Plan for Preservation and Growth Presented for Lincoln at Meeting

A Plan for the Preservation and Growth of Old Lincoln Town, prepared by the New Mexico State Planning Office, funded by the Department of Commerce and the Four Corners Regional Commission, and with the assistance of the Department of Development, South-eastern New Mexico Economic Development District, the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission and a great number of residents and interested parties in the area, was presented at a special meeting in the Courthouse at Lincoln last Saturday morning.

David King, State Planning Officer, noted that area residents wanted to preserve the village but also wanted to allow growth for the area. He pointed out that the plan reflected the strong will and community spirit of the people of Lincoln.

The study was initiated in the fall of 1972 and covers detailed plans for local utilities on flood control, telephone service, electrical power, sewage and water systems. The first of its kind, the study addresses itself to Lincoln's history, environment and architectural esthetics and approaches the subject with a view of protecting and preserving the town's identity and character.

Santa Fe architect Bill Lumpkins served as the architectural consultant for the project and pointed out that future construction could be made compatible with existing buildings, as has already been done by many of the town residents. The plan proposes the restoration of many of the existing structures in the village, several of which are now state owned.

A great deal of southern New Mexico history took place in Old Lincoln County, of which Lincoln was the county seat, which was comprised of 27,000 acres.

The village was originally named La Placita del Rio Bonito, and was settled by Hispanics in the early 1850's, but the town was made into the county seat in 1869 with the establishment of Lincoln County, and the name was changed to Lincoln.

Lincoln is probably best known for the exploits of Billy the Kid and the Indian Wars of the late 1800's, but these ac-

tivities mark only a short portion of the true history of Lincoln County and the southeastern New Mexico area.

The study noted: "The town of Lincoln is a rarity among villages with a historic past, in that most of the buildings which were still in existence. Many are in good to excellent condition." "The town, then still displays fine examples of its historical architecture. Furthermore, it retains its old open village character. Lincoln has not grown since the 1880's—in fact, has declined in population—but with renewed interest in the area's history, and considering its attractive rural atmosphere, rapid growth may be imminent. A plan for growth is therefore in order."

The restoration of Lincoln was begun in the 1930's by the Museum of New Mexico and the School of American Research and the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission was established in 1949. Mrs. Dessie Sawyer is the head of the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission.

Members of the Advisory Committee on the Lincoln Study are, Albert Bookley, Walter Henn, Arnold Dockery, Mrs. Ofella Salas, Mrs. Fulgencia Zamora, William Pfingstner and Mrs. Juanita Abercrombie.

Top priority in the restoration is water and an FHA loan has been obtained for the project. A grant has been forthcoming from the EDA but costs have increased by 20 to 30% since the grant was approved. King noted that a meeting was planned with the Four Corners Commission in Phoenix next week and that he felt that the extra funds could be obtained from this source. \$15,000 in National Park Service funds have already been set aside for the project. He stated that the original EDA grant of \$60,000 had fallen about \$30,000 short of needed funds.

Old, New Ruidoso City Councils Close Past Term - Start New One

The old and new councils of the village of Ruidoso each met in the past week, one to retire, the other to commence the upcoming two years of the new council.

The outgoing council met last Thursday in a meeting that the village attorney John Thompson determined did not meet the requirements of the new Open Meetings Law recently passed by the legislature. As such, no official business could be conducted or discussed in the meeting and it served only as a farewell to the departing members of the council.

Mayor Leon Farrar and Trustee Earl Allison were present for the meeting. Farrar had not sought re-election to the board and Allison was an unsuccessful candidate for mayor.

The other departing member of the governing body, Trustee Warren Tucker, was not present for the meeting.

Farrar thanked both departing and remaining members for their cooperation and diligence in serving on the council. He

pointed out that this spirit had made his job much easier and credited it for the many accomplishments of the village during his two years.

Village manager Jim Hine thanked the mayor and council for their service to the village and in particular noted their great concern for the village employees. Speaking in behalf of all of the employees of the village, Hine thanked the entire council for this concern.

Just before the meeting was adjourned, in a record 12 and one-half minutes, Farrar was presented with a pocket knife, "for all of the fishing he'll finally get to do."

