There are many people who felt positive at the conclusion of the 1971 New Mexico Class AA State Championship High School football classic between Ruidoso and Jal, which, if you remember, Jal won 21-6, that these same two fine football teams would have a rematch in the 1972 equally classic state championship contest.

And so it is tonight, Friday, these same two teams will face each other on the same field (Bulldog Stadium in Artesia), on the same night of the week and in the same week of the month as last year, and by the same token with many of the same players and coaches. In truth, looking at the entire scope of the spectacular... it is a credit to both schools, teams, coaches, student bodies and faculties.

One of the unique aspects of the much published sport event is the fact that Ruidoso High School Warrior head football coach Doyle Howell is a former coach of the Jal Panthers. This fact within itself gives added fuel-for-desire on the part of both gridiron greats. HUD Stops Processing Ruidoso's Water Facility Grant Application

The Dallas, Texas area office of the Department of Housing and Urban Development has informed the Village of Ruidoso that HUD cannot proceed with Ruidoso's current application for a \$879,000 matching fund grant from HUD for the village's planned water storage and water distribution expansion project.

The Ruidoso governing body was informed publicly of HUD's decision Thursday night, Nov. 9, during a regular council meeting.

HUD's most recent action came in the form of a letter to Ruidoso City Manager James L. Hine. The letter stated in part, "We cannot proceed further with the application in its present form. Our primary objection to the project as proposed is the lack of a long-range water supply."

HUD gave Ruidoso three alternatives to consider, regarding a long range water supply, before processing of Ruidoso's application will continue.

The federal agency's letter listed the three alternatives as: A. Including the storage reservoir in this application (Ruidoso's application) as constructed by the city; B. Provide for concurrent construction of the reservoir outside the scope of this project, either by Ruidoso or by Eagle Creek Water Users Association; or C. Providing the reservoir by a joint application with the city and Association.

The council agreed to participate with the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users Association under HUD's required Plan A. Tom Jones, president of the association, and Tom Mann, Mann Engineering Co., Roswell, advised the council that they would immediately begin a preliminary engineering study of a reservoir site north of the ski road in an area called the Phillips Canyon.

City Manager Hine told the council that he understood from HUD officials during a recent trip to Dallas that if the council amended their HUD application to include the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users Association raw water storage reservoir HUD will probably grant the monies by next March or April.

Hine stated, "We need to get the application amendment into the HUD office before January 1 and unless the village does the Plan A of HUD's alternatives, we will have to start all over again on a new application which will not be considered until 1974."

The decision by HUD to insist on a long range water reservoir apparently came as the result of a HUD inspection team's on-site survey of Ruidoso's project made last September 27. Ruidoso has had an application for the grant from HUD for over three and one-half years.

In other action the council approved a request from Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens, Jr., to expend up to \$3,000 to remodel the Ruidoso PD and jail facilities. The major remodeling project will include provisions for a new prisoner booking department, criminal and photo lab and additional security facilities. Lukens stated that work would begin immediately on the long time needed modernization plan.

The council considered a \$18,677 bid from the Barnes Company of El Paso, Texas for a proposed new metal municipal shop building. The bid quotation from the Texas firm did not include the concrete, electric or plumbing installation costs for the fifty feet by sixty feet structure. The council agreed not to award a contract to the Barnes Company until cost estimates on all required work and material was received.


Two new Ruidoso Police Department personnel were recommended to the council by Ruidoso Mayor Leon Farrar and approved by the governing body. Those recommended were Guy Bowers, Pampa, Texas, patrolman, and James Rethmel, Alamogordo, midnight shift radio dispatcher. Both men join the RPD highly recommended and with previous law enforcement training and experience.

In other action the council formally approved a resolution regarding their intention to participate with the Village of Ruidoso Downs in a joint venture towards the installation and construction of a Regional Sewer facility on an acceptable and approved equitable basis.

In reference to the previously proposed plan to contract the Village's sanitation department to a private firm, Mayor Farrar advised that the governing body had decided to stay with their existing operation. Bill Kelley, Ruidoso, who last month had submitted a preliminary proposal to operate the sanitation department was present during the council meeting.

