Hospital Is Under PHC....

The Presbyterian Hospital Center, Albuquerque, through their official Board of Directors, assumed complete policy, management and operational control of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital last week.

The action comes as the result of the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Hospital unanimously accepting a proposal from the Board of Directors of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital and the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners to lease the local hospital for ten years.

Ray Woodham, Executive director for PHC, announced this week while in Ruidoso, the benefits to be derived from the agreement are expected to be principally in the maintenance of the quality of health services for people in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley area.

In addition he stated a hospital advisory board, to include area residents, will be appointed in Ruidoso in the future to provide representation and counsel from the residents of the Ruidoso area.

Woodham also stated that PHC has just recently secured sufficient financing for construction of patient facilities for twelve additional beds and a casting room as requested by the local medical staff. Estimated cost of the new twelve bed facilities has been set at around \$80,000. The Executive Director remarked that the only delay to PHC's immediate construction of the new facilities will be in the engineering and architects' drafting of the construction specifications.

It was also announced this week that Felix d'Entremont, local hospital administrator for a number of years had resigned but would serve as a consultant for PHC. Woodham stated that no additional personnel changes were anticipated at the present and that from all indications PHC was pleased with the overall staff at the local hospital.

Roland Walsh, PHC's Hospital Administrator of the Artesia General Hospital, it was announced, will serve as Acting Hospital Administrator for the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital.

James W. Hall, President of the Presbyterian Hospital Center Board of Directors, recently emphasized that Presbyterian will "continue the excellent activities of the Ruidoso Board of Directors, the Medical Staff, the Auxiliary, and individual citizens of the area who have made the health care facility possible." Hall continued, "Presbyterian Hospital Center looks forward to cooperating with them in the further expansion of these efforts."

Presbyterian Hospital Center, the largest private hospital in New Mexico, currently operates the Anna Kaseman Hospital in northeast Albuquerque, the Belen General Hospital, Belen, and the Artesia General Hospital in Artesia, in addition to the 400-bed main unit in Albuquerque.

Added to the highly medically recognized Presbyterian Hospital Center, the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital will basically remain a county-owned hospital with all present physical properties and equipment of a permanent nature belonging to the county.

Regional Sewer Plan Discussed In Joint Meet

A proposed 15 million dollar regional sewer plant facility designed to serve both Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs was discussed Thursday night, Nov. 3, during a special joint meeting with officials of both villages, project engineers and representatives of the New Mexico State Environmental Improvement Agency, Santa Fe.

Quinten Daniel, Alamogordo, chief project engineer for the Village of Ruidoso Downs and principal speaker for the discussion, informed the officials that the proposed regional sewer facility was engineered to accommodate a twenty-year anticipated growth in the Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs area.

Daniel stated that the proposed plant would be a joint venture that would benefit both villages with each village sharing their proportionate cost of the construction and installation of the sewer plant and sewer plant land acquisition.

Louis Gray, Engineer for the New Mexico State Environmental Improvement Agency, Santa Fe, advised those attending the meeting that both "villages have an obligation to meet state and federal health regulations." He continued that based on past growth patterns and future growth expectations the area insists that installation, enlargement and updating of sewer facilities is an absolute must.

Gray stated that when two villages are contiguous, as in the case of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, state and federal agencies push and urge for a regional sewer facility because it is normally the most economical and environmentally safe method of sewage disposal.

He also reminded the officials that in his opinion it would be very difficult for Ruidoso to receive or secure any state or federal financial grants for enlargement of their present sewer facility or for Ruidoso Downs to put in a system without considering Ruidoso when the Federal Environmental Protection Agency insists on the regional sewer concept.

In reference to the financial assistance available for the two villages Daniel stated that federal participation, in the form of a grant, would be 55% of the total cost.

The Ruidoso council voted to instruct Ruidoso Village Attorney John Thompson to draft a resolution regarding Ruidoso's intent to participate in the project on an equitable basis.

Ruidosoan Shot

A Ruidoso bartender, thirty-one year old Fermin Chavez, reportedly underwent surgery Wednesday morning in an El Paso, Texas hospital and remains in critical to serious condition. Chavez was wounded by a 22 calibre rifle shot Saturday afternoon, Nov. 4, while he was standing in front of a Ruidoso lounge.

Charged with the reported shooting is Gregg Guffey, 24, Las Cruces. Guffey was arrested Sunday morning, Nov. 5, in Ruidoso Magistrate Court and charged with aggravated battery on the person of Fermin Chavez. The charge was authorized by Lincoln-Otero Counties District Attorney Norman D. Bloom, Jr., Alamogordo.

Presiding Magistrate Judge Austin A. Pritchett set Guffey's bail bond at \$10,000 and ordered him held in custody of the Lincoln County Sheriff pending the outcome of his preliminary hearing or posting of bond.

The shooting suspect, who pled not guilty during his arraignment, was released Monday afternoon by the Lincoln County Sheriff Department after posting a \$20,000 property bond. The date for Guffey's preliminary hearing has not been announced.

Area law enforcement officers, including Ruidoso Police, Lincoln County Sheriff Deputies and New Mexico State Police units, combed the area for Guffey Saturday afternoon and shortly before 8:30 p.m. an all points bulletin for his arrest was sent to all state and regional law enforcement agencies.

The warrant for his arrest was issued by Magistrate Judge Pritchett and authorized by District Attorney Bloom.

Around midnight, Saturday, the Ruidoso Police dispatcher received a telephone call that Guffey was going to surrender himself to the Ruidoso Police and just shortly after midnight he walked into the Ruidoso Police Department and voluntarily surrendered.

A second man, Jay Beasley, 36, Ruidoso, and also suspected to have been involved in the shooting incident, was apprehended by New Mexico State Police units, stationed in Ruidoso, around one hour after the shooting and about two miles

from the scene while driving Guffey's pickup truck.

Beasley was charged with Aggravated Battery on the person of Fermin Chavez by reason of accessory and held in the Ruidoso jail until his arraignment Sunday morning. Prior to the official arraignment District Attorney Bloom dropped the charges and requested he be released from custody.

Chavez was first rushed, around 1:45 p.m. Saturday, to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital by a Ruidoso Chapel of Roses ambulance for emergency treatment. Apparently because of extensive bleeding, blood was ordered relayed from El Paso to Ruidoso via the New Mexico State Police and then later cancelled and the shooting victim was flown to an El Paso hospital about 5:00 p.m. Saturday.

Criminal investigation of the shooting incident is under the direction of Ruidoso Police Department Corporal Bobby Bradley.

VEGA SECOND TO NIXON—

GOP Landslide

In traditional style, reportedly as in every presidential election since New Mexico became a state, Lincoln County voters have also elected the nation's choice for the presidency—Hence, as Lincoln County goes—so goes the nation.

Tuesday's General election was no different as President Richard Nixon's bid for reelection won an overwhelming victory in Lincoln County over his nearest opponent, Democrat George McGovern, as was also the case throughout the nation.

In addition, 3,388 or 78 percent of the official 4,297 registered voters in Lincoln County, reportedly a record number, pushed for the election of six Republican candidates of a total of eight for elective positions in Lincoln County.

On the county level only, Ruidoso's Bill Hart, County Commissioner, District 2, and Carrizozo's Austin Wooten, County Probate Judge, both Democrats, were able to overcome the county-wide Republican Party landslide victory.

U. S. House of Representatives, N. M. District 2, Harold Runnels, seeking a bid for reelection, was the only other Democrat candidate elected by the voters on the entire slate of twenty-one elective positions, excluding four positions on the ballot held unopposed by Democrat candidates.

Second only to President Nixon's mountainous vote margin over McGovern in Lincoln County was Lincoln County Sheriff Republican candidate, Leandro Vega, Jr., Carrizozo. President Nixon polled 2,528 votes or 1,832 over McGovern and Vega rallied 2,088 votes or 1,009 votes over his Democrat opponent Concepcion A. Morales, also of Carrizozo.

Other candidates in Lincoln County's official election results who tallied vote margins of 800 votes or more over their opponents were incumbent Mable Vigil, Carrizozo, county treasurer over Amelia Jenkins, Capitlan, by 857 votes; Pete Domenici, U. S. Senate, over Jack Daniels, N. M. District 2, over George Presson by 808 votes.