The new council met Monday morning in an organizational meeting required by law.

Newly elected Mayor Lloyd Davis, Jr., was out of town on business and Trustee Ab Gunter served as mayor pro-tem for the short session.

At the session, the new council dealt with two procedural matters to set down the operation of the council. They passed two resolutions, one establishing the procedure for conducting business. This remained the same as it has been for the past four years.

The other measure established both local banks to serve as depositories for municipal funds. This also is a procedure established four years ago.

Hine presented copies of the municipal bank balances and investments, a statement of bonded indebtedness and the current cumulative operating statement for the fiscal year to the new council. He also reviewed some of the current projects underway by the village to bring the new members up to date.

These projects include the million dollar water project, proposed joint sewer project, library and senior citizens center. He noted that Ruidoso is also involved and represented in the committee to study the feasibility of building a new area airport facility.

Included on the agenda was the appointment of village officers, including village manager, police chief, attorney, engineer, inspector and heads of all of the departments of the village.

With Davis absent, naming of these officials, as well as membership of various boards and commissions such as cemetery and planning and zoning, was postponed. No changes are anticipated.

The first regular meeting of the new governing body was set for Thursday, March 28, 7:30 p.m. At this time, the council will conduct the first business of the new session. The council will, for the time being, follow the established meeting schedule to meet on the second and last Thursday of each month.

Alert Passersby Saves Business

An alert passerby early Wednesday morning averted what could have been the total destruction of the Ruidoso Downs Package Liquor Store by fire.

Warren Baker and Gaynell Fleming were driving by the store at about 4:55 a.m. Wednesday when Mrs. Fleming thought she noticed smoke in the store. They drove back to the store and when they found it full of smoke, notified the owner, Norm Wheeler and the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department.

When firemen arrived at about 5:10, the rear door of the store was blazing and flames had reached the ceiling and walls around the door inside.

They quickly extinguished flames that were very close to bottles of liquor displayed on the back wall of the store. Wheeler said that if the fire had burned for just a few minutes more and the bottles started exploding, "the place would have come up like a bomb."

Ruidoso Downs, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and New Mexico State Police officers were investigating the cause of the fire Wednesday morning which started on the outside, at the base of the back door which was barred. There was no apparent attempt to enter the store.

Chestnut of El Paso.

Johnson said that when they were apprehended, approximately \$300 worth of damage had been done to the car. The larceny and vandalism charges stemmed from this damage as well as the damaged campsite.

Sgt. Johnson left for Alamogordo Wednesday morning where he was going to file the charges with the district attorney there. He commended Cleaver for his outstanding work on the case.

Four Youths Captured Near Capitan Gap With Stolen Car

Four youths, two of them juveniles, were apprehended Saturday evening in a stolen car near Capitan.

According to Sgt. Jack Johnson of the New Mexico State Police, the four were arrested with the car on the Capitan Gap Road by himself and Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Dennis Cleaver about 8:40 p.m. with the car that had been taken from the Bonito Lake area about 6:20 p.m. Saturday.

Arrested by the officers were David J. Yost, 19 of Plano, N. Y. and Lincoln, N. M.; David E. Swift, 19 of Carrizozo, and two juveniles who were not identified. The adults were arraigned before Magistrate Bill Payne of Carrizozo.

All four have been charged with auto theft. Separate charges of larceny and vandalism have also been filed against the four. Swift was released by Judge Payne on his own recognizance and Yost remains in the Lincoln County jail on \$2,000 bond.

The juveniles were turned over to juvenile authorities and then released to their parents. According to Johnson, the four were roaming the Bonito Lake area and while they were there, they vandalized a campsite several miles above the lake.

When they returned to their truck they found all four tires flat and began walking. One of the youths apparently decided he didn't want to walk any more, left the group and stole the car belonging to James

Miss New Mexico To Be Hostess For Miss Central N. M. Pageant

Miss New Mexico 1973, Patti Nelms of Roswell, has been selected by the Ruidoso Jaycees to serve as mistress of ceremonies for the Miss Central New Mexico Pageant they are sponsoring in the high school auditorium Saturday.

