Labor Day at the famed Ruidoso Downs Race Track, are the 14th running of the All-American Futurity Quarter Horse Race, the world's richest horse race with this year's un-equalled estimated million dollar total purse, and secondly, the first live telecast, in full color, of the renowned All-American Futurity by the All-American Network of Topeka, Kans., to be televised on all major networks on sixty-four stations in seventeen mid-western, southwestern and western states.

As announced this week by track officials, the 1972 estimated million dollar purse is one year ahead of the anticipated date for the million dollar All-American Futurity purse schedule. The 1972 purse was estimated, originally, to be \$920,000 with a record \$220,000 going to the winner—'73 was to be the million dollar year for the All-American Futurity. As a result, the 1972 winner of the nationally acclaimed twenty seconds plus race will receive around \$75,000, about three times the winner's purse of the Kentucky Derby, and double the combined purse of the "Triple Crown".

Last year's All-American winner, Mr. Kid Charge, owned by Will Whitehead, Del Rio, Texas, received \$180,000 out of the total estimated 1971 purse of \$750,000. In addition, Mr. Kid Charge, set the pace for future All-American Futurity spectators with his All-American Futurity record breaking time of 19.65 seconds.

In fourteen years the All-American Futurity purse has fabulously increased from a total purse in 1959, its inaugural year, of \$129,000, a not too modest figure for a twenty-second race, to this year's estimated one million dollar total purse.

In addition, during the same fourteen years, the voice of the track announcer as he called the race on the public address system to the 12,000 fans present for the 1959 All-American Futurity and the several additional thousands who heard it monitored via radio, is but in truth a small fraction of the estimated seven and one half million people who will both hear and see the superstar of the Sport of Kings live on prime time through the magical tube of television.

"'72 truly is the year of the tube" as far as the live telecast color production's promotional potential of the world's richest race, the All-American Futurity. The soon never to-be-forgotten historical production, which will feature Charlie Jones, NBC-TV sportscaster, as the anchorman for the telecast, and Doc Severinsen, musical director for the popular NBC-TV nationally televised Tonight Show, who will provide the commentary of the thirty minute prime time telecast.

Jones, whose "mellow voice" for the past twelve years has called the AFL-NFL professional football games, is a sports-minded master. The distinguished Charlie Jones, who admitted "works hard at the job" has a list of sport related activity credentials, including foreign assignments, that would startle the United Nations.

The master of the mike has announced the AFL pro football Championship Game two years, the NFL pro football Championship game five years, in the college ranks he has served as chief announcer for the Sugar Bowl, the Orange Bowl, and in addition has announced sporting events on international levels from football to the World Championship Bridge Tournament and everything in between. Assisting both Jones and Severinsen with the telecast will be veteran Ruidoso Race Track announcer Bob Dudich, equally renowned in his own field of horse racing. Dudich will call the All-American Futurity live as it is transmitted into the millions of television sets throughout the seventeen state programming.

Who's responsible for this magnificent milestone of a live-prime time telecast of two All-American Futurity which

Ruidoso may hopefully lose its unwanted distinction of being the only city, of equal size and vehicular traffic, in New Mexico, without a traffic light. Kenneth Towle, Hobbs, Vice-Chairman of the New Mexico State Highway Commission, Monday, Aug. 14, via a telephone conversation with Ruidoso Village City-manager James L. Hine, reportedly told Hine that the New Mexico State Highway Department would install a traffic control light on New Mexico State Road 37 at the intersection of Suddeth and Mechem Drives.

Towle reportedly told Hine that the installation of the much sought after traffic light at the heavily traveled intersection would possibly be installed before Labor Day. The village has endeavored, unsuccessfully, to secure a traffic control system at the awesome intersection for the past seven years. For the last several years the municipality has been compelled to station a police officer at the intersection three or four days a week for periods of three to four hours per day. The officer's life is placed in great danger since he is in the middle of an unprotected and highly congested intersection.

Unofficial reports are that a vehicle passes through the intersection at the rate of one every five seconds, Monday through Wednesday and then on race days, Hine stated, "It is not uncommon to see cars backed up for several blocks in every direction trying to get through the currently uncontrolled intersection."

will introduce literally millions of race fans and non-race fans to the 14th running of the world's richest horse race in this mountain resort mecca of the southwest?

There has been perhaps dozens of serious minded individuals in recent years who have had a plan or an idea regarding a live telecast of the All-American Futurity, but the one man who "put it all together" is Thad Sandstrom, Topeka, Kans., who will arrive in the Ruidoso area next week with a staff of twenty people and over one million dollars worth of highly technical television equipment.

Not too long ago Sandstrom heard of the All-American Futurity, for the first time, from a Winfield, Okla., horseman who had a horse place fourth in the 1966 All-American Futurity. From that time on the fascination and potential of producing the world's richest horse race on live TV began to stir the necessary television production imagination, an innate quality, in Sandstrom.

