The idea or premise that only children pretend, play make-believe, assimilate or dream that they are a movie star, cowboy hero, popular singer, spectacular and internationally famous sports figure or a great statesman is really false, as there are also by the same token many adults who play the same kind of game.

One of the noted differences is that the kids usually play their game of make-believe or pretend in secret. They are apparently endowed with a special kid-like kind of innate power that enables them to sit in a school class room during a lecture and at the same time pretend that they are a thousand miles away on some heavenly island or out on the gridiron running for another touchdown with eleven opposing players at their heels.

Although many adults play the same kind of game, in contrast with children, the adults play it out in the open. There are many grownups who pretend they are heroes of some sort or statesmen with special formulas for success and accomplishments.

During special events, seasons or conditions, adults don the robes of kingship, presidents, quarterbacks, school teachers, lawyers, judges, parents and even at times become some kind of supreme being.

Without a doubt, this is the year and the season for politics, which by the way, with the great multitudes who have filed for the equally many multitudes of individual elective offices available, one wonders who will be left to vote.

Because this is the year for politics — it is also the season for the great game of Political Pretending. How many times have you heard someone make the statement, "If I were president," or "If I were a Senator," or "If I were Mayor," or "If I were a Trustee," or "I would do so and so on this and that?"

Sad, but nevertheless true, is the fact that there are some adults who are currently holding elective offices and yet are still pretending.

In the spirit of this season of Political Pretending and looking at the situation on the lighter side, what would you do if you held some high and noble or some not so high and not so noble elective office?

If you were president you might call for a moratorium on taxes of all kinds for one day a year. Perhaps it could be arranged where on that special holiday only the elected officials would work and only the elected officials would pay taxes.

As a congressional delegate you might promote a "Getting To Know You" type of program wherein the elected congressional delegates would have to return to the area they represent and meet the people that both elected them and those whom they serve. It is strange how many elected officials practice the "Who are you" phrase until just prior to time for re-election.

Looking at politics on the local level, and pretending you are in county government or village government could prove to be very interesting to say the least. In the spirit of political pretending just what would you do?

You might paint a huge, full width of the highway, welcome mat for all of the visitors and tourists that exodus to our area, or really be different than other local elected officials by promoting a project to paint all of the streets a special color, that's better than promising to pave them with gold.

As a member of a village council and in the spirit of setting a good example you might secure a grant from some fed-

### Bender Named To DE Hall of Fame

Terry Bender, the Ruidoso High School DE Coordinator has been selected by State of Ohio Department of Education to be listed in the Hall of Fame. Recommendation came from state supervisors and teacher-educators to be installed during 1971-72.

The Distributive Education Hall of Fame was organized under the sponsorship of Distributive Education Division of the American Vocational Education. The award is to be presented during the DECA National Leadership Conference.

The honor was presented not only for Bender's successful years as a coordinator in Ruidoso, but also for his past involvement in Distributive Education. He was a DE student at Iowa City High School, Iowa City, Iowa, and graduated in 1965. He received his BBE in Distributive Education in 1970, and his MBA in Distributive Education and Marketing in 1971. He was a DE Graduate Assistant at the University and helped plan youth conferences in New Mexico, and now he has completed his first year as a Distributive Education Teacher-Coordinator. He has received Outstanding Service awards from the state department a few publishing or writing a book entitled "Distributive Education in Miniature." He also worked his entire way through school and has accumulated over 52 months worth of work experience in jobs related to the field of distribution. Recently the Ruidoso DECA Chapter received second place "Chapter of the Year" award which no other first year program has ever done in New Mexico. Usually a chapter has five or six years of experience before it ever takes first or second.

Shortly after the incident Paul Lukens, Ruidoso Chief of Police, took Watson into custody and at 9:45 Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Jerry Foster, Ruidoso, filed an open murder charge against the suspect. The complaint was authorized and signed by Lincoln County Assistant District Attorney Jack Underwood, Ruidoso.

Investigation by local and county law enforcement officers reportedly revealed that Kazhe and two other Mescalero residents, Roderick Kazhe and Ethel Enjady, were in the Watson home at the time of the stabbing. The report also revealed that Kazhe was stabbed at least once and that he left a trail of blood over a 130 yard course from the Watson residence to the point where his body was found.