Car Suspected In Transporting Drugs Found

An apparently abandoned car found Tuesday afternoon just outside the Ruidoso corporate limits and suspected to have been used to transport around two hundred pounds of high grade marijuana and also possibly involved last weekend in the robbery of an El Paso, Texas sporting goods store has been impounded by the Ruidoso Police Department in cooperation with the Lincoln County Sheriff Department and the New Mexico State Police.

The car, reportedly registered to an Anthony, New Mexico woman was first discovered by two Ruidoso Police Officers who reported their findings to county and state law enforcement agencies.

A state narcotics agent, called in to assist in the investigation, stated that the street price for the marijuana was in the neighborhood of between twenty and sixty thousand dollars. He also

stated that the car very possibly was in transit through Ruidoso and broke down and the occupants removed the marijuana and left the car abandoned.

Area law enforcement officers, during their investigation of the abandoned car, found three large suit cases and a large six feet long hand made plastic-type bag, all empty, which apparently was used to haul the marijuana. In addition, they also found several items that are suspected to have been stolen from the El Paso sporting goods store.

In other action, late Tuesday afternoon, two Las Cruces Police Department Metro Narco agents, Ron Tarpley and Ray Gutierrez, arrested 18-year-old Richard Farrell, Radium Springs, N. M., in Ruidoso on a warrant issued by a Dona Ana District Magistrate Court.

Farrell, charged with Distribution of Dangerous Drugs, was apprehended in downtown Ruidoso and was taken by the Metro Narco agents to Las Cruces Tuesday night for arraignment. Bail for the defendant was reportedly set at \$10,000.

Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Jerry Foster, Ruidoso, is heading the investigation of the abandoned car incident.

RPD Night Patrol Unit Foils Robbery Attempt At Ski Shop

An alert Ruidoso Police Department night patrol unit, shortly after 1:00 a.m., Thursday morning, apparently foiled what might have been a whole-sale-type robbery of the Mountain Ski Shop on Ruidoso's Sudderth Drive.

Night RPD Patrolman Guy Bowers, with the RPD for the last several weeks, apparently came within minutes of possibly apprehending a thief inside the local ski equipment and ski wearing apparel store.

Investigation revealed that the intruder gained entrance into the shop by breaking out a glass door located at the rear of the building. He was supposedly surprised by the officer patrol check and ran out the rear door dropping several pairs of ski gloves inside the store while seemingly in a hurried departure. One pair of ski gloves was found outside the store, around thirty feet from the rear of the building.

Officer Bowers reportedly was making a routine check of the ski shop and had checked the front and west side of the building and decided to make one more pass around the rear of the store through an alley. It was at this time that he saw the broken glass door and radioed for assistance. Within minutes two additional RPD night patrol units were on the scene and began an immediate canvass of the area.

RPD officers assisting Bowers, Sgt. T. Ruman McBride and Officer Gayle Knapp, surmised that as Officer Bowers turned into the alley of the building the intruder ran out the back door of the store.


First Baptist Church Designates Sunday "Emma Foreman Day"

C. C. Buckner To Be Buried Friday With Full Military Honors

C. C. (Buck) Buckner, 59, who died Tues., Nov. 14 in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Albuquerque, will be buried in the National Cemetery in Santa Fe with full military honors on Friday, Nov. 17, at 2 p.m. The honor guard will be members of the American Ex-Prisoners of War. Memorial services were held Thursday, Nov. 16 in the First United Methodist Church in Roswell.

Buckner was born Dec. 27, 1912 in Hope where he grew up and graduated from the Hope High School. He attended Taft College in Bakersfield, Calif., and founded the C. C. Buckner Agency (State Farm Insurance Co.) in 1951. He was the Roswell agent for that company until his retirement in 1967. In World War II he was in the Bataan Death March and later was a Japanese prisoner of war for 3 1/2 years. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Roswell, the Roswell Lodge No. 969 BPOE, past national director of the American Ex-Prisoners of War and a life member of the Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion and the Bataan Veterans Organization.

Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Goldie Buckner of Roswell; three sons, C. C. Buckner, Jr. of Fort Stanton, Ronald R. Buckner and William W. Eight Day Ski Program Accepted By Ruidoso Municipal School

An eight day school ski program was approved by the board of trustees of the Ruidoso Municipal School Tuesday at the regular monthly meeting of the board. The program will run Dec. 5-12-19, January 23-30, and Feb. 6-13-27. Ray Heid, representing the Sierra Blanca Ski Club, was present at the meeting and noted that Roy Parker, area manager, had approved the earlier starting date. Heid volunteered the services of three instructors to assist with the school program and introduced Chuck Bent, newly hired Junior Racer coach. The school will again ask for adult volunteers to transport the students to the ski area.

Superintendent Pat Valliant reported that a grant of \$22,022 for a one year contract in career education had been approved for Ruidoso as a pilot school and that career education would be required in all state-schools next year.

Discussion was held on a proposal to sell the school lawn sprinkler systems to be installed by school personnel at a considerable saving. The matter will be further studied before a decision is reached.

Personnel hired included: Junnity Bush as school nurse and Health Occupations Instructor; Myrtha Crocker as secretary to the counselor, and Ronald Strassburg as coordinator for the machine shop project in Mesalero. The resignation of high school custodian Laroy Leighton was accepted.

The board has scheduled a special meeting with the student council for next Tuesday night at the Texas Bar-B-Q to hear suggestions from the student body. Only members of the

Discussion was held concerning the changes in the teaching methods at Nob. Hill School.



Ruidoso Tops Kirtland Central For Regional - Play Jal For State

The never-say-die Ruidoso Warriors did it again! They will be playing Jal this Friday night in Artesia for all the marbles in the Class AA State Football Championship game!

In a nerve wracking, spine tingling climax to an afternoon of football, Ruidoso's Big Blue came from behind with 44 seconds to wrap up their second consecutive regional championship game and go on for bigger and loftier gains.

In a script that could have been written for a TV cliff-hanger, the Ruidoso Warriors battled both a tremendous football team from Kirtland Central, the Broncos, and the clock in the final seconds of the football game played here last Saturday afternoon, to wrap up the regional game.

Ruidoso took the opening kick but was unable to get its offense untracked and was forced to punt after their first series of

plays. Kirtland Central moved the ball down to the Ruidoso 14-yard line from the Warrior 47-yard line in nine plays. Unable to move from the Warriors' 14 yard stripe Bert Waite, Bronco quarterback, split the up-rights for a 24-yard field goal to put the visiting Kirtland Central eleven out in front, 3-0.

Ruidoso again was unable to move the ball after taking the after touchdown kick and was forced to give up the ball via a punt. The Warriors' defense began to dig in and stop the Broncos' ball carriers. Big Ken Perryman and Mel Patton came up with two big defensive plays for Ruidoso, Perryman rushing the passer and then Patton nailing the ball carrier for a 6-yard loss on the next play, forcing the opponents to punt the ball out.

Ruidoso moved the ball from the Kirtland Central 47-yard line down to the 15-yard stripe in the second quarter, but was unable to keep up their momentum. After two unsuccessful pass plays, Miller tried to roll out but slipped back on the Kirtland 20-yard line that put the Warriors in a fourth down and 15 situation, with the pass play wide, and the Warriors' scoring threat snuffed out.

Ruidoso scored late in the second quarter after driving 86 yards for the go-ahead TD. Quarterback Miller found Mel Patton in the end zone on his favorite pass pattern and tossed a 10-yard touchdown pass. Miller also kicked up point-after to put the Warriors out in front, 7-3.

Kirtland Central went out in front in the third quarter by the score of 10-7 with Waite going in for the go-ahead touchdown from 2-yards out. He also booted the extra point.

Tim Baur and Dick Underwood provided the big play in the fourth quarter that forced the Broncos to punt to Ruidoso for their last chance to move the ball in for a touchdown.

With a third down and five needed for a first, Baur and Underwood nailed the ball carrier behind the line of scrimmage, forcing a fourth down punt.

After taking the punt on the Broncos' 49 yard line, the Warriors began to move goalward. Miller hit Kent Skarda with a 10 yard screen down to the Kirtland Central 27-yard stripe. Miller then picked up 11 yards to the 25 yard line and then carried again for 11 yards. Skarda then got into the act by punching the ball for 10 yards, down to the 4-yard line. After being penalized back to the 6, Miller picked up a first down on the Broncos' 1-yard stripe. With 44 second showing on the scoreboard clock, Miller hit off tackle to put the regional crown in the hands of the Warriors, 13-10 then added the point after to climax the come-from-behind victory for the Warriors.

