New Mexico's accreditation as being the Land of Enchantment was really strengthened last week with the advent of flowered apple blossoms on a tree owned by Ruidoso's Bill Pippin and growing on a crab apple tree located at the rear of the Bill Pippin Real Estate office on Sudderth Drive in the Gateway Area of Ruidoso. I am truthfully not sure that this is a first but imagine that crab apple blossoms in Sept. are somewhat rare even if it is an election year. Might just make a good Political Punch for some—come November 7th.

While on the subject of weather, the Ruidoso area has already passed its average early rainfall by nearly two inches with several areas within the corporate limits unofficially reporting from 3 to 8 inches above the average yearly amount. As of this week Ruidoso has had officially 21.71 inches of rainfall with the yearly average for Ruidoso set at a little over 20 in. With nearly 4 months yet to go in 1972 the area, if the rainfall pattern continues, might come close to setting a new record. Checking back through 1949, several yearly rainfall totals were greater than the yearly average. For example in 1955 Ruidoso officially had 34.81 inches of rainfall, in 1959, 29.55 inches and in 1949, 25.42 inches.

The big question now, that takes up much time in the coffee shops, does a wet summer mean a good year for snow? Some answer in the affirmative and others say that it really doesn't make any difference.

In checking over the official records covering nearly twenty years it appears that wet summers do not mean snowy winters. For example, I checked the rainfall during the summer months for practically each of the past twenty years and the summer months with the greatest amount of precipitation, in many cases, recorded the smallest amount of snow the ensuing winter. In 1950 during the months of June through September Ruidoso recorded over twenty inches of rain, nearly 11 inches in July alone, but received only 3.80 inches of snow for the entire year.

In 1949 the total rainfall was registered at 25.42 and during that same year Ruidoso received 66.10 inches of snow. Other unusual weather events reveal that in June of 1951 there were thirteen consecutive days of freezing weather and only 21.94 inches of rain for the same year.

Perhaps the nearest we can come to hoping for the snow-belt in 1972-73 is in the comparison with this summer and the summer of 1953. In 1953 it was recorded that Ruidoso had twenty-one consecutive days of rain in July and August, of that year had twenty-two days of consecutive rain. The yearly total for snow that year was well over forty-six inches through December and then in January, February and March of 1954 we can add around ten more inches... the concluding urgency... think snow now and write your congressman or double up your salary for the preacher.

It may not be too good for razor blade manufacturing or shaving cream factories but nevertheless the Annual Ruidoso Aspicade Board Growing Contest will reach some sort of climax come Tuesday, Sept. 19. That's the date for the annual Kangaroo Court at which time all Ruidoso area men who have smooth faces will have to face up to a fine or detention in an Aspicade Cell on the Plaza Dee Shopping Center parking lot.

Only three members of the Ruidoso Downs Village Council were present Monday evening to hear a report from the engineer for the village sewer project, Quentin Daniels of Daniels Engineering. Also present for the meeting were Lewis Gray, with the Environmental Improvement Agency; and Ted Asberry, Daniels Engineering. Mike Richardson, local Environmentalist, was a visitor.

Daniels explained work progress on the sewer project and presented drawings of the central plant. He outlined basic requirements before approval of federal funds would be made available. The six major items needed for the application include: 1. basin area study, 2. application for grant, 3. location of central plant, 4. uses of waste

## Ruidoso Municipal School Board Calls Bids on Landscaping-Paving

A call for bids will be issued by the Ruidoso Municipal School Board for Sept. 27 on sprinkler systems, concrete paving and sidewalks, topsoil and seeding, and paving of parking lots to complete the remodeling and building projects now nearing completion. According to Rem Alley and Waggoner, the proposed project should require about 30 days from the letting of the bid for completion. Plans and specifications for the work were donated by Alley and Waggoner to the school.

Alley, architect for the school remodeling and building project, reported that work on the schools has been substantially completed and that funds in the amount of the minor items still uncompleted could be withheld with the major portion of monies to be paid at this time to the contractor.

The board approved many minor changes in the original plans that were not foreseen at the time of the contract signing. Pat Valliant, school superintendent, noted that Bauske Construction, contractor for the project, had been most cooperative and that several items not in the general contract had been given the school without charge.

According to school officials, an open house will be held at the schools upon arrival of furniture and clean-up of the campus. A letter from the Indian Division of the State Department of Education concerning the school board contract with the Mesas Apache Tribe for Johnson - O'Malley funds was read giving approval for the contract.

An invitation and information concerning the New Mexico School Board Association from Dr. Joe Menapace was read to the board.

A letter to the president of the school board from Dick Dunagan, former 8th grade teacher at Nob Hill school, was read giving his reasons for resigning. The board approved the warrants for the month of August. Pat Valliant was approved as official representative for Title I and P. L. 874 applications.

The board voted to raise per diem (motel room and meals) for teachers and school officials traveling in the state from \$18 per day to \$20.00. Out of state will remain at \$25, as will travel pay at 10c per mile. Payment of the architect and all but \$50,000 of the total con-

## GENERAL ELECTION — NOVEMBER 7th

## Voter Registration Deadline Is 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 26

Lincoln County residents who are not registered to vote in the forthcoming Nov. 7 General Election have until 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 26, in which to register as a qualified voter, according to Mrs. Bill G. Shreevogost, Chairwoman of the Lincoln County Board of Registrars.

In addition it was also announced that Sept. 26 is the final date for candidates to withdraw their names from the official General Election ballot.

Lincoln County residents, 18 years of age and up, who have lived within the county thirty days prior to the General Election and have never registered to vote must register with an official Registration Officer before they can qualify to vote. Also, Lincoln County residents who previously have registered but did not vote in the last General Election (1968) and have not re-registered since that time must again register before the Sept. 26 deadline.

The county Chairwoman of the Board of Registrars stated that in March, 1971, over 1,500 Lincoln County voters were purged from the voter registration list because they failed to vote in the 1968 General Election. As of April 25, 1972, there were 3,715 qualified voters in Lincoln County with a revised total expected shortly after the Sept. 26 registration deadline.

