Tuesday, Feb. 1, is the one and only day political aspirants have to file for the municipal office they seek. Filing must be done before 5:00 p.m. at the Ruidoso Municipal Building. 

Apaches Answer Forest Statement

The Mescalero Apache Tribe has issued a "Clarification Statement" in response to the recently issued U. S. D. A. Forest Service Environmental Statement concerning the transfer of National Forest lands to the Mescalero Apache Tribe. The statement was prepared by the Tribe and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The report outlined improvements made in the past several years in recreational and land management by the Tribe and noted that resources on the Reservation were maintained in as good or better conditions than those under the care of the U. S. Forest Service. Over 180,000 man days of recreation use are being provided, annually on Reservation lands alone. This figure does not include the Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

The suggested Sierra Blanca Ski Area development plan for the enlargement of ski facilities would be developed in conjunction with the Cieneguita project. Projections for use of the ski area show an increase by 1980 of at least 200,000 man days of skiing and as high as 300,000 man days use. Total cost of construction for the development would amount to approximately \$4 million. The Tribe maintains that, under the present land-use permit, financing for the expansion is impossible to find. With the land under the Department of Interior, in trust, funds would be readily available.

would not be reduced through this exchange since land of equal value and impact would be traded in the proposed exchange.

"We do not feel that the White Mountain Wilderness Area would be endangered by this exchange. The sight of a distant chair lift blending into avalanche trails landscape seems minor compared to the unsightly communications towers, powerlines, and access roads on Buck Mountain now permitted by the USFS."

Lack of space does not permit the complete text of the statement, but a copy of the report is available at the office of the Ruidoso News and those wishing to read the complete report may do so at this office.

We would not presume to tell our readers what decision they should make on the proposed exchange but we would encourage them to study the matter and be well informed before a decision is made. A public meeting will be held at the Chaparral Motor Hotel at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 22 where questions will be answered and interested parties will be given an opportunity to express their views.

Adults Needed For Ski Program Transportation

The Ruidoso school ski program will begin Tuesday, Jan. 25 and continue through Feb. 29 for students interested in learning to ski or wishing to advance their skiing ability. Transportation will be provided by local residents who will be allowed to ski at the school rate if they carry as many as four students to the ski area. Anyone wishing to ski on Tuesday is urged to help with the program.

Students participating in the program will be dismissed from classes at 11:42 a.m. each Tuesday and meet on the parking lots at the high school and Nob Hill school, where those adults wishing to take advantage of the reduced ski rates will pick them up.

Students not participating in the ski program will remain in classes for the school day. Equipment may be rented at downtown ski shops for \$1.00, or all equipment and lift tickets will be \$3.00 at the ski area. Only two afternoons of free instruction will be furnished for those skiers who have not skied before.

A release from liability for accidents, signed by parents, will be required for students.

Water Rights Assured

Mescalero Apache Indian Tribal authorities told the Ruidoso Village Council, in a special called meeting with the council, "We have never planned or proposed any changes in the water from the Rio Ruidoso."

The special meeting, called by Ruidoso Mayor Pro-Tem Elmer Pirelli, was scheduled to give the Mescalero Apache leaders an opportunity to express their position regarding the water rights involved in their proposal to acquire 2,240 acres of Lincoln National Forest land.

Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council, told the Ruidoso governing body and the large gathering of Ruidoso area business and professional men, "Your interests are our interests." The tribal chief also stated, "We have no intentions of not respecting anyone's water rights any more than we would not respect our own water rights."

Chino assured those in attendance that all water rights affecting the Ruidoso Area and the Hondo Valley would be legally protected in writing.

Following a presentation, including a question and answer session involving most of those in attendance, the council voted unanimously, completely favoring the exchange of lands to the Mescaleros.

The council previously, Thursday, Jan. 13, instructed the Village Clerk to inform the U. S. D. A. Forest Service of their objection to the exchange of lands based upon the information available then.

Mayor pro-tem Pirelli told the Mescalero Apache delegation, "Our main concern is in regards to the water. It's the village water rights that seriously concerned us." Referring to the proposed exchange of land to the Mescaleros to assist them in expanding the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, Pirelli stated, "We are completely in accord and favor of the proposed expansion." Several Ruidoso area businessmen voiced their approval of the Tribe's expansion program for the ski area, calling

attention to the favorable economic impact on the entire area. It was noted that on December 28, 2,800 skiers were registered at the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

Chino and the delegation of Mescalero Apache administrative officials addressed the council also to refute certain statements recently released in a 40-page draft prepared by the U. S. D. A. Forest Service, Albuquerque.

