

Fort Stanton Staff

Intensifies Training

Fort Stanton was established in 1885, as a U. S. cavalry outpost for the protection of settlers from the Indian tribes of the area. Today, 118 years later, Fort Stanton Hospital & Training School has a similar purpose: the care, education and protection of approximately 200 trainable mentally retarded. Fort Stanton is a member of the New Mexico Department of Hospitals & Institutions, and is primarily a health-care facility for the mentally retarded.

Fort Stanton has recently intensified the training program for the retarded students, thru the use of a highly professional "team approach", consisting of two qualified Psychologists, a Special-Education teacher and teacher-aids, a Recreation Specialist, and a complete staff of Attendant-Trainers, all working to provide continuous personal development and self-help training for residents, according to individual needs.

Teaching programs for all levels of the retarded, have been initiated, ranging from Basic Compliance and Self-Help Skills, to simplified classroom instruction. Domestic Training, Arts and Crafts, Social-Recreational functions, and various Sheltered Workshops, have proven very successful in providing students with essential training areas for possibly community placement.

The over-all purpose for these varied programs is to insure an appropriate home-like atmosphere, qualified medical treatment and care, and developmental activities to provide each resident the opportunity to: 1) return to his personal home, 2) participate in Community Sheltered Workshop Programs, and, 3) to qualify for competent job placement within the community.

The reason for retardation is fairly clear and can be explained medically. What has yet to be explained is: What can be done for the retarded? The spe-






Chamber Chatter

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

How To Fireproof Christmas Trees
 The average Christmas tree is a serious fire hazard. While the methods discussed below will reduce the fire hazard of your Christmas tree, it should be borne in mind that no inexpensive method is known that will make a Christmas tree completely fireproof.
 A freshly-cut tree does not ignite easily because of its high moisture content, but without proper caution this moisture soon evaporates and the tree becomes dry. By following a few simple rules you can reduce the fire hazard in your Christmas tree while maintaining color and reducing needle shed at the same time.
 When you bring your tree home, stand it in a bucket of water outdoors or in a cool place and where it will not be exposed to the sun or drying winds. When you bring it indoors for decoration, make a fresh slanting cut across the trunk at least an inch above the old cut to allow the tree to absorb water. Place the tree in a container of water, or in a tree stand that has a reservoir for water.

Jehovah's Witness Local Members Attend Assembly

Addressing the Circuit Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses held over the weekend at the El Paso County Coliseum, F. D. Malaspina, District Supervisor for the Watchtower Society, asked his hearers to reflect for a moment on the question of man being the product of evolution, and if so has he evolved to the point of extinction? "Such reasoning", he said, "should provoke the question, 'Is This Life All There Is?'" as 1,444 listened in rapt attention.
 Contrasting "such reasoning" with the Bible he further stated, "that this 'system of things' will soon come to its end — not by evolution, pollution, nuclear war, or over-population, but by God's intervention. 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

absorb up to a quart of water a day. Place your tree in the coolest part of the room away from the fireplace, radiator, air ducts or TV sets which tend to dry out the needles.
 The water-absorbing power of freshly-cut trees permits the introduction of certain chemicals that tend to make the tree even more resistant to fire. Ammonium sulfate seems to work very well, is cheap and easily obtained. It can be bought at most stores that sell seed and fertilizer.
 The method of using ammonium sulfate in making a Christmas tree fire resistant is as follows:
 Weigh the tree and divide the weight in pounds by four. This will give the weight in pounds of the ammonium sulfate needed. Dissolve the material in water using one and one-half pints of water to each pound of ammonium sulfate.
 Cut the trunk as described above and place the tree into the solution immediately. Keep in a cool place until most of the solution has been absorbed. The rate of absorption is best at temperatures of 55 to 65 degrees Fahrenheit. When the solution runs low in the container, add water only.
 The above treatments do not make your tree fireproof—only fire resistant. Avoid faulty wiring and do not use open flames around your tree. Then too, the decorations, ornaments and gifts on or around your tree may be highly flammable.
 Have a merry Christmas, not a sad one.