Mrs. Shreevogost also stated that Lincoln County residents can register in any of the municipal buildings of the villages in Lincoln County and in addition may register in the home, school, on the job or "just about anywhere" as long as an Official Registration Officer is present.

Jerry Wood, member of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and chairman of the chamber sponsored Annual Ruidoso Aspicade Celebration's "Beard Growing Contest" issued a FINAL WARNING late this week regarding "Beardless and Badgeless Men" in the Ruidoso area effective at daylight Tuesday, Sept. 19.

Wood stated that the annual Kangaroo Court will be held in the Plaza Dee Shopping Center with a prominent self-styled Judge presiding. All area men who are without a beard or who have not paid the five dollar fee and received their No-Beard Permit Badge will be arrested and brought before the court.

This generous offer was approved by the following men: P. L. Carson, Bud Sheff, Tommy Hicks, Ted Johnson, Ed Davis, Ben Jenkins and Tom Shipley. Thomas Crume, superintendent of the Ruidoso-Stetson school district, has announced that the first home game will be played on this field on Sept. 19 when the local team will meet the Portales team.

Ground was broken last week by the First Baptist Church of Ruidoso on their lots located a few blocks out the Alto Road for a \$30,000 church to be completed within two years. Plans call for a two-story building with the exterior of the church to be Spanish-style and painted white. 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## MRS. B.

I promised to tell about the first place my parents pitched their tent. — There was a mob of people all milling about not knowing where to go, or what they were doing; so you just put your tent down on a patch of dried grass—that is if some other tent was not already there.

The first day my father went about his business; and while he was gone (it was several days) mother had to keep careful watch over us and manage the food the best she could.

I have not mentioned the fuel in this country was scarce, and it became more so the farther west we would go. All the way from the piny woods we crossed many streams, there the wood was easy to find; but by the time we reached the plains, there was not much to burn. Just little twigs of shinny or 'cow chips' was quite a come down, after being accustomed to plenty of wood.

Maybe some of you youngsters do not know what either is. Shinny: is a western name for small oak trees about a foot or two high, stunted, because they never had much rain. 'Cow chips' are: Well they are dried hard before you can burn them —if you use green ones they smell something awful. The dried ones smell bad enough.

Well, mother managed to cook enough food for us over the campfire—Now you may wonder what we ate on such an escape. I know the food never tasted better — This is a recipe mother handed down:

**Sour Dough Biscuits**  
1 qt. warm water, 1 table-  
spoon sugar, Flour to make bat-  
ter.

Put in large glass jar, but do not crowd lid on (only when moving chuck wagon). Set in warm place until it foams. This takes four or five days in warm weather. When it 'smells' (mother always went by the smell and experience) just right, use as much sour dough (or batter) as you would sour milk; using soda, salt, flour and baking powder — as you would for sour milk biscuits; but not much shortening. Make up dough like any other biscuits. Melt some bacon grease in pan, dip biscuits in and turn them over. Bake at once in a hot oven or in a greased dutch oven over a campfire, turning them once to brown on both sides.

When you use some sour dough always add a little more warm water, sugar and flour to the mixture; to keep the sour dough continuing. (Do not ever put in the refrigerator).

These biscuits, with plenty of beans, cooked with a big slab of home cured bacon or a skillet of Irish stew cooked on a campfire, topped off with stewed home dried peaches or honey and butter was all one needed to keep him happy. Some had far less.

You recall I told you we brought Old Bess, the cow. Mother kept her staked out not far from our tent and you can just know we fared alright after mother had milked her.

The days father came back he would bring wild prairie chickens or pheasants he had killed on the way home. Once he brought back an antelope which was a wonderful treat, and mother dried some of the meat after dividing up with her neighbors.

One day while we were alone a man came by and told mother: she would have to move as our tent was on the railroad right-of-way. How was she to now, as this was only a bald prairie? And she asked as much. She told the man she would have to wait until her husband returned. "Lady, do you want to sit there and let the train run over you?" he asked. Mother, not seeing any train, not



**Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?**

**A. Leg of Pork—Sirloin Half.**  
(Also referred to as Fresh Ham—Butt Half.)

**Q. Where does it come from? How is it identified?**

**A. It is the upper half of the hind leg; the sirloin half of a whole fresh ham. The round leg bone can be seen on the cut surface. Since fresh ham is not cured or smoked, it does not have the pink color associated with smoked ham.**

**Q. How is it prepared?**

**A. It is roasted in the same manner as a pork loin. Place the half leg of pork on a rack in a roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so bulb is centered in the thickest part. Do not add water. I guess we will just have to move over a little."

Not many days passed though, until we sat in the opening of our tent and watched the rough hard looking men of various color and nationality, lay the iron rails, while the first 'iron horse' slowly pegged its way in to the barren lands of the golden west; filling our eyes with cinder and smoke.

Mother says it was the Choc-taw, later purchased by the Rock Island; but there are many railroads today where once the buffalo roamed and the Indians rode their wild horses. It is hard for me to remember all the details, as this was told to me.

Next, father found us some land to file on.

