6. In '73 resolve to forget what you forgot to remember in '72.

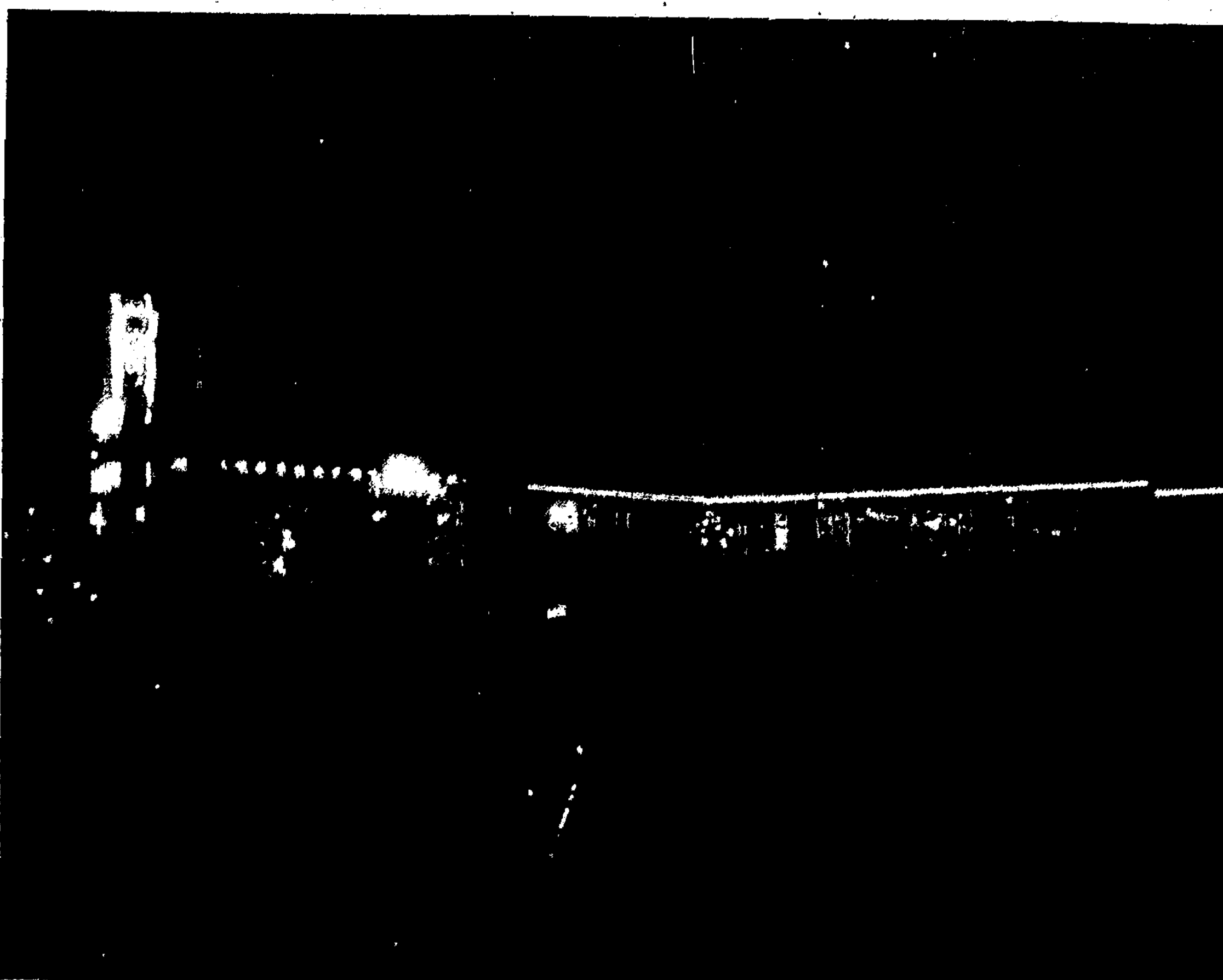
(If the above won't help you to forget remembering to make resolutions that you forgot to remember in '69, '70, '71 and '72 then let it be in '73.)