Lincoln County voters also approved the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital and Lincoln County Municipal Levy,

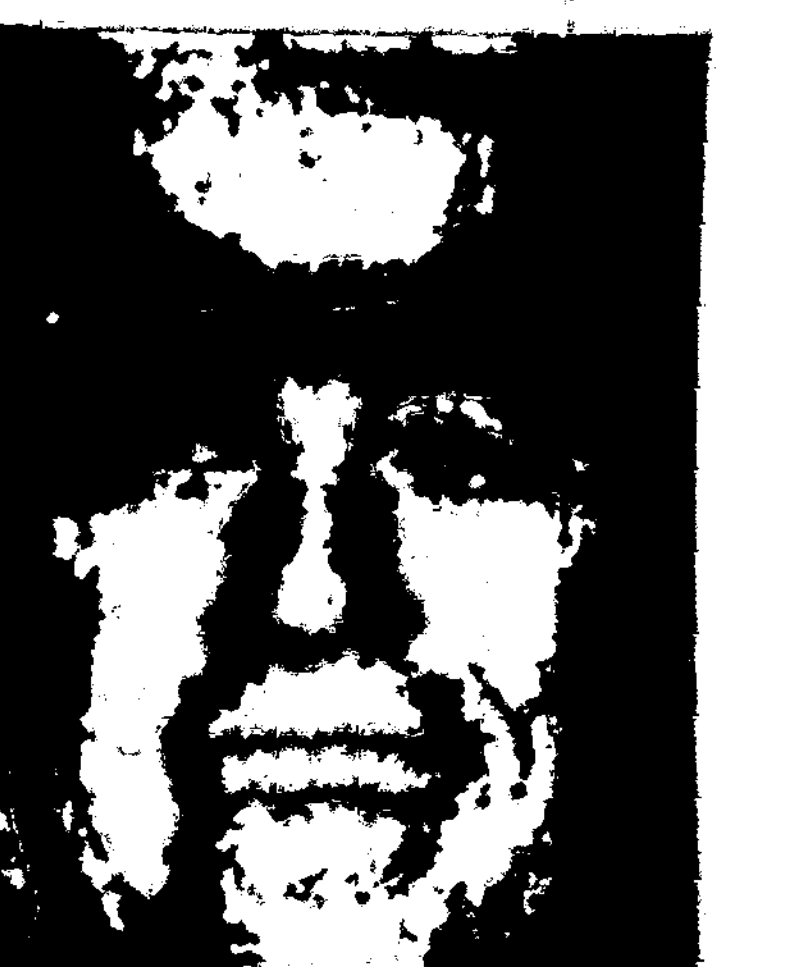

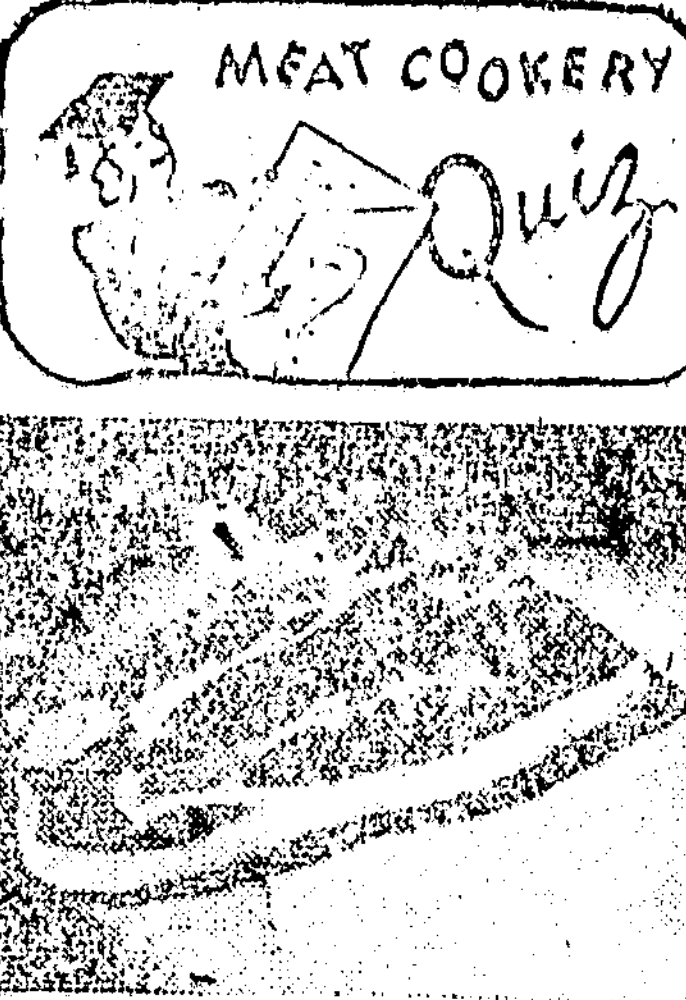

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

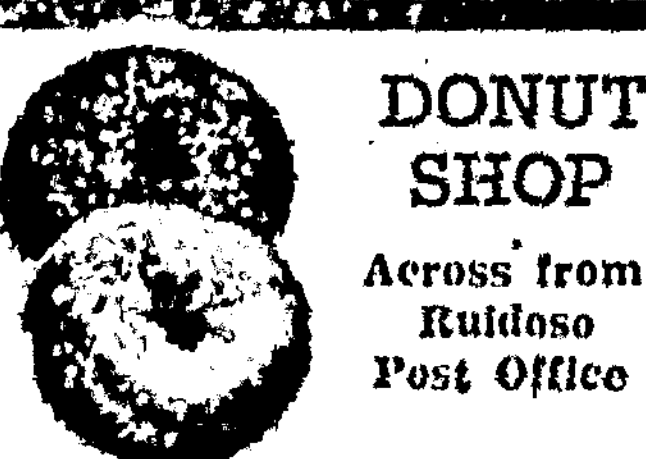
A. Beef Blade Steak.

Q. How is it identified?

A. Cut from the beef chuck, this steak contains portions of the blade bone and backbone, and may include small pieces of rib bone. The lean is composed of the same muscles found in the blade pot-roast.

Q. How is it prepared?

A. By braising or broiling indoors or out. For broiling it is best to have steak cut thin and to marinate it, for these are less tender than steaks cut from the loin or sirloin. To broil, place marinated steak on grill or on broiler rack 4 to 5 inches from heat. Broil at moderate temperature for 7 to 10 minutes on each side, depending on doneness desired (rare or medium). To braise, brown the steaks, add seasonings and a small amount of liquid, cover and cook slowly until tender (1 to 1½ hours for 4 to 1-inch steaks; 1½ to 2½ hours for 1½ to 2-inch steaks).

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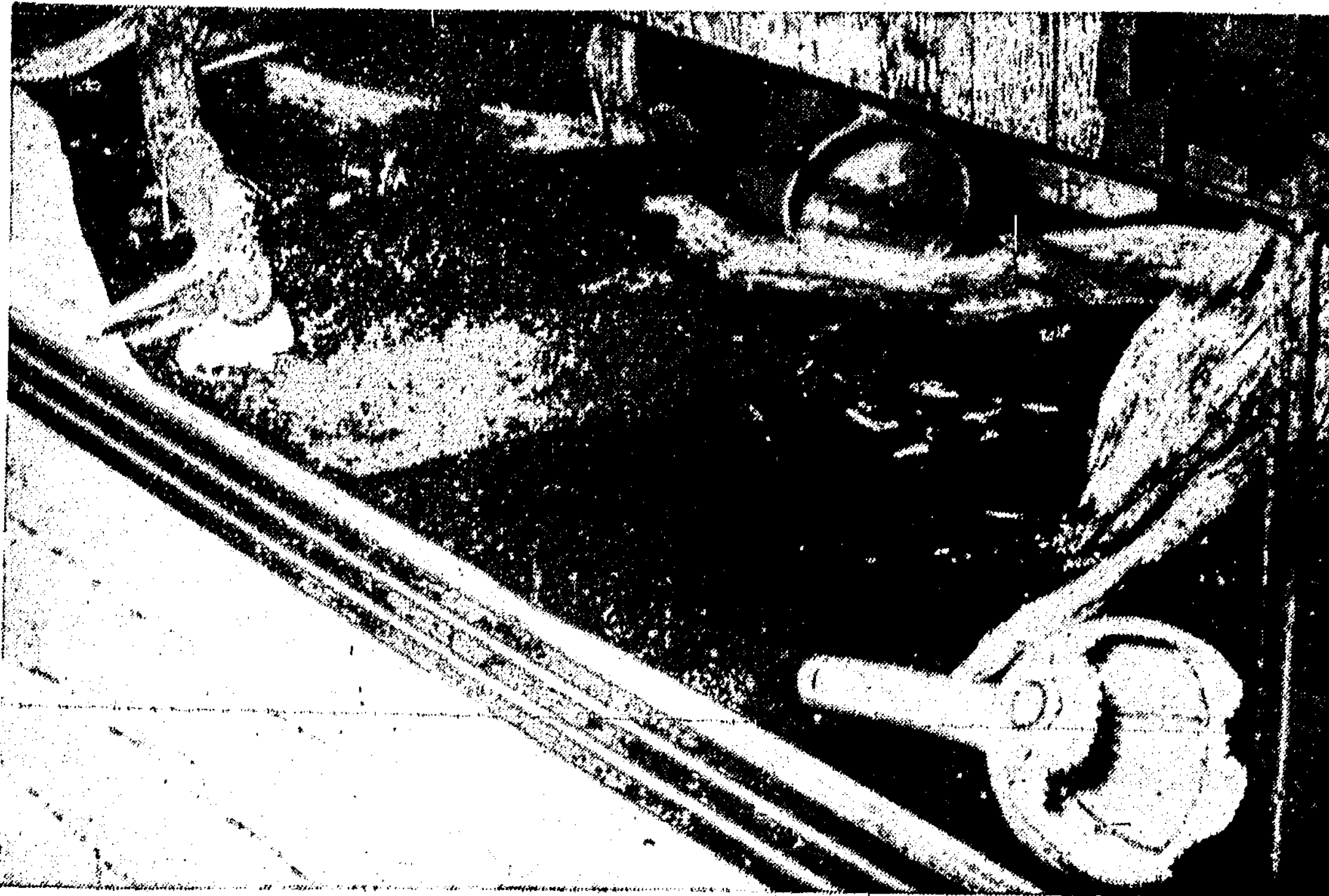
Held In Roswell

