Every election has its strange oddities and then there are also some strange oddities that are created or devised after every election. Regarding this week's Ruidoso Municipal Election, the 702 Ruidoso residents who took advantage of their constitutional right to personally voice their choice for an elective municipal official by the ballot, really left eighty-eight votes in the voting machine.

The 702 voters, if they voted for one mayor, two trustees and one municipal judge, had a combined total of 2,808 votes and strange as it may seem, to some anyway, only 2,720 votes were cast. Only 693 voted for a mayor, there were 87 votes left in the trustee race and 22 still remain in the municipal judge's race. All I can say is that someone did not get their constitutional worth out of the election.

There is another strange oddity regarding the four man mayor's race. For example, if the 693 votes cast for the four hopefuls were divided equally it would result in each candidate receiving 173 votes. The winner, Leon Farrar, received 229 votes which is fifty-six votes over the average while the last man in the race, Elmer Pirelli, received 121 votes, 52 votes under the average. By the same token the second place winner, Lloyd Davis, Jr., received 192 votes, nineteen votes over the average and the third place winner, Shorty Stoneman, received 151 votes, 22 votes under the average.

Now consider just what could have happened if the nine people who did not vote for a mayor had voted for the second place winner and the third place winner received only the 173 average (more than he really received) and the fourth place winner picked up the third place's 22 votes above the average which would give the fourth place winner 22 plus the 173 average plus his 52 under the 173 average which really would result in his getting 247 votes. The results... maybe it can be injected here that the Biblical statement, "the first shall be last and the last shall be first" prevails.

So you see, those nine individuals who did not exercise their right to vote for a mayor and the 57 who failed to pull the handle for a trustee and the 22 authorized voters who failed to judge for a judge really could have created a computer catastrophe.

We do commend the 3 elected council candidates who were elected by the people to serve our village and truthfully offer our sincere assistance in every and any way possible to promote Ruidoso and provide its citizenry with a better Ruidoso. Our current council is sure to provide the very best for our readers, after all we now have an EARL... and someone to WARREN us before we go FARRAR out, someone to DON our village problems and when problems come we can always write Dear AB-by. Top this with one legal mind. Jon Thomson and it looks like a good combination not forgetting the HINE site of Jim Hine.

We do congratulate Leon Farrar, Don Riley and Ab Gunter and trust that their new association with Earl Allison and Warren Tucker will make for great Ruidoso happenings. Equal congratulations are certainly extended to newly elected Municipal Judge Sam Nunnally.

# Local Municipal Voters Make Their Choice

Ruidoso municipal voters, Tuesday, March 7, in a near record number and with a record number of candidates, 16 in all, from which to select four open municipal elective positions, elected a long time Ruidoso resident, Leon Farrar, 46, to serve a two year term as mayor of this tourist seasoned mountain resort village.

The voters also elected a former Ruidoso resident, Ab Gunter, as Village Trustee, and elected to return current Village Trustee Don Riley, appointed as Village Trustee last September, to fill a vacancy on the council. Both newly elected trustees will serve four year terms each.

Voter selection for the fourth open municipal elective position, Ruidoso Municipal Judge, was overwhelmingly in favor of Sam Nunnally. Nunnally's 490 vote total led the entire 16 candidate slate. The newly elected Municipal Judge defeated Ruidoso Mayor George P. White by 338 votes.

Mayor-elect Farrar, a twenty-eight year resident of Ruidoso and reportedly making his first bid for public office, led the four mayor's race with 229 votes. The voters' number two choice, former Ruidoso Mayor, 1966-70, Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., polled 192. Finishing third and fourth respectively in the mayor's race were George "Shorty" Stoneman, 151 votes, and village trustee Elmer Pirelli, 121 votes.