Jim Littlefield Named Salesman Of the Year

A Ruidoso resident who first received his New Mexico Real Estate Commission approved Real Estate License shortly after he first moved to the Ruidoso area over seventeen years ago, who also was semi-retired from the real estate business until two years ago, was named Friday, Dec. 15, as the Ruidoso Multiple Listing Service's 1972 Salesman of the Year.

Recipient of this year's annual award was Jim Littlefield, a long time associate of the firm of Perle-Parks and Associates, one of Ruidoso's largest and leading real estate and insurance companies.

Breakfast Is Essential Even During Holidays

Corn flakes or whole wheat flakes and leftover turkey are the primary ingredients for a holiday breakfast that will make a hit with all family members. Breakfast is just as important during the busy holiday season as it is any other time of the year. But with the many extra activities, some people may neglect this meal.

One way to entice the non-breakfast eaters to the table in the morning is to plan breakfast as carefully as any other meal. Breakfast does not have to be elaborate or take a long time to fix. The wide variety of breakfast cereals available offer convenience as well as nutrition. Keep various kinds of juices and fruits on hand to add interest to breakfast.

For a unique breakfast treat combine corn flakes or whole wheat flakes with leftover turkey to make Turkey Cereal Cakes. This is an excellent combination of foods. Many cereals are fortified with eight essential vitamins and also supply carbohydrates for energy. The turkey provides protein.

Prepare the turkey mixture the night before, cover and store overnight in the refrigerator.

TURKEY CEREAL CAKES WITH CRANBERRY ORANGE SAUCE

2 tablespoons butter or margarine
3 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 cup milk
1 chicken bouillon cube
2 cups finely chopped cooked turkey
2 tablespoons sliced green onion with tops
2 1/2 cups corn or whole wheat flakes, crushed to make 1 1/2 cups coarse crumbs
1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons cooking oil



Melt butter or margarine. Stir in flour, salt and pepper. Add milk and bouillon cube; cook stirring constantly until smooth and thickened. Stir in turkey, onion and 1/2 cup cereal crumbs. Chill until mixture is easy to handle. Shape mixture into 6 cakes, 2 1/2 to 3-inch diameter. Dip each cake into beaten egg, then coat with remaining cereal crumbs. Brown patties in oil over moderate heat, about 10 minutes, turning patties once. Serve with Cranberry Orange Sauce (recipe below). Yield: 6 cakes.

CRANBERRY ORANGE SAUCE

1 cup drained fresh orange sections
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
3/4 cup water
3/4 cup sugar
2 cups fresh cranberries

Bring water and sugar to a boil. Add cranberries; bring to a boil. Simmer uncovered until all berries pop, about 5 minutes. Stir in orange sections and orange rind. Cool. Serve with Turkey Cereal Cakes. Yield: About 3 cups sauce.

