### Fair Opens Friday

The Lincoln County Fair will open at 8:00 a.m., Friday, Aug. 25 and close at 4:00 p.m., Saturday, Aug. 26. Exhibits must be in place by 9:00 a.m., Aug. 25, and remain in place until 4:00 p.m., Aug. 26. See fair manual for further information.

The Lincoln County Fair Parade is Saturday morning, Aug. 26. Judging will be in front of the high school building beginning at 9:30 a.m. The parade will begin at approximately 10:15. The only requirement is that you: 1. build your float, 2. decorate your bicycle, 3. get your costume ready, 4. get any other idea ready — and — enter it in the parade. A total of \$22.50 will be awarded to the first three places in the float division. A total of \$10 will be awarded to the first three places in the costume division. The best dressed cowboy and cowgirl will be awarded \$5 each. At least \$13 and possibly more will go to the best decorated bicycles. The bicycles need not be decorated to enter the parade, but they must be decorated to get in on the prize money. An additional cash prize is set aside for any float not covered in the parade categories, but deemed worthy by the judges.

It is known that bands from Capitan and Carrizosa will be in the parade. The likelihood that the Corona Band will also be in the parade is excellent. Get your unit ready and be a participant — not a "looker".

There will be a "junior" rodeo, Saturday, Aug. 26, at 1:30 p.m. Fletcher Hall will be the arena. He is assisted by Grady Ehrhardt, Mrs. Zane Kelly will be the bookkeeper and Pat Crookes the announcer.

A lot at the fair this year is a junior livestock sale. This is scheduled for Saturday morning at 11:30. Three animals will be sold from the following classes: 1. Yearlings (3), heavy calves (3), heavy hogs (3), and heavy sheep (3). There will be eight lots of fat lambs — 3 in each lot containing 24 fat lambs. The committee will obtain packer bids from purchasers who do not wish to keep the animals for home consumption. Packer bids will be announced prior to the sale. The superintendent for this year is LaMoynie Carpenter.

Another first at this year's fair are several carnival rides. Enjoy these rides and be sure to patronize the various booths that classes from the Capitan Schools will sponsor.

The council officially removed around forty-five parcels of the originally planned parking area because of objections of the criteria as previously agreed upon by the planning board.

Over 2,000 parcels of land were included in the original paving program with only around one percent of the property owners objecting to the plan. The paving program, which is being completed in the next few months, will include a total of 24 parcels of land in the entire all paving district.

The council is scheduled to meet in a regular session Thursday, Aug. 31, and will hold a formal resolution calling for the paving district to be agreed upon during the special session. The council will also, at the same time, call for a call for construction bid for the paving of an estimated \$141,057. The first estimate on the original proposal was \$109,529.

Construction bids will be opened around the fifteenth of October and a final Public Hearing will be held only regarding the actual cost per front foot for each property owner included in the area to be paved.

A revised list of the streets to be paved will be published, reportedly, in the Sept. 1 issue of The Ruidoso News.

### Runnels Meets With Ruidoso City Officials

United States Congressman Harold Runnels, (D-N.M.), New Mexico's Second Congressional District, met with Ruidoso Village officials Tuesday and assured them that he was very much interested in Ruidoso and the current Ruidoso water storage, distribution and expansion project.

Congressman Runnels told the village leaders that he personally would keep close tab on the Village's application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for a federal grant for the project.

Runnels was in Ruidoso as a part of his current tour of twenty-four communities within the 18 counties which comprise his congressional district. The popular congressman who is seeking his second term of office, was the guest of the Lincoln County Democratic Party at a special "Get Together" held at the Holiday House Restaurant.

Approximately twenty-five Runnels' supporters were present for the special meeting.

During a question and answer session, in reference to the proposed Atom Waste Plant for Southeastern New Mexico, Congressman Runnels told those in attendance, "I'm for the Atom Waste Plant, providing the majority of the residents of Eddy and Lea Counties and the majority of the residents of the City of Carlsbad are in favor of the project." Runnels added, "The people of the community must buy the project whole heartedly or it is no good."

