Ruidoso Downs Council Sets Vote On Purchase of Denton Field

Mayor Jake Harris and councilmen Neil Smith, George Hancock and Albert Richardson were present for the regular meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees held Monday evening at the Ruidoso Downs Village Hall.

In the reading of correspondence, a letter from the Secretary of the Treasury was read requesting information concerning the village in conjunction with the federal revenue-sharing plan. A notice from the state dealing with the sale of excess property drew the comment that the village could be interested in purchase of a back hoe. A question arose from a HUD letter stating that the village had received a grant of \$2,160 for a low rent housing project. Records will be checked for more information on the grant.

The village agreed to request a safety survey of Highway 70 through town after an offer from the New Mexico Highway Safety Commission of such a survey on a cost-sharing plan. Bills were approved paid, including the purchase of a radio receiver to be used by the Marshall at his home. The receiver was paid for from a state grant. Purchase of new tires for the village police car was also approved.

Mayor Harris noted that a test of the water well on Denton Field showed that the well would pump 320 gallons per minute and the council will try to get the bond issue for the purchase of the property on the November ballot. In a referendum held in conjunction with the primary election, the mea-

HUD Inspection Team Holds Ruidoso Tour For Water Project

A Department of Housing and Urban Development inspection team from the Dallas, Texas Area Office arrived in Ruidoso Thursday afternoon, Sept. 27, to make an on the spot inspection and survey of the proposed 1.8 million dollar Ruidoso municipal water storage distribution and expansion project.

Officials of the federal department of HUD notified Ruidoso Village officials late Monday afternoon that the HUD team would be in Ruidoso to conduct the required over all engineering specification inspection and ground survey of the proposed land use sites for the project.

Ruidoso has applied for a \$860,000 matching grant from HUD for the project which received an overwhelming voter approval last year. The on the spot inspection and survey, reportedly, is one of the basic requirements before a final decision for the grant is reached by HUD.

The village will again request a grant from law enforcement agencies for a police car and one patrolman for one year. Such a request last year was turned down.

The Mayor's mileage and per diem for the trip to Albuquerque for the Municipal League Convention was approved.

A short discussion of Ruidoso's participation in the sewer project was held and the council decided to call for bids on a five acre parcel of land east of the village for the construction of the central sewer plant. It is understood that several sites would be suitable for the plant location but that only two property owners had offered such a site.

N. M. Daughters of the American Revolution U. S. A. Bicentennial Memorial Forest Dedication Sunday, Oct. 1

Several hundred people, including New Mexico Governor and Mrs. Bruce King, are expected to attend the significant and historic formal dedication ceremony, Sunday, Oct. 1, of the New Mexico Organization of the Daughters of the American Revolution U. S. A. Bicentennial Memorial Forest, to be located on Lincoln National Forest lands at the site of the 1963 "Bonito Burn" area near Bonito Lake, north of Ruidoso.

The NMDAR U. S. A. Bicentennial Memorial Forest project is the result of a cooperative agreement, signed in Ruidoso, June 8, 1972, between the NMDAR and the Lincoln National Forest regarding the reforestation of the "Bonito Burn" area with around 3,000 two year old pine tree seedlings financed by the NMDAR Chapters.

The area to be reforested as a NMDAR Bicentennial project serves as a watershed above the Bonito Lake Reservoir. The area, referred to as the 1963 "Bonito Burn" area near Bonito Lake, north of Ruidoso.

The HUD team, according to James L. Hine, Ruidoso city manager, is also scheduled to meet with Ruidoso and Captain Village officials and the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users Association in a joint meeting Thursday night during the Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

The next regular meeting of the board will be held at the Village Hall Oct. 9, 7:30 p.m.

"Bonito Burn" caused the total destruction of 288 acres, 200 of which were Lincoln National Forest lands. Suppression of the fire, suspected to have been man-caused, lasted from April 24 until April 29 at a total cost of nearly \$300,000. Fighting the fire required 17 fire fighting crews totaling 425 men plus around 175 other fire fighters and additional Forest Service personnel.

The unique NMDAR project, the first for the celebration of the U. S. A. Bicentennial Era in New Mexico, is in addition a part of the Horizons, USA emphasis of the United States Bicentennial Commission. The commission's goal is to "carry out projects which will contribute towards a better Third Hundred Years For America."

Sunday's program to begin at 1:00 p.m. at the South Fork Campground, will include the official unveiling of a special designated marker commemorating the NMDAR U. S. A. Bicentennial Memorial Forest plantation.

