Sewer Resolutions, Agreements Occupy Downs Village Council

Passage of resolutions and agreements concerning the new village sewer system occupied most of the regular meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Village Council at the Village Hall Monday evening. The action was necessary to receive state and federal participation in the 1.3 million dollar project scheduled to begin immediately.

In other action by the council, a bid for \$13,981 on a new garbage truck from Milne International of Alamogordo was accepted, with delivery slated for about 90 days.

Municipal League dues were paid for the coming year and intra-budget transfer was made. Approval was given for replacement parts for street and sanitation department equipment and a 5% increase was voted for employees in the water, street, and sanitation departments. Money for the increased salaries had already been budgeted.

Mayor Jake Harris noted that the village had received \$8,500 in state funds for the village fire department, and that a request had been made to state officials for funds to support one police car and one officer.

A. J. Thompson requested assistance in straightening the river channel near Thompson's Trailer Park before the river bridge was washed out. The board noted that the County Commissioners would be contacted in an effort to secure their help with the project.

The village clerk was instructed to contact Charles Denton for a commitment for acquiring Denton Field as a village recreation area. The proposition will be on the ballot in the November general election. A straw vote had previously been taken and received the approval of village voters.

A discussion of the livestock problem in the village was held and it was agreed that the planning and zoning commission would meet with the village council to draw up a new ordinance with boundaries and regulations for their control. The meeting was held Wednesday evening.

The next regular meeting of the council will be held at the village hall July 24 at 7:30 p.m.

The Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association, the legal responsible administrator of Alto Lake Reservoir and relative water controls, is composed of three Ruidoso

men and three Capitan men all appointed by their respective mayor upon the consent of the village councils. Alto Lake and the waters under the control of the association are owned jointly by Ruidoso and Capitan.

Jones told those present that a long range plan of the association was to build a dam on the ski run road on property owned by the association. The site, the Hightower Dam, would cost an estimated \$500,000 and would hold around 80 million gallons of raw water and would gravity flow to both Ruidoso and Capitan water treatment plants.

Howard Abercrombie, Capitan, who served as moderator for the meeting, stated that the dam has been engineered, Ruidoso has an overall water improvement plan, the need now is for an overall water improvement plan for all concerned.

It was noted that Capitan now has a working agreement with the City of Alamogordo which provides that they take water from the Bonito Lake and replace it during the off season dry months. Last summer, it was also noted, Capitan was confronted with both a water shortage and the inability to store raw water.

Pappas suggested to the group that a feasibility study and cost estimate be made and in addition investigate the possibility of the two villages and the Eagle Creek Association securing funds for the overall project which possibly could be matched with federal fundings.

Pappas also stated that a \$2,500 grant could be made available immediately for an overall feasibility study of the proposed plan. He advised that he would make the application for the grant through the required Purchase Order made available by the Economic Development Administration for the study.

Following the feasibility study and the necessary research and funding applications, Pappas continued, "Within six weeks we ought to be able to put everything together," referring to the initial application for federal grants.

Overall Water Storage Plan—Ruidoso-Capitan Cooperative Plan Discussed In Meeting Here

Officials of the Village of Ruidoso, Capitan and the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association, in a joint meeting Wednesday night with officials of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, discussed a proposed cooperative agreement plan for a new raw water storage and water treatment facility that would serve both Ruidoso and Capitan.

Meeting in the council chambers of the Ruidoso Municipal Building, the group of nineteen, the majority of whom are elected officials, appointed or employed by their respective municipalities, agreed that an overall plan that would serve both communities appeared to be the ideal solution to the current water storage shortage now existing in both communities.

In addressing Nick Pappas, Director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, Tom Jones, president of the Eagle Creek Association stated, "Capitan is in dire need of water storage and pipeline work and Ruidoso is in need of raw water storage, we don't have the money for additional storage and want to know if any money is available for us?"

