Special Meeting Studies Alto Fishing Problem

A special joint meeting between board members of the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association, Inc., the governing bodies of the villages of Ruidoso and Capitán and representatives from the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, the New Mexico Health and Social Services Department, and the New Mexico State Environmental Improvement Agency was held Thursday, Jan. 13, in the council chambers of the Village of Ruidoso.

The special joint meeting, called by Tom Jones, Ruidoso, and president of the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association, Inc., was scheduled to be a discussion session regarding the question of fishing in Alto Reservoir. Fishing in the Alto Reservoir has not been permitted since it was drained and cleaned late last year.

Early last December, 1971, Mike Richardson, New Mexico State Environmental Improvement Agency officer for Lincoln County and stationed in Ruidoso, was requested by the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association, Inc., to secure an official statement from the N. M. E. I. A.'s Water Quality Section regarding their position on recreational use of water supply reservoirs and more specifically concerning recreational use at the Alto Reservoir.

In response to Richardson's request, Michael R. Snavely, EIA's Water Pollution Regulation section officer, in a letter dated Dec. 20, 1971, made the following recommendations regarding recreational use of water at the Alto Reservoir.

1. The installation and periodic maintenance of two vault-type toilets and adequate trash receptacles.

2. Close supervision of the recreation. This would preferably include personnel to routinely police the grounds and enforce the no trespass areas.

3. Bacteriological monitoring of the finished water at a frequency of no less than two samples a week.

Also included in Snavely's report was a copy of the official State of New Mexico Health and Social Services Department recommended policy on use of water supply reservoirs and Watersheds for Recreation.

The recommendation, in part, states: "Controlled use of reservoirs for bank fishing and boating where adequate sanitary facilities are provided. Swimming and wading shall be excluded. This use of a reservoir shall be limited to an area that is at least 600 feet, and preferably 1,500 feet with a 30-day detention time, from the water intake to the supply pipeline. A boom or other equivalent barrier shall be constructed to indicate the no-trespass area. The specific purpose of limitation of use adjacent to the intake is to provide added protection in case of plant breakdown, poor operation, and for errors in operational procedures, by provision of added storage prior to water usage for domestic purposes."

The recommendation also stated, "Policies for camping, picnicking, and other recreational uses of watersheds shall be established for each specific location after cooperative evaluation of the conditions involved has been made by the Department of Game and Fish, the Department of Public Health, the community involved, and any other agencies concerned."

Development Assn. Sets Land Exchange Public Meeting

The Lincoln County Development Association has scheduled a special meeting to be held at the Capitán City Hall Jan. 19, 7:30 p.m. to hear Lincoln National Forest Supervisor Kenneth Evans speak on the proposed land exchange involving the Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

Interested citizens of the area are urged to attend the meeting for a better understanding of the proposal.

Sewer Bond Question Will Appear On Ballot In Ruidoso Downs

A resolution, prepared by Darrel Fowler, fiscal agent with Stern Bros., calling for a certain bond election in the amount of \$300,000 in general obligation bonds was approved Monday night by the Ruidoso Downs Village Council at their regular meeting.

The funds from the proposed bond issue would be used for the village's share of a \$1.2 million dollar sewer system. Eighty percent of the project would be funded with federal and state grants. Completion of the sewer system would require two years.

Quinton Daniels, consulting engineer retained by the village for the project, was also present for the meeting. Daniels' company had formulated the plans for a system in 1969 that was turned down by voters in the village.

All members of the council felt that the people of the village realized the need for the sewer and that the bond would pass.

Daniels will meet with the village Planning and Zoning Committee and council members Tuesday evening at 7:30 to discuss alteration needed in the 1963 plan.

Ralph Douglass, consulting engineer with Douglass and Cheney of Lubbock, Texas, attended the meeting to make a presentation in behalf of his firm in connection with the proposed system.