With his twenty-six years of professional radio and television experience at his disposal he began to put the "tubes" in place for the soon to be realized mass television production setting. The results — the formation of the All-American Network with Sandstrom as president, Jerry Hoag, sales manager, Cliff Craig, Station Relations, and Bill Duckworth, Business Manager. The necessary additives which Sandstrom voluntarily proclaimed was the complete and totally super operation of Art Johnson, general manager of Ruidoso Downs during the formation of the plan, Dick Alwan, RD Publicity chief, and Bill Thomas, RD Public Relations, who all three super colossal in their assistance.

Sandstrom's radio and television experience began twenty-six years ago when he went to work for the Stauffer Publications, Inc. as an announcer. He has since then both worked and deservedly earned his way to the position of Vice-president of broadcasting and member of the firm's board of directors. Stauffer Publications owns two television stations, an NBC affiliate in Amarillo, Texas and a CBS affiliate station in Topeka. In addition the firm owns 18 news papers, four radio stations and two FM radio stations. Employee number better than two hundred.

Downs Council Holds Tuesday Called Meet

A special called meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Village Council was held Tuesday evening with a quorum filled to appear for the regular meeting Monday night.

It was announced that Mayor Jacke Harris would attend a conference of the New Mexico Municipal League slated for Sept. 13 through 15 in Albuquerque.

Discussions were held on the Southwestern New Mexico Economic Development Association and the revenue-sharing bill now before the U. S. House of Representatives.

Officials noted that Southwest Dodge would deliver a new police car for the village Oct. 1 on a bid that was let earlier this year.

A letter from HUD was read stating that the village had not been approved for 36 units of low-rent housing. The application had been made in 1969. In another letter from C. A. Denton, the owner had agreed to sell Denton Field to the village for the sum of \$50,000. The property consists of about 10 acres of land.

A discussion was held concerning the increasing coverage on the municipal building and contents and problems at the sanitary land fill.

Supplies for the water department were approved and a call for bids to repair the roof of the municipal building were called.

The trustees heard a request from Frank Cox, owner of Frank's Fruit Market, for permission to build a building for his market. Cox will submit plans for the building to the planning and zoning commission for approval.

Repairs of streets in subdivisions after the installation of utilities were also discussed by the board.

Next regular meeting of the board will be held Aug. 28 at 7:30 p.m.

Aspenade Committee Adds Many Events

An Aspenade committee meeting was held Monday noon at the Trails Restaurant in Ruidoso Downs to consolidate further plans for the Aspenade portion of the Cowboy, Oktoberfest slated for the first two weeks in October.

Among events added to the celebration were: an Arts & Crafts fair, a Championship Kid's Rodeo, a trail ride, and a contest for the best square dance or Apache dress.

It was noted by officials that Ben Johnson, winner of the Academy Award for best supporting actor of the year, will be present for the Aspenade Parade. All parade marshalls from years past will be contacted and honored in the parade and past presidents of the chamber of commerce will also be honored.

With the addition of numerous events, this year's celebration promises to be the largest in Ruidoso's history.

HUD Approves Preliminary Project Plans

Preliminary Project plans for Ruidoso's proposed water storage, distribution and expansion project, according to Ruidoso Village Manager James L. Hine, have been approved by the Dallas, Texas regional office of the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Hine made the report of HUD's approval during the Ruidoso Village Council Meeting Thursday, Aug. 10.

The preliminary project plan approval is the first required step towards the village receiving a federal grant for the proposed project. Ruidoso officials have, for the past three years, endeavored to secure federal aid for a major water storage and distribution expansion project but have been unsuccessful.

HUD officials, reportedly, will be in Ruidoso within a week to make a final survey of the project's engineering aspects and overall municipal needs. A final decision regarding the approval or disapproval of the federal grant of \$829,549 for Ruidoso is expected from HUD by Sept. 15.

Jack Kannady, Ruidoso Village engineer and also project engineer, told the council that he will be ready to call for bids on the million dollar water storage, distribution and expansion project around the 25th of September. Kannady stated that regardless of the decision of HUD, construction will begin on the project priorities as soon as possible after construction bids are accepted.

The council also approved the issuance of the remaining \$500,000 General Obligation Water Bond monies as approved by Ruidoso municipal voters nearly a year ago.

The board accepted the resignation of 10 teachers at the same meet. They are: Bette Longan, 1st grade; Texanita Cole, 2nd grade; Helen Brown, instructional aide; Terry Ben-

der, distributive education; Jan Bender, 7th and 8th remedial reading; Lynn McGuire, 4th grade; Kenneth Wright, social studies; Margaret Wright, high school secretary; Karen Heckman, instructional aide, and James Dickinson, 7th and 8th grade math.

This is going to fifteen states through 62 television stations. This will be probably our greatest outlet for live advertising on our area to date. Included in the viewing market is the twelfth largest single area television market in the United States. We may have to ask some assistance of some of our people for use of their equipment or even inventory items. The producers told us that due to costs of putting on an additional twelve stations that their budget was just about extended to it. maximum. I hope our people will realize the huge benefit we will derive.

