New Mexican or Ruidosoan ... to state, "There is nothing as an American for which I can be thankful."

By the same token, it is equally absurd for

the same above mentioned Americans to suppose that on the fourth Thursday of November of each year, they can, during a single day, muster together and compile and then compute their multitudinous blessings because of their being the great daily benefactors of Americanism in its very highest sense and degree.

Tribe Wins State

How sweet it is! The taste of victory and the knowledge that the Hustling Ruidoso Warriors are THE No. 1 Class AA football team in the state — that is!

Ruidoso grabbed the opening kickoff and never gave up the ball until they had posted the first six points on the scoreboard. On the first play from scrimmage, Kent Skarda raced 27-yards out to the Tribe 47, only to have the play called back because of an off-side against the eager and determined Tribe. On the next play quarterback Blane Miller overthrew his target on a passing try. Skarda then took a pitch-out from Miller and picked up ten of the fifteen yards needed for a first down. Again Ruidoso

was penalized on the next play, bringing up a third down and 10 needed to keep rolling. Ruidoso picked up 14 yards on the next play when Miller hit Dick Underwood, fullback, with another screen which was good down to the Jal 49-yard line. Skarda again got the call and he punched down to the Panther 27-yard line, then carried for a 13-yard pickup. Miller tried another pass which was, too high, bringing up a third down and nine needed. Underwood carried for 8 yards, down to the Jal 17 yard line. With a fourth down and 1, Skarda picked up the necessary yardage for a big first down for the Warriors. On the first down try Miller threw a perfect strike to Mel Patton, 170-pound end, coming across the middle in the end zone for the 6-points. On the extra point try the ball was momentarily fumbled and the kick was blocked by Jal.

Jal took over on their own 37-yard line for their first offensive downs in the ball game, but found the going a little rough against the determined defense set up by the Warriors. After driving down to the Ruidoso 35 yard line and picking up a first down, Jal began to feel the fury of Ruidoso's hard-hitting and great pursuit of the Warriors, and had to punt from Ruidoso's 40-yard line.

Reeves McGuire, all 135 pounds, kept the Warriors out of a heap of trouble on the Jal punt as he let the ball roll toward Ruidoso's end zone, and laid a beautiful block on a Jal defender on about the 2-yard line, keeping him from killing the ball deep in the Warriors' end of the field and giving the ball to Ruidoso on their own 20 yard stripe.

Ruidoso got their second TD of the night in the fourth quarter with 4:18 left on the clock. The pursuing, gang tackling defense of the Warriors really paid off as Dale Cates was hit hard trying to sweep Ruidoso's left side of the line and Ken

Perryman grabbed the ball, jumping it a few yards, right into the hands of Blane Miller who raced into the end zone from 29 yards out. When the extra point try was good, and the tribe led to 12-0 for a 12-0 lead.

Jal hit on the ball late in the fourth quarter for their only tally of the game with the clock running down. On the 47 that was called back because of an off-side. The Warriors' defense, in the end, was the one that counted. The Warriors' extra point try was good, and the final Ruidoso victory sealed up all the battles for a state championship.

