



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Magistrate Pritchett Seeking Re-Election

Austin A. Pritchett of Ruidoso, currently completing eight consecutive years as judge in Lincoln County, formally announced his intention this week to seek re-election as Lincoln County, Division-3, Magistrate, subject to the Democratic Party Primary Election on June 4th.

In announcing his candidacy, Judge Pritchett stated, "I sincerely do not feel that it is either proper or ethical for me to attempt to project a long list of so-called campaign promises. My greatest concern is to assure the voters of Lincoln County that during my years on the bench I have at all times realized the importance of the position entrusted to me and therefore to recognize that the dignity of the court and that of the people should be treated with respect and fairness."

The Magistrate added, "There is also another important side of the magistrate's courtroom and that is the opportunities to assist in many ways the people that seek assistance with their problems. No one is ever turned away in my court and always there is an attempt to seek a solution to their problems."

A resident of Ruidoso for eleven years, in 1968 Judge Pritchett was successful in his first attempt to seek public office when he was overwhelmingly elected as Justice of the Peace in Ruidoso, as the result of a write-in campaign. At the same time, Judge Pritchett ran on a platform of abolishing the JP system in favor of the current magistrate court system.

Following the abolishment of the JP system, Pritchett was elected the first magistrate in Ruidoso and elected to the position of Municipal Judge at the same time he was JP. He served in the dual judgeship for six years. In 1972 he declined to seek re-election as municipal judge and concentrated his efforts upon the now increased magistrate duties.

"As magistrate in Ruidoso under the current Preliminary Hearing procedure," Judge Pritchett stated, "I have handled multiple types of serious felony cases that include murder, rape, car theft, burglary and narcotics. In recent months," he added, "the N. M. State legislature has required that magistrate courts handle all High Court Misdemeanor trials which carry penalties up to one year in the state prison if proven guilty."

Judge Pritchett has attended numerous judgeship and judicial training seminars and schools and more recently was awarded a Certificate of Study following a special training conference of the National College of the State Judiciary in Reno, Nevada.

In reference to his continuing judicial training, Judge Pritchett said, "I am personally convinced that it is absolutely essential for a judge to continually study and prepare himself to be a qualified arbiter on the bench." He continued, "The New Mexico Supreme Court has handed magistrates new rules of procedures for both criminal and civil cases that require positive understanding and interpretation if the magistrate is to keep abreast with the attorneys that practice before his court."

Pritchett added, "I want to express my grateful appreciation to the attorneys in Lincoln County who have signed my petition for office. I am proud of this approval since a Magistrate Judge must really study the Supreme Court's rules of criminal and civil procedure in order to keep up with these attorneys during court." Judge Pritchett is past president of the Ruidoso Rotary





ORDINANCE NO. 74-1

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A MUNICIPAL JUDGE, ESTABLISHING HIS JURISDICTION AND LOCATION OF THE MUNICIPAL COURT, DEFINING HIS DUTIES, QUALIFICATIONS, TRAINING AND BENEFITS; PROVIDING FOR ALTERNATE MUNICIPAL JUDGES; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREBY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO:

ARTICLE I JURISDICTION, LOCATION, PRESIDING OFFICER

Section 1. The municipal court has exclusive original jurisdiction over all offenses and complaints under the codes or ordinances of the Village of Ruidoso and may issue subpoenas and warrants and punish for contempt. The court shall be located in quarters provided by the Governing Body and shall be presided over by the municipal judge.

Section 1. ELECTION: The municipal judge shall be elected as provided by law. Any vacancy shall be filled by the Governing Body.

Section 2. QUALIFICATIONS: The municipal judge shall be a registered, qualified elector of the Village of Ruidoso and shall reside within the corporate limits of the Village of Ruidoso.

Section 3. TRAINING: The municipal judge shall annually as a condition of discharging the duties of that office, successfully complete a judicial training program conducted under the authority, or with the approval of, the court administrator, unless exempted from this requirement by the chief justice of the Supreme Court. No municipal judge holding office after December 31, 1973 shall receive any salary until he has successfully completed, or been exempted from, the required judicial training program.

Section 4. BOND AND OATH: The municipal judge shall be covered by the corporate surety bond covering all municipal officials in the amount of \$5,000.00; said bond to be conditioned upon the faithful performance of his duties and to the paying over to the Village of Ruidoso all fines, forfeited bonds and other money which comes into his hand by virtue of his office. The municipal judge shall take the oath of office as required in Section 14-2 NMSA 1953.

