Council Hears Sewer Report

Quentin Daniels, engineer for the Ruidoso Downs Village sewer project, reported on progress on plans for the sewer to the village council at their regular meeting held last Monday evening at the village hall. Daniels estimated that the actual construction of the project would start in about one year. He noted that much information must be gathered and submitted to federal and state agencies before approval of the project.

Mrs. Moncure MacKenzie was present at the meet to request the annexation of about 2 acres of land west of Hale Springs for the purpose of building a home. The request was granted.

Municipal Judge H. O. Miller asked permission of the council to attend a seminar for judges sponsored by the New Mexico Municipal League and was authorized to attend. He also asked that the council adopt an ordinance allowing the Mayor to name an alternate judge to act in his absence. The ordinance was passed.

The council will call for bids on a new police car for the village with specifications to be the same as the state police.

Board members agreed to pay a bonus to Tony Craig for his services in the water department until someone can be found to head the department. Discussion was held concerning the possible location of a permanent base for the bookmobile and the mayor and members of the Ladies' Auxiliary inspected the community building to determine what would have to be done to prepare for the facility. The village would be required to furnish a building and the utilities for the library if it is accepted.

3 Officers Attend Police Management Seminar in Santa Fe

Several area law enforcement officers, last week attended the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy sponsored Police Management Seminar held at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy, Santa Fe.

Attending the special police management training seminar from the immediate area were Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens, Jr., Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez and Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Leandro Vera, Jr. A total of twenty-nine law enforcement officers sat on and throughout New Mexico attended the seminar, including State Police personnel, Sheriff Department and city police departments.

The five-day, eight hours per day school, was also held in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Special FBI agents of the Federal Law Enforcement Academy, Quantico, Va. served as instructors for the school. Special agents instructing the seminar were Eugene Crickenberger and Ernie L. Halls.

All officers attending the seminar were given examinations and following completion of the school were presented with a special certificate signifying their completion of the Police Management Seminar.

The seminar was divided into eight separate areas of study and concluded Friday afternoon with a special session on Practical Problems confronting those involved in police management.

Other subject matter included, Principles of Management, Motivation and Leadership Skills, Problem analysis and Decision Making, Administrative Communications, Evaluation of Personnel-Rating Systems, Planning, Organizational Principles as Applied to Management and Police Management Discipline.

Memorial Day Services Slated By Local Legion

Ruidoso-Hondo Valley residents are cordially invited to attend and participate in Memorial Day services May 29, sponsored by Robert J. Hages Post No. 79 of the American Legion; Post Commander George White announced today.

The traditional commemorative rites are scheduled to begin at 8:00 a.m. at Forest Lawn Cemetery, Commander White added.

The services will be under the direction of Chaplain Kline, State American Legion Chaplain, with the invocation and benediction given by Rev. Charles Crutchfield, Community United Methodist Church minister. Graves will be decorated with the United States flag by A. E. Hunt and Paul West and the firing squad will be directed by Ray Crawford.

The observance of Memorial Day is an American tradition which began during the Civil War. The first national observance was called for in 1868 when Gen. John A. Logan, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued his historic order for commemorative rituals "to respect comrades who died in defense of their country." For many years after the Civil War, the Grand Army of the Republic in the North and the Confederate Veterans in the South took charge of Memorial Day services in their respective communities.

When these organizations became unable to carry on actively these rites (which included the decoration of all known veteran grave sites), the American Legion pledged its help to perpetuate the annual observance of Memorial Day.

Severe Restrictions Placed On Forest

The Lincoln National Forest fire danger is extreme.

By proclamation, smoking is prohibited on all lands within the Lincoln National Forest of New Mexico except at permanent places of habitation or in designated forest camp and picnic grounds, and smoking is prohibited while traveling except on paved or surfaced highways and in areas designated by an authorized Forest officer. Campfires are not permitted except in designated forest camp and picnic grounds or with a permit issued by an authorized Forest officer.

Designated camp and picnic grounds are:
South Fork, Monjeau, Skyline, Oak Grove, Three Rivers, Cedar Creek, Pines;
Fir, Silver, Saddle, Apache, Deerhead and Sleepy Grass.

The 100-acre lake and hotel complex will be located on the Mescalero Apache Reservation up Carrizo Canyon.

Opening Weekend Sets New Record

The "new" Ruidoso Downs kicked off the season in grand style over the weekend as 4,896 fans turned out for Saturday's inaugural program and pushed \$233,837 through the betting equipment.

This was the highest opening-day handle in the track's history. The previous record was established in 1969 when approximately 4,000 fans were on hand and wagered \$200,650.

