

Village Okays Joint Powers For Airport Board

The Ruidoso council unanimously approved a joint powers agreement for the Sierra Blanca Airport Development Board at their regular meeting last Thursday. John Payne and George Shoemaker, Ruidoso representatives on the board, reported to Mayor Leon Farrar and Trustees Warren Tucker, Ab Gunter and Earl Allison on the actions the board has taken in the past weeks including the selection of the planning consultant and preliminary steps taken toward the planning. They then asked that the council provide the board with the agreement authorizing it to act in behalf of the governing body in the planning work on the airport. The agreement covers disposal of state and federal planning grants to the sponsoring governments to pay for the planning.

Careful Burglar Hits Alto Village Home

Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Jerry Russell of Ruidoso was called Friday night to investigate a burglary at a home in Alto Village. Russell said that property, valued roughly in excess of \$1,000, was taken from the home of Darrell Canfield of El Paso in one of the largest and most unusual burglaries he has investigated in the area. Canfield, the owner, called Ruidoso police about 9 p.m. Friday, after they arrived at the home and began discovering items missing. Russell said that the final inventory included three pairs of skis, five pairs of poles, ten pairs of boots, three sets of golf clubs, fiberglass bow and arrows, binoculars, a fire extinguisher, poker chips, playing cards and all of the food from the cupboards and freezer. Russell noted that the burglar was very selective in that he left behind many valuables such as a mini-bike, electrical appliances, and sporting goods, including three other pairs of skis. According to Canfield, the three pairs of skis taken were all engraved with the name Canfield while the three pairs left were not engraved. The burglary is estimated to have occurred sometime between Monday evening and Friday evening of last week. Canfield said that his son had skied through Monday last week, turned the heat down to 50 degrees and double-checked all of the doors before leaving. When the Canfields discovered the burglary Friday evening, they told Russell that they found all of the doors locked, the heat turned up to about 70 degrees, and other than the missing items, there was no sign that anyone had been in the house. Among the items missing were the skis the son had used on Monday. Russell noted that the burglar had been very careful to leave no evidence of forced entry or damage.

Downs Gets 63 Racing Days

The 1974 season at Ruidoso Downs will cover 63 race days - one less than last year. The dates, and stakes schedule, were given the green light by the State Racing Commission in the last regular meeting. The '74 season will kick off on Saturday, May 18, and extend through Labor Day. According to General Manager Al Rosa, the format is almost identical to the one last year - a format which helped propel the mountain track to a daily wagering average of \$275,158. The '73 season was the most successful in Ruidoso history. There are only two minor changes in the '74 racing calendar. A Thursday program has been slated for May 30, and a Wednesday card, on the final week, has been dropped. This time, matters will wind up with five straight race days, instead of six. As usual, there'll be two Monday programs - Memorial Day (May 27) and Labor Day (Sept. 2). Except for the first two weeks, and the closing week, racing will be staged in a Thursday-through-Sunday pattern. First post is the standard 1:30 p.m. Total purse disbursement is expected to reach a soaring \$4 million. A good hunk of this amount will be distributed in two spectacular events - the \$500,000 (est.) All-American Derby and the \$1,030,000 All-American Futurity. The All-American Futurity - the world's richest race by far - will again close out the meeting on Labor Day, and will be televised live from coast-to-coast by the All-American Network of Topeka, Kans. Charges Dropped In Credit Card Misuse

Three charges stemming from the illegal use and possession of a credit card, reported stolen last week, were dropped Friday in a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Austin Pritchett in Ruidoso. Dan Reed of Alamogordo had been charged with felonious use of a credit card and signature of a receipt, and misdemeanor possession of the MasterCard charge card issued to Lewis Vaughn, also of Alamogordo. Vaughn had allegedly reported the card stolen Monday morning and Reed was arrested last Monday afternoon trying to use the card to purchase four tires and service work at the White's Auto Store in Ruidoso. In testimony at the hearing Monday, Vaughn said that he had given the card to Reed to use. Shortly after this testimony, Judge Pritchett accepted a motion to dismiss charges against Reed.