Section 5. APPOINTMENT OF TEMPORARY MUNICIPAL JUDGE: In the event of the temporary incapacity or absence of the Municipal Judge, the Mayor or Mayor Pro Tem of the Village of Ruidoso, may appoint any registered voter of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, to hear and determine cases arising under municipal ordinances in the Municipal Court in his place and stead. The temporary Municipal Judge so designated and appointed shall be paid the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day that he shall sit and serve as Temporary Municipal Judge, such sum to be paid out of the General Fund of the Village of Ruidoso; provided however, that in the event the duly elected and qualified Municipal Judge shall be incapacitated or absent from his duties as Municipal Judge for more than thirty (30) days in any calendar year, then and in such event, the compensation for such Temporary Municipal Judge shall be deducted from the salary of the elected Municipal Judge in a manner to be determined by the Village Clerk. The requirements of law relating to money collected, monthly reports, itemized statements and penalties apply to temporary municipal judges. The temporary municipal judges shall be covered by the corporate surety bond covering all municipal officials.

Section 6. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS AND SALARY: The municipal judge is entitled to vacation, sick leave, holidays and all employee benefits granted other municipal employees. The municipal judge shall receive a salary of \$3,000.00 per year payable at the rate of \$250.00 per month through March 5, 1974, after which date the municipal judge shall receive a salary of \$6,000.00 per year payable at the rate of \$500.00 per month; it being the intention of the Governing Body that the salary shall not be increased during the current term of office of the incumbent.

Section 7. RECORDS AND REPORTS: The municipal judge shall keep or cause to be kept a record of every traffic complaint, uniform traffic citation and other form of traffic charge filed in his court and every official action and disposition of the charge by his court. Within ten days after disposition of every charge of violating the traffic code of the Village, the municipal judge shall, upon forms furnished by the commissioner of motor vehicles, prepare, certify as correct, and forward to the State Department of Motor Vehicles an abstract of the record. A report need not be made of any conviction in-





Inside The Capital

SANTA FE — The legislature set fiscal 1974-75 general appropriations at about \$982 million, up some \$43 million over the current year.

Individual income taxes were cut but a corporation income tax decrease died. Single income taxpayers received a break. The tax credit for low income taxpayers was increased.

A major new public school formula was adopted. It is intended to equalize educational opportunity for New Mexico school children.

Legislators' comments: Rep. John Bigbee, R-De Baca-Lincoln-Guadalupe-Torrance: "I like the new school formula. I don't like the fact it takes more control away from local boards. It's an improvement over what we had in equalizing the support more among school districts."

"It eliminates local incentive to raise school money by taking credit for 95 per cent of local funds to compute state aid." Gov. Bruce King signed the public school finance formula bill.

Rep. Bigbee, a candidate for reelection, was disappointed the legislature did not adopt a campaign practices act. He says: "We really don't need major reform. We could do a little work on the existing law and put some teeth in it."

Sen. John Morrow, D-Colfax-Union-Harding-San Miguel: "Every area of the state got some recognition in things that will help them." Morrow said public school people accept the new public school formula well. He said it allows local school boards to take cognizance of increased living costs.

Sen. Morrow sponsored a bill authorizing an animal research center and appropriating \$300,000. Emphasis will be on a study of respiratory diseases of cattle weighing 300 to 600 pounds. New Mexico State University regents will choose the center location.

Sen. Morrow says: "I hope it will be Clayton." He is a rancher. He was not disturbed at death of the campaign practices act "because this was putting limitations on a candidate but no limits on opposition from non-candidate groups."

Morrow says: "Campaign reform is this simple: All donations should be made by check or money order and all disbursements made by special check and audited at the end of the campaign with no limits."

Rep. William J. Upton, D-Luna-Hidalgo, said he expected to contend with about \$5 million more in spending than was appropriated. Rep. Upton, a retired banker, will seek a third House term.

Rep. Upton said the new public school finance formula "to a certain extent equalizes expenditures all over the state." Upton says the legislature should have passed a campaign practices act. But he said the amended bill the Senate sent the House was too complex to accept.

Rep. Upton says: "Campaign expenditure and contributions reports should be posted on courthouse bulletin boards for public information." He says a \$368 million general appropriations level will meet state needs and not threaten the state's fiscal future.

