This weekend, March 31 thru April 2, is really a weather focused three day week that includes a number of local weather dependent events. With April Fool's Day, Saturday, April 1st; the Sierra Blanca Ski Club sponsored Fourth Annual Ski-Tee Tournament, March 31st thru April 2nd; and Easter Sunday, April 2nd, all of which are affected in one way or another by weather conditions, thought it might be of public service to investigate the weather possibilities for the week end.

Regarding the scheduled and already planned ski-tee journey, the skiing session of the special three-day event begins Saturday, April Fool's Day. It is not an April Fool's joke that the official Ruidoso Weather Records, dating back to 1947, reveal that Ruidoso had snow only one time during the past twenty-five years at which time 8 inches of the white manna blessed the area. The welcomed skiing necessity was recorded on April 1, 1949 and it has not snowed on that same day in twenty-three years.

Just how you can figure the percentage possibilities for snow in the light of past records is your own guess other than to report that it did snow once on the day before April Fool's Day, that happy 31st occasion was on March 31st in 1948. Ski Club enthusiasts don't lose faith, as it snowed this Thursday on the mountain and more is forecasted for the weekend.

Sunday, April 2nd, Easter Sunday and also the day set for the golf tournament portion of the annual Ski-Tee Tournament, if the law of repetition has any merit, it doesn't really make for too much gloom. The past official weather records reveal that on April 2nd in the last twenty-five years, it has snowed a total of nineteen inches in four different years. Officially the April 2nd snows came in 1949, 56-57 and 60. Predicting this year's April 2nd weather conditions would be like trying to get a loan at a bank without first offering at least a quart of blood or predicting the outcome of a Ruidoso Municipal election.

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



Quarter Horse Classic Draws 489 Entries

A record total of 489 head were nominated for the '72 running of the Rainbow Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The 400-yard event, slated for Aug. 6, is expected to offer a gross purse of about \$200,000.

The Rainbow is the richest "combination" event in racing. Part of the nominating fees for the Futurity are directed into the Rainbow Derby the following season.

Liz Devine, Ruidoso nominations secretary, expects the '73 Rainbow Derby to top out at least \$250,000—by far the richest three-year-old quarter horse event in racing.

The Rainbow Futurity was first run in 1948, but the race was reorganized into the "combination" format in 1963.

"The Rainbow has turned into a startling success under the combination format," Liz noted. "The race has continued to build and build. Within the next few years, the combined purse total of the Futurity and Derby should reach the half-million dollar level."

The previous record for original nominations was established last year at 435. A total of 195 passed the entry box. The way things look this year, Liz expects some 200 to pass entry for the Futurity, thus creating around 17 trial races. (A certain number of two-year-olds pass the entry box for the futurity with no intention of running in the trials, but simply to remain eligible for the following year's Derby.)

Over 50 percent of the horses nominated to the Rainbow are also nominated to the \$300,000 (estimated) Kansas Futurity and the \$225,000 (estimated) All-American Futurity. The three races are considered the "Tres Coronas" of the glittering Ruidoso stakes schedule.

The biggest single nominator to the Rainbow was J. H. Rose, Jr. of Houston, who named eight head. Five head each were named by the Burnett Estate of Ft. Worth; L. R. French, Jr. of Odessa, Texas; S. F. Henderson of Odessa, and the Travis Ranch of Norman, Okla.

Joe McDermott of Houston was the second biggest nominator with six head.

The '72 Ruidoso season, offering some \$3 million in purses, covers 63 race days from May 20 through Labor Day.

A. degree in Business Administration and resides in Albuquerque.

Federal Income Tax Questions & Answers

Q) Are there any penalties for a tax preparer who sells information from a person's Federal income tax return?

1971 made it a misdemeanor for any person engaged in the business of preparing tax returns, or providing services in connection with such a business or for any person who receives compensation for filing out a return to disclose Federal tax return information or use it for any purpose other than to assist in preparing the return. Violations may be punished with a \$1,000 fine or a year in prison or both.

Q) Are tuition and room and board charges exempt from price controls?

A) Yes. Tuition and room and board charges for state colleges and universities and private, not-for-profit schools, colleges and universities are exempt from price controls. However, private institutions, operating for profit are not exempt from price controls.

Q) I rent out a room in my home. Is the rent I charge subject to control under the economic stabilization program?

A) Owner-occupied dwellings of four or less units having rental agreements are exempt from rent controls.


clothing stores and with any luck and youthful determination they might just accomplish their goal and result in Ruidoso's first Teenage Tycoons.

