RUIDOSO COUNCIL MEETING— Forest Service Representatives Discuss Land Use By Village

Kenneth Evans, U. S. Forest Supervisor, Alamogordo, informed the Ruidoso Village Council, Thursday, April 27, that before the U. S. Forest Service could issue a Special Permit for forest land use by the Village of Ruidoso as a site for water storage tank locations, "a demonstrated need for National Forest Lands" must be proven.

Evans and Fritz Menninghaus, Ruidoso District Ranger, U. S. Forest Service, met with the council during their last regular meeting at the request of the council. The Ruidoso governing body met with the U. S. Forest Service representatives to discuss procedures and possibilities of securing land locations upon which to construct a number of water storage tanks as a part of the current one million dollar water expansion and distribution project.

Evans also told the group that Forest Lands demonstrated need has reference to requests "where there are no available private lands." He continued "The dollar value is not the question," referring to a councilman's notation that the cost of private lands might be out of reach for the village. Menninghaus told the council, "The way I look at it, if the private lands is suitable, the cost of land is not the criteria for special use of Forest Lands."

The council was advised by the two men to make out the proper applications demonstrating the need for Forest Lands and submit them to the U. S. Forest Service office in Alamogordo. No official action was taken by the council but an agreement was reached to look further into the matter.

Also on the agenda was R. A. Bennett, owner of Bennett's Big Store, who was granted a public hearing regarding current village occupation. License charges, Bennett remarked to the council members, "I think the food stores have been discriminated against long enough."

It was noted during the meeting that eighty-five Ruidoso businesses pay an occupation license charge of only \$5.00, the minimum, while others pay one-tenth of one percent per year of their gross income. Grocery stores reportedly come under the latter schedule.

Bennett told the governing body, "I would like to see the council take some action."

Trustee Earl Allison moved that village attorney John Thompson and Village Clerk-manager "come up with three different proposals for the council review and consideration." Trustee Warren Tucker seconded the motion and the motion carried with one council member not voting.

Tabled for further study and consideration by the council was a proposal by Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens of the possible formation of a

uniformed Reserve Police section of the Ruidoso Police Department. Chief Lukens suggested that the reserve force be made up of ex-policemen and responsible local businessmen who can assist in local law enforcement work.

The council approved Chief Lukens recommendation that an extended leave of absence, as requested by RPD officer Rex Skellett, be granted to Skellett. In addition upon the recommendation of Mayor Leon Farrar the council approved the employment of Tommy Box, graduate of the Dallas Texas Police Academy, in the RPD.

The entire council expressed their sincere appreciation and commendations to all residents who cooperated in the Earth Week and Clean-up campaign. Ab Gunter, Trustee, said that he was especially appreciative of the "school kids" and highly commended them for their work.

The council instructed Clerk-manager Hine to write a letter of appreciation to Ruidoso School superintendent Pat Valhalla, Ruidoso High School principal Harold Logan and others responsible within the school system for the success of the community project. The council also voted to donate \$100 for the sack lunches furnished to the students.

In other action, the council opened bids on 600 linear feet of six-inch cement asbestos water pipe and the ditching, installation and covering of 600 linear feet of six inch water pipe. The pipe is to be installed in the Pinecliff area of Ruidoso.

The apparent low bid of Clowe & Cowen, Albuquerque, at \$1.72 per foot was accepted by the council. Hall's Excavation Co., Ruidoso, was the apparent low bidder of the three submitted on installation of the water pipe. Hall's bid quotation was accepted at .76c per foot.

The low bid of Smith Machinery, Albuquerque-El Paso, Texas, \$4,067.30 for a 40 H. P. Pump, 1600 gallon water pressure tank, air compressor and complete installation was approved by the council subject to village Engineer Jack Kennady's approval. The above equipment was also designated for the water expansion project in the Pinecliff Subdivision.

RUIDOSO EXPERIENCES—

2 Major Robberies

Ruidoso experienced two major robberies in as many days last weekend as early Friday morning a daring lone masked gunman robbed the H. & J. Foodbasket and escaped on foot with over \$1,000 in cash. Late Saturday night or early Sunday morning someone broke a side window to gain entrance into Mannie's Toggery and got off with over \$2,000 in merchandise.

