Chamber Asked To Assist With Road To Research Station

The board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce held their regular monthly meeting last Monday evening at the council room in the Village Hall with R. F. Madera of North Park, Inc., present to ask the group's assistance in getting the road to the Montgomery Biological Research Station paved. The research station, operated by New Mexico State University, is located just north of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport in the village limits of Ruidoso.

Madera noted that officials of the university stated that an expansion of facilities at the station were planned upon completion of an all-weather road and an adequate supply of water. A village water line is now being installed but a cooperative effort to obtain a road is now at a standstill. Madera requested

that a committee, consisting of members from the college, the chamber of commerce, the village and the county commission be formed to work with the State Highway Department for the two mile road project. Board member Bill Ward, was appointed to serve on such a committee.

A discussion was held concerning television coverage of the All-American Futurity by a major network and the board decided to support the coverage in any way possible.

President Dick Mound named George Luck to serve as chairman of the Arts and Crafts committee to assist with the Arts & Crafts show scheduled to be held in the municipal park Aug. 4, 5 and 6. The event is slated to be held annually and will be produced by George Buffett, who also handles the Albuquerque show.

Other committee chairmen named included: Sports—George Marsh and Tuffy Wilson; Highway—Bill Ward; representative to bring in new industry—Jerry Wood and Bob Ethridge; and tourist development—George Klineckle and Alton Lane.

Chamber manager Wyman Scarborough noted that the chamber office had been contacted by a group out of New York concerning the filming of a documentary film about Kid's Rodeo and that there was a good chance that Ruidoso would be selected for the filming this fall.

Mound stated that much interest had been shown in the tennis tournament to be held Sept. 8, 9 and 10 and that the El Paso Tennis Club had offered to assist with the tournament.

The directors set June 27 as "mop-up" day in the annual chamber of commerce membership drive.

RUIDOSO'S SUMMER OF '72 Historic Ruidoso Village Budget Is Approved First Day of Summer

Officials of the Village of Ruidoso and Raymond Lara, Chief of the New Mexico State Local Government Division, Santa Fe, during a formal budget hearing here Wednesday, approved the largest Ruidoso Municipal budget, \$950,000 for the fiscal year 1972-73, in the history of the Village. Which by the way is on par with the \$950,000, estimated, total purse of the 1972 All-American Futurity Race, the World's Richest Horse Race, held annually on Labor Day at the world renown Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Considering the fact that this historic budget was approved Wednesday, the first day of Summer, June 21, and that the first municipal budget, just twenty-seven years ago was only \$100,000, you begin to believe that there is evidently a proven and progressive love story that continues to saturate the populace of this all season paradise.

Truth is, that the current and popular motion picture love story, "The Summer of '42", has to take a back seat to the very evident love story of "Ruidoso's Summer of '72". When you examine the approved 1972-73 budget in comparison with previous Ruidoso Municipal budgets and when you consider what has taken place in the village the past year and what is

planned for this year . . . there has to be a real love story between the local populace and this garden of glamour.

The love affair between these two is enhanced because of many facets, for example . . . recent rains in the area have made the possibility of repeating last year's drought nearly void . . . building permits for both commercial and residential construction are at an all time high in cost and number and reportedly lead New Mexico percentage-wise . . . the Ruidoso area tourist business is apparently surpassing all previous years . . . There have been major increases and advancements in every phase of the village's utility department . . . a year from now the one million dollar voter approved major water distribution and storage expansion project will be completed or very near completion . . .

A major expansion project on the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital will soon be completed and the voter approved Ruidoso School District building, remodeling and repair program will be ready next fall.

In the current fiscal year, 1971-72, the village made its final payment on the very first municipal voter approved water improvement General Obligation Bond issuance and during the ensuing fiscal year will make its final payment on the first Village Paving District . . .

Also in the ensuing fiscal year a new Village Paving District will be established that will multiply our paved streets by many miles . . . the downtown and mainstreet building improvements and beautification projects . . . and again the Village of Ruidoso, 1971-72, operated financially in the black, showing a balance in all municipal departments in which to start the new fiscal year . . . There's gotta be a love story . . .

Studying Ruidoso's accomplishments in the past and considering Ruidoso's faith in the future it is no wonder that the Chief of the New Mexico State Local Government Division, Lara, was extremely complimentary towards the Village officials during Wednesday's budget hearing . . .

The approved 1972-73 village budget projects an increase of nearly \$70,000 over last year's previous high record budget. Every year since the village incorporated in 1948 the proof of Ruidoso's belief in the area is verified both by its continual expansion and its annual budget intent, every year the budget has increased breaking records year after year and every year the village has enlarged its municipal facilities.