The prepared draft, "A Draft Environmental Statement", concerned the Forest Service position on the proposed exchange of lands between the U. S. Department of Interior to be held in trust for the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

The Forest Service reportedly questioned the compatibility of the transfer and the ability of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, under the supervision of the Department of Interior, to manage the lands.

Officials of the tribe refuted the suggestions of the Forest Service both through a printed Clarification Statement and during the special session with the Ruidoso Council Monday night.

Joe Otero, Mescalero Apache Tribal Council Superintendent and former BIA employee, stated, "We have the same responsibility as the Forest Service to protect the land." It was noted that the same rules and regulations that govern the Forest Service also govern the Department of Interior and hence the land in trust to the Tribe.

The Tribal office on Wednesday that it was not financial, land grants or give-away that they were requesting in their proposal to the Forest Service—but an exchange of lands to make it possible for the tribe to secure a loan for the much needed ski expansion program. It is reportedly not an outright transfer of lands as a gift but rather an exchange of lands with the Forest Service selecting its choice for the exchange. The Mescalero Apache Tribe will then purchase the selected land and the Forest Service will add it to the National Forest system.

Hine; Mescalero Apache officials Fred Heckman, Tribal Department of Development; Roy Parker, Sierra Blanca Ski Resort manager; Joe Otero, Superintendent for the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council; Tom Jones, president of the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association; Dick Mound, president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce; Jim Tully, representing the Rio Ruidoso Farmer's Water Users Association, and Sam Nunnally, Ruidoso fire department chief.



They must have a junior or senior class standing, a 2.75 overall grade average and be in the upper 20 percent of the class scholastically. Interdisciplinary membership is limited to 35 members per campus.

STATE SENATOR JOHN E. CONWAY

The second session of the 30th Legislature convened at high noon on Tuesday, Jan. 18. There has been much speculation about what will be contained in the Governor's message, and as to what matters, other than finance, the Legislature will consider this Session. I am sure that there will be some environmental legislation introduced, and probably a subdivision bill. I know that subdivision regulations are of considerable interest to the people of Lincoln County, and I will try to keep you informed of the progress at this Session. At the last Session a reapportionment bill was passed which has since been declared unconstitutional by the District Court in Santa Fe. A special committee of twelve members of the House and Senate has been considering a new reapportionment bill. I was fortunate enough to be appointed to this committee, and a bill to the Senate, and two bills to the House have been drafted. These bills were drafted by the Legislative Council, which has access to the population figures of each of the precincts.

Several years ago the Supreme Court of the United States announced the one man one vote rule. State Legislatures now have to apportion each house according to population, and most Courts are requiring a plus or minus 5% deviation. This is what the Legislative Council was working toward with a 42-member Senate and 70-member House, the same as we have now.

Under the Senate plan, Lincoln and Otero Counties combined would have two Senators. At the present time, the two Counties are represented by myself and Senator Dunn of Alamogordo, who ran at large in the two Counties. Under the new reapportionment plan, there would be two districts within the two counties, Lincoln County and several Otero County precincts composing one district, and the balance of Otero County being the second district. Each district under the 42-member Senate plan has to have approximately 24,000 people. The last census showed Lincoln County to have 7,569 people, so approximately 16,500 people from Otero County will be in the same district with Lincoln County. As this bill progresses, I will keep you informed.

The House plan is considerably different and presents a great number of problems for us. In a 70-member House, each District, to be ideal, should have 14,514 people. Under one plan Lincoln County is represented by three representatives, and under the other plan by two representatives.

The first plan has one representative representing all of Catron and Socorro Counties, Bennett's Indian Shop, west on and precincts 2, 3, 4 and 12 of

Lincoln County, another representative from Guadalupe, Torrance and DeBaca Counties, and precincts 1, 5, 16 and 17 of Lincoln County, and a third representative with precincts 11, 13, 14, 15 of Lincoln County and that part of Otero County which is now represented by Representative John Mershon of Clarendon. Representative Ralph Petty of Ruidoso is in this third district. Representative Leo O. Coker of Datil, lives in the first proposed district, and Representative John Bigbee of Encino lives in the second proposed district. Both are Republicans. Under the second plan, most of the area now represented by Representative Maurice Hobson, a Republican of Alamogordo, and Lincoln County precincts 2, 3, 4, 11 and 12, would comprise one district and all of Torrance and Guadalupe Counties, plus Lincoln County precincts 1, 5, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 would be a second district. Both Representatives Bigbee and Petty live in this proposed second district. I am against dividing up the County. I wish we could go back to the old days where every County had at least one representative and one senator, but the Supreme Court rule has done away with that. Now we are guided by simply getting the right number of people regardless of County lines, where these people might live, or what they may all have in common. It is one heck of a mess and is going to be extremely difficult to work out.