Ruidoso Police reported that a lone gunman, with a woman's stocking over his head, held two H. & J. Foodbasket employees at gun point, fired two shots from what was reportedly a .22 calibre pistol and left the store with over \$1,000 in cash in his pocket.

Herb Ford, H & J Foodbasket manager, reportedly told investigating officers that shortly after 8:00 a.m. he answered a knock on the rear delivery door of the store assuming that a

produce salesman wanted to make a routine delivery.

When Ford unlocked the door the masked gunman pointed a pistol at him and told Ford to back up and demanded that he go to the front of the store and get the money out of the cash registers. The store was not open for business and only Ford and Don Graves, the latter the meat market manager, were in the building.

Enroute to the front of the store where the cash registers were located the intruder saw Graves and immediately ordered him to lie face down on the floor and keep quiet. He then pointed the pistol to Graves' head and then fired one shot into a nearby refrigerated display cabinet and hollered at Ford, who by this time was at the cash registers, "Hurry up and get the money or I'll blow his (Graves) head off!"

The store manager reported to police that after he gave the gunman the money the thief put it into his pocket and took him with him to the rear delivery door of the store. Standing in front of the rear delivery entrance, with the door partially open, the gunman fired a second shot over Ford's head and then escaped out the door on foot.

Ruidoso Police and area law enforcement officers are continuing their investigation of the armed robbery.

—MANNIE'S TOGGERY THEFT—

Monday morning a 25 year old Mesquero woman, Lily Enjady, appeared before Ruidoso District III Magistrate Judge Austin A. Pritchett, charged with the burglary of Mannie's Toggery. The complaint was signed by investigating officer Sergeant Truman McBride of the Ruidoso Police Department.

Judge Pritchett set Miss Enjady's bail bond at \$2,000 and ordered her held in custody of the Lincoln County Sheriff until her preliminary hearing on the charge of pending her posting bond.

The woman is also waiting her preliminary hearing on several other criminal charges including three counts of forgery and one other count of burglary.

Marianne Badillo, co-owner with

his wife of Mannie's Toggery, did not discover the burglary of his clothing store until shortly before 9:00 p.m. Sunday night, at which time he also called the Ruidoso Police Department.

It was reported to police that in addition to several different items of clothing, around \$1,800 in jewelry was also missing.

The woman also appeared before Ruidoso Municipal Judge Sam Nunally Monday morning and pled guilty to being drunk in public and resisting arrest. Judge Nunally sentenced her to a total of 15 days in jail and fined her a total of \$75 on the Municipal charges.

On Sunday afternoon, May 14, a course in "Civil Disorder" will be given by the Department of Military Affairs, to begin at 1:30 at the Ruidoso Fire Hall, downtown Ruidoso.

This course will be a four to six hour course, depending on attendance. Col. Jim Reeves and the department of New Mexico office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, will give this course.

This program will consist of a film of the Albuquerque civil disorder, State Police and National Guard policies and procedures, Judicial procedures and legal problems, riot control tactics and techniques, local planning and training concepts, a demonstration of equipment used in civil disorders, to conduct a practical exercise to test gas masks.

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, at the Fire Hall on May 15, 16 and 17, a two-hour course each night will be given on Radiological Monitoring.

All policemen, firemen, and other public works agency should attend both of these meetings.

Land Use Meeting For Lincoln Forest

A public meeting to discuss land management alternatives for unroaded areas on the Lincoln National Forest will be held this Saturday, May 6, in Alamogordo, according to Kenneth Evans, Forest Supervisor. The meeting will be held in the North Elementary School at 13th and Florida Street, beginning at 9:00 a.m., Evans said.

Evans stated that all roadless areas of 5,000 acres or larger have been inventoried on the Lincoln. These are located in the Capitlan, White, Sacramento and Guadalupe Mountains, he said.

"A number of management possibilities exist," Evans noted, "ranging from intensive utilization to wilderness. This meeting is to try to determine the wishes of the public with regard to the use of the land before undertaking future management planning."

The Saturday meeting is one of a series of similar meetings being sponsored by the twelve National Forests of Arizona and New Mexico, according to Evans. Seventy-eight roadless areas have been identified in the two states, he said.

All interested persons are urged to attend the meeting and express their views, Evans concluded.