Manuel T. Torres To Enter Missile Contest

U. S. Air Force Second Lieutenant Manuel T. Torres, son of Mrs. Jovita Torres of 1300 C. Ave., Carrizozo, has been selected to participate in the Strategic Air Command (SAC) missile combat competition at Vandenberg AFB, Calif., April 6-14. Lieutenant Torres, a missile launch officer in the 351st Strategic Missile Wing at Whiteman AFB, Mo., will compete with other top missilemen from SAC's six Minuteman and three Titan wings.

He will represent his Minuteman unit as a deputy combat crew commander. During the annual meet, combat crews will match their skills in electronic, computerized simulators which are virtually identical to operational launch control centers at SAC missile bases.

The competition is scored by electronic computation, with no actual missile launches. While the crews are competing, judges will grade each maintenance team's precision and skill while they are completing essential tasks at Vandenberg launch facilities. The wing scoring the most points will win the coveted Blanchard Trophy, named for

Community Action Grant for Mescaleros

Approval of Office of Economic Opportunity grants totaling \$1,487,210 to seven New Mexico agencies was announced today by Governor Bruce King.

Largest grant was \$857,944 to the Albuquerque Economic Opportunity Board. The grant provides \$22,967 for Community Action Agency administration; \$510,033 for general community programming; \$94,944 for family planning programs; and \$20,600 for general technical assistance within the community.

The Dona Ana County Community Action Agency received \$128,001 to conduct a summer headstart program for 650 children in the 5 to 6 year age bracket.

A grant of \$126,498 to Eastern Plains Community Action Agency will provide \$34,286 for CAA administration; \$23,713 for general community programming; \$6,500 for family planning programs; and \$42,999 in carry-over funds for emergency food and medical services.

Grants to Indian programs include \$70,000 to the Navajo Community College for training and technical assistance; \$64,430 to the Santo Domingo Tribe for community programming; \$95,277 to the Pueblo of Laguna for community development; and \$145,000 to the Mescalero Apache Tribe for its community action program.

The purpose of the competition is to increase SAC's ability to perform its mission of providing an effective nuclear deterrent force of long-range bombers and intercontinental ballistic missiles.



Texas Leads In All-American Nominations for '73

What state supplies the most nominations to the All-American Fairly at Ruidoso Downs? The answer is Texas, according to **Liz Davine, Nominations Secretary at Ruidoso Downs.** Liz surveyed 64 nominators who named a record 1,066 to the '73 All-American. The 440-yard run is a landmark event in racing history with the gross purse slated to reach the fabulous \$1 million plateau.

Of the 1,655 nominees, 303 came from Texas, putting the Lone Star State at the top of a list of 37 states. Oklahoma is second with 110, followed by New Mexico, 35.

SANTA FE — Gov. Bruce King and legislative leaders met early this week on a special legislative session to deal with a court-imposed election crisis. The high level huddle included Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, D-Belen, and Senate President Pro Tem I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra.

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A U. S. District Court decision at Albuquerque voided the \$2,650 filing fee and one-year party affiliation requirements for U. S. Senate candidates. Gov. King said wiping out the filing fee would produce at least 30 to 40 Senate primary candidates. He said many would be non-serious, publicity seekers.

King strongly intimated he would call a special legislative session this week to pass emergency election laws. The filing day is next Tuesday and the primary is June 6. The legislature could change both dates but many other election laws revisions would be required then.

Atty. Gen. David Norvell, formerly of Clovis, said informally the application of the federal court decision would extend to all offices on the election ballot—two U. S. House seats, one state corporation commissioner, two Supreme Court justices, three Court of Appeals judges, 13 district attorneys, 26 district judges, 10 State Board of Education members, 104 legislators and a host of county offices.

Two major courses seemed open to a special legislative session: A return to the unpopular pre-primary nominating convention used in 1964 and 1968 or creation of a runoff primary between the two top vote getters in the first primary.

The pre-primary nominating convention is vulnerable to political boss rule and manipulation. The convention system allowed a candidate who received at least 20 per cent of delegate support to be placed on the ballot. An alternative petition method of getting on the ballot was also provided.

The runoff primary ensures the party's nominee is the choice of those balloting. In the 9-man Democratic lieutenant governor primary in 1970 Robert Mandragon of Albuquerque was nominated with 31 per cent of the vote. Mandragon, elected later with Gov. King, is an ex-Guadalupe County resident.

State Tourist Director Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe won the 1968 Democratic governor nomination in a 6-man field with 31 per cent of the vote. Gov. King has supported a runoff primary for years as New Mexico House speaker and in his present office.