Tuesday's municipal election total of 702 voters casting ballots was only ten shy of setting an all time record number of voters in a Ruidoso municipal election, according to James L. Hine, Ruidoso Village Clerk-Manager. The 1970 municipal election totaled 711 voters, while





**25 Years Ago**

News Items From Ruidoso Issue of March 7, 1947.  
A long article in this issue of The Ruidoso News tells the story of Ft. Stanton from April 12, 1855 to March 1947. The article states in part: On April 12, 1855, Captain Henry W. Stanton lost his life in a gallant stand against the Apache Indians as head of a detachment of the First Dragoons of the United States Cavalry. For him Fort Stanton was named. In 1861 Fort Stanton was burned and abandoned by the Union forces when Texas troops approached to give battle. In 1863 it was re-occupied and in 1868 the buildings still now being used were built around the grassy quadrangle. On April 1, 1889 after armed troops had been transferred from Fort Stanton, President William McKinley, by executive order, set aside the Fort Stanton Military Reservation, made up of 43 square miles of land, for the use of the Public Health Service. Today the Fort Stanton Marine Hospital is a self-sufficient community with the primary purpose of helping to heal the seamen from American merchant vessels who are afflicted with pulmonary tuberculosis.

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**News 'N Notes**

This news from Las Cruces—Homemakers looking for ways to save a buck, take note!  
You're being summoned by ridiculously low prices at retail egg counters. Oversupply and low prices at egg farms have caused retail prices to tumble to the lowest level in months. Offerings of "three dozen for a dollar" are common.

"In terms of premium high quality animal protein, that's a still-about one-fourth the cost of bone-in-steak," declares Dr. D. W. Francis, extension poultry specialist at New Mexico State University. The poultry specialist wants the over-supply of eggs to be rapidly moved through market channels, and he is asking homemakers to help.

"Find new ways to use eggs in main course dishes and desserts, especially for lunch and dinner," he urges. "Extend the use of eggs beyond breakfast."  
He says a search of the cookbooks will reveal interesting possibilities: salmon egg foyage, varieties of omelets, eggs florentine, and dozens of sauces and desserts.

"Don't feel you're being shorted on nutritional values by increasing your use of eggs," he says. "You're improving it. Egg protein is so perfect that it's the standard for rating proteins from other sources. Eggs are rich in vitamins. They contain all essential minerals except calcium, which is in the shell."

Some reminders about cooking eggs:  
1. If an egg is cooked too long or the cooking temperature is too high—the protein shrinks and makes the white tough and the yolk mealy.  
2. The green discoloration that sometimes appears between the white and the yolk of a hard-cooked egg is not harmful. Unattractive it may be—but no problem. However—you can prevent this discoloration by cooking eggs at low temperature, avoid overcooking, and cool promptly.

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?  
A. Frenched Pork Loin Roast  
Q. How is it identified?  
A. After being cut from the center of the pork loin, meat is cut away from the tips of the ribs of the roast to expose about 1 inch of bone. Paper frills are placed on the bone tips after roasting. The roast contains the loin eye and usually includes a portion of the tenderloin at the sirloin end. The back bone should be loosened at the market by sawing across rib bones at 1954.

Q. How is it prepared?  
A. By roasting. Place meat, fat side up, on a rack in an open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer, so bulb is centered in the thickest part. Make certain bulb does not rest in fat or on bone. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325°F.) to well done (170°F.). Allow 30 to 35 minutes per pound for roasting.



### Price Freeze Questions and Answers

(Q) I sold my home last December at a \$5,000 profit. Do I have to report this as income when I file my 1971 return?  
 (A) Not, if, within one year before or after the sale you buy and occupy another residence that costs as much or more than the sales price of the old residence. Additional time is allowed if you construct the new residence or you were on active duty in the U. S. Armed Forces. In such a case, the tax is postponed, not forgiven. Any gain not taxed in the year you sell your old residence is subtracted from the cost of the new residence giving you a lower basis to be used in the event of a later disposition. If you sell the new residence in a later year, and again replace it, under similar circumstances, any tax on the gain you realize may continue to be postponed.  
 (Q) I paid my daughter's medical insurance premiums last year. Do I include these premiums in the amount of support I furnished her when figuring out whether or not I can claim her as a dependent?  
 (A) Yes. You may include as an item of support medical insurance premiums you paid, as well as other expenditures you made for her medical and dental care. However, the benefits received from medical insurance policies are not included in support.  
 (Q) After four years of attending college full-time and

working part-time to help pay for it, I graduated last year and took a full-time job. Can I use income averaging to reduce my tax?  
 (A) Before you can consider income averaging, a basic requirement is that you must have furnished 50 percent or more of your own support during each of the four years prior to 1971. IRS Publication 506, "Computing Your Tax Under the Income Averaging Method," explains all the details of income averaging. It's available free by dropping a postcard to your IRS district office.  
 (Q) I sued to recover damages for injuries I incurred in an auto accident. I settled for \$7,500 before we ever got to trial. Is the \$7,500 tax-free?  
 (A) Yes, if it is compensation for personal injury or illness. Such compensation is not taxable, whether you receive it after trial or through settlement.  
 (Q) Where can I get a copy of the IRS Booklet, "Your Federal Income Tax"?