Rep. Clifton Moreland, D-Quay-Union, says the public school finance formula "will help the little schools." House, Logan and San Jon school districts are in Moreland's House District 67. He will seek re-

election to a third term. Rep. Moreland, an oil company lobbyist, sponsored a bill clearing the legislature to Gov. Bruce King. The bill says no oil company, withholding its retail or wholesale production from New Mexico, can receive its federal fuel allocation from the state.

Rep. Moreland said: "The energy crisis will hurt much more than many people think." He said business volume is down 30 percent in Taos. The legislature voted a \$2.2 million general fund appropriation to cities and counties. Included was 1.2 million for cities and counties whose gasoline tax receipts have dropped because of the fuel shortage.

Rep. Moreland opposed some tax cuts. But he voted for income tax relief in middle income brackets.

Sen. Kenneth Schlienz, R-Quay-Curry, said failure to adopt a campaign practices act was "one of the biggest failures." He said: "Pre-let back home want change a reform."

Sen. Schlienz said the new open meetings law is good legislation although it was watered down. But he favored open meetings of House and Senate finance committees. They can still be closed under the new act.

Sen. Schlienz voted against the General Appropriations Act because he believed the public school funding level should have been higher. He said the House sent \$408 million in spending bills to the Senate. "They just didn't screen them as well," he said.

Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, said: "We didn't get much of an income tax cut but we got some." Total income tax and tax credit relief was \$11 million. Berry voted against the public school finance formula because it could hurt Lea County school districts in the future.

He noted often-used property tax ceiling for school districts will be banned next Jan. 1. The House killed a bill appropriating \$15,000 for a mini-park at Williamsburg, Sierra County. The Senate had approved 37-0.

Featuring the natural beauty of the National Forests in Arizona and New Mexico, the color illustrated booklet describes the major resources of forest lands and their key role in the total Southwestern environment. It also briefly recounts the history of the conservation movement in the United States and milestones which led to modern philosophies in natural resource management.

Bicentennial Center will feature a mural with such outstanding American heroes as — Karl Marx, Friedrich Engels, Joseph Stalin, Mao Tse-tung and caricatures of President Nixon wearing a mustache and a gangster costume and Tricia Nixon Cox with an Afro hairdo. A nice portrait of Angela Davis is also included.

With some of the things going on in Washington, we expect that this is a pretty clear cut view of lots of the citizens in that notorious community. We will just assume that the Bicentennial Center was paid for with taxpayers money, just as some of the schools for making bombs during riots have been paid for in the same way.

We would suggest, if the painter of the mural is so enthralled with communism, that he renounce his citizenship in the U. S. and move as swiftly as possible to one of the Iron curtain countries. We are sure that his talents would be appreciated there and he would probably never be heard from again. 

High Country Wheels

The High Country Wheels Car Club is interested in getting a sanctioned drag strip for Lincoln County. We feel that the support of all the people in this area is essential to the success of this project. To explain some of the aspects of this project, and possibly answer some important questions, we have these following facts:

1. The dragstrip would be far enough away from all residential areas so as not to create a noise problem.
2. Except for street-stock cars, the drag vehicles would be towed or trailered so no unnecessary noise would be created in areas other than the dragstrip.
3. The relatively remote location of the strip would help to alleviate the problem of heavy traffic before and after race events.

With only two weeks remaining before the election, I would like to take this opportunity to explain two points about my position.

Last week I mentioned only one specific issue, zoning and planning. Zoning and planning in itself is an important issue that concerns the future of our community. Water, sewage, pollution of our river, preservation of our natural environment, etc., all are part of the overall picture in zoning and planning. There are many additional issues that concern all of us in Ruidoso. Issues like the creation of a community center, drug traffic in our community, upgrading our schools, the lodging tax for advertising our community, whether or not gambling should come to Ruidoso, the creation of a municipal airport and numerous other projects. I do have my own opinions on these topics. However, I would like to repeat here the one pledge that I made in last week's article. I will see that all voters in this community have the opportunity to voice their opinion and vote on every major issue that confronts the council before it is voted on. Due to the cost of a direct mail-out, I will be using a tear-out questionnaire in The Ruidoso News. This procedure will give each voter the opportunity for real representation by this councilman. I will use these questionnaires in determining my vote and in any council discussion prior to a vote.







SANTA FE — I think the people of New Mexico were the losers on Sunday, Feb. 10 when we considered House Bill 300.