Referring to the safety factor of the atom waste plant Runnels stated that he would not support the project unless it operates in a perfectly safe manner. He con-

### MESCALERO APACHE COMMERCIAL CENTER DEDICATION — "Mesalero-A Symbol Of Hope" - Blunt Says

"I have heard so much about Mesalero . . . from objective observers who see you as a symbol of hope for all of the Tribes of American Indians," were among the opening remarks, Saturday, Aug. 19, made by William W. Blunt, Jr., Deputy Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development Washington, D. C., during his dedicatory address for the formal Dedication Program of the Mesalero Apache Commercial Center on the Mesalero Apache Indian Reservation.

Other principal speakers for the special services included Louis Bruce, United States Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C., and Wendell Chino, president of the Mesalero Apache Tribal Council.

Several hundred people attended the dual services which in addition to the dedication program also included the formal Open House Ceremony for the Marvel Engineering Company's manufacturing plant on the reservation at a site which formerly housed the Eight Canyon Job Corps.

The Mesalero Apache Commercial Center, located on a large tract of land adjacent to the Mesalero Community Center, U. S. Highway 70, includes a large general store, a coin operated laundry, service station and garage and when completed will include an authentic Mesalero Apache Museum and Village. Plans and property designs have already been made for additional retail and commercial establishments to be operated by the Mesaleros.

The Marvel Engineering plant, in a cooperative effort with the Mesaleros, currently manufactures filters for heavy equipment and employs thirteen Mesalero Apaches. Mesalero furnishes the Chicago, Illinois based firm with building space and

equipment and Marvel supplies the materials, sales market, technical skill and training.

Marvel expects to have around fifty Mesalero Apaches in training by January 1973.

William Gruber, Marvel Plant Superintendent at Mesalero, reported that his firm was very well satisfied and that they are "very well pleased with the Mesalero's capabilities," adding, "they learn very fast." He said it would require from one to five years of training to become a machine operator. The company manufactures about 4,000 varieties and combinations of filters.

U. S. Commissioner Bruce visited the Mesalero Apache Reservation as the guest of Mesalero Tribal Council president Wendell Chino and the tribal council. During his four day stay he toured the \$6.8 million Clemente Resort Hotel and Tourism Triad Complex, the Sierra Blanca Ski Area, the Mesalero Center, the Industrial Site and the overall Mesalero housing and development projects.

During his address for the Dedication Program, Bruce stated, "I have traveled all over this country and Alaska visiting Indian reservations and when president Chino invited me I decided that I wanted to spend more than 3 or 4 hours here and I can say that this has been one of the most delightful and inspiring visits I have ever made to any reservation."

Bruce, in his speech, repeatedly commended the leadership of Chino and the Tribal Council and the assistance of the Bureau of Indian Affairs at Mesalero and stated, "I pledge our continued assistance and technical help . . . we want to be a part of this growth."

Deputy Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development Blunt also had high





**(SOCIAL SECURITY**

Close to 30 million women are earning social security protection for themselves and their families through their own work, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative.

Here in Lincoln County, 541 women 60 and over actually receive social security benefits.

"The working woman has both disability and survivors protection," Mrs. Graves said. "If she becomes unable to work for a year or longer because of a disabling accident or severe illness, she and her dependents may be eligible for monthly cash payments from social security."

If a working woman dies prematurely, monthly cash payments from social security can help her children through school

(until they're 22, if they remain full-time students and unmarried).

"If a working woman's husband is 62 or older and dependent upon her for his support, he also can be eligible for monthly social security payments on her records," Mrs. Graves said.

"Even though her husband may be working at a full time job, her children are still eligible for benefits on her work record," Mrs. Graves noted.

On her own work record, the working woman can retire at 62 with reduced monthly cash payments. Or she can wait until she's 65 and get full monthly cash benefits, Mrs. Graves said. But, if she could collect higher benefits as a wife on her husband's record, she can choose to collect the higher payment.

Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the Council Room in the Ruidoso City Hall the second Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon and 1 to 2.