School Board Holds Inspection Tour of Building-Remodeling

A walk-around was held at the regular monthly Ruidoso Municipal School board meeting Tuesday evening for the inspection of buildings nearing completion and remodeling of existing buildings. The library, shop and administration building will be complete within two weeks and remodeling is progressing well in the high school, junior high and gymnasium.

Following the inspection, the board went into regular session and heard letters from Leonard DeLayo, State Superintendent of Schools, concerning student involvement in school administration, and a letter from state school board lawyer Robert Ripley advising changes in the proposed contract with the All Indian Pueblo Council for Johnson-O'Malley funds. The corrections were adopted and the contract will be presented to the Council representatives for their signatures.

In answer to the student involvement program, the board noted that such a program had already been accepted by the school. Student council members are invited to attend school board meetings and special luncheon meets will be held at least twice each year to hear council representative ideas on administration.

Rem Alley, architect for the building and remodeling program, gave a progress report and suggested plans for landscaping and paving areas at the high school and Nob Hill school. Drawings were presented and the board voted to adopt the plans, with a ceiling of \$30,000 for the combined projects.

Vouchers for the contractor on the school project and warrants for June and July were approved.

The resignations of Cheryl Heesch, Phil Hood and Louise Bruce were accepted and Yone Holman was hired as sixth grade teacher.


A discussion was held concerning insurance on school buildings and fixtures and it was decided that the architect would be consulted for an estimate of the value of school property for the purpose of increasing insurance coverage.

Positions still to be filled on the teaching staff include: Counselor, social studies, high school science, industrial arts, health occupations, basketball coach, part time secretary, and custodian.

The board voted to move M. B. McGuire to Nob Hill school, where he will teach remedial math and do testing work.

The next regular meeting of the board will be held Aug. 15, 7:00 p.m. in the new administration building east of the high school.

Over ten years ago Mescalero Apache Tribal leaders had a particular dream of a gigantic resort and recreational project that would create year-round employment opportunities for the Mescalero people.

In 1962 their dream became more realistic as a multi-million dollar tourism triad complex was architecturally placed on the tribal planning boards. In the months and years to follow multi-numerous studies by highly qualified and skillful engineers and planners were made, the nation's leading convention consultants were contacted, resort and recreational specialists were engaged and the resultant Cienegita Resort Hotel Complex became a near reality.

MONDAY — WORK STARTS ON DREAM

Monday, July 10, work of the first phase of the Mescalero Apache's \$6.8 million resort and recreational complex was started, which when completed, will provide an estimated 150 Mescalero Apache Indians with year-round employment opportunities. Hence their dream is no longer a dream but a distinct fact.

Last Friday, July 7, during a formal press conference in Albuquerque at the Albuquerque Press Club, Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council, announced the start of construction on the long range project which will hopefully make much of the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation lands a year-round resort and recreational mecca.

Construction began Monday on the \$2 million dam to impound a recreational lake of about 100 surface acres. Construction time is estimated to take around fifteen months and reportedly will require several hundred workers to complete the first phase of the overall project. The lake will be around 1 1/2 miles in length and in comparison to Bonito Lake, about two and one-half times larger. It is expected that fishing, boating and swimming will be offered to tourists.

Focal point of the tourism triad resort development will be the \$4 million, 140 room, Cienegita Resort Hotel complex to be located near the lake site and around three miles from Ruidoso.

According to information released early last year by tribal officials, the resort hotel complex will be the very first grant of its kind in the history of the federal departments.

Referring to the Tribal leaders' overall long range plans and goals for stimulating economic growth through recreational and tourism as a further means to promote self-determination and self-sufficiency among their people Morton stated, "I commend the Tribal leaders for their foresight... these projects and their long range plans for public

recreation services that will provide job opportunities."

Thus a dream of a decade ago, a deterministic dream by Tribal leaders and aimed at sincerely bettering their people, has in fact changed from a possible to a positive... from a promise to a project... from a hope to a holding... and from a goal to a growth.