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Inside The Capital

SANTA FE — Sen. John Conway, Lincoln/Otero, upset William Segó, 33, Albuquerque, for Senate Republican leader on the fourth ballot in a controversial party caucus.

An Alamogordo lawyer, Conway, 38, has been a legislator only two years. Sen. Segó has been a lawmaker since 1967. Segó has 1974 governor ambitions. Senate GOP leader John Eastham, Albuquerque, also a governor prospect, did not seek reelection this year.

Sen. Conway finally won 7-5 after Senate Republicans deadlocked 6-6 on three earlier ballots. Conway predicted afterward Senate Republicans, outnumbered 30-12 by Democrats, will wield much influence in the 1973 Legislature despite the big disadvantage.

In the Senate Democratic caucus Odie Echols, Clovis, and Robert McBride, Albuquerque, tied 15-15 on three ballots for majority whip. Senate Democrats then named Echols and McBride co-majority whips in an unprecedented move.

Tibo Chavez, Belen, was renominated as Senate majority leader and I. M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra, was chosen again as Senate president pro tem in the Senate Democratic caucus. Both were unopposed.

Sen. Chavez and Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, were reportedly among Sen. Echols' supporters.

Rep. William J. Upton, D-Luna-Hidalgo, would effect a tax cut by raising state income tax exemptions in the 1973 Legislature. "Make the exemptions two or three times the present exemptions," Rep. Upton recommends.

State government expects a \$141 million general fund surplus next June 30. Rep. Upton would use the surplus for a tax reduction, an increase in state reserves and one-time capital improvements.

Upton says he will vote against ratification of the federal constitution women's equal rights amendment. He noted Luna and Hidalgo Counties rejected a state constitution equal rights amendment approved statewide by voters Nov. 7.

Sen. Smalley says he will support Gov. Bruce King's proposals for the state to buy the Public Employees Retirement Association building and construct a building to house the Motor Vehicle Department and Revenue Bureau in Santa Fe.

Smalley also favors a boost in state general fund reserves. He adds: "I would favor anything to reduce taxes." The longtime legislator says the Universities Study Committee will sponsor four or five bills in the lawmaking session opening Jan. 16. Sen. Smalley is USC chairman.

He says bills are being drafted in final form. Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, is also a USC member.

The State Park and Recreation Commission hiked fees for boat safety inspection at state park lakes. The new fees: \$5 for boats less than 20 feet long and \$10 for boats longer than 20 feet. Former fees were \$3 for boats with less than 10 horsepower and \$5 for those over 10 horsepower.

Rep.-elect Dan Berry, D-Eunie, says of the projected \$41 million state general fund surplus: "We should save all of it we can. That kind of money doesn't come in every year."

"Once you start spending it, it's hard to stop. Any new program — that is set up has to be financed down the road," Berry, 50, a rancher, has lived in Lea County since 1946.

Berry's committee assignment preferences are the Taxation - Revenue, Transportation and Corporation-Banks Committees. Speaker Walter Martinez, D-Grants, renominated by House Democrats, will complete assignments before Jan. 1. Berry's House district includes Eunice and Jal.

Also at the House Democrats' caucus were Rep. Clifton Moreland, Quay-Union; Bobby Duran, Taos insurance agent, and H. B. Barnard, Clovis insurance agent. Duran, 33, hopes to land on the Appropriations-Finance, Taxation - Revenue or Corporations-Banks Committee. Barnard's choices are also the Appropriations - Finance and Taxation - Revenue Committees.

But Barnard says he will be glad to serve on committees dealing with municipalities and highways. Barnard is an ex-Clovis city commissioner. Duran and Barnard will be freshmen legislators.

Sen. Trujillo says state re-

serves should be raised from \$12 million to \$15 million with part of the projected general fund surplus.

An insurance agent, Sen. Trujillo says: "My first inclination is to be against no-fault insurance. But I want to look at the bill the interim legislative insurance committee has approved and other no-fault proposals."

