



Candidates File For March 5 Village Elections

Four incumbents were among those who filed for election to the eight offices up for grabs in the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs municipal elections which will take place March 5. The incumbents include Mayor Jake Harris, Trustee Albert Richardson and Judge Driscoll West of Ruidoso Downs and Judge Sam Nunnally of Ruidoso. These four are among the 24 residents who filed for election to the mayorship, two council seats and municipal judgeship of the two adjacent villages. Of the eight offices, the two judges will be unopposed. In Ruidoso, Earl Allison was first to announce and file for mayor Tuesday morning. Allison is completing a four year term as a Trustee on the Ruidoso council, his first public office. Also a candidate for mayor is Lloyd L. Davis, Jr. Davis, like Allison, a resident of Ruidoso since childhood, is trying to regain the mayor seat after serving two terms as mayor in the late '60s with four years service as a trustee prior to that. Davis was narrowly defeated in his bid for mayor in 1972 by the outgoing mayor, Leon Farrar. Also on the ticket for the top spot is W. C. "Bill" Porter. Porter, a native of Silver City and three-year resident of Ruidoso, is making his first bid for public office. Leading the list of nine candidates for the two trustee seats on the Ruidoso council is George P. White. White served as mayor from 1970-72 and came in second to Nunnally for municipal judge last election. White is the only former Ruidoso office-holder among those filing, which includes L. C. "Cowboy" Stokes, Don Driver, Larry C. Daniels, Wyman B. Scarborough, Richard J. McEnany, Raymond A. Crawford, George E. Jones and Sherman Atwood. The mayor's race in Ruidoso Downs pits the incumbent Mayor or Jake Harris against former mayor J. J. DiPaolo and Norman Wheeler. Harris is completing his first term as mayor after serving as a trustee on the council. DiPaolo served one term as mayor of Ruidoso Downs from 1968-70. Wheeler came in third in the trustee balloting in the 1972 election. Albert Richardson, completing his first appointive term, is seeking election to that seat. Ken Geaslin, currently holding the other seat up for election, is not filing for office. The other candidates to file for the two seats include Warren Carpenter, Noel Mullins, "Nick" Nicholich, Wayne Wanzel, George Romero and Gary Virden. Capitan had seven candidates file for seats on the council, mayor and municipal judge. Mayor J. Johnston is unopposed for re-election to that post. Incumbent Norman Renfro leads the list of three seeking four-year terms on the council. Included on that list is Virgil Hall, Jr. and Valton Hall. Chuck Pankey is unopposed in his bid for the two-year seat on the Capitan council. Dorothy Johnston is opposing the incumbent municipal judge, Mrs. Gertrude Huey for election to that position.

Ruidoso Downs Council Schedules Meet With State Finance Dept.

The Ruidoso Downs Village Council agreed last Monday evening to leave the final decision concerning the investment of funds from the Sewer Bond issue to the State Department of Finance and will ask for a meeting with their representative at the earliest date possible. Trustee Ken Geaslin presented a motion to call for sealed quotations from the three county banks for interest to be paid on two certificates of deposit, in the amount of \$100,000 and one for \$69,731.38 but the motion and second were withdrawn after Mayor Jake Harris refused to call a vote until the opinion of the Finance Department was heard. Harris had previously read a letter from Attorney Jack Whorton advising the council to present the matter to the District Court for a decision. Both trustees Ken Geaslin and George Hancock noted that the village was in no way bound by the call for bids and that the move was made to expedite the matter after a decision by the Department of Finance. Considerable discussion was held before moving on to the next item on the agenda. Mayor Harris appointed Jack Whorton of Alamogordo as village attorney and he was approved by a vote of 3 to 1. It was then moved that Whorton be contracted to serve as the official attorney on the sewer project, according to law. Hancock noted that he felt that the signing of a four year contract would be illegal with council elections slated for next month, and that the contract should be on a temporary basis until after the election. The phrase "according to law" was added to cover the objection and the motion passed with two yes votes, one no and one abstention. The council approved election officials for the March 5 municipal election and heard a letter from Ruidoso Village Manager Jim Hine requesting assistance in cleaning refuse from the road to the land fill. Harris suggested that the cost of clean-up be shared on a pro-rata basis according to population and noted that a letter would be sent with the suggestion. An audit of banking procedures by Dean and Mound was approved. A visitor to the meeting asked about a building inspector for the village and it was noted that such an inspector is required to have a contractor's license and that none, in the