All-American Telecast Set

The All-American Futurity, the World's Richest Horse Race, will be televised live and in color exclusively by a special network formed to carry the event. It was announced today by Thad M. Sandstrom, President of the All-American Network, and Art Johnson, President of Ruidoso Downs.

The "All-American" is scheduled Labor Day, Sept. 4, at Ruidoso Downs, and will be telecast on approximately 60 TV stations and 15 southwestern and midwestern states, KGNB-TV, Amarillo, Texas, and WIBW-TV, Topeka, Kansas. Flagship stations of the All-American Network will originate the first live telecast of the All-American. Unlike the Triple Crown which is televised on Saturday afternoons, the All-American will be carried in prime time—6:30 p.m. CDT on most stations.

Billed as the World's Richest Horse Race, the winning horse of the "All-American Futurity" will receive approximately \$200,000 first prize money—about three times the winner's purse of the Kentucky Derby. The total purse of \$925,000 is double the combined "Triple Crown" purse.

In addition to the actual race itself, viewers will see preliminary All-American races held during the Labor Day weekend; resort areas around Ruidoso; and highlights of the world-famous All-American Sale of Yearling Quarter Horses nominated for the 1973 All-American Futurity. Telecast time will be 6:30 CDT, 5:30 p.m. MDT, Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 4.

Two Area Men Bound Over To District Court

Ruidoso Magistrate Judge, Division III, Austin A. Pritchett, denied a motion for dismissal by court appointed attorneys representing two Ruidoso area men charged with Contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor and Statutory Rape following a nearly three hour long Preliminary Hearing here Tuesday, July 11.

The two men, Frazier Pope, 27, Ruidoso Downs, and Billy Ray Davis, 20, Ruidoso, both of whom pleaded not guilty to the charges during their arraignment July 3, were bound over to District Court to stand trial and ordered held in the custody of the Lincoln County Sheriff pending posting of bail bond.

Pope is charged with a Third Degree Felony, which if convicted carries a two to ten year prison sentence. Davis is charged with a Fourth Degree Felony, which if convicted carries a one to five year prison sentence.

Judge Pritchett reduced the bail bond to \$3,000 for Pope and \$2,000 for Davis, the bond previously had been set at \$7,500 each. Both men bonded out late Tuesday afternoon.

Ray Villani, Alamogordo, Student at Law, served as Assistant District Attorney and represented the State in the Preliminary Hearing. Pope was represented by Richard Parsons, Ruidoso, Attorney at Law, and Davis was represented by Stephen Sanders, Alamogordo, Student at Law, of the office of John B. Conway, Alamogordo.

Finance Charge Change Set for Sears

Sears, Roebuck and Co. today announced plans to adopt the average daily balance method of computing finance charges on revolving charge accounts in New Mexico.

Bill Lyle, owner, said the change will be reflected in customers' September billings. He said the change was made possible with the advent of new computer technology and equipment.

Lyle said that the average daily balance is determined by dividing the sum of the balances for each day of the monthly billing period by the number of days in the period.

He said the balance outstanding for each day is determined by subtracting payments and credits on the day they occur from the previous day's balance.

Under the plan, purchases in the current month will not be included in the average balance for purposes of determining finance charges. Traditionally at Sears, no finance charges are assessed on goods purchased in the current billing period.

"For example," Lyle said, "your opening balance during a month is \$100. Fifteen days before your billing date you make a \$10 payment, return \$10 in merchandise and make a purchase of \$25. Your actual balance would be \$105 from then to the end of the month, assuming you make no other transactions. Your finance charge would be calculated on \$100 for 15 days and \$105 for 15 days, or an average of \$102.50. The \$25 purchase is not included in determining your daily balance for that month."

What are we to do about the high cost of food? I have tried many things and let me tell you what I have learned. You can't have it all, but you can have a few things that will help you. There is nothing better than a nice, juicy steak, sprinkled with grated cheese or cottage cheese. And what is better than a plate of well-cooked beans (any kind) with chile rellenos and this slice of sweet onion? Don't forget to add some of the amount of eggs to your corn bread. Did you know you can increase the protein by adding one half cup of dried milk to one glass of whole milk?