King planned to call a special legislative session to avoid a chaotic election situation with more candidates filing than could be placed on mandatory voting machines and many entering with no intention of campaigning seriously for public office.

The newly released fiscal 1971 Village of Fort Sumner audit found municipal books and records generally in good condition. James O. Walling, Fort Sumner registered public accountant, said 14 vouchers were missing.

About half were submitted by oil companies and all totaled less than \$100 each. State Auditor Frank Olmstead released the audit. Walling reported: "There is very little internal control in the Village of Fort Sumner office."

Village of Fort Sumner salaries total \$26,626. Total assets are \$862,061. The surplus balance dropped \$199,593 to \$520,510 June 30, 1971, auditors said.

The Public Service Commission will approve electrical residential rate increases to Public Service Company of New Mexico boosting the utility's revenue more than \$2.5 million annually.

The firm serves electrical customers in Deming, Belen, Los Lunas, Santa Fe, Albuquerque and Las Vegas. The rate hike will raise residential electricity bills about \$12 a year.

Forest Service Tells Danger of Forest Fires

U. S. Forest Service officials warned today that some Southwestern National Forests are dangerously dry.

Wm. D. Hurst, Southwestern Regional Forester said the danger of wildfire is very high to extreme on the Lincoln, Apache, Cibola, Gila, Coronado and Tonto National Forests in Arizona and New Mexico. The lack of winter precipitation, higher temperatures and strong, dry winds are the principal cause of the rapidly increasing danger, he said.

Fire danger for the Carson, Santa Fe, Coconino, Prescott and Kaibba National Forests is high. We have had 72 fires to date. Those fires were all man-caused and have burned about 1,000 acres. Last year there were a few less fires but more acres burned by this date, he said.

Hurst predicted another critical, prolonged fire season that could be worse than 1971, when more than 130,000 acres burned in the Southwest, mostly on Federal and State-administered lands.

Hurst cautioned all outdoorsmen and recreationists to use all fires and cigarettes with great care. He asked those using the forests to never build fires on windy days and to use their auto ashtrays for smoking. "One careless spark could cause more of the horrible wildfire losses we all suffered in 1971," he said.

Taxpayers Newsletter

INTERIM TAX STUDY—The Legislative Council has appointed the seven-man 1972 Interim Legislative tax study committee, the first meeting has been tentatively scheduled for the week of April 10.

The interim committee, established with a \$30,000 appropriation from the 1972 Legislature, will be chaired by Rep. Eugene Cinelli, D-Bernalillo who was chairman of the 1971 interim tax study committee. Vice Chairman Sen. Flinn Heidel, D-Lea, also was appointed by the Council. Other members include Reps. Edward Lopez, D-Santa Fe; Tom Brown, D-Eddy; Robert Jordan, R-Bernalillo, and Sens. John Rogers, D-Los Alamos and Jack Patterson, R-Chaves.

A five-member liaison committee also was appointed to attend the interim meetings and to offer input into the study. The liaison committee will be without voting privileges, but they were those members of the legislative who were interested in having a voice in the interim tax study. They are Reps. Mur-fel Monell, D-Lea; Frank Salopek, D-Dona Ana; Colin McMillan, R-Chaves, and Sens. Robert McBride, D-Bernalillo and John Eastham, R-Bernalillo.

The Legislative Council, after appointing the committee, set down guidelines for the 1972 interim tax study. Designated as priorities in the interim study were these areas: municipal taxes, property tax distribution, road fund allocation, mineral taxation and green belt taxation. Also included was a study of the proposed constitutional amendment to allow exemptions of certain classes of personal property.

Chairman Cinelli has indicated he will call on Franklin Jones, former aide to Governor Bruce King and former Bureau of Revenue commissioner, to assist in the study. It will be Jones' fifth participation in tax studies since 1963. Jones last

year headed the professional committee that presented a 45-bill package of reform tax measures to the legislature. Last year's study was staffed by the Taxpayers Association under a \$40,000 contract with the Legislative Council Service. Other members of the professional committee besides Jones last year were Fred Moxey of Estancia, Jack Deason of Roswell and Joel Carson of Artesia. Last year's bill drafting was handled by attorneys Steve Durkovich and Ted Pearson under contract to the Taxpayers Association.

This year's tax study will be staffed by three members of the Legislative Council Service—attorney John Jasper (who was former director of the Health and Social Services Department), fiscal analyst Inez Gill and staff secretary Gloria Trujillo.