1972 All-American Futurity— All-American Telecast Sets Pace For 1973

The Labor Day '72 telecast of the All-American Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs was viewed by an estimated audience of about 10 million.

This is the report from Thad Sandstrom, president of the All-American Network of Topeka, Kansas. The network was formed expressly to beam the World's Richest Race throughout an 18-state area.

In analyzing the results of the telecast, Sandstrom said: "The reports we've gotten on the telecast of the All-American have been just great. The people interviewed, for example, report fantastic comment from all areas in which the broadcast was carried."

According to Sandstrom, about half the estimated viewing audience of 10 million saw the live telecast. Another five million saw the race on national and local TV shows later in the week.

Al Rosa, president and general manager of Ruidoso Downs, also expressed great satisfaction with the telecast and noted that it's now full-steam-ahead in plans to televise the '73 All-American.

The 15th edition of the World's Richest Race will be staged on Labor Day, Sept. 3, with the gross pot a cinch to top out a hearty \$1,030,000. This year, the distance stretches out from 400 to 440 yards.

If last year's television success is any yardstick, the upcoming edition will again grab considerable national interest. Here's a resume of the 1972 All-

—The CBS Radio Network, which includes 244 radio stations, carried highlights of the race on World Wide Sport 25 minutes after the race was over. The All-American Network fed the audio part of the race live to CBS in New York.

—The audio portion of the race was carried live on KENC Radio in Amarillo and WIBW Radio in Topeka, Kansas.

—The Associated Press carried a report on the All-American on its national wire, reaching all major cities. The New York Times, for example, carried a two-column story on the All-American on Sept. 5.

—United Press International also carried the race on its national wire.

The National Observer sent a reporter and photographer to cover the All-American, and the race was featured in a Page One spread in the issue of Sept. 16, 1972.

Officials of the All-American Network estimate the 67 participating stations carried approximately 1,000 advance production announcements by jockeys.

Mystery Mishap

At 7:13 p.m., in the main dining room of a large hotel, a mirror suddenly fell from the wall and landed on the head of an unsuspecting diner.

No one could figure out exactly why the mirror had fallen. Nevertheless the diner, painfully injured, filed a lawsuit for damages against the hotel.

"He had no case," the management argued in court. "He cannot point to any specific thing we did wrong."

But the court upheld the man's claim. "Mirrors do not ordinarily fall off walls," reasoned the court, "unless someone is negligent."

The court was invoking a famous legal doctrine known as res ipsa loquitur — "the thing speaks for itself." This doctrine is widely used when there is no direct, eye witness evidence of an act of negligence. Weighing the odds, the law decides that an act of negligence — even though unseen — probably did occur.

Thus: Using res ipsa loquitur, a court found negligence when a

car, parked on a steep slope, started to roll downhill. Chances were good, said the court, that the driver had neglected to set his brakes and cramp his front wheel against the curb.

Also using res ipsa loquitur, another court found negligence when a housewife encountered a piece of glass in a newly opened can of spinach. Chances were good, said the court, that someone in the canning factory had been careless.

But the mere fact that an accident had happened does not necessarily justify the use of the doctrine. Consider this situation:

A woman climbing down from a trolley lost her footing and fell to the pavement. Demanding damages later from the trolley company, she said the car had probably moved just as she was getting off.

But the court said there was an equal probability that she herself had simply failed to watch her step. With no odds in her favor, said the court, she could not use res ipsa loquitur to win her case.

So father worked every day, saving his money to buy the land and we moved on the claim hoping no one would contest it. (Which they never did).

I think he must have pitched our tent over at the creek; as there was a spring of cold running water and more protection from the wind among the tall cottonwood trees. I remember in later years, playing on the banks of this creek which ran across the back side of father's pasture; hunting for violets in the cool shady nooks and "sheep spur" in the low rich places; also finding many pretty Indian arrows and dough boards of stone.