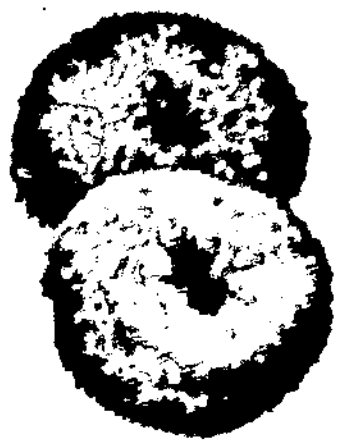

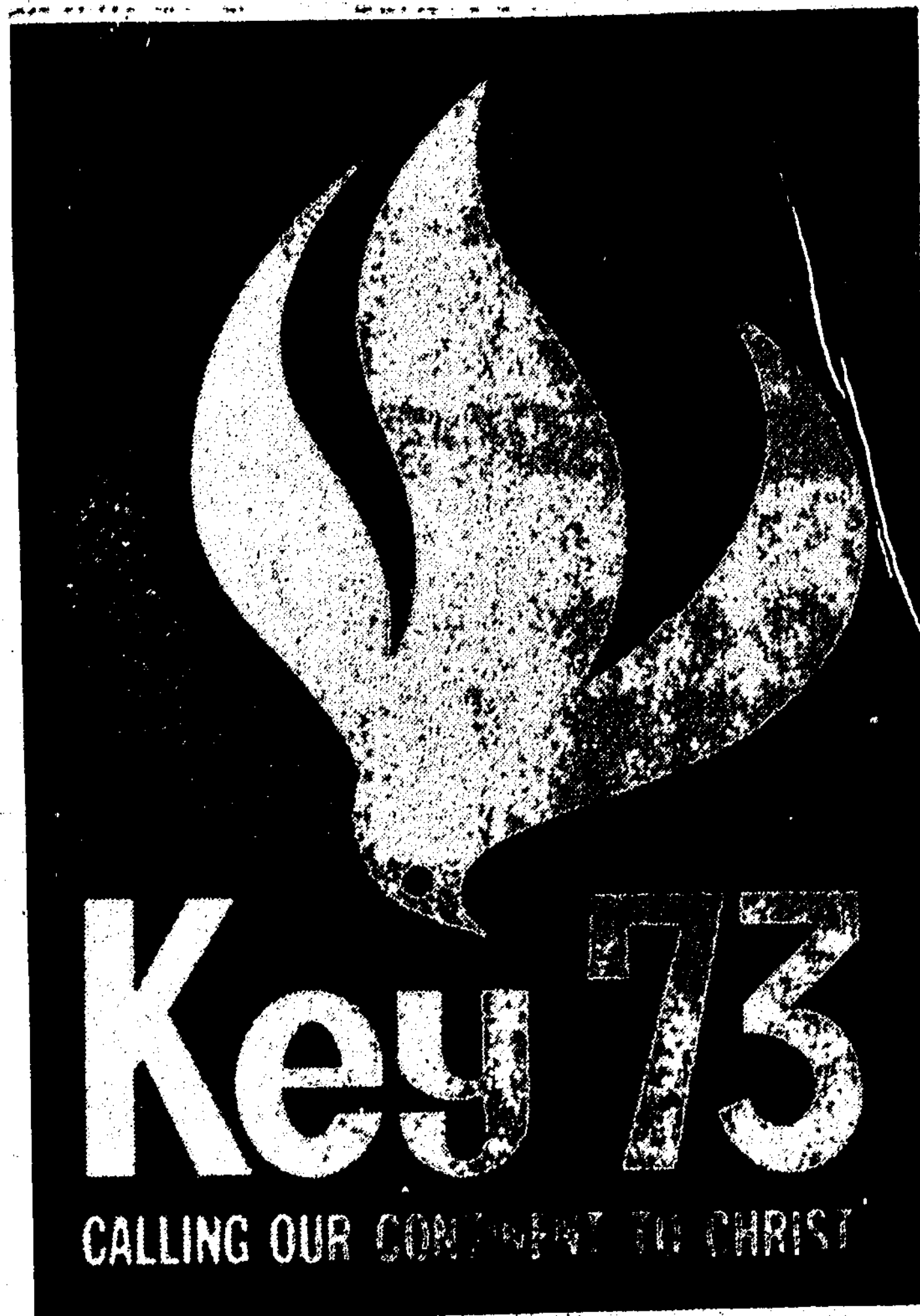

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) Is it true that some taxpayers may be able to use a shorter Federal income tax return for filing their 1972 return?

A) Yes. Taxpayers may now have a choice of returns to file — the short form 1040A and the regular form 1040. You may file the new short form if the following conditions are met: you take the standard deduction rather than itemize; you did not earn more than \$200 in interest and \$200 in dividends; and your income was only from wages, salaries and tips.

Q) I work six days a week and

pay a maid to come in and clean my apartment. Can I deduct the wages I pay her?

A) Yes. If you are employed and provide over one-half the cost of maintaining a household for a dependent child under 15, a disabled dependent of any age, or a disabled husband or wife, you may deduct household expenses, such as amounts paid for the services of a maid, cook or other domestic help, subject to certain limitations.