Miss Nelms, sponsored by the Roswell Jaycees in the state pageant last year, will graduate this spring from Southern Methodist University where she is majoring in Spanish and English. She was an honor graduate from Goddard High and has added numerous scholastic awards in her four years at SMU.

The 21-year-old brunette won the talent competition last year on her way to winning the state title and the trip to Atlantic City, N. J. She also served as mistress of ceremonies for the Miss Alamogordo Pageant. She hopes to continue in school for her master's degree and then teach English at the college level.

"Ideas and concepts are the basis of all creativity, and I hope to encourage original thinking for young people of America," Miss Nelms explained.

She is currently an honor student at SMU.

Miss Nelms will host the annual pageant which this year will include nine contestants, four from Ruidoso, four from Artesia and one from Truth or Consequences. The contestants

will represent a broad range of talent ranging from musical instruments through dramatic presentations.

In addition to the pageant events which will begin with evening gown competition, followed by talent presentations and finishing with swim suit competition, the pageant will include a modern dance performance by the reigning Miss Central New Mexico, Cathy Hine.

Miss Hine was a runner-up at the state pageant in Hobbs last year and at the end of the evening, she will pass her crown on to the new winner.

All of the contestants will also take part in musical numbers at the opening and close of the pageant.

For the 1974 pageant, the sponsoring Jaycees have posted \$750 in scholarship awards for the winners.

As well as the top scholarship award, the winner of the pageant will earn a trip to the state pageant at Hobbs, sponsored by the Ruidoso Jaycees. From there, she has the opportunity to be named Miss New Mexico and represent the state in the Miss America Pageant in August.

The Miss Central New Mexico Pageant is the first step toward a possible trip to Atlantic City and the Jaycees promise a show worthy of the Miss America tradition.

Hospital Seeks Rate Increase

Roland Walsh, administrator of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, at a news conference held last Monday, reported that a request for exemption from Economic Stabilization Phase Four regulations for rate increases be allowed the hospital because of drastic increases in costs of medical supplies, wages, and food prices. He noted that the only businesses still under control were the oil industry and hospitals.

Walsh stated that, unless the increase was granted by the Cost of Living Council, the hospital would be required to cut back on services and reduce the capabilities of the institution to stay within the budget. He estimated that the hospital

would lose a total of approximately \$82,000 this fiscal year.

In requesting a larger increase than the 7.5% allowed per year by the ESA, Walsh pointed out that there had been only one increase of 6% since 1969. He predicted that three or four small hospitals in New Mexico will close this year because of the regulations, and noted that the Ruidoso Hospital was the first to make application for an exemption and receive approval from the state advisory board, who must approve before the request can be forwarded to Washington. The application was submitted Jan. 30 and an answer is expected within a week or two.

If the requested increase, which will bring the hospital to a break-even level, is approved,

it would be implemented by April 1.

Low Wages Bring Turnover

When asked about the loss of key personnel at the hospital, Walsh noted that about 40 employees draw the minimum wage (\$1.60 per hour) and that the entire staff average was \$2.00 per hour, therefore, there is a large turnover of the 85 employees of the hospital. He pointed out that the number of Registered Nurses had been increased by 100% since Presbyterian Hospital Center assumed operation of the hospital in November of 1972 and that the physical plant, which was valued at \$202,000 in 1969, is now valued at \$1.6 million. After talking to many friends, I wish to announce that I will run again for County Commissioner.

After serving for a little over a year, I have become aware that it is impossible to get all the things done that a commissioner would like to get done. Some of the things which we have made gains on, but have not completed, is the paving of Highway 37, Highway 42, and a program of improving Highway No. 14 to Gran Quivara.

Some of the things which I feel are of interest to the public and for which I would like to state my position on, is the improved quality of our county road system. Although there is always work to be done in improving many roads, we do feel that most roads have been noticeably improved. We were fortunate in being able to secure approximately \$100,000 of new road equipment and this has enabled us to move approximately five times as much gravel and road material in an effort to improve our road system.