"It looks like we're off to a banner meeting," remarked General Manager Richard Thompson. "We had plenty of sight-seers on hand, and everyone seemed pretty pleased over the new facilities. The new All-American Turf Club and Jockey Club made an instant hit."

During the off-season, management invested some \$670,000 in a massive improvement program which not only gave the track greatly expanded facilities but provided a new, modern look as well.

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County Agent's Column

Two confirmed cases of worms have been found in New Mexico. One in Otero County April 17 and the other in Hidalgo County April 21. The first was a screw worm, *Cochliomyia vicina*, and the second was a hair worm, *Trichostrongylus axei*. Otero County is in the area of infestation in Hidalgo County was in the area of infestation in May 1. The worms are found in wounds, infections and in the soil.

Infected wounds are of major importance. Hide tick producers should be at all dehorning, castrating and docking wounds as well as surgery is performed. Individual wounds with insect sprays or give animals an oral spray with Co-Ral or Korlan if large numbers have been reported on.

Examine animals frequently for wounds and other wounds that collect any worms that can be found. They wounds after the animal is sprayed. If no worms can be found in wounds, spray with an oral spray containing Korlan (fenitrothion) to prevent possible infestation. If a wound made by ear tags should be treated. When spraying with Korlan or other similar insecticides that are effective against screw worms.

from wounds, take them to your county extension agent, veterinarian, or livestock inspector. It is best to place specimens in alcohol, but clean water can be used. Addressed mailing tubes containing a vial of alcohol are available from county agents, veterinarians, and livestock inspectors.

If a confirmed case is found, livestock owners can have their entire herd sprayed at no cost, if they will corral their animals. All ranchers with positive cases should take advantage of this service. The Southwest Screw-worm Eradication Program is doing all it can to stop this outbreak, but cooperation is needed from all livestock producers and pet owners. They must continue to inspect animals, treat wounds, and collect and send in samples for identification.

R-R-R
 Lawn grasses do not thrive on reduced diets. If you want a

beautiful lawn, there are several good management practices you must follow. Regular feeding is one of these practices. Although lawn grasses require all plant nutrients, they feed heavily on nitrogen. Available nitrogen in the soil is unstable and is easily removed by leaching. If heavy applications of an available form of nitrogen fertilizer are applied, much is lost before the grass has need for it. For this reason nitrogen fertilizer should be applied in small amounts, but frequent enough to meet the plant's needs. The so-called "slow release" fertilizers permit heavier applications without appreciable loss by leaching.

The cumulative use of nitrogen by lawn grasses is affected by many factors, such as variety, time of year, type and depth of soil, amount and frequency of watering, and mowing height.

Bermuda and other warm season grasses usually require 5-7 pounds of elemental nitrogen per 1,000 square feet per season while bluegrass and similar cool season grasses may require 7-10 pounds per season. Single applications should never exceed three pounds of nitrogen (elemental) per 1,000 square feet, and 1-2 pound applications are preferable.

Federal regulations require that analysis of a fertilizer be printed on the package (e. g., 5-10-5, 16-20-0, 16-0-0, etc.) The plant nutrients contained in formulation are expressed in percent of total by weight. Thus a 100 pound bag of Ammonium Sulphate (16-0-0) will contain 16.0 pounds of elemental nitrogen. If you wished to apply a sufficient amount of ammonium sulphate to deliver two pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area, you would employ the following formula: 2:16x100=12.5 lbs. If you wished to use Ammonium Nitrate (42-0-0) then 2:42x100=4.76 lbs.

An application of phosphorus may be needed annually on sandy soils, but probably only once every second or third year on loam or clay soils. Five to seven pounds of phosphate (elemental) designated by the center figure in the fertilizer formula, 5-12-5, 0-45-0, etc., should be sufficient for an annual application. Phosphorus moves very slowly through the soil and is not lost by leaching; forming animal needs to be applied in one operation.

First, the center figure in the fertilizer formula, is seldom needed in New Mexico soils, and should be applied only when soil analysis indicates a deficiency. Lawns often become yellow even after fertilizer has been applied. This condition is usually due to iron deficiency. To correct this condition, you may apply 1-3 pounds of Iron Sulphate or Iron Chelate per 1,000 square feet. You will find it difficult to spread this small amount over 1,000 square feet unless you mix it with about 7 pounds of sand, or the iron can be mixed with other fertilizers. Fertilizers containing iron are available, and are good in maintaining a lawn. It may not correct an existing deficiency.

Lawns should be watered immediately after each fertilizer application to carry plant nutrients into the root zone.

