Airport Study Being Reviewed

The application master plan study, for the Sierra Blanca Airport Development Committee project, is being reviewed by the Federal Aviation Administration in Washington, D. C., the FAA office in Albuquerque told The Ruidoso News Monday.

It is anticipated the final grant offer will be received early in June to initiate the study by mid-June. Among the 14 study elements will be the site selection.

The Southeast New Mexico Economic Development District will administer the study, which is being financed with \$40,000 FAA and \$20,000 State Aviation

Board funds.

The SENMEDD will make recommendations to the sponsors, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitán, Lincoln County and the Mescalero Apache Tribe, at the completion of the study.

Several sites are under consideration but no action can be taken until approval of the master plan study by the FAA.

A Few More Seats Available for Chamber Banquet

It was announced this week by the Post Commander, Ray Crawford. The nominating committee will present a slate of new officers for 1974-75 and installation of new officers will be conducted by George P. White, District 5 Commander.

The Auxiliary will meet at the same time and will also have election of new officers and installation.

Fire Conditions Critical for Lincoln Forest

Lincoln National Forest Officials warned that fire danger remains critical in spite of scattered showers during the week. Ruidoso Ranger Station reported no precipitation. Mayhill received only .02 inches of moisture, while a trace was recorded at Cloudcroft. Thursday's fire danger was high, and it is predicted that very high to extreme conditions will once again exist by the weekend.

Lands of the Sacramento Division remain closed to public entry, while other areas of the Lincoln National Forest are open to use with fires and smoking restricted to designated campgrounds.

Fire Control Officer Larry Allen reports that numerous violations of the Regional Forester's closure order are still occurring, especially in the foothills near Alamogordo. Intensive patrols of the closed area continue both by ground vehicles and aircraft. To date seventeen citations have been issued to persons discovered in the closed area. All cases have been referred to the U. S. Magistrate in Alamogordo for action. Violation of a Forest Closure is contrary to the U. S. Code of Federal Regulations and punishable by fine.

Not in recent years has a jockey dominated the riding scene at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park the way Willie Lovell has done.

Since the start of the 1970 Sunland season, Lovell has ridden off with four riding championships.

And when the '74 Ruidoso season kicks off on Saturday, May 18, Lovell will be aiming for his third straight title at the mountain track. In 1971, Lovell scored a very respectable 68 wins, but had to settle for second behind Larry Byers in the jockey derby.

In '72, Lovell soared up to 83 wins and outdistanced Jerry

Nicodemus by 10 notches. Last year, it took a photo-finish to decide the winner. But Lovell again overcame Nicodemus, getting the crown by a slim 68-66 margin.

And while Lovell's been racking up title after title, he's also been banking plenty of cash for his owners. Last year, Lovell was ranked as the ninth leading quarter horse jockey in the nation. Horses ridden by him earned purses totaling \$290,678.

But for Lovell, who was born and reared in Dale, Texas, things haven't always been so rosy.

Trustees Name Sanchez to Head BB Department

The Ruidoso Municipal School Board, at a special meeting held last Tuesday evening, voted to name Thurman Sanchez as head basketball coach for the high school and re-hired one other teacher whose contract had been held for further study.

The proposed budget for 1974-75 was presented by Superintendent Pat Valliant, and after an item by item vote, passed by a three to one vote. The dissenting vote was cast by Dan Griffith, who noted that his reasons for voting against the budget were the 2 1/2 mill levy that was

ceded from the villages and the budget had not been well prepared to advance the academic program. The budget grand total reached \$1,308,213 this year as compared to \$1,080,166 for last year. The budget was prepared on a basis of 1125 students for the coming year and without Johnson-O'Malley funds, which have not as yet been contracted for. The Johnson-O'Malley funds, which are for Indian students, should amount to about \$29,490, and will probably be added to the budget at a later date.

The number of students enrolled at the end of 180 days was 1071 with the high reached at the end of 40 days with 1125, which was used as a basis for this year's budget. The budget hearing, with state officials, has been set for May 22, 2:30 p.m. at the Chaparral Motor Hotel.

The board held a discussion concerning the employment of a choral teacher for all three schools and Valliant noted that the item would be on the agenda of the next regular meet.

A schedule for high school classes was presented for the 1974-75 year and was approved by the board. The split lunch period for the high school will be discontinued next year.

The next regular meeting of the board will be held May 14, 8 p.m. in the administrative offices of the school. Meetings are open to the public.