## Inside The Capital

MIAMI BEACH — Alternate Paul Feil, 21, of Deming in the New Mexico GOP national convention delegation disagreed sharply with parts of the party platform drafted at the White House and tailored to President Richard M. Nixon's wishes.

Second youngest New Mexico delegation member, Feil said: "The platform looks a little too conservative for me." The platform opposed amnesty for draft evaders. Feil says: "I favor a work service program for draft evaders."

"The effect of the laws have to be upheld. The term punishment in an institution is not the way to solve the problem to get a piece of revenge," Feil says. Draft evaders should be tried and assigned, for example, to VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America), a federal program in effect in New Mexico.

The national GOP platform took conservative positions or omitted mention of legalization of marijuana and abortion. Feil said of marijuana: "I've lived a long time on marijuana for the last three years at Colorado College." He is a senior biology major and plans to enter a medical school in 1973.

Feil, son of Dr. Paul Arnold Feil, Deming general practitioner, says: "At 21 years old marijuana may be permissible, matching the legal age for alcohol." He said marijuana may be legalized at 21 with proper controls "as long as it is kept out of the hands of 14-16 year olds."

He would not extend legalization to any other drug. Feil said at parties three groups were often found among college students — marijuana smokers, al-

coholic beverage drinkers and those abstaining from marijuana and alcohol.

Feil and his brother, David, 18, polled 100 voters in 6 Deming precincts in a 2-week period ending Aug. 17. The results: President — Nixon, 66.5 per cent; McGovern, 8.5; California Rep. John Schmitz, American Party candidate, one per cent; undecided, 23 per cent.

U. S. Senate—Domenici, 41.3 per cent; Daniels, 19.5; undecided, 38.4; State Representative District 32 (Hidalgo-Luna Counties)—incumbent Democrat William Upton, Deming, 34.8 per cent; Mrs. Thelma Immon, Republican, Luna County rancher 15 miles south of Deming, 21.7 per cent; undecided, 40.5.

Confined to Deming, the poll did not include Mrs. Immon's home precinct or Hidalgo County. Dr. Feil is a GOP Luna County Commission candidate. He formerly lived in Belén.

Dr. and Mrs. Tom Prescott and their son, Michael, 20, drove to the GOP national convention at Miami Beach in a car. Efforts to push his bid, Mayer piloted his yellow single-engine 1932 design, Beechcraft stagger-wing biplane from New Mexico.

Most New Mexico delegates opposed allotting McCloskey a delegate at the national convention. McCloskey won a delegate by polling 3,387 votes against Nixon in the first New Mexico presidential primary June 6.

ber delegation. Michael, who was 20 June 19, was the youngest delegation member.

Mrs. Juanita Marcus Michaels, 36, a Taos Pueblo member, was the only Indian delegate in the New Mexico contingent. She met with minority groups at the national convention.

But Mrs. Michaels, a Santa Fe resident 13 years, says people in minorities should be treated as individuals. They should not be pictured as stereotypes, she says.

Mrs. Michaels favored allotting California Rep. (Paul) Pete McCloskey a committed New Mexico delegate. In pre-convention action the committee on contests and the National GOP Committee unanimously rejected McCloskey's demand for a bona fide New Mexico delegate.

Would-be McCloskey delegate Tom Mayer, 29, of Espanola and McCloskey alternate Pete Duran, Albuquerque, flew to Miami and teamed with McCloskey to push his bid. Mayer piloted his yellow single-engine 1932 design, Beechcraft stagger-wing biplane from New Mexico.

The New Mexico delegation, state law by casting 13 votes for Nixon and one for McCloskey. But delegates said McCloskey badly damaged his chances of winning a committed delegate at the state GOP convention July 15 in Albuquerque.

McCloskey told the state convention he would not support Nixon for re-election unless Nixon stopped bombing in Vietnam before the general election.

The New Mexico delegation supported a compromise delegate reapportionment plan that favors New Mexico Republicans at the 1976 national convention. New Mexico delegates would be increased from 14 at the 1972 powwow to 19 at the 1976 convention if Nixon carries the state again Nov. 7 under the plan.