(A) You can buy it for 75 cents at larger Postal Service stations, IRS district offices, and branch bookstores of the U. S. Printing Office throughout the country, or by mail from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402.  
 (Q) Are there any limits on how much you can deduct as a charitable contribution?  
 (A) Yes. In general, contributions to most charities, such as churches, educational organizations, hospitals, etc., may be deducted up to 50 percent of your adjusted gross income. However, contributions to certain private non-operating foundations, veterans organizations, fraternal societies and cemetery organizations are limited to 20 percent of adjusted gross income. The organization itself can tell you which of the two categories it falls into.  
 There are also certain limitations on contributions of property, such as stock. For details, see IRS Publication 526, "Income Tax Deduction for Contributions," available free from your IRS district office.  
 (Q) I had two jobs last year and I think my employer withheld too much for Social Security. How can I get this back?  
 (A) If you worked for two or more employers during 1971 and received more than \$7,800 of wages subject to Social Security tax, you are entitled to claim the excess Social Security tax withheld as a credit against your income tax. Check your tax returns instructions for information on how to compute the credit.

**Corporate Taxes Due March 15 For 1971**  
 Wednesday, March 15, is a Federal tax deadline for corporations whose tax year ends December 31, 1971.  
 Corporations must file a 1971 income tax return, or an application for extension of time for filing, on Form 7004 by March 15. Maurice E. Johnson, District Director of Internal Revenue for New Mexico, said today.  
 At least 50 percent of the balance of the tax due when the return is filed or when the extension is requested on March 15 must be deposited in an approved commercial bank or a Federal Reserve bank. Deposits should be made using 503, "Federal Tax Deposit, Corporation Income Taxes."  
 Publication 542, "Corporations and the Federal Income Tax," which provides detailed information on this subject can be obtained free, in person or by mail, from your IRS District Office.

## Ministerial Alliance Sponsored Cover-All Moves Headquarters

Two years ago, women from seven Christian Churches in the Ruidoso area banded together, under the sponsorship of the Ruidoso Ministerial Alliance to put their Christian faith to work.

Involved are the First Baptist Churches in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, the Catholic, Christian, Episcopal, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches; and the Assembly of God is being invited to join, as some of their members have indicated a desire to help.

The organization took for a theme, "The Cover-All". The idea is to provide a place where people can bring all the things they don't need or want, but which are too good to throw away—so others can come and get what they want or need for a token price; and where people of the area can become acquainted with each other. Above all, the organization stands ready to give whatever help it can wherever it might find a need.

Permission was granted by Charlie Seed (former owner of Sierra Blanca Motor Co.) to use an abandoned cafe building he owned in Ruidoso Downs, until the property sold. Some of the women then got busy and swept out hay and the evidence of mice and spiders and battled greasy dirt as best they could without hot water. Finally, some of the men came to the rescue and finished the cleaning, found a stove, had gas put in and fixed the wiring so electricity could be hooked up—and the Cover-All became an active place on Tuesday afternoons.

In the two years they have been in business, the Cover-All has handled an unbelievable amount of clothing—and all sorts of other things, from appliances and furniture to artificial flowers, books, toys, etc. They have furnished clothes to Fort Stanton and promised the Mesalero Head Star program they can have whatever they want if they'll come and pick it out. They have sent several pick-up loads of clothing to El Paso, where some church groups have received it gratefully; and money has been turned over to the Ministerial Alliance to be used to meet any

needs which came to their attention. The number of people who say "Thank You" when they pay for what they get—and the appreciation exhibited by customers has been a revelation.

Now, the Seeds' property has been sold; and the Cover-All has had to find a new home on short notice. Another place was found in Ruidoso Downs, on the south side of the highway, about two buildings down from an Antique Shop on a corner next to the Community Center. If anyone has any doubts about the sincere dedication of the women of the Cover-All, he should have gone down there and watched some of those women tackle the filth and dust and broken bottles and useless junk and accompanying smell that was in that place. It is a pretty wonderful thing that there are women in this world who will willingly take on hard, dirty, depressing hopeless looking jobs in the hope of helping others.