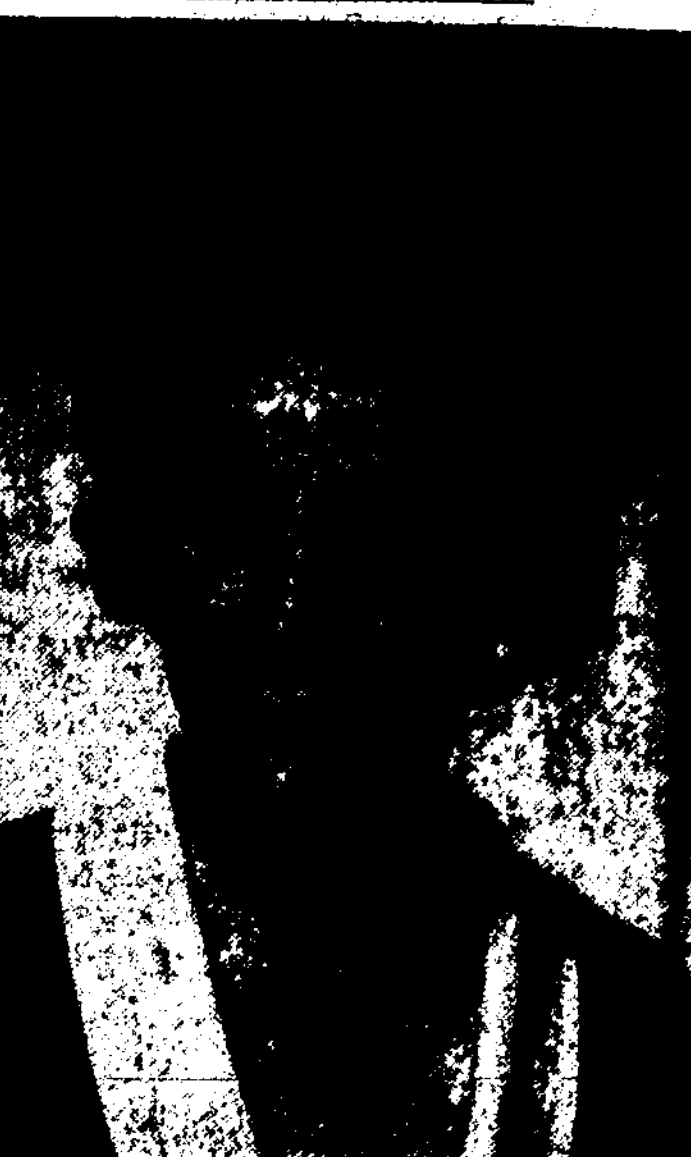

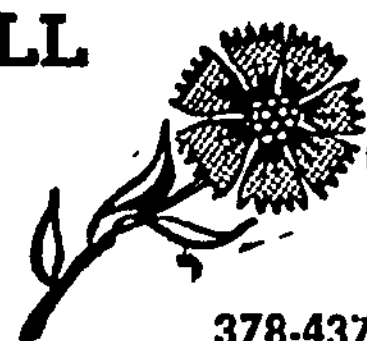

In Passing..

We had promised to attempt to obtain figures on the village levies that were ceded to the schools, and after considerable effort, we have come up with some figures that may clarify the levy. The state of New Mexico sets a 20 mill limit on taxation for counties — this includes state, county, village and school. At the present time, the levies go as follows: state, 5 mills; county, 5 mills; school, 5 mills and the remaining 5 mills is split into two 2 1/2 mill levies that go the villages (collected within the village limits) and county. The 1/2 mill levy that is left over goes for hospitals, conservation and such. At the present time, those living within the village pay the full 20 mill levy, but those living outside the village pay 17 1/2 mills. If the ceding of the levy remains as passed, both those within and outside the village will pay the full 20 mills. The 2 1/2 mills from outside would go to the school district. We don't know if the levy is just, but at least now you have something to go on. The 20 mill levy does not include taxes paid for retirement of bonds or interest on the bonds.

Mobile Home Law To Be Enforced

Acting Commissioner, Brad L. Hays announced that effective April 10, 1974 the Enforcement Division of the Motor Transportation Department began actively enforcing Senate Bill 47 as passed by the 1974 New Mexico legislature with the emergency clause. Such law being Section 64-23-22, "Permits for Excessive Size and Weight — Special Notification Required on Movement of Mobile Homes."

"It is very important that the general public be aware of this change in the law to avert costly detainment of their mobile homes," Hays noted.

(1) All property taxes due on the mobile home for the current tax year or past years have been paid; or

Briefly the law states that if the movement of a mobile home originates in the State of New Mexico, no permit issued by the Motor Transportation Department is valid nor shall any mobile home be moved under such a permit until the owner of the mobile home or his authorized agent obtains and attaches to the permit a Certificate from the County Assessor or County Treasurer of the County in which the mobile home exists for the current tax year or any past tax years.

The Motor Transportation Department will continue to issue oversize permits in the usual manner. Any questions pertaining to the movement of a mobile home can be answered promptly by writing or calling the Motor Transportation Department (505) 827-2052.

Hays commented: "Even though we anticipate a number of enforcement problems, we feel it was the intent of the legislature to implement the law immediately. We will work closely with County officials in

the coming weeks for as smooth a transition as possible."

Failure to comply with this law will result in issuance of citation and detainment of movement.

Socialized Medicine

Socialized Medicine is here! Congress is now in the process of passing a bill that would, for all practical purposes, give us socialized medicine under the guise of "health care" to be administered by the Social Security Department. You won't hear it called socialized medicine because we have not as yet become so liberal that we will readily accept such a term — but you can bet that it is just that. With the federal government's fantastic success at running other people's business, we are quite sure that this new experiment will prove just as successful as price controls, the Vietnam war and the poverty program.

We can just imagine what our founding fathers would think if they could see us today with all our federal programs and controls. They seemed to think pretty highly of the free enterprise system and strict curbs on federal powers — as were set forth in the Constitution — but we have reached a point where the Constitution is either warped to meet the liberal view or entirely ignored.

You may want to be completely regimented from the cradle to the grave but I still like to make a few decisions on my own. With the mess that now comes out of Washington, I doubt seriously if there remains in that city one man capable of making a rational decision — and it looks as though most of our government people are attempting to completely destroy our confidence.

With federal agencies now controlling much of the railroad system (Amtrak), our merchant marine fleet (millions spent on freighters and tankers), and tremendous amounts spent on subsidies for the airlines, we feel that creeping socialism has crept far enough. Perhaps we should try the free enterprise system again.

Junior Riders Open Season at Capitan

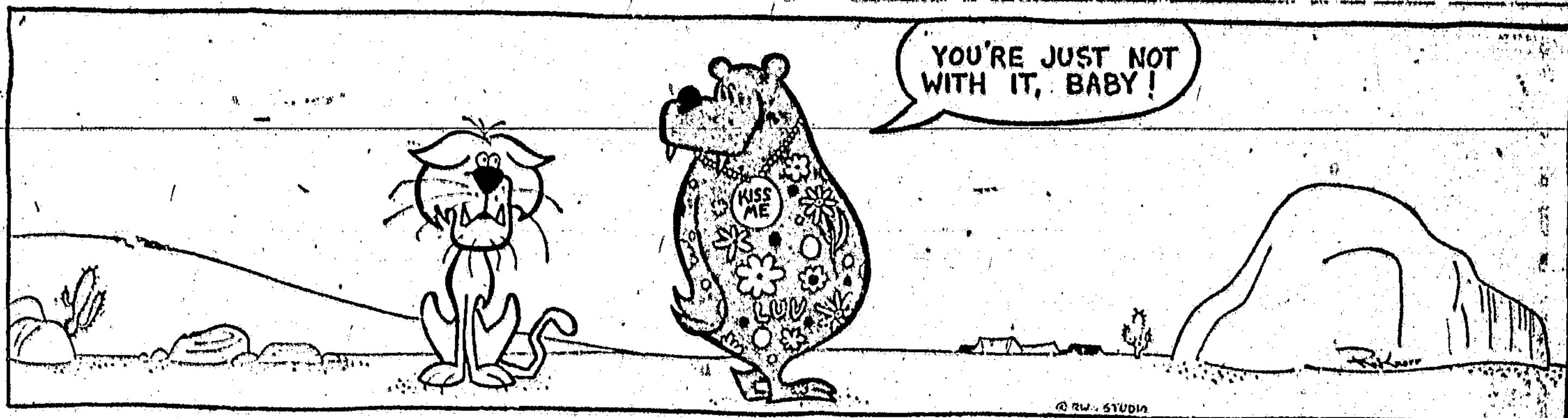

Motel and Your Car
Melvin's restful night at a motel came to a jarring end when he looked out the window in the morning. His car, which he had parked just outside the room, had disappeared. In fact, he never saw it again.
In due course, he tried to collect reimbursement from the management of the motel.
"It was their guest," he argued in a court hearing, "and my car was on their premises. Therefore, they are legally liable for the loss."
However, the court tossed out Melvin's claim. The court said his argument did not stand