Watson was remanded to the custody of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department pending the outcome of his preliminary hearing set for a later date. The defendant requested the court provide him with legal counsel as he was without funds.

### Fifteen Demos and Thirteen GOPs File For County Elective Offices

At the conclusion of the 5:00 p.m. filing deadline, Tuesday, for Lincoln County elective positions in the June 6th Primary Election, fifteen Democrats and thirteen Republicans had affixed their signatures to the required declarations of candidacy document.

The number, 28 in all, reportedly represents the largest number of party candidates ever to file for a county position in a Lincoln County primary election. Nearly half of the total number of county residents filing for a position on the ballot had from Ruidoso and four who named Captain as their residence.

In other statewide filing that concerns Lincoln County electors twenty-eight Democrats filed in Santa Fe for the U. S. Senate seat and twelve Republicans filed for the same U. S. Senatorial position. The Congressional District 2 position, now held by Harold Runnels, Democrat, was unopposed by District 2 Demos and the Republicans filed for the same elective position. They include:

### First Regular Meeting of 1972-73 Ruidoso Council Lasts 3 1/2 Hours

The 1972-73 Ruidoso Village Council, meeting Thursday, March 30, for their first regular business session since the municipal election, opened bids for 1,200 feet of water pipe, approved Ruidoso Police Department personnel salary increases, granted a date for a hearing regarding a local businessman's occupational tax, took action on the water improvement project, heard several requests from various village officials and approved newly elected Mayor Leon Farrar's several recommendations.

One of the first items on the meeting's long agenda, the meeting lasted over three and one-half hours, concerned the opening of bids for 1,200 feet of 2-inch galvanized water pipe. The council accepted the apparent low bid of the Alamogordo Pipe and Supply Co., Alamogordo.

The Alamogordo based firm's low bid of \$83.50, less 2% per 100 feet was accepted by the council.

The council also approved salary increases for Ruidoso Police Department personnel. The pay increases, based on length of service and rank, ranged from ten dollars per month to seventy-five dollars per month with the increase to become effective April 1. Officer Truman McBride was promoted to the rank of Sergeant over the night shift and the council approved the appointment of Larry Simon as a new member of the department. It was noted to the council that two additional officers will be hired as soon as possible.

Ruidoso businessman R. A. Bennett, Bennett's Foodliner, addressed the governing body requesting a hearing, in accordance with village ordinance number 153, regarding his occupational tax. The council agreed to a hearing for Bennett and set the date for April 27 during a regular meeting of the council.

In other action, the council approved the request of Village Engineer Jack Kennedy that the Cherokee Well near the Pinecliff subdivision and purchased by the village last year be activated. Kennedy requested that the well be completed with a six-inch main line, pump and 1,000 gallon pressure tank with a chlorinating unit.

The council also requested Engineer Kennedy to contact the Mescalero Apache Tribal Indian Council requesting approval or disapproval of use of their land by the village for an off river raw water storage facility. Kennedy had previously reported the difficulty and problems in securing land from federal agencies for the reservoir.

Regarding reports from village officials, Mayor Farrar recommended the village employee A. L. Lancaster as the Park Maintenance employee. Lancaster was approved by the council and will begin work May 1.

Upon a request as to the status of the "Thrill Hill" area of Cree Meadows Drive by Trustee Don Riley, Engineer Kennedy stated that revamping of the area would begin within ten days.

Trustee Warren Tucker reported that he thought it would be a good idea to have the Chief of Police invite the Liquor Control Division to Ruidoso for the purpose of conducting a review of possible violations by the owners, operators, etc. of bars.

Trustee Ab Gunter requested that the governing body consider enactment of an ordinance requiring all users of village garbage services to be required to have their garbage receptacles made stationary. The council concurred and asked Village Attorney John Thompson to consider drafting such an ordinance.

Various village board appointments by Mayor Farrar were approved by the council, they include: Beautification Board — Mrs. Carl Erickson, Mrs. Marie Martin, E. S. Hardy and Blair Halladay, Cemetery Board, Mrs. Billie Clarke, Mrs. Lela Eagler, Mrs. Jean Moore, Mrs. Lynda Samelson and Albert Jay.

The Mayor also requested that those currently serving on the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission continue serving as well as the three current Ruidoso members serving on the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association.

Mayor Farrar also announced that he was calling for a special meeting of the council for Thursday, April 6, 7:00 p.m. in the council chambers, for the purpose of reviewing contractors' proposals for necessary work to be done in sealing the Gavilan Water (raw) Storage Reservoir.