A call has gone out to the churches involved, and anyone else interested, to help with the moving Thursday evening at 5:30 so—anyone who is interested can go see them—or any Tuesday afternoon between 2 and 4 p.m.—Some Christians do care!

## Federal Spending With A Flair!

When that pleasant day rolls around that we all look forward to, April 15, here are a few thoughts to remember: Up to 1970 our representatives in Washington had spent the following sums of public monies on the listed "indispensible" items—

International Cooperation Administration	\$11,463,835,000
Food For Peace	20,162,387,000
Office of Economic Opportunity	9,575,153,000
Eskimo Dwellings	1,590,000,000
Reconstruction Finance Corp. (1948 only)	10,648,931,259
Urban Renewal Administration	6,924,791,000

These are but a small sampling of the many thousands of federal projects underway with—looks to us—only one purpose, to spend money.

A prime example is the Job Corps. At one camp the estimated yearly cost for training one individual was \$39,205. A survey of private schools showed that it takes less than a year to train a man to be a computer programmer or an electrician at a yearly cost of about \$4,500.

According to an evaluation of the program, the increase in employment of those who did finish the course was only 5 percent!

We are constantly hearing of families that have lived as parasites on welfare for as long as four generations and who obviously have no reason for ever working again. Some welfare is necessary, but the free-handed politicians in Washington are not the ones who should make the decisions as to those needing it. Local governments are much more apt to remember the real need.

We would suggest that you remember these facts when you mail your check to the Internal Revenue Service and especially to remember them when you cast your ballots in November. There is hope for economy in government at the ballot box.

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**Your Social Security**  
Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative, reminded workers who receive tips that cash tips amounting to \$20 or more in a month with one employer are covered by social security.

"You must give your employer a written report of the amount of your tips within 10 days after the month in which you receive them," Mrs. Graves said. "Your employer will collect your contributions due on these tips from other wages he owes you or from funds you turn over to him for that purpose. Otherwise your contributions must be paid by you directly to the Internal Revenue Service," Mrs. Graves commented.

"Your employer includes your tips reported to him along with your wages in his social security wage reports and on Form W-2, but he does not have to match your social security contributions on the tips," Mrs. Graves said.

around Santa Rosa into Santa Rosa. Jaramillo overrode Santa Rosa City Council and approved transfer of a license from 2.5 miles west of Santa Rosa to 2525 E. Will Rogers Drive in Santa Rosa. Ownership also passed from Jubencio Lucero to Canuto Sanchez. The City of Santa Rosa sued Jaramillo in Santa Fe District Court and challenged his authority. Teutsch set a March 20 deadline for filings.

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## CONWAY from the CAPITAL

Just before the Session started, I mailed out approximately 2,000 questionnaires regarding issues which would probably come up during the Session. 365 were returned, which I thought was quite good. As I am told that on most of these questionnaires you are lucky to receive 2 to 3% back. In this column I will list each question and the percentage of yes-no answers.

1. Should the taxes and fees on big commercial trucks be increased? Yes-68%, No-32%.  
I voted yes on the truck tax bill, which is expected to increase revenues by approximately 4.2 million dollars. This money goes to a road fund and hopefully we will see some of this increase coming to our area. The figures on what will be necessary to maintain our road system when all the interstate is completed are staggering, and we are certainly going to need this money.

2. Should public employees be allowed to strike? Yes - 23%, No - 77%.  
No bill was introduced during this short session on this question. It came up during the 1971 Session, and on that bill I voted No.

3. Should the state revenue surplus be returned to taxpayers? Yes - 33%, No - 67%.  
I don't recall any bill coming to the Senate specifically that would return the surplus directly to the taxpayers. I think a bill may have been introduced in the House, but it died in the figure. Had the bill come to the Senate in this form, I would have voted against it.

4. If not, how should it be used? One-time Expenditures - 11%; Schools - 54%; Welfare - 2%; and Saved - 32%.  
No bill was introduced which would have specifically done any of the four things which are listed under this question. Some of the money was used for one-time expenditures, the schools received a good increase in money, some parts of the welfare program were slightly increased, and some of the money was saved. I interpreted the selection by 54% of the people as wanting the money spent on schools to be the community feeling on helping our schools. I voted yes on all of the bills which would benefit our schools, as our school funding remains a top priority.