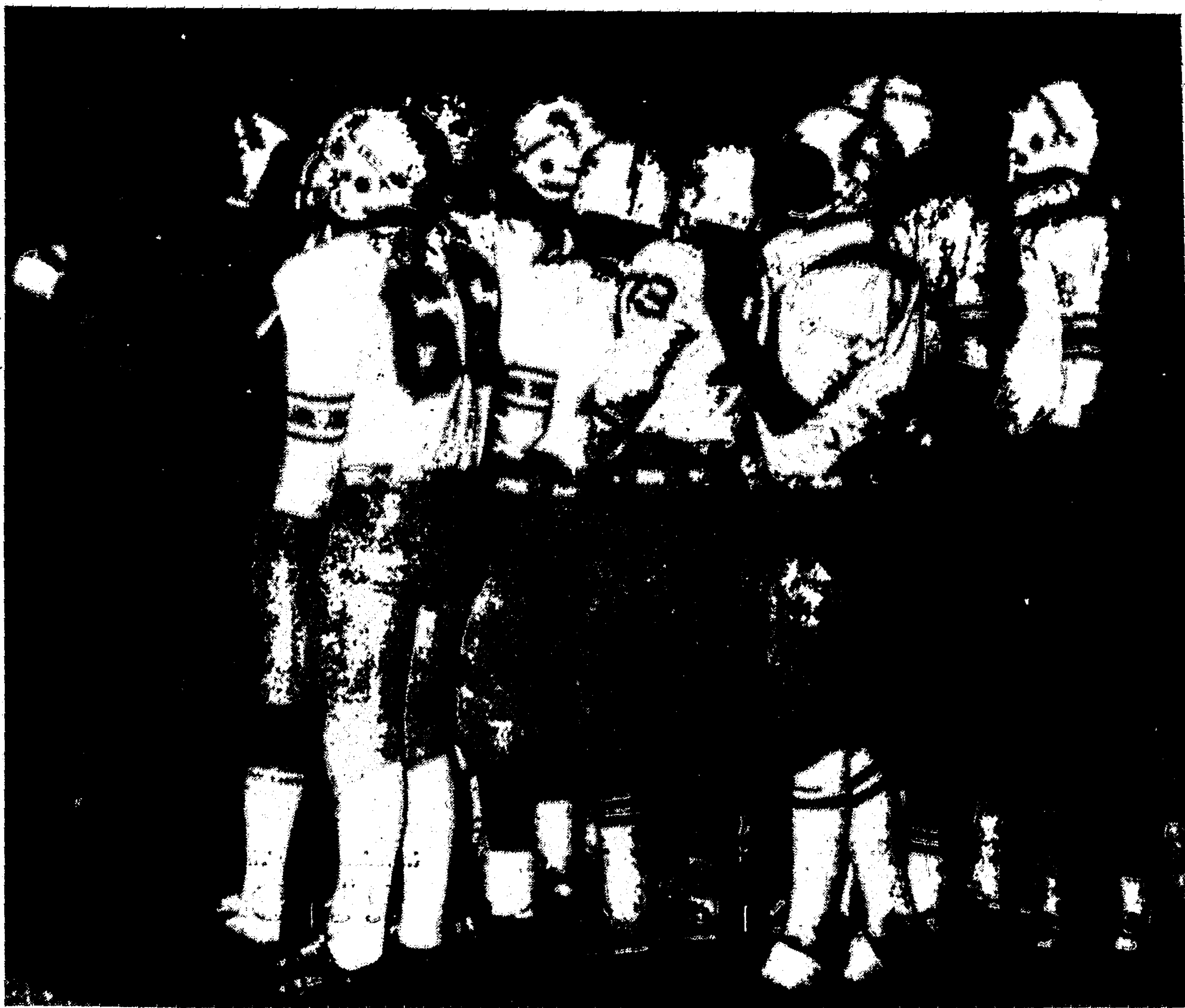

25 Years Ago

News Items From Ruidoso, News Issue of Nov. 21, 1947.

This issue of the Ruidoso News carried an article on the schools in the Ruidoso Valley from 1888 and in Ruidoso in the 1890's, up to the time of the completion of the new Ruidoso High School which was opened this week. Alfred Hale said he recalled going to school in a log cabin on the old Hernandez Herrera place which is now the Beaver Farm in Green Tree and when this building burned about 1902, a new cabin was built on the site of the Stetson School. There was another school built in the Ruidoso area in 1910. Charles Wingfield, father of Ike Wingfield, built this school which was located a short distance from the site of the present high school. A second Ruidoso school was built in 1918 in the Gateway area of Ruidoso. In 1928 there were enough grade school students in Ruidoso to establish another school and this was installed in central Ruidoso, in the vicinity of the Hedgecock home. In 1931 the school was moved to the Southwestern Children's Home where it remained until the first three rooms of the present grade school were built. Mrs. Frank Cee established the first school in the Glencoe area on the Co. Ranch in 1888. The school term was 3 months, October, November and December. As the school grew, the school term was lengthened to 9 months. In 1915 this school was taken into the county system.

FRIED CHEESEBURGERS DELUXE

Makes 4 servings
Cheese Sauce:
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
2 teaspoons all-purpose flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup shredded process American cheese
1/2 cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked
1/2 cup tomato sauce
1 teaspoon instant minced onion
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Batter:
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup fine dry bread crumbs

For cheese sauce, melt butter in a small saucepan. Stir in flour until smooth. Gradually add milk. Bring to a boil and simmer 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Stir in shredded cheese until melted. Keep warm until ready to serve.

For burgers, combine ground beef, oats, tomato sauce, minced onion, salt and pepper. Shape to form 4 patties. Dip patties in beaten eggs; then coat with dry bread crumbs. Dip in eggs and bread crumbs a second time. Fry in hot fat (375° F.) about 6 minutes for medium doneness. Drain on paper towels. Serve with warm cheese sauce.

News 'N Notes

Are you getting your money's worth when you buy fruit drinks? Fruit drinks are a big part of snacking for children and some fruit beverages offer more nutrition for the money than others. Spend a few extra minutes in the store reading labels of fruit drinks and know what the labels mean.

If you notice the labels on several dry fruit mixes, such as instant breakfast drinks, imitation lemonade mix, and instant soft drink mix you'll find that sugar is the ingredient present in the greatest quantity, followed by citric acid, several chemicals, vitamins, artificial flavors and color, but no real fruit juice. The same is true for two frozen concentrates which are imitation orange juice. Sugar syrup, water and corn syrup are the leading ingredients, but no orange juice is present. In contrast, another frozen concentrate imitating orange juice lists concentrated orange juice first, with a statement that the product contains not less than 50 per cent orange juice.

One popular canned orange drink lists water, sugar, concentrated orange juice, and vitamin C among its ingredients. The label also states that there is not less than 10 per cent orange juice present. Drinks that are made with a substantial amount of real orange juice deserve priority over those that are entirely synthetic, because they are likely to provide more food value. For example, although we drink orange juice primarily because it is rich in vitamin C, it also contributes vitamin A and thiamine and the minerals calcium and iron. Some synthetic drinks may be a less expensive source of vitamin C but they may not contain all of the other important nutrients. And most synthetic drinks to which vitamin C has been added are two or three times more expensive than real fresh, frozen, or canned orange juice.