Fowler noted that any owner of property in Ruidoso Downs, and who was a resident of Lincoln County, is eligible to vote in the election provided he notifies the village clerk 15 days preceding the election, January 25

is the deadline for voters of the village to register for the election.

Election judges, clerks and alternates were named by the council for the March 7 election and can be found in the legal columns of this issue of The News.

The council voted to hold a referendum for the purpose of ascertaining the people's feelings concerning the purchase of Denton Field. Mayor Clovis Perry noted that the property contained a good irrigation well that could be useful to the village in a few years and that the land could be used for either a recreation area or possibly the location of the "All-American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame".

The council agreed to investigate the water rights and price of the property.

The notice of election for the village appears in this issue of The News and candidates for village offices are reminded that only one day will be allowed for filing.

News Release

(Editor's Note: The following news release was received from the U. S. Forest Service Tuesday morning concerning the proposed transfer of forest lands to the Mescalero Apache Tribe.)

A proposal to transfer National Forest lands in New Mexico to the Apache Tribe of the Mescalero Reservation is the topic of a draft environmental statement just released by the Forest Service.

Kenneth L. Evans, Forest Supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest, where the proposed transfer would occur, noted in releasing the transfer of 2,240 acres of National Forest lands surrounding the Sierra Blanca Ski Area to the Tribe. In compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, we have prepared this environmental statement to examine the possible impact of such a transfer on the environment.

Copies of the statement may be reviewed, Evans noted, in the Forest Service Offices in Alamogordo, New Mexico.

The Supervisor also announced that an open public meeting has been scheduled Jan. 22, 1972 to discuss this proposal.

Evans emphasized that the decision has not yet been made as to whether to proceed with the transfer or not. He pointed out that public opinion must be considered before such a decision could be made, and that the meeting is one means of assessing public opinion. The meeting will be held at the Chaparral Motor Hotel and Convention Center, Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico at 9:30 a.m., January 22, 1972. Evans invited all interested persons to attend.

Supervisor Evans also added that he will be receiving written comments through Feb. 12, and sincerely urged all interested persons or organizations to state their feelings concerning the proposed transfer. Written comment should be directed to the Forest Supervisor, Lincoln National Forest, P. O. Box 640, Alamogordo, N. M. 88310.

Public Hearing Set for Proposed Sierra Blanca Ski Area Transfer

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A proposal made by the Mescalero Apache Tribe for the exchange of Reservation land for the Sierra Blanca Ski Area is now under study by the U. S. Forest Service and will be discussed at an open meeting slated for Jan. 22, 9:30 a.m. at the Chaparral Motor Hotel.

Members of a Mescalero Apache delegation approached the New Mexico Congressional Delegation in September 1971 with the proposal for the acquisition of 2,240 acres of the ski area lands.

The proposal stated that the Tribe faced two problems in the proposed expansion of the ski area. 1. "The existing land ownership pattern prevents the Tribe from obtaining funds in the form of grants and loans to finance the expansion. They indicated that unless the Indian development is on Indian trust lands, grant funds through EDA are not available to them."

2. "With both existing summer and proposed winter resort development on Indian trust lands, supervision by two different government agencies, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Forest Service, would be a problem." (The quotes are from a direct environmental statement issued by the Forest Service.)

The lands lie just north of Sierra Blanca Peak and are the highest elevation of lands in the Lincoln National Forest. It is the uppermost reaches of three very important watersheds: The Rio Ruidoso, the North Fork of Eagle Creek, and the North Fork of the Rio Ruidoso, all with headwaters in this 3 1/2 square mile area of land. Buck Mountain, also in the proposed exchange area, has been officially designated as an electronic site, and permits to maintain radio and TV sites have been issued to the State Radio Communications Department and KBIM TV.

ties under the Bonito Watershed Act and the Forest Service notes that intensive watershed management is necessary to maintain the area. According to the statement, "An efficient fire control organization is vital to the protection of important watersheds. Transfer would remove these lands from the protection they now enjoy under Forest Service administration."