Voter Residency Regs. Relaxed

Voter registration officials at the Ruidoso Municipal Building were informed last week that residency requirements for voting in all elections in New Mexico had been changed this year. Under the new requirements, a voter need only be a resident in any area for 30 days preceding the election and reach the age of 18 on or before the day of the election. Any voter who is a resident of Ruidoso or Ruidoso Downs on the registration deadline Monday, properly registered, is eligible to vote in the election regardless of county or state residency, which no longer stands.

Seven Candidates File For Capitan Offices

Seven candidates filed for the village's March 5 general elections, Doris Engleking, village clerk said. Of the seven, two applied for the municipal judge position, four for council and one for mayor. Village council candidates included Norman Renfro, Valton Hall, Virgil Hall, Jr., and Chuck Pankey. Mayor Jay T. Johnston is unopposed. Dorothy Johnston and Gertrude Huey applied for the municipal judge's seat. Mayor Johnston said today, "There have been approximately 100 new water meters hooked-up installed and six new businesses started in his two years in office" and he feels there is much to be done since Capitan is growing so fast. It has been a good year. The village has \$300,000 to spend on the improvement of the water system; \$100,000 is state grant and \$200,000 voted general obligation bonds. There will be a new filter and chlorination plant installed and a 200,000 gallon steel storage tank placed on Three-mile Hill, operating by gravity. Besides the water improvement, \$15,000 has been allocated for a new village park. 

The big food news of two weeks ago was the startling announcement by Bill O. Mead, chairman of the American Bakers' Association, that a loaf of bread would cost one dollar by May of this year. Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz said in Washington on Jan. 11 in a news conference that Mr. Mead "perpetrated a hoax on consumers" with his scare tactics. For bread to hit one dollar a loaf by May, wheat prices would have to move up to \$33.00 a bushel.

Secretary Butz called on Mr. Mead to "tell consumers the truth about bread." He said the average retail price of a 1 1/2 pound loaf of bread is about 47 cents and that the farm value of wheat in that size loaf is just over 7 cents. Other costs and profits accounts for the remaining 40 cents, he said. Mr. Butz said further, "Maybe these 40 cents of other non-wheat costs and profits are going up by May; if so, say so. Don't lay all the blame on wheat for your increased costs - that's unrealistic." It will be interesting to see what happens to this latest "crisis" for the American consumer.

## County Agent's Column

Marek, Eddy County Extension agent for New Mexico State University, says, "To me this letter tells of the greatness of the 4-H program in developing today's youth, who in turn, appreciate and have concern for those who helped them build a better life." The letter is written to Mrs. Grace Bowman, Eddy County, a former 4-H club leader of Mrs. Estrella (Garcia) Flores, now of Ruidoso. It speaks for itself.

Surprised to hear from me? I was going through my closet, giving my house a good spring cleaning. I came upon my 4-H record books and I started thinking back to all the fun and hard work Grace, Carol, you and I put into 4-H club work. (Agent's Note: Grace and Carol are Mrs. Bowman's daughters.) **Plan Your Garden Now**  
Now is the time to plan your garden, even if you live in the cooler parts of Lincoln County. Plan your garden on paper, taking into consideration the particular tastes of your family, the space available, whether produce will be canned or frozen as well as selecting the proper vegetables to grow to insure a succession of crops to fully utilize the space available.