Ski-Tee Is Set

George Marsh, coordinator of the Sixth Annual Ruidoso Ski-Tee Skiing and Golf Tournament, has announced that the date for the tournament has been set for Friday evening, Saturday and Sunday, March 29, 30 and 31. The tournament will be run as it was last year, opening with the Calcutta Party on Friday night at the Cree Meadows Golf Course, followed by the slalom run and wine party Saturday, and 18 holes of golf and awards party Sunday. The entries have been returned from the printers and will be available from the ski shops in town, participating businesses or from Marsh at the Ruidoso State Bank. Entries will also be printed in The News next month. The entry fee again this year is \$20 and includes dinner Friday, lift tickets, green fees, both parties, tee shirts and the great list of prizes donated by local merchants and other businesses for this Junior Racer benefit. Deadline for entries is 4:00 p.m. Friday, March 29.

County Commissioners Favor Keeping Water Canyon Road Open

The Lincoln County Commission met Tuesday at the courthouse in Carrizozo and, after some discussion, accepted the report of Commissioner Bill Hart of Ruidoso recommending that the road over private land to the Water Canyon area of U. S. Forest Service Wilderness be kept open. The road has come under fire lately since the owner of the land crossed by the road, Kelly Stevenson, announced that he would like to close the road because of littering and damage to his property caused by public use. Hart's report called attention to the fact that the area has been used for recreation for over 50 years, thus giving the road "first priority toward being a public road." The report called for the state, forest service and land owners to furnish supplies for fencing the road and the county

would provide labor and road maintenance. Jim and Mary Rich Steinfeld, of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, spoke to the commission regarding funds from the three-quarter mill levy for the hospital. They were told that the levy does not presently exist but that revenue sharing funds are available and will be given to the hospital. Intimidation Charges Dropped After Mix-Up

Magistrate Austin Pritchett of Ruidoso allowed the dismissal of a charge of intimidating a witness against Donald Ray Bishop in a preliminary hearing Friday morning. Bishop had been charged with attempting to intimidate a witness against him on a drug-selling charge currently pending in 12th District Court in Carrizozo. Judge Pritchett allowed the motion by assistant district attorney Charles Shaw, that the charges be dropped without prejudice when testimony at the hearing indicated that the alleged attempt at intimidation had occurred approximately a month prior to the date stated on the charges filed by the district attorney's office. In the motion to dismiss the charges, Shaw indicated that his office intended to file new charges on the alleged incident so the charge would agree with the testimony.

Town Meeting Called To Discuss Problems With Drugs In Area

Parents, and any adult in the Ruidoso area concerned about current and potential drug problems in our area are invited to attend a general, unsponsored town meeting Monday, 7:30 p.m. at the high school. Initiated by "Dub" Williams and Dick Mound, the meeting has grown out of concern by the Lions and Rotary clubs to learn about and deal with the problem. Williams and Mound noted that there is no planned program or moderator for the meeting but that they just hope to get a bunch of concerned adults out to talk about the problem and learn what they can.

Municipal Court Has Record Case Month

Ruidoso Municipal Judge Sam Nunnally closed out his books last Friday on the heaviest case month in the history of the court here. In January, Judge Nunnally acted on 154 cases including traffic, parking and misdemeanor cases. The total surpassed the old court record of 132 dispatched during the peak month of July 1972. A major factor in the heavy case load, noteworthy especially because it occurred during the winter, is the heavy use of the new radar speed detection device purchased by the police department in late December. The radar accounted for a large number of the 108 traffic cases that came before the court. Judge Nunnally received 1372 in fines for the village during January. He also noted that word getting back to him indicates that the point system in New Mexico is beginning to work, as some of the regulars in his court are beginning to lose their licenses. Engineer Jack Kannady reported on the progress of the water improvement. He said that three tanks were now finished, except for painting, with two more under construction. Most of the pipelines are down but work has nearly stopped on the project because of weather and supplies. Snow and ice have made the Upper Canyon site nearly inaccessible for the contractors and they are having a great deal of trouble getting their pumps and some other supplies. Mayor Farrar reported on his correspondence including a request that the village participate in sponsoring the Wide Area Telephone Service (WATS) line proposed by the Chamber of Commerce for tourist vacation information. The mayor recommended that action on the request be tabled for the new council following the election. The council agreed. Upon the mayor's recommendation, the council also approved the reduction of Lt. Truman McBride of the Ruidoso Police Department to patrolman. Hine reported that on the way back from Santa Fe, he and the attorney had stopped at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo to verify the eligibility of the remaining 12 candidates in the Ruidoso municipal elections.