Proposals have also been made recently to include the area in the White Mountain Wilderness, which adjoins the proposed transfer area. The University of New Mexico and Colorado State University have proposed the reclassification of approximately 900 acres, included in the transfer area, as a research natural area. Preservation of a stand of the largest Corkbark Fir in the nation was the aim of the request.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe purchased the Sierra Blanca Ski Area in 1963 and operates the area under a 30-year special-use permit issued by the Forest Service. The Forest Service administers more than 200 ski areas on 87 National Forests in the nation and conducts safety inspections of facilities and land management duties on ski areas within their jurisdiction.

Forty-eight persons and groups, including the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, and the Ruidoso Village Council, were consulted in the preparation of the Forest Service statement and the draft statement was distributed to 103 individuals and groups. None of the news media were included in the distribution.

(Editor's Note: The following release was issued Wednesday from the office of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, in reply to the U. S. Forest Service Environmental Statement concerning the exchange of Reservation land for Forest Service land at the Sierra Blanca Ski Area.)

Wendell Chino, President of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, is critical of the U. S. Forest Service's Albuquerque Regional Office advance copies of their environmental impact statement distributed to certain individuals and selected agencies during the past ten days.

Mr. Chino believes that the Forest Service's Environmental Statement with regard to the requested transfer of National Forest lands to the Mescalero Apache Tribe is biased. It appears that the statement has been distributed mainly to Environmental oriented agencies and groups.

Mr. Chino states that "Indians, who are the original Natural Conservationists and Environmentalists are not bothered by this fact."

He further states, "It is inconceivable that a public agency could not be more open-minded and fair-minded prior to a public meeting. However, the Mescalero Apache Tribe appreciates and welcomes the opportunity to respond in detail to the Forest Service's statement at the public hearing scheduled on the matter in Ruidoso, New Mexico on January 22, 1972."

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News 'n Notes

The temperature - whether washing, drying or pressing - is the key for the best care of polyester clothing. When washing polyester, use the warm, not hot, water temperature setting. This way you'll avoid the set-in wrinkles that can occur when too hot water is used.

If you should get set-in wrinkles, try washing the garment again using the same temperature. This seems to relax the fabric enough to release the wrinkle-set condition. Then, remove the garment from the washer immediately after it stops to prevent the wrinkles from being re-set. Tumble drying garments also helps remove wrinkles. Again remove the articles from the dryer immediately after it stops to prevent deep-set wrinkles.

For pressing, keep the temperature low. Set the iron temperature at the synthetic setting to press polyester fabric. If the temperature is over 300 degrees, the fabric will glaze and appear shiny.

As a crisp coating for meat, poultry, or fish—use crushed, unsweetened ready-to-eat cereal flakes, or packaged cereal crumbs in place of bread crumbs or flour. Season crumbs with salt, pepper and your favorite herbs if desired.

Have your apple for the day early. For a delicious new breakfast idea, peel, core and dice an apple. Top with a scoop of cottage cheese and sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Apples are plentiful, says the consumer and Marketing Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Packaged cereal grains that are to be cooked should not be washed, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. To do so removes valuable nutrients, especially the B-vitamins. Except for macaroni products, it is best to cook cereals and rice in just enough water so the water will be completely absorbed.

Environmental Improvements

Michael Richardson, Lincoln County EIA, will answer all questions in this newspaper.

WATER SUPPLIES

Water?? Sometimes in the Ruidoso vicinity it is limited. But, what about the quality and safety factor of the water we drink in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs?

Many diseases are spread by water and in any community the danger of drinking water containing dangerous bacteria is always present. Fortunately in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs this danger is at a minimum. Both towns have well operated filtration systems which purify our water supplies. Besides the filters, the final, clean water is chlorinated. When the chlorine is added in amounts of 1 to 3 parts per million, all bacteria is destroyed, insuring a safe, usable water supply. Samples are taken every month to analyze and determine if the water is free of all bacteria.