French chops are delicious and the kiddies will love them. Thin-slice, beautiful butter with a small amount of milk so it will spread easily. Spread on whole wheat bread; cover with another slice; cut in oblong or triangle pieces. Dip in egg batter and fry in butter, as French toast.

I have seen vegetarians who seemed to be as healthy as any of us. If you are accustomed to meat three times a day, just cut down on it for one or two meals. If every one in our village would stop buying meat for a week or a month and eat vegetables, I believe the merchants would be begging us to buy it. Let's let them realize they are depending on us—not us on them.

I had guests drop in and had only a 12-ounce package of thinly sliced steak that cost \$1.36. I made my paper thin steak into a stroganoff and served it over homemade egg-noodles; to four hungry people. This with cooked dried beans, a salad or vegetable and pie was ample. One man usually eats that amount of meat at a meal.

When we were on the ranch; it used to be my job, in the winter, to keep the ice broken up on the tanks so the cattle could get water. Sometimes my hands were almost frozen, if I happened to get my gloves wet. But all I would think of was; the small amount we were to get for the steers. Since rearing, we pay three or four times the price for our meat. Folks, there is a cop in the woodpile somewhere.

Meat is not the only thing that has jumped far above what it should be. I have a bottle of detergent that was 49¢ marked eighty-four cents; then down under in bold figures, twenty cents was added on. As you can see making \$1.04 plus tax for a bottle of detergent to wash off the crumbs of our high priced meat. This is ridiculous! This is only one item of thousands that have been marked up since they were bought. I get back at them by using one "squirt" instead of two in the place, get Ruidoso water. It is the scalding hot rinse that counts anyway. If we

Peter Hurd Will Head Citizen Action Group

Internationally famous artist Peter Hurd is heading a citizens' group, Action for Education, in support of a proposed \$10 million bond issue for library buildings for the state's public colleges and universities.

Reactivation of Action for Education and the San Patricio artists' chairmanship of the organization was announced by Governor Bruce King who said he was acting "in the capacity of a fellow citizen of New Mexico and a member of Action for Education."

"I certainly am delighted that Peter Hurd, one of New Mexico's most distinguished sons, is taking the lead in this most worthwhile and necessary project," the Governor said. "And I am very pleased that Action for Education, which has been so helpful to higher education in the past, is again involved in an effort which will be of major benefit to all citizens of New Mexico for many years ahead."

Action for Education, made up of alumni and friends of New Mexico's public four-year universities and two-year colleges, helped in the passage of statewide bond issues for academic building funds in 1964 and 1966. The \$10 million library bond issue proposition will be on the ballot in the November 7 general election.

Approval of the bond issue this November is essential to the continuing development of our higher education system," Hurd said. "Information collected by the legislature shows clearly that our college and university holdings are well below standard. In fact, in most cases, they are dangerously inadequate."

"If we are to insure continued quality in our state's higher education offerings, we must remedy the library situation now. The five-year, ten million-dollar bond issue approved by the legislature permits us to make the needed investment."

Hurd went on to say that his "firm conviction that a strong system of higher education is vital to the development of New Mexico" prompted him to become active in support of the library bond issue proposal.

Action for Education committees will be formed in every county of the state during the weeks ahead to help inform the voters of the need for the bond issue and the benefits to the state.

"It is most gratifying already to see the support that is developing for the bond issue," he said.

Hurd, a native of Roswell, studied art at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and also studied under N. C. Wyeth.

Famous for his paintings of each life and scenes in New Mexico, especially around his San Patricio home, Hurd is represented in major museums in the United States and abroad, including the National Gallery in Washington, D. C., and the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

He is an academician of the National Academy of Design and recipient of numerous national prizes and awards. In 1958, Hurd was appointed to the national Commission of Fine Arts by President Eisenhower.