When it comes to deciding which beverage item to buy,

consider use as well as cost. If the beverage is to provide the major source of vitamin C for the day, then orange juice will probably offer the most food value for the money.

The Lincoln County apple crop was heavily damaged by unfavorable weather conditions in 1972. But, there are apples available for the homemaker to use in many tempting ways. Apples can be used in family meals from appetizers to desserts.

The Rome Beauty or Jonathan apple would be a good variety to choose for the following dish:
Dutch Apple Cake
2 cups sifted enriched flour.
3 tablespoons sugar.
3 teaspoons baking powder.
1 teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine.
1 cup whipping cream.
3 to 4 apples.
1/4 cup sugar.
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
Mix and sift first four ingredients. Whip cream, blend in lightly with a fork. Spread in greased 9-inch square cake pan. Pare, core and quarter apples; cut each quarter into 3 slices.

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County Agent's Column

Deer hunting season is here again, and with many hunters in the field, it's a good time to remember the rules of gun safety. Every fall sees needless tragedies in the hunting field. There's no reason for deaths and injuries from gun accidents. If everyone followed the common sense rules of safety and courtesy, gun accidents could easily be avoided.

Here are some tips for gun safety:

Treat every gun with respect due a loaded gun. Getting into sloppy habits with unloaded firearms carries over into the field. Assume every gun is loaded — even after you have opened the action and checked the magazine.

Watch that muzzle! Always be conscious of where the muzzle of your gun is pointing. Good hunters get extremely nervous looking down the barrel of a companion's gun — usually nervous enough to find someone else to hunt with. Carry your gun safely and keep the safety on until ready to fire.

Always unload guns when not in use, and keep the action open. Guns should be transported in cases. Be sure the barrel is clear of obstructions. Dirt, mud, snow — or shells of a smaller gauge — can cause a gun to blow up when fired. Never point a gun at anything you don't want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay with guns. Never climb a tree, cross a fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun. Never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water. Ricochets are unpredictable and extremely dangerous. When shooting a target be sure your backstop is adequate. Store guns and ammunition separately and beyond the reach of children. Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during hunting. Drinking while carrying a gun is no more sensible than drinking while driving. Alcohol and gunpowder can be a fatal mixture as well as alcohol and gasoline.

The rules of gun safety are nothing more than common sense. Observing them closely can only increase the pleasure of a hunting trip.

Look for meat prices in 1973 to be lower than for this year. Indications are that there will be considerably more pork and beef produced. Beef production will be up three to four per cent, while pork production will be about five per cent over 1972.

During the first half of 1972, consumer demand for beef was strong and prices rose substantially even with a small rise in numbers of cattle marketed. In June, the average retail price for choice grade beef was 113.5 cents per pound and choice cattle were selling for about \$38.50 per hundred.

By-product values for cattle were up over last year and in July amounted to about \$35 for a 1,000 pound steer. Most of the increase in by-product value came from an increase in hide year I'm going to do different-

prices which were almost double those of a year ago.

Since June, live cattle prices have dropped about \$4 per hundred. Hog prices have remained in the \$28 range. Both cattle and hog prices will decrease late fall and early winter.

Producers will raise two per cent more hogs this fall and 1973 spring pig crop is anticipated to be up about seven per cent. Hog prices during the fall of 1973 will drop to about \$22 per hundred.

Beef production in 1973 will be up by three to four per cent as feeders continue to place more cattle on feed. Next spring choice cattle prices will be in the \$33-\$34 range and by next fall prices may drop even lower.

Right or wrong, good or bad, your 1972 gardening season is rapidly coming to an end. All during the year, you have continued to tell yourself "Next year I'm going to do different-

ly." If you expect to carry out this promise, or threat, you should start making plans now.

Where can I find a plant that requires a minimum of care and attention? Use Chamiza in your landscape plans. Also, let us consider a group of plants known as wormwood (Artemisia). One species of this family grows in the desert areas of New Mexico and western Texas which we call "sage" or "rabbitbrush". In some areas, this plant is called Chamiza, but this name more appropriately refers to the Fourwing Saltbrush (Atriplex Canescens).

Nurserymen list at least four improved varieties of Artemisia. Probably the best known variety is "Silver King." This striking white-leaved plant grows to three feet. The entire color effect is bright frosted-silver. Its delightful mist-like quality is superb in floral arrangements. Sprays also lend elegance to dried arrangements. Another variety, "Silver-Mound" produces a handsome compact, mound-like plant only eight inches high and twelve inches in diameter. Fern-like foliage is of the lightest and brightest silvery gray, making a pleasing effect in the rock garden or as an accent plant when planted in groups of three or more. It is incomparable for edging beds or walks. Like all artemisias, Silver-Mound prefers a warm sunny, and slightly dry location. The lovely silvery gray-green foliage of "Versicolor", combined with its unique habit of growth makes this variety of particular value. The plant produces a rather stately central stalk some 18 to 20 inches tall with a low compact mound of foliage nestled at the base. An unusual chain-like effect is created by the finely cut spiky leaves. It is outstanding as a border plant and excellent in groups of three or more to highlight your perennial garden. You will also admire its beauty in bouquets and floral arrangements.

