New Mex. DAR, Forest Service Sign Agreement

Around thirty members of the New Mexico State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, representing eight separate New Mexico State chapters, were in Ruidoso Wednesday, to participate in the formal signing of a Cooperative Agreement Document between the Lincoln National Forest and the New Mexico State Society of the D. A. R. regarding the reforestation of the Bonito burn area in the Lincoln National Forest.

The official document was signed during the special ceremony, held in the grand room of the Holiday House Restaurant, by Mrs. Floren Thompson, Jr., Portales, and State Regent for the New Mexico State Society DAR, and Paul Gorden, Alamogordo, Acting Forest Supervisor for the Lincoln National Forest, Regional Office, Fritz Menninghaus, Ruidoso District Ranger Station head, was also present for the ceremony.

The agreement was the outgrowth of a decision by the New Mexico State Society DAR during their Spring (1972) DAR State Conference held in Livingston at which time they voted to make the Bonito burn area their first bi-centennial project. The project is a part of the Horizons USA emphasis.

The DAR agreed, in the formal Cooperative Agreement, to contribute a sum estimated at \$500 for the purpose of planting a site designated as National Forest Land in the Bonito burn area and also agreed to mark the site with an interpretive sign.

The Forest Service agreed to expand the funds for reseeded with appropriate seedlings and to design, build, and erect a suitable sign at a roadside location that would give clear and noticeable view of the area reseeded.

The Forest Service also agreed to furnish all labor, material and supplies, subject to the availability of funds for the project and to assume the responsibility for routine maintenance of the interpretive sign.

An initial check for the cost of the project was presented to Gorden by Mrs. Marge Bodwell, Alamogordo, State Treasurer for the New Mexico State Society of the DAR.

The area to be reforested, destroyed by the 1963 Bonito fire, will be known as the USA Bicentennial Memorial Forest of the New Mexico State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Site of the area is located above the Bonito Lake, north of Ruidoso, and across from the South Fork Campground of the Lincoln National Forest.

Daily Use Permits Set To Continue

The Forest Service said today that because Congress has not acted on an annual permit for use of developed recreation areas, it would be necessary to continue use of daily permits.

The daily permit for use of camp and picnic areas on the National Forests throughout Arizona and New Mexico is \$1 per day for each non-commercial vehicle. The only exceptions are even highly developed areas where the fee is \$2.

The announcement said the permits were available at the entrance to each camp or picnic area from self-service dispensers. It is the responsibility of users to obtain a permit and display it or run the risk of a fine. Patrolmen will not sell the permits.

The \$2 areas are Fawn Lakes and Columbine on the Carson National Forest, Bonito and Pinegrove on the Coconino Mesa Campground on the Gila, Lynx Lake on the Prescott and Ponderosa on the Tonto.

81 Down and 22 To Go In The November 7th General Election

Over 2,000 Lincoln County Democrats and Republicans, out of a total of nearly 3,700 registered, went to the polls Tuesday, June 6, to select their choice among the 103 candidates listed on the ballot representing both political parties.

The number of candidates on last Tuesday's Primary Election Ballot, Lincoln County, will be reduced to twenty-two in the General Election, November 7, 1972. Eighty-one were eliminated.

Lincoln County Under Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr., Carrizozo, walked away with the greatest margin of victory in the Lincoln County primary race as he defeated Robert A. Crenshaw, also of Carrizozo, by 361 votes in the Republican race for the Lincoln County Sheriff position. Vega served two terms as Lincoln County Sheriff, 1965-68, while Crenshaw reportedly was seeking his first try for the county's top law enforcement position. Vega will face another Carrizozo resident, Conception Morales, Democrat, in November for the sheriff position.



Summer Youth Program Planned By Cooperating Local Churches

Fairly Free Private Enterprise

Curb-side flower vendors became so numerous in a certain community that the regular florists began to complain about the competition. Finally, the city council passed a tough licensing law aimed at knocking the street vendors out of business.

But when the new law was

tested in court, it was held null and void. The court said the city simply had no power to regulate a business as harmless as selling flowers.

Private enterprise, while not wholly free, still has considerable vitality. A city's "police power" does not include blanket authority over all kinds of business activities, just because they happen to be within the city limits.

On the other hand, a city may indeed impose restraints on a business that has a real potential for harm.