After you have planned your garden on paper, proceed to the area. You should prepare the soil beforehand. You may add organic matter such as manure, compost, sludge, etc. and incorporate to a depth of six inches. If the ground is frozen, you may add the manure as a layer and work it in later.

In some of New Mexico, time to plant is almost on us. Other areas will be ready in March and the cooler areas by April. At this time, you may plant cool season crops.

Trash Compactor Forms Solid Mass  
Trash compactors are safe if used right. And they can be locked when not in use. A trash compactor is about 35 inches wide and 25 inches deep. It can be built in or left free standing. The machine will crush almost any combination of trash, including aerosol cans, into a compact mass contained in a plastic bag. In one test, 42 pounds didn't fill the bag. A full bag weighs from 30 to 50 pounds depending on the type of trash in it. The weight could make the bag hard to remove from the compactor.

After you push the start switch, a motor drives a ram down to mash the contents. Then the ram returns to the up position and the motor shuts off. When you close the drawer, an aerosol deodorant sprays the top layer. You must use some deodorant to keep down odors. The action of a trash compactor can be stopped by flipping a switch or turning the key off or opening the drawer. If the ram is interrupted in its downward thrust, it will go to the top position first when restarted.

Never let children operate a compactor. They might open the access panel just enough to reach a small hand inside.

The unit uses 6 to 11 amperes during its cycle so a 15 amp, 3-prong grounded outlet on a separate circuit with time delay fuse is suggested. Using a compactor may slow down the natural destruction of waste. If the compactor uses two bags a week, the bags and deodorant alone would cost \$35 a year.

What is a "Real" Sore Throat?

What is a "real" sore throat? A scratchy or a "minor" sore throat which is present in the morning and disappears before night is not significant. A real sore throat, however, lasts for more than a day and may be accompanied by swollen, tender lymph nodes under the jaw. It must be cultured.

The culturing process is a simple matter of swabbing the throat with a cotton-tipped stick, then growing the collected material under special conditions for 24 to 48 hours. This simple procedure determines whether a sore throat is caused by the streptococcus germ (which demands treatment), or by some other bacteria or virus which should not be treated with antibiotics.  
It is important to determine if a sore throat is caused by streptococcus because as many as three out of every hundred people with untreated sore throats will develop rheumatic fever or kidney disease two to three weeks later as a result of streptococcal infections.

Rheumatic fever may be mild or quite serious, and may cause permanent damage to the heart. There is also great variation in the seriousness of kidney disease caused by a streptococcus. In any event, these diseases should and can be prevented

by proper treatment of streptococcal infections.

Ironically, antibiotics are not given to help the sore throat. The sore throat pain, whether it is caused by streptococcus or something else, will stop almost as fast without antibiotics as with them. Rheumatic fever and kidney disease occur following the throat infection, and are due to an abnormal body response to the streptococcus. Penicillin or other appropriate antibiotics stop this reaction by completely ridding the body of all the germs.

An important point to remember is that it takes seven to eight days to remove the strep bacteria from the throat and prevent the serious post-streptococcal diseases, even though the symptoms of a sore throat may disappear in four to five days. Thus, a strep throat is treated with penicillin or suitable substitute for ten days. You do yourself no favor by stopping the antibiotic before the ten days are up.

Play it safe. If you or any member of your family has a "real" sore throat, have it cultured by your family doctor or neighborhood health clinic. Then see that the prescribed medicine is taken exactly as ordered.

## County Agent's Column

**Plan Your Garden Now**  
Now is the time to plan your garden, even if you live in the cooler parts of Lincoln County. Plan your garden on paper, taking into consideration the particular tastes of your family, the space available, whether produce will be canned or frozen as well as selecting the proper vegetables to grow to insure a succession of crops to fully utilize the space available.

After you have planned your garden on paper, proceed to the area. You should prepare the soil beforehand. You may add organic matter such as manure, compost, sludge, etc. and incorporate to a depth of six inches. If the ground is frozen, you may add the manure as a layer and work it in later.