Early in Thursday night's meeting representatives from the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce and the Ruidoso Valley Ambassador organization congratulated the newly elected members of the village council and publicly stated their willingness to continue cooperating with the village council.

In addition Eric Bruce was re-elected Treasurer; Roy Hall, Lion Tamer and Doyle Howell, Ruidoso High School head football coach, Ted Twister.

Board of Directors elected, and their respective term of office, included Everett Fruit, one year; Dr. W. D. Horton, one year; Ray Littlefield, two years, and Dub Phillips, two years. The complete slate of new officers will be installed in the near future and will take office July 1.

Club officials also announced that the Evening Lions Club Annual Broom Sale has been scheduled for Saturday, May 13. The project is one of the several club projects aimed to assist in club sponsored benefit and charity programs.

**SPICY TESTIMONY**  
Contesting the Contest

"Decisions of the judges shall be final."

So said Rule Number Seven in the dot-counting contest sponsored by a neighborhood store. But when the judges rejected Myrtle's entry on grounds of neatness, she took the matter to court.

The court agreed with Myrtle, and her entry went on to victory.

Contests create a legal contract between the sponsoring company and the contestants. Accordingly, the basic principles of contract law will apply. Once the terms of the agreement are fixed, neither side can arbitrarily make changes.

However, if the contest judges keep within the limits of the original contract, they generally do have broad discretion.

In another case, contestants were supposed to deposit their entries in person at the showroom of a local automobile dealer. One contestant, disqualified by the judges for having mailed in his entry, insisted that this was too flimsy a reason for him to be barred.

But this time, the judges' ruling was upheld in court. The court said they had acted within the reasonable scope of their authority.

What about a rule against participation by company employees and their families? Again, the specific wording is crucial. In one case, the father of a company salesman submitted an entry in a football pool contest.

According to the rules, "no employee or member of his im-

## Your Social Security

Before April 15, millions of social security beneficiaries must file a report of earnings for 1971, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative.

Any beneficiary who worked in 1971 and earned over \$1680 is required by law to file an annual report of earnings if he received one or more benefit checks during the year. This report is in addition to any reports already filed with social security or an income tax return filed with Internal Revenue.

Reporting cards have been mailed to beneficiaries known to have worked, but many had earnings they have not reported to social security. Many who received no benefit checks in 1971 but earned \$140 or less in one or more months may be entitled to some benefits. To collect any benefits due, it is necessary to file an earnings report. All earnings reports are due on or before April 15, 1972.

For more information, assistance, or a reporting card, telephone the nearest social security office.

The one-year party affiliation requirement for candidates was also junked. Candidates could register with a political party Tuesday and immediately enter the primary.

Soundings at the state Democratic convention in Albuquerque produced these comments: Luna County — County Chairman Tony Viramontes says Sens. Edmund Muskie and George McGovern are leaders in Luna County in the presidential primary with Muskie on top. Viramontes says the Democratic U. S. Senate primary race in Luna County is between Tom Morris and Jack Daniels with Morris ahead. Viramontes' personal choice is Morris but he cannot campaign openly as county chairman. Viramontes says Lt. Gov. Robert Mondragon will not poll a heavy Luna County vote in the Democratic U. S. Senate primary.

Luna County delegates at the state Democratic convention were Viramontes, State Rep. and Mrs. William P. Upton, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Donaldson and Joe Senz of Deming. Viramontes says Hubert Humphrey has residual support in Luna County from the 1968 presidential campaign but the loser's image hurts him.

Sen. Henry Jackson ranked first and Sen. Muskie finished second in a straw vote at the DeBaca County Democratic convention. In the Democratic U. S. Senate primary Jack Daniels of Hobbs has strong DeBaca County support.

DeBaca County delegates at the state Democratic platform convention in Albuquerque were H. P. Roy, the county chairman; ex-State Sen. M. F. (Pim) "arr; Mrs. Nell Duke, Richard Pollard and Mr. and Mrs. Grym Steele, all of Fort Sumner. Lincoln County Chairman Fern Sawyer of Noga attended the state party. Mrs. Pat Ward of Lincoln accompanied her. Mrs. Ward was not a delegate. Soundings showed Sen. Henry Jackson is leading the Democratic presidential primary in Lincoln County with Humphrey and Muskie following. In the U. S. Senate race Daniels is leading but Morris has substantial support.