During World War II, Hurd served as a war correspondent for Life Magazine.

Any interested person may also ascertain in the office of the Clerk a description of the property to be assessed thereagainst, and the maximum amount of benefits estimated to be conferred on each tract or parcel of land. Reference is made to such further detail.

After such hearing said Board shall determine as to the advisability of so improving said streets and parts thereof, and shall determine the kind and character of such improvements so to be made and shall proceed to advertise for bids for the doing of the work therefor and shall enter into a contract for the doing of such work and the furnishing of all necessary materials to the lowest bidder.

After the making of such contract said Board shall determine what portion of such work shall be paid by the property specially benefited; shall make out, together with said engineer, an assessment roll, shall thereupon fix a time and place when objections thereto by the owners of the assessed property will be heard and cause such roll to be filed in the office of the Clerk. After proper notice is given said hearing is held, said Board may modify said roll and shall levy the assessments therein by ordinance which makes reference thereto. Each assessment shall not exceed the estimated maximum benefit to the property assessed. The Board shall provide that the assessments may be payable without interest or demand, at the election of the owner, or in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal. The Board shall also provide the time and terms of payment of such assessments and the rate of interest upon deferred payments thereof, which rate shall not exceed eight per centum (8%) per annum and shall fix penalties to be collected upon delinquent payments.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

BETTER MOUSETRAP
"Build a better mousetrap," said Ralph Waldo Emerson, "and the world will beat a path to your door."

But the United States Patent Office is not so easily impressed. If your mousetrap is better merely because it is made of better materials, you probably could not get a patent. It must also work in a new and better way.

For example:
A man came up with the idea of making towel holders out of plastic rather than metal. The plastic holders did have certain advantages. They were cheaper, for one thing; They were also more colorful.

But these advantages of plastic were already well known. Simply applying them to another product was held not original enough to qualify for a patent. Even if the change of material means added convenience, that usually won't do. Another would-be inventor put together a map case of lightweight metal, making it easier to carry. But again, a court found no basis for a patent.

"(The lightness) may prove beneficial," said the court, "but it is not invention. There must be original thought or inventive skills, not mere mechanical

change of what was old." On the other hand, a change of material might actually change the way the product functions. Take the matter of garter buttons. Originally made out of metal, garter buttons had two major drawbacks. If the clasp was tight, the stocking had a tendency to tear. If the clasp was loose, the stocking had a tendency to slip.

Someone finally hit upon the idea of making the button out of rubber. This solved both problems at once. Stockings neither tore nor slipped, because the rubber button gripped the fabric in a new and better way.

Did this change of material entitle the man to a patent? A court said yes.

"It is this capacity for accomplishing results," said the court, which has always distinguished success from failure and the inventor from the mechanic."



MIAMI BEACH, FLA. — Lincoln County Democratic Chairman Fern Sawyer of Nogal strongly attacked the proposed national Democratic platform she helped to write.

A rancher and longtime active Democrat, Fern said bluntly: "It's too liberal." She dislikes the platform's farm and ranch planks. She opposes "collective bargaining in the farm world." She also fought 110 percent parity in farm prices back in the platform.

The 150-member platform committee shaped planks in Washington. Fern attended four

day of 14-hour sessions with M. E. (Meb) Eoin of Portales, a stout George McGovern supporter. She is conservative and Eoin is liberal.

But the Democratic National Convention platform committee was called into session here Sunday, apparently to review its work. Fern, longtime member of the State Fair Board, was miffed, because she had not received the finished platform earlier.

She was deeply disturbed by McGovern delegate efforts to write liberal views into the party platform for the 1972 general election campaign. Fern says: "Thank God the Democrats had enough sense to keep legalized homosexual marriage out of the platform." She favored Washington Sen. Henry Jackson for Minnesota Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, the 1968 candidate, the Democratic presidential nomination and later supported Fern and Rudy Ortiz of Albuquerque, national Democratic committeeman-elect, attended the \$500-a-person dinner and 21-hour Democratic telethon at the

weekend in a Miami Beach hotel. The party tried to wipe out a \$9.3 million 1968 campaign debt with the extravaganza, replete with entertainers.