We would like to thank the local artists and craftsmen and women who participated in our Arts and Crafts Fair. We hope they had some great success and will be back with us next year for even a greater show. We will be doing this again at next month's event.

The T. M. Tournament is now on. The races are beginning to track in, so we may have some 75 entries by the time the race starts. As of this date, so far, some 25 entries have returned an entry blank.

The Aspencade is only six weeks off. We need the business to consider putting on this year. We will probably be able to get some live backing advertisements from these 62 stations carrying the All-American Race, so that should make our Aspencade even greater. Don't forget this is our Silver Anniversary, so think of something local to depict.

Now for the beard thing, we don't care if you can grow one or not. However, every smooth face seen in this area had better have some "line" money handy.

The Hanging Judge, Jerry "Fuzzy Face" Wood said, "Everybody better have a fuzzy face." Jerry's Gang, "The Prickle Face Few", will be roaming the streets as of Sept. 1, so beware.

Free Lunch Policy Told by Capitan Board

Capitan Municipal School District announces new free and reduced price lunch.

Capitan Municipal School District has long recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of its students. All schools serve a well-balanced nutritious lunch and/or breakfast each school day. The charge to students who can pay is 35c. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these meals free of charge or at a reduced price to those children determined by the Capitan Board of Education to be unable to pay the full price for their meals.

Families who feel that their children may be eligible for free or reduced price meals are urged to apply. Copies of the application form were sent home in a letter to families earlier this week. Additional copies may be obtained at any school in the district. The completed application, signed by an adult member of the family, should be sent to the office of School Superintendent (where or title and address of person designated). Such applications will be reviewed promptly, and within 10 days the family will be notified as to the decision made. Families may appeal this decision by contacting County Welfare Agent to request a hearing as established in the Fair Hearing Procedures set forth by law. Any information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence. Decisions for approval will be based on the Eligibility Standards.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Social security quarterly reports for the three-month period ending June 30 are due in July, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative. A domestic worker's cash wages for work in a private household are covered by the law if they amount to \$50 or more from one employer in a quarter.

Many situations have arisen where domestic employees have not been reported and the most common reason given by non-reporting employers has been that their domestic employees had requested that the social security tax not be withheld from their pay. If the reporting requirements are met for domestic employees, reporting on a quarterly basis is mandatory.

If you employ a household worker who will come under the law and you are not receiving the forms necessary to make the quarterly reports, contact your nearest Social Security or Internal Revenue Service representative for information on how to get the forms and make the reports. Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the Council Room in the Ruidoso City Hall the second Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon and 1 to 2.