FRANKLIN JONES—It has been reported that Franklin Jones, who wears the hat of New Mexico's favorite tax expert, has been feeling out the possibility of soliciting financial support from industry to foster a government research-lobbying organization similar to the Texas Research League. The Texas League, operating on a budget of \$291,000 contracts extensively with governmental units in that state to provide studies in a variety of areas. In many cases, federal, state or local funds are available to the organization to carry on the studies, but the Texas League has been known to turn down these governmental funds. The Texas organization's budget comes only from industry and does not include government funds. It is doubtful such an organization could function in New Mexico because of the industrial image of conflict-of-interest. The Taxpayers Association last year underwent severe criticism from the Albuquerque Journal because of its participation in the 1971 tax study. Until the black-hat image bestowed on industry and its representatives and organization is overcome in the press in New Mexico, industrial spokesmen and their activities will be open to shallow criticism.

ALBUQUERQUE CASE—Remarks made by Judge Mary Walters after viewing briefs from both sides of the Albuquerque utilities tax case indicated she would sustain the city's position—that is, the city may make a profit on the operation of its utilities. Such a decision would support similar operations in 20 other New Mexico communities. Behind the court's decision apparently was the passage in the 1972 Legislature of a bill allowing communities to make a profit on the operations of utilities. The limit of profit was not set out in the new statute, nor was the issue of whether or not the utility charges become taxes if used for general fund purposes. It is not expected that the Walters court will set that limit either. The case will be appealed to the State Supreme Court in an attempt to establish permanent authority for the decision. The Taxpayers Association entered the case earlier this year in an attempt to settle the issue of service charge vs. tax. If the Albuquerque court case is upheld by the Supreme Court, New Mexico communities will have a new source of revenue available if they are in the business of operating utilities. This revenue plus that allowed in the last legislative (new excise taxes for municipalities) should greatly relieve the so-called money crisis in many New Mexico communities.

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County Agent's Column

Apple blossoms in March! Yes the apples are blooming now. This is the earliest in many years. Normally you see them in mid-April but they are about a month early. There has been no killing frost since early March. At present there are apricots and peaches on the trees.

Northern New Mexico and Colorado report that the apples will be blooming within a week if the present warm weather continues.

R-R-D

Under authority of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 the Department of Interior is considering restricting the use of chemicals in the control of predatory animals on BLM lands. Unauthorized use of toxic chemicals could, if the controls are instituted, result in the cancellation of reduction of grazing privileges. Interested parties have until May 1, 1972 to submit views concerning the proposed rules and should write: Director (210), Bureau of Land Management, Washington, D. C. 20240.

R-R-D

You may need some help from the children on indoor

noise control, but traffic and neighborhood noises can be lessened. The use of plant materials around the home grounds for sound control as well as aesthetics is a relatively new phase of landscape design. Recent studies show a noise level of 60 decibels or noise equivalent to heavy expressway traffic can cause a rise in blood pressure. Noise in the range of 130 decibels, or equivalent to a jet taking off can actually cause physical pain. Even the sound of your neighbor's lawn mower can be distracting if you are trying to work inside a building.

Several principles of sound barrier plantings can be applied to home landscaping. The thickness or density of a particular planting has a lot to do with its sound absorbing capacity. Evergreens have always been recognized for their value in protection against sound. However, where evergreens are not possible homeowners may wish to consider the use of a dense and wide deciduous hedge. Where space is limited, a dense vine covering on the side of a building can be effective in reducing noise penetration.

In an attempt to control noise, space out plantings, graduating from low to high as they approach the house. A ground cover or low hedge near the sidewalk helps to trap ground level noises. Low trees and shrubs used in island plantings in the lawn area act as intermediate height barriers to the noise. If needed, taller trees may also be used near the house to blot out any second-story sound waves.

One other point is that hard surfaces do not absorb sound. Paved areas for drives, walks and parking should be kept to a minimum. When they are a part of the landscape setting,

Interest Deductions Should Be Studied

Taxpayers planning to claim an interest deduction on their 1971 Federal tax return should be sure to read the instructions carefully to avoid errors, Maurice E. Johnson, District Director of Internal Revenue for New Mexico, advised.

Interest deductions should be entered on Schedule A and attached to Form 1040. The form for itemized deductions gives taxpayers space to list interest, taxes, contributions and other deductible expenses.

Interest paid on a home mortgage, a bank loan or other debt may be deducted if the taxpayer is legally responsible for the payment.

Interest paid for another person is not deductible, Johnson said. This could occur when a parent makes a mortgage payment for his children on a home that is not in his name.