For more details on the child care deductions, write your Internal Revenue district office and ask for a free copy of IRS

Publication 503, "Child Care and Disabled Dependent Care." It will be available in January 1973.

Q) I'm a salesman and I use my car for business travel. In addition to deducting the standard mileage rate for transportation expenses, can I deduct my parking fees and tolls?

A) Yes. Parking fees and tolls incurred during business use are deductible in addition to the standard mileage rate.

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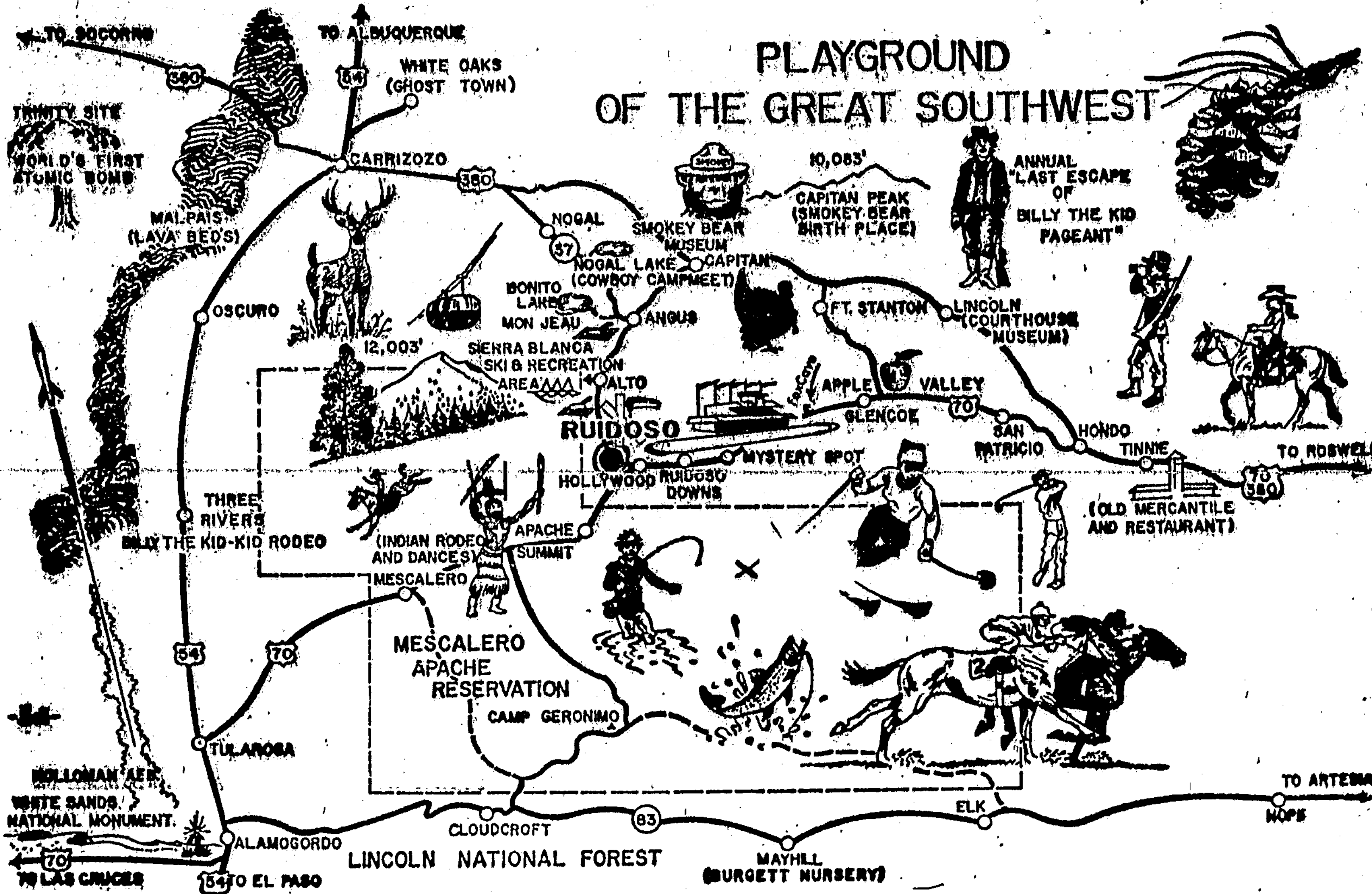