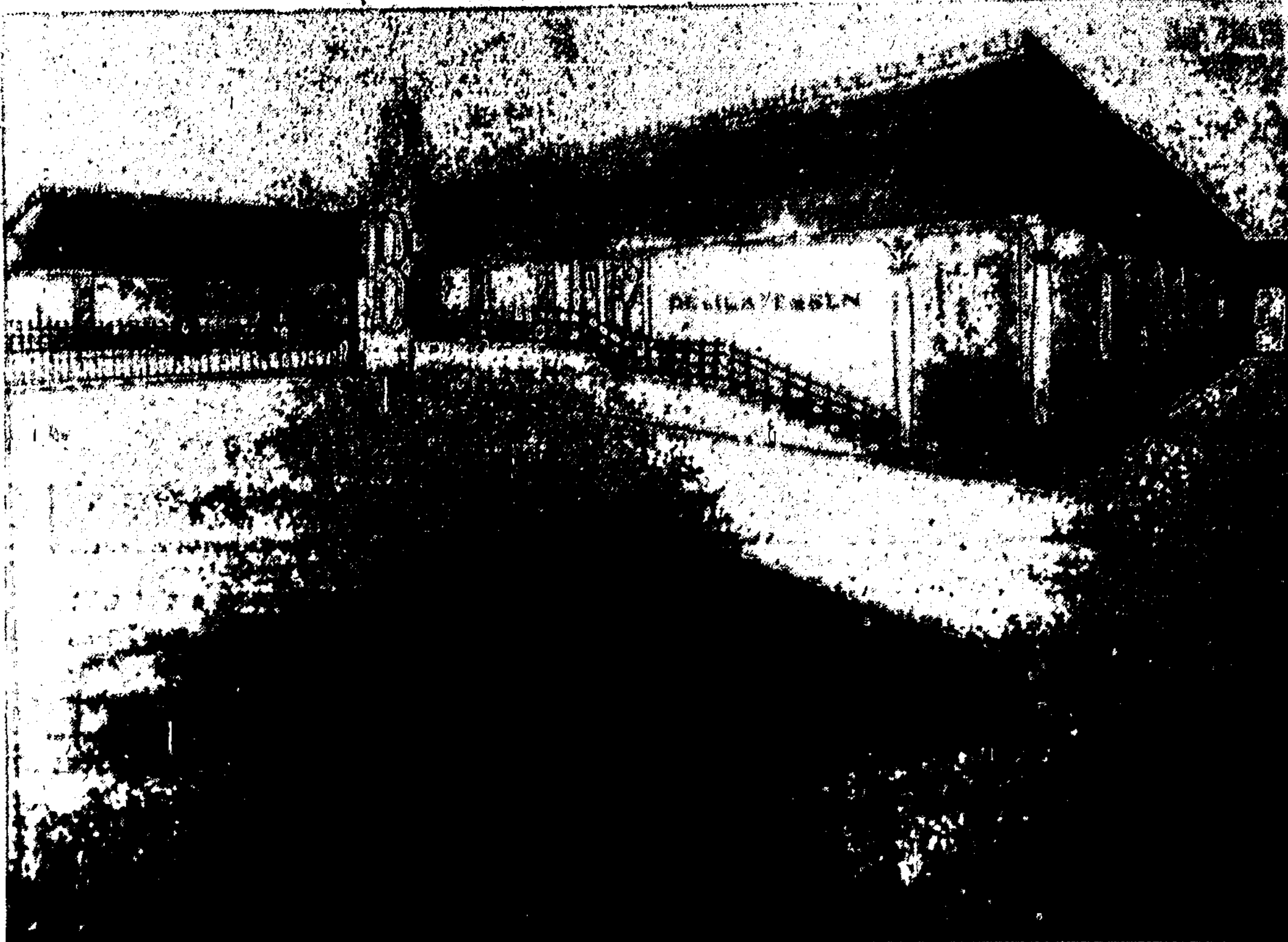

Real Estate Facts

Some families who otherwise might own their own homes are stopped from taking that satisfying step because they do not understand what sources of financing are available to them.

A realtor can take some of the mystery out of the process by explaining various forms of financing.

So can a banker or savings and loan officer.

Basically, there are three sources of loans on houses and other types of residential property: 1) financial institutions such as savings and loan associations and banks; 2) mortgage bankers and loan correspondents; and 3) the private lender.

By law, savings and loan associations must invest a high percentage of their depositors' savings in home mortgages. That was the reason for their creation. Banks also invest in home mortgages, though the percentage of their deposits used for this purpose is considerably smaller than the percentage applying to savings and loan associations. Together, these two are the principal sources for what is known as conventional financing.

Conventional financing is characterized by being the most readily available. Interest rates, and length of time for repayment, as a result, reflect how large a money supply is available. In times of "tight money" when demand is greater than supply, interest rates rise and short term loans are favored. When money is plentiful, interest rates decline and loans are usual.

Federal Housing Administration (FHA) loans are made by conventional sources but with repayment guaranteed. Among rather strict conditions of the guarantee are certain standards of construction, space, inspection, and other requirements designed to be sure the property is not below a certain quality. The borrower pays an insurance fee, 1/2 of one per cent of the amount of the loan, which goes into a general FHA fund. Any defaults are charged against the fund.

While this form of loan is usually referred to as "publicly assisted," in fact, the insurance fees of borrowers pay the entire cost of operating the program. No taxpayer's money is required. It is one of the few federal programs that has paid its own way, and has even made a profit.

Veteran Administration loans operate on the same principle as FHA, except that the borrower does not pay insurance.

Interest rates for both FHA and VA loans are set by Congress. During times of "tight money" FHA loans are available only when sellers are willing to pay "points" as a bonus for agreeing to FHA financing. A "point" is 1% of the amount of the loan. There are no "points" involved in VA financing.

FHA and VA financing have several advantages to the borrower, among them, up to 30 years to repay, no money down on VA loans, and modest down payments - up to about 10% - on FHA loans.

Money from mortgage bankers or loan correspondents (usually a realtor or other real estate broker) is available directly from those sources. The money they channel into mortgages comes from insurance companies, pension funds, and individual investors. Down payment requirements are usually a little higher than for conventional financing, but interest rates are a fraction lower. Length of loans depend on the market and usually do not exceed 20 years.

The last source of financing, through private lenders, is Aunt Maude or some other individual

who has a limited amount of money to loan. Often this is the source of funds for second mortgages. A second mortgage is in addition to the first mortgage and if there is a foreclosure, can only be satisfied after the first mortgage is paid off.

Second mortgages are usually for from three to five years and at a higher interest rate than first mortgages. Realtors often know of private lenders who will make second mortgage loans.

These are the source of financing for home mortgages. Each has its advantages and disadvantages, partly depending on the condition of the real estate market and the availability of funds. All of them are designed to help families own their own homes, and the people who arrange them are anxious to see them used.