A fourth variety called "Discolor" is shrub-like having stems 10 to 18 inches high. Its foliage is a stunning frosty green on top with white silky down beneath. It blends harmoniously with flowers in the vase as well as the flower border.

Like most perennials, Artemisias require annual shearing to look their best. Excessive amounts of either fertilizer or water destroys their beauty. It appears we have found just the plant we have been looking for, doesn't it?

27-Year Old Ruidoso Man Dies Tuesday As Result of Pistol Shot

Ruidoso Police officers, under the direction of Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens, Jr., Tuesday, Nov. 21, investigated the apparent shooting death of a twenty-seven year old Ruidoso man who was the co-owner of a Ruidoso and Alamogordo appliance repair service company.

The body of Robert Wallace Simmons was found Tuesday morning lying across a bed in his rented apartment, located in the Gateway area of Ruidoso, the victim of what appeared to be a self-inflicted .38 calibre pistol shot.

Chief Lukens stated that Simmons' body was discovered around 10:30 Tuesday morning by his bride to be who notified the Ruidoso Police. The appar-

ent gun shot victim and the Ruidoso girl were scheduled to be married on Dec. 16.

The Chief also stated that it appeared that Simmons' death was caused by suicide but that his department would continue their investigation until all possible facts are known.

A neighbor reported to one of the Ruidoso Police officers that she had heard what she thought was a gun shot around 8:30 Tuesday morning but with all of the building construction noise in the immediate area she was not sure it was a gun shot and did not think too much of the noise at the time.

Lincoln County Coroner Dr. W. D. Horton examined the body and ordered an autopsy to determine the actual time of death and other related causes of death details. His body was taken to Roswell by the Chapel of Roses Mortuary ambulance.

Picketing Private Home
Henry's plan to open a tavern in a suburban neighborhood raised the hackles of nearby residents. One afternoon, several men showed up at his house with protest signs and began to picket.

Equal'y incensed, Henry went to court for an injunction against this "invasion into my private life." At the hearing, the picketers insisted they were mainly exercising their right of free speech.

But the court sided with Henry and issued an injunction.

"The home is a retreat from outside affairs," said the judge. "When the right of free speech is weighed against the right to privacy, the balance favors the privacy of the home."

Courts generally have concurred in placing a high value on the home as a privileged sanctuary from strife.

Nevertheless, residential picketing has sometimes been allowed under special circumstances -- such as the fact that the occupant of the house is a public official.

Thus, the picketing of a governor's home by a civil rights group was upheld in court. The judge said the picketers "had

a legitimate right, protected by the Constitution, to appeal to those in authority for redress."

And the picketing of a landlord's home by disgruntled tenants was sustained on the ground that he had no other known headquarters where they could vent their feelings.

Of course, even if picketing itself is considered lawful, it may still be condemned because of the manner in which it is done.

In another case, the home of a hospital executive was subjected to mass picketing by boisterous marchers. Furthermore, they flaunted signs that were plainly libellous. This time a court held the picketing unlawful.

"Conducted at a considerable distance from the hospital," said the judge, "in a residential area, it was apparently aimed to cause humiliation and mortification to (the victim) and his family. It represents a form of direct and unmitigated coercion, a foul blow."