Feeding of Bears Can Be Dangerous

The Department of Game and Fish has received an unusually large number of complaints of bears coming into towns in search of food this year. Since June 1, the Department has handled 69 bear complaints. Complaints have been most numerous in Santa Fe, Los Alamos, Ruidoso and in the Silver City area.

Most of these bears have been raiding garbage cans in search of food and have been trapped or tranquilized and removed to remote areas of the state which have little human population. About 15 of the bears have been shot and the Department has had to destroy these. Once a bear becomes a stick killer, it is necessary to destroy it because it will continue to kill livestock in any area to which it is moved.

A situation which has added to the bear problems is the feeding of bears by people in some towns around the state. People have done this for two reasons. It is exciting to see the wild bears and to take photographs of them and some have had the mistaken impression that they are helping the "poor hungry bears." Actually, feeding bears causes a dangerous situation, is harmful, rather than helpful to bears, and this feeding is strongly discouraged by the Department.

Bears adapt quickly to coming into an area where they know food will be put out for them. As they come in closer contact with people, they become more accustomed to them, lose their natural fear for them, and gradually become bolder. This can create a dangerous situation, especially for people with small children in that area. A bear could seriously injure a person with just a single swat from its large paw. Also endangered are pets in the area. The Department has warned that law suits and civil damages against people who are feeding bears are a possibility if injury or serious property damage should result. Continued feeding of wild animals is harmful to the animals, as they lose their wild instincts. A bear that becomes dependent on feeding will no longer fend for itself and become a habitual problem animal. This can often result in the necessity of the Department destroying the animal or, if it is moved to a remote area, its chances of survival are lessened.

Usually heavy bear problems have been caused this year by the extremely dry weather experienced around the state last winter, spring and summer. Normally bear problems are ended by this time of year because moisture has improved conditions in the bears' natural ranges. But during the past year, there was little or no moisture to start the development of natural foods and the rains have been of little help.

Price Freeze Questions and Answers

Q. Do doctor's offices have to post their base prices?
A. Noninstitutional providers of health services, such as doctors, dentists, etc., and institutional providers, such as hospitals and skilled nursing homes, must maintain at each of their facilities a scheduled showing base prices for their principal services and each change in those prices. The schedules must be made available for public inspection and a copy must be furnished to the Internal Revenue Service upon request. Health providers also must post a sign (minimum of 22" by 28") in a prominent place in each of their facilities stating the availability and location of the schedule.

Q. Will prenotifiers and reporting firms get quicker service by submitting reports to Internal Revenue Service offices?

A. Although the necessary forms for prenotifiers and reporting firms are available at IRS offices, completed forms should be mailed to the Pay Board or the Price Commission. Price notifications should be mailed to the Price Commission, P. O. Box 18300, Washington, D. C. 20036. Wage notifications on Form PB-1 should be mailed to the Pay Board, P. O. Box 1498, Washington, D. C. 20013; Forms PB-2 should be mailed to the Pay Board at P. O. Box 1499.

Q. When can a retailer raise his prices?
A. A retailer may charge a price in excess of the base price whenever its customary initial percentage markup after Nov. 13, 1971, with respect to the property sold is equal to or less than its last customary initial percentage markup before November 14, 1971 or, at its option, during its last fiscal year ending before August 15, 1971. The aggregate effect of all of its price changes must not be to increase its profit margin over that which prevailed during the base period.

Q. My apartment development plans to build a swimming pool for the use of the tenants. How much can they raise my rent to cover the cost of the swimming pool?

A. Generally, the allowable increase in monthly rent over the base rent for a capital improvement such as this may not be more than 1 1/2% of that part of the cost of the capital improvement allocable to your apartment.






Museum Dedication Held Recently

Dedication ceremonies for the Geronimo Springs Museum were held during the annual Fiesta in Truth or Consequences Saturday, May 13, at 1:00 p.m. with Governor Bruce King and other dignitaries attending.

Ralph Edwards, originator of the famed TV program for which the city is named, has been a major contributor to the museum, participated in the dedication. Ed Bailey, producer of the Truth or Consequences Show, came early to the city to supervise the placement of materials in the Ralph Edwards' Wing of the museum in time for the opening.

Several government officials from Mexico attended the dedication, William Buhler, president of the Sierra County Historical Society which sponsored the museum said. They included the mayor and former mayor of Juarez and the governor of the State of Chihuahua and Senora. A group of singers from Chihuahua sang during the dedication ceremonies.

The museum, which has a sign front featuring three huge Spanish arches with Mexican carved wooden doors, was built entirely through donations of approximately \$50,000 in money, labor and material.