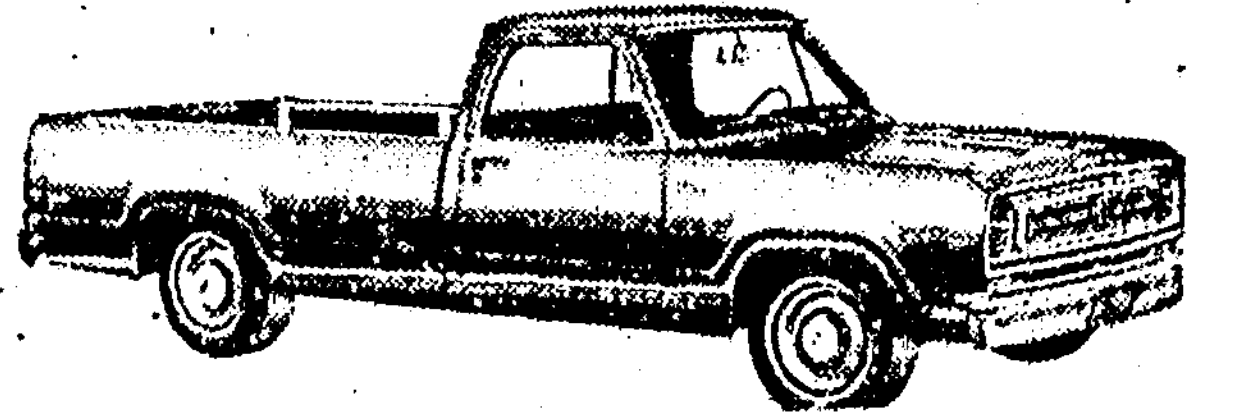

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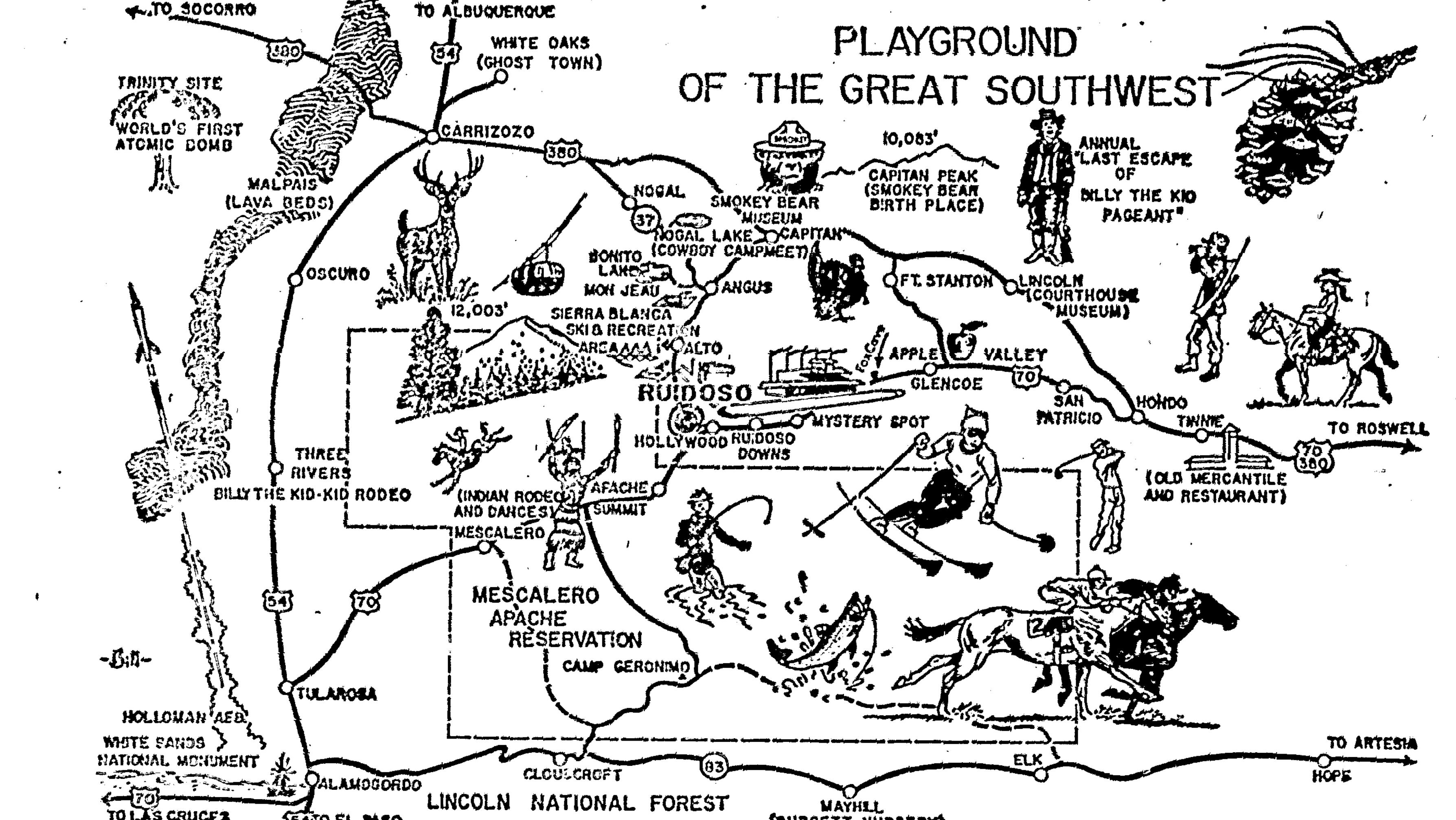

Gran Quivira Shows 26% Visit Increase

For the month of July 1972 Gran Quivira National Monument had 5,140 visitors. This brings the total number of visitors for this year to 23,169. This is an increase of 26% over last year for the same period.