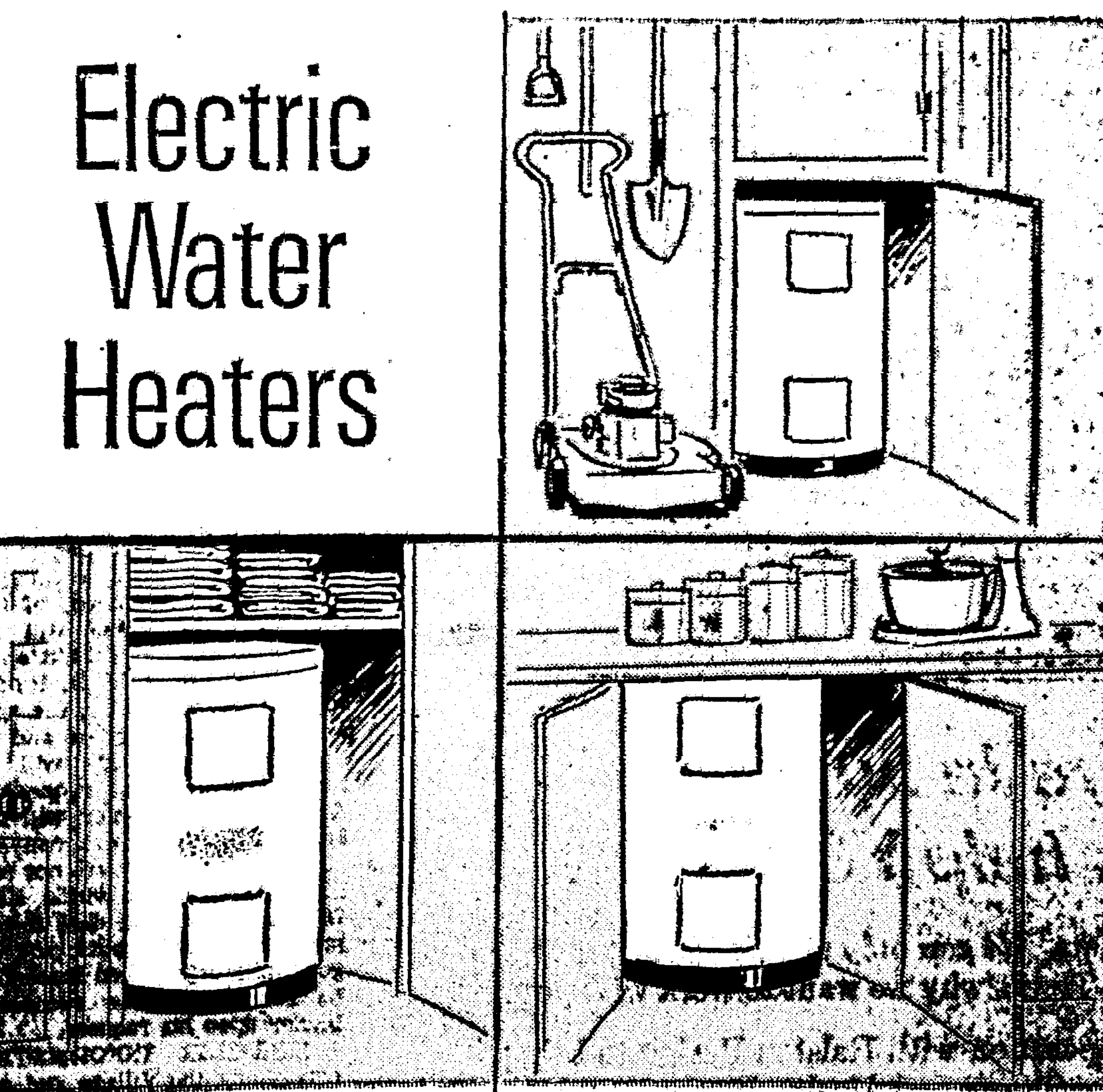

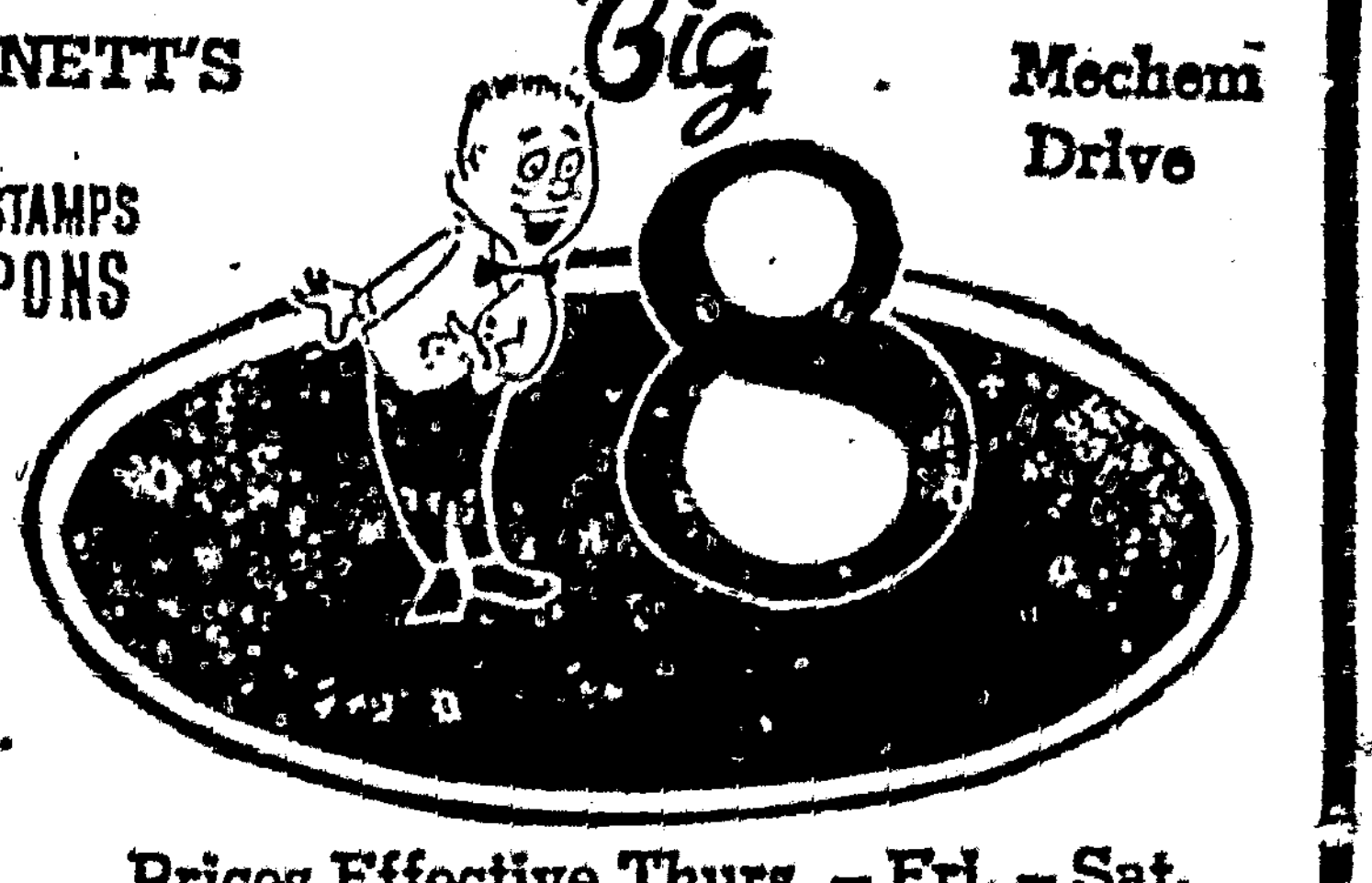

## Taxpayers Newsletter

**TAX STUDY**—A recently held 28 meeting of the interim legislative Tax Study Committee again heard Municipal League spokesman Jerry Boyle outline present and projected needs of communities in New Mexico. In other action, the committee heard more information on taxation of the extractive industries from staff member John Jasper. More discussion of property tax law changes were presented during the three day meeting.

The Municipal League, representing most of the state's cities and towns, is seeking a viable taxing situation for their troubled treasuries. The problem, according to the League, is one of rapid expansion of services tied to a slow-moving tax base for local government.

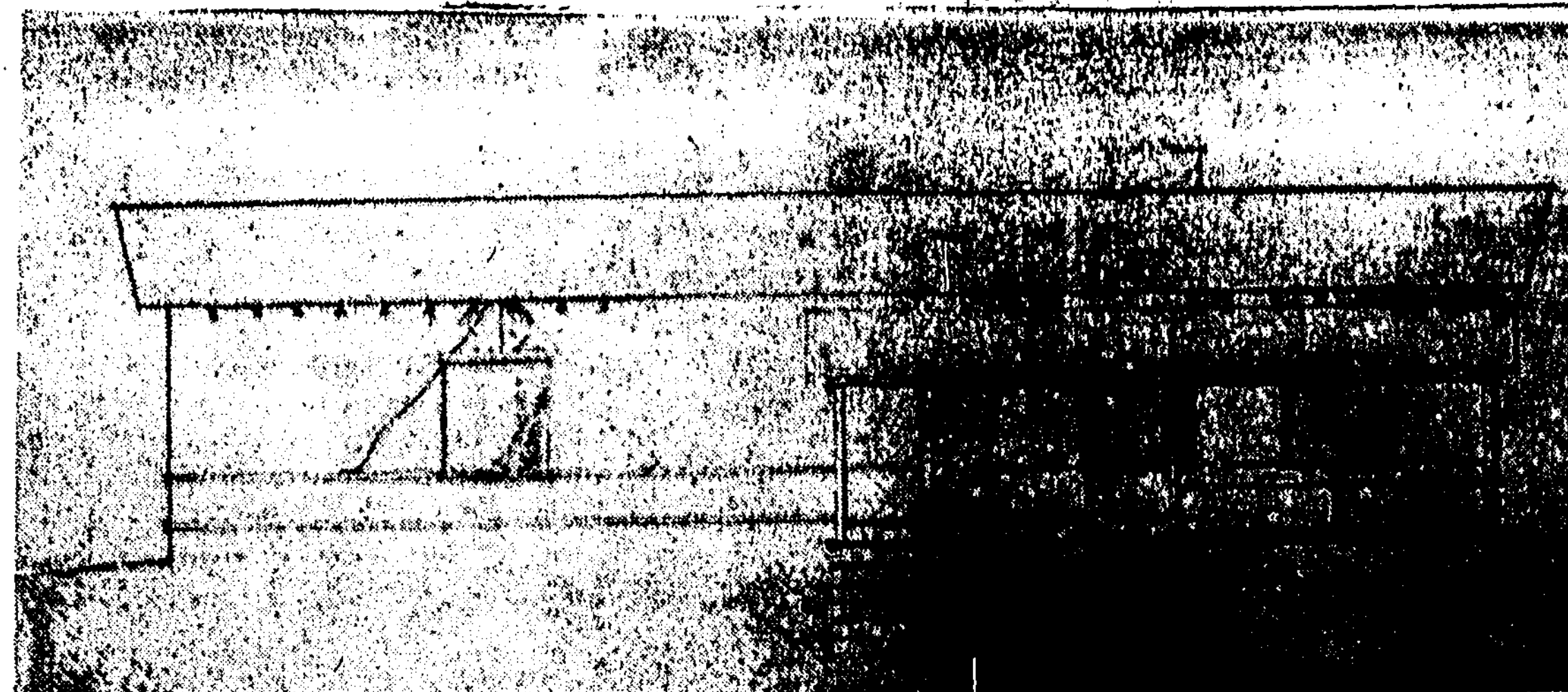
Apparently home rule was not the cure-all outlined by its proponents when presented to the public for approval. It appears the public simply is not willing to tax itself in the troubled communities at the same rate it wants expanded services. Crippled further in the last legislature by a new law restricting the communities from taxing themselves with the same taxes used by the state, New Mexico's cities now are back seeking help from the Santa Fe lawmakers. The issue appears now to be developing into a key one for the 1973 Legislature.

Broad and acceptable solutions to the municipal taxing problem have not been forthcoming. Proponents of strengthening local authority generally prefer increasing the portion of gross receipts taxes now received by the state's communities. Other forms of taxation appear too slow or complicated structurally to keep up with the cities' spending patterns. Home rule advocates look more toward service charges tied to property taxes. A minority group has been toying with direct expenditures from the state's general fund to communities, similar to those given to

schools.