Of the several prominently noticeable items in the 1972-73 budget, including the increased sale tax resources which increased from \$137,000 in the head injuries and facial lacerations, radioed for an ambulance for Nunnally and then ran to the scene of the fire to secure additional help.

He said when he arrived back at the action scene Nunnally's Jeep caught fire and with the aid of investigating Ruidoso Police officer Ken Mays and patrolman Gayle Knapp and several volunteer firemen, the fire was extinguished and Nunnally removed from the wreckage.

Both Nunnally and Fennell were rushed to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital by a Chapel of Roses ambulance. The two men were released late this week from the local hospital. Boone reportedly was not injured.

Boone, who was cited by the investigating officer for reckless driving and failure to obey an officer, Monday, appeared before Acting Municipal Judge Wayne Estes and was fined a total of \$600 and 180 days in jail. Judge Estes cut his fine to \$300, on both counts, and suspended the 180 days subject to the New Mexico State Motor Vehicle Department revoking Boone's driver's license for a period of one year.

Ruidoso Police Department Gives May Monthly Activity Report

Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens, Jr., this week, released the official Ruidoso Police Department's Monthly Activities Report for the month of May which revealed that Ruidoso had the lowest number of burglaries, 4, during the month of May than in any previous month during the past 18 months.

The report, presented to village officials and acknowledged during the council's last regular meeting, also stated that fifty-nine traffic citations were issued during the month which equaled over twice the number issued in a given month in the last several years.

Ruidoso Downs Sets Bond Bid Opening

Bids for \$300,000 in general obligation sewer bonds for the Village of Ruidoso Downs were opened at 9:00 p.m. June 22 at the Village Hall but results of the opening were not available at press time. The bonds are for the village portion of the estimated 1.3 million dollar sewer project.

The bonds will be dated July 1, 1972, and are in denominations of \$5,000 each and are scheduled to mature from 1974 until 1991. The bond sale is being handled by Stern Bros. of Albuquerque and construction is slated to begin in the immediate future.

It is estimated that completion of the project will require about two years.

Western States Receives REA Loan

According to a release from Congressman Harold Runnels' office, a loan in the amount of \$2,555,700 has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration for Western States Telephone Company for improvement of their facilities in Ruidoso Downs, Truth or Consequences, Hillsboro and Lake City, Utah.

Improvements will include upgrading existing facilities to all one-party lines in Alto and Hillsboro, the construction of a central office building in Ruidoso Downs and an addition to the central office in Truth or Consequences.

Western States plans to install 191 miles of new lines in New Mexico and Colorado.

Mescaleros Set Ceremonial

The annual ceremonial held by the Mescalero Apache Tribe has been scheduled for July 1, 2, 3 and 4 at Mescalero and will feature a rodeo each day beginning at 1:00 p.m. Immediately following the rodeo members of the Tribe will render the Dance of the Mountain Gods, the Maiden Dance, and the Apache War Dance.

The Battle of Indian Bands will start the beginning of the ceremonial at 8:00 p.m. June 30 on the Ceremonial grounds. Rodeo events July 1, 2 and 4 will be open for participation for all comers, but the third day will feature an All-Indian Rodeo. Books for entrants open at 8 a.m. each day and close at 11 a.m.

Admission to the ceremonial will be \$1.00 for adults and 50c for children, for the rodeo, \$1.50 for adults and 50c for children. All events are open to the public and guests are invited to attend.

The following letter of welcome was issued by Mescalero Tribal President Wendell Chino:

WELCOME
It is my pleasure and privilege in behalf of the Tribal Council and members of the Tribe to welcome our friends and guests to the annual Mescalero Apache Ceremonial. From time immemorial, the Mescaleros have observed this ancient tradition.

It is fitting and proper that we pause for a moment to take a brief review of the significance of the Fourth of July. In our American history, we refer to it as Independence Day. In our age of inter-continental ballistics and space flights, we tend to lose the meaning of this legacy and what it has meant to us and our country. While our freedom's legacies are dear and true, we should stop and be grateful for Independence Day.

It was fought for—it meant bloodshed and it should not be taken lightly. Herein, lies the heart of the American way of life and the heritage of the democracy that is now wrestling not to impose its way on the whole world, but to remain free to pursue its course untrammelled and unafraid.

In this age and day when most of the world is grasping for supremacy and attempting to make us all conform to a single pattern, it is well that once a year our people here re-live customs and practices of the Apache culture. What we present here has been handed to us from our prehistoric ancestors.