Consider the case of a man who started a telephone answering service. According to a city ordinance, he and his employees were supposed to submit to photographing and fingerprinting. Challenging the ordinance, the man said it was unfair to "single us out."

But a court saw two ways in which a telephone answering service could be harmful:

- 1) by the misuse of confidential information about subscribers; and
- 2) by the encouragement of immoral activities.

Upholding the city's requirements, the court said:

"There is a reasonable basis for distinguishing this type of business from others that are not regulated."

Another ordinance, covering private detectives, went still further. Under its terms, they had to put up a special bond and get a character clearance from the police department.

But again, a court decided there were enough possibilities for mischief in this line of work to justify the city in taking precautions. As one judge put it:

"A statute to promote the public safety is valid, although it may interfere with individual freedom. Individual freedom must yield to the public good."

The "All-Breed Ladies Lead Sheep Class" is sponsored by Sheep to Shawl, a group organized in late 1970 to help promote projects rearing wool: Mrs. Janice Gnatkowski, Ancho, is chairwoman of the organization. The Lincoln County Extension Service of New Mexico State University is assisting. Qualifications for entering the class are as follows: The girls must be New Mexicans or reside in El Paso County, Texas. They must be between 16 and 21 years old, and their major articles of clothing must be made of wool. The girls must show at halter a yearling (two-tooth) ewe, shorn in the current calendar year. Purebreds of any breed are eligible, and registration papers are not necessary. The girl must have owned the ewe for at least 90 days before the class is judged, and must provide proof of ownership. This means animals must be acquired soon. Verification of animal ownership, and the home sewing of ap-

Two El Pasoans Area Students Injured Last Week On NM 37

An El Paso, Texas man, Dennis Houghney, 23, reportedly remains in serious condition in the Providence Memorial Hospital, El Paso, following a one-car accident, around noon, Thursday, June 1, on New Mexico State Road 37, one mile north of the Ruidoso Village limits.

Houghney was first taken to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital where a team of Ruidoso doctors reportedly worked for over three hours trying to stop massive bleeding.

Blood for Houghney was flown in via helicopter from the Holloman Air Force Base and also relayed to Ruidoso by New Mexico State Police Units from Roswell and Alamogordo. He was flown to El Paso late Thursday afternoon.

A passenger in the car, Floyd Jones, 16, and also of El Paso, was taken to the local hospital and after emergency attention was released late Thursday night.

Jeff Darden, New Mexico State Police officer who investigated the mishap, reported that Houghney's late model car skidded over 140 feet, on the wrong side of the highway, before smashing into the hill. It was also noted that the car, after the first impact, traveled over 75 feet down the side of the road and overturned at least once before landing upside down.

Witnesses at the scene, four men saw the accident while in the High Country Lodge Restaurant, stated that they heard the car coming down the road, saw the impact and the two men thrown out of the car. When they arrived at the scene, just moments later, Houghney was pinned under the car. The men raised the front of the vehicle and pulled the injured man out from under the car.

Both men were taken to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital in the back of a pickup truck belonging to the High Country Lodge.

New Mexico State University (NMSU) has awarded more than 750 degrees to students who completed degree requirements during the spring semester at the university.

The designation of meritorious graduate was given for a two-year course to 17 students who maintained a 3.2 in the last 45 credit hours at NMSU.

New Mexico State University is a land grant college founded in 1888. It has an enrollment of more than 8,000 on the main campus in Las Cruces. An additional 2,000 students are enrolled in the university's four branches in the state. In addition to the Graduate School, NMSU has College of Agriculture and Home Economics, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration and Economics, Education and Engineering.

Gallery III Sets Painting Exhibit

Gallery III, Ruidoso, will present an exhibition of paintings by Domenico Mortellito of Wilmington, Delaware Saturday, June 10 through Friday, June 23. A reception will be held Saturday, June 10 from 7:30 to 10:30 p.m.

Mortellito has made an outstanding contribution to the field of fine arts by using his creative talents on media that are of recent origin such as Linoleum, Lucite, polychromed composition stone, Urethane and Teflon. The paintings which will be shown during the two week period are painted with "Potassium Titanate". The work is quite unique in that this medium, more than being completely new and a product of science from the chemical laboratory, does, in fact, lend a new and significant quality to painting that never existed before.