There are a number of privately owned wells and water systems in the area which may not be safe. If the well casings are not sealed properly, or as found in the Ruidoso Downs area, septic tanks are located too close to the well, contamination is possible. Mr. Richardson will check construction and water quality of private systems at no charge when requested. When new wells are constructed, he will take samples to determine bacteriological and chemical quality of the water.
If you have a private well, don't take a chance, be safe and have it checked.



All-American Futurity Sale Date Is Told

The 11th annual All-American Futurity Sale at Ruidoso Downs has been set for Aug. 31 through Sept. 3, according to an announcement by Mike Coen, Chairman of the Board of Fortuna Corp. Each of the four sessions—Thursday through Sunday—will begin at 7 p.m. Fortuna Corp. is the owner and operator of both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park. In a recent action by the Board of Directors, Coen was appointed to head a committee to direct the annual sale which is open only to horses eligible for the All-American Futurity. The dates of the 1972 sale, which coincide with Labor Day weekend and the running of the All-American, represent a change from previous procedure when the sale was staged the week before Labor Day. Various details on the sale were ironed out over the weekend in a meeting between Coen and members of the sale com-

mittee. The meeting was held at the M. J. Coen Ranch in Tulsa, Okla. Coen also announced the selection of two sale auctioneers, Ike Hamilton of West Monroe, La., and J. Gordon Hannagan of Penfield, Ill. Another key development at the meeting was the decision to offer special stabling facilities for sale yearlings. According to Coen, the new facilities will afford potential buyers easy opportunity to inspect the sale yearlings. Coen also reported the method of selecting the sale order will be a drawing by consignors' names. The draw will be supervised by the American Quarter Horse Assn. The date and place of the drawing will be announced later. Entry blanks for the 1972 sale will be available in early February. The entry deadline is April 15. In last year's sale, 350 head were consigned. The total gross of \$1,753,375 established a sale record. The upcoming All-American Futurity carries an estimated gross purse of \$910,000. The figure is expected to top the \$1 million mark with the 1973 running.

U.S. Rep. Wilbur Mills, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, is scheduled to speak at a fund-raising dinner for New Mexico Congressman Harold Rannels in Hobbs on Jan. 27. The \$100 stag or couple dinner will be at the Hobbs Holiday Inn, beginning with a reception at 6:30 p.m. and followed by a banquet at 7:30. Harry Eaves, a Hobbs businessman who is chairman of the event, said tickets have been distributed throughout the 18-county Second District and that he expects at least 300 of them to be sold. Fincher Neal, a Hobbs attorney, will be master of ceremonies for the dinner which has been planned to raise funds for Rannels' 1972 campaign. Joining Mills and Rannels at the dinner will be U. S. Senator Joseph M. Montoya, D-NM; New Mexico Governor Bruce King; and other elected state officials. Rep. Mills, an Arkansas Democrat, has been in the Congress for more than 30 years and is considered one of the most influential members on Capitol Hill. He has been mentioned as possible presidential candidate this year.

Aliens Must Report Addresses In January

Howard L. Adams, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, El Paso, reminded today that the annual alien address report program is again underway. "Federal law requires all non-citizens in the United States, with a few special exceptions, to report their addresses during the month of January each year. This is true even though the alien's address is unchanged since the last report. Willful failure to comply with this requirement could result in serious consequences." Forms on which to make the reports are available at all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and at post offices. Trained personnel in all offices of the Immigration Service are available to assist aliens. In complying with the law and there is also a volunteer group assisting aliens to fill out their alien address report cards free of charge in the lobby of the main post office station located at 219 Mills St., El Paso, Texas. "It is easy for an alien to comply with these requirements," the immigration official pointed out. "The forms are relatively easy to fill out; the parent or legal guardian of an alien child under 14 years of age must fill out the form for the child, and a person who is ill may send for a form by a friend or relative who can return it to the post office or immigration office after it has been completed by the alien."

