ROSA'S HERE Racing 'OK'

The New Mexico State Racing Commission, meeting Tuesday in Albuquerque, granted the new owners of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track continued racing dates as already approved by the racing commission last year and also set Monday, Aug. 7, as a tentative date for the state required hearing on the licensing of the new owners.

Both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park Race Track near El Paso, Texas, of which Sunland Development Corporation was the principal stock holder, were purchased last week by the Kodiak Industries, Inc. of San Diego, Calif., the leading principal of whom is Al Rosa of San Diego.

Former majority stockholders of Kodiak Industries, Inc. were Dominic Alessio, Rosa's brother-in-law, and Anthony Alessio, Dominic's uncle. Rosa reportedly bought out the two men which according to their agreement with Rosa, gives them an option to buy back controlling interest in Kodiak.

Saturday, July 29, Rosa made his first appearance at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track since he purchased the nationally recognized horse race track. In an interview he stated that he plans to spend most of his time at the track and possibly make a trip to San Diego as often as necessary for both business and family reasons.

A native of San Diego, Calif., Rosa, and his wife Rose Marie, have four children, Rick, Randy, Ronny and Rhonda Marie. Rosa readily admitted that his family wanted to come to the Ruidoso area.

Regarding his purchase of Ruidoso Downs Rosa said, "I am very happy to have made the purchase and foresee very little changes. Changes will come about very gradually." He had high praise for both Art Johnson, President of Ruidoso Downs, Inc., and Bill Thomas, Director of Public Relations and Special Events. Rosa stated of the two men, "I cannot knock the success of Art and Bill, they have produced a good sound racing program here at Ruidoso Downs. I'll stay with their program."

Rosa arrived in Ruidoso Downs late Friday night and stayed at the track's Guest House in Ruidoso Downs. His appearance Saturday afternoon at the track, about midway through the afternoon's meet, came unassuming, casual, at least on his part, considerate and in a way, off of the cuff.

It was learned, as he made his way into the office area, alone, neatly dressed, businesslike and unassuming, the office staff was very busy and really did not realize his presence. His stay there was reportedly very brief.

Alone he made his way under the grandstand area and up the steps towards the All-American Turf Club and his first verbal contact with one of the thousands of race fans was at the foot of the steps. Rosa spoke first and greeted a Texas looking gentleman who was standing near the steps and eating a sandwich. Rosa said, "Hello, that sandwich really looks good." To which the man, undoubtedly not knowing Rosa, remarked, "Why if you'll come around to this side I'll buy you one."

Ruidoso Water Usage For July Second Highest

Ruidoso Village Water Superintendent Orvil Nash, this week reported that during the month of July Ruidoso experienced its second greatest water usage month in the history of the village when nearly 18 1/2 million gallons of water was metered through the Ruidoso Municipal water system.

Nash stated that the record high water usage month for Ruidoso was set in July of 1970 when the village pumped over 20 million gallons of water.

Village Manager James L. Hine, in commenting on the unusually high water consumption, stated that the real comparison between July of 1970 and July 1971 is that in 1970 Ruidoso experienced an extremely dry year with less than two inches of rain for the month of July. In explaining the high consumption of water Hine remarked, "The water usage in July of 1970 was accentuated because of outside watering and fire control because of the extreme dry conditions."

"From January 1970 until July of the same year," he continued, "we had less than seven inches of rain." Hine said that this year the vast increase in water usage could only be contributed to the increase in both commercial and residential growth for Ruidoso and the expanded tourist economy. Hine added, "With the better than six inches of rain during the month of July and the total rainfall to date of over sixteen inches, outside watering has been practically nil."

Anaya To Head Over 700 Attend Demo Caravan Here Saturday

Over seven hundred people, representing twenty-four states and Canada, registered for the Second Annual Quarter Racing Congress, held last weekend, Friday through Sunday, in the spacious Chaparral Motor Hotel Convention Center.

The four-day schedule of events included lectures and seminars on subject matters relative to the quarter horse racing and breeding industry and featured some of the top professional quarter horse personalities in the nation.

In addition the congress featured, in the main area of the large convention center, forty trade display and exhibition booths. Those attending the congress also were privileged to view a special display of some of the top and nationally famous stallions, with a combined value in excess of fifty million dollars. The list of top stallions included Easy Jet, Jet Smooth, Bunny Bid, Top Divi and Jet Too.