In some of New Mexico, time to plant is almost on us. Other areas will be ready in March and the cooler areas by April. At this time, you may plant cool season crops.

Recommended varieties of these cool season crops are:  
BEETS - Detroit Dark Red, Sweetheart, Ruby Queen, Asgrow Wonder.  
BROCCOLI - Waltham 29, Texas 107, Decico, Greenbud.  
BRUSSEL SPROUTS - Jade Cross, Long Island Improved.  
CABBAGE - Headstart, Golden Acre Hybrid, Red Acre, Round Dutch, Maion Market.  
CARROTS - Pioneer, Impera-

tor, Waltham HI Color, Chateaux Red Core.

**Plan Your Garden Now**  
Now is the time to plan your garden, even if you live in the cooler parts of Lincoln County. Plan your garden on paper, taking into consideration the particular tastes of your family, the space available, whether produce will be canned or frozen as well as selecting the proper vegetables to grow to insure a succession of crops to fully utilize the space available.

After you have planned your garden on paper, proceed to the area. You should prepare the soil beforehand. You may add organic matter such as manure, compost, sludge, etc. and incorporate to a depth of six inches. If the ground is frozen, you may add the manure as a layer and work it in later.

In some of New Mexico, time to plant is almost on us. Other areas will be ready in March and the cooler areas by April. At this time, you may plant cool season crops.



## THE PICTURE OF HEALTH

What is a "Real" Sore Throat?

What is a "real" sore throat? A scratchy or a minor sore throat which is present in the morning and disappears before night is not significant. A real sore throat, however, lasts for more than a day and may be accompanied by swollen, tender lymph nodes under the jaw. It must be cultured.

The culturing process is a simple matter of swabbing the throat with a cotton-tipped stick, then growing the collected material under special conditions for 24 to 48 hours. This simple procedure determines whether a sore throat is caused by the streptococcus germ (which demands treatment), or by some other bacteria or virus which should not be treated with antibiotics. It is important to determine if a sore throat is caused by streptococcus because as many as three out of every hundred people with untreated sore throats will develop rheumatic fever or kidney disease two to three weeks later as a result of streptococcal infections.

Rheumatic fever may be mild or quite serious, and may cause permanent damage to the heart. There is also great variation in the seriousness of kidney disease caused by a streptococcus. In any event, these diseases should and can be prevented

by proper treatment of streptococcal infections.

Ironically, antibiotics are not given to help the sore throat. The sore throat pain, whether it is caused by streptococcus or something else, will stop almost as fast without antibiotics as with them. Rheumatic fever and kidney disease occur following the throat infection, and are due to an abnormal body response to the streptococcus. Penicillin or other appropriate antibiotics stop this reaction by completely ridding the body of all the germs.

An important point to remember is that it takes seven to eight days to remove the strep bacteria from the throat and prevent the serious post-streptococcal diseases, even though the symptoms of a sore throat may disappear in four to five days. Thus, a strep throat is treated with penicillin or suitable substitute for ten days. You do yourself no favor by stopping the antibiotic before the ten days are up.

Play it safe. If you or any member of your family has a "real" sore throat, have it cultured by your family doctor or neighborhood health clinic. Then see that the prescribed medicine is taken exactly as ordered.