County Agent's Column

by Ralph Dunlap
(Lincoln County Agent)
January will feature several meetings for the farmer and rancher. One of these meetings is the Agricultural Chemical conference on Jan. 24 and 25 at the Palm Motor Hotel in Las

Cruces. Insecticides, pesticides and predator control will be among the subjects to be discussed. Put Jan. 24 and 25 on your calendar and plan to attend.

R-R-D
Worming a horse regularly is probably one of the most important aspects of proper nutrition. Far too many horsemen neglect this part of horse care because they can't see the worms, and because if a horse is fat he looks healthy. Worms not only rob the horse of vitality and nutrition; they can also damage arteries, cause colic, intestinal obstructions and irritate the digestive tract. They can interfere with the proper growth and development of young horses and they can cause lung damage.

R-R-D
The European Common Market's efforts to modernize agriculture are moving slowly. A Commission report released in September said that only heavy investment in the farm sector could speed up the 8 percent a year rate of increase in farm labor productivity. The average farm size of 31 acres in the community remains too small for greatest productivity, the report says. Both farms and farm workers are declining.

R-R-D
A frequent pest of garden plants, the clover mite, often moves indoors when temperatures drop. Clover mites are eight-legged, reddish or brownish creatures smaller than a pinhead. They do not bite people, transmit diseases, or feed on household furnishings or stored food, but they are a nuisance. If they are crushed, they leave blood-red spots that are especially noticeable on linens, curtains, walls and woodwork. It is difficult to remove these pests from homes without creating these stains.

Infestations of these mites inside buildings can be reduced or prevented by treating outside surfaces. Thoroughly spray the lower exterior walls, the foundations, and 10 to 20 feet of adjacent lawn with diazinon, Dibrom, Kelthane, or chlorobenzilate. For treatment of window sills, walls, and dormant plants, use double strength recommended on the package for control of foliage pests. When treating evergreens and hardy grasses, don't exceed the rate recommended in the label instructions.

Low temperatures and rains will reduce the effectiveness of these miticides. Therefore, treatment should be made when day time temperatures are at least 50 degrees F. Repeated applications should be made every seven to ten days or after heavy rains or until the mites are under control.