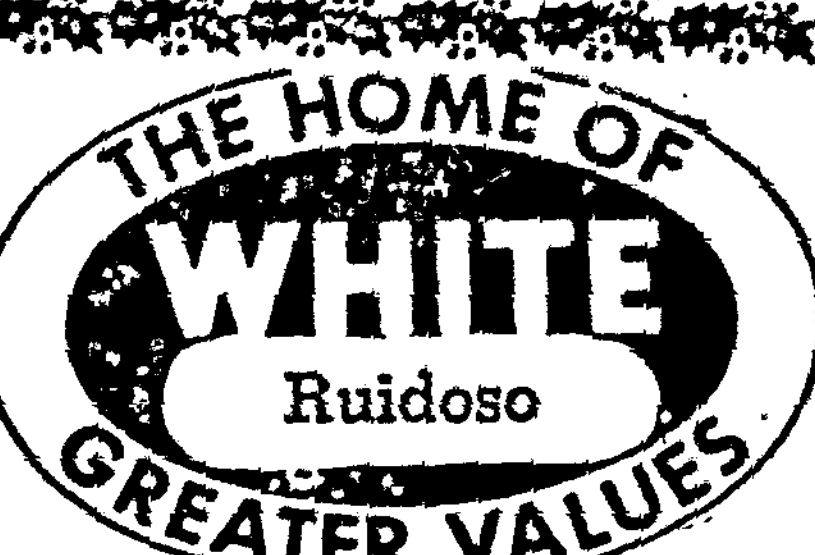

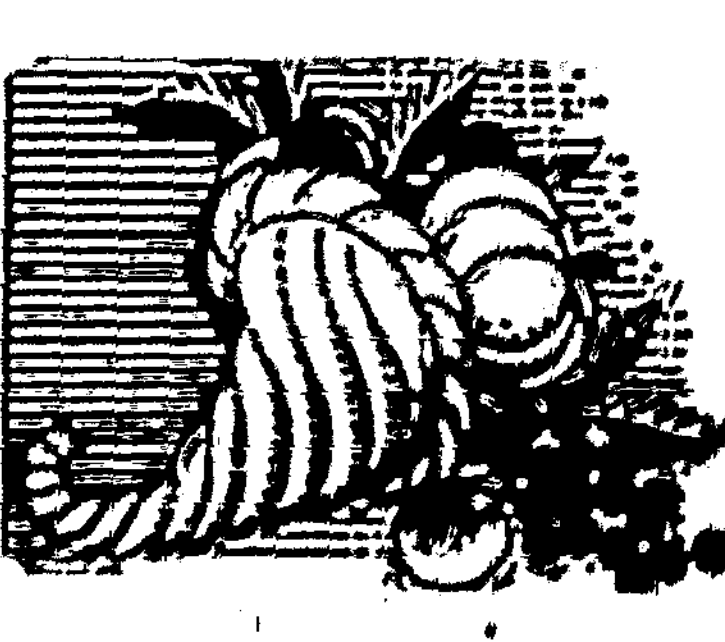

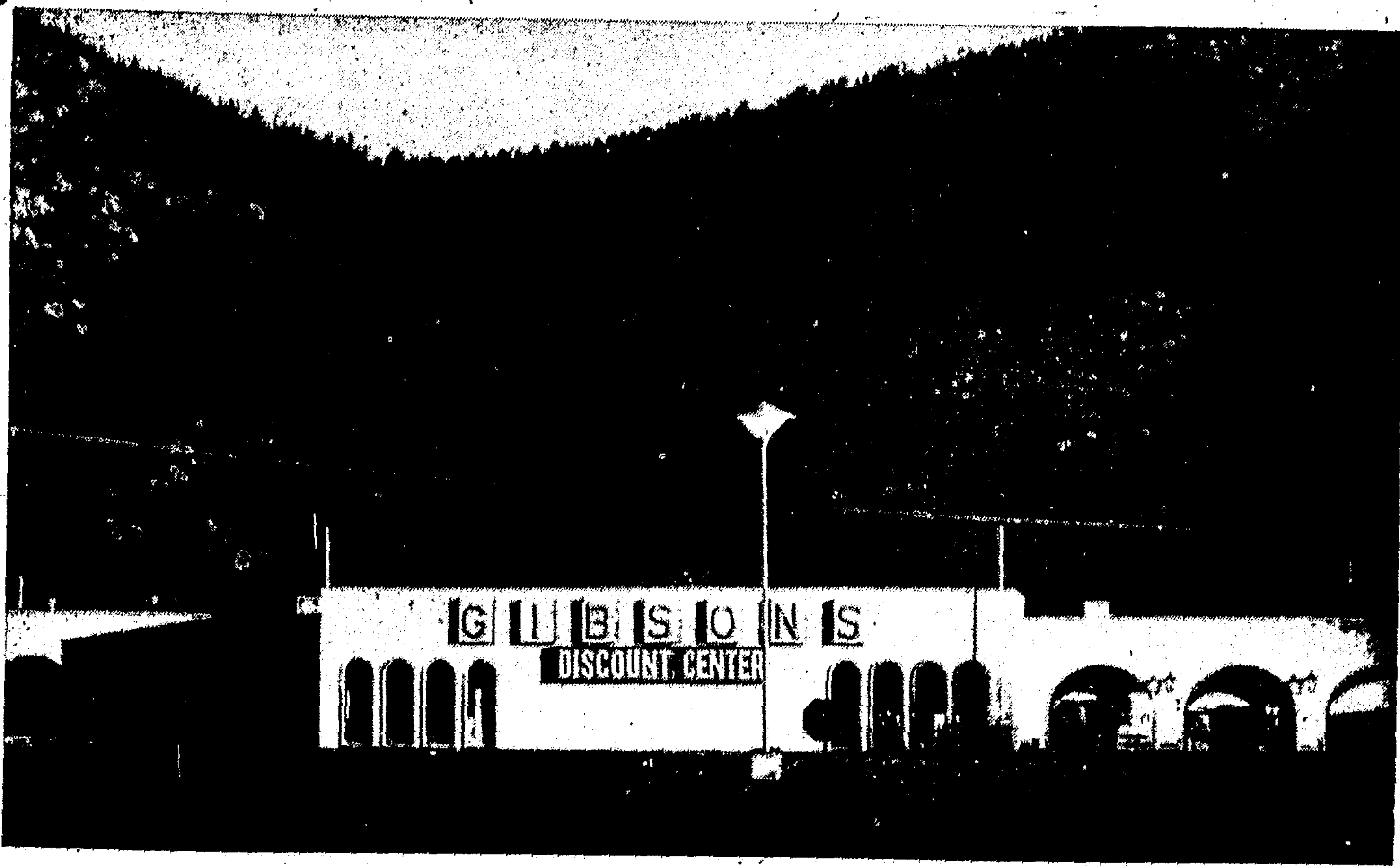

Your Social Security

"On the third of next month, over twenty-eight million people will receive a social security check. We are vitally interested in seeing that every check is delivered on time," Mrs. Christien Graves, social security field representative, emphasized today.