Featured speaker for the program will be Miss Pamela A. M. Fraser, Coordinator, Conservation Activities, SW Region, Forest Service, USDA, Albuquerque. Kenneth Evans, Forest Supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest, Alamogordo, will make the acceptance speech for the NMDAR project.

Mrs. Floren Thompson, Jr., State Regent for the New Mexico Organization of the DAR, who reportedly initiated the idea for the NMDAR's contribution to the ecological needs of New Mexico, will serve as Mistress of Ceremonies.

Special guests for the Oct. 1 official NMDAR Marker dedication ceremony also include Mrs. Ralph Killey, Winnetka, Ill., National DAR Chairman for Conservation, Mrs. R. L. Jackson, Carlsbad, National DAR Chairman for the USA Bicentennial, Ed Pond, Executive Director of the New Mexico American Revolution Bicentennial Commission and Edmundo Delgado, Chairman of the NMDAR Bicentennial Commission, Ruidoso Mayor Leon Farrar, and William Hurst, Regional Forester, Albuquerque.

Mrs. Killey will represent the National DAR Conservation Committee whose current goal is for each DAR member in the nation to plant a tree during 1972.

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Preliminary Hearing Scheduled Today For Tommy Lee Watson

A Preliminary Hearing for Tommy Lee Watson, 57, Ruidoso, charged with the March 30, 1972 stabbing death of twenty-five year old Elliott Kazhe, Mesquero, is scheduled for today, Friday, at 9:00 a.m. in the Lincoln County Magistrate Court Division III, Ruidoso, with Magistrate Judge Austin A. Pritchett presiding.

Watson has been in the custody of the Lincoln County Sheriff Department since his formal arraignment Friday, March 31, reportedly with the exception of an evaluation study at the Las Vegas State Hospital upon the request of his court appointed attorney, Leland Stone, Ruidoso.

The State of New Mexico, plaintiff in the case, will be represented by Norman D. Bloom, Alamogordo and Lincoln-Otero County District Attorney. The state issued thirteen witness subpoenas to appear during the Preliminary Hearing.

Eighteen New Mexico communities received Blue Ribbon Cities Merit Awards Thursday evening (Sept. 14) during the New Mexico Municipal League's annual banquet.

The Blue Ribbon Cities program is co-sponsored by the Department of Development, the Municipal League, the New Mexico Industrial Development Executives Association, the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association, the New Mexico Chamber of Commerce Executives Association, the University of New Mexico's Bureau of Business Research and the New Mexico Junior Chamber of Commerce.

"Small Texas College" Holds Centennial

A small college was established in 1873 on the Texas cattle frontier in Thorp Springs, an area north of Granbury and southwest of Fort Worth. The co-founding brothers, Addison and Randolph Clark, began the institution with the assistance of their academic-minded father, Joseph Addison Clark, and their mother Hettie DeSpain Clark, who made her Christian influence known. Thirteen students enrolled in classes that first September. For its 100th anniversary, the college welcomed some 6,500 students from 49 states and the District of Columbia and 35 foreign countries and United States possessions.

The original school, named Add-Ran College, boasted 12 instructors and today has 329 full-time faculty members.

TCU will celebrate its Centennial with many events, slated for the full 1872-73 year, most of which will be open to the public.

"Centennials are times for looking backward and forward," states Chancellor J. M. Moudy, who is the first Texas and TCU alumnus to become the chief executive officer. "In ours, we intend to praise the past, swearing never to depart from it except as we can improve upon it, and equally promising not even for a day to hold on to anything not true, not good, not beautiful. That ought to keep us busy for another 100 years."

Guadalupe Park Sets Dedication Ceremony

President Nixon's younger daughter, Julie Eisenhower, will be the principal speaker, and the guest of honor, at the Guadalupe Mountains National Park Dedication ceremonies, scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 30. Asst. Sec. Reed of the Department of the Interior, and Stanley Hulett, Associate Director of the National Park Service in Washington are also expected to attend.

The ceremonies will be held near the park's Frijole Information Station, 1 mile east of Pine Springs, in the northern part of Culberson County, Texas, beginning at 10:00 a.m. Pine Springs is located near the top of historic Guadalupe Pass on Highway 62-180, 55 miles north of Van Horn, Texas.

A plaque honoring the Wallace E. Pratt family for their donation of 5,600 acres for inclusion in the park will also be unveiled at the ceremonies.

Guadalupe Mountains National Park was authorized by Congress on Oct. 15, 1906, under Public Law 89-667, but formal establishment was delayed until this year when the last remaining tracts of land which were authorized for the park were acquired.