In the Colfax County delegation were Chairman Basilio Chavez of Raton and Mrs. Chavez; Mr. and Mrs. James Morrow of Raton; Harry Pompeo of Maxwell; Joel Sanderson of Raton; Mrs. Marain Vigil of Springer, and Mrs. Inez Morris of Springer. The Sierra County delegation

included Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Flynn of Truth or Consequences and Joe Garay and Toby Tipton of Derry. Mr. and Mrs. and Mrs. Flynn are members of the Hot Springs Chapter of the American Association of Retired People formed last October. Mrs. Flynn noted nothing was said in the state convention about problems of retired persons.

Taos County Chairman James Duran of Taos headed the 18 Taos County delegates. Duran's brother, Bobby, 32, a Taos insurance agent, was in the delegation. Bobby Duran is a candidate for the party nomination for the House. He was the party's nominee for the office in 1968.

Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, D-Belen, Senate President Pro-Tem I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna - Hidalgo - Sierra, House Majority Leader David Salzman, D-Mora-Union-Harding, and other legislative leaders advised Gov. Bruce King not to call a special legislative session on election procedure.

Democratic and Republican leaders said changes could only be effective if legislation was cleared with the emergency clause. They doubted two-thirds majorities could be mustered in the House and Senate to implement the emergency clause. Gov. King decided not to call a special lawmaker session.

Sens. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, and Odie Echols, D-Clovis, attended the emergency meeting with the governor.

The First State Bank of Taos asked State Banking Commissioner Roy Davidson of Raton for authority to establish a branch. The branch would be in a recently vacated post office building.

### Rotarians Hear Fire Conditions

Sam Nunnally, Ruidoso fire chief, and Dave Parks, local insurance agent, gave the program at the weekly meeting of the Ruidoso Rotary club Tuesday at Joe's Cafe. Nunnally commented on the fire danger at the present time and quoted statistics. He stated that the Ruidoso Fire Department employed three paid firemen and had 17 volunteers. He also noted the fire consciousness of Ruidosans and the good position that the village was in with fire equipment available from both the Forest Service and the BIA. He stated that some fire restrictions were now in effect on Forest Service land but that none had been declared for the village.

Dave Parks explained classification of fire insurance and said that Ruidoso is one of about 12 cities in the entire U. S. that rely on a volunteer system with a rating as low as we have. He informed the group that fire insurance companies had notified agents that there would be an increase in cost on fire insurance in the immediate future.

Barney Waldrip, youth chairman for the club, announced that the club sponsored Youth Career Clinic had been tentatively set for April 18. District officer conference for state's proved reserves of crude oil dipped 104,036,000 barrel or 13.7 per cent in 1971.

State Sen. Fingy Heidel, D-Lovington, announced his candidacy for an 8-year term on the State Supreme Court. Heidel, an attorney, lost a close 1970 race for the Democratic nomination for another place on the high court.

The attorney general's office detailed the Racing Commission's duties under a 1972 law on the admissions tax at New Mexico tracks.

American Petroleum Institute and American Gas Association issued a disturbing report. They said New Mexico's crude oil reserves will be exhausted in seven years unless production is cut or new reserves are established via exploratory drilling.

New Mexico's oil production last year reached 113.3 million barrels. This was offset partly because 785,000 barrels were found in 1971 in newly discovered fields plus 190,000 barrels in newly discovered oil reservoirs in established oil fields.

New Mexico's reserves of natural gas fell from 13,290,023 million cubic feet at the start of 1971 to 13,087,954 million cubic feet at the end of the year. The decline was 1.7 per cent or 222,069 million cubic feet. The

### Good Records Save Many Tax Dollars

Good records can save tax dollars at income tax filing time for New Mexico taxpayers. Maurice E. Johnson, District Director of Internal Revenue in New Mexico, said good records help you get all the deductions and credits you are entitled to.

A good system for keeping records is to label envelopes or folders according to the types of income and deductions you have, Johnson said. Bills and receipts should be put in the appropriate folder as they are paid.

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040 must have available cancelled checks, receipts, statements, and other material to support the claimed deductions.

Johnson said that, in addition to saving tax dollars, good record keeping makes preparation of the tax return a much easier task.