I have strong feelings for our hospitals and feel that we should do everything in our power to give them the necessary help they need. Due to the Attorney General's opinion in 1973, it was necessary for us to remove the 3/4 mill levy. Recent legal opinions have enabled us to go on record to the effect that the 3/4 mill levy will be reinstated with the beginning of the new fiscal year, July 1 1974. I would hope it may be possible for us to assist both hospitals through some other area, possibly through Revenue Sharing.

Presently we are in the process of obtaining a water system in the historic site of Lincoln. I feel very optimistic that this will be finalized in the very near future.

The 1973 New Mexico Legislature required all counties to institute their own subdivision regulations and meet the minimum state guidelines. Although this presented quite a hardship on the commissioners, workable subdivision regulations were developed which met the state requirements. I feel that the regulations are good but will become better with revisions which will be made periodically.

Due to our increased operations, our increased subdivision areas and with the big increase in cost in 1973-74, it has been increasingly difficult to live within our budget that was formulated in early 1973 and approved in June 1973.

Another interesting matter is the fact that the State Legislature has now set the salary of elected officials at \$12,000 per year and each commissioner will receive \$3600 per year. This will become effective January 1975.



to point out that your tax is very near 20 mills, whereas the State receives this 20 and returns to the county approximately 1/2 — with certain restrictions attached. The only tax that stays 100% in the county is the hospital 3/4 mill levy. In lieu of the 3/4 mill levy, the county furnished approximately \$25,000 to offset this temporary loss.

During 1973-74 we, as commissioners, have had several requests to close roads, I am opposed to closing any road that leads to the forest. I feel that the main attraction in our area is the climate and mountains which attracts many tourists. I feel that more access roads to forest lands and campsites should be developed.

In closing, numerous projects are still in the preliminary stage. Again, thank you for the opportunity in allowing me to be a part of your community.

May I say it has been a privilege to serve as your commissioner in District 2. I will appreciate your consideration and approval to serve you for the next two years.

A PROCLAMATION

As America enters its second year of peace after a decade of conflict, it is highly appropriate for us to acknowledge the debt we owe to those veterans who served in the Armed Forces during the conflict in Southeast Asia. The untiring devotion that characterized our Armed Forces during this trying conflict is a tribute to the national character.

There are over six and one-half million Vietnam veterans, of whom more than two and one-half million served in Vietnam. Despite significant disruptions in their lives and other personal sacrifices, they answered the call of their country and served with great distinction.

As a Nation, we have acknowledged our deep respect and admiration by setting aside March 29, 1974, as Vietnam Veterans Day to remember that the honorable peace America achieved came through great sacrifice. Those who served, those who gave their lives, those who were disabled, and those who are still missing in Southeast Asia — and whose full accounting we shall continue to seek — deserve the profound gratitude of their countrymen. For this purpose, the Congress has authorized and

requested me to issue a proclamation designating March 29, 1974, as Vietnam Veterans Day. NOW, THEREFORE, I, RICHARD NIXON, President of the United States of America, urge the people of this Nation to join in commemorating Friday, March 29, 1974, as Vietnam Veterans Day with suitable observances.

I direct the appropriate officials of the Government to arrange for the display of the flag of the United States on all public buildings on that day; and I request officials of Federal, State, and local Governments, and civic and patriotic organizations, to give their enthusiastic support to appropriate ceremonies and observances throughout the Nation.

I urge all citizens of every age to participate in the events of this day as one means of honoring those men and women who served their country faithfully and courageously during the Vietnam conflict.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-sixth day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred seventy-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred ninety-eighth.

Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

SANTA FE—State brass decided in a quiet meeting that property tax ceding with a \$2.5 million impact can be used one more year.

But a 1974 property tax law amendment requires this procedure to boost school local revenue: School budget forms were revamped to reflect the change. Cities and school districts will enter formal ceding contracts. State approval of agreements must be obtained.

The new property tax code will wipe out ceding next Jan. 1. But it can be legally used in fiscal 1974-75, beginning July 1. Seventy-one of 88 school districts are ceding—a swap of up to 2.25 mills of property tax that adds dollars to school districts' revenue.