With the total number of visitors in the vicinity of 31,000 for 1971 and the expected total to reach 40,000 for this year it is not surprising that visitation is running well ahead.

Visitors for the first seven months of this year have come from all 50 states, the district of Columbia, and 20 different foreign countries, including Greece, Yugoslavia, Malaysia, Thailand and Nepal.

The visitor center is open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. thru Labor Day, then 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. every day except Christmas. At the visitor center are various exhibits and artifacts which have been found during past excavations. Guided tours are available to organized groups. Visitors may use the self-guiding trail. The ruins consist of 21 pre-Spanish pueblo Indian dwellings, two of which are excavated. There are also two 17th century Franciscan missions at the monument.

There is no campground at Gran Quivira, but a picnic area is available for those who wish to use it.

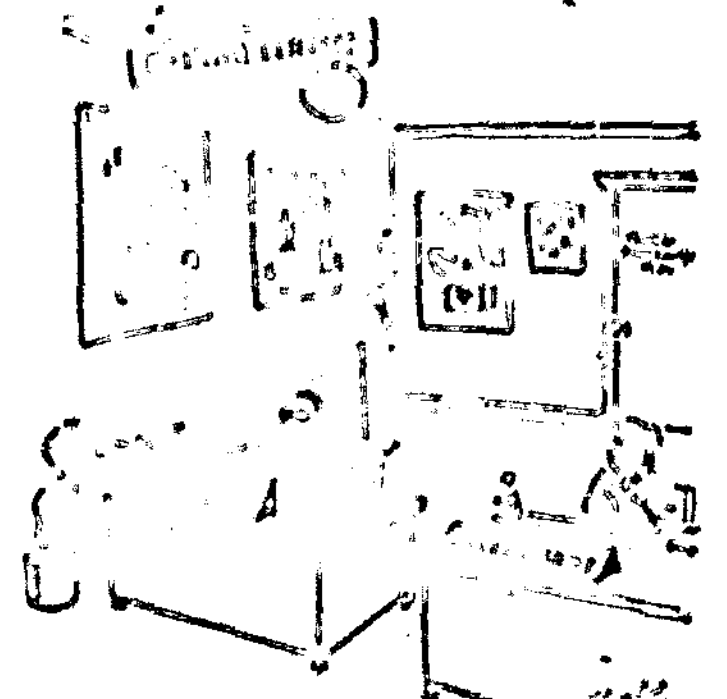
Gran Quivira was established on November 1, 1909 and is administered by the National Park Service. In 1916 when Congress created the National Park Service, Gran Quivira was one of the 22 National Monuments to comprise the new National Park System.

The monument, located in central New Mexico, is on a ridge of the Chapadara Mesa. You can reach Gran Quivira a number of ways. By turning south off U. S. Highway 60 at Mountainair, and driving 28 miles on State Highway 14, one can reach the monument on a paved road. From Carrizozo drive 16 miles north on U. S. Highway 54 and then turn west on State Highway 14 for 39 miles of gravel road. Gran Quivira can also be reached by driving 30 miles west of San Antonio on State Highway 380. When you reach Bingham, go north on State Highway 41 for 41 miles. This road is almost all sand and clay, and should only be used in good weather.

CYCLE REVIEW

For the first year in the history of motorcycle racing the Americans are surpassing their European counterparts who had previously dominated the sport.

Hakan Andersson, Jim Weinert, Gary Jones and Torsten Hallman, finished in that order to sweep the first four places at the Elkhorn, Wisconsin International 250cc Class Motorcycle Race. Hakan Andersson, Yamaha Factory Team rider, dominated all three 25-minute 250cc motos for the overall victory.

In moto one, Torleif Hansen jumped into the lead aided by an inoperative starting gate that suffered the crunches after over half the field ran over it. Andersen was in close pursuit and took the lead in the back sweepers, followed closely by Hansen.

Hansen crashed at the beginning of lap nine when his engine seized on the fasted part of the course.

Andersson continued to show an aggressive style of riding in moto two, knocking off front runner Gary Jones (Yama) halfway through lap one. Brad Lackey (Kaw) moved into second ahead of Jones on lap eight and Montessa rider Mike Runyard into fourth on lap thirteen with Jim Weinert (Yam) and John DeSoto (Kaw) safely in fifth and sixth place.

Jim Weinert streaked into the lead in the final 250cc moto giving Hakan Andersson some competition. Weinert began moving away from John DeSoto and Gunnar Lindstrom (Hus) opening up a 15 bike length lead by the end of lap one.