up because he had never turned over possession of the car to the management. He had parked the car himself and kept the keys in his pocket.
It is true that motels — and hotels as well — bear a substantial responsibility for the property of their guests. This rule dates all the way back to the Middle Ages in England, when inns were considered a kind of safety zone for the travelling public.
But the rule does not go into effect until the property has been transferred to the possession of the management. In the case of automobiles, possession is ordinarily transferred when the guest surrenders his keys to a company employee.

The exact moment of transfer may become crucial. One woman left her car at the entrance to a hotel and went in to register. When the bellboy asked her for the keys, she replied that she had left them in the ignition.
Shortly afterward, a thief slipped into the car and made off with it.
Had the woman delivered possession of her car to the hotel management, making it responsible for her loss?
A court said yes, even though the keys had never been physically handed over to the bellboy. The court said the woman's words had given him the right to take possession of the car — and along with the right went the responsibility.

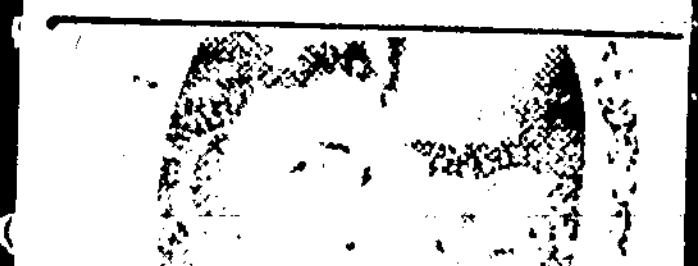

County Agent's Column

If you are having insect problems, get extension publication 400-J16 "Home and Garden Insect Control Guide" from the County Extension Office in the courthouse at Carrizozo. It gives insect control recommendations for most garden crops.

Select a pesticide that fits your needs from the chart in the publication. By using the right dosage of the proper chemical and by waiting the recommended time between the last application and harvest, you should get adequate control and avoid harmful residues on your vegetables.

R-R-D

The elm leaf beetle was found in this area last year. It is a serious pest of elm trees, especially Chinese elms — often called Chinese elms — through the area. Elm leaf beetles not only defoliate elm trees, but they can become serious nuisances in homes in the spring and fall. The adult beetles and the larvae feed only on elm leaves. The adult becomes a nuisance in homes when they seek a place to hibernate in the fall and when they come out of hibernation in the spring.

Both the adult and larvae feed on elm leaves. They eat the surface of the leaves, leaving the veins. The skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall. Their damage weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to borers that attack elms.

Sevin (carbaryl) gives good control of adults and larvae on elm leaves and is also effective against fall webworm and spiny elm caterpillar. The major problem is complete coverage of infested trees. This requires a high pressure, high volume sprayer. The elm leaf beetle has from three to five generations per year and will require repeated spray applications. Also any trees in the area that are not sprayed can reinfest from 58 to 82 cents per clean pound at the wool sales in Roswell recently. The majority of the sales were from 70 to 75 cents per grease pound. The sales were on a generally weaker trend toward the end of the sale. The buyers seemed to have more orders for fine wool than the coarser wools.

R-R-D

I visited a few orchards in the Hondo Valley recently. A good crop of Golden Delicious and Jonathans is anticipated but the Red Delicious crop is expected to be light. Although the other elm trees.

R-R-D

Start Apple and Pear Protection Now: Worms ruin many home-grown apples, pears, crab apples and quince because very few home gardeners know how or when to spray their fruit trees. Many gardeners that do know when to use and how and when to spray are still unable to protect their fruit from worms because they don't have adequate equipment that will properly spray their trees.

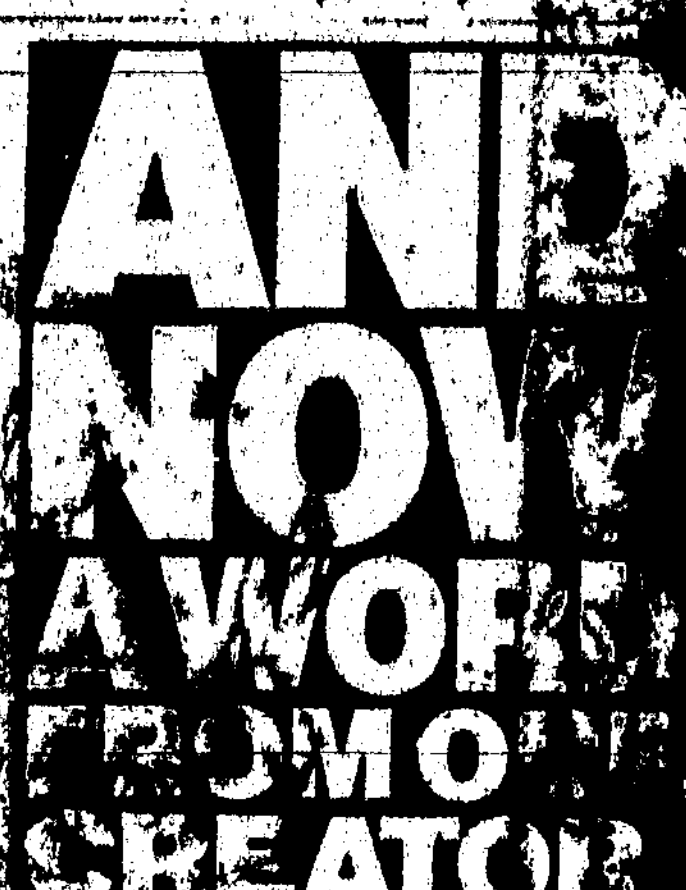
First, gardeners must realize that the worms come from a very small brown and gray moth called a codling moth. There are generally three moth flights each summer. During these flights, the codling moths lay the eggs that produce the worms that infest apples, pears, quince and crab apples. It takes two thorough sprayings with a good worm control chemical for each of the three moth flights. A trade-name "fruit tree spray" or Spectraide (Diazinon) should be used. The first moth flight begins in late April and early May and continues until about the first week in June. Therefore, trees should be thoroughly sprayed sometime between May 10 and May 20. A second spray needs to be applied two weeks after the first spray or about May 25 to June 10. Apply the spray as a fine mist and wet all fruit, leaf and bark surfaces.