I do not remember about how or when they built their house, but it must have been a task; as they had to freight lumber from the nearest railroad town by mule or oxen teams. My father was very handy with carpenter tools; also had a very good education, for those days. My mother was very well educated, too, and taught a private school before she married.

Our place was in the corner where a freight road running north and south crossed one going east and west. We were about half way between Cheyenne and Sayre, twelve miles each way. Which by the way are large oil towns today.

My brother and I would stand in the window with our noses to the pane and watch the old oxen freight come by about once a month. Once I could not see as clearly as I thought I should, and being rather short I stood upon mother's large stone churn (the same one she brought the honey in). The lid turned sideways and down I went into the churn full of buttermilk, feet and all. Woe, be unto me.

These oxen, twelve of them I think, were driven without any lines; but they were a wonderful sight to see. Watching the old bearded man, with a language not for our small ears, throw his long whip, and hearing the crack of it over the oxen's heads is something a little one is not likely to forget. We have watched many droves

of cattle come up this same trail that looked to our small eyes, like a long dark snake; with flashes of light like sparkling eyes, as the sun reflected on their long horns (that we never see today). Soon they came near enough for us to hear their lowing. Then as they drew near we could hear the cowboys singing their weird and soothing lullabies. Father said they could quiet the cows by singing to them. I hate to "disillusion" the younger generation, but I will have to admit: I never once saw a cowboy strumming on a guitar.

These cattle were mostly from Texas on their way to Dodge City or Abilene, Kansas which was the nearest markets in the southwest. I have wondered since: how many of these cowboys got safely back to where they came from and how many may have landed in Boot Hill cemetery at Dodge City.

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

Inside The Capital

SANTA FE - Crushing defeat of Democrat's George McGovern and Jack Daniels in New Mexico in the general election may touch off a power struggle in the state's majority party.

Gov. Bruce King, titular head of the New Mexico Democratic Party, said he will move to attract moderate back into the party. Democrats voted for President Richard M. Nixon in droves, Nixon smashed McGovern in New Mexico. Republicans won the vital U. S. Senate seat, too. Albuquerque Pete Domenici easily defeated Robb. Democrat Daniels. With only 13 of 132 precincts unreported the tally was Domenici, 202,207; Daniels, 171,528.

State Senate President Pro Tem I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Dominion, said: "The vote turned down McGovern and his liberal ideas and it turned them down flatly."

"Democrats didn't vote against the ticket. They voted against McGovern. A lot of Democrats have quit going to Democratic Party meetings in the last couple of years."

"If moderate Democrats turn out in large numbers at the next round of Democratic conventions, you will likely see some major changes."

Sen. Smalley represents Lujan, Hidalgo and Sierra Counties. He expects bills in the 1973 Legislature to return to the convention system of nominating candidates. New Mexico uses the direct primary now. Sen. Smalley also says a bill will be introduced providing for a runoff primary.

Chances are dim for adoption of a runoff primary in New Mexico. Sen. Smalley says the legislature has very slowly taken away the governor's political patronage. He cited

Gov. King says he will talk with party leaders for weeks before calling a meeting in January to chart plans for the 1974 campaign. King will confer with Sen. Montoya and U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels of Livingston among others.

Rep. Runnels swamped his general election opponent, Silver City Republican Ed Presson; 73 to 27 per cent. U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque Republican, easily won a third term over Santa Fe Democrat Eugene Gallegos.

Lujan ran far ahead of Gallegos in Albuquerque which polls 60 per cent of the District 1 vote. Democrats gained slightly in both branches of the legislature. The new partisan division: Senate - 30 Democrats and 12 Republicans; House - 51 Democrats and 19 Republicans, an increase of three Democrats.

State Rep. David Salman, D-Buena Vista, will seek reelection as House majority leader in the House Democrats' caucus in December. But Salman will be opposed by Rep. Fred Chavez, Albuquerque. Chavez says Albuquerque is underrepresented in party leadership posts in the legislature.

Two Republicans won seats on the Luna County Commission - Walter Greeman and Mrs. John (Punkie) Edwards. Greeman beat P. D. Torres by 186 votes - 2,347 to 2,161. Democrat Torres was an incumbent.