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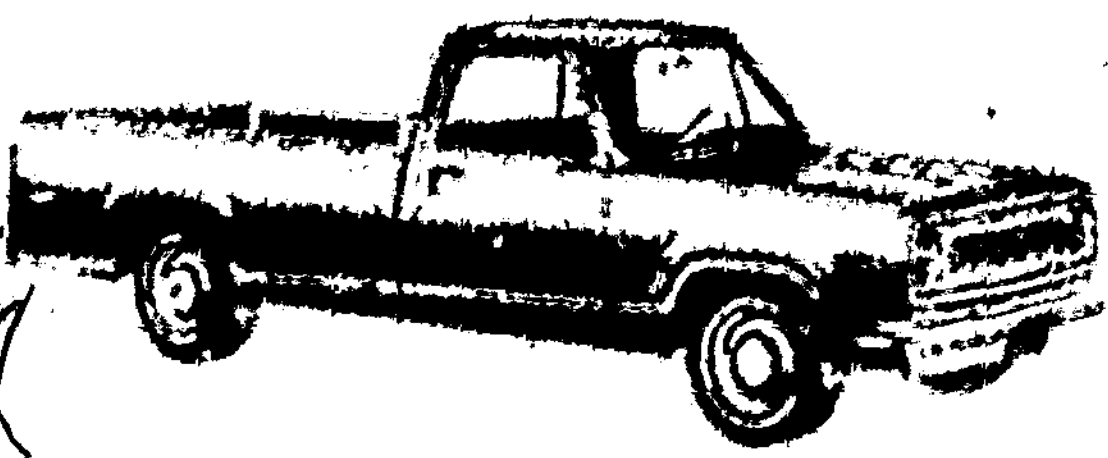
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4-H Awards Program Slated Nov. 12