The second flight of moths occurs in late June and continues until the end of July. To protect fruit from this generation of worms, two more sprays should be applied — one between June 25 and July 10 and another between July 15 and July 30. These four sprays for worm control should protect summer apples and early maturing pears. A third flight of moths occurs in mid-August. Therefore, late ripening fruit often needs a fifth and sixth spray. The fifth spray should be applied about two weeks after the fourth spray and then a sixth spray two weeks after the fifth. Before applying any worm control sprays, you should examine trees thoroughly for spider mites. If a mite infestation can be found, it may be necessary to make two applications of the worm control spray five to seven days apart or a mite control chemical such as Kelthane or chlorobenzilate should be added to the worm control spray to give added mite control.

R-R-D

Ruidosoans Participate in Emergency Course

Health professionals and rescue workers from around the state began a special two-week course on the latest in emergency treatment techniques, Monday, May 6, in Santa Fe. The course is sponsored and taught by the New Mexico Regional Medical Program's (NMRMP) Emergency Health Services and will be at St. Vincent's Hospital. The NMRMP instructors for the sessions are Bob Cook and Al Apodaca, both professional instructors in emergency courses.

Among the 17 students in the course is Denny Grover, Professional Patrol Instructor with the National Ski Patrol in Ruidoso.

The course is known as the 81-hour Dunlap curriculum and it offers the most up-to-date emergency health training available. The classes include instruction with actual emergency equipment as well as models and simulated equipment. Students spend 71 hours in class improving their medical skills and will then spend 10 hours in the medical units of St. Vincent's.

During the clinical portion of the training, each of the students receives instruction in five areas of the hospital. These include the emergency room, obstetrics clinic, psychiatric ward and the surgical and intensive care units.

Upon completion of the course, each participant will be certified by NMRMP and the University of New Mexico School of Medicine. He also will receive an advanced first aid and emergency medical care card from the American National Red Cross.

NMRMP is one of 53 regional medical programs in the country and operates entirely within New Mexico to work towards making health care better, more accessible and less costly to the people of the state. NMRMP is a federally funded agency and is active in poison control, health education, community health development and other areas. Its Emergency Health Service project has trained nearly 1,000 people in the state to work as rescue technicians in an ever-growing network designed to help save lives in New Mexico.

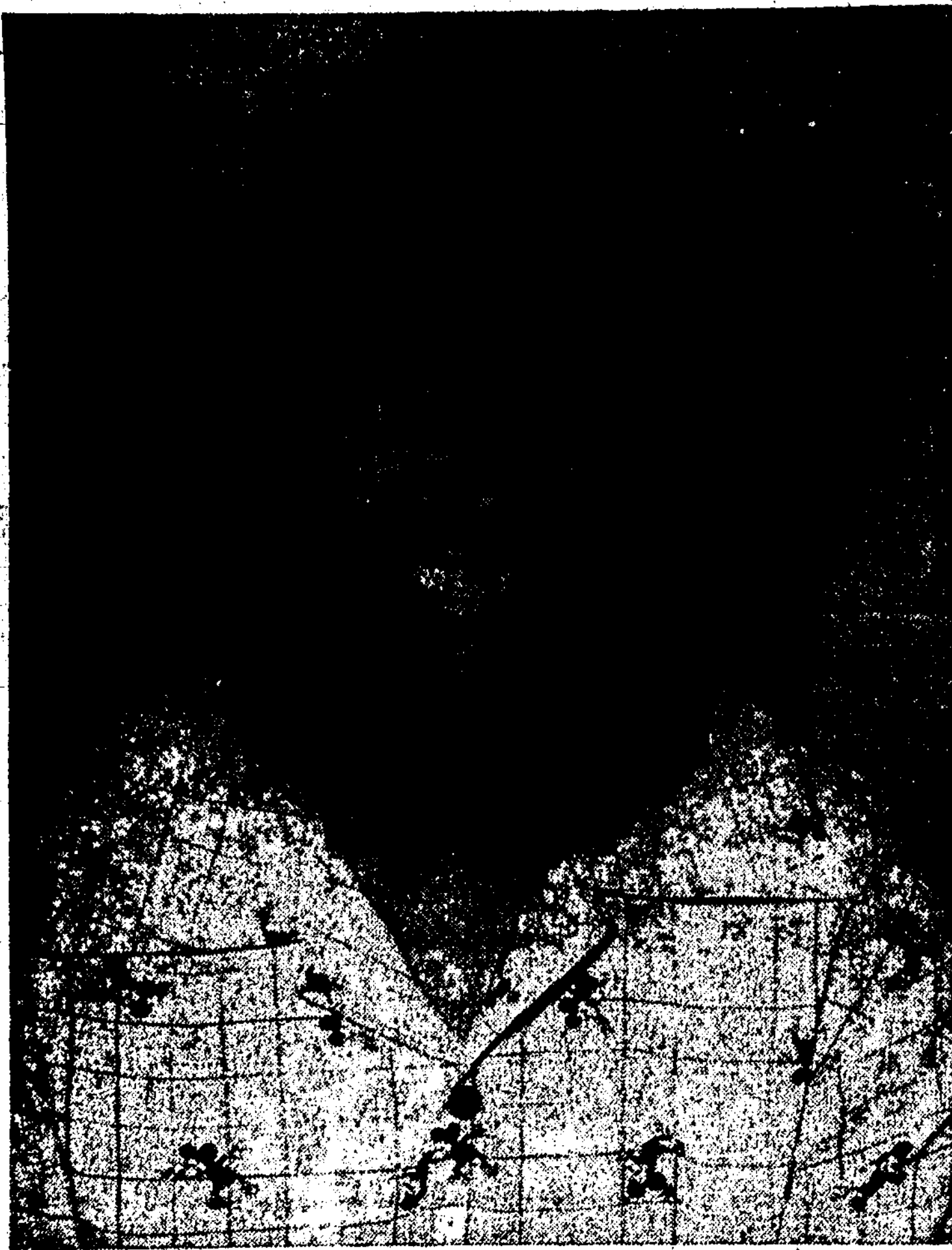

County Arts Assn. to Reorganize

Responding to an announcement in last week's Ruidoso News, the Roswell Daily Record and the local radio media, a large group of area residents interested in reorganizing the Arts Association attended a meeting in Ruidoso to listen to guest speaker Mr. John E. Wyant, Executive Director of the New Mexico Arts Commission.