On-the-Job Training Urged For Veterans

In support of President Nixon's effort to increase employment opportunities for returning Vietnam veterans, the Veterans Administration five months ago launched a nationwide effort to generate employer interest to create new jobs.

Donald E. Crow, Director of the Albuquerque Regional Office said employer response in New Mexico has been most favorable as more than 300 on-the-job training situations in business establishments have recently been developed.

Since mid-July, VA representatives have been contacting employers of all sizes throughout the state urging and helping them to develop training situations. Personal letters have been sent to over 800 New Mexico employers asking them to focus extra efforts in planning and developing job training opportunities. On-the-job training programs must meet certain requirements under the GI Bill and must be approved by the appropriate State Approving Agency. Basically, the training program may not be less than six months, nor more than 24 months. Beginning wages should be at least half of the Journeyman target wage in the area and are to be increased periodically until the veteran is earning at least 85% of the target wage by his last month of training. Approved programs provide a special incentive to veterans wanting to learn a new skill. In addition, veteran trainees receive a monthly allowance from the VA to supplement their trainee wages and increase their financial security and stability during the training program.

As examples, Crow said, the Associated General Contractors of New Mexico, in coordination with the Bureau of Public Roads, Federal Highway Administration, and the Department of Transportation, have designed a program to train operating personnel in 29 different objectives. General Contractors are expected to have approximately 73 jobs this year under the program. The Police Department of Albuquerque also placed about fifteen veterans in training this year.

Although general interest by employers is increasing almost daily, Crow said those who need additional information on placing veterans in on-the-job training situations or in an apprenticeship training program established by the Department of Labor should contact the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Albuquerque.

Estimate Income Deadline Monday

The deadline for final payment of 1971 estimated Federal income tax is Monday, Jan. 17, 1972, Maurice E. Johnson, District Director of Internal Revenue for New Mexico said today.

Some persons may have to make an amended estimate by Jan. 17 if their income changed substantially during the last quarter of 1971. Space to compute an amended estimate is provided on the worksheet contained in the estimated tax package received by taxpayers for 1971.

Other taxpayers may have to file an original 1971 declaration on Form 1040-ES by Jan. 17 if they just met the filing requirements during the fourth quarter, according to Johnson.

Payment of the last installment or the filing of an original or amended declaration otherwise due Jan. 17 is not required if the taxpayer files his 1971 income tax return and pays all of the tax due by Jan. 31, 1972.

Due dates are different for farmers and commercial fishermen, Johnson said. Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," furnishes additional information on this subject and may be obtained free, in person or by mail, from your IRS district office.

Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES
The Democratic legislature will battle over spending, a \$12.5 million boost in state support for public schools, a modified no-fault insurance plan, an 87-page drug abuse bill, no less than 50 tax bills and a State License Department housekeeping proposal in a 30 day session opening Tuesday, Jan. 18.
Gov. Bruce King will send a \$291-million proposed fiscal 1973 state general fund budget to the 112 lawmakers. King will also seek approval for \$8 million in capital improvements.
Other highly controversial topics will demand much time from legislators — a \$8.519-million truck tax-fee bill and a piping hot land use control measure. Gov. King will propose a land use control law geared to requiring developers to guarantee potable water is available to purchasers.
The powerful Legislative Finance Committee sponsors the truck tax-fee bill that would generate \$6.515 million more revenue a year for highways. The New Mexico motor carrier industry is shaping its own proposal to counter the LFC proposal. The truck tax-fee fight will be a steaming scrap.
Amid the rash of subjects legislative reapportionment will underlie the course of the entire session. Legislators are divided over handling the gut reapportionment issue in the constitutional 30-day session or in a special session immediately afterward.
Gov. King prefers a special session. The 1971 House and Senate reapportionment laws were declared invalid Nov. 22 by District Judge Edwin Felter of Santa Fe. Judge Felter said the sticky subject back to lawmakers for another try.
The state's money position is favorable as the lawmaking session arrives. A \$20 million-plus state general fund balance is forecast June 30, end of the current fiscal year.
Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, is Drug Abuse Committee chairman. The panel recommended milder penalties for first time marijuana users and stiffer penalties for drug sellers.
Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, is LFC vice chairman. The LFC met early this week on a dozen bills it will sponsor, including the embattled truck tax-fee proposal.
The Legislative Tax Study Committee finally sent all of the 50 tax bills it aired to the full legislature. The 13-member panel approved 9 bills, rejected 19 and reported 17 without recommendation. Most attempt to erase inequities instead of raising taxes.
In this basket full of legislation probably the most controversial is a bill to tax mobile homes with the ad valorem levy in the same manner as permanent residences.
Tax Study Committee members include Sen. Finis Leroy Heidel, D-Lovington, the vice chairman, and Rep. Robert E. Johnson, R-Clovis.
Sen. Trujillo dropped his efforts to defeat Sen. I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra, for Senate president pro tem. Senate Democrats will choose a president pro tem at a party caucus Monday to replace retired R. C. (Ike) Morgan, D-Curry-Roosevelt.
Sen. Robert Wood, 39, Fortales banker, Morgan's successor in the Senate, was assigned to the Senate Rules and Education Committees. Wood is a Democrat.
The Tourist Division of the State Department of Development submitted a preliminary