**TAXES TOO HIGH?** — A Wall Street Journal item is worth reprinting: "Local taxes too high? Might try dissolving the government. Extreme as the solution would seem for larger municipalities, residents of the village of Prattburg, N. Y., a small upstate community, voted last week to disband their government to cut taxes. They fired the entire bureaucracy — the mayor, village clerk and four trustees or councilmen. (All were part-time jobs). Under the paid guidance of a New York City management consulting firm, Prattburg is arranging with the surrounding town, also known as Prattburg, to take over street maintenance and other services. . . . The consulting firm, Kingsley Associates, figures doing away with the government will save the average village taxpayer roughly \$75 a year without costing him any service. Voters supported the move 157 to 139. . . . It's a election turnout ever. It's a huge step for these conservative people to give up a 95-year tradition of their own government," one observer comments. Many other villages in the state reportedly are considering similar action."

**MORE NEW YORK** — A New York county supreme court (equivalent to the California Superior Court) has reversed the trend in Serrano-type cases throughout the country. The New York court in Spano vs. Board of Education dismissed the complaint which charged the method of financing schools in New York violated the equal protection clause of the U. S. Constitution. In the dismissal, the court referred to two U. S. Supreme Court rulings, *McInnis vs. Ogilvie* and *Burruss vs. Wilkerson*, which held that prevailing state and local legislative patterns for levying and disbursing taxes to defray the cost of public education were not unconstitutional. The court said the acceptance of the Ser-

rano judicial theory "is to de-mean the U. S. Supreme Court."

**GAMBLING** — The Tax Foundation reports a half dozen states may soon join the six Eastern states now operating lotteries because of heavy profits from the gambling ventures. New Jersey's anticipated \$60-million profit from its weekly lottery and the million-dollar daily handle at New York City's 60 off-track betting establishments are tempting other states and some local governments. Listed by the Foundation as prospects for successful gambling legislation are Oregon, Washington, Michigan, Colorado, Maryland, California and Rhode Island. New Mexico presently allows gambling only at horse races and then only at the tracks. Rep. Eugene Cinnelli, D-Bernalillo, chairman of the interim legislative Tax Study Committee, has announced his group will investigate the gambling issue thoroughly this year.

**PRINTING COSTS**—The Taxpayers Association has launched a probe of the election printing costs in New Mexico after allegations were made concerning the 1972 contracts. At issue is a contract let by the Secretary of State to supply all printed matter and some other materials for both the primary and general elections this year. The

report when completed on the issue and distribution will be made to all interested parties.

**REVENUE SHARING** — U. S. Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Fla., outlined opposition this month to the federal revenue sharing plan, H. R. 14370, presently before the House. That opposition closely parallels the Taxpayers Association views. Chief among them is that the bill would force states to become dependent on federal assistance to meet their general government responsibilities. It would also undermine public accountability, Gibbons says, by divorcing the responsibility for raising taxes from the dispensation of public benefits. It also would further centralize government and would presume an excess revenue availability which is not available now nor will be in the near future. "The only appeal the committee bill has," Gibbons says, "is based on one of the hoariest of hoaxes—that it is possible to get something for nothing."

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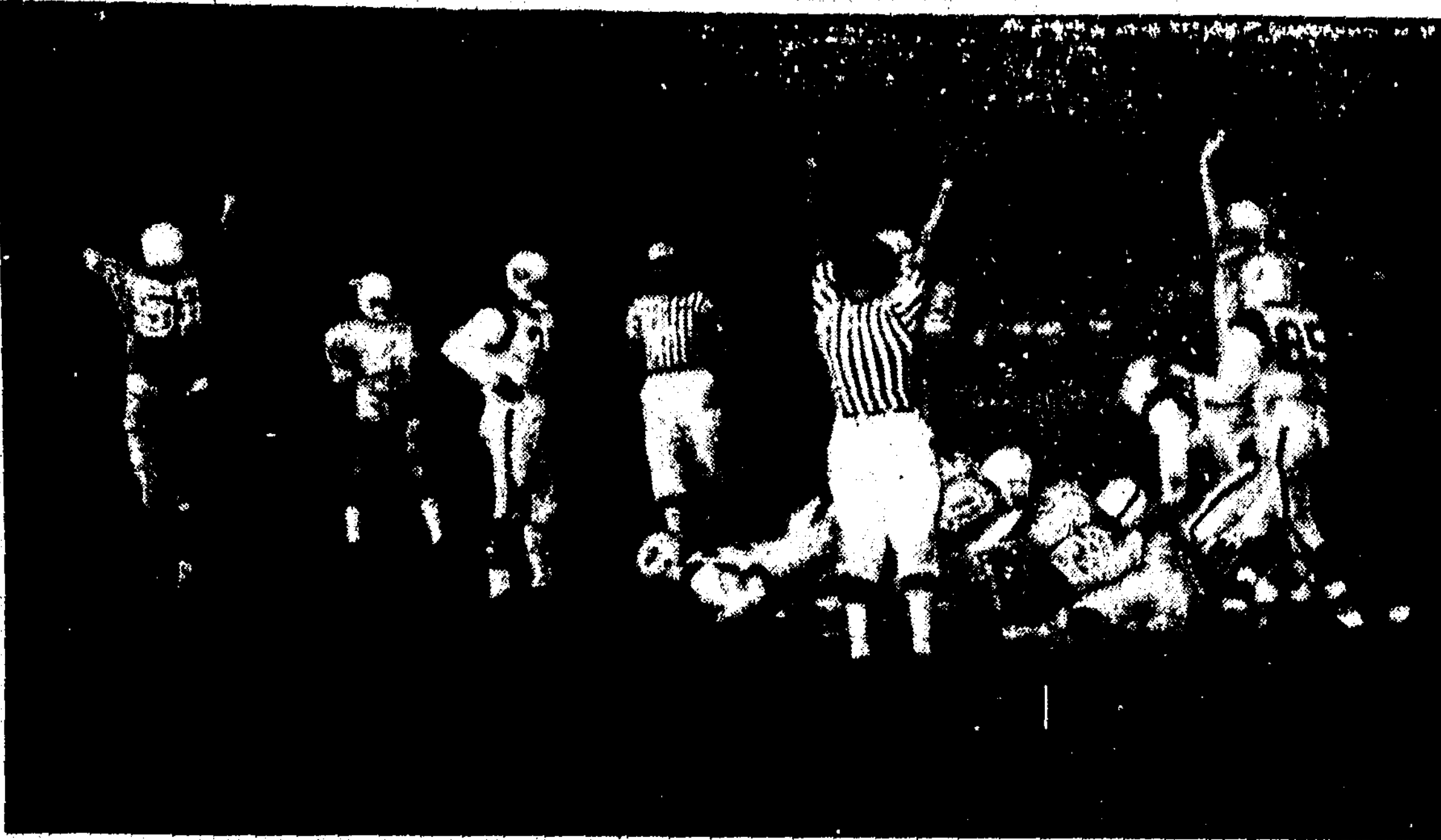