As I did last year, I will make every effort to be home every weekend so that I can meet with anyone who wants to discuss legislation. My address will be: Senator John E. Conway, New Mexico Senate, State Capital Building, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501. During the session we have the use of a WATS line, so I can call any of you who want to talk with me. If you will call my office in Ruidoso, 257-4678, or Alamogordo, 437-1840, they will give me your number and I will call you. If any of you will be coming to Santa Fe, please let me know and I will make every effort to meet with you and have you as my guest in the Senate.


I meant to write about our snow, but I find words are not adequate. Then, again, it is just an everyday thing with those of you who have spent many winters here.

Health Services Posting Required

Maurice E. Johnson, District Director of Internal Revenue, today advised that Price Commission Regulations now require all institutional and non-institutional health providers to maintain in each of their facilities a schedule showing base prices for their principal services and any change in such prices. The schedule shall be made available for public inspection and a copy shall be furnished to the Internal Revenue Service on request. Each provider must post a sign in a prominent place in each facility stating the availability and location of the schedule. No price may be increased before the sign is posted and the schedule is made available. All providers' general cost and price increases will be monitored with the assistance of health insurers to assure consistency with the guidelines.

No provider of health service shall adopt any changes in charging practices, reduction in the quality or quantity of service, or any other practices for the purpose of avoiding compliance with the provisions set forth in the Price Regulations.

Your Social Security

Starting Jan. 1, the deductible under the Medicare hospital insurance program was increased to \$68, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative.

"This means that the Medicare patient admitted to the hospital since Dec. 31 is now responsible for the first \$68 of the hospital bill. The \$8 increase in the deductible is the result of a review of hospital costs during 1970," Mrs. Graves said.

Under the Medicare law, the deductible must be adjusted to keep the amount in line with the average cost of one day's stay in the hospital.

Because of the increase in hospital costs, three other increases in the amount patients pay under the Medicare hospital insurance program are required, beginning this month.

For hospital stays of more than 60 days, she said, the Medicare patient will pay \$17 a day, instead of \$15, for the 61st thru the 90th day.

For a post-hospital stay of more than 20 days in a skilled nursing home, the patient will pay \$8.50 a day, instead of \$7.50, for the 21st through the 100th day.

For "lifetime reserve", the patient will pay \$34 instead of \$30, for each day used.



County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

Biological conditions make a rat control program more effective in the winter. The reproduction rate of rats is slower in winter, and second, there is usually a shortage of food. Also, starving rats die from diseases, and fourth, hungry predators prey on them.

To take advantage of these conditions, start with a thorough clean-up program to eliminate shelter and food for rats. Rats will seek shelter in implement storage areas that have dense weed growth. They like wood and trash piles and old sheds that are not frequently used. Such places should be cleaned up and sheds repaired or destroyed. Buildings that are used for storage of feed or grain should be rat-proofed by sealing all entrances except doors and windows with hardware, cloth or metal flashing.

Clean up sources of food such as spilled grain, livestock feed and pet food. Grain and feed in sacks should be placed on racks at least six inches off the floor to discourage rats from nesting in and around them.

Here are some hints for keeping your place free from rats:
Fix any leaky faucets and other sources of water around grain storage areas.

After the clean-up and repair program, set up bait stations in all areas where rats are likely to roam. Baiting is only effective if most other sources of food have been eliminated and if the bait stations are continually supplied with bait.

The anticoagulant baits are very effective and are less hazardous to use than arsenic, strychnine, phosphorus, and other highly toxic poisons. However, a good supply of bait must be kept available to the rats for at least two weeks and preferably longer. Water baits of anticoagulants can also be used especially where it is impossible to eliminate a food supply.

Ready-mixed baits containing warfarin, Fumaryl, diphacinone, Pival, FMP, or Frolin (warfarin plus sulquinoxaline) are available under many trade names. They are all equally effective against roof rats, Norway rats, and mice.

Place the bait and some water under a cover of some type to keep pets and livestock from getting to it. A wooden box with small openings at each end and a hinged lid is ideal. Place your bait station where there are signs of rat activity or where rats might be attracted. Check your bait stations every afternoon for the first few days of your baiting program to see if enough bait is being put out and see if it is being taken. If the bait is all gone, then you should increase the amount at that station. If no activity is evident at a bait station and you know there are rats in the area, then you may need to change the location of the station.

Rats often avoid new types of food if they are happy with what they are finding. If a bait is not being accepted, then change to a bait that is similar to what they might be feeding on or use water-bait if other sources of water are not available.