Sen. Trujillo is set to become chairman of the power Legislative Finance Committee after the 1973 Legislature adjourns. He is LFC vice chairman now and vice chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

Trujillo favors the proposed statewide insurance plan for teachers. He was on a committee that shaped the proposal. He underscored sharp differences in plans now offered teachers by the 88 New Mexico school districts. The uniform plan that will go to the legislature sets standard provisions. It is far superior to most teacher insurance now in effect. The cost would be an added \$2.5 million in state appropriations for the employer's share.

The State Game and Fish Department says it is asking Steere Tank Lines, Dallas, for \$29,370 for damage in a diesel oil spill Oct. 24 on the Cimarron River. State Game Director Ladd Gordon said the spill

killed at least 18,500 trout. A truck overturned on U. S. 54 and spilled about 7,000 gallons of diesel fuel into the river.

Universal Constructors Inc., Albuquerque, was apparent low bidder at \$67,400 on crushing and stockpiling material near Clayton on US-56-64-87. Tuffy's Ski Chalet Inc., Ruidoso, was incorporated here by Jim Lee Wilson Jr.


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

News 'N Notes

"Deck the Halls with Boughs of Holly", 'tis the season to be jolly," 'tis also the season to be thinking about buying or cut-ting the traditional Christmas tree.

The tradition of a decorated Christmas tree in the United States may date back to the Revolutionary War, when home-sick Hessian troops cut and decorated fir trees as was their German custom. Since then, the Christmas tree—with its forest fragrance and freshness—has come to represent the Yule season. It is the mainstay of both indoor and outdoor holiday de-corations.

Today, selecting the perfect Christmas tree is one of the highlights of many families' pre-holiday preparations. Choos-ing a tree that is "just right" for you will be easier if you know what species you are look-ing for, the different features that indicate a good tree, and how to select and maintain freshness.

A few simple procedures can make the selection of a "per-fect" Christmas tree easier. De-termine where in your home you will display your tree. With this in mind, you will be able to tell what height you will need and whether all four sides must be suitable for display. You should select a tree that is the right height for the space you have chosen for it. Cutting large portions off either end will alter the natural taper of the tree.

Freshness is an important key when selecting your tree. The needles should be resilient, but not brittle. Run your finger down a branch—the needles should adhere to each twig. Shake or bounce the tree on the ground lightly to see that the needles are firmly attached. If only a few drop off, the tree is fresh and with proper care should retain its freshness in-doors throughout the holiday season.

The limbs should be strong enough to hold ornaments and strings of electric lights and the tree should have a strong frag-rance and good green color for the species. Check the tree for freshness, cleanness, health, and trimming and be sure it dis-plays the best qualities for the particular species. Following these steps should insure a healthy, attractive tree, but the care of your tree does not stop here.

SOCIAL SECURITY

"Prior to the passage of the 1972 Amendments to the Social Security Act (signed into law last month), much publicity was given to the provision concern-ing the amount of widow's ben-efits. Mrs. Christine Graves, so-cial security field representa-tive stated today, "Under the old law, the maximum widow's benefit was 82½% of the amount of benefits her husband would have received had he lived to age 65 and retired. A widow who applied at age 62 or later received this 82½% amount. Under the new amend-ments, this amount will be in-creased to 100%, provided the widow didn't become entitled to benefits until she was 65.

"For the widow who original-ly started receiving benefits when she was 62, no increase is possible under the new law. Only those who received their first benefit for a month after their 62nd birthday will receive any increase. Benefits will range from the 82½% figure shown above to the 100% fig-ure, depending on which month between age 62 and 65 she first became entitled to widow's benefits.

"Any increase in benefits due will be automatic—no applica-tion nor inquiry should be made," Mrs. Graves stressed. "The first increased check pos-sible will be for the month of January, 1973."

Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the Council Room in the Ruidoso City Hall the second Wednesday of each month from 10 to noon and 1 to 2.

Mother's little helper.