Mrs. Lillie Apodaca, 36, a McGovern delegate, and George Baca, 54, a Wallace alternate, arrived here at the weekend. Both live in Socorro.

Mrs. Apodaca's trip to the steaming Democratic National Convention was rescued by friends after her home was destroyed by fire last weekend. Mrs. Apodaca will support South Dakota Sen. George McGovern all the way in the convention until McGovern releases her.

She was McGovern campaign coordinator in New Mexico's sprawling, 18-county U. S. House District 2. Lillie is an assembly line employee at an Eagle-Picher Industries, Inc. plant north of Socorro. The plant turns out printed circuit parts. Mrs. Apodaca, a personable, energetic politician, is secretary of the Socorro County Democratic Party.

A court reporter, Baca is a Wallace alternate. He is State Democratic Party secretary and an ex-state senator. George is also a veteran politician.

McGovern and Wallace New Mexico delegates were expected to support their candidates' stands on key delegate seating fights and back them throughout convention balloting for the presidential nomination.

District Judge Filo Sedillo, Belen Democrat, was also in Miami Beach. He was Valencia County Democratic chairman 38 years until his 1971 appointment by Gov. Bruce King as judge in the new Valencia-Sandoval Counties judicial district.

Filo has attended many national Democratic conventions. He was a McCarthy delegate to the tumultuous 1968 Chicago party powwow that shredded the Democratic ranks.

Lee Nance, 44, and Juan A. Cruz Solano, 32, were in Miami Beach with the New Mexico delegation. Both are Clovis residents. Nance is a McGovern delegate and Cruz Solano a McGovern alternate. Nance is one of two blacks on the New Mexico delegation. The other black delegation member is Mrs. Ava Marie Bowers, 31, of Albuquerque, a McGovern alternate.

Mrs. Bowers was born and raised in Georgia and formerly lived in Atlanta.

Mrs. Dortha Moore, 35, of Tucuman, a Wallace delegate, arrived at the weekend in Miami Beach. An avid Wallace supporter, Mrs. Moore says: "We've got to bring back the quality in our lives and get something moving for the Democratic Party."

She strongly supports individual and states' rights, opposes liberalism in the Democratic Party and charges the federal government is chipping away "a little of our freedom at a time." She will stick with Wallace all the way.

A Quay County native, Mrs. Moore is a Baptist and a housewife. She has a daughter, Linda Cox, 16.

Mrs. Rena Rosequist, 41, of Taos, is a McGovern alternate. She owns an art gallery. Mrs. Rosequist was a 1968 supporter of the late New York Sen. Robert Kennedy. After Kennedy's assassination she backed ex-Minnesota Sen. Eugene McCarthy. In the 1968 general election campaign Mrs. Rosequist aided Humphrey. She was Taos County McGovern coordinator in the primary drive this year.

Jack Daniels of Hobbs, the Democratic U. S. Senate nominee, and his pretty wife, Libby, were expected in Miami Beach at the weekend. Ortiz slated 20 speakers at the New Mexico delegation's first caucus on the California and Illinois delegate seating squabbles and on presidential candidacies. Washington Sen. Henry Jackson was a scheduled speaker.

John Hemery, 62, of Luna

County was a Wallace alternate. Hemery is an accountant at a Deming plastics manufacturing plant. Born in British Guiana, Hemery became a naturalized U. S. citizen in 1970 so he could campaign and vote for Alabama Gov. George Wallace.

Several New Mexico delegates on Wallacelites attended a gala Wallace party at the weekend at his convention headquarters hotel. The New Mexico delegation was quartered in a beautiful, 14-story oceanfront Miami Beach hotel.