Social security checks normally arrive on the third day of the month, but sometimes a check may be late.

"If a check is late, we advise the beneficiary to wait three days — until the sixth of the month — before notifying us that he did not get his check. During this three day wait, many checks arrive which were simply held up in the mail."

"A beneficiary should definitely contact the nearest social security office if his check does not arrive on the sixth of the month. This contact can be by phone call, letter, or personal visits to the social security office."

Robinson Crusoe may have had a personal benefactor in the person of his Man Friday, of the historic fictional novel, Robinson Crusoe, of many years ago, but Ruidoso area businessmen now have a multiple benefactor in the person of "Our Girl Friday," Mrs. Jim (DeeAnn) Wooldridge, Ruidoso.

The new secretarial firm offers a complete secretarial service for both the small businessman, who can't afford a full-time secretary, and for the heavily loaded businessman and firm whose current secretarial staff finds it impossible to keep abreast with current secretarial chores.

The new venture by Mrs. Wooldridge, who is now located in a temporary office in Ruidoso Downs, began the first of November and has already proved to be a success. The success is in the fact that she is endeavoring to secure a franchise from the nationally recognized Kelly Girls, a national secretarial organization.

In addition, the Ruidoso area Our Girl Friday, already has plans for a new office which includes plans for a twenty-four hour telephone answering service, reportedly another service long needed for the small Ruidoso area businesses.

Something else, in comparing his Man Friday, Crusoe's man that is, to "Our Girl Friday," Crusoe's man could only speak one language, whereas Our Girl Friday specializes in at least two languages, who has a college background, National University of Mexico, Mexico City, Mexico, where she majored in Foreign Languages. The results, Mrs. Wooldridge offers dictation in at least two languages, Spanish and English, and on a twenty-four call. Not sure about Crusoe's Man Friday.

The list of secretarial services offered by "Our Girl Friday," your other secretary, ranges from speed typing at over 90 words per minute, in her office or the customer's office, and taking dictation at the rate of around 100 words per minute. In addition, she offers a complete addressing and mailing service, cuts stencils and memorandum, and is qualified to take official minutes and as an official recording secretary. Mrs. Wooldridge's credits as

year has been raised to \$2,100 or less in 1973 he will get all benefits for the year. If he earns more than \$2,100 while he is under age 72, the general rule is that \$1 in benefits to him or his family will be withheld for each \$2 he earns over the \$2,100 per year.

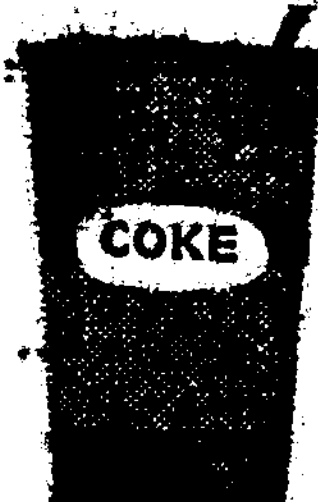

Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, will propose a primary convention method of nominating candidates in the 1973 Legislature. Delegates would be elected to the state convention in March. A candidate would win a place on the primary ballot if he polled 15 to 20 per cent of delegates. The primary election would be held in May or June.

The proposed change would affect both major political parties. The legislation, already drafted, is patterned on the New York system. As alternatives, Sen. Echols says, he will propose a run-off primary or a petition method of qualifying for the primary ballot in New Mexico.

Major election legislation will be sent to the 1973 Legislature, an outgrowth of a massive filing fee tangle in the 1972 Democratic primary. Two filing fee cases were still pending in the U. S. Supreme Court.

Sen. Echols is also considering legislation providing two 4-year terms for the governor and other elected state officials. Elected state officials are limited to a single four-year term now under a constitutional amendment adopted in 1970.

Echols will also introduce a plan allowing the State Development Department to attract economic development in New Mexico by making capital more readily available under specified conditions.

Echols is chairman of the interim Committee on Aging. The committee is looking into probate problems. Echols seeks reelection as Senate majority whip in the Senate Democratic caucus. He is opposed by Sen. Robert McBride, Albuquerque. Sen. Echols is a 1974 Democratic governor prospect.

The Legislative Council, the legislature's interim arm, met in Santa Fe. Council members attending included Senate President Pro Tem I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra; Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, D-Belen; Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, and Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry-Roosevelt-Lea.