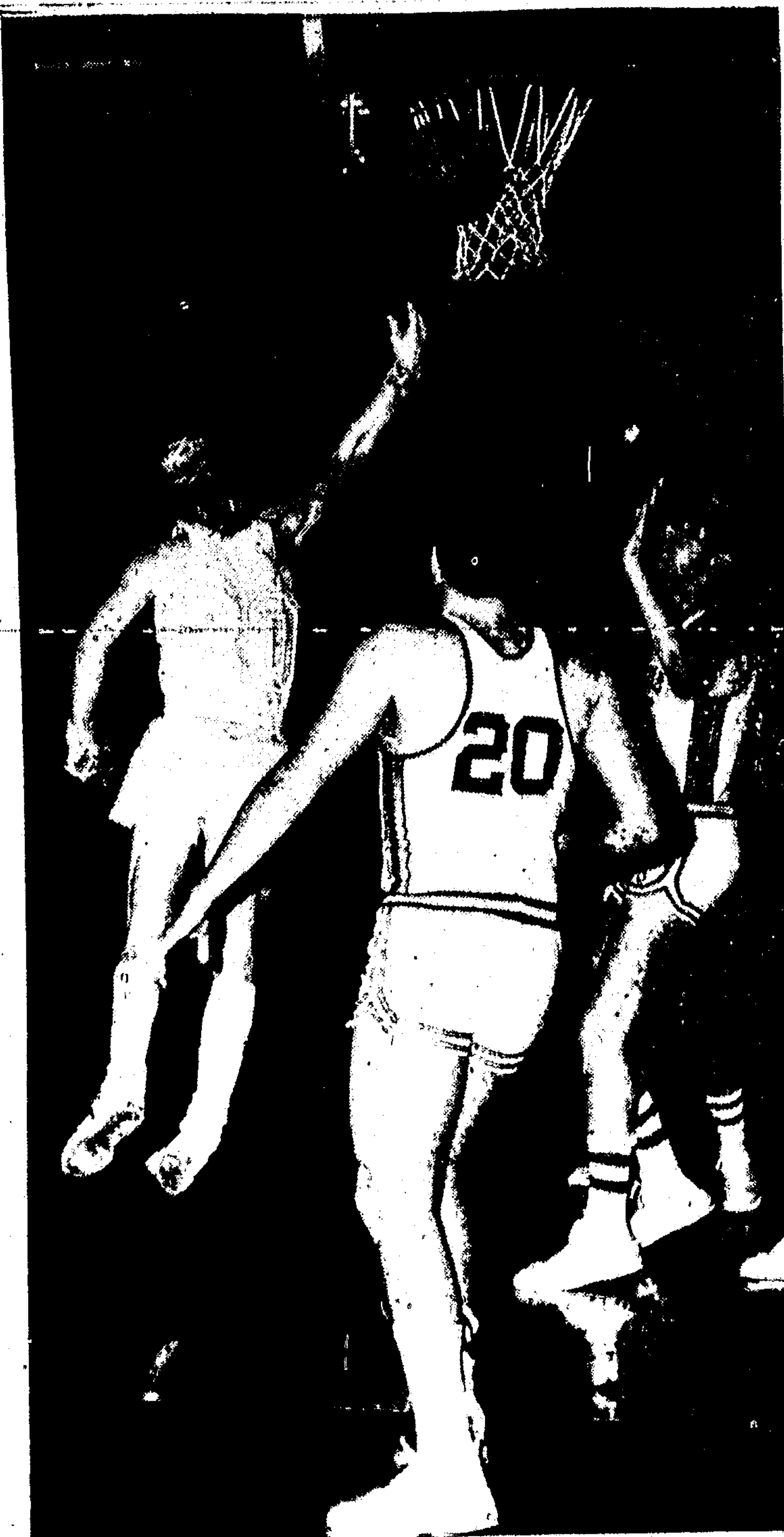

BELEN — The action is going to be in the capital roundhouse in Santa Fe for 60 days and nights, beginning Jan. 10, and lasting through the first regular session of the 31st Legislature.

Many New Mexicans feel more money and more laws will solve all of our state's pressing problems, including drugs, alcohol, land use, ecology, finances, etc. But we who have been on the scene for a while know better.

The Senate this year will be composed of 42 senators — 12 Republicans and 30 Democrats — with many ideas, views and backgrounds. They will all be sincere, honest, able and dedicated, but they have different backgrounds and represent different constituencies of different areas of the state.

Therefore you have to reconcile, compromise and swallow your pride sometimes in enacting or killing proposed laws and financing in the best interest of good government.

New Mexico ranks 11th from the top among the 50 states of the nation in overall performance in an evaluation by the Citizens' Conference on State Legislatures. Although the performance of the New Mexico Legislature is good, the pay is among the lowest in the nation. Even the modest retirement plan is constantly being subjected to pot shots by the press.

In the 70-member House the majority will also be substantially Democratic. This places a heavy burden and responsibility on Democrats in coming through with worthwhile programs, particularly on land use, control of the environment, adequate financing for schools and continuing the welfare program for those in need on an equitable basis.

Trying to provide for those who are truly in need and trying to eliminate the chiselers is a real dish of spaghetti. Also closely related is the effort to rehabilitate those that may be in need for a period of time but can get back on their feet and provide for themselves and their families by proper training and counseling. This is the real solution.