application to the Four Corners Regional Commission for a \$1 million project to restore the historical town of Lincoln in Lincoln County.
State Tourist Director Fabian Chavez said the goal is development into a major tourist attraction. Federal money would pay 80 per cent of costs. The state's share would be 20 per cent.
Chavez said the \$1 million would finance: Rebuilding of the famed McSweeney house on its original site; restoration of the Torreon, a rock fort; restoration of a convent; major improvements of the Billy the Kid pageant grounds; refurbishing of an old school building for use for group meetings, assemblies, movie showings and a supplement to the museum in the Old Lincoln County Courthouse.
Also planned is a bypass highway off present US-380 for truck and other "through" traffic to free US-380 in Lincoln for pedestrian movement. The old courthouse, museum, state-operated Wortley Hotel and other attractions are on US-380.
Mrs. Dessie Sawyer, Crossroads, Lea County, is longtime chairman of the Lincoln County Memorial Commission. She is also Democratic national committeewoman. Chavez says attorney-author Will Keleher of Albuquerque suggested the Lincoln restoration project. Fabian says Arthur Ortiz of the Four Corners Regional Commission asked for a detailed application from the state on the project. Lincoln County is in the Four-Corners Regional Commission's designated area.
The commission is especially interested in encouraging private tourist-related businesses—hotels, restaurants, bars and service stations—in the Lincoln area, Chavez says.
Gov. King reappointed Dr. Girard Landry, Dering physician, to a 5-year term on the State Hospitals - Institutions Board, subject to Senate confirmation in the legislative session.
Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, predicted the \$20 million state general fund surplus "will disappear real fast" in the legislative session. Carbajal says: "Schools, health and social services will take the lion's share of it."
Rep. Carbajal says: "I will not vote to increase any spending except increases for the state executive agencies." An insurance agent and chairman of the Corporations-Banks Committee, Carbajal will handle no-fault insurance legislation if it clears the Senate. He opposes the bill in present form.

Changes Are Noted In Immunization For School Students
The State Board of Health and Social Services has amended its regulations on the immunization of children entering school. Smallpox vaccination will no longer be mandatory but requirements for immunization for measles and Rubella—the light, short form of measles—have been added.
Another important change, according to Dr. Nancy McCaig, chief of the HSSD Preventive Medicine Section, is the redefinition of "school." Immunization requirements now apply to all children in Early Childhood Education facilities under the State Department of Education and all those in preschool and day care centers licensed by HSSD. Regulations still apply to pupils in public, private or parochial elementary and secondary schools.
Dr. McCaig said the reason for discontinuing smallpox vaccinations is the startling success of the World Health Organization's fight against the disease. Nearly all countries in the world reported no smallpox cases as late as the early 1960's. Now smallpox appears only in India and the surrounding countries and in a few African nations.
Death from complications following vaccination is another reason for dropping the smallpox requirement. An average of seven to nine deaths from complications occur annually in the United States.
WHO predicts that smallpox will completely disappear from the world in five to seven years. The U. S. Foreign Quarantine Service will continue to require proof of vaccination from travelers returning from areas where there are still smallpox cases.
Dr. McCaig explained that the addition of measles to the required immunization for diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus and polio results from a nationwide upsurge