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If you buy your tree several days before it will be set up and decorated, store it outside. Cut the butt of the tree at a diagonal about one inch above the original cut—this opens the pores and aids in the absorption of water. Place the butt end in a container of water.

When you bring it into the house, saw the butt again, squaring off the diagonal. This facilitates placing the tree in a stand as well as aiding absorp-tion.

Keep the butt end of the tree in a container of water the en-tire time it is in the house. Be-ll the container daily as the tree requires a lot of water. Sprinkling water on the branches and needles before you decorate the tree will help retain freshness.

Be sure that the base of the tree is well supported and the tree is placed away from fire-places, radiators, electric heat-ers, televisions or any other source of heat.

Open flames, such as lighted candles should never be used on or near the tree. In addition, never leave your home with the Christmas tree lights still on.

The longer the tree is in-doors, the more combustible it will become. Check electric light cords for fraying and worn spots that could easily lead to fires. Also do not overload the electric circuits and avoid placing electric toys directly un-der the tree. Be sure to avoid the use of combustible de-corations.

Following these cars and pre-

caution measures should insure an attractive tree that stays fresh indoors for more than a week and a holiday season free from Christmas tree mishaps.

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



The Poor Man's Weed Is Not So Poor

There is a little weed, or maybe we had better call it an herb, that grows practically all over North America. It is especially thick when the rains come after a drought. This little plant stands ready to spring into the job of covering bare spots on Mother

Repairman vs. Homeowner
Homeowners with grievances against repairmen are no novelty. But repairmen too have their grievances. If a plumber or a roofer or an electrician suffers an injury while working on your premises, you may well be held responsible in court.

In the lexicon of the law, a repairman is classified as a "business visitor." This means you owe a high degree of care for his safety. If he trips on a broken step or slips on a greasy floor, the fault — and the cost — is usually yours.

Take this case: An absent-minded homeowner, backing his car out of the garage, knocked the ladder out from under a painter working on his shingles. When the painter filed suit for damages, the court ordered the homeowner to pay up. This was no way, said the court, to treat a business visitor.

It is also true, of course, that the repairman himself has duties with regard to his safety. In particular, he should be alert to the kind of dangers that are common in his line of work.

A plasterer hired to patch a kitchen ceiling, had just gotten started when a chunk of plaster came crashing down on his head. He too tried to collect from the homeowner. But the court said this was the kind of danger a plasterer is supposed to foresee and avoid.

A similar ruling denied damages to a tree surgeon, injured when a dead limb collapsed beneath his weight.

A repairman may also be held to have "assumed the risk" of an accident if he uses your premises in an unauthorized manner. For example:

A painter, refinishing a house, hung his scaffolding from a gutter — without checking with the owner. While he was at work, the gutter suddenly pulled away from the wall,

So the other day I was by to see Henry and asked him if you could make tea out of the poor man's weed. Henry said,

"I think I have heard that you can make tea out of it, yes. If I am not mistaken, this would be a catnip tea — very good indeed. And now my Spanish friends tell me that this tea is a remarkably good medicine for many things, and also a blood tonic."

So the poor man's weed is not so poor after all.

Any of you who know something of other herbs that grow here around us, please pass it along.

Zip Numbers Urged In Holiday Mailing

Zip Coded addresses will help assure that holiday greetings arrive in the mails on time, Postmaster Badillo reminded residents here today. "Heavy mailings at year's end mean Zip numbers are particularly important," Badillo said. "The Postal Service is anxious to make certain that cards, letters and parcels arrive at their destination on time—and Zip

numbers are essential." Out-of-town mail is best sent air mail, he said. The mail should be posted before 4:00 p.m. in any mail box, or by 5:00 p.m. at the Main Post Office, and Hollywood Station. In-town mail, again including the Zip Code, should be mailed before 5:00 p.m., Badillo said. Residents may contact their nearest post office for Zip Code information. "In addition to outgoing Zip Codes, return addresses should

include the sender's Zip number," Mr. Badillo added. "We will supply mailers for the public with self-adhesive labels for handling mail 'Local' or 'Out of Town'."