5. Are subdivisions and land-use regulations needed in New Mexico? Yes - 76%, No - 24%.  
6. If yes, should the regulations come from State or County? State - 49%, County - 51%.  
I will answer these both together as they are interconnected. In the previous column I wrote about the subdivision bill

that came to the floor of the Senate. It was referred to as the "Dunn Bill" as the bill we had was the one which Senator Dunn had introduced in the Senate Judiciary Hearing. This bill placed most of the control over subdivisions in the Counties, but it still maintained considerable State control. Many of the subdividers thought it was too strong, and the environmentalists thought it was too weak. I did not think it was the perfect bill, but it was certainly a place to start and I voted yes. The bill died in the House through the actions of three so-called strong environmentalists and consequently we have nothing new. The subdivision problem is being assigned to an Interim Legislative Committee, which hopefully will come up with something for the next Session as we need legislation in this area.

7. Should the laws on marijuana be relaxed? Yes - 15%, No - 85%.

As I wrote last week, this question came up in the Control Substance Act. I offered the amendment in the Senate to keep the penalties for possession of marijuana exactly the same as they are now. My amendment failed, and I was one of the six Senators who voted against the bill. As I wrote last week, the Conference Committee was able to get the penalties increased from what was originally in the bill, but not to the same level as the amendment which I proposed.

This will be my last regular column, but I hope to write a few during the next several months on the work of the two interim committees which I serve on, the New Mexico Judicial Council of which I am Vice Chairman, and the University Study Committee. Both committees will be meeting approximately once a month and I will summarize their work so that you will have more insight in the work of the interim committees. I hope that all of you have enjoyed this column, it has been rather hurriedly written at times, but I want to keep you informed as best I can on the major areas of legislation, and I certainly wanted you to know how I voted and why I voted that way. Again, I want to thank all of you who have taken the time to call and write me and stop me on the street to explain your feelings on the legislation. I especially want to thank the editor of this paper for donating the space for this column.

## Inside The Capital

The new House reapportionment bill, signed into law by Gov. Bruce King with the emergency clause, is a Chinese puzzle.

Both House and Senate reapportionment bills were submitted in Santa Fe County District Court this week for approval.

House District 8 counts 13 Valencia County precincts with 11,115 population and 4 McKinley County precincts with 3,783 residents. Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, lives in the district. District 9 is an all-Valencia County district that includes 6 Belen precincts. Rep. Richard Carabajal, D-Belen, lives in District 9.

Valencia County Bosque Farms Precinct 9 was placed in District 10 with 10 Bernalillo County precincts. The division: Valencia County, 2,036 population, Bernalillo County, 12,438. Rep. William Upton, D-Deming, is in District 32-6 Hidalgo County precincts totaling 4,734 population and 10 Luna County precincts with 10,149.

Luna County Precincts 17 and 19, totaling 1,557 population, were placed in District 33 with 11 Dona Ana County precincts of 13,269 population. District 36 spans all of Sierra County with 7,183 population and 7 Grant County precincts totaling 7,593. Rep. Murray Ryan, R-Silver City, lives in the district. District 41 brackets 8 Taos County precincts and 24 Rio Arriba County precincts. The Taos County precincts are Questa, Garro, Costilla, Ojo Caliente and Tres Piedras. Rep. Jose Benito Chavez, D-Rio Arriba, is the incumbent in the district. Rep. Alfonso Vigil, D-Ranchos de Taos, is in all-Taos County District 42 embracing 19 precincts with 14,308 population. The norm is 14,514. District 50 spans all of Guadalupe County with 4,969 population. Five Torrance County precincts with 3,148, Fort Sumner Precinct 1 in DeBaca County with 860 and 9 Lincoln County precincts with 5,810. The Lincoln County precincts are at Captain, Corona, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, San Patricio and Hondo. Reps. John Bigbee, R-Encino and Ralph Petty, D-Ruidoso, live in the district. Lincoln County Precincts 8 and 4 at Carrizozo are in Dis-

trict 52 with 7 Otero County precincts. Rep. Maurice Hobson, R-Alamogordo, lives in this district. The division: Lincoln County, 1,552; Otero County, 12,349.