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

**WHEN YOU GO DANCING**  
Whenever business was good at a suburban night club, the management would "stretch" their space by putting extra tables and chairs on the edge of the dance floor. One night, a dancing couple stumbled over a stray chair.

The woman suffered painful injuries, and later sued the club for damages. She pointed out that the chair had been shoved several feet into the dancing area.

"If it was," countered the management, "some other customer must have done the shoving. We are not legally liable for what our customers do."

But the court granted the woman's claim. The court said that by placing chairs directly onto the dance floor, the management had set the stage for trouble.

When you go dancing in a public place, you are entitled to conditions of reasonable safety. The dance floor, the lighting, and the furnishings should all be maintained in such a way as to minimize the chance of accidents.

Nevertheless, merely by choosing this form of recreation, you are accepting those dangers that are "natural" to it. For example:

Another woman, injured while dancing, claimed she lost her footing because the floor was slick. But the court found no reason to blame the management for this. As one judge put it:

"Dance floors are intended to be slippery."

Furthermore, your own behavior might amount to negligence. That was the court's ruling in a case in which the claimant had ventured onto a ballroom floor in a state of advanced intoxication.

And in another case, the court declared it was negligence for a woman to try a particularly tricky step while wearing heels three and a half inches high.

"The situation," said the judge, "parallels that of the risk taken by a participant in a sport."

# Expansion Slated For Night Racing At Sunland Park

Night racing will be expanded during the upcoming '72-'73 season at Sunland Park, according to an announcement by Al Rosa, President and General Manager. The format for the fall portion of the two-part season will be similar to last year with night racing being scheduled for Fridays in November. In the spring season, however, Sunland Park will go to night racing on both Wednesdays and Fridays throughout most of March and April. The pattern of four race days per week will be a first in Sunland history. Briefly, here's the way the racing calendar looks:

The fall portion of the '72-'73 season kicks off on Saturday, Oct. 7 and continues through Dec. 10. After a two-week dark period in December, the spring meeting will get underway on Friday, Dec. 29 and extend thru Sunday, May 13. The two-part season will cover 95 race days. All Saturday and Sunday programs (with only one exception) will get going at the regular first post of 1:30 p.m. Friday racing will be staged either at night, starting at 7:30 p.m., or at the twilight first post of 3:00 p.m. Night racing on Wednesdays are booked for 7:30 p.m. Friday racing will get underway with twilight programs on Oct. 20 and 27. All Friday agendas in November, as part of the co-ordinated programs with the Juarez Race Track, will be staged under the lights. The last two Fridays of the fall season—Dec. 1 and 8—are booked for twilight. In January, February and March, the format calls for night racing on Fridays. During the last six Fridays of the season—April 6 through May 11—the (twilight) first post will again be in effect. All together, there'll be six Wednesday night programs. The dates are March 14, 21, 28 and April 4, 11, 18. The mounting popularity of night racing last year prompted track officials to schedule Wednesday night racing. Of the 12 biggest night handles in Sunland history, 10 were established last season. The top six night handles went into the record books during the spring portion of last year's meeting. Topping the list is the wagering total of \$163,643 on March 31, 1972. Other highlights for night racing: \$153,654 on March 10, 1972; \$150,907 on Feb. 18, 1972; \$146,678 on March 17, 1972; \$144,514 on March 3, 1972; \$141,365 on Jan. 28, 1972. The only other new wrinkle this season, so far as racing dates and post times are concerned, is the scheduling of a twilight program on Saturday, Dec. 30. That's the day of the Sun Bowl game. The game is expected to be concluded before Sunland's first post of 3 p.m.

## Inside The Capital

**SANTA FE** — Democratic presidential candidate George McGovern boosted his New Mexico political stock in two days of campaigning in Albuquerque and Espanola but still seemed to trail far behind Republican President Richard M. Nixon in this state.

McGovern talked on the problems of Spanish-American

and other minorities at a major Espanola barbecue rally. U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, McGovern's state campaign chairman, had predicted earlier up to 30,000 would attend the major event.

More than a dozen steers were contributed from New Mexico's East Side for beef for the barbecue. Democrats tried to make the rally the largest ever held in New Mexico.

South Dakota Sen. McGovern, 50, had often visited Taos, Santa Fe and other Northern New Mexico areas earlier. He spent much of his time in New Mexico relaxing in Albuquerque after a 10-state campaign swing.

McGovern talked briefly to 300 who attended a \$50-a-couple fund-raising reception honoring him at Albuquerque. He said: "I want to restore the government to the people. The country cannot afford Richard Nixon for another four years."

McGovern also met in Albuquerque with potential major campaign contributors. Harvey Mudd, Taos environmentalist, was in the group. Dennis Hopper, Taos movie producer and actor, also was reportedly in the meeting.

Some 150 greeted McGovern when he arrived Friday by plane in Albuquerque. Democratic U. S. Senate candidate Jack Daniels, Hobbs, and Santa Fe lawyer Gene Gallegos, U. S. House District 1 Democratic nominee, attended major McGovern campaign events in New Mexico.

U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat seeking re-election, stayed in Washington.

The Eunice rate includes \$4.61 for New Mexico Junior College.