Winning Recipes Contain Pumpkin, Pecans and Prunes

Pumpkin, prunes and pecans, together with the baking skills of two excellent cooks, combined to attract the attention of judges in this year's International Pecan Food Fantasy at New Mexico State University. The three ingredients were among the keys to success for Linda Brookey, Las Cruces, winner of the outstanding junior entry award, and Mrs. O. T. Smith, Tornillo, Texas, winner of the outstanding senior entry award. Miss Brookey took her prize with pumpkin nut bread, while Mrs. Smith won with an iced prune cake. Both entries, of course, list pecans among their ingredients.

All first and second place recipes in the 16 junior and 16 senior divisions of the Food Fantasy are included in a recipe book published by the Western Irrigated Pecan Growers Association. The book may be obtained by mail by writing: WIPGA, Box 550, Las Cruces, N. M. 88001. Cost by mail is \$1.25.

The winning pumpkin nut bread recipe prepared by Miss Brookey is as follows: Three (3) cups sugar, one (1) cup oil, four (4) eggs, one and one-half (1½) teaspoons salt, one (1) teaspoon nutmeg, one (1) teaspoon cinnamon, one-half (½) cup pecans, two (2) teaspoons soda, two-thirds (⅔) cup water, two (2) cups pumpkin, and three and one-half (3½) cups flour.

Mix sugar, oil and eggs. Add pumpkin and mix. Add dry ingredients alternately with water. Add pecans. Pour into greased and floured pans. Bake at 325 degrees Fahrenheit for one hour. Makes two loaves.

Mrs. Smith's recipe for iced prune cake is as follows: Ingredients: two (2) cups sugar, one (1) cup margarine, three (3) large eggs, one (1) cup buttermilk, one (1) teaspoon baking soda, one (1) teaspoon vanilla, one (1) teaspoon nutmeg, one (1) teaspoon allspice, one (1) teaspoon cinnamon, one (1) cup cooked prunes, cut, one (1) cup chopped pecans, three (3) cups flour. Bake one hour at 325 degrees Fahrenheit. Grease loaf pan and dust with flour.

Ingredients: one-half (½) cup flour; two-thirds (⅔) cup

The spirited game took on the appearance of a grudge match in the first half as plenty of contact kept players down on the floor throughout most of the game and the Eagles' pivot man Aaron Miller came in with a bloody gash over his eye in the first half.


In spite of the contact, it is a credit to the players that they never flared throughout the game.

But it was not the physical game that gave the Warriors problems. Richard Montoya started early to break the back of the Ruidoso defense grabbing ten points in the first quarter on 20-footers. Ruidoso also had their problems on their own side as the ball just wouldn't fall through the hole for them. Everything from lay-ups to 25-footers were bouncing and rolling off the hoop as it seemed at times to have a lid on it.

Even with the problems, the Warriors were down by only seven at the half. The second half started no better and by the end of the third quarter, the Eagles' lead was 13.

In their frantic struggle to narrow the gap in the closing stanza, Ruidoso could get it no smaller than ten as Hondo play-making would repeatedly spring a man open for a lay-up while Ruidoso put pressure on the back court ball handlers.

With only about two minutes

Hondo took a time-out, settled down and shut Ruidoso out for the rest of the game while they padded their lead with five more points for the final 69-60 margin.

Montoya led all scorers in the game with 26 points while teammate Miller hit 15. McGuire led the Warriors in the losing cause with 19 and Clyde Reynolds scored 15.

Saturday night when the Weed Bulldogs made their way up to Ruidoso for the return match here, the Warriors had just enough of their shooting troubles left over from Friday night to get them in the hole early. Missing seven lay-ups in the first quarter, Ruidoso found themselves down by six after the first six minutes. They never got them all back.

Ruidoso and Weed battled even for the next 16 minutes and then in the fourth quarter, the Warriors managed to get two points back when time ran out and left them four-point losers, 54-50.

Reynolds hit four points in each quarter to pace the Warriors with 16 while McGuire got

eight of his 13 points in the third period.

The loss left Ruidoso with a 4-14 record for the season.


Hoffman Is Speaker For Resources Meet

The second measure asked for assistance in providing adequate counseling for students in obtaining scholarships and financial aid to attend college in Lincoln and Otero Counties. This was a well-attended meeting and enthusiasm remains excellent, with everyone working together to improve Lincoln and Otero Counties. The next meeting is scheduled for March 12 in Carrizozo.