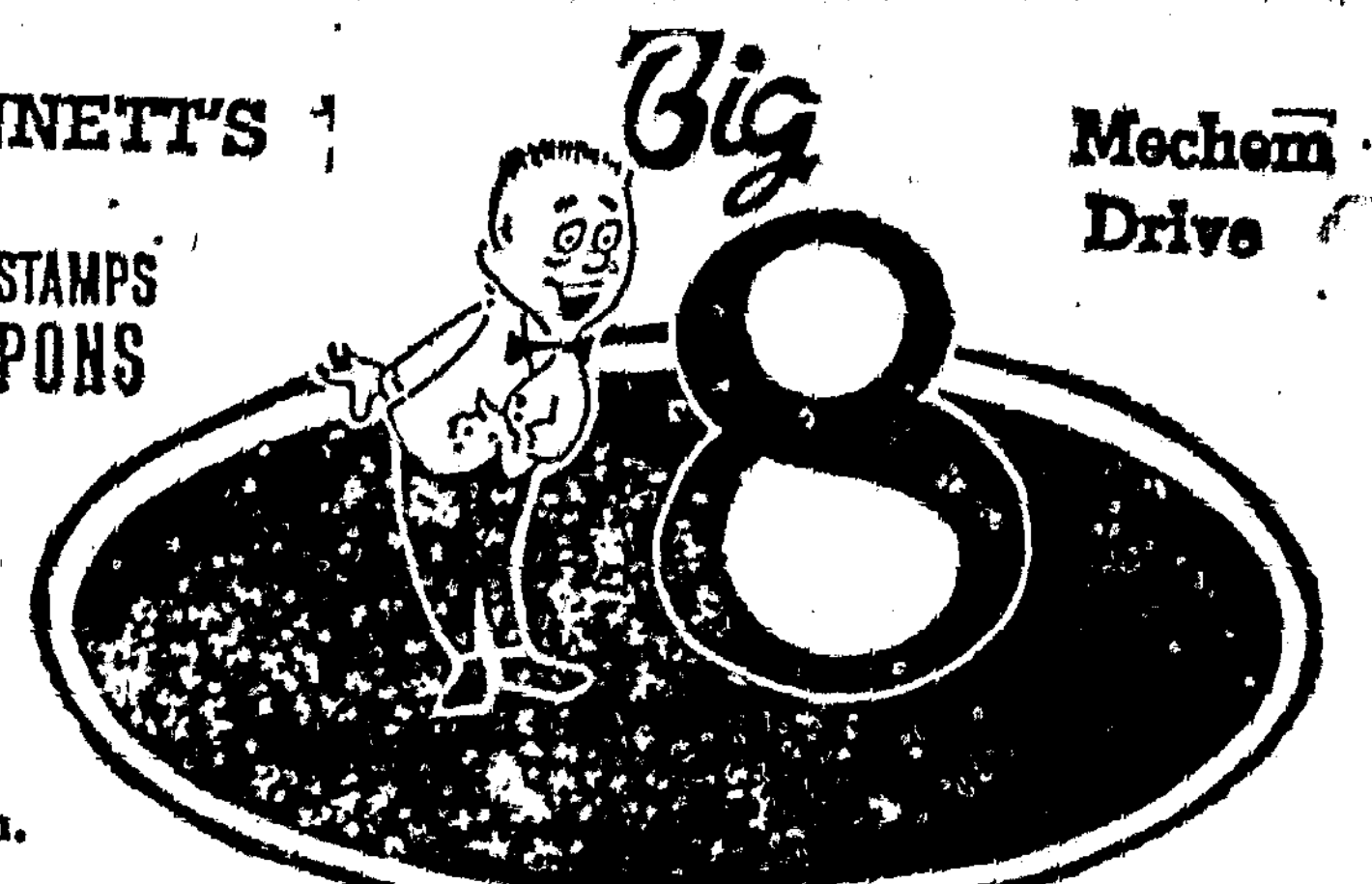

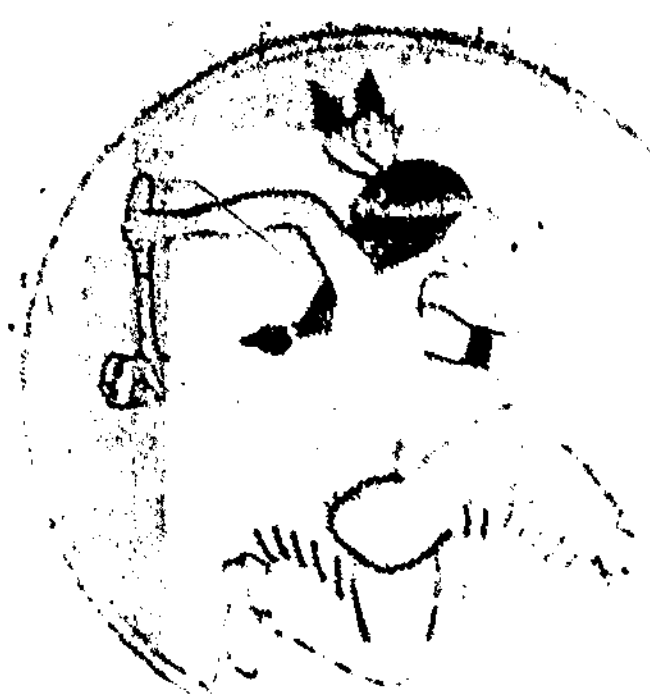

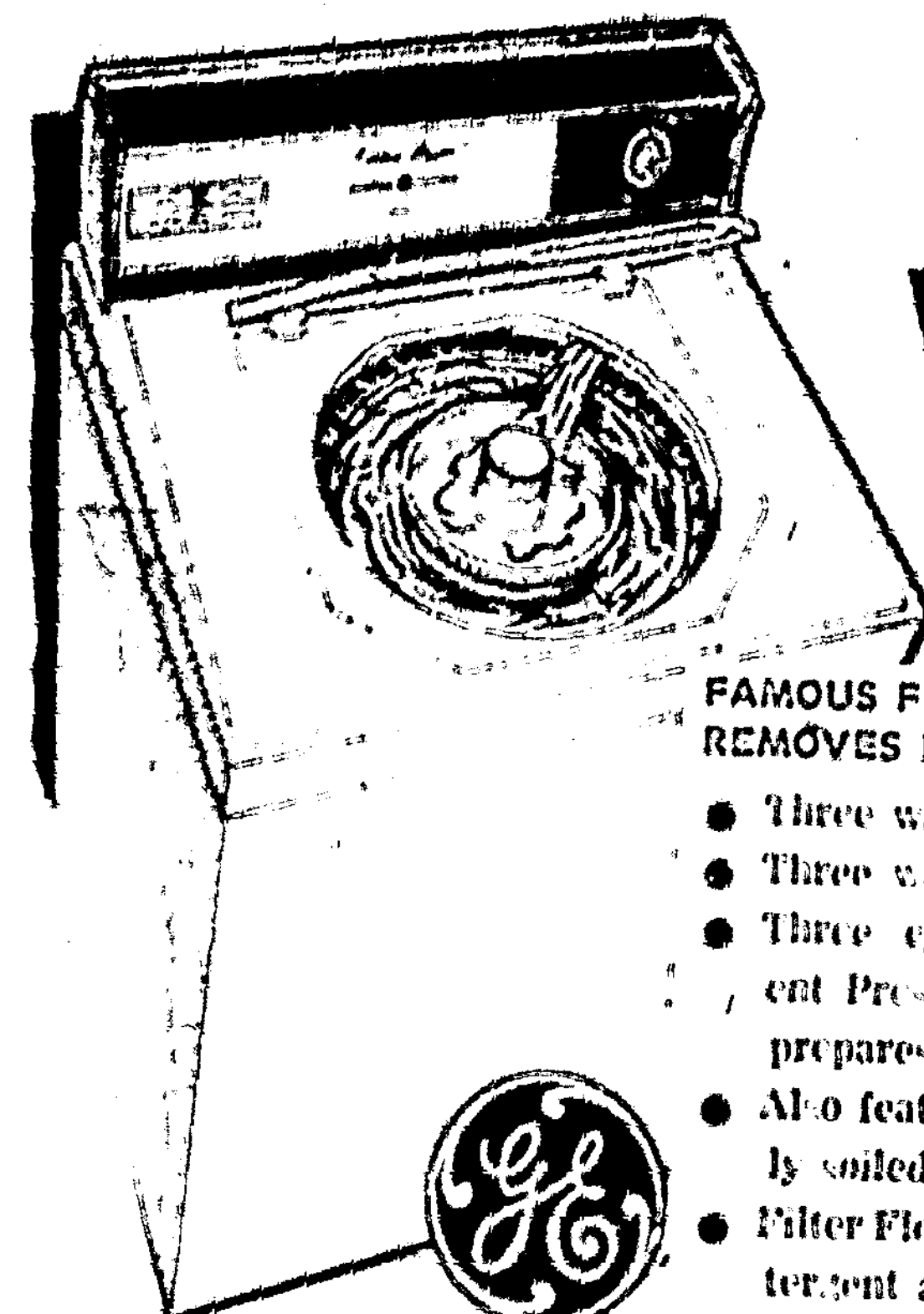

"Crisis Line" Discussed At Meet Held Wednesday at Nob Hill School

According to several very responsible citizens of the Village of Ruidoso, an estimated 75% of the youths of the community have either tried drugs or are now using them. This fact emerged at a special meeting Wednesday evening at the Nob Hill School when a group of concerned residents met to discuss the possibility of a "Crisis Line", not only for our youth to use, but also for anyone in the community to use in time of crisis.

A very successful program of this type has been in operation in Las Cruces for about seven years according to Bob Bell, a representative of the Southwest Mental Health Center there. Bell noted that the center was interested in helping not only mental illness but also with alcohol and drug problems and with counseling for those wishing their services. The Las Cruces center covers about one-third of the state and maintains a staff of 50 for con-

The Ruidoso group expressed much interest in the "Crisis Line" and Bell explained the operation of such a program. Listeners would be maintained on an evening schedule to receive calls from anyone with a problem — from drugs to family problems — with the listeners. The center would train volunteer listeners to prepare them for various problems and compile a list of experts to whom the caller could be referred if necessary. Grants are available for the project but would probably require 6 to 9 months to acquire.

Below this article is a questionnaire for local residents to submit to the group if they feel that such a program is needed in Ruidoso. 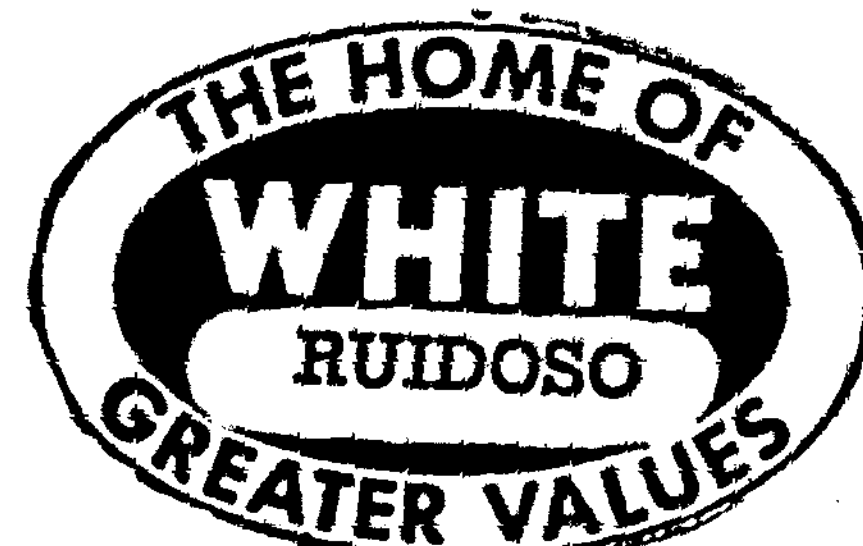

Dick Underwood, fullback for the Warriors, punched his way down to the Tiger 17 yard line but lost the handle on the ball. Alert play on the part of big "Bunker" Perryman kept the drive alive as he pounced on the ball at the 10-yard line of the Tigers. From there Miller threw his second TD pass of the night as he hit Mel Patton in the end zone. Miller also added the 2-point running play to up the score to 14-6.

Ruidoso tacked on 12 more points in the second quarter with Underwood blasting his way 23 yards for his first touchdown of the night. Reeves McGuire gathered in a Blane Miller pass that was good for 36 yards, carrying from the Tiger 39 yard line down to the T. or C. 3-yard stripe. From there Miller tallied for the Warriors, increasing their lead 20-6.

Dick Underwood crossed the double stripe in the third quarter for his second touchdown of the evening from 9-yards out. Skarda added his 6-points in the third quarter as he hit in from 3 yards out.

The most electrifying run of the night was turned in by Craig Horton, Ruidoso halfback, late in the fourth quarter. With a sprinkling of reserves, and Dick Underwood, fullback turning quarterback, at the helm, Horton took the hand-off on a quick hitter through the right side of the line and raced into the end zone, 75 yards away. Ruidoso's defensive unit played a sterling game throughout the contest. Led by Perryman, Baur, Mellon and Harlan Butts.

In addition to official ratification of Farm Bureau policy, members of the State Board of Directors from District II — Curry, DeBaca, Quay and Roosevelt counties; and District IV — Dona Ana, Grant, Hidalgo, Luna, Otero and Sierra counties; will be elected.

Also up for election are the positions of president, two vice-presidents and the State Women's Committee District Chairwomen.

Also on the agenda are official annual meetings of the Farm Bureau affiliated companies.