Ceding added these amounts in the current year: Animas, \$11,033; Belen, \$113,426; Bernalillo, \$32,045; Clayton, \$22,479; Corona, \$22,456; Cuba, \$15,237; Des Moines, \$6,845. Also ceding: \$99,723; Fort Sumner, \$18,169; Graevy, \$4,655; Hondo, \$9,631; House, \$4,816; Jal, \$86,359; Jemez Springs, \$44,442; Los Lunas, \$49,373; Maxwell, \$53,369; Melrose, \$13,716; Ojo Caliente, \$13,304.

Questa, \$29,936; Pecos, \$3,730; Raton, \$7,239; Santa Rosa, \$16,744; Springer, \$8,594; Taos, \$21,394; Tabung, \$93,437; Texico, \$12,185; and Vaughn, \$7,434.

Among school districts not using ceding are Truth or Consequences, Cimarron, Clovis, Deming, Lordsburg and Ruidoso. After fiscal 1974-75 a method must be found to replace the \$2.5 million lost to the 71 districts.

Sen. John Conway, R-Alamogordo, seeks re-election in a district of all of Lincoln and part of Otero Counties. Reportedly, Alamogordo Democrat Rolly Buck will seek the primary nomination to Nov. 5. Conway is a former Otero County Democratic chairman and retired State Corporation Commission member. Conway is Senate GOP leader.

A statewide political committee, Good Government, was formed by conservatives to push for fiscal responsibility in the legislature. Santa Fe partner Hanagan said the non-partisan committee believes in limited government.

Hanagan said, "Profit is not a dirty word. The state should not spend money it doesn't have." Among initial committee directors are ex-State Rep. George Blocker, Jal; Les Davis, Cimarron; W. R. Nichols, Springcr, and Reuben Pankey, Truth or Consequences.

The influential Legislative Finance Committee voted narrowly 4-3 not to file a suit challenging constitutionality of some of Gov. Bruce King's partial vetoes of the General Appropriations Act.

LFC Chairman C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, strongly supported court action. Trujillo is a state senator representing Taos, Mora and San Miguel Counties. The LFC whacked King's vetoes of contingency language — language effecting appropriations only if expected federal money is received by a state agency, for example. The purpose is control over state spending.

Lt. Gov. Roberto Mondragon, 33, of Nambé, Santa Fe County, announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for the U. S. House in Northern District 1. Mondragon had no announced Democratic opposition. He is set to oppose U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan, Jr., Albuquerque Republican, Nov. 5.

The State Republican Central Committee voted hurriedly to change its rules so Murray Ryan of Silver City can stay on as New Mexico GOP chairman and seek re-election to the State House.

Ryan will try for a fourth term. He represents all of Sierra and part of Grant Counties. Sen. Conway was named to the interim Legislative Insurance Study Committee. Sen. Ray Leger, D-Guadalupe-De Baca-San Miguel, was placed on the Health and Aging Study Committee. Leger replaced governor-running Sen. Jerry Goddard, D-Las Cruces.

Reps. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, and Dan Berry, D-Eunice, were picked on the host committee of the National Legislative Conference, expected to attract 3,000 to Albuquerque in August. Governor-running Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, resigned as chairman of the Health-Aging Committee, but Echols remained on the committee.

Results of a \$14,000 Town of Lincoln restoration study were presented Saturday, March 16, by State Planning Officer David King to a 10-member Lincoln citizens advisory committee.

Two thousand copies of a report, "Lincoln, New Mexico, A Plan for Preservation and Growth", were printed. State brass made decisions on

Restoration of the historic town.

Mrs. Dessie Sawyer, Crossroads, Lea County, co-operated in the venture as chairman of the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission. Federal planning funds are sought.

The Highway Commission will open bids Friday, March 22, to build a bridge over Carrizo Creek, 15 miles south of Clayton on NM-18 in Union County.

U. S. Sen. Joe Montoya urged a Senate subcommittee to approve \$2.5 million for construction on Los Esteros Dam project near Santa Rosa in fiscal 1974-75.

State Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo approved a liquor license ownership transfer at Jal from Don Lee Gillet, doing business as Pactus Bar, to Elias Garcia. Price was \$29,000 for the permit, two lots, stock and other items.

Streakers Hit!