Highlight of the special quarter racing congress, sponsored jointly by Walt Wiggins, Roswell, and Blair Polck, Springfield, Ohio, was the Second Annual Quarter Racing Congress Super Select Broodmare Sale held in the newly constructed Ruidoso Downs Race Track's All-American Plaza.

The special sale established a new world record, for the second straight year, as an average of \$14,662 was paid for the forty-three broodmares sold Saturday night. Last year the congress set a world record when the mare's average price reached \$10,002.

The better than eight hundred people who attended the broodmare sale heard a nine year old sorrel, Maggie's Straw, consigned by Orjen Boren of Greensboro, North Carolina, sell for \$77,000 to Rulon Goodman of Aracoe, Ariz. Maggie's Straw is in foal to Go Man Go, sire of twenty finalists in the world famed and world richest quarter-horse race, The All-American Futurity Race held annually on Labor Day at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Youth Burned In Explosion Here Thursday

Escaping sewer gas from a Ruidoso drive-in restaurant is thought to have exploded last Thursday night, July 27, resulting in sending a youth to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital with multiple burns.

The youth, Carl Humphrey, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Humphrey, of Ruidoso and El Paso, Texas, an employee of the Dairy Freez in Ruidoso, apparently had gone into a former rest room and currently used as a potato storage and peeling room. He reportedly turned on the potato peeler several times and then an explosion occurred.

In the explosion, a wall was blown out, double glass sliding doors were partially blown out and another wall housing the rest room was displaced by the blast.

Ruidoso Police officers who made the investigation, Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens, Jr., and Patrolmen Larry Simmons and Jerry Fennell, summoned Lincoln County Environmental Improvement Agency Officer Mike Richardson who told the officers that in his opinion the possible concentration of sewer gas was the explosive agent.

Upon examining the room officers found an uncovered and dry lavatory sewer drain.

Pitch In Plan Gets Underway In Ruidoso Area

Most Ruidoso municipal vehicles, as of this week, are displaying a green and white bumper sticker or sign, "Pitch In!" in cooperation with the nationwide project to fight litter. In addition, posters, litter bags and several printed items explaining the project are currently available at the Ruidoso municipal building or the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce office on Sudderth Drive.

The recent awareness of the new theme for the five year old project, which is sponsored by the United States Brewers Association, Inc., came to light Tuesday as William E. Christoffersen, Albuquerque, New Mexico State Director of "Pitch In" met with James Lewis Hine, Ruidoso City Manager and Wynman Scarborough, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Manager.

Christoffersen told those present for the meeting USBA sponsored project to fight litter across the nation is wholeheartedly endorsed by the federal government. He stated that special assistance and advice, including films and special school presentations, are available through his Albuquerque office and state headquarters for the "Pitch In" project.





Hearing Set On Environmental Change

The Water Quality Section of the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Agency tentatively has set an August 9 meeting date for discussion of a new policy controlling installation of private sewage disposal systems.

Larry J. Gordon, EIA Director, said the agency's authority to control septic tank systems stems from the State Health Department Regulations in effect since 1937. The EIA's predecessor agency was the Environmental Services Division of the New Mexico Health and Social Services Department, and EIA still is administered under the HSSD framework.

John R. Wright, Chief of the Water Quality Section, said the policy guidelines for administration of the regulations under modern conditions would be discussed with representatives of the real estate business and members of the public at a meeting to be held in the Second Floor Auditorium of the PERA Building, just east of the Capitol in Santa Fe, beginning at 9:00 a.m. Aug. 9.

Under the new policy, the agency's Regional Environmental Managers' offices would be responsible for evaluating each disposal system for which a permit was sought.

Information which may be required from a person requesting approval to install a septic tank includes but is not limited to:

- Soil suitability for effluent percolation, absorption and filtration;
- Depth to and characteristics of the bedrock;
- Slope of the ground surface;
- Depth rate and direction of groundwater flow;
- Flooding potential;
- Type of system to be used;
- Density of (private treatment) systems in the area; and
- Type and density of vegetation.

Septic tank disposal systems may be approved under the following minimum conditions un-

less there are abnormal or undesirable characteristics indicated by the information required in the conditions listed above:

- When approved community water supply is provided, a septic tank system may be installed if:

- The distance from the low-point in the system to the groundwater exceeds 20 feet;
- The lot size exceeds one-half acre; and
- The average waste-water flow from the proposed septic tank will not exceed 1,000 gallons per day; and
- No public sewer lines are located within 300 feet of the property line.