Guadalupe Mountains National Park encompasses more than 77,000 acres, including the 4 highest peaks in Texas, deep rugged canyons, a large segment of the world's best preserved Permian-age fossil reef, and rare mixture of plant and animal life.

At the present time, the park is totally undeveloped and almost completely lacking in public-use facilities. However, a final Master Plan for the park's development and use should be released in the near future.

The first proposals for a park in the Guadalupe Mountains were advanced in 1925 and again in 1930 by Judge J. C. Hunter, Sr. of Abilene, Texas, one of the principal land owners, and others who were interested in the project.

However, the proposal gained little support or backing until 1950 when Wallace E. Pratt, noted pioneer petroleum geologist, and a former Vice President of Humble Oil Company, donated his ranch which included a large part of McKittrick Canyon. The Pratt family's donation served as a turning point and sparked a drive which finally led to establishment of the park. The largest parcels of land included in the park were acquired from the Pratt family, now of Tucson, Ariz., and J. C. Hunter, Jr. of Abilene, Texas.

The Dedication of Guadalupe Mountains National Park is particularly significant in that the nation is celebrating the National Parks Centennial this year. The nation's first national park, Yellowstone, was established in 1872, under a bill which was signed by President U. S. Grant.



Guadalupe Park Sets Dedication Ceremony

President Nixon's younger daughter, Julie Eisenhower, will be the principal speaker, and the guest of honor, at the Guadalupe Mountains National Park Dedication ceremonies, scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 30. Asst. Sec. Reed of the Department of the Interior, and Stanley Hulett, Associate Director of the National Park Service in Washington are also expected to attend.

The ceremonies will be held near the park's Frijole Information Station, 1 mile east of Pine Springs, in the northern part of Culberson County, Texas, beginning at 10:00 a.m. Pine Springs is located near the top of historic Guadalupe Pass on Highway 62-180, 55 miles north of Van Horn, Texas.

A plaque honoring the Wallace E. Pratt family for their donation of 5,600 acres for inclusion in the park will also be unveiled at the ceremonies.

Guadalupe Mountains National Park was authorized by Congress on Oct. 15, 1966, under Public Law 89-667, but formal establishment was delayed until this year when the last remaining tracts of land which were authorized for the park were acquired.

Guadalupe Mountains National Park encompasses more than 77,000 acres, including the 4 highest peaks in Texas, deep rugged canyons, a large segment of the world's best preserved Permian-age fossil reef, and rare mixture of plant and animal life.

At the present time, the park is totally undeveloped and almost completely lacking in public-use facilities. However, a final Master Plan for the park's development and use should be released in the near future.

The first proposals for a park in the Guadalupe Mountains were advanced in 1925 and again in 1930 by Judge J. C. Hunter, Sr. of Abilene, Texas, one of the principal land owners, and others who were interested in the project.

However, the proposal gained little support or backing until 1958 when Wallace E. Pratt, noted pioneer petroleum geologist, and a former Vice-President of Humble Oil Company, donated his ranch which included a large part of McKittrick Canyon. The Pratt family's donation served as a turning point and sparked a drive which finally led to establishment of the park. The largest parcels of land included in the park were acquired from the Pratt family, now of Tucson, Ariz., and J. C. Hunter, Jr. of Abilene, Texas.

The Dedication of Guadalupe Mountains National Park is particularly significant in that the nation is celebrating the National Parks Centennial this year. The nation's first national park, Yellowstone, was established in 1872, under a bill which was signed by President U. S. Grant.

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

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County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

As population increases it becomes increasingly critical that we make the most of our soil resources while at the same time maintaining these resources for the use of future New Mexicans.

This objective can be achieved through the use of soil surveys which are basic scientific inventories of the soil resources of an area. These surveys can provide valuable soil information needed for land utilization, land use planning, park and open space planning, and housing subdivision layout and design. They are also helpful in planning and designing urban and rural tile drain systems, planning and design of sewage disposal systems, zoning and other land use controls, as well as for their prime objective of agricultural land use planning and management.

The soils of New Mexico are an irreplaceable asset to the economy of the state and to the environmental well-being of its people. The appropriate use of land and the utilization of conservation practices suggested in soil survey report can go a long way toward making the most of your soil resource while reducing pollution caused by water and wind erosion of soils. Soil surveys can help you to better use and preserve one of our natural resources — soil. Check with your local Soil Conservation Service office for a soil survey report in your area.