Streaking, thefad that is sweeping the nation, weekend as unsubstantiated reports told of a number of the unclothed runder dashing about Ruidoso and down the slopes of the Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

The first reported incident occurred in the early hours of Saturday morning when three naked men were said to have scampered in the chilly night air from the Buckaroo Lounge to the Hideout Lounge.

Several other streakers were said to have been performing in the area of the post office early that same morning.

The streakers are reported to have come out of the cover of darkness though on Sunday as announcements that it was the final day of skiing at the area, coupled with the balmy spring day on the slopes, prompted a number of young men to doff their duds for a season-ending dash down the slopes in the buff.

Slivers coming down from the mountain Sunday evening reported bands of streakers on Captain run overlooking the lodge as well as lone streakers working their way down Deep Freeze and then taking a "slow streak" back up the chair lift to their clothes.

One streaker, apparently unabashed by onlookers, removed his clothes at the top of Captain, skied down, rode the T-bar back to the top after his clothes. Finding them gone, he calmly skied back to the bottom and into the midst of a large crowd that was guarding them.

Both occupants of the west bound car were sent to the hospital for treatment, as well as the driver of the other car. A passenger in the east bound car was uninjured.

New Fish Regulations To Begin April 1

Trout stamps, junior-senior licenses and licensing 12 and 13 year olds, mark the main changes for New Mexico's 1974-75 fishing license year, which begins April 1.

The changes, instituted by the 1973 Legislature, also include a new system of paying license vendors' fees.

Trout stamps, required April 1 for fishing in trout streams and lakes, cost \$3.00 if they are to be attached to a \$12.00 residents-only general hunting and fishing license; a \$5.50 resident year-round fishing license or a \$10 non-resident, year-round fishing license.

A \$1.00 trout stamp can be affixed to the \$1.00, residents-only junior-senior fishing license; the \$2.00 resident or non-resident one-day fishing license; the \$5.25 five-day, non-residents-only fishing permit.

The trout daily bag and possession limit is eight trout of any species. There is a special size limit in Cabresto Lake and the lower Red River below the hatchery, where no more than two trout in the regular eight-trout limit can be more than 12 inches long.

The \$1.00 junior-senior fishing license can be purchased by resident anglers who are 12 or 13 years old or who are 65 years old or older. Non-residents 12 or 13 years old or 65 or older must purchase regular, non-resident fishing licenses.

The Fisheries Division of the Department of Game and Fish emphasized that the only legally unlicensed anglers are those who have not reached their twelfth birthday at the time of purchase.

A one-day license, formerly available only during the summer months, can now be purchased at any time of year.

The vendor's fee, is added to the license and stamp cost at the rate of 50 cents for licenses costing more than \$5.50 and 25 cents each for licenses and stamps costing \$5.50 or less.

Youngsters and oldsters who are both anglers and hunters can realize a small savings by purchasing a junior-senior license with trout stamp — \$2.50, including vendor's fees — and a general hunting license for \$9.50, including vendor's fees, for a total of \$12.25. The law requires a \$3.00 trout stamp to be attached to the \$12.00 general hunting and fishing license — a total of \$15.75, including

Vendor's fees.

Trout stamps can be purchased at the same time as the license or can be purchased separately — the 50 or 25 cent vendor's fee will be charged for each in either case.

The stamps are required year-round for fishing regular trout waters, from Oct. 1, 1974 thru March 31, 1975 for fishing winter trout waters; and in southern Rio Grande trout waters from April 1 through July 1, 1974, and from Feb. 1 through March 31, 1975.

Southern Rio Grande trout water is the stretch between Elephant Butte Dam and the town of Williamsburg.

Winter trout waters, where trout are planted and a trout stamp required from Oct. 1 to March 31, 1975, are: Bataan, Bottomless, Carlsbad Municipal, Carrizozo, Chaparral, Conservancy Park, Eunice, Green Acres, Jal, Oasis Park and West Lakes; Arisco, Belen Riverside, Cor-



Montgomery Station To Be Rebuilt If Funds Can Be Obtained

When New Mexico State University's Montgomery Biology Research Station near Ruidoso burned March 7 in a forest fire, the research and service projects came to a halt.