Now Is Time to Prune Fruit Trees for Growth

Prune fruit trees annually to control their size and shape. When properly pruned, trees usually live longer and produce

more fruit than other trees. By training the tree each year, you can guide the growth to secure branches at the right location up, down, and around the main tree trunk. If you select and establish the scaffold branches when the trees are small, you will need to make fewer, larger cuts later.

When trees are pruned well, the cultivation, spraying, and harvesting jobs are made easier. Pruning results in larger fruits and better fruit colors because

of more light distribution throughout the tree. Do not leave stubs. All cuts made in the pruning operation should be flush with the parallel to the branch structure. If the end of a branch is removed, make the cut just beyond a side branch. Close cuts will heal more quickly. Don't cut back the tip end of branches promiscuously.

For most pruning jobs, you'll need a sturdy pair of lopping shears and a pruning saw. To begin the pruning operation, look the trees over carefully. Remove all dead or dying wood. Cut away any water-sprouts (suckers) growing from the trunk and large limbs.

Now look for limbs that grow inward, criss-crossing through the tree. Remove these where they originate. All branches should radiate outward. Remove a branch that lies directly over or on another. After eliminating suckers and interfering branches, thin the remaining terminal growth.

January, February, and early March are usually the best months for pruning fruit plants. Don't prune during extremely cold weather as trees may be injured.

Treat all wounds over one inch in diameter with a suitable tree wound dressing.

Several cars of senior citizens made one of the most enjoyable trips, I have ever taken, to Old Lincoln and 'Billy the Kid country'. Mrs. Bertie Gunter was so kind to invite me to go up with her.

The sun was barely up over the pines when we left the Senior Center. We had a light snow the day before which left the hoary forests glittering in the sun.

When we arrived at the Lincoln County courthouse, the caretakers graciously signed us in. The old historical adobe building and state monument,

with its twenty-four inch thick walls, was filled with many aged documents of the Lincoln County War and men of importance; and antiquated things that were used during that period.

Since New Mexico was one of the last states to be admitted to the United States, listed only as a resort and health state; and Indian warfare soon to be ended, along with the Santa Fe Trail bringing in settlers, there was a vast change taking place in the state that the world knew very little about. As there is not a great deal of authentic reference in history, I think it is amazing that so many of the documents have been preserved. But, history or not, many books have been written since and authors have had to imagine or express their own opinions and thoughts as to what took place in the Lincoln County war.

Now a land of azure skies, deserts, alpine mountains, where skiers streak down the glistening slopes and fishermen make a mean cast in the delphinic streams; little do many realize or even dream that this region was and still is teeming with legends and folklore.

After visiting the many relics we went up to the main courtroom where history was made and justice was supposed to have been carried out.

We heard Dave Townsend, Pete Henderson, Lonnie Jarratt and Mrs. Lennie Jones, instructors from the Alamogordo branch of the New Mexico State College, give interesting talks on the cause or 'why' of the Lincoln war; guns and ammunition used; and the life of 'Billy the Kid'; and facts as near as they were able to be put together, with much research.

Mrs. Jones gave a brief but colorful presentation of some of

We heard Dave Townsend, Pete Henderson, Lonnie Jarratt and Mrs. Lennie Jones, instructors from the Alamogordo branch of the New Mexico State College, give interesting talks on the cause or 'why' of the Lincoln war; guns and ammunition used; and facts as near as they were able to be put together, with much research.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

"I Just Killed My . . ."

Poking fun at the law, a cartoon shows a man rushing into the police station to confess a murder. But the desk sergeant frantically waves him into silence.

"You don't have to say a word," the sergeant explains, "until you have seen a lawyer." This may be good cartooning. But it is bad law. The sergeant has no obligation to interrupt a confession that is offered voluntarily. Furthermore, the man's statement may be used against him in court.

Consider an actual case: A motorcycle officer sired a motorist to the curb and asked to see his driver's license and registration slip. After a moment's hesitation, the man shrugged.

"Well, I guess you've got me," he said, "I stole the car." Brought to trial later for car theft, he claimed that his confession could not be used against him because the officer had failed to warn him of his rights.

But the court found nothing wrong with the confession, since the man had made it of his own free will.

What kind of pressures do taint a confession as "involuntary" — hence inadmissible in court? Obvious examples are the use of physical violence or mental intimidation. Such methods run afoul of the constitutional privilege against self-incrimination.

But a confession may also be ruled out because it was obtained by the unfair use of promises or temptations. In one case, a man under questioning about a robbery was informed that his wife — also being held — would be released if he would confess he had committed the crime.