BRICKBATS FOR TEACHER
Billy's grouchy grandfather took such a violent dislike to the boy's homeroom teacher that he wrote a special letter of denunciation to the board of education.

"This woman is ignorant, lazy, and totally uninterested in her job," he alleged. "She just sits there and collects wages." As it happened, Billy's teacher was both capable and energetic. When she found out about the letter, she determined to sue the grandfather for defamation of character.

At the trial, he was unable to produce even a shred of evidence to sustain his charges. Result: liability. The court said teachers need not put up with malicious charges that blacken their professional reputation.

Most courts agree. Still, not every mistaken statement about a teacher will support a defamation suit. Like other public employees, a teacher must "take" a reasonable amount of criticism from those who are legitimately concerned with the school system.

In another case, a pupil's mother complained to the school board that a certain teacher was "not competent." But this time, even though the mother's complaint was exaggerated, she did have a substantial amount of supporting evidence.

The teacher sued — but the court ruled against her. The judge said that for the good of public education, some leeway must be allowed to its critics.

Nor is a defamatory charge does not seriously reflect on the teacher's professional qualifications. Take this case: A school principal, writing a report about a new teacher, described her as being "careless in writing on the blackboard." Was this statement, if untrue, enough basis for a defamation claim by the teacher?

A court ruled that it was not, because it did not really mean she was incompetent in her job. The court said it was perfectly possible for someone to be very bad at writing chalk, yet very good at teaching children.

County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

The only thing you can be sure about the price of wool is that it will change. Prices at the wool sale yesterday were from 40 to 56 cents per pound. T. J. McKnight received the top price of 56 cents on his lamb wool. Some other prices in the area were Ernest Sultemeier 44 cents per pound, Hindi Sheep Co. 50 cents per pound. There was a strong demand for the wool with five different concerns participating.

MORE OF YOUR NEIGHBORS are now growing vegetable gardens. The 1971 sales of vegetable seeds surpassed those during World War II. And if you asked your neighbors why they were growing vegetables, what do you think they'd say? Some would answer that they are tired of the lack of flavor in vegetables bought in the market. Others would point out that they have the space and might as well use it profitably. Female neighbors in particular might show you current prices of vegetables and tell you that growing their own saves money.

Men who formerly worked longer hours will concede that they're bored and looking for something to fill time, preferably at home so they need not buck traffic. Others, again probably female, will indicate greater vitamin and mineral content

of really fresh vegetables. Then there are reasons which you might not hear as often, but which are true just the same. Gardening offers outdoor recreation and, therefore, is healthful. It gives the family a chance to do something together and, especially, it gives the father a chance to do something with his daughter as well as his son that all of them will enjoy. There's the thrill of growing a vegetable that none near you grows — of having the first peas or beans of any gardener on the block or of winning awards in the local show.

And, finally, there are two other reasons for growing a vegetable garden — the contact with Mother Earth so sadly needed into days of mechanized world and the real feeling of accomplishment that comes when walking through your garden, no matter how small, and knowing you're producing your own food.

ELM LEAF BEETLES, a nuisance

in homes during the spring as they come out of hibernation, are a serious pest on elm trees. The beetles eat the surface of the leaves, leaving the veins. The skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall from the trees. The damage weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to borers that attack elms.

The adult beetles are oval and about one quarter of an inch long. They are yellowish to olive-green in color with a black stripe along each side of the wing covers. They are sluggish, but can fly. The yellow eggs are laid in clusters of five to 25 on the undersides of elm leaves. Young larvae are nearly black and are covered with short black hairs. Full-grown larvae are about half an inch long and dull yellow in color with black stripes on the back. They have a distinct black head and three pairs of black legs. The pupa is bright orange-yellow and one quarter of an inch long. It is usually found lying on the ground at the bases of infected trees. Although many insecticides will kill the adult and larvae beetles, the major problem is thorough coverage of infested trees. Trees often have to be sprayed several times, because there are at least three generations of beetles a year, and some years there may be as many as five.

High-pressure, high-volume sprayers are necessary for complete coverage of foliage. Some degree of control can be obtained by spraying the trunk and lower limbs when the larvae move down to pupate.