National Committeewoman Francine Neff of Albuquerque backed the plan, approved by the National GOP Committee. Mrs. Neff and Albuquerquean Dr. Hartman, New Mexico members of the convention rules committee, also supported the plan. The plan favors lightly populated, rural, Midwest, Southern and state that traditionally support the GOP presidential candidate.

## In Area School Zones Residents Cautioned

Ruidoso Downs Chief of Police and the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, Traffic Safety Coordinator, Milton Matson, jointly today urged motorists to exercise extreme caution in view of the beginning of school in the very near future.

In the joint announcement released today the men said: "Many children will be leaving home for school this year for the first time. They will have many things on their young minds and one of those things probably won't be traffic safety. So we, the motorists, must be alert and watch for these youngsters. Many of these children will be riding bicycles, and while they

have traffic rules and regulations to abide by, as do the auto drivers, they don't always know them or obey them. So we, the motorists, must do all we can to avoid colliding with the bike rider or pedestrian."

Remember the speed limit in school zones and please obey them. They have a safety objective.

Let's all cooperate and make this the safest school year ever by avoiding traffic accidents. We can do this by being a little more patient, watchful and considerate of the other person. Let's promote between motorists and pedestrians an attitude of mutual understanding, courtesy and cooperation."





# Real Estate Facts

There has been much said about "leverage" in making real estate investment. Leverage means that by using a small amount of money, the investor can accomplish big things. It is another way of saying, "Use other people's money to build an estate."

Those other people are quite anxious to let you use their money at a price, with security. A common example of lever-

age in real estate could be that you buy a duplex for \$20,000 and pay \$3,000 down, the balance of \$17,000 being borrowed from other people at an interest rate of 6%.

You collect \$100 a month on the two apartments, a total of \$240 a year, paying \$1,020 interest on the \$17,000. You have a net earnings of \$1,380, giving you a return on your \$3,000 investment, before taxes, of 46%.

Payments to amortize the loan, with interest, over 20 years would be \$121.72. You can make the payments out of rental earnings and still have money left after taxes and upkeep to do with as you want. You are letting other people's money work for you. You are using leverage.

Here is an example of leverage cited in a book, "Creative Real Estate Investment," published by the California Real Estate Association:

"Several years ago... a mail carrier... bought house after house for never more than 10% down. He did the needed clean up work. He rented them for enough to pay taxes, maintenance and payments. In approximately 10 years he owned 15 clear houses. Then he resigned from the post office and became a full-time investor and real estate rental operator."

Quite a record!

There are considerably more complicated methods of using leverage. It can be through long term lease, sale and lease-back, options on vacant land, and many other situations.

Leverage is especially helpful in building an estate when there is increasing demand for real estate to serve an expanding population. The increasing demand raises the value of the real estate, and owner's equity.

If you have had \$3,000 in a \$30,000 property which doubled in value in 20 years, at which time you had it paid off from rental income, your \$3,000 is now worth \$40,000. Every dollar is now worth more than \$13.

Your Realtor is versed in using leverage for investment purposes and can guide you on which leverage route might be best in your situation. He can probably help you find property that will help share in your city's growth and build an estate doing it.

Leverage is only one of many ways that real estate can be used to accomplish this purpose. Investment can take other forms as well. Leverage does offer excitement and some risk. Most worthwhile accomplishments use the same two ingredients

## THE FAMILY LAWYER DRAG STRIPS

To hot rodders, the opening of a new drag strip is a cause for jubilation. But to residents of the neighborhood, the occasion may be less joyful. Do they have legal grounds for complaint?

Unless banned by local statute, a drag strip (or other kind of race track) is a perfectly lawful activity. It may become unlawful, however, because of the way it is run. This is, it may amount to a nuisance—subject to abatement by court action.

The noise alone may be offensive enough to justify a stop order. Take this case:

Residents living near a suburban drag strip found the noise so unbearable that they had to keep their windows shut. Residents one mile away had to keep their television turned on high. Residents three miles away said the noise ("like a chain saw") could be heard plainly.

Impressed by these tales of woe, a court ordered the track closed down.

Even if the noise itself isn't too bad, other factors may tilt the scales against the track operators.