He did confess. But this time, his confession was held to be inadmissible in court. The judge said a confession obtained by offering such a powerful temptation had one great drawback in the eyes of the law: It was all too likely to be false.

Inside The Capital

SANTA FE — The legislature was moving closer to spending levels for public schools and general appropriations with adjournment set about Feb. 14.

General appropriations will probably be set at about \$363 million, the amount Gov. Bruce King recommended. The battle, which still hot over public school finance state support. A level upwards of \$20 million was likely.

Rep. William J. Upton, D-Hidalgo-Luna, threatened to blow the whistle if the legislative session continues beyond the 30-day constitutional limit. Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, D-Belen, said the session would end on time.

Sen. I. M. Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra, proposed an additional district judge for the Sixth District — Luna, Hidalgo and Grant Counties. Smalley's bill proposed a \$60,480 appropriation for the Sixth Judicial District next fiscal year.

A \$30 million state support increase for public schools is in an alternate proposal prepared for Sen. John Rogers, D-Los Alamos. The proposed increases: Belen, \$403,949; Ber- naldo, \$173,566; Capitán, \$16,963; Carrizozo, \$34,040; Cimarron, \$54,300; Clayton, \$119,808; Clovis, 1,044,892.

Also, Corona, \$16,866; Cuba, \$40,663; Deming, \$395,549; Des Moines, \$25,522; Eunice, \$27,164; Fort Sumner, \$58,325; Grady, \$18,119; Hondo, \$23,044; House, \$14,078; Jal, \$29,550. Jemez Springs, \$22,360; Lordsburg, \$133,483; Los Lunas, \$328,878; Maxwell, \$22,051; Ojo Caliente, \$66,455; Penasco, \$97,732; Questa, \$108,237; Raton, \$209,836; Ruidoso, \$88,648; San Jon, \$23,295; Santa Rosa, \$119,101; Springer, \$72,635.

Taos, \$355,188; Tatum, \$17,766; Texico, \$57,976; Truth or Consequences, \$149,729; and Vaughn, \$33,020.

Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, opposed HB 85, the proposed public school formula revision, because it would move funds to Santa Fe and distribute them statewide. Berry said state support for Eunice and Jal schools would be unchanged next fiscal year under the formula at a level of \$26.1 million increased state support.

Rep. Berry said the formula hands a blank check to special programs — bilingual, early childhood, vocational and special education. He said programs should be suggested, then funds should be distributed.

Berry predicted House Bill 85 would clear the House but would be "very, very difficult to pass in the Senate." He said emphasis should be on teacher salaries and the formula concentrates on special programs money.


A Berry bill appropriating \$50,000 for vocational education transportation received approval from the House Education Committee. The bill would make \$10,918 available next fiscal year for the New Mexico Junior College to transport vocational students from the Eunice, Lovington, Tatum and Hobbs school districts.

Berry strongly opposes a proposed state oil and gas severance tax increase from 2½ to 7½ per cent. But he said prospects are good for adoption of the increase. "I just hope it will be a small increase," he said.

A major constitutional amendment combining utility regulation in a new, 5-member Corporation Commission cleared the Senate 24-13. The amendment places all regulatory power in a commission elected statewide for six-year terms.

The Public Service Commission would be abolished. The present State Corporation Commission would be expanded, in effect, and continued with greater authority. The interim Tax Study Committee proposed the major change. It would be on the November general election ballot.

Walter Bruce of Santa Fe, a candidate for the Republican governor nomination, said he would use the state surplus to

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Bigbee Reports From Santa Fe

 Most municipalities in my district depend heavily on revenue from the gasoline tax. It is not surprising therefore that the municipal officials are deeply concerned about the possible loss of revenue from the gasoline taxes. I agree with Senator Dunn that the smaller municipalities are in even greater need of increased revenues than the larger ones. The proposal to give the cigarette tax back to the municipalities and counties seems not only logical but necessary.
 The House of Representatives finally adopted a rule change last week that several of us have pushed for a long time. That rule change requires an attendance and voting record kept on all bills in committee. I am only disappointed that a voting record on all amendments is not required and that all meetings of the House Appropriations and Finance Committees are not open.
 At least we have made some important progress this time. I certainly believe that more accountability will produce more responsibility in the legislative process.