Mr. Wyant spoke of the basic needs for forming an Arts Association and how the state can aid the association once it has been set up and programs formed. The group was advised of the different funds available to art groups as well as special grants available.

While visiting with the group, area artists, Mr. Wyant asked for and received several paintings and other works of art to take back to Santa Fe for display in the Capitol Building. This program of displaying the work of New Mexico artists has been renewed and has proven to be a successful means whereby artists have their work viewed by the thousands of tourists and New Mexico residents that go through the Capitol Building. The artists exhibiting are asked to leave their work in the Capitol for at least one year and are allowed to put a price on their work as well as exhibit an article of the artist's background with the work of art. ly giving the Arts Commission at least 24 hours notice. The Lincoln County Arts Association has existed in the Ruidoso area for the past ten years but has been rather inactive since 1967. At one time, the association had one hundred twenty-five local, New Mexico and out-of-state members.

The Association was active in promoting local art shows, field trips for artists, classes, promoted civic activities and was the sponsor of the First Southwest Arts Symposium in the spring of 1967. It is the intention of this group of artists motivated individuals to again get the association operating and the purpose of such organization can only be made clear to the interested public thru a quote from the New Mexico Arts Commissions Council, as follows:

"We hope the association can be created because many thoughtful and responsible citizens believe the arts are important to the aesthetic and intellectual well being of our community and its members. We also believe that a dynamic cultural atmosphere can be of economic value to this area by giving it vitality as a market place, by attracting industry and enterprise and by appealing to prospective residents."

Ten Speed Shift

Easter has come and gone. And with it, a very interesting bicycle trip is now history. I mentioned earlier that I would provide you ardent followers of this column with a log of that three-day excursion. But the warming weather has caused me to preempt that article with one of more current importance. Therefore, I will return at a later date with an article or two about touring. Now, let's get down to business and discuss some safety.

The year was 1880 when the League of American Wheelmen formed to improve riding conditions in America. It was this group that was the force which caused the U. S. government to build a roadway system here in the U. S. (sorry 'bout that Triple A). And when these roads were built, the automobile bit into the asphalt with a grip which has never been loosened. As a result, those vehicles which were secondary users, have run us cyclists (motor and bi-ally) into the ground. Literally. We are now the subservient creatures of the highway.

The bicycle is a sharer of the open road and as such, he is responsible for his actions as he would be if driving a car. Riding a bicycle does not give you the privilege of not stopping at red lights; or to ride on the left; or of turning without proper signals; or of passing a moving vehicle (same direction) on the right; or of violating any other

law that applies to automobiles. The implications are severe and justifiably so. An officer of the law has a right and an obligation to ticket recklessness. I have been stopped on three occasions for violating three different auto laws while riding my bicycle. Each case I was thankful for because the situation was potentially dangerous.

As I look at the situation I see definite inequality. My bike and I weigh 215 pounds. The average automobile weighs about three thousand pounds. Thus, I would say the car has the weight advantage in the event of a collision due to simple inertia. Please correct me if you note an error in my observation because there are times when revenge would be sweet.

Now, bicyclists are getting the short end of the weight stick so it appears we have to lengthen it somehow. What can be done? Read on.

The first and probably the most important task any cyclist can perform is that of maintaining excellent operational order of the bike. I did not say good or very good but rather, excellent. In Ruidoso it is absolutely essential that all components are in top working condition because of the severe terrain. A bicycle which has adequate stopping power in downtown Tulsa may not be capable of stopping coming down Alto Hill. There is absolutely nothing extenuating on the basic ten-speed, so everything from the air pressure in the tires to the brake adjustment is critical.

Secondly, all rules of the road should be followed. You may be in a hurry to get to your destination when you come to the one and only red light in town and fail to stop — you may nevertheless reach your destination.

You may also ask, "Isn't it better to ride facing traffic?"

Would you drive the wrong way down a one-way street? Besides, in the event of a collision from the rear (which is extremely rare), the impact force is the difference of the speeds of the vehicles whereas the impact force in a head-on is the sum of the two speeds. It can mean the difference between life and death.

The third consideration is for you night owls. If your bike is not equipped with lights front and rear (the state law requires that all bicycles have a front light visible from 500 feet and a rear reflector visible from a minimum of 50 feet), do not ride at night. Your chance of getting hit at night increases about two million percent. If you must ride at night the best bike-mounted lighting system I've found is the Schwinn Super Sport for ten dollars. If you use it for one minute on the road, it has paid for itself.

How you dress is important

also. A fourth point to consider is to try and wear light or bright colored clothing as much as possible. Wearing a light shirt with dark trim helps tremendously.

The fifth point. Do not ride double on a bicycle designed to seat one. That's like killing two birds with one car.

Usually those things which we like to do most are the things we should not do at all. Therefore, point six is do not ride "hands off". That's akin to riding with your brain a little off because you have decreased your control by 99 percent not to mention that it is illegal.

Of these points mentioned, only point four is not covered by New Mexico State Law. If you are found guilty of violating any of the other considerations by an officer of the law, you may be in the state prison for up to one year (if you are under age, your parents can be held liable according to a state provision set forth in 1953). Indeed, this is the maximum penalty but I believe it demonstrates the seriousness of biking safety.

Bicycle riding is serious business. Play foolishly and you will pay dearly; enjoy with respect and you will live — not regret.