The fire razed some 160 acres of forest, including 15 acres of a 20-acre plot where the research station was located. Dr. Max Dunford, associate professor of biology, said the research station alone was valued at \$35,000.

The concrete block building housed sleeping facilities for 29 people, a kitchen, bathrooms, temporary laboratories,

work space for research activities and storage.

Little equipment was lost in the fire since provisions are transported from campus when needed, Dunford said.

Dr. William Dick-Peddie, biology department head, noted, however, that the loss of trees and the interruption of projects with NMSU and other universities and government agencies is next to impossible to estimate.

The facility has been used not only by biology students and faculty, but by other departments such as wildlife sciences and agronomy for research and study. Other departments have also conducted field trips at the site.

In addition, visiting universities have used the area for collecting soils and field trips to study soil, vegetation and animal types because of peculiarities of the area's floristic and faunistic composition.

Located in Lincoln National Forest, the site provides easy access to five life zones for biological study.

The burned structure also provided a government service. The U. S. Forest Service has used the site in the past for a fire suppression school and had planned to use it again this summer, Dunford pointed out.

"All projects in progress at the facility will have to be re-scheduled or other facilities will have to be found. Research will be drastically limited because researchers will have to camp out in the area unless the building is reconstructed," Dunford commented.

Plans are to rebuild the station if funds are available. Dick-Peddie explained insurance covering the station is based on the cost of the structure when it was built in 1967.

County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

Lincoln County boys and girls learned how to start judging at the Judging Clinic Saturday at Captian. The morning started out with Neil Burcham, Livestock Judging Coach at New Mexico State University, giving the group some ideas for taking notes for giving oral reasons on classes of livestock, horses or wool.

There were over 75 boys and girls and leaders at the clinic. Wallace Cox, Extension Horse Specialist, explained what you look for in judging horses and emphasized that no oral reasons should be over two minutes long.

John W. Cooper helped the group get started judging wool and sheep. Demonstration classes of horses, sheep, beef cattle and wool were shown to the group. They then judged two classes in the afternoon. Livestock for the clinic was furnished by Hugh Adkins, John W. Cooper, Preston Stone, Ronnie Eldridge and Fletcher Hall. Assisting with the clinic in taking reasons and judging classes were Scott Shafer, Nancy Knight and John W. Cooper.

R-R-D

Apple trees bear most of their fruit on the outer four to five feet of the tree. This was pointed out by Douglas Bryant, Extension Horticulturist at New Mexico State University at the fruit school in Honda. Any tree over 10 ft. wide has some wasted space in the center. The newer apple orchards being

planted are closer together and the trees are smaller.

As a result only \$16,500 is available — much less than is needed to rebuild.

Should the facility be rebuilt, biology professors plan to make the most of the situation. Since water is available on the property, the professors hope to develop ecological studies at the fire area and the immediate vicinity.

Work can be done with natural and controlled reseeding. Irrigation can be provided during the dry season to experiment with the idea of speeding up the plant coverage process.





 Sen. Domenici's office has been in contact with the National Zoo and Malcolm Hardy of the Forest Service, who watches over the famous bear from Capitol Mayor Jay Johnston had asked Sen. Domenici's office to look into reports that Smokey was near death.
 "The best information I have at this time is that Smokey is in good health for his 24 years, his sheen is good, his appetite excellent, and he is experiencing the normal winter slowdown other bears suffer through," Sen. Domenici said.
 "We've been told that he has at least a couple of good years left," Sen. Domenici said he was

... talking to Forest Service and zoo officials about the possibility of returning Smokey's body to Capitol's Smokey the Bear Museum when the bear dies.
 "No decision has been made and, apparently, will not have to be made for some time," Sen. Domenici explained. "We periodically discuss the possibility of returning the bear's remains to Capitol."
 Several New Mexicans have asked Sen. Domenici to attempt to bring the bear's remains back to the state. At the present time, the Smokey the Bear Museum is run by Captain Wotom's Club.
 Twenty-four years ago the bear was rescued from a forest fire in the Capitan region. He has become one of the most famous symbols in American history, requiring his own personal zip code to handle the thousands of letters he receives each week.
 His face appears on countless posters and Americans to help prevent forest fires.