Mrs. Edwards beat Antonio Viramontes, Luna County Democrat chairman, by 78 votes - 2,346 to 2,268. Viramontes ran for the commission seat held by his brother, P. O. Viramontes.

Columbus Ferguson, Taos Democrat, easily won reelection to the State Corporation Commission for another six years. Incumbent Ferguson beat Roswell Republican Larry Hess by 32,

the State Personnel Act and the Highway Department, managed by commissioners appointed for a six-year term.

In the final week of the general election campaign, Sen. Smalley says, many Democrats did not want to vote for Sen. McGovern. He says they were reluctant to cross party lines to vote for Nixon but finally decided to support Nixon because of their strong opposition to McGovern.

In the U. S. Senate race Domenici carried Democratic Luna County over Daniels, 2,641 to 1,954. Daniels squeaked past Domenici in Guadalupe County. Domenici carried Colfax, Curry, DeBake, Lincoln, Quay, Sierra, Taos, Union and Valencia.

Daniels won his home Lea County nearly 2-1 over Domenici. Jack carried Hidalgo County 913 to 691. In all, Domenici carried 25 counties and Daniels won 7.

The intraparty struggle for control may pit U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya against other Democratic Party segments. Sen. Montoya was New Mexico McGovern campaign chairman.

Sen. Montoya doubtless suffered loss of political prestige in McGovern's overwhelming defeat by President Nixon in New Mexico. But Montoya, who was not on the ticket this year, campaigned loyally for Democratic candidates throughout New Mexico.

260 votes - 186,414 to 154,214 - with only 13 precincts unreported.

Mrs. Tillie Simion of Red River, Taos County, is a Republican presidential elector. Presidential electors will meet in Santa Fe Dec. 18 to cast New Mexico's four electoral votes for Nixon.

SOCIAL SECURITY Eubanks Completes

"Now that the wedding gift thank-you notes have been written, and the new furniture arranged, it is time for the new bride to get to the business aspect of her marriage," Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative, suggested today. For example, the bride should contact her nearest social security office and have her name changed on her social security card. This is not as important as it may first appear to be.

Social Security earnings records are kept both by name and by social security number. When the bride's employer reports her wages showing her usual social security number but a new name, this causes difficulty in crediting the earnings to the proper account. In such a situation the Social Security Administration cannot assume that the worker has married, but each case must be verified to be certain that the new name still refers to the same person.

Changing a name on social security records is not difficult. The bride should simply call or write the nearest social security office and ask for the form

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 4 ARTICLE II OF ORDINANCE NO. 70-5 RELATING TO THE MUNICIPAL JUDGE OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, TO PROVIDE FOR A TEMPORARY MUNICIPAL JUDGE IN THE EVENT OF THE TEMPORARY INCAPACITY OR ABSENCE OF THE DULY ELECTED MUNICIPAL JUDGE; AND TO PROVIDE FOR COMPENSATION FOR THE TEMPORARY MUNICIPAL JUDGE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

ARTICLE I: That Section 4 of ARTICLE II of Ordinance No. 70-5 be amended to read as follows:

4. APPOINTMENT OF TEMPORARY MUNICIPAL JUDGE: In the event of the temporary incapacity or absence of the Municipal Judge, the duly elected and qualified Municipal Judge, or the Mayor or Mayor Pro Tem of the Village of Ruidoso, may designate any duly licensed attorney at law, who is a resident of Lincoln County, New Mexico, or a Magistrate of Lincoln County, New Mexico, to hear and determine cases arising under municipal ordinances in the Municipal Court in his place and stead. The temporary Municipal Judge so designated and appointed shall be paid the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day that he shall sit and serve as Temporary Municipal Judge, such sum to be paid out of the General Fund of the Village of Ruidoso; provided however, that in the event the duly elected and qualified Municipal Judge shall be incapacitated or absent from his duties as Municipal Judge for more than thirty (30) days in any calendar year, then and in such event, the compensation for such Temporary Municipal Judge shall be deducted from the salary of the elected Municipal Judge in a manner to be determined by the Village Clerk. The requirements of law relating to money collected, monthly reports, itemized statements and penalties apply to temporary municipal judges.

ARTICLE II. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effective five days after its adoption and publication as required by law.