County and community government officials, city and coun-

ty planners, and other concerned individuals are expected to attend the fourth annual New Mexico Land-Use Planning Symposium Oct. 11-12 in Albuquerque. Theme of the 1972 symposium is "Land-Use Legislation for New Mexico." Both state and national experts will participate. Headquarters will be in the Albuquerque Hilton Inn.

Among the subjects to be discussed are:
New Mexico subdivision legislation, land use policy for New Mexico, national legislation for land-use planning, urban studies program and its land-use implications, and New Mexico's needs for land-use legislation.

The symposium is being sponsored by New Mexico State University. Keith Austin, NMSU Extension Program Leader, Community Resource Development, is the coordinator. Purpose of the symposium is to encourage and stress the need for wise rural and urban planning in the use of land and natural resources. Twenty-two organizations and governmental agencies are cooperating with NMSU in sponsoring the gathering. Information concerning the symposium may be obtained at the County Agents Office in Carrizozo.

The herbicide application season is over, but where and how do you safely store these chemicals and the equipment for applying them? Most herbicides will specify storage conditions, so read the label. Wettable powders, for example, should be stored in a dry, cool place. Moisture will cake the wettable powder.

Freezing usually will not inactivate most liquid herbicides like 2, 4-D, but it may cause some of the actual crystals to settle out from the inert carrier. Proper mixing after the herbicide is warmed usually will redissolve these salted out chemicals.

The most toxic chemicals will be labeled: "Poison" or "Danger." Intermediate toxicity will be described with "Warning." Less toxic chemicals are labeled "Caution." Other precautions for herbicide storage safety include:

Try to store herbicides in a separate storage facility where they will be safe from children or adults not familiar with herbicides. Do not store herbicides near seed, fertilizer or crop storage areas. Some herbicides give off fumes which may contaminate these products. Store herbicides only in labeled containers. Do not use pop bottles, old fruit jars, plain paper bags, etc. (Or other containers that may accidentally be used by children for food or drink). Repair torn herbicide bags. Dispose of unknown, unlabeled containers.




winning tally giving the Warriors a final 8-7 victory edge over the visiting Eagles.



'72-'73 Meet All Set At Sunland Park Track

About 800 horses are already on the grounds at Sunland Park, getting ready for the kickoff of the '72-'73 season on Oct. 7.

Plenty of class runners are included among the early arrivals—but few have the "rag-to-riches" story that goes with the powerful colt, Native Tango.

The gray two-year-old is part of a 14-head contingent trained by Johnnie Jamison.

Currently, Native Tango sports a bankroll of \$83,176, which makes him one of the richest thoroughbreds in this part of the country. But the best part of the story is this—Native Tango was purchased as a yearling for a paltry \$1,600.

Last summer, the colt went through the Haymaker Sale at La Mesa Park and was purchased at the rock-bottom price by Nancy Shelton of Clarkston, Texas, and Jo Hutton of Lubbock.

"I wasn't too impressed with the colt at that time," Jamison remarked. "But his new owners sure liked him. I don't believe they were too concerned with his breeding or physical structure. What they really liked was the fact he was gray. The color just caught their fancy."

Native Tango broke into racing last spring at Sunland Park and began dividends right away. In his first start, he finished third as a 7-5 shot. Then he licked maidens handily as a 4-5 choice, and followed this up with a length win over allowance juveniles as a 3-1 choice. He made it three in a row with a half-length win as a 5-1 shot in the trials for the \$100,000 Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity.


On the final day of the '71-'72 season, Native Tango got away as an 11-1 shot in the Allison Futurity, and showed good early speed while finishing second to Bold Liz. The runner-up slot was worth \$17,500 and clearly established Native Tango as a horse to be reckoned with in the Southwest.

Native Tango was then shipped to La Mesa Park, where he finished second in the \$10,000 Scotch Pursome at 4 1/2 furlongs. Next came a try in the trials for the richest thoroughbred event in this part of the country—the \$168,000 Land of Enchantment Futurity.

Native Tango came from just off the pace to nip Kid Loco, the favorite, by a head as a 7-1 shot.

In the finals, Kid Loco was again picked as the favorite, and Native Tango again got away as a 7-1 shot. And once again he had to rally from just off the

Inside The Capital

SANTA FE—Republican President Richard M. Nixon still held a big lead in New Mexico over South Dakota Sen. George McGovern, the Democratic nominee.

The battle was close between Hobbs Democrat Jack Daniels and Albuquerque Republican Pete Domenech for the U. S. Senate. The winner will succeed retiring U. S. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, 76, Albuquerque Democrat.