For information dealing with the chemical treatment of elm leaf beetles, single copies of Circular 435, "The Elm Leaf Beetle: How to Control It," are available from the County Extension Office in Carrizozo.

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
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Inside The Capital

The crazy-quilt ruckus over candidate filing fees ended at least temporarily with 25 Democratic and 8 Republican U. S. Senate hopefuls in the party primaries.

Only U. S. Senate candidates were not required to pay filing fees. All other candidates were required to pay the statutory fee of 6 per cent of the annual salary of the office. The requirement sharply sliced fields in some races.

Crisoforo Gallegos, Questa grocer, stayed in the field in the Republican U. S. Senate primary. Valencia County Treasurer Clovis O. Herrera of Los Lunas remained in the Democratic U. S. Senate race. Herrera is in Position 3—the middle of the top row of candidates—in the big field.



CHAVES COUNTY SAVINGS AND LOAN — Bids will be let in the immediate future for the new home of the Chaves County Savings and Loan association, Ruidoso's first savings and

loan association. Site of the new building will be the corner of Sudderth and Thomas. Manager of the Ruidoso Branch is Ivan McGee.

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Democratic U. S. Senate candidates will appear on voting machines in five rows numbered from left to right. Among well-known candidates the arrangement helps Lt. Gov. Robert A. Mondragon of Namb. Santa Fe County, and Atty. Gen. David Norvell of Santa Fe.

Mondragon's name is first on the second row. Norvell's name leads off the third row.

Reuben E. Pankey of Monticello, Sierra County, and George E. Presson of Silver City are opposed in the Republican primary in U. S. House District 2. Both paid the \$2,550 filing fee. Howard M. Overstreet, Truth or Consequences retiree, did not pay the fee and is off the GOP primary ballot in the District 2 U. S. House race. Pankey is favored to defeat Presson.

U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, Lovington, is unopposed for re-nomination in U. S. House District 2. Five Democrats are crapping for the party nomination for the U. S. House in 14-county northern District 1.

They are in ballot position order ex-Santa Fe Mayor George A. Gonzalez, Santa Fe lawyer Eugene Gallegos, Santa Fe consultant Theodore R. Wilson, State Sen. Mike Alarid of Albuquerque and well-publicized Santa Fe cocktail waitress Sparkie Plenty.

At present, Sen. Alarid and Gallegos are favored in the Democratic U. S. House District 1 primary. Alarid, 51, is a super-market owner and insurance agent with 8 years in the legislature. Gallegos, 36, son of retiring District Judge J. V. Gallegos of Tucumcari, was a 1968 Eugene McCarthy Democratic national convention delegate.

Incumbent Rep. Manuel Lu-

jan, Jr. of Albuquerque, is opposed in the GOP primary in U. S. House District 1 by Richard Martinez of Albuquerque, former State Motor Vehicle Department driver services director. Lujan is favored heavily to win re-nomination.

The Democratic State Corporation Commission tussle simmered down from 11 to 5 candidates — incumbent Columbus Ferguson of Taos; Jake Baruh, Espanola real estate man and well drilling contractor; Albuquerque engineer Joe H. Barela, Mountain Bell Telephone Co. engineer; Santa Fe Radio station manager Ben F. Ramsey and ex-Dona County Sheriff A. L. (Happy) Apodaca of Las Cruces.

SCC member John Abraham of Santa Fe, a Democrat, was actively supporting Ramsey statewide against fellow corporation commissioner Ferguson in the party primary.

Litigation is still pending over candidate filing fees in U. S. District Court and the U. S. Supreme Court. Final results of the primary and general elections may not be determined until long after the elections June 6 and Nov. 7.

But the U. S. Supreme Court last week refused to grant a permanent stay of a State Supreme Court order on filing fees. The high federal court's order was based partly on grounds further action now would disrupt the new Mexico election process. The extended filing fee deadline was 5 p.m. Tuesday (April 25). The stay was sought by Norvell, formerly of Clovis.

Some candidates said notice of this deadline was so short they were unaware of it or unable to

get to Santa Fe in time to pay filing fees.

The State Corporation Commission held a hearing Tuesday this week in Lordsburg on the request of Lordsburg Distributing Co. of Lordsburg for escrow service authority.