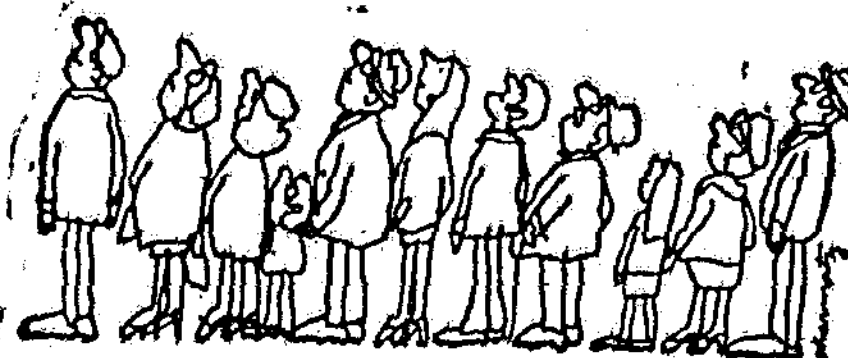

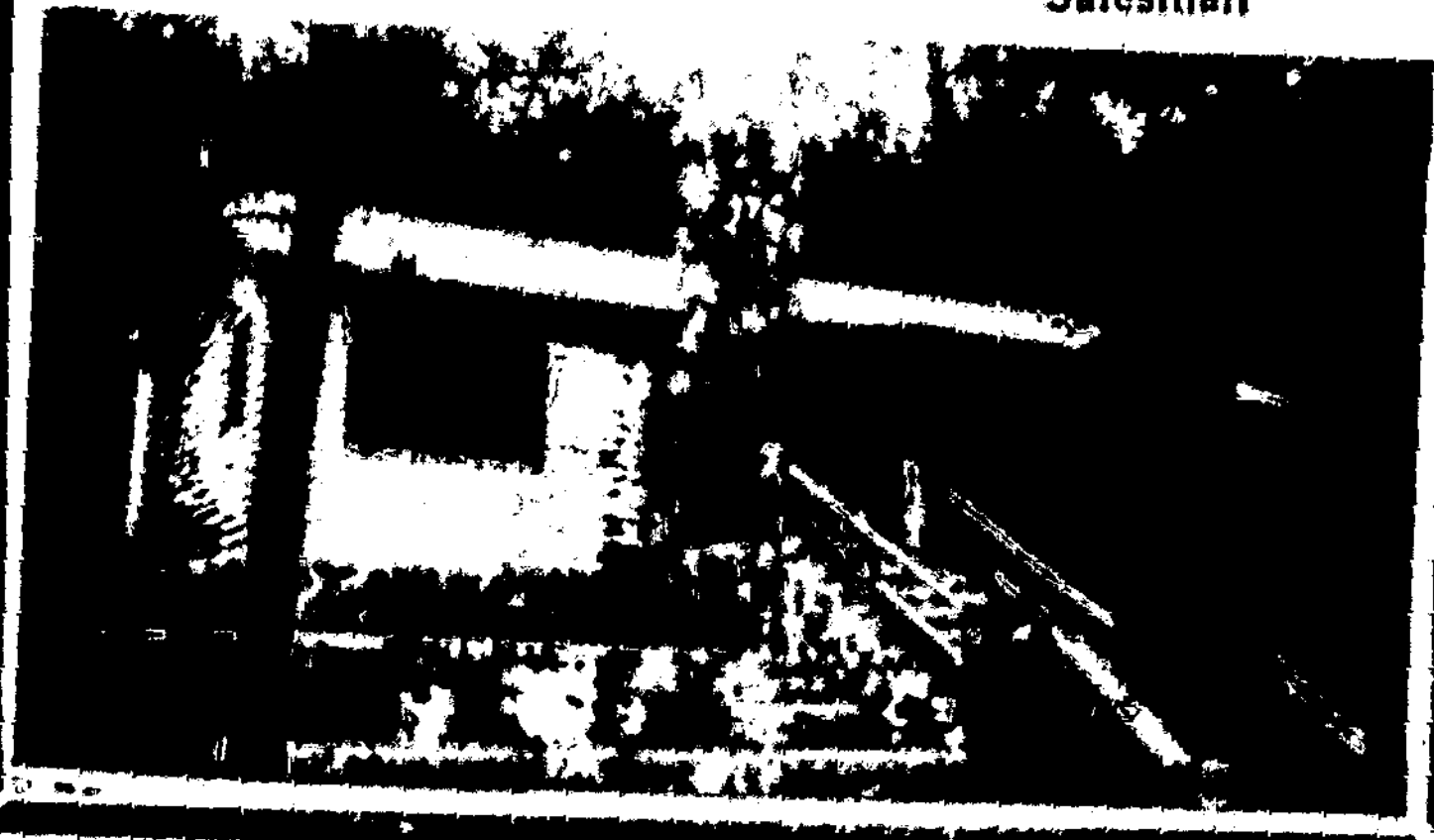

SOCIAL SECURITY

People tend to underestimate the monthly benefits social security can pay. According to a recent survey, only one person in 25 gave the correct answer to this question: "Let's take a man 35 years old, with a wife and two young children and average earnings of about \$500 a month. If he became disabled and couldn't work any more, about

how much do you think he and his family would get from social security? Or if he died, how much do you think his wife and children would get? (Just a rough guess)."

The question was put to a sampling of people 18 and over across the Nation. Including the 20% increase due on the Oct. 3 checks, the correct answer is about \$500 a month, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative.

"But three out of four people guessed the social security payments would be \$350 a month or less," Mrs. Graves said. "More than half guessed \$250 or less. One out of four guessed \$150 or less."

A new free leaflet, "Higher Social Security Payments" is available from any social security office. It gives examples of benefits payable under the new rates which started on Oct. 3, and may be secured by contacting any social security office.

A man with a questionable character had a bunch of boys that he brought over here and had out so they would not have to go to war. This was told to me years ago, by a news man who was supposed to know.

Undoubtedly Chisum was classed along with King, Goodnight, Wagner, Slaughter and the Lazy S and others I fail to recall. These men with their dreams are to be long remembered.

I am also reading: Elbert Hubbard's Scrap Book. I judge by his collections from noted writers, he was a lover of nature, virtue and peace. I believe he hated war above all else, from his vast selections opposing it; even before he died in 1915. What would he (not) say if he were living today?

I once read: if you could enter a man's library and see his books you could tell what kind of person he is.

It is hard to choose one outstanding quotation, but I believe I like Keat's 'Last Sonnet', Voltaire, Beecher, Mary Baker Eddy, Lillet and Channing's: 'God be thanked for books, they are the voices of the distant and the dead, and make us heirs to the spiritual life of past ages. Emerson and Tennyson are also my favorites. 'Trees' by Joyce Kilmer is lovely, along with 'To the Preacher' by Charlotte Gilman. I just simply lose myself in a book of this kind.