Lincoln County Angus Precinct 12 with 124 population was assigned to District 51, with 13 Otero County precincts totaling 13,787 population. Rep. John J. Merston, D-Clarendon, lives in the district. DeBaca County Precincts 2 and 3 at Fort Sumner, were combined with 10 Roswell precincts in Chavez County in District 57. The incumbent in the district is Rep. Colin McMillan, R-Roswell.

The provisional House plan places Eunice Precincts 71 and 72 and Jal Precincts 73, 74 and 75 in Lea County in all-Lea County District 62. Retiring Rep. George Blocker, D-Jal, lives in the district. Four Curry County precincts and 11 Roosevelt County precincts are in District 6. Rep. Cecil Cook, D-Portales, lives in the district. District 64 spans 17 Curry County precincts—10 of them in Clovis. Reps. Hoyt Fattison, R-Clovis, and Ralph M. Pruitt, R-Clovis, live in the district.

Rep. Robert Johnson, R-Clovis, lives in all-Curry County District 65 that embraces 15 Clovis precincts. The provisional plan calls for an at-large House member to run all of Lea, Roosevelt and Curry Counties. Its constitutionality is doubtful. The plan was shaped to avoid splitting Lovington and Portales into different districts within the cities.

An alternate Lea-Curry-Roosevelt plan in the House reapportionment bill places Jal and Eunice precincts in a district with 5 Hobbs precincts in Lea County. Reps. Blocker and Robert Moran, R-Hobbs, live in this alternate district. District 67 places all of Quay County with 10,900 population in a lineup with 6 Union County precincts of 3,293 population. Four of the Union County precincts are in Clayton. The others are Sedan and Amistad. Rep. Clifton Moreland, D-Tucuman, lives in this district.

District 68 spans all of Colfax County with 12,170 population and 7 Union County precincts totaling 1,722. 

## Danger With Kites

"No Metal" is the key for safety in kite flying—meaning "no metal in the kite, string, or in the air" (in the form of electric wires) near where the kite is being flown.

This is the advice offered to kite-flyers—young and old—by Gerald Wood, Ruidoso manager for Community Public Service Co.

Other safety tips: keep the kite string dry and don't fly your kite on rainy days. Avoid busy streets and highways, and stay away from TV antennas. "If your kite does get snagged on a power line," Wood stressed, "don't try to climb up and get it down. Call the CPS office for help."

The kite-flying safety rules are being publicized in posters for school bulletin boards, and in newspaper ads, both sponsored by the power company.



## Tax News

Medical Equipment, Etc. is Deductible

Taxpayers know about most deductible medical expenses — including such obvious things as hospital, surgical, and professional fees, as well as the cost of medicines, drugs and health insurance premiums.

According to H & R Block, America's Largest Tax Service, most Americans who in the past have claimed medical deductions, are fully aware of the fact that they may only deduct medical expenses which exceed 3% of their adjusted gross income. For this reason many people in upper income brackets have never been able to deduct medical expenses. Under a fairly recent rule, however, one half the cost of medical and hospitalization insurance premiums (up to \$50) may be deducted without regard to the 3%

limit. This could mean a fairly substantial tax saving to those who in the past have been unable to claim any medical deductions.

Other deductions that people often overlook are costs of round-trip transportation to seek medical care, and fees paid to specialists other than an M. D. These specialists include osteopaths, chiropractors, psychiatrists, podiatrists, dentists, and Christian Science practitioners as well as other healers.

Deductions for transportation costs are most frequently overlooked, says H & R Block. If a person's ailment is such that it is necessary to travel to a specialist 1,000 miles away from his home, he should deduct the cost of such transportation. Of course the transportation is deductible even if you only travel 15 blocks on a subway or bus. If you drive your car you can deduct the cost of gasoline and oil for your automobile, or take

a flat deduction of 6¢ a mile.

Other items often overlooked by taxpayers, says Block, are elastic bandages, wheelchairs, hospital beds, or any other medical equipment (usually prescribed or recommended by a doctor), that must be rented or purchased to enable a patient to regain physical or mental health. Many items not prescribed by a doctor, that contribute to your health or physical well-being, may qualify as deductions within certain regulations. A competent tax consultant can advise you which items qualify.