B. When water is supplied on individual lots by private wells, a septic tank system may be installed if:

- The distance from the low-point in the system to the groundwater exceeds 20 feet; and
- The lot size exceeds two acres; and
- The average waste-water flow from the proposed septic tank will not exceed 1,000 gallons per day.

(Exceptions to Paragraph 3B may be granted in any limited development area of less than ten acres.)

C. No component of the septic tank system shall be installed within a horizontal distance of:

- 100 feet to waters used for domestic supply; or
- 100 feet to a perennial stream; or
- 25 feet to an arroyo.

Wright said formulation of a firm policy to protect public and private water supplies from proliferation of poorly placed septic tanks has been a need which has grown with the growth of lot sales, and the population added in recent years in suburban locations like the Valley areas above and below Albuquerque, where the ground water level is near the surface.



Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

The Youngest member of the New Mexico delegation to the National Convention Aug. 21-23 in Miami Beach will concentrate on ecology at the quadrennial party powwow.

Alternate J. Michael Prescott, Tucumcari, was 20 June 19. He favors welfare reforms and more effort to bring prisoners of war home from Vietnam and wind down the war. He says Republican President Richard M. Nixon's administration "should put more emphasis on jobs for youths that are more full-filling, jobs that use their youthful energy and apply their ideas."

A Journalism Junior at New Mexico State University, Mike enlisted in the Air Force Reserve in mid-July. He will begin a year of active duty in December in radio relay. He plans to return to NMSU and finish his studies.

Mike says: "Democrats are coming around and making a lot of promises to youths. Republicans should appeal to intelligence of youths and point out Democrats are making promises that cannot be fulfilled."

Active in Dona Ana County Young Republicans, Mike will take part in a GOP stepped-up NMSU voter registration drive this fall for the general election.

He attended a New Mexico College Republican Youth Seminar last weekend in Albuquerque. Mike predicts Nixon will carry Quay County Nov. 7 by a bigger margin than he did in 1968. Nixon defeated Minnesota Sen. Hubert Humphrey then in Quay by 74 votes.

Mike and his father, Dr. Thomas M. Prescott, 52, Tucumcari physician and surgeon, are both GOP national convention alternates. Assessing Nixon's Quay County chances, Dr. Prescott says: "Apathy is the biggest thing we have to be concerned about. Most people I have talked to favor Nixon."

Dr. Prescott says: "President Nixon is reducing the involvement in Vietnam. He has brought over 450,000 men home. He's trying to do whatever he thinks best for the POWs. This is a No. 1 concern for him. Economically, he has stemmed the rise in prices although it wasn't popular to put in price controls."

Dr. Prescott says: "National defense and conservation of resources will be the main issues in the campaign." He favors strong national military preparedness. As a young World War II field artillery second lieutenant his first assignment "was to teach career colonels and captains what the Army was all about."

He says: "I swore to God I'd never let our country be caught in this state of unpreparedness again." Dr. Prescott strongly backs Nixon's bombing policies and his Halphong port blockade. He supports Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater, the 1964 GOP presidential candidate, and South Carolina Sen. Strom Thurman. Dr. and Mrs. Prescott and Mike returned July 27 from an 8-day trip to Wisconsin and Michigan with a new 27-foot motor home, with adjustments the motor home will accommodate the entire New Mexico delegation at Miami Beach. The Prescotts will drive the motor home to the convention city.

The New Mexico contingent faces a transportation problem. Its hotel is near Hollywood, 18 miles from Convention Hall.

Alternate Paul Alan Fell, 21, of Deming says: "I consider myself an 18th Century liberal. Yes, in the 20th Century I am conservative, but a conservative with a slightly different strain. I am a reformed Republican."

Paul says Nixon's chances to carry Luna, Hidalgo, Sierra and Lincoln Counties over South Dakota Sen. George McGovern are good. He strongly favors a sound 2-party system. Paul says the current campaign presents an excellent opportunity to strengthen the 2-party system.

A biology senior at Colorado College, Colorado Springs, Paul plans to enter medical school in the fall of 1973.

Active in politics since he was 16, Paul was 21 May 9. A Deming native, he is the son of Dr. Paul Arnold Fell, Deming physician and surgeon. Paul says: "The image Sen. McGovern is giving in this area is that he is a big Eastern ogre—the group of people that are always trying to change the Western tradition of hard work. He wants to give everybody everything whether or not they want to work for it."