The Roswell Social Security Office, along with social security offices in 850 communities around the country, has been appointed by Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, Elliot L. Richardson to serve as a local center to receive complaints about substandard conditions in nursing homes.
Persons who have information about instances of poor quality care, neglect, unsanitary, or unsafe conditions in a nursing home may give that information to the nearest social security office in person, or by letter or phone. If desired, the name of the person making the complaint and the name of the nursing home patient will be kept confidential. Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative for this area noted.
The social security office will see that the complaint gets to the proper Federal, State, or local authority for investigation.



Pension Report Due By Veterans

The Veterans Administration again reminds veterans and dependents receiving VA pension checks that they have until Jan. 15 to return the income questionnaire which they received with their check on Nov. 1, 1971. Several hundred have not been returned and they must be if payments are to continue in 1972.

Donald E. Crow, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Albuquerque, explained that the Jan. 15 deadline applies to those veterans who are totally and permanently disabled by disease or injuries not connected with their military service, and to wartime veterans' widows who draw pension from the Veterans Administration if they have limited incomes.

In addition, certain parents of deceased veterans who receive

benefits are required to return income and dependency questionnaires. Since the amount of payment is related to income, the law requires beneficiaries to report their annual income to the Veterans Administration to determine the amount to which they are entitled during 1972.

Crow did say, however, those who did not receive a questionnaire this year should not be concerned since a recent law does not require a report from those 72 years of age or older, and who have been receiving benefits for two consecutive years, unless an income could affect their VA payment.

Information and assistance in completing questionnaires is available at the nearest Veterans Administration office. The Albuquerque Veterans Administration office is located at 503 Gold Ave., S. W.

A NEW LOOK AT MOVING EXPENSES

If you were transferred by your company or if you moved to take a new job, you may be able to deduct many of your moving expenses, which were not reimbursed by your employer, according to H & R Block, America's Largest Tax Service.

Under pre-1970 law you could deduct the cost of moving your household goods and your family if the distance between your new place of business and your old residence was 20 miles greater than the distance between your old place of business and your old residence, and if you worked in the new area for at least 39 weeks (the 39 week rule may be waived if your employer transfers you sooner). The deduction was not available to self-employed persons.

The new law has expanded the distance to 50 miles and now includes self-employed persons (self-employed persons must work 78 weeks in the new area, at least 39 of which are in the first 12 months).

In addition to those items which were deductible in the past, persons shifting their place of work can now deduct (1) travel, meals and lodging expenses for pre-move house-hunting trips; (2) expenses of meals and lodging near the new job location for up to 30 days; (3) expenses related to the sale or settlement of a lease on the old residence or the purchase of lease of a new one.

The deduction allowed for these three additional categories is limited to \$2500, with expenses for house-hunting and temporary living limited to \$1,000 of the total. Any reimbursement must be included in your gross income before the expenses can be deducted.

According to H & R Block, these changes could generate some confusion in the mind of the taxpayer. If there is any doubt as to what is and what is not deductible as a moving expense, professional advice should be sought on your tax return.

Carlsbad Caverns Sets All-Time Record

Travel to Carlsbad Caverns National Park reached an all-time high in 1971 according to a statement made by Park Superintendent Donald Dayton. New records were set for 7 months of the year, and the yearly total exceeded the old record by more than 78,000. The 1971 total was 791,634 visits, the greatest number for any single year since the Park was opened in 1923.