 This letter is by way of opinion and confirmation of our dis-  
 mission of last week relative to the investment of the proceeds of the sewer bond issue. There are a number of statutes relating to the investment of municipal bonds without reciting, we will refer to Sec. 11-2-7, et seq.; Sec. 11-2-25, et seq.; Sec. 11-2-28. The general thrust of these statutes is that amounts should not be deposited with any one depository in excess of that portion which is federally insured or that amount which it is qualified to accept as a qualified depository for public funds.  
 Public funds have to be deposited within the county unless the amount would be so large that it would not be insured or if there was no qualified depository to receive such amount in the county. In this event, deposit could be made outside the county or within the county upon certificate and permission of the State Department of Public Finance.  
 If deposit were made in Lincoln County and distributed ratably among the banks as the statutes contemplates, this would include a distribution among all qualified depositories. The statute is silent as to the situation with so called "branch" banks. I would assume that either the branch bank would have to qualify as to a separate depository or that there would have to be a sufficient number of securities on reserve with a parent bank before this could be done. This may not be the case, however, because there is no statute in that respect.  
 If the Village desires to comply directly with the law, I would suggest that it turn to the District Court for aid in this matter by filing an interpleader action against the four banks in Lincoln County, which would include the bank in Carrizozo, and let the banks come forward at that point and show their qualifications to accept deposits and suggest a manner of ratable distribution among those banks qualifying. If a bank could not qualify as a depository, then any portion that they wanted to accept could not exceed the federally insured amount of \$20,000.00.  
 I strongly fear that the ratable

# Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

SANTA FE — A slow-moving legislature received a rash of income tax cut bills and an election campaign reform act. Gov. Bruce King asked legislators to lower individual in-

come taxes 20 per cent and corporate income taxes 10 per cent. Prospects were bright for an income tax reduction but the amount had not been determined.

The public school finance formula revision was set to be introduced this week after much delay for wrangling. Strong support for the revision's concept was exerted. But differences were sharp over major elements within the formula.

Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, called the threatened federal crackdown on New Mexico highway funds "blackmail." The cutoff could occur if New Mexico does not adopt the federal 55-mile speed limit.

Berry voted for the lower speed limit, effective March 2. He voted to delete a House Transportation Committee amendment that would ban the Motor Vehicle Department from recording points against a driver convicted of speeding 56 to 70 miles per hour. Rep. Berry is on the HTC.

Rep. Berry introduced a bill

appropriating \$50,000 for vocational education transportation. He said New Mexico Junior College is receiving \$10,918 in the current fiscal year for this purpose.

Vocational education students of Eunice, Tatum, Hobbs and Lovington School Districts attend classes at NMJC. Berry says property tax ceding should be retained or the revenue that school districts would lose in repeal should be replaced.

He says Eunice School District is receiving \$99,000 this fiscal year via ceding. Jal School District is obtaining about \$90,000 by this method, he said.

Rep. Berry opposes removal of the exemption of newspaper sales from the state gross receipts tax. Rep. John Radosovich, D-Albuquerque, proposes to lift the exemption in a pending bill.

Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, favors an increase in tax credit for low income brackets and relief for the middle income group — \$6,000-\$15,000 taxable income.

Carbajal said he will introduce a bill that would stop duplication of tapes of recorded artists for intrastate use. He predicted the legislature will vote \$20-\$25 million added state support for public schools.

Rep. Carbajal said a bill continuing the University Study Committee will also be introduced this week. Carbajal is USC chairman. The Senate killed another bill to make the USC permanent.

Carbajal is also House Corporations - Banks Committee chairman. The HCBC was set

to hear a bill by Rep. Max Coll, R-Roswell, requiring the Corporation Commission to consider yellow pages revenue in considering phone company rate cases. Carbajal plans to seek re-election this year.

Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Lea-Curry - Roosevelt, said the public school funding formula is in danger. An agricultural engineer, Pattison is senior House Republican in service.

Pattison said: "The formula needs more work and perhaps another year of polishing to make it more salable." Rep. Pattison is on the Legislative School Study Committee that spent many hours on formula revision.

Rep. Pattison also opposes removal of the exemption of sales of newspapers from the state gross receipts tax. He would keep the exemption.

Pattison said some East Side school districts would receive no added state support or less increase than many other districts under the school finance formula revision.

Rep. Cliff Moreland, D-Quay-Union, called the federally mandated 55-mile speed limit a "blackmail deal." Moreland said: "I feel sorry for the truckers. It will hurt them an awful lot."