The artist says of his work, "It is a subtle but effective quality of depth and reflectivity. This is an important factor in a work of art because it literally emulates the illustrative and somewhat evanescent effect of visual experience which in nature are never fixed or static, and which is now for the first time not static in the 'P. K. T.' paintings." "It is the hope of every artist to capture something new and refreshing in his work which will provide a different and satisfying sensorial experience for his viewers. It is my belief that 'P. K. T.' paintings have this quality."

The conception of PKT paintings or more precisely the use of P (pigmentary), K (potassium), T (titanate), started in the research laboratory. The scientists, Thurman E. Gier, Paul Salzberg, and Howard S. Young, assigned to E. I. du Pont de Nemours and Company, found that the chemical fusion of an alkali metal carbonate or hydroxide with titanium dioxide produced other titanates which resulted in asbestoslike or fibrous alkali metal titanate which is water insoluble. This was a new, important, patentable concept which revolutionized the white paper industry providing us for the first time with the brightest, whitest papers ever.

The artist, continually looking for ways to produce new and meaningful paintings with contemporary mediums, became interested in P. K. T. in his work with paper as a color consultant. Through the help and close association with Dr. Harold C. Brill, they made up some color paints. Mortellito then proceeded to use these paints to cre-

ate a number of paintings which had a new inherent dimensional quality.

The ultimate result was a new form of art called P. K. T. A dimensional painting medium which brought a new visual-optical experience to works of art. In some of the paintings, as the viewer moves gently from one point of vision to another while viewing the work, one actually experiences the added quality of motion.

Though he was born in Newark, N. J., in 1906, Domenico Mortellito traces his artistic roots back through centuries and national boundaries to the Italian Renaissance of his forebears. Like the men of that storied time, his talents spread generally through the arts, finding expression in painting, sculpture, architecture, design and such esoteric specialties as mosaics, plastic intaglio, and color dynamics.

Apprenticed to a mural painter at an early age, Mortellito went to work at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn to lend his efforts to numerous art and architectural activities in the metropolitan area. He has served as design consultant to the Du Pont Company for 27 years. He is presently Chairman of the Du Pont Color Council.

His works include the 6,000 square foot decoration for the Smithsonian Institute Pachyderm House in which he was the first to use rubber base paint for decoration. In the 1939 New York World's Fair, his executives included decorations in the Ford Theatre, Helms, Fair Corvettes, Fisher's, House of Jewels and Dupont Exhibits; and 10,000 square feet of covered cement decorations for the Ford Buildings. He designed the original model for Dupont 1964 World's Fair Pavilion and created the first sculptured urethane mural for the Pavilion.



Individuals aged 55 and over, who have never had a number, should take some form of identification with them when they go to the social security office to apply for a card.



Antiquity Permits Necessary For Artifacts Collecting

Regional Forester Wm. D. Hurst announced that the U. S. Forest Service must now require antiquity permits for collecting all artifacts, including those on the surface of the ground, within the National Forests.

The new regulation reads: "It is unlawful to remove any object or artifact from National Forest land without permission, whether or not surface disturbance is involved."

The term artifact is defined in the broadest sense as any product or by-product of human activity is an artifact. This would include a range from such familiar items as an ar-

rowpoints, to the less familiar soil matrix of an Indian village.

Thus, depending upon the level of consideration, an artifact may reference a single item, such as a bead, or an entire village or town.

Hurst said this is in conformance with Section 432 of the Antiquities Act pertaining to the issuance of permits. Such permits are issued only to qualified institutions, upon recommendation by the Smithsonian Institution. Applications for a permit may be obtained from any Forest Supervisor's office.

The requirement is a response by the U. S. Forest Service to protect the numerous Indian and early European camp and village sites that are being damaged or destroyed by relic collectors.

Gov. Bruce King continued to battle a proposal of El Paso Natural Gas Co. officials. The governor has repeatedly fought EPNG's announced intention to reduce gas supplies within New Mexico when maximum demand requires stepped-up deliveries to major California customers.

King Administrative Assistant Tony Anaya met with El Paso Natural Gas Co. officials. The governor has repeatedly fought EPNG's announced intention to reduce gas supplies within New Mexico when maximum demand requires stepped-up deliveries to major California customers.