Outstanding contributions have been made to the museum exhibits, with experts from the Museum of Santa Fe advising the best methods of display. The earliest display contains items dating back more than 1500 years to the early Indian culture in the area.

"PEDESTRIAN" ON SKATES
Roller skating on the sidewalk, six-year-old Teddy was hit by a delivery truck backing out of a driveway. In short order, Teddy's parents aimed a damage suit at the trucking company.

At the trial, they noted that pedestrians on sidewalks had the right of way over motor vehicles.

"Maybe so," conceded the company. "But this boy was not really a 'pedestrian' at all. He was a roller skater."

However, the court upheld Teddy's claim. The judge said: "While a pedestrian is ordinarily one who travels on foot, the mere circumstance that he has attached to his feet roller skates, or walks on stilts, or uses crutches, does not clothe him with any other character than that of a pedestrian."

Local traffic laws often grant special rights to pedestrians over motorists. In most cases, as in this one, courts have given the word "pedestrian" a broad meaning.

But this works both ways. The status of pedestrian may involve duties as well as rights: Thus:

A woman climbed down from a trolley car and started jaywalking toward an opposite corner. Struck and injured by a passing taxicab, she later sued the cab company for damages. When the company pointed to an ordinance against jaywalking by pedestrians, the woman replied:

"Until I reached the sidewalk I was still a passenger, not a pedestrian. Therefore, the ordinance against jaywalking did not apply to me."

However, the court turned down her excuse. The judge said her status changed from passenger to pedestrian at the moment she got off the trolley.

What is your status if you have car trouble on the road and have to use your feet? In one case, a man was run down while walking behind his stalled car to set out warning flares on the highway. When he sued, he was blamed by the other driver for not walking on the left side of the road — like any other pedestrian.

But the court ruled that, at least in these circumstances,







If you were a Federal Judge (and you'd make a good one) you wouldn't have to run for re-election, but being a State Judge and running, I hope the people will take advantage of this opportunity to give you the biggest vote of confidence for good judging ever voted in your area!

SANTA FE — The primary election campaign thundered in to the stretch but registration showed few 18-20-year-old voters eligible to cast ballots June 6.

Army Gen. David Norvell, formerly of Clovis, said he is taking compensatory and annual leave time to campaign full time for the Democratic U. S. Senate nomination. Lt. Gov. Robert Mondragon, previously of Santa Rosa, says he will take a "couple of days" of leave to campaign in the same

face. Norvell and Mondragon are elected officials. And elected officials are not subject to compensatory and leave time under the State Personnel Act. In practice they set their own working hours.

The light new under-21 voter registration is shown in county totals reported here: Colfax, 163 voters under 21 — 105 Democrats, 40 Republicans, 8 declined to state; Curry, 705 under 21 — 435 Democrats, 211 Republicans, 58 declined to state, minor parties one; Guadalupe — 181 under 21, 124 Democrats, 30 Republicans, declined to state, 27. Lincoln — 104 under 21, 52 Democrats, 39 Republicans, 13 declined to state; Luna — 280 under 21; 204 Democrats, 67 Republicans, 6 declined to state, minor parties, 3, and Sierra — 73 under 21, 37 Democrats, 34 Republicans, 2 declined to state. Democrats held their 2-2-1 total voter registration advantage.

Albuquerquean Pete Domenici, Republican U. S. Senate candidate, told 40 persons at Clovis he found nearly unanimous support for GOP President Richard M. Nixon's Vietnam policies among voters. Domenici called for local control of programs now federally administered.

He promised to build a stronger Republican Party to compete with the Democratic Party. Carry County registration to 3-4-1 Democratic over the GOP.

Serra County Republican rancher Reuben Pankey attended the Democratic Clovis rally. Pankey of Matucelo backs the

GOP U. S. House District 2 nomination against Ed Fresson of Silver City. Pankey is favored. Pankey campaigned early this week in the Grants area.

Santa Fe lawyer Gene Gallegos, formerly of Tucuman, told a Tucuman audience \$20 billion for new domestic programs could be realized by cutting Defense Department spending. Gallegos would end the Indochina War, reduce the 2,000 U. S. overseas military bases and the 300,000 U. S. troops in Europe alone.

A fiscal 1971 Fort Sumner Public Schools budget of \$502,391 was tentatively approved after an annual public hearing in Fort Sumner. The tabulation of resources for the total state money, \$372,214 or 74 per cent; local, \$103,957; federal, \$4,700, and carryover cash balance, \$21,520.