As we annually gather here for this occasion, a ceremony which required four days and nights to complete, we observe what has been the custom of our people for hundreds of years. Herein, we express our patriotism to our culture and our country. This is the significance of Independence Day, to preserve the heritage of our people and the freedom of our country.

This subdivision takes in 640 acres of land and includes the old golf course site. Today a new high school is being constructed, and several business buildings and homes have been built. A year ago this week, Nob Hill Restaurant opened, owned by Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Kruse and Mr. and Mrs. George Hollaway. About the same time Emmett Reese and Jimmy Rogers opened the Wagon Wheel Motor Company. The Community Methodist Church, just a dream a year ago, is now a reality built by the people of the town on ground given them by the partners of the White Mountain Development Co. Dr. R. H. Sutton built the Grandview Pharmacy, now owned by Mrs. E. A. Johnson. Forty-two additional lots have been sold in the Palmer Gateway subdivision for businesses that will include all types. Carmon Phillips was also building a year ago, doing most of the work himself, creating an art shop, a home and photography studio right next to the historic old mill. The local school board announced that Paul Vance of Madrid, N. M., will be the athletic director and coach for the new Ruidoso High School when it is completed late this fall. Rev. Carl Hammer, formerly stationed at Fenasco, N. M., is now in Ruidoso organizing the Mission here into a parish which will include the Glencoe and San Patricio Missions. SOCIAL SECURITY

Earnings from summer jobs can affect the monthly payments of students and other young people who get benefits from social security, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative. "Over 4 million young people under 22 get monthly social security payments as children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers," Mrs. Graves said. "Many of them will spend the summer school vacation working. In some cases, this work and earnings will affect their social security benefits." The amount young people earn at summer or part-time jobs will cause a reduction in social security payments if their total earnings for the year are more than \$1,680. But even if they earn over \$1,680, they can get their social security payment for any month in which they neither earn more than \$140 nor perform substantial services in self-employment. "Summer workers and other young people who get social security benefits and who know their earnings for this year will go over \$1,680 should notify social security as soon as possible. Refunding overpayments to social security at the end of the year can sometimes create a financial hardship," Mrs. Graves concluded. Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the Council Room in the Ruidoso City Hall the second Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon and 1 to 2.



But, if being the first lady jockey to ride at the mountain track meant anything special, you couldn't tell it by Jackie's lean country-girl look and quiet attitude. It was just another day of riding—something she's been doing for the past three or four years. Jackie shipped in from Tonganoxie, Kansas to ride three mounts in the recent qualifying

trials for the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity. "Yes, it's fun being a jockey, but I haven't decided whether I'd like to do this for a living. I just graduated from Tonganoxie High School, and I'd like to go to Junior College. I'd probably major in business." During her afternoon of riding at Ruidoso Downs, Jackie's presence just about put Fred Berger, Ruidoso Downs vice-president, out on the sidewalk. Berger's office was turned into a dressing room for the first jockey in the track's 25-year history. How does it feel to invade a man's world? "Oh, I guess the boys don't like it too well. No

one has ever said anything, but you can sort of feel the way they're thinking. But it doesn't bother me at all." Jackie, 18, feels a girl can be just as much at home aboard a snorting race horse as any boy. "It's just a matter of getting used to it. Horses don't scare me in the least. About three or four years ago, I started riding in races at Hutchinson, Kansas. Two years ago, I rode at Park Jefferson, South Dakota. I had about 10 mounts, but I didn't have too much luck. I think I got one second."



Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

State Sen. John Morrow, D-Capulin, says major interests in his new District 7 "are trying to get more water, promote tourism and build better roads."

Morrow survived a primary contest in a Colfax-Union-Harding-San Miguel district. He faces State Rep. Carol Tinker, R-Las Vegas, in the general election. Morrow is a rancher. Mrs. Tinker is a two-term House member.

Sen. Morrow says major voter concerns in his district are the Vietnam war and the economy. He says a highway project is being built on US-87 from Clayton west. He encourages industrial development in the Senate District and notes labor is available.

Sen. Morrow predicts Republicans will not win control of the House or Senate in the general election. The present Senate division is 28 Democrats and 14 Republicans. The House split is 48 Democrats and 22 Republicans.

Morrow said adequate wash-room facilities are still lacking in Cimarron Canyon in Colfax

County. He talked with Gov. King late last week on the problem.

State Sen. Odys Echols, 42, D-Clovis, is opposed for reelection by Clovis Republican Lonnie Hand, a farmer inexperienced in politics. But Alabama Gov. George Wallace easily carried Curry County in the New Mexico Democratic presidential primary. President Richard M. Nixon whopped Minnesota Sen. Hubert Humphrey in Curry in 1968.