State Sen. C. B. Trujillo, 40, D-Taos, says: "Some method is needed to provide a method for county governments to maintain and improve county roads. Some county roads are in very poor condition."

Sen. Trujillo recommended studying the possibility of the state assuming maintenance of all roads in New Mexico, including county roads. Asked how this would be financed, he said: "I know the problem. I don't know the answer."

He said: "New Mexico municipalities are dying for lack of funds to fulfill their many duties and benefits demanded by their constituents." Trujillo said the interim legislative Tax Study Committee will send recommendations on the vital problem to the 1973 Legislature.

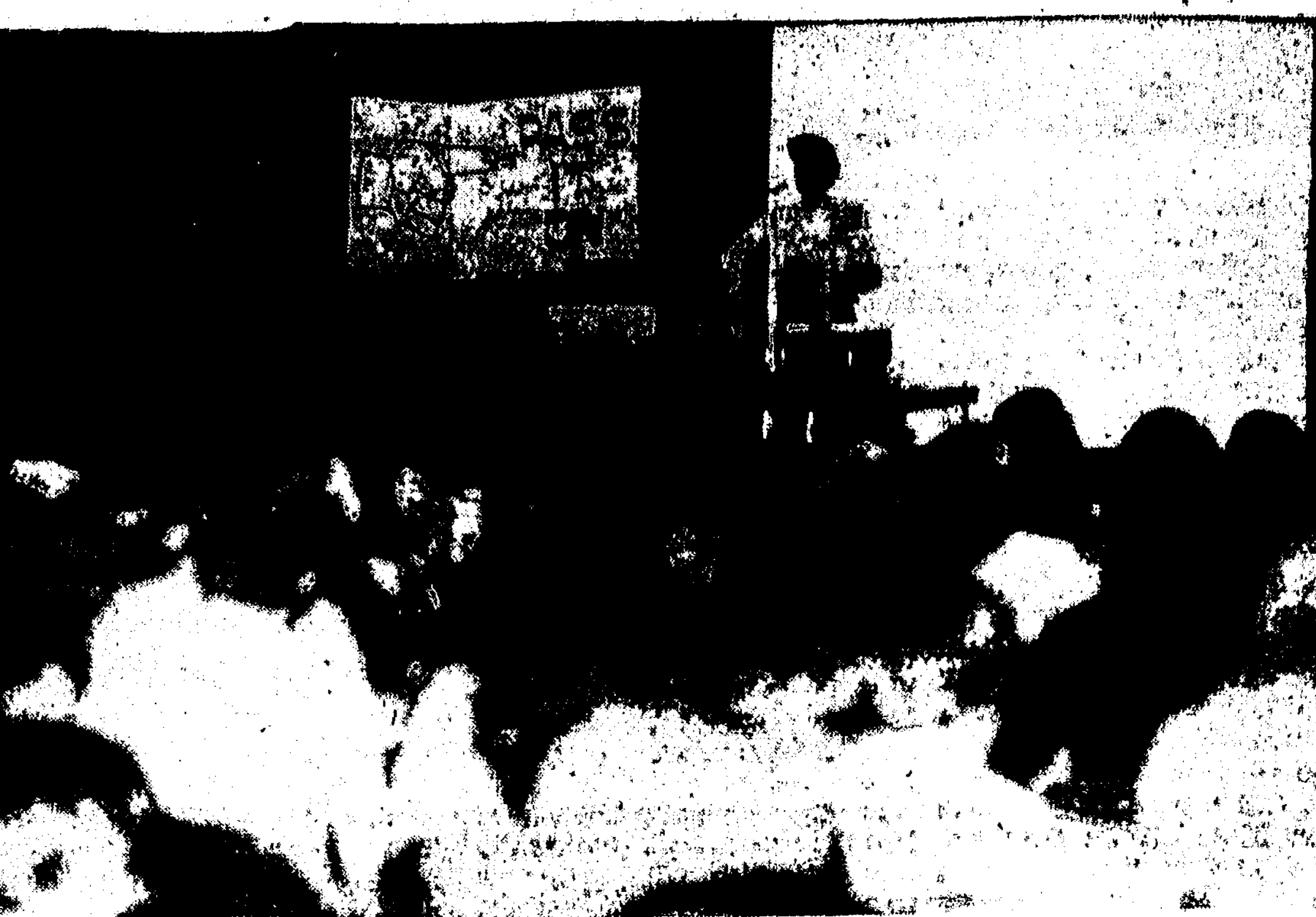
Two outgoing legislators — Sen. Flinns Helder, D-Lovington, whose district includes Eunice and Jalisco, and Rep. Robert Johnson, R-Clovis — are on the TSC.

Trujillo is opposed in the general election Nov. 7 in new Senate District 6 by Penasco merchant Pete Sahd, longtime active Republican. Sahd is a former New Mexico Department American Legion commander. He has been active in many Taos County civic projects. Sahd ran unsuccessfully in 1968 for the GOP U. S. House District 1 nomination.

New District 6 spans all of Taos and Mora Counties and the Montezuma, Sapello and Rockada precincts in San Miguel County. Sahd could benefit from President Nixon's coattails. In 1968 Nixon carried Taos and Mora Counties narrowly over Minnesota Sen. Hubert Humphrey. Nixon lost San Miguel County to Humphrey by 61 votes.

Sen. Trujillo pushed a slot machine bill before the TSC. Revenue from slot machines would be assigned to cities. A Trujillo slot machine bill was beaten in a previous legislative session. If Trujillo is re-elected and offers the proposal in the 1973 Legislature, it would set off steaming controversy. Its long-range chance of adoption are dim at present.

Deputy Atty. Gen. Oliver Payne said in an opinion for

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## Social Security

Fifteen years ago the first social security disability payments were made to 96,500 disabled workers. Today, nearly 3 million disabled workers and members of their families get monthly cash payments, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative. Here in Lincoln County, 76 disabled workers draw \$11,000 per month. This amount will be increased by 20% starting with the October 3 checks.