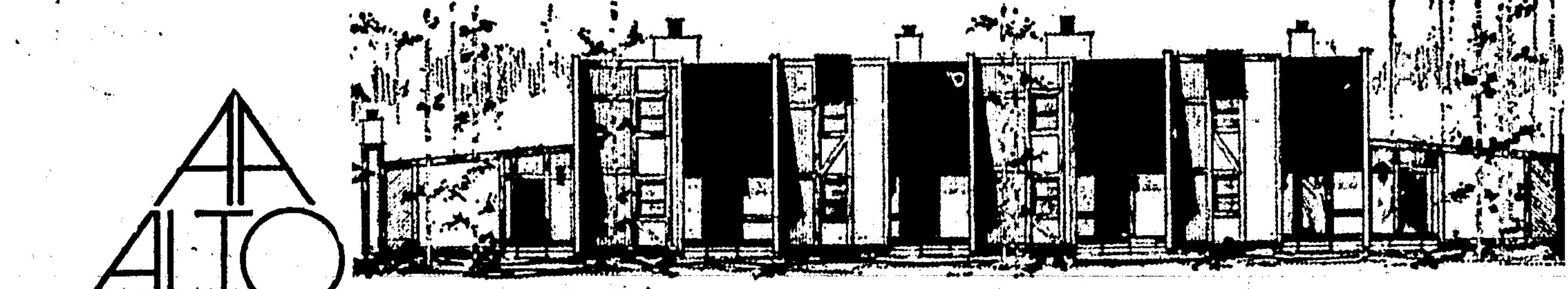

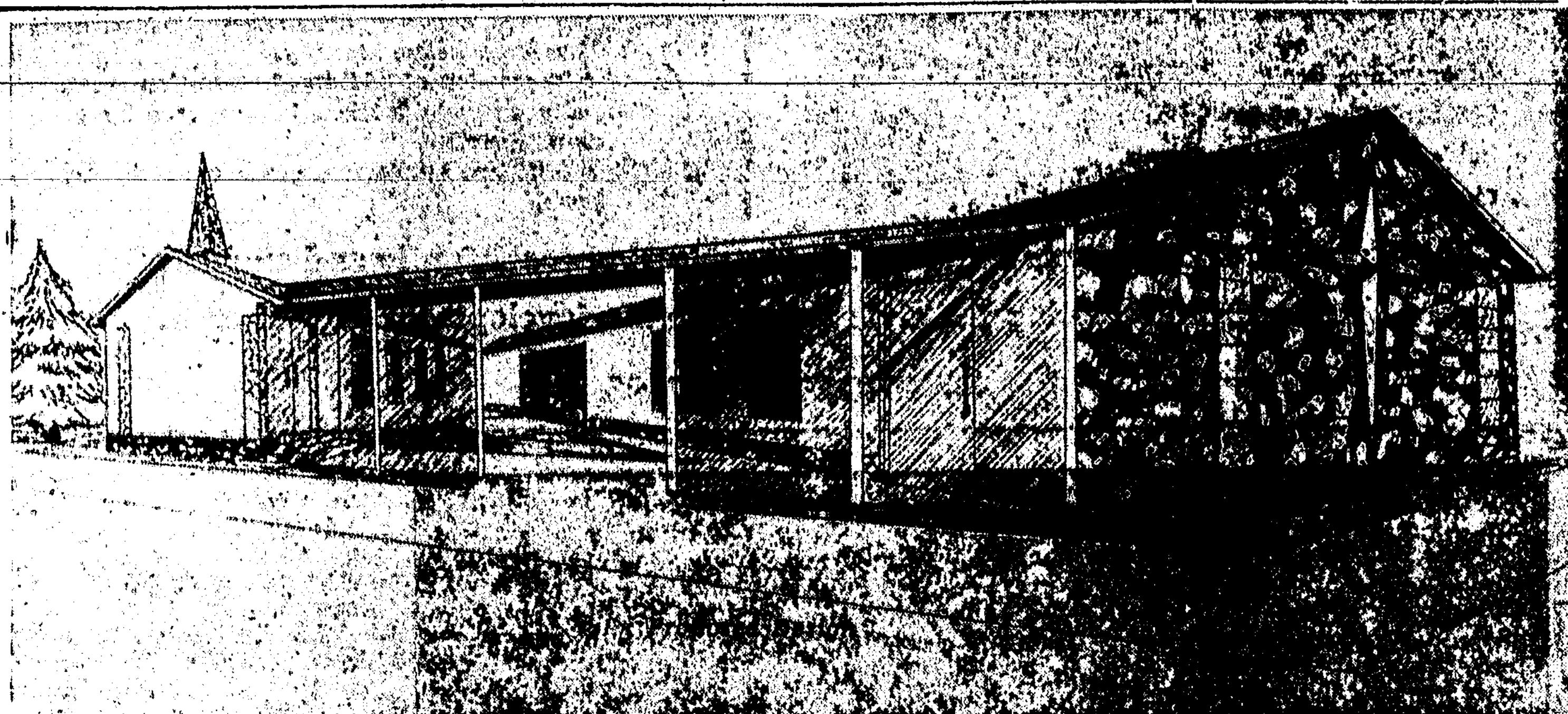

Carrizozo Man Named To Advisory Board

Two members of the New Mexico Multiple-Use Advisory Board have been named by Secretary of the Interior Rogers C. B. Morton to represent natural resource interests of their areas on the Bureau of Land Management's National Advisory Board Council.

The Council are E. P. Harvey, Carrizozo area rancher, livestock representative; and Paige Christiansen, Socorro, wildlife representative. Dr. Christiansen also will represent Arizona wildlife interests this year, in a system of alternating wildlife representatives between New Mexico and Arizona every other year.

The National Advisory Board Council is a public advisory

committee which provides counsel to the Secretary of the Interior and the Bureau of Land Management on the administration of more than 450 million acres of national resource land. It will meet at Los Angeles, Calif., May 18, 19 and 20.

The Board was recently reorganized to conform with the new Federal Advisory Committee Act. The number of Board members was reduced from 42 to 36 with broader and more balanced representation. Representatives have been added to the council in areas of oil and gas, environmental quality, outdoor recreation, state government and public utilities.