Fort Sumner Schools Supt. James R. Fincke's salary was raised \$500 to \$13,700. Teachers will account for about \$222,000 of the budget for 27 instructors. Valencia County Assessor Clovis Herrera of Los Lunas, a Democratic U. S. Senate candidate, was chairman of the Los Lunas evaluating committee. The report told Gov. King: "Our committee has been at odds with our school superintendent, from almost the very beginning."

The scorching, lengthy report said, "Our evaluating committee work has not helped the Los Lunas School situation. In fact, our committee has been accused of witch hunting and unjustly painting a bleak picture of the Los Lunas School District."

"The situation has become rather critical. Things in our school system were not very good. They seem to be worse now." The sharply critical report carried strong political overtones.

Domenici, campaigning in Lea County, said he favors the state's effort to win a sharp natural gas price increase at the wellhead from the Federal Energy Commission. Meanwhile, the latest monthly state financial report to Gov. King shows state income from the oil and gas industry continues to drop.

Domenici named his Luna County campaign organization: Dr. John Edwards, Deming, chairman; David S. Christman, finance chairman; Dr. George O'Sullivan, organizational chairman; Mrs. A. B. Williams and Mrs. Tom Pearson, research chairwomen, and Tommy Perez, activities chairman.

Gov. King named John W. Blocker, Jal Democrat, as magistrate for Lea County Division 3 in Jal. John Blocker, a general contractor, real estate agent and insurance agent, is a brother of retiring State Rep. George Blocker of Jal. Salary for the

Your Social Security

A New Mexico state agency helps the Social Security Administration process disability claims. An individual files his claim for disability benefits at his nearest social security office. However, the actual decision about disability is made by a division of the New Mexico State Vocational Rehabilitation Department. There, a team of doctors and vocational rehabilitation experts work jointly on the case. Medical reports from private doctors and hospitals, age, education, and work experience are all factors which help these people arrive at the answers to two questions. Is this person totally disabled now? Is he expected to be, or has he been disabled at least twelve calendar months.

Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative,

explained that if the answer to both questions is "yes," then the claim is approved. If the answer to either question is "no," then the claim is denied. Additional information may be secured by telephoning the nearest social security office. Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the Council Room in the Ruidoso City Hall the second Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon and 1 to 2; or at the County Commissioner's Room, Lincoln County Court House in Carrizozo, the fourth Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon.

New Mexico Highway Commission Local Bankers Holds Two-Day Meet In Ruidoso Named to Bank Group Directors

The New Mexico State Highway Commission, during an official two-day meeting last week held at the Chaparral Motor Hotel, unanimously voted to retain the current picture of New Mexico Governor Bruce King on the official New Mexico State Highway map and to replace the pictures of the commission members with a scenic picture of New Mexico.

The controversy over the pictures of Governor King and the Commission came to light prior to the Ruidoso meeting when Governor King, through Tony Anaya, an aid to the Governor, reportedly directed the commission to order 400,000 new highway maps immediately and to share the Highway Department's remaining maps with the N. M. Department of Development whose supply has been exhausted.

The commission, Friday morning, issued a special news release, that stated in part, "The New Mexico State Highway Commission voted unanimously to order 400,000 copies of the New Mexico Highway map to assist the Department of Development during this period of shortage of state maps."

The news release continued, "The new issue of state maps will retain the picture of Governor Bruce King, plus a welcome

letter to the tourists from the governor. An additional cost of printing, amounting to \$2.50 per thousand maps to remove the governor's picture is the reason for the retention of the Governor's picture on the map. In reference to the Governor's wishes, the pictures of the Highway Commissions will be replaced by a scenic view of New Mexico."

"The Highway Department will furnish a new map side for map, with the latest updating of finished highways, roads and tourist oriented sites, such as the Zoological-Botanical Gardens at Carlsbad."

K. L. Towle, vice-chairman of the commission, stated, "It is unfortunate such an issue was made over the inclusion of the highway commissioners' pictures on the map, and the commission feel that a definite purpose was served by the pictures being on the map."

The highway commission voted to assist the DOD by lending them 40,000 of the current highway maps until the new maps are available. It was also agreed by the commissioners that the Highway Commission will bill the DOD for 45,000 maps sold to them in 1970, for 105,000 maps sold to them in 1971-72 and also for the 40,000 current maps.

Towle also remarked, after the commission's decision to or-

In other action the commission went on record as being in favor of highway U. S. 70 being a part of the United States Interstate system, and instructed the legal section of the highway department to draft a bill for the N. M. State Legislature to abolish certain state roads that are currently unused. The commission also accepted an invitation to officially meet in Roswell, September 20-22 and will be headquartered there at the Roswell Inn.