Rep. Moreland, an oil company jobber, would delay tax relief action because of the energy crunch. He said: "I have mixed emotions."

Rep. Moreland said decreased state gasoline tax revenue will hurt Clayton, Tucumcari, San Jon and Logan. Cities share in the revenue. Moreland was shaping legislation to preserve New Mexico's fuel allocation.

He said the bill would force oil companies to maintain their franchise distribution systems. Rep. Moreland strongly opposes a bill by Sen. Kenneth Schlienz, R-Quay-Curry, that would repeal the present 2 per cent allowance for gasoline shrinkage in computing state gasoline tax.

Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, and Sen. Bill Lee, D-Lovington, proposed a tax credit for low income brackets and a one-time 20 per cent income tax cut for middle and high income taxpayers. Echols is a governor candidate.

Sen. Echols said the state general fund surplus June 30, 1975, will exceed \$80 million less special appropriations voted in the present session. Sen. Lee proposes to exempt private projects from a requirement to file an environmental impact statement.

## Bigbee Reports From Santa Fe

Last Tuesday found the New Mexico Legislature in an enviable position as it started its short session to deal with fiscal matters, in that we are one of the few states in a cash surplus position. In view of this position I think it is an opportunity for New Mexico to appropriate sufficient funding to education, so that our local Boards of Education will have the opportunity to raise the salaries of our teachers to a more respectable level.

Throughout my legislative district it seems that one of the main concerns my constituents have is that their children are not really receiving a quality education. I think that we should realize, however, that the teaching profession, relative to required training and education, is one of the lowest paid professions in the state. It seems obvious that if those in the profession are not adequately compensated we are not going to keep the caliber of personnel necessary for quality education. I do think that one of the most progressive steps that the teaching profession could take would be to re-examine the tenure law in view of that law's unpopularity with the general public and

the handicap it can sometimes pose to consistent quality selection.

**Short Session Action Told by Sen. Conway**  
 By **JOHN CONWAY**  
 The "short session" of the 31st Legislature is off to a slow start. As you know, the Legislature can only consider financial matters and bills that are sent down from the Governor's office during this session.  
 School financing is probably the number one issue at this writing. A new school distribution formula is proposed but has not as yet been introduced.  
 How much each school district will receive depends on how much new money will be put into education. The figures run from a low of \$12 million to a high of approximately \$30 million. I hope we will be able to fund our schools as close to the higher figure as possible.  
 The bill for state funds for the International Space Hall of Fame at Alamogordo has not been introduced at this time. The Governor in his initial message to the Legislature asked

for \$1.8 million for this complex.  
 Whether or not we will get any tax relief this session is still up in the air. I am pleased that all three of the tax relief bills that I introduced last session have now been introduced by members of the majority party. They are a year late with tax relief, but I'm glad to see them reintroduced this session.  
 The first part of January, I sent out 1300 questionnaires at random to people living in my senatorial district. This was done at my own expense and at no cost to the taxpayer. I'm also asking this newspaper to reproduce this questionnaire with the hope that you who did not receive one will cut it out and forward it to me. After I receive the replies, I will have the results printed along with my voting record on these issues.

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**  
 "Dating" A Disease  
 If you need an operation but have no hospital insurance, you might get the following bright idea: take out insurance first, then have the operation.  
 Obviously, the insurance companies would not like this sort of thing. To prevent it, health insurance policies often say you are not covered for a "pre-existing" illness — that is, an illness you already had when you brought the insurance.  
 But when does a disease really begin? Fixing a specific date is not always easy. In one case in terms of later surgery, a disease may be traced all the way back to birth. As a poetic judge once put it:  
 "The seeds of death are sown when the first breath of life is drawn."  
 "But the law generally dates a disease from the time when "discoverable symptoms" first appear. Take the case of a woman who had a gall bladder operation. The insurance company refused to pay her expenses, because she had had occasional stomach pains before taking out the policy.  
 "Those pains," argued the company in a court hearing, "mean she must have already had gall bladder trouble at that time. Therefore, it was 'pre-existing.'"  
 But the court disagreed and upheld the woman's claim. The judge said mere pain was not a clear enough signal of what she had.  
 Suppose the disease is already known and simply gets worse. That usually is not covered.  
 One man had cataracts when he bought a disability insurance policy. His sight gradually faded, and he finally became blind. Was this a pre-existing condition, excluded from his insurance coverage?  
 A court said it was indeed, because the blindness was a natural, foreseeable develop-