Andersson, after a slow start and bogged in traffic, moved into second place on lap five before taking the lead on lap ten.

Once Andersson had the lead, it was an instant replay of motos one and two as he began to increase his margin to almost 30 seconds at the end.

The final moto provided the best show for the different makes as Mike Runyard (Mon) picked up a second with Weinert third, Gunnar Lindstrom (Hus) motored to fourth, CZ riders Dave Bickers and Stuart Nunn took fifth and sixth and Bob Grossi (Hus) picked up seventh.

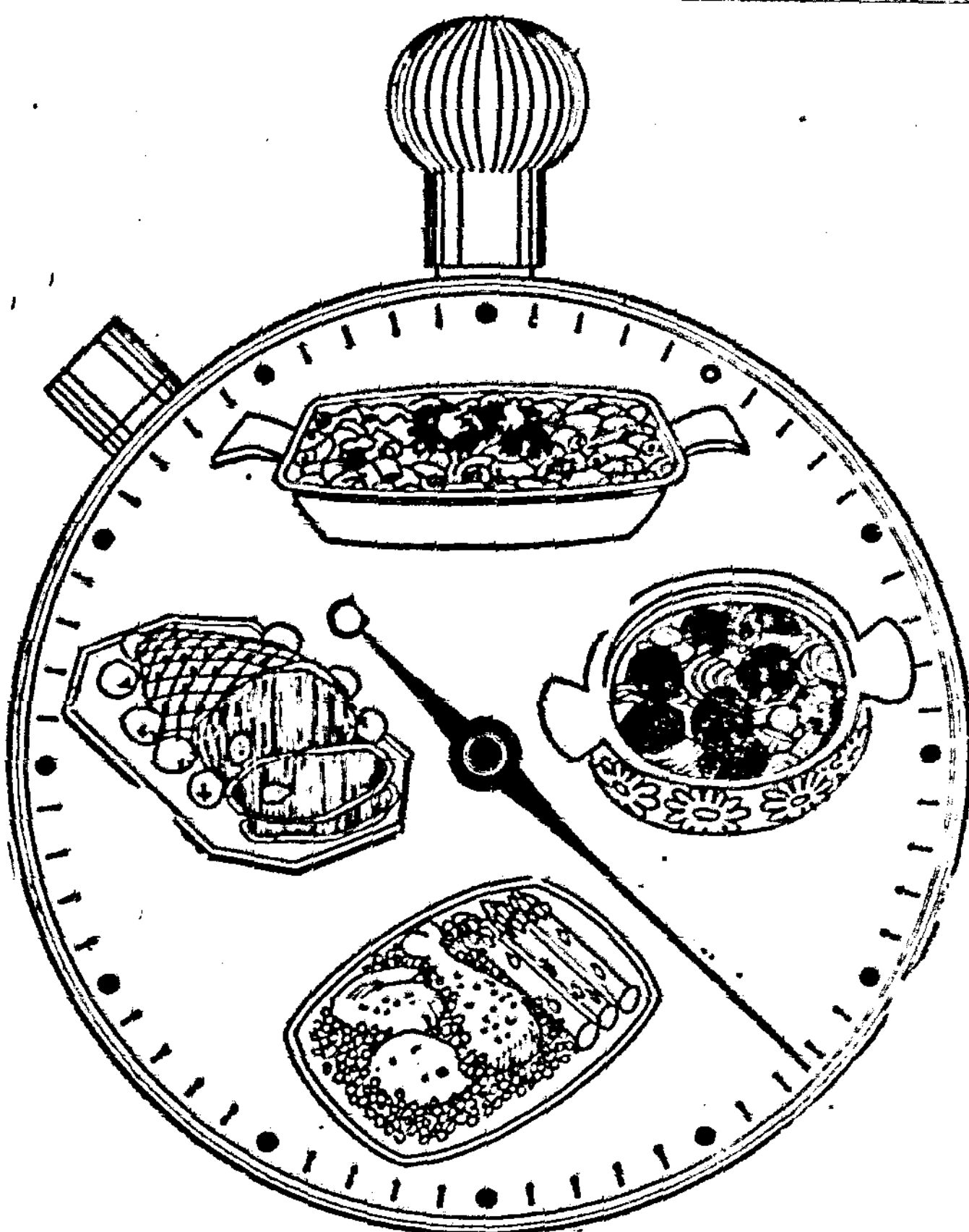

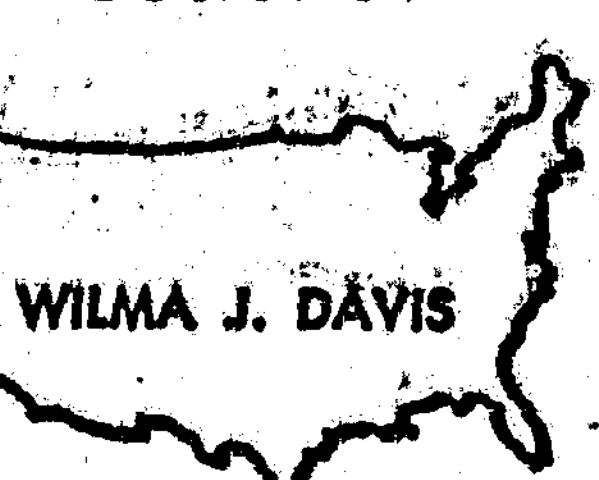

Inside The Capital

A 28-member New Mexico delegation will head for Miami Beach this weekend for the National Republican Convention opening a 3-day stand Monday.