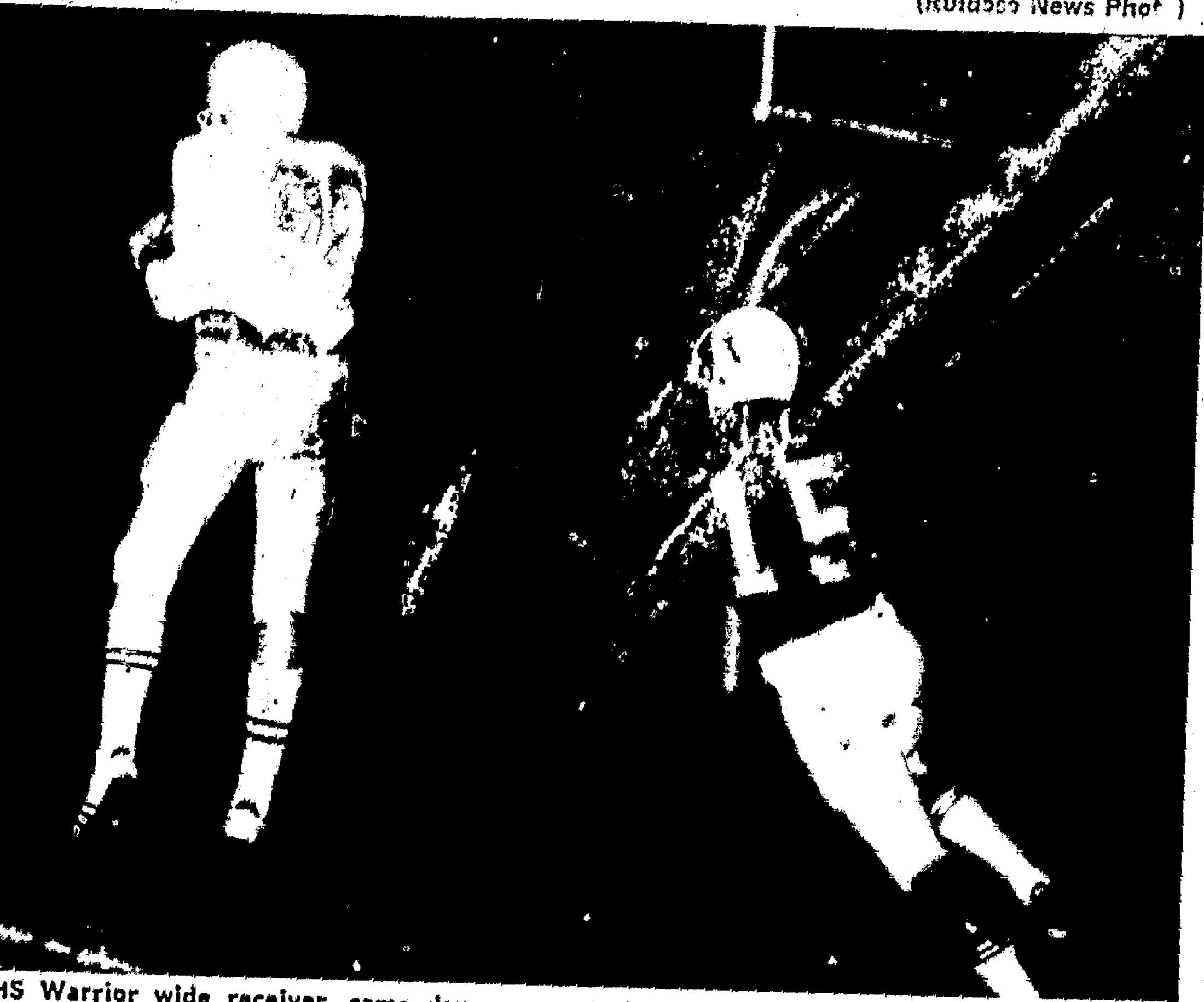

erage Control Department appealed the district court ruling. State Tourist Director Fabian Chavez says he seeks \$5,500 for preliminary engineering, architectural work and planning on a project to restore the Town

of Lincoln.

Chavez said \$2,500 was approved from the historic preservation fund of the National Park Service. The Four Corners Regional Commission will act Dec. 9 on a request for an additional \$3,000. Chavez said work would be performed by Santa Fe architect William Lamphkins and Herkenhoff and Associates of Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

Major restoration of the Town of Lincoln and a highway bypass are projected. The Four Corners Regional Commission application has been filed.

Transfer of a Carrizozo retailer liquor license was approved by the state liquor agency. Ownership passed from B. V. and Geraldine Vlahovic, doing business as Central Package Store, to Raymond A. Sanchez.

Transfer of ownership of San Jon Bar, San Jon, from A. E. Rhode to Mr. and Mrs. J. E. DeMaris was also approved by the state liquor agency.

Tinnie Mercantile Co., doing business as Double Eagle, acquired a Mesilla dispenser's liquor license from Allen-Lange, Inc. Tinnie Mercantile Co. also operates restaurants and bars at Tinnie, Lincoln County, and La May, Santa Fe County.

State Finance Director Robert Kirkpatrick said revenues from New Mexico's mineral production, especially oil and gas, have been surprisingly strong in recent months.

Kirkpatrick told Gov. Bruce King in a report: "Although total oil production remains below last year's levels, natural gas production and prices are rising significantly."

"As a result, the distribution to the state general fund of severance tax revenues amounted to \$4.7 million during the first four months of the current fiscal year (July-October), an increase of 8.4 per cent from the previous year's total for this period of \$4.4 million."

New Mexico's public school enrollment after the first 40 days was down in most districts from 1971. The 40-day report is critical because it is the basis for state funds for school districts.