King sought legislation in the 1972 lawmaker session to hand him more authority to oppose the plan. The hot issue was still pending this week. El Paso Natural Gas Co. sells gas wholesale to major suppliers of much of New Mexico. A crisis could develop in cold weather in New Mexico if insufficient gas is available.

Gov. King asked the Four Corners Regional Commission to extend its boundaries to 11 more counties in New Mexico. They are Union, Curry, Roosevelt, Lea, Eddy, Otero (the Mesclero Apache Reservation excluded), Sierra, Dona Ana, Luna and Hidalgo. All other counties are already in the commission's area.

If remaining counties are added, they would be eligible for a host of development projects. Areas include highways, recreation, housing and a wide range of other projects.

Gov. King says his proposed expansion of coverage tallies with new legislation introduced by U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya to continue federal regional commissions.

Mrs. K. I. Langley of Tucumcari was named by Gov. King to succeed her late husband on the State Board of Education. Langley, a Tucumcari businesswoman, died early this year. He was a Democrat. Mrs. Langley's appointment will end Jan. 1 when a newly reappointed State Board of Education will take office.

In Tuesday's Republican primary in new District 5 of the board candidates were the incumbent, Mrs. Dorothy B. Marjorie Kirk of Deming, wife of ex-State Rep. Carter Kirk.

The big new district spans Valencia, Socorro, Catron, Grant, Sierra, Hidalgo and Luna counties. In a late campaign statement Mrs. Holmes said it is important to seek ways for education, the state's largest budget item, to exert visible effect on health and social service, the

second largest spending area.

Therefore, Mrs. Holmes says, "I have cheered for the vocational thrust, career awareness programs in elementary schools, pre-school and kindergarten and bilingual approaches where needed."

Mrs. Holmes said she also seeks a way "to make school count for the gifted, those I call the bright and bored."

Before the primary election Tuesday Ed Presson, 29, of Silver City, claimed heavy support in the Belen-Los Lunas-Valencia County area. Presson opposed Sierra County rancher Reuben Pankey. Pankey was favored to win the Republican nomination for the U. S. House in District 2.

Presson predicted he would win Socorro, his home Grant County, Otero, Roosevelt and Valencia Counties. Ed rated himself even with Pankey in San Juan County and Curry County. He said Chaves, Eddy and Lea were question marks. He said he could not assess DeBaca, Hidalgo, Luna and McKinley Counties.

A hot Democratic primary scrap was expected in new State Senate District 7—all of Union, Colfax and Harding Counties and San Miguel County from the Gallinas River in Las Vegas east to the Quay County line.

The Democratic primary matched incumbent State Sen. John Morrow of Capulin, Union County, and ex-State Rep. Kelly Mora of Raton. The winner will oppose Carol Tinker, Las Vegas Republican, in November.

Another lively Democratic primary race matched incumbent Albert Amador of Fairview, Rio Arriba County, and Espanola insurance agent Joe Romero, 38. Romero was a State House member from Taos County in 1961-64.

Amador and Romero are in newly reapportioned State Board of Education District 9—Rio Arriba, San Miguel, Harding, Guadalupe, Taos, Mora, Quay, Colfax and Union Counties.

No Republican filed for the State Board of Education seat. Clayton Mayor Ed Herring, Republican; Dr. H. M. Mortimer, Las Vegas Republican, and Langley were in the huge new district.

Emprice Corp. of Buffalo, N. Y., reportedly under investigation by a Congressional committee for alleged underworld ties, has been removed from a position of possible control of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, ex-Gov. John Simms reported.

"My Girlhood Among Outlaws" by Lily Klasner Edited by Eve Ball

Lily Casey Klasner lived side by side with outlaws and Indians and could hold her own with any of them. Born in Texas in 1862, she walked much of the long trek to New Mexico with her parents in 1867, settling on the Rio Hondo in New Mexico, bringing with them about 300 cattle, 200 sheep, and a large remuda. She was introduced to violence when Indian raiders robbed the Caseys of most of their cattle and provisions.

Danger, deprivation and tragedy dominated her childhood. Her father was murdered when she was 13, and Lily quickly assumed family leadership. Fearless, a tireless rider, her wits as quick as her six-guns, she could do any "man's job."

Intimate friend and counselor of Lily and her family was John racing season opened.



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