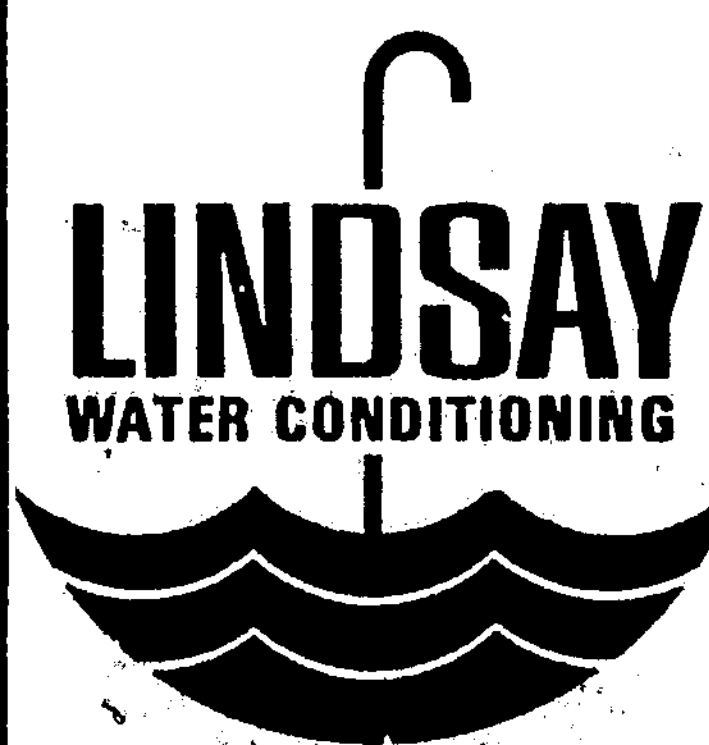

THE PICTURE OF HEALTH

Early Signs of Heart Attack

You could be stricken with a heart attack quickly, quietly, and without any real warning of what is happening. Can you recognize the early signs of heart attack? It is important because it is essential that you get medical attention as soon as a heart attack begins.

Statistics show that 70 per cent of the people who have heart attacks die before they get to the hospital. Most of these deaths happen because people don't recognize the early heart attack signs. Only eight per cent of heart attack victims die after they get to the hospital.

The most important sign of heart attack is unexplained chest pain. This is any pain that you have never felt before above the waist, in the neck, shoulder, arm or chest. It is usually, but not always, persistent and moderately severe. It is often confused with a muscle strain or heart burn and might be ignored. Nausea, vomiting, or sweating may also accompany the pain.

People who are more likely to have heart attacks usually have one or more of the following things in common which make them "high risk". They are physically inactive, smoke cigarettes, have high blood pressure, have diabetes, have abnormal blood fats, are obese, or have close relatives with coronary heart disease.

What is a heart attack? A heart attack results when the blood flow to a part of the heart has been cut off because of a blood clot or a clogged or collapsed artery. The heart muscle itself starts to die when this happens, and it is the loss of blood, flow and oxygen that causes the pain.

Once a heart attack starts, your heart can no longer pump blood throughout your body the way it should. The circulatory (blood carrying) system also cannot work efficiently. Your heart may beat very irregularly, the pain may continue, and it can become hard to breathe.

There are several things you can do to prevent heart attacks. It helps if you watch your diet, reduce calories and fats, and keep your weight normal for your height. Regular exercise and not smoking also cut the risk of heart attack, as does reducing emotional tension and

stress as much as possible. Regular checkups by your doctor or at your clinic also are important. For people who are "high risks", checkups should also include tests for blood sugar and fats, and a test on how the "electrical system" of the heart is working.

If you think that you or someone in your family is having a heart attack, remember that time is important for successful treatment. Go to an emergency room or clinic immediately rather than waiting for your doctor. Personnel at the hospital or clinic can locate your doctor for you.

ALBUQUERQUE — Can Sen. Odie Echols of Clovis mount a charge that will overtake Sens. Tibo Chavez of Belen and Jerry Apodaca of Las Cruces in the final four weeks of the Democratic gubernatorial campaign?

Who will U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya bless in the 6-man race? Can Apodaca sustain his momentum built up over nine months of campaigning? Has Sen. Chavez reached a plateau and headed downward?

These are key questions bearing directly on the outcome of the Democratic governor's race as contenders crisscross New Mexico.

Sen. Chavez attracted 528 to a \$50-a-plate fundraising dinner that netted about \$20,000 at Albuquerque for his campaign. Gov. Bruce King, Tibo's top supporter, delivered a ringing, detailed endorsement of his longtime political friend.

Tibo told his admirers: "There is no commitment between me and Gov. King. The only bond between us is friendship." King told Chavez supporters he insists that state employees not engage in on-the-job political activity.

The governor said he has worked hard to strengthen the state personnel system. Rio Arriba County Democratic Chairman Emilio Naranjo endorsed Tibo. A series of labor leaders and Chavez campaign county coordinators added warm words of Tibo.

Five King-appointed state board members or department directors attended the overflow dinner. Tibo called again for bringing together all New Mexico residents in a team effort to move the state forward. Mack Easley of Hobbs, Tibo's state campaign committee chairman, was master of ceremonies.

In Chavez County, rancher Joe Skeen of Picacho, Lincoln County, will win a big margin in the Republican governor primary. Skeen was born in Roswell.

Bobby Mayfield, Echols and Chavez are Chavez County leaders in the Democratic governor primary. Chavez County Democrats are reviving after 10 years of Republican domination.

U. S. Sen. Joe Montoya told the New Mexico Association of Counties at Albuquerque: "It began to be clear that for the Nixon administration revenue sharing meant not so much tax-cutting as tax-shifting."

Montoya said a survey of state, county and city officials at the end of 1973 showed: "All of those questioned supported the original concept of general revenue sharing, the idea that new money would be sent back to help the beleaguered local official."

"But all opposed the reduction of the federal social programs, forcing local tax dollars to replace federal tax dollars," Sen. Montoya told the AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education (COPE) at Albuquerque it should endorse candidates who would work to curb inflation, control interest rates and reduce unemployment.

Sen. Montoya has long been closely allied with organized labor. Lively primary races are under way in House District 50 (Guadalupe - Torrance - DeBaca - Lincoln Counties). In the Democratic primary former Rep. Isidro (Sid) Romero, Pastura bar owner, and Donald William Rawhouser, Ruidoso, are matched.

Romero, a House member in 1961-66, is favored in the primary. In the Republican primary Rep. John F. Bigbee, Encino rancher, faces J. James Sanchez, San Pablico, a teacher.

Bigbee, a conservative, is completing his third House term. He was a 1969 constitutional convention delegate. Rep. Bigbee is favored to win re-election in the far-flung House district.

Texas Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes is a co-owner of a Texas firm that is building new motels in Santa Rosa and Taos. The Santa Rosa motel is set for opening July 1. The Taos motel is closer to completion.

Skeen called for a governor who can operate a performance-oriented administration.