### Tribe Back On With 'Zozo Win

Ruidoso broke out of their seven game skid Saturday by mastering Carrizozo's Grizzlies, 62-48.

The Warriors looked like a different team when they finally started rolling in the second quarter to take a 31-23 lead over the Grizzlies who had just given Corona a terrible 118-17 pounding the previous night.

Joe Bob McGuire, the night's high scorer with 21, got the Warriors going in the first quarter with ten of their 12 first quarter points. Seven Warriors got on the board in the second period of play as Ruidoso started showing signs of dominating the game.

Carrizozo was able to trade points with Ruidoso in the third quarter but the Warriors finally broke it wide open in the closing stanza. They ran the lead as high as 18 points in the quarter by solving the Grizzlies' press and taking advantage of trips to the free-throw line following ten Carrizozo fouls in the quarter.

David Stiles and Dick Underwood followed McGuire in double figures with 12 and 11. Charles Baker and Andre Hoff were the only Grizzlies to hit in doubles with 12 and 11 also.

Saturday marked the first time in eight games that no Warrior has fouled out in the game. Meanwhile, Carrizozo lost four of their five starters to fouls in the final period.

### JV's Whip Grizzlies, Run Streak to Six

After a slow first quarter in which both teams could manage only 23 combined points, the Ruidoso JV's got on the track to swarm Carrizozo 49-32 for their sixth straight win.

The Warriors did next to nothing the first half as an aggressive, pressing defense caused them to force shots and lose the ball. But Carrizozo did little more in the defensive first half. Ruidoso held a one point lead after one quarter and the Grizzlies took a one point advantage to the lockers at the half.

It was a new ball game when Ruidoso came back from the break as Ruidoso quickly set about making up for the first half. They took the top for two points to get underway and there was little doubt of the outcome for the next 16 minutes.

Kirk Eubank, the freshman scoring leader of the junior varsity, grabbed ten of his 20 points for the game in the third quarter to put Ruidoso up by six by the end of the period, and moving away.

In the fourth quarter, the Warriors completely crumbled the Grizzlie press, scoring 23 points as the remainder of the Ruidoso bench got in on the action.

Eubank, with 20 points before he was ejected from the game in the fourth quarter for a temper flare-up, was the only player for either side to hit in double figures with seven two-pointers from the floor and six of eight attempts at the charity line.

The JV's have now won their last six games after they lost the first four to AAA schools.

### Confusion In Filing Noted by Sec. of State

Betty Fiorina, Secretary of State, expressed concern over the widespread confusion that the electorate is experiencing because of the provisions of the primary election law, commonly referred to as the "Nominating Petition Law".

Mrs. Fiorina said that due to the numerous court suits filed during the 1972 primary election and the ultimate judgment that filing fees were unconstitutional, the 1973 legislature passed a law that provides for candidacy in the primary election. The new law requires a certain number of signatures of registered voters for candidates to have their names placed on the ballot in the primary election.

"Over 75% of the telephone calls received in my office are from voters and candidates asking for clarification on the new system," Mrs. Fiorina said. She further stated, "I am available to speak to any interested groups on the subject of the primary election law and to answer questions that might be asked."

Mrs. Fiorina said that it has been an almost impossible task for her and her staff to take care of the unsurmountable telephone inquiries and correspondence regarding the nominating petition system. Mrs. Fiorina added that she feels that it could be a very workable law once the public and the candidates are thoroughly educated.