Several of us had worked with the Department of Public School Finance on an amendment to the appropriations bill to guarantee a ten percent increase in teachers' salaries that would have excluded only the richer districts in the state, where salaries are already far above the average state wide.

Rep. Tom Hoover presented the amendment to the chief clerk. When majority leaders saw the amendment, they quickly cut off debate and would not even allow the whole amendment to be read to the House, or even recognize Rep. Hoover to say what the amendment would do.

In all my years in the House, I have never witnessed such inconsiderate and rude treatment. The citizens' representatives should have been allowed the opportunity of voting on this matter.

There have been times that I have opposed such an amendment because of the problem of usurping the authority of local school boards. However, this particular amendment, I think would have worked because it would have put the money in the districts where it is most needed.

AMERICANS

"The United States dollar took another pounding on German, French and British exchange this morning hitting the lowest point ever known in West Germany.

It has declined there by 41 per cent since 1971 and this Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the Americans as the most generous and possibly the least appreciated people in all the earth.

As long as sixty years ago, when I first started to read newspapers, I read of floods on the Yellow River and the Yangtze. Who rushed in with men and money to help? The Americans did.

They have helped control floods on the Nile, the Amazon, the Ganges and Niger.

Today the rich bottomland of the Mississippi is underwater and no foreign land has sent a dollar to help.

Germany, Japan, and to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy, were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts.

None of these countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States.

When the franc was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was

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

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McGuire's Bucket At The Buzzer Spoils Capitan's Late Rally

Joe Bob McGuire had his lowest scoring night of the season, the going scoreless for 32 minutes of Saturday's game against Capitan here. But a split second after the buzzer ended the game, his last second shot fell straight through the cords to give Ruidoso a 58-56 win over Capitan.

The shot wilted an aggressive comeback by the Tigers who, with only five seconds left on the clock, had tied up the game on two good free throws by Robert Abercrombie. Abercrombie scored the last six Tiger points in their charge that finally tied the game with only the five seconds left.

Kelly Perryman, a junior varsity starter, was the other Ruidoso hero for the game as he came off the bench cold when Piggy Griego fouled out with just over two minutes left in the game. He stayed cool and hit four free throws in a row and added a two pointer to single-handedly hold off the Tiger charge until Abercrombie hit the tosses to tie it up for the first time in the second half.

With only five seconds left, no time-outs and the Tigers pressing all over the court, Dick Underwood inbounded the ball deep to McGuire who was streaking down the sideline just past mid-court. He continued down the side and then headed for the basket. With the Capitan defender still right on him, McGuire gave a little move and went up with the shot. It arched just over the defender's fingers and as it reached the top of its arch, the buzzer sounded ending the game. A moment later the shot ripped straight down through the net as the Ruidoso gym erupted in pandemonium.

Before McGuire's two point night Saturday, his lowest point production had been six points and he had seldom failed to score in double figures. Yet the night had to be one of the most satisfying for the Warriors' second leading scorer.

Abercrombie was top scorer for Capitan with 17. David Pumphrey and Sam Townley also scored in doubles with 12 and 10 respectively.


Ruidoso was helped by 62 percent shooting from the free throw line while missed charity shots helped sink the Tigers who hit only 33 percent from the line.

Following the final game Saturday, Billy Holder, district governor of the Rotary, presented the trophies to the winners while Bill Elliott announced.


With the third year under their belts, the Rotary Tournament has established itself as a junior high classic drawing heavy crowds and top basketball action.



Harris Reports Aims Of Progressive Slate

I have been a resident of Lincoln County since the year 1917, and of Ruidoso Downs since 1940, when it was known as Palo Verde.

At this time, Jack Holloman, the man for whom the air base at Alamogordo is named, established a lumbering operation behind what is now the Ruidoso Downs City Hall. This later became known as the J. G. Harris Lumber Co.

Another lumber operation was established on what is now known as Denton Field by Mr. A. E. Beavers and Mr. C. A. Denton.

Due to the increasing population of the area, it became imperative that we have a water system. To do this, it was necessary for us to incorporate. A resolution to this effect was passed by the County Commissioners on Oct. 9, 1947; we were given the name of Green Tree by the Post Office Department. Many of us were dissatisfied with this name, and when approached by the owners of the race track to change our name, to Ruidoso Downs, we did so, thus putting the name of Ruidoso Downs on the map.