U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan, Jr., Albuquerque Republican, retained his margin over Santa Fe Democrat Eugene Gallegos, 36, a lawyer, in District 1. U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, 58, Lovington Democrat, enjoyed a comfortable lead over Ed Presson, 30, Silver City Republican, in District 2.

This was the outlook as the general election campaign headed into its final six weeks. The McGovern camp mounted an intensive, statewide voter registration drive aimed squarely at McGovern supporters. But President Nixon was considered the New Mexico leader by a big margin.

Rep. Lujan flew to Albuquerque from Washington to campaign over House District 1 steadily until election day. Gallegos was set to conduct a walking tour in the Pecos Wilderness.

Only a broad Nixon sweep could threaten Rep Runnels' seat. Outgoing State Rep. Geo. Blocker, D-Jal, and other legislators said they expect much ticket-splitting in Southern and Eastern New Mexico. Soundings showed McGovern is unpopular in the conservative areas.

Democrats underscored campaign efforts to elect state ticket candidates. Both major parties will bring a series of national figures to New Mexico in October as the campaign pace quickens.

State Finance Director Robert Kirkpatrick said oil and gas tax revenue is down. Kirkpatrick said: "The major source of weakness has been in the area of mineral production, particularly with respect to oil and gas output."

"Total severance tax revenues for the first two months of this fiscal year have risen from the comparable period of the previous fiscal year, but only 0.4 per cent. A similar small increase has been registered by the oil and gas school tax. In the case of Federal Mineral Leasing Act income there has been an actual decrease."

Resources excise tax revenues on oil and gas also dipped in July-August below comparable totals for 1971.

Atty. Gen. David Norvell, formerly of Clovis, announced settlement of an antitrust suit against several major oil companies with \$250,000 to be distributed to the state and several New Mexico cities.

Norvell said Tucumcari will receive \$3,000 and Lordsburg \$2,000. The state received \$202,000. Filed in 1969, the suit in U. S. District Court alleged the companies tried to conspire to control the price of asphalt sold to the state and various cities.

The Legislative Committee on Aging, headed by Sen. Odie Echols, D-Clovis, met in Santa Fe. Echols said afterward the panel is looking with the State Health-Social Services Department into a medical indigent program "which would solve the annual crisis we seem to face regarding elderly citizens in nursing homes."

A 20 per cent Social Security increase effected Sept. 1 would have pushed some elderly persons' income over \$116 a month and made them ineligible for Medicaid nursing home care. But the HSS board forgave \$7.50 of the \$116 so elderly persons in nursing homes could retain their Medicaid eligibility.

Echols said New Mexico will receive \$500,000 in a new federal program in the present fiscal year for a nutrition program for the aging, based on ability to pay. The federal government will pay 90 per cent of costs. The remaining 10 per cent will be provided in cash or in-kind services by local units of government.

Echols said Daniels and Runnels are leading in their races in Curry County. He conceded Nixon is ahead of McGovern at least 2-1 in Curry.

Echols faces Republican Lonnie Hand, Clovis farmer, in the general election. Ex-Tucumcari Mayor Kenneth Schlientz, a Republican, and Democrat D. F. McCasland Quay County farmer, are matched in a State Senate district of all of Quay and part of Curry.

Southern Union Gas Co. is expected to ask the Public Service Commission for another automatic cost adjustment rate increase within two weeks. Three small adjustments have already been approved.

A PSC rule adopted last January allows Southern Union to pass on to retail customers the increased costs of wholesale gas. Previous adjustments were effective March 1, June 1 and Sept. 1.

A U. S. House subcommittee approved a bill authorizing \$20 million to buy huge Vermejo Ranch in Colfax and Taos Counties for the National Park system. The House Agriculture Committee's subcommittee on forests acted after part of members visited the site.

U. S. Rep. Lujan predicted full Agriculture Committee approval of his bill this week. President Nixon designated Sierra and Dona Ana Counties federal disaster areas because of recent flood damage. Nixon's





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Your Social Security

There is no age limit for the payment of social security taxes, but all workers, regardless of their age, pay tax on their covered earnings. This reminder comes from Mrs. Christine Graves, social security Field Representative.

"It makes no difference that a worker may be over age 65, or over 72, or receiving social security insurance payments," Mrs. Graves explained. "Social security taxes are payable if a worker is paid covered wages of any amount, or has covered income of \$400 or more from his own business in a year."

Wages paid to the spouse, or child under age 21, by an individual employer, are not covered by social security and should not be reported, Mrs. Graves pointed out; however, the wages of a parent who works in the business of his son or daughter are covered but not if the parent works in his child's home.

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