The 1972 reports: Jal Public Schools, 841 enrollment, down 47; Eunice, 757, down 80; Belen, 3,452, up 19; Los Lunas, 3,403, up 117; Taos, 3,176, up 85; Clayton, 1,081, down 42; Springer, 624, down 23.

Also, Tucumcari, 2,263, up 39; Lordsburg, 1,255, up 105; Carrizozo, 431, up 29; Ruidoso, 961,

down 2; Deming, 3,769, down 3; Fort Sumner, 500, down 22; Santa Rosa, 1,102, down 103; Truth or Consequences, 1,457, up 44; and Clovis, 9,181, down 17.

Ex-Senate President Pro Tem W. C. Wheatley, Clayton Democrat, visited the capitol late last week. Former Sen. Wheatley renewed friendships with legislators and others.

The Governor's Council on Criminal Justice Planning divided federal funds. Allocations included: Ruidoso, \$1,409; Lordsburg, \$3,816; Taos, \$2,800; Tucumcari, \$6,611; Valencia County, \$1,731; Hidalgo County, \$1,292.

Let us be thankful for our great American heritage, our freedom and for the many other blessings that we so often take for granted. We're all in it together... to make a better life for ourselves and our children.

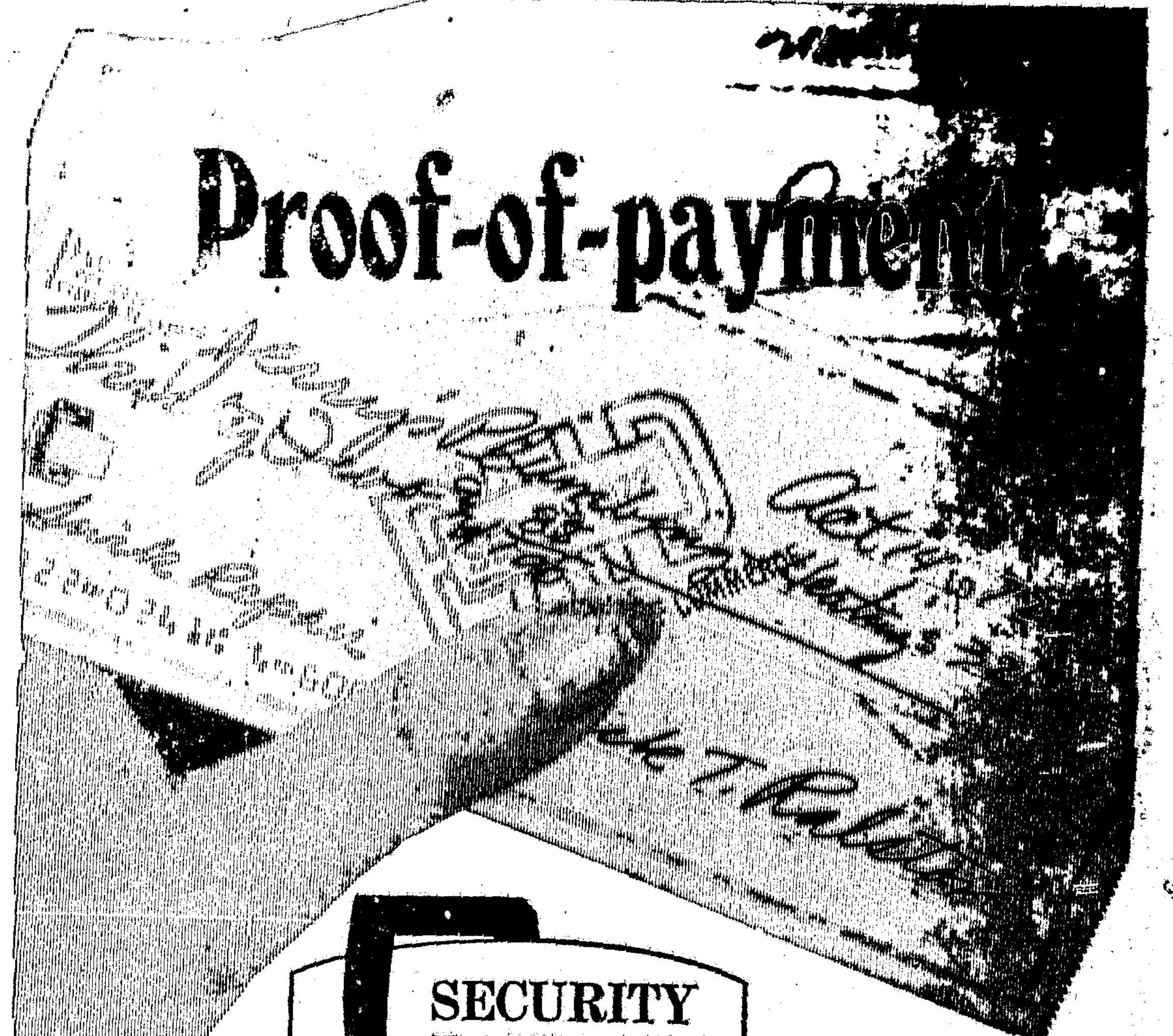