He said of Missouri Sen. Thomas Eagleton, McGovern's choice for vice president: "Anyone who needs electric shock treatments certainly is not fit to serve as President of the U.S." The vice president is regarded "as a heart-beat away from the presidency."

Paul hopes the National GOP Convention takes a strong stand "to bring young people into the party." On campaign issues he

says: "Welfare, big government and big labor are all more important to the American people than the war in Vietnam." He is the second youngest New Mexico delegation member.

Nixon carried Luna County by 514 votes over Humphrey in 1968. Nixon lost Hidalgo County to Humphrey by just 72 votes. Hidalgo County's voter registration is 9-1 Democratic. Nixon's 1968 margins in other counties included: Sierra, 694 votes; Lincoln, 1,202; Lea, 2,664; DeBaca, 313; Taos, 126; Curry, 2,647; Union, 539; Guadalupe, 149; and Valencia, 163. The Curry margin was nearly 2 to 1.

Completion of Percha Dam State Park for \$100,000 in Sierra County is set in mid-September about 5 miles south of Caballo Lake State Park. Hardley and Hust, Las Cruces, is the contractor for improvements on a contract of about \$96,000. State and federal money will pay costs on a 50-50 basis.

The State Park and Recreation Department said receipts from overnight camping and boat permits at big Elephant Butte Lake State Park were up \$3,620 in the January-June period over the same 1971 span, from \$18,143 to \$21,763. Bill Kreuch of the agency said similar fees for Caballo Lake State Park were up \$1,925 for the period, from \$9,147 to \$11,072. Elephant Butte Park Superintendent Johnny Brown says the

season attendance at Elephant Butte Park is at about the same level as attendance for the same 1971 period. The park has topped all state parks in annual attendance since the state acquired it in 1965 from the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation on a 25-year lease.

El Paso Natural Gas Co. agreed with state officials to dedicate part of gas from its projected \$410 million San Juan County gasification complex to any responsible party willing to sign a firm contract.

County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

Pine borers are causing some problems in some areas. They cause a resin or gum to form on the trunk. These can be controlled with lindane sprayed on the trunk of the tree at two week intervals during the summer.

Webworms on the oak brush are causing concern in the Glenoco area. They are eating at the leaves and causing them to die. These web worms are green and about an inch long. They will be leaving the oaks shortly and starting to pupate. If they are in the yard area they can be controlled with Sevin or diazinon.

The old saying "may lightning strike me down" is often spoken in 600 jest. But for the more than 600 persons killed and 1,500 injured by lightning in the U. S. last year, lightning was a potent tragic phenomenon.

There are several things a person can do to protect himself when it is lightning. They include:

Paving the patio ground surrounding shade trees may endanger them. Such paving will prevent water, nutrients and air from reaching the feeding root zone of the tree unless loose joints or holes are left through the flagstones or cement.

The large roots close to the trunk of the mature tree do not need water, so don't be fooled by them. Many people think that watering these visible roots will feed the tree, but they just hold the tree up. It's the smaller feeder roots at the edge of the drip area that are important. The feeding root zone of a tree covers the same area underground as the foliage above ground.

The basin of large ornamentals or fruit trees in a garden extend to about eight or 10 feet in diameter. Be sure to get the whole root zone of the tree watered. To help hold the water in the ground, spread a mulch of organic material over the soil. The mulch soil cover will conserve water.

There are several things a person can do to protect himself when it is lightning. They include:

Don't go outdoors or remain out during thunderstorms. If you have a choice of shelter, get into a large metal or metal frame building. Homes or other buildings which are grounded to protect against lightning are next best, followed by large unprotected buildings and by small unprotected buildings.

Stay away from open doors or windows, fireplaces, stoves and electric equipment such as radios, lamps or other plug-in devices. If caught outdoors during lightning, you'll have good protection in a cave, depression in the ground, valley or canyon, the foot of a cliff, or the interior of dense woods. In large woods, stand under short trees surrounded by taller ones. If caught in the open near isolated trees, crouch down in the open away from the trees.

Don't use steel or metal items such as fishing rods and golf club during thunderstorms. Keep away from isolated trees, wire fences, small sheds in exposed places, hilltops and wide open spaces where you are the tallest object around. Stay out of water and small boats. Stay in your car if traveling in a thunderstorm. Enclosed rubber-tired vehicles are excellent protection.