When social security disability benefits were first paid in July, 1957, only disabled workers between 50 and 65 were eligible for payments, Mrs. Graves said. "Today, disabled workers of any age under 65 can receive disability payments. And certain members of their families can get monthly checks, too," she said.

To be eligible for social security disability payments, which start in the 7th month of disability, a worker must be so severely disabled that it looks as if he'll be unable to work for a year or more. But he should contact the nearest social security office and file for benefits as soon as he becomes disabled. Generally, he must have worked in employment covered by social security for at least 5 1/2 years — and 5 years of the work must have been during the 10 years before his disability began. The work requirement is lower for workers disabled before age 31, Mrs. Graves said.

The September list of plentiful foods from the U. S. Department of Agriculture includes — Turkey, peanuts and peanut products, broiler-fryers, fresh apples, dried beans, frozen French fried potatoes and eggs. Watch your stores for special prices on these items.

Hard-cooked eggs should be refrigerated promptly—either in the shell or out. If the shell is removed, put the eggs in a tightly closed container or wrap them with moisture-proof, vapor-proof material, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Peanut butter, consisting of roasted and ground peanuts, will deteriorate less rapidly after the container is open if it is refrigerated.

## 1972 All-American Horse Sale Sets Eleven Year Record

The 1972 All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale was the biggest in the 11-year history of the venue, according to figures released by Al Rags, President and General Manager of Ruidoso Downs.

The sale, was held in the new All-American Plaza, a sales pavilion located on the track grounds.

Total sales topped out at a record \$2,048,680, far surpassing last year's previous high of \$1,795,775. A total of 256 yearlings passed under the gavel of Auctioneers like Hamilton and Gordon Hammagan. This boiled down to an average price of \$7,908, another sale record.

The previous average high was \$5,647, established last year. The top price of the '72 sale was \$75,000 paid by J. R. Adams of Guymon, Okla., for the unnamed colt by Rocket Bar out of Leocita. The colt was consigned by Joe Kirk Fulton, of Lubbock, Texas.

A Go Man Go colt, out of Nippy Bars, drew the second top price of \$55,000 from James and Evelyn Meredith of Inkster, Mich. Blairwood Farms was the consignor.

The third top price was paid for another Go Man Go colt, this one out of the fine mare, Ruby Charge. The colt, Go Bunny Go, drew a price of \$47,000 from Jeff Carr of Corpus Christi, Texas.

Jeff's Rocket (Rocket Bar-Hank's Dial Doll) was taken by Bees Fish of Houston, Texas submitted a successful bid of \$44,000 for an unnamed filly by Go Man Go out of Jagalena.

Rocket Rebel, a roan colt (Rocket Bar-Topo) was picked up by Agent Don Jones for \$36,000. Tripoli Jet, a Jet Deck colt out of Baralita, was taken by Rancho Jamal of Jamal, Calif., for \$32,000.

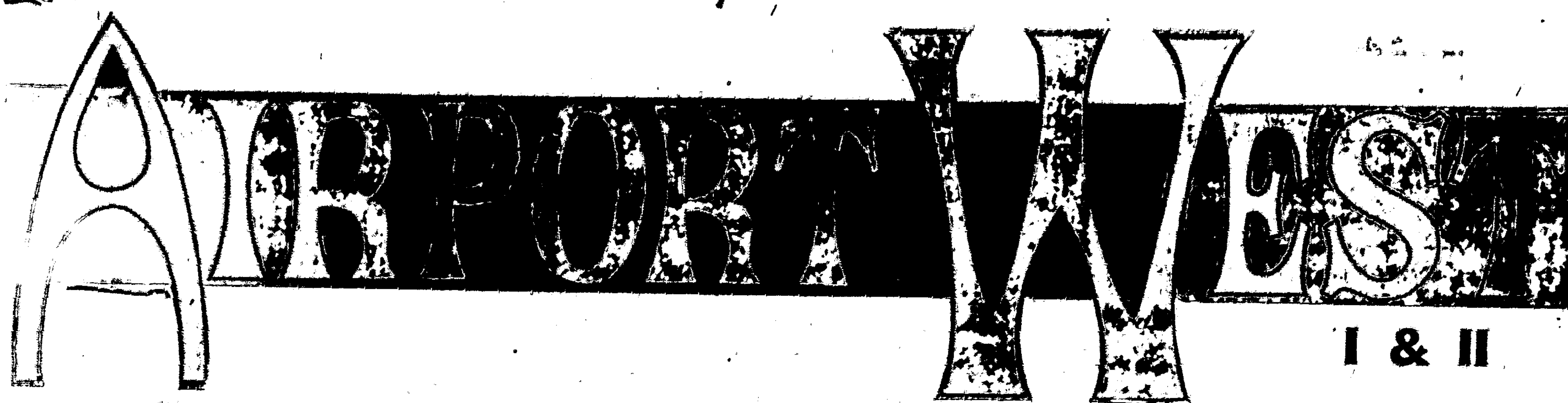

## Local Criminal Justice Committee Holds First Meeting

Ruidoso's Local Criminal Justice Committee held its first official meeting Thursday, Sept. 7, in the Council Chambers of the Ruidoso Municipal Building and elected Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens, Jr., as chairman of the nine-member committee.

The purpose of Thursday's meeting, according to Chief Lukens, was to formulate projects, objectives and goals that will promote and maintain a continuing updating program for the Ruidoso Police Department.

The committee agreed that one of the primary goals was to assist in the establishment of a new criminal investigation department within the Ruidoso Police Department. Cost estimates regarding manpower and a mobile crime lab were discussed and when finalized will be presented to the Ruidoso governing body for their consideration when they prepare the 1973 municipal budget.

In addition, in accordance with one of the primary functions of the local committee, Chief Lukens stated that the committee will work in conjunction with the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, a federally sponsored program administered through the state. The Local Criminal Justice Committee will assist the local police department in applying for LEAA grants available for specific law enforcement needs in municipalities.

The test consists of a variety of aptitude and achievement items which in various combinations are designed to predict success for the student in a number of skilled trades and technical occupations.