In one case, in issuing an injunction, the court stressed the smell of burning fuel. In another case, the court called attention to the glare of lights, powerful enough to keep the neighbors awake at night. Said the indignant judge:

"To dangle restless sleep before an exhausted mortal and never allow him to taste of its refreshing juice, constitutes one of the most torturous experience of mankind."

Still, if these assorted annoyances are kept within reasonable limits, the mere fact that the track brings some commotion into the neighborhood may be overlooked. Thus:

The main objections to a new midjet race track were 1) that traffic in the neighborhood had increased, and 2) that parking spaces had become harder to find. But this time the court denied an injunction, saying that traffic and parking were problems for the city, not for the operators of the track.

The judge said the right to use the public streets belongs to all members of the public—including racing fans.

**County Agent's Column**

By RALPH DUNLAP

Plan to attend the Lincoln County Fair in Capitan this Friday and Saturday. There have been several new things added to the Fair. There will be rides for children. The new livestock building will make it possible to see the livestock more easily. An excellent exhibit of beef calves and lambs are expected.

Another item is the Junior Livestock Sale on Saturday morning, starting at 11:30 a.m. Entries will be accepted Thursday evening and Friday until 9:30 a.m. Judging of livestock and Home Economics will start at 10:00 a.m. Saturday activities start at 8:30 a.m. with the judging of Junior Breeding livestock. The parade is at 10:00 a.m.

The new Ladies' Lead Class will be at 11:00 a.m. This is where a par on and their cheep will be judged as a pair. If you want to buy a calf or lamb, be at the Junior Sale starting at 11:30 a.m. at the

same time you can help these boys and girls.

Plan to bring the family to the Lincoln County Fair. There is no admission charge. Come see your neighbor.

**R-R-D**  
Vegetables from the garden taste better if they are harvested at the proper stage of maturity. Garden produce that is over- or underripe suffers from poor quality and low nutritive value. Here are tips on harvesting when vegetables reach a favorable peak in their growth:

Pick snap beans when pods are tender and snap readily.

Pick lima beans when still green and the end of the pods are spongy. Older beans are tough, dry and starchy.

Harvest beets when they are about 2 inches in diameter.

Pick broccoli before flower heads show color.

Cabbage heads should be firm and round with no sign of splitting.

Carrots have their best flavor when the roots are about 1 inch across the top.

Pick celery at medium height and thickness. If the seed stalks appear, the stems will be bitter.

Sweet corn is sweetest just as the silk blackens. Kernels should be fully formed but tender and milky when broken with the thumb nail. Sweet corn rapidly passes through this milk stage.

Harvest cucumbers when the seeds are young, small and soft.

Pick loose-leaf lettuce as soon as the leaves are large enough to use.

Peas lose their sweetness and flavor early. Pick when pods are well-filled and bright green.

Sweet peppers are best when mature and firm with either a good green or red color.

Use radishes while they are firm and crisp. They become tough after the seed stalk appears.

Harvest summer squash when the fruits are about 6 to 8 inches long.

Tomatoes are best when they are fully red on the vine.

Dig turnips when they are about 2 inches in diameter.

Watermelons are fully ripe when the portion touching the ground is cream-colored, fruit sounds hollow when thumped, and it separates easily from the vine.

Cantaloupes are ripe when the fruits appear yellowish and slip easily from the vine.

**R-R-D**  
The month just completed was the worst July livestock producers have suffered through since the screwworm eradication program began in 1962. It was nearly twice as bad, in fact, as the next worst. In New Mexico this year, things were bad en-

ough as it was. There were 124 confirmed outbreaks in New Mexico, two in Lincoln County, a figure surpassed only by the 162 cases in 1963. New Mexico hadn't had a case in July since 1969.

Texas' situation is so bad as to be almost incomprehensible. The state recorded an astronomical 15,331 infestations last month. That's double the previous mark of 8,300 the first year the Screwworm Eradication Program was established at Mission, and an incredible 900 times worse than a year ago when a meager 17 cases were discovered. In fact Texas' average of 500 cases a day during July was higher than