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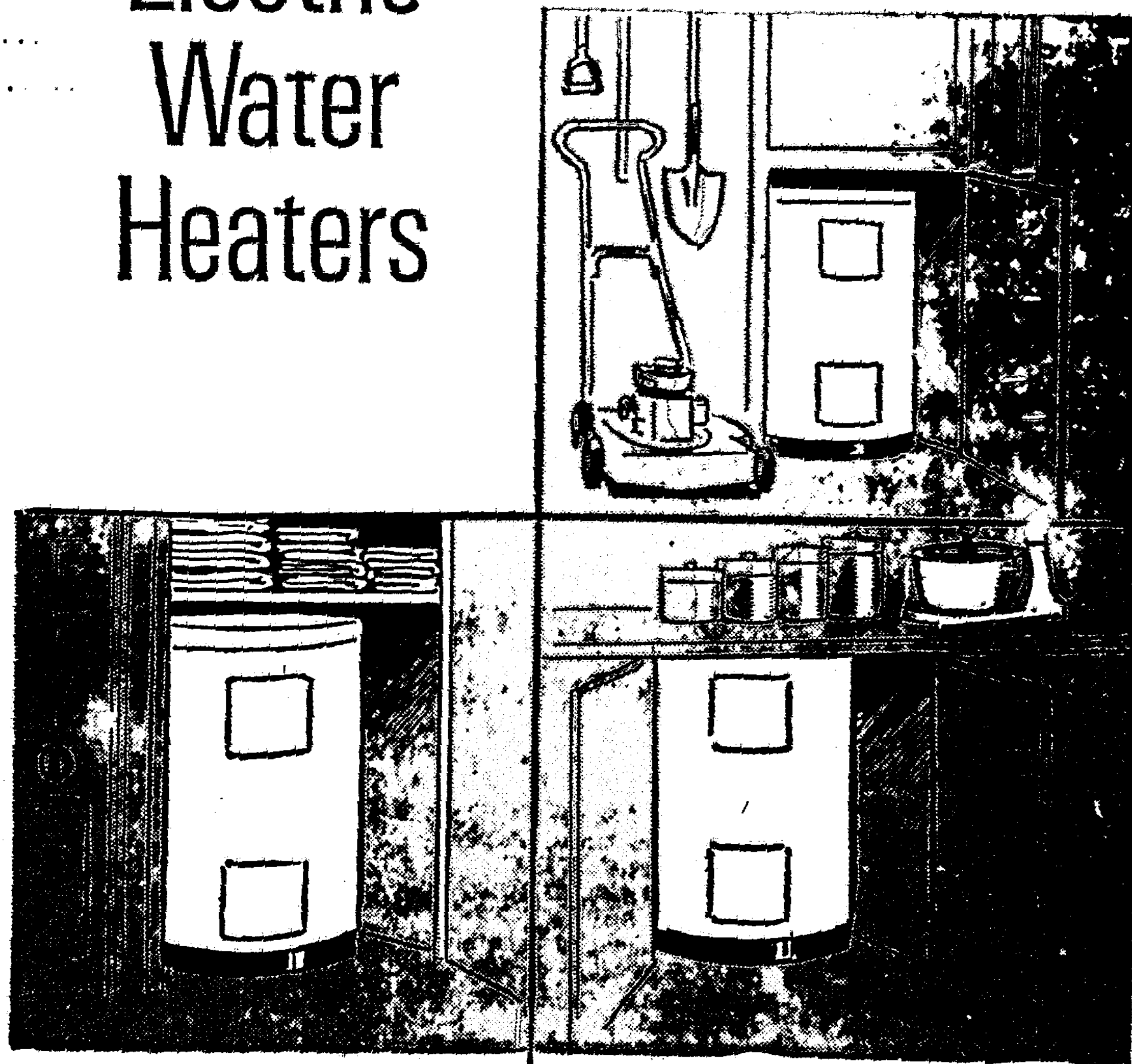

Ethylene dichloride is available in borer control solutions under a variety of trade names. Solutions that contain lindane and other insecticides are effective when painted or sprayed on the bark in the summer, but they are of no use in the fall. Using fumigants around peach trees is a delicate operation and should be done with care and precision. Over-treatment can damage the tree.

Before applying PDB crystals or ethylene dichloride, the area around the tree must be cleaned and the soil smoothed. Apply the fumigants in a continuous ring around the tree and one inch from the trunk. The crystals should not contact the bark. Cover the ring of crystals by mounding dirt firmly over them and up to six or eight inches on the trunk. Remove the mound in four to six weeks.

The amount of PDB to use is determined by the age of the trees. Two-to-three-year olds require one-half ounce, four-to-five-year olds, three-fourths of an ounce, and six-year old trees take one ounce. Weigh the crystals and do not use more than is recommended. Trees with a trunk diameter of 10 inches or more should be treated with two ounces. Too much PDB can injure the tree. Follow the manufacturers' directions when using ethylene dichloride.

Every home should have at least one fire extinguisher on each floor, with an extra one in the kitchen that should be especially effective on grease fires. Everyone in the family should learn the proper use of fire extinguishers and every home should have a fire drill once a week to instruct the children what to do in case of fire.

Fires in industry are not as damaging as they used to be, mostly because industry has equipped itself and trained its workers to avoid fires, or overcome them quickly if started.

Most homes, however, have no fire extinguishers and families are not familiar with their use. Here are some suggested precautions to avoid home fire hazards:

Make sure all electrical appliances are in good order. Make sure your wiring is in good repair; have it checked at the first sign of trouble.

Keep matches where children can't get at them; and teach children their proper use and danger.

Check your furnace, all heating equipment, ducts, etc. If you have air conditioning, include that in the check.

Be sure that your flammable materials, cleaning fluid, etc. are properly stored, out of the reach of the children.

Don't let rags, paper, or other combustible materials pile up.

Know what furnishings in your home are flammable, and try to keep these to a minimum by using fireproof or fire-resistant materials.

And always use caution.

Christmas Tree Cutting Begins Nov. 13

As early snows bring thoughts of Christmas, Forest Supervisor Kenneth Evans today announced plans for the Lincoln National Forest's annual Christmas tree program.

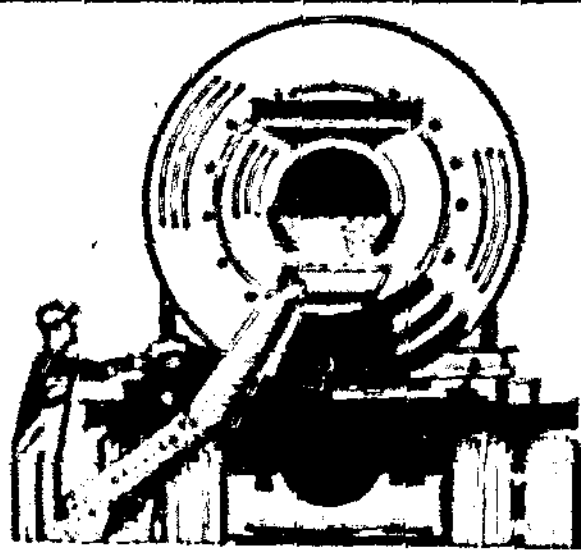
Starting Nov. 13, permits for personal use Christmas trees will be available on weekdays at all five of the Lincoln National Forest's Ranger Stations. Sales hours will be 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Evans noted sales are limited to one tree per person and individuals must purchase a red permit before any tree is cut. Maps showing permitted cutting areas will be furnished at each Ranger Station.

Permit price is \$1.00 for a tree up to 10 feet tall. All persons desiring more than one tree should plan to bid on commercial blocks to be sold Nov. 8. Information on commercial blocks is available at the Forest Supervisor's office in Alamogordo, telephone (505) 437-6030.

Weekend visitors will find only the Clouderoff and Ruidoso Ranger Stations open Dec. 9-10 and Dec. 16-17 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Offices will not be open on Thanksgiving Day. "We believe this popular program will be run smoother than ever this year," Evans said. "We ask anyone planning to cut a tree to observe the one tree limit, the permitted locations, and the sales dates. Some areas will have very limited numbers of certain kinds of trees, and visitors should find out if trees are still available before beginning a long trip."

Evans noted that the Christmas tree outing has become a favorite annual event, but the fun can quickly sour if visitors enter the highly country unprepared. He mentioned some helpful suggestions for tree cutters:

1. Be prepared for a long walk.
2. Carry plenty of warm clothing and good boots.
3. Start early, no later than 1:00 p.m., so that darkness doesn't catch up with you in the woods.

Picketing Private Home
Henry's plan to open a tavern in a suburban neighborhood raised the hackles of nearby residents. One afternoon, several men showed up at his house with protest signs and began to picket.

Equally incensed, Henry went to court for an injunction against this "intrusion into my private life." At the hearing, the picketers insisted they were merely exercising their right of free speech.

But the court sided with Henry and issued an injunction. "The home is a retreat from outside affairs," said the judge. "When the right of free speech is weighed against the right to privacy, the balance favors the privacy of the home."

Courts generally have concurred in placing a high value on the home as a privileged sanctuary from strife.

Nevertheless, residential picketing has sometimes been allowed under special circumstances.

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stances — such as the fact that the occupant of the house is a public official.

Thus, the picketing of a governor's home by a civil rights group was upheld in court. The judge said the picketers "had a legitimate right, protected by the Constitution, to appeal to those in authority for redress."

And the picketing of a landlord's home by disgruntled tenants was sustained on the ground that he had no other known headquarters where they could vent their feelings.

Of course, even if picketing itself is considered lawful, it may still be condemned because of the manner in which it is done.

In another case, the home of a hospital executive was subjected to mass picketing by boisterous marchers. Furthermore, they flaunted signs that were plainly libellous. This time, a court held the picketing unlawful.