I have had an active part in the building of a water system for Ruidoso Downs from the time when we used scrap pipe and donated labor, until the present system, which was bonded in March of 1963.

I was a charter member of our Volunteer Fire Department, first established May 11, 1954, and served on it for many years — some six years as Fire Chief.

Since our incorporation, the solid waste problem has been a major one for Ruidoso Downs.

Our first attempt at a land fill was on forest land a short distance below Ruidoso Downs, one-half mile South of the highway. This was an excellent location, but due to lack of personnel and equipment, we were unable to maintain it properly, and when it was closed by the Forest Service, a site was located on B. L. M. land on the Ft. Stanton Mesa. This site was chosen because it was centrally located for Ruidoso, Capitan, Ft.

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

Stanton and Ruidoso Downs. This was done in the mid-60's. Because of the primitive roads and distance, this land fill site put a great financial burden on Ruidoso Downs and as a result, with the help of the people of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, I have helped establish a site about two miles below Ruidoso Downs.

I am thankful for the support that I have had in this effort, and beg forgiveness of those who feel offended; but we are bringing our trash to a central place where it is being contained, and not scattered over the country side.

While we all take great pride in the improvements that we have made to our culture, our economy, and our comfort over the years (a Race Track, Ski Run, lakes, housing, roads, Historical Society, etc.) I think we take too much for granted our Greatest Assets of all, and the principal reason that we are all in this locality, and that is our pure air, and our clear skies, and our beautiful streams and lakes, and our forests and wild-life, and our wonderful landscape.

As a community, this is our Greatest Gift, and should be cared for accordingly.

This will mean proper waste management, both liquid and solid, sewer and land fill.

In the past, it was customary to use the fire pits or incinerators, as happened to be the case, as a place to dispose of the waste of our community. There was no charge for this; this was simply the logical place to dispose of trash. As we grew, it became necessary to find another way. In all of these 24 years, no one has sought to solve this problem except as the emergency arose.

Now suddenly, it has become a campaign issue in Ruidoso Downs, and this is good. This shows that those who seek political office in Ruidoso Downs are beginning to recognize this problem.

It will be well if this interest endures beyond the coming election, because in 12 months the contract on the present land fill expires and those in authority will be faced squarely with the problem of location and maintenance of a land fill site.

As to the investment of our Sewer Bonds, anything that I do in this matter will be strictly according to the laws of the state as interpreted to me by counsel and the New Mexico State Board of Finance.

We are taking the proper steps in the progress of our sewer project and we are on schedule and the outcome of the coming election will have no effect on the progress of it. We have been promised a part of approximately \$25,000,000 allocated to be spent in New Mexico

in this way and are assured by the E. I. A. and our Senators and Congressman that Ruidoso Downs has top priority in this matter and letters from them stating this have appeared in this paper and are posted on the bulletin board of Ruidoso Downs City Hall.

Until our sewer is installed, our street problem must remain a maintenance problem, as the ditches for the sewer lines would damage any improvements that we might make. After the lines have been installed, I would promote a street improvement program, preferably paving, as much as we can sensibly afford.

The time has come to expand our water system, i.e. storage and source of supply. There are two good wells in our Village that should be considered. They are on the old sawmill sites, one on the Denton Field property and one on the J. G. Harris sawmill site. There is another source of supply that I would consider, and that is the Eagle Creek Water Users' Association. Ruidoso Downs is the only community on the water shed in this area not receiving water from this source. Another source is the Ruidoso River.

There are three good men seeking election with me on the Progressive Ballot.

Warren Carpenter came to Ruidoso Downs in 1940, about the same time as myself. Mr. Carpenter and I have been closely associated since then and I know him to be an honest, hard working progressive-thinking man, and he would be a complement to the Village Board of Ruidoso Downs.

Albert Richardson is a native of Lincoln County and has been a resident of this locality for the past 30 years. He has served with the Sheriff's Department, C. & L. Lumber and is now a rancher. I have known Mr. Richardson some 30-odd years and know him to be a level thinking man of the highest character, who is concerned with the future of Ruidoso Downs.

Brisco West came here nine years ago with a firm background in law enforcement and we are fortunate to have him serve as judge in our Police Court.

My Police Department speaks for itself and I am proud of what it says.

We are all home owners in Ruidoso Downs and we will do what we can to promote its welfare and progress.

I consider it a privilege to have been able to serve my community and I will continue to do this to the best of my ability.