The SCC also set a hearing May 30 in Clovis on the application of Sheriff's Escort Service of Clovis for authority to operate an escort service. A SCC hearing is scheduled May 31 at Clovis on the request of Ray Elarubuck and Jerry Newkirk of Clovis for livestock hauling authority.

The All-Indian Pueblo Council approved a contract with the U. S. Bureau of Indian Affairs to administer federal Johnson-O'Malley funds for many New Mexico public school districts which provide special services for Indian children.

The State Education Department, dated earlier with Indians over Johnson-O'Malley funds distribution for fiscal 1973. The distribution includes: Los Lunas Schools, \$34,150 under new BIA contracts; \$38,212 recommended by SDE; Pecos Schools, \$8,230 under contract; \$5,281 recommended by SDE; Ruidoso Schools, \$26,240 under contract; \$10,400 recommended by SDE, and Taos Schools, \$26-

438 under contract, \$21,390 recommended by SDE.



Eggs are low priced now, due to the plentiful supply. The three consumer grades of eggs are U. S. Grade AA or Fresh Fancy, Grade A and B. The price varies for different sized eggs of the same grade. Generally speaking, if there is less than a seven cent price spread per dozen eggs between one size and the next smallest size in the same grade, buy the larger size.

Egg size refers to the minimum weight per dozen. Sizes most often found are: Extra large — 27 ounces; Large — 24 ounces; and Medium — 21 ounces. The official grade shield on egg cartons certifies that the eggs have been graded for quality and size under Federal-State supervision. The grading service is provided on a voluntary basis to those who request it and pay the fee.

Always buy eggs from a refrigerated case and then refrigerate them promptly at home. Store eggs large-end-up to help maintain quality.

Fresh blueberries will soon be on the market. Look for the dark blue color with a silvery bloom—that's your best indication of quality according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. They should be plump, firm, and uniform in size.

I do not mean to steal Heloise's "thunder" as I think she is the greatest; but I have lived a good while and have had to cut many corners, so I may have some ideas that the young homemaker has not thought of—besides the general rules for safety, such as: a red can of soda near the stove; non skid rugs and tub with safety grab bars; also keeping all medicine, poison and matches out of reach of children.

When making hot cakes: add 1 tsp. sugar and 1 tsp. corn meal for better flavor and texture; also orange juice may be used for liquid.

To clear ham or bacon grease; fry some slices of potato in it. Never throw out a crust of bread. Toast them lightly; then cut into small croutons or roll in fine crumbs. Stored in the refrigerator they keep indefinitely. They may be used in stuffed eggplant, squash or peppers. The fine crumbs may be used as crusts for chiffon pies.

When ground meat is brought from the market: cut the portion into patty sizes; handling carefully, place on a large plate, slip into a plastic bag and freeze. When frozen break apart and place in a container or bag; store in freezer to use as desired.

For soft puffy omelet: crumble one slice of bread into a half cup of milk and add to the eggs. It is delicious and makes the eggs go further.

For the ones who still make their icings: if your divinity icing is cooked too done; add a few drops of warm water or if it is not done enough, add some powdered sugar.

My daughter-in-law bakes flaky pie crusts in rounds, squares or strips on a cookie sheet; then heats the fruit and makes individual cobblers at serving time. These are not soggy and are deliciously crunchy.

Brown sugar mixed with soft butter and spread on bread; slipped under the broiler until bubbly—being careful not to burn is nice for breakfast or a quick dessert.

Left over biscuits, split and placed in a skillet of bubbling syrup and butter are good for the kiddie. Also split biscuits placed on a pan of fruit; sprinkled with sugar, cinnamon and butter; browned in a hot oven, makes a quick cobbler.

Forget about sleeping pills and before retiring; drink a glass of hot milk to which 1 tsp. of scerzium molasses has been added. You will sleep like a baby.


Salt and vinegar will shine your pots and pans as good as some commercial cleaners.

To keep pot plants fresh; set them in a sink half full of water. I have kept them a month this way, when away from home.

To remove black heel marks from your floors; just rub them with the sole of your shoe.

Always thread a needle before breaking thread off the spool and it is not apt to knot.

A stitch in time saves nine. How true. It is better to darn before washing as the gyrations or movement of the machine will make the hole larger.

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
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


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