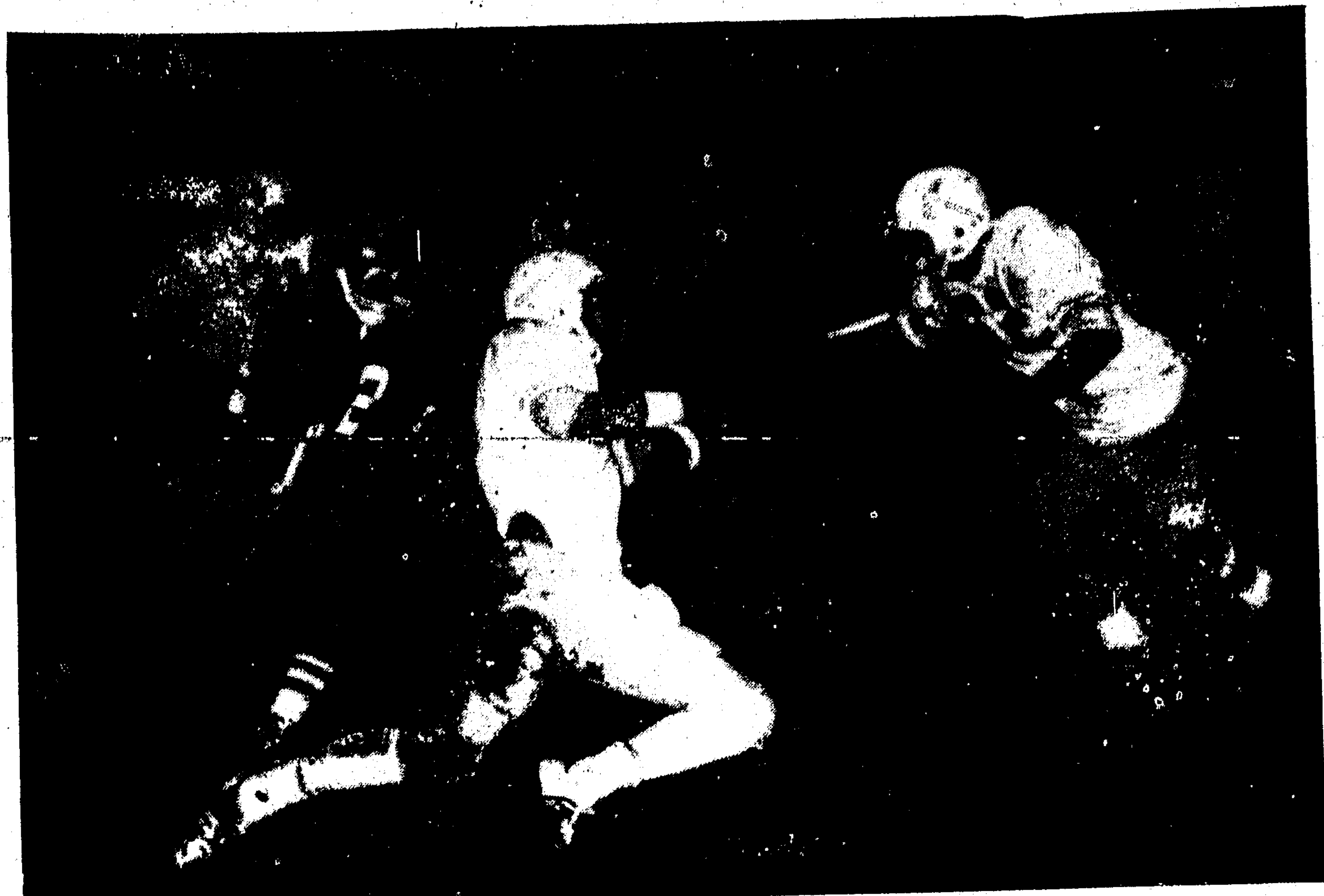

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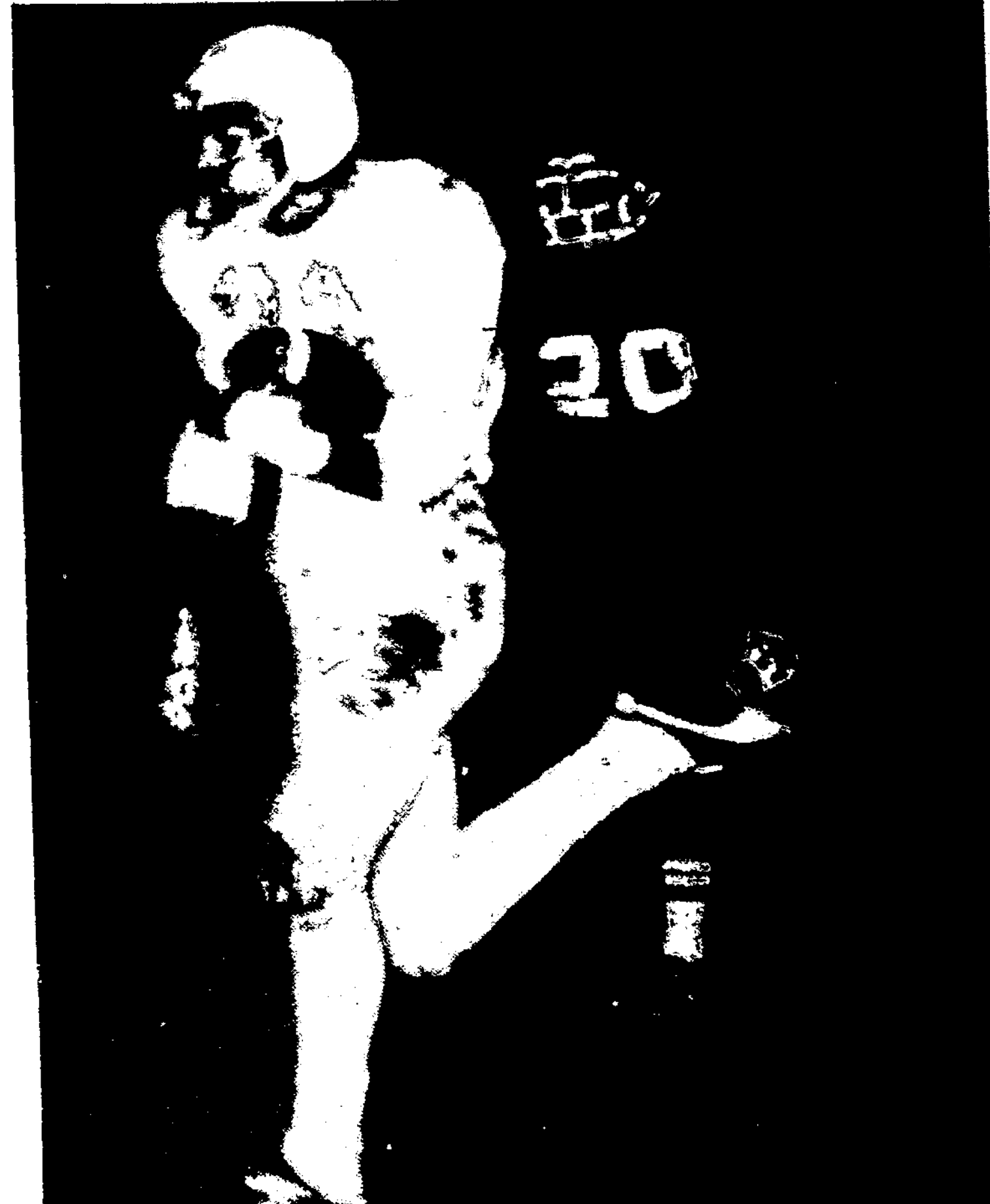

Good Manners Urged County Court Action

Used By Hunters Termed Necessary

Hunters were urged to put on their best manners while hunting on public lands in New Mexico, especially with off-road vehicles.

W. J. Anderson, state director for the Bureau of Land Management, and Ladd Gordon, director of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, observed that 1972 marks the end of the "good old days" for hunters accustomed to driving anywhere they please after game. "A few controls are in effect on state lands this year for off-road machines," the two men said. "Hunters still enjoy almost unlimited freedom to use public lands. But next year, as directed by President Nixon, regulations will control the use of off-road vehicles on all Federal public lands also. The 'good old days' for off-road machines are drawing to a close."

"Hunters have a big stake in the degree of vehicle freedom they will be permitted in the future," Anderson and Gordon said. "Much of the pressure to control off-road machines comes as a result of bad behavior by a small segment of the public," Anderson and Gordon said. "Considerate hunters will not shoot windmills full of bullet holes; harass livestock; litter the countryside; drive vehicles indiscriminately across fragile terrain; cut fences and leave gates open. All of these actions, whether by hunters or others, have to be taken into consideration when rules for off-road vehicle use are being considered."