Alternates on the delegation include Dr. Thomas M. Prescott, 52, of Tucumcari; Dr. Prescott's son, Michael, 20, and Paul Alan Fell, 21, of Deming.

Dr. Prescott recently bought a motor home 27 feet long for the long trip to Miami Beach. Last weekend he was still making alterations and was unsure whether he would drive the big unit to Florida.

The New Mexico delegation hotel is 12 miles north of Convention Hall. If the Prescott motor home goes to Miami Beach, it could provide needed transportation to convention sessions.

Five of the 14 New Mexico delegates are women. Included is Mrs. Juanita Marcus Michaels, Santa Fe, a Taos Pueblo member. Her father, Ben Marcus, a Taos Pueblo council member, made a buckskin costume Mrs. Michaels will wear in Miami Beach, weather permitting.

Three of the 14 New Mexico alternates are women. Wesley Little of Silver City, a delegate, formerly lived 10 years in Deming. Little operates 11 convenience stores in Luna and Grant Counties. Two others are under construction in Grant County.

The all-Nixon New Mexico delegation is generally conservative. U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan, Jr., 44, of Albuquerque, is delegation chairman. Albuquerque lawyer Thomas McKenna, 50, is vice chairman. McKenna is state Republican Party chairman. Lujan and McKenna are conservatives.

Average age of the 14 New Mexico delegates is 48. Only 3 delegates are 35 years old or less. Seven delegates or 50 per cent are over 50 years old.

The youngest delegate is Miss Linda Budagher, 24, of Albuquerque, a new graduate of New Mexico Highlands University, is Las Vegas lawyer Jose Arriola, 71. Arriola also was on the New Mexico delegation to the 1952, 1956 and 1964 national GOP conventions.

Michael Prescott, a junior in Journalism at New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, is the youngest member of the delegation. He voted in the June 6 primary for the first time.

Most of the New Mexico delegation will fly Saturday from Albuquerque to Miami for the national convention. Early arrivals were Alex Gonzales and Miss Irene Senutovitch of Santa Fe, the New Mexico members of the key platform committee, and National Committeewoman Francine Neff of Albuquerque. Mrs. Neff attended meetings of the national GOP committee and the convention housing arrangements committee. She is also on the convention rules committee set to meet Sunday.

While renomination of President Richard M. Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew was assured, a scrap was pending for a committed New Mexico delegate for California Rep. Paul (Pete) McCloskey.

McCloskey polled enough votes in the New Mexico primary to win one delegate to Miami Beach. But the state GOP convention in Albuquerque July 15 refused to amend party rules to permit election of a bona fide McCloskey delegate. Would-be McCloskey delegate Tom Mayer of Espanola and alternate Pete Duran of Albuquerque filed a challenge with the national convention credentials committee. The challenge will be heard this week.

Meanwhile, the New Mexico Democratic caravan continued

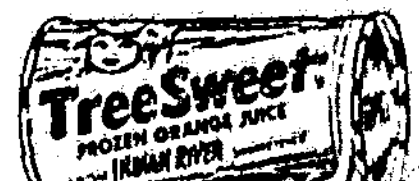

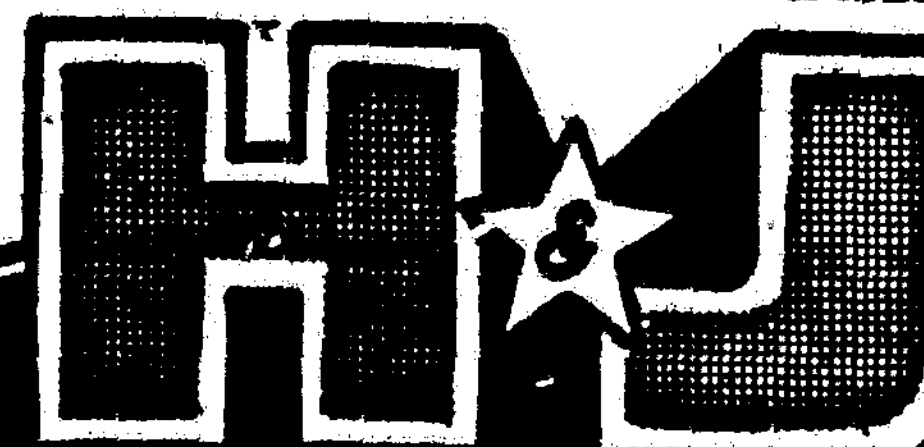