The Wallace vote could move to Nixon in the general election and hurt Democratic candidates further down the ticket. Echols is looking at a possible 1974 Democratic governor run. He must be reelected to the State Senate, retain his majority whip post and compile a creditable record in the 1973 Legislature to be a threat in the governor's race.

Echols, a state senator since 1967, believes Jack Daniels of Hobbs, the Democratic U. S. Senate candidate, and U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat, will help other East Side candidates in the general election.

State Rep. John Bigbee, 37, R-Encino, says: "People are real disgusted with people being elected to 4-year terms and then running in the middle of that term. We should have legislation to prevent it."

Bigbee, a reelection candidate, referred to Lt. Gov. Robert Mondragon, Atty. Gen. David Norvell and State Treasurer

Jesse D. Kornegay—all losing candidates for the Democratic U. S. Senate nomination. All were elected to 4-year terms in 1970 and campaigned for the Senate without resigning.

Rep. Bigbee would remove the lieutenant governor's \$16,000 annual salary. He would allow the lieutenant governor per diem during legislative sessions, office space, a secretary and "some expense money."

Rep. Bigbee is opposed in the general election by Democrat A. F. (Lalo) Padilla of Vaughn in House District 59 in Guadalupe, Torrance, DeBaca and Lincoln Counties. Padilla formerly lived in Santa Rosa.

Bigbee predicts President Richard M. Nixon will carry New Mexico handily Nov. 7. He says: "Wallace would be the only threat to Nixon."

Bigbee says he will campaign on "fiscal conservatism." He is on the House Appropriations-Finance, Printing and Supplies and Transportation Committees.

The State Hospitals and Institutions Board will meet June 26 at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School near Capitan. The Legislative Universities Study Committee will meet Friday in Santa Fe. Sen. I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra, is chairman. Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, is a member.

A State Corporation Commission hearing was set Wednesday in Ruidoso on the application of Tom L. Marrs of Capitan to operate a tour service to White Sands, Carrizozo, Sierra Blanca and the Lincoln National Forest area.

State Rep. Severino Martinez, Espanola contractor, submitted the apparent low bid to build a rest area on US-180 some 20 miles northwest of Deming. Martinez, defeated in the Democratic primary for renomination, bid \$53,400. The Highway Department's engineer's estimate was \$61,307.

J. W. Jones Construction Co., Albuquerque, was apparent low bidder at \$1,030,099.70 on an Interstate 25 safety and overlay project 16.9 miles long in Dona Ana and Sierra Counties from 4 of one mile south of the Rincon Interchange north.

The State Oil Conservation Commission took under advisement a proposed major change in state rules on prohibiting oil production in New Mexico. The OCC staff shaped the proposed change. Present rules to control prorationing were set in the mid-1940's. The normal unit allowable was about 45 barrels daily then.

A major proposed change sets a "depth bracket allowable." A definite allowable would be stated in regulations for all wells with increases for each 1,000 feet in depth. There would be no change from the present allowable for wells up to 8,000 feet in depth. But the allowable would be reduced for wells over 8,000-feet in depth.

The New Mexico McGovern organization picked Lee Nance, 44, of Clovis as a delegate at large for South Dakota Sen. George McGovern to the National Democratic Convention. Juan A. Cruz Solano, 32, of Clovis and Mrs. Rena Rosequist, 41, of Taos were chosen as McGovern alternates at Miami Beach. Choices this week in Albuquerque.

Special Exemption For Part-time Summer Students

Maurice E. Johnson, IRS District Director for New Mexico today announced that IRS has special withholding tax information for students seeking summer jobs.

Any employee who owed no tax in 1971 and does not expect to owe any in 1972 can request his employer not to withhold Federal income taxes from his pay, Johnson said.

In addition to students with summer jobs, part-time employees are likely to qualify for this special exemption from withholding.

Before the special exemption from withholding was enacted, taxpayers who owned no tax had to file tax returns in order to have their withholding refunded.

Under present law, if a taxpayer qualifies to be exempt from withholding, no Federal tax is withheld from his pay, and he does not have to complete a tax return for the sole purpose of having his money re-

funded, Johnson said.

The tax law provides for an exemption from withholding of Federal income tax only. Employers are still required to withhold Social Security from their employees' pay.

Before an employer is relieved of the responsibility of withholding Federal tax from an employee's pay the employee must file a special withholding exemption certificate, Form DW-4E, with them. These forms are available at your nearest IRS offices, Johnson said.