The officials urged hunters, and others affixed with off-road vehicles, to respect the rights and property of all other users of the public lands. They stressed that cooperation among all users is essential for continued full enjoyment of the lands by hunters as well as all others. "We urge everyone to use common sense and restraint — and to follow five principles of safety and courtesy while on public lands," they said. The rules: observe all hunting regulations; be safety conscious; recognize and preserve the rights of others; do not frighten or harass livestock, or damage property; do not camp within 300 yards of livestock waters; keep and leave clean camps. If asked to leave the public lands by any other user of those

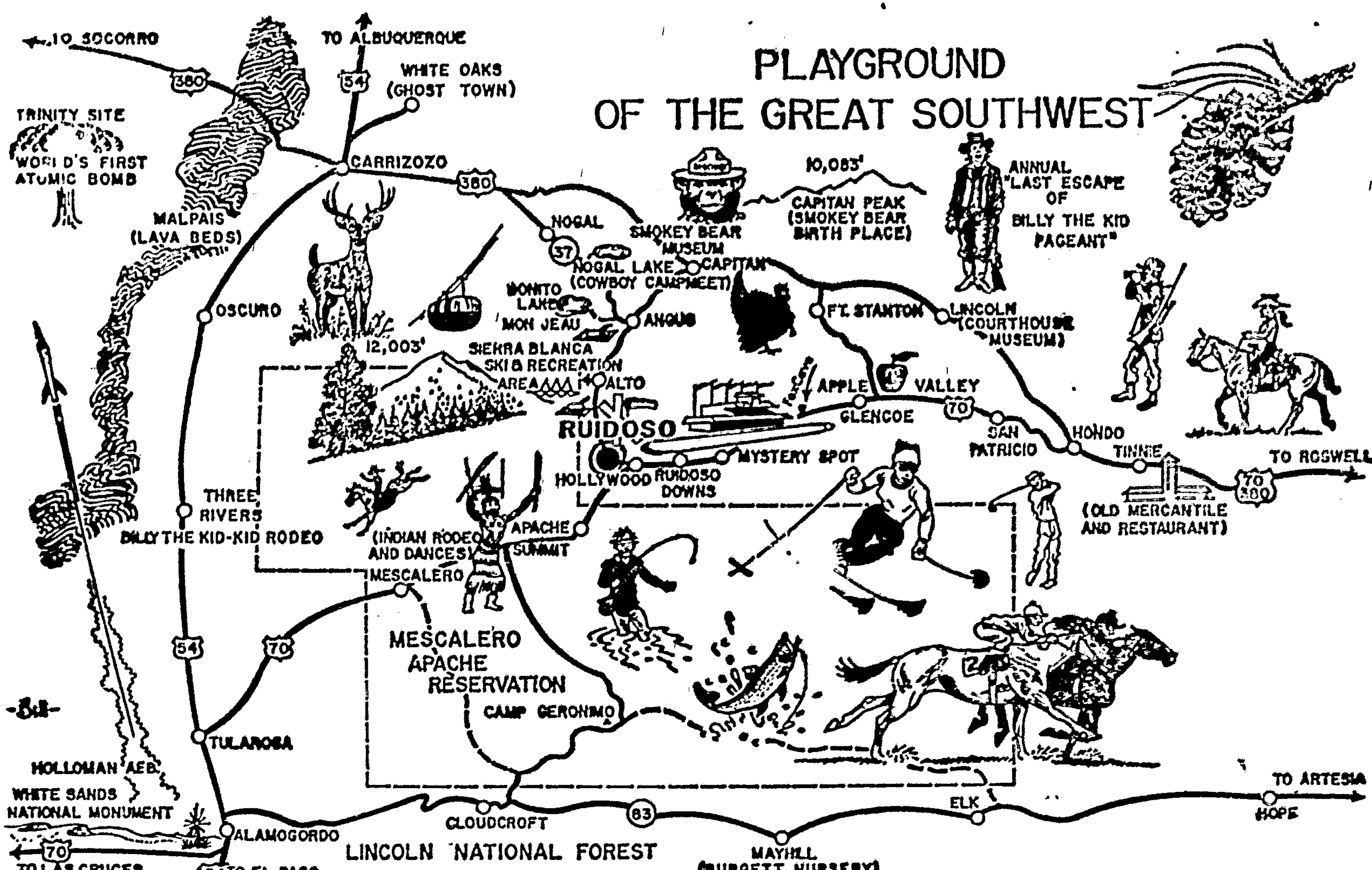

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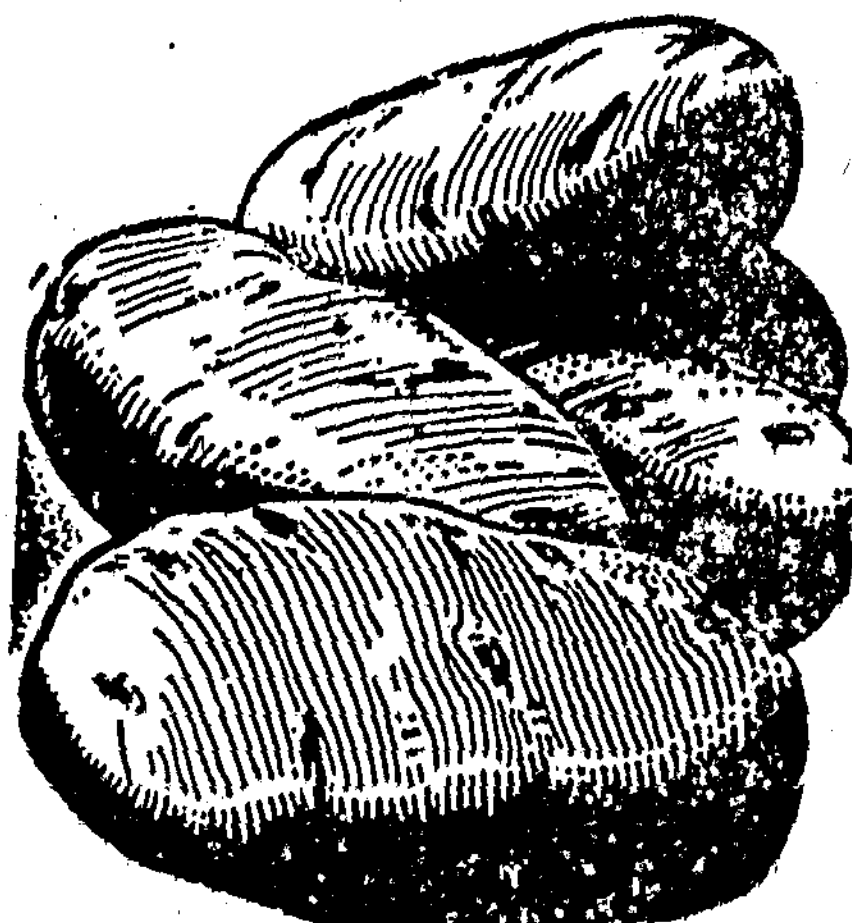
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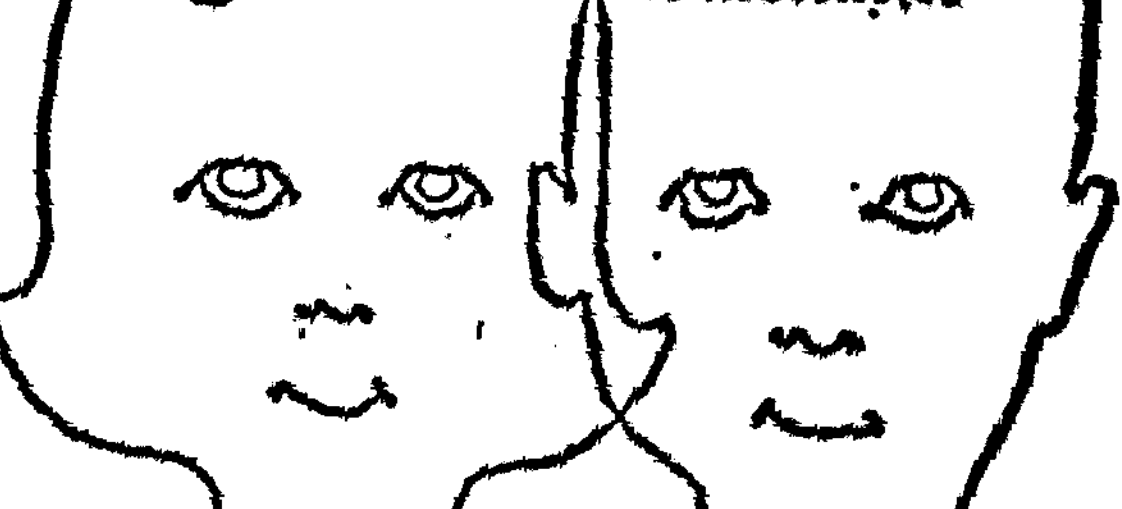
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