THE PICTURE OF HEALTH

"Mommy, I have an earache," probably will echo throughout households at least once or twice this winter. And, you'll probably find your child crying with pain, pulling at the offending ear, complaining of a muffled sound if he's old enough.
 Just what causes these painful (but common) middle-ear infections?
 Think of the middle ear as an enclosed space with "two gates." One "gate" is the eardrum, and beyond it is the outer ear. The other "gate" is the eustachian tube. It lets air from the nose and throat into the middle ear to equalize the pressure on each side of the eardrum when you yawn, sneeze, or blow your nose.
 Unfortunately, the eustachian tube can also function as a pathway for germs and secretions living in the nose and throat to enter the middle ear. All the ingredients for an infection are present: warmth, moisture, and germs. The pressure builds in the middle ear which then presses against the eardrum.
 At this point, the tube itself becomes inflamed and swollen shut. Now air can't get through the tube, nor can the infection from the middle ear drain away through the nose. The result is pain! Now is the time to seek medical care.
 Usually ampicillin or penicillin are used for effective treatment of middle ear infections. However, if the infection is untreated or if the antibiotic is stopped before it should be, infected material may get locked in behind the eardrum. If this happens, a small surgical cut is made in the eardrum to drain the material, and antibiotics are prescribed.
 Sometimes a thick fluid is within the middle ear after such an infection. This glue-like fluid is a serious cause of hearing loss in children.
 What can you do to prevent or minimize the effects of middle ear infections?
 —Blow your nose gently.
 —Never stop prescribed antibiotics before the recommended time.
 —See your doctor or neighborhood clinic about any ear pain.

Rotary Club Hears Forest Program

A program outlining the combining of the Smokey Bear and Ruidoso Ranger Districts was given for the Ruidoso Rotary by Earl Blann at last Tuesday's regular meeting of the club. Blann noted that the combined districts, to be called the Smokey Bear District, would total about 445,000 acres. This figure includes the 185,000 acres of the Ruidoso District. Grazing permits jumped from 26 to 66 and firewood sales from 400-500 to about 3400 cords.
 In pointing out the reasons for combining the districts, Blann noted the reduction in office staff and better management of resources in the district. He explained the new firewood program for individuals and asked that anyone wishing to obtain the free wood come by the office and have chain saw muffler checked before going into the forest. Only dead and down material may be taken for wood. He noted the excellent clean-up of the forest and the removal of material that was a fire hazard.
 He pointed out that the mild winter could cause an increase

in forest insects this year, because of lack of winter kill of many of the insects, and suggested that residents having green wood stacked, cover the stack with clear plastic and seal to kill insects.
 Following the program, Dick Mound, chairman of the basketball tournament committee, gave a rundown on plans for the 7th, 8th & 9th grade tournament slated to begin February 6. He noted that 18 area teams would participate in 23 games, with the first game between Holloman and Alamogordo 8th graders set to begin at 2:30 p.m. Feb. 6.



Lincoln Co. Farmers Asked To Grow More

With the increase in demand and high prices for agricultural products both in the United States and abroad, American farmers and ranchers are being asked to produce food at record levels to meet this demand. This program has been designated, "Produce More, Protect More," by the Secretary of Agriculture, Earl Butz. As a result, large amounts of marginal cropland which had been converted to grass or trees may again be put under the plow. This includes land which is considered to be either too steep, too dry, too sandy or too wet for efficient crop production without extensive conservation measures.

Lincoln County formerly had scattered areas of dry cropland, particularly in the Claunch area, between Nogal and Alto, and at other scattered locations, but almost all of this land has been returned to grass or other native vegetation. Farmers learned that drought is too frequent a problem to make dry farming profitable in this area. Supervisors of both the Upper Hondo and Carrizozo Natural Resource Conservation Districts in Lincoln County have expressed concern at the possibility of marginal lands being plowed in other parts of the state. They feel that very little land in Lincoln County will be dry farmed by those who are familiar with the area. Anyone planning to convert grassland or idle cropland into actual production should give careful consideration to the past history of dry farming in this area.

Lincoln County's contribution to the nationwide increase in food production should come from the irrigated lands and from native grazing lands. Much of the irrigated and range land in the county is producing below its potential. Those planning for increased production are urged to contact A. T. "Bert" Pfingsten, Chairman of the Upper Hondo Natural Resource Conservation District, or A. W. Gnatkowski, Chairman of the Carrizozo Natural Resource Conservation District for on-