Tax News

Get Tax-Free Money
While You're Sick

If the flu bug bedded you for a few weeks before the end of 1971, don't worry. If your employer kept you on the payroll you have the sympathy of the Internal Revenue Service.

A little-known and frequently overlooked tax rule can make your illness almost enjoyable. H & R Block, America's Largest Tax Service says you may be able to deduct all or part of your salary from your taxable income. It works this way: If you receive 75% or less of your regular weekly salary, you can deduct up to \$76 of this pay after the first week of illness (if hospitalized for one day, the first week's waiting period is waived). After 30 days of being absent from work, the weekly \$76 exclusion climbs to as high as \$100.

If your boss thinks enough of you to keep you on full pay or more than 75% of it, you can claim a \$100 per week exclusion, but only after you've been off the job for 30 days or more. In either case, warn H & R Block, you must file Form 2449 along with your tax return, in order to support your claim for a sick pay exclusion. Form 2449 requires a detailed statement of how long you were ill and the exact amount of wages you received during that period. This amount must be included on your Form W-2 (withholding statements) as part of your total taxable earnings. Double check your W-2 to make sure it was included; otherwise the Internal Revenue Service will be most sympathetic and your sick pay exclusion will be disallowed.

Inside The Capital

SANTA FE - The Legislative School Study Committee dropped a bombshell a few days before the opening of the 30-day lawmaking session this week.
 The interim panel, headed by Rep. David Salman, D-Union-Mora - Harding, proposed to move all local property taxes collected for public schools to the state level for redistribution on a per pupil basis.
 The move would reduce revenue \$230,808 to Jal Public Schools and cut Eunice Public Schools income \$248,295. Other school districts with high property valuations because of oil and gas industry development would also be hurt.
 The LSSC endorsed a uniform assessment of 12 mills for public schools for the 99 New Mexico districts. Revenue would be deposited in the state general fund. It would be allotted to school districts on the basis of the proportion of the 40-day average daily enrollment in each district bears to the state total.
 The current average property tax levy for public school operations is 11.15 mills. Gov. Bruce King was disturbed because the LSSC acted on the proposal without consulting him. King conferred later with Sal-

man, who is also House majority leader.
 The 1971 plan, invalidated by Santa Fe District Court, created a House district of Belen. The major proposal relates to a key California court decision in 1971. The court said in effect local property tax assessments retained in local districts to finance public schools created unconstitutional inequities. The ISSC bill was expected to be a top battleground in the legislative session.
 The LSSC also was set to sponsor legislation permitting year-around operation of public schools. Rep. Salmon said Los Lunas and Roswell schools are considering this move.
 Gov. King appointed Lesta Burdett as Lea County magistrate at Eunice, succeeding the late Faugh H. Bowden. A Eunice native, Burdett is a theater operator. He is a retired Navy chief warrant officer.
 Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, favors preserving his House district in the form in 1971 legislation in new reapportionment plans. The legislature will tackle thorny legislative reapportionment in the constitutional 30-day session or a special session afterward.
 Adelina, Rio Grande Estates, Los Trujillos, Parales, Bosque and Casa Colorado in Valencia County and LaJoya in Socorro County. The population of 13,416 is 6.24 per cent below the norm or ideal population of 14,310 for a House district in a 70-member House.
 A special legislative reapportionment committee received proposed Senate and House plans late last week from the Legislative Council Service staff. No action was taken. The panel was set to meet again this week. Special committee members include Sen. John Conway, R-Lincoln-Otero, and Reps. George Blocker, D-Jal, and Robert Johnson, R-Clovis.
 A plan based on estimated precinct populations place Rep. Blocker, senior House member in service, in a Lea County district with 15,034 population. This is 3.58 per cent above the norm.
 The proposed district spans Eunice, Jal, Oil Center and five Hobbs precincts. The deviation limit from the norm is 5 per cent in the new plans.
 An insurance agent, Rep. Carbajal says the Insurance Regulation Study Committee should be continued and no-fault insurance should be studied another year. Rep. Alvin E. Castillo, D-Cofax County, is committee vice chairman.
 The interim insurance committee shaped a bill for the new legislative session that is a major step toward a modified no-fault insurance plan. Under no-fault insurance a policyholder's insurance company pays his claim regardless of responsibility for a traffic accident.

 Deadline for employers to give employees their 1971 W-2 forms is Monday, Jan. 31, 1972, Maurice E. Johnson, District Director of Internal Revenue for New Mexico, said today. The form should show earnings, income tax withheld, and Social Security information.
 A W-2 form from each employer has to be filed by the employee with his income tax return. Therefore, it is important that employers furnish their employees by the date required to permit timely preparation and filing of employees' tax returns.
 A penalty may be charged an employer for each late W-2 he sends out.