Everyone seems to be concerned about how, or how not, to spend the \$41 million surplus in the state treasury projected at the end of the present fiscal year. But, on second thought, it is more important to give thanks to the Lord and Democratic Gov. Bruce King for not having a tax increase on the poor sap citizens during Bruce's four-year term — we hope.

It is wise to provide an adequate surplus and stash away for a rainy day in meeting future emergencies than to face an income, property or sales tax increase in the future. The average New Mexico citizen cannot afford more taxes and industry has had enough if they are to survive in a healthy atmosphere.

Any rebate of tax at this time would be ill-advised and could lead to a catastrophe. Anticipating an income of \$330 million for the next fiscal year and appropriations of slightly less does not leave much room for added fancy programs or capital outlay.

The present \$10 million general fund reserve should be increased to approximately \$15 million. This is only a 5 per cent reserve in the event taxes do not materialize as anticipated.

Municipalities will ask for more money, but in view of the additional federal revenue sharing to all municipalities in the state, the legislature will probably take a wait-and-see attitude before changing the municipal tax structure.

As in the legislative session early this year, a no-fault insurance bill will be introduced in the 31st Legislature. Branch banking will also be introduced. Enactment or modification of laws relating to equal rights for women will be considered.

Changes in statutes will be proposed for 18-year-olds who have attained their majority and now require amendments to laws so that they may assume their increased responsibility as citizens.

Despite the fact liquor and drugs are still one of the main social problems, an effort will be made to repeal or modify the Implied Consent Law in view of its tough application to drunk drivers.

State Traffic Safety Director D. K. Kelly estimates one-half of deaths on New Mexico highways are still related to alcohol. Many judges are still tapping drunk drivers on the wrist and saying: "You will have another chance." They are placing drunk drivers on probation instead of revoking their licenses as required by law.

The tourist industry is still

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The tourist industry is still

one of the most important resources in providing new and added revenue to the state. A new effort will be made to beef up the tourist industry in attracting more tourists to visit recreational areas, historic sites and enjoy the New Mexico culture, unique in the nation.

The tourist dollar can go a long way in solving the problems of small communities on the byways that are withering on the vine or becoming ghost towns.

This is what offers the most refreshing look and reward to those touring New Mexico for the first time.

Gov. King has ideas and a definite program on all these areas of government which will present to the 31st Legislature Jan. 10.

We will begin the legislative session with an optimistic attitude.

After all, New Mexico is in an enviable position compared with the financial crises and problems facing other states in the nation.

Upstairs Neighbors
Madge had always been a restless sleeper. But matters went from bad to worse when a young couple with a baby moved into the apartment upstairs.

It seems the baby was teething. To keep her quiet at night, the parents would trundle her around their apartment in a baby carriage, causing sounds that were plainly audible to the wakened Madge.

Finally she went to court for an injunction. But at the hearing, the baby's father said there was no other way to keep the child from crying.

Besides, he pointed out, their carriage had rubber wheels and their floor was carpeted.

The court thereupon tossed out Madge's complaint, saying that a moderate amount of noise must be accepted by those who choose to live in apartments.

"Where people indulge their inclination to be gregarious," said the judge, "they must expect the quiet that belongs to solitude."

Courts generally take this hands-off attitude in disputes between apartment dwellers. Nevertheless, a court may well intervene if the noise gets out of hand.

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new parquet flooring. This time, when the tormented people downstairs went to court, the judge ordered the man to work on weekdays only, from nine to five, and to keep the noise and vibration to a minimum.

What role does the landlord play in these conflicts? Should he take action if the downstairs tenant asks for his help?

In most cases, the answer is no. Take this example: A downstairs tenant, disturbed by relentless piano playing from the apartment upstairs, asked the landlord to enforce a house rule against such conduct.

But the landlord refused to mix in — and his refusal was upheld in a court hearing. The judge said the rules in a lease are put in primarily for the landlord's benefit, to be enforced or not according to his discretion.