Carlsbad Caverns Spring Schedule Told

Park Superintendent Donald Dayton has announced that new visitor hours will go into effect at Carlsbad Caverns National Park on Sunday, May 12. Beginning on that date and continuing until the full summer schedule begins on June 9, the park visitor center will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 6:00 p.m. daily. Trips through the main cavern are offered continuously between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. for those walking in through the cavern's natural entrance, and from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for those entering the cavern by elevator. Guided lantern trips into primitive New Cave, located 23 miles from the park visitor center near the entrance to Slaughter Canyon, will also be offered four times daily on the spring schedule. Reservations are required for the primitive lantern tours, which are designed for more adventurous and hardy visitors. Departure times from the entrance to New Cave are 9:30 a.m., 10:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. Visitors must allow sufficient time for travel to Slaughter Canyon, and for the 1 1/4 mile hike to the cave before departure times. Telephone (505) 785-2233 for reservations.

The park entrance fee is \$5.00 per carload for private non-commercial vehicles, or \$1.00 per person for commercial bus passengers. Annual Golden Eagle and Golden Age passports are also honored at the park.

RUIDOSO IS WHERE IT'S AT

— junk, trash, litter, shacks, mobile home jungles, dead automobiles, desecrated hillslides, amateur planning, zoning mistakes and poor construction, yes, we have it all right here. While some choose to call it the Playground of the Southwest, I think that it is New Mexico's largest wrecking yard. One would think that there is no town dump from the appearance of our driveways and yards.

But before I continue on this tirade let me say that Ruidoso could be the finest and most beautiful place in this end of the whole world — providing that we can come to our senses before it's too late. And, I will not have to stand alone on this subject — even the school children of our community feel as strongly as I as evidenced by their recent village tours and letters to the editor of this fine newspaper.

Before you openly disagree with my pronouncement take a drive thru Paradise Canyon, thru Carrizo Canyon, at the trash heaped against some of our downtown business buildings, at the jillions of garbage cans not hidden from view, at the hundreds of unscreened heating-fuel tanks, at the acres and acres of weed patches next door to your home and to mine, at the multitude of mobile homes placed wherever it was easiest to set them, at the numerous tarpaper and bailing wire shacks, at the many conflicting land uses, where homes and businesses are built side by side, at the thousands of signboards that confuse the environment, and at the general ugliness created by so many who don't seem to care.

But blame is at this point unimportant. A monstrous blight has happened in our otherwise beautiful community — and this beautiful community is running out of control. What is now important is that we will honestly do something about correcting the situation. In an endeavor of this consequence and magnitude the help of every single resident is imperative — not just the real estate people, the Woman's Club, and the school kids. Bless them for their efforts and for their foresight — but it will take all of us to straighten out this gigantic mess. And it is not a question of whether or not Ruidoso is going to grow, because it definitely will. So the question really is how it is going to grow. With enough public apathy we may be on the threshold of living in the biggest junkyard in the whole country.

But assuming that you want to stop the mess before it goes any further and wish for our proper growth then following are the things that must be done — and done as quickly as possible:

1. Our recently reconstituted village council should procure a workable master plan even as a major expenditure. Such a plan, carefully implemented by the planning commission and the council, will prevent the planning catastrophes that are happening here almost every day due to the lack of such a plan.

2. The council should review the many construction code deficiencies (on a crash program) and enact an up to the minute code requirement that will prevent much of the junk presently being erected. And, in this process, don't pay too much attention to the herds of unlicensed builders as they have little to contribute. It is high time to encourage quality — we have had too much already of the other.

3. The council must review current building permit methods and strengthen the requirements unmercifully for plan reviews, inspection requirements, and fee basis. Mr. Chuck Brown performs an excellent job for our village, but he should be assisted by at least two or three more people to insure that the interests of the public are adequately protected.

4. The mobile home restrictions presently being studied by the council should be approved on an interim basis until they can be still further strengthened. Incidentally, there is nothing wrong with a mobile home or mobile home park providing that they are well positioned with respect to property lines, are well foundationed,

and present an appearance that meets environmental and code requirements.

5. The council should be very cautious about accepting new subdivisions until the subdivision has satisfied every existing requirement, and until it is proven that adequate services are available to the public who may buy such property. As a matter of fact, existing subdivision requirements are exceedingly marginal. In my opinion these requirements should be drastically increased in favor of the community.

6. The council should withhold on new subdivisions even on the granting of building permits for tomorrow's projects until it can be established that there is adequate water, power, sewage or septic facilities, and police and fire services to support the new subdivision and/or permits.

7. Residents who plan to build a new residence or an addition of any sort should have a plan developed that assures that the construction meets community standards thru the building permit system, and further that the proposed construction enhances the building site, the neighborhood, and the community.

8. The village needs an ordinance that will permit the cleanup of eyesore properties to be paid for by the property owner. There is really nothing very strange about this proposal as many cities in New Mexico have such laws already operating. Provide strong enforcement for the "clean up" ordinance.

9. Property owners should examine their property to make certain that it is clean and that it presents a "taken care of" appearance. Owners of particularly rundown or very old structures should carefully consider the real value of such facilities and whether remodeling or replacement is economically feasible. Your real estate people can be very helpful in such considerations of highest and best land use.

10. Finally, every man, woman, and child resident should acquire the stature of a vigilante in establishing and protecting the appearance of the community. You can assume that this is a transient resort community if you wish, but for many or even most of us it is our home — and we hope that it doesn't always have to look like a junkyard. Be willing to call to the attention of the property owner the following kinds of problems that annoy you and interfere with the good housekeeping of the area:

a. The sign that is no longer appropriate, that needs removal, repair, or repainting.

b. The old or wrecked car that belongs in the salvage yard instead of on the front lawn or driveway.

c. The weed patch that is both unsightly and hazardous.

d. The pile of firewood that should be neatly stacked.

e. The accumulation of trash or storage which looks so ugly next to the house, garage or building.

f. The pine needles that should be raked up and disposed of properly.

g. The garbage cans and fuel tanks that can be so easily and inexpensively screened from public view.

h. The salvage yards, storage yards, and nuisance businesses (sand, gravel, redmix, brick yards, etc.) which should screen their ugly appearance.

i. The construction project that somehow has to be an absolute mess during the entire construction period.

j. The fences that are falling apart or need repainting — and the piles of building materials that should be either used or disposed of.

My apologies if I have disturbed you. But if you are really honest (and if you do have your eyes open) you know that there is a big job to do. And if you are really satisfied with the way your community looks (now) then you probably won't like what is about to happen here — because most people do care about Ruidoso and the way they think it should be.

Let's get busy!

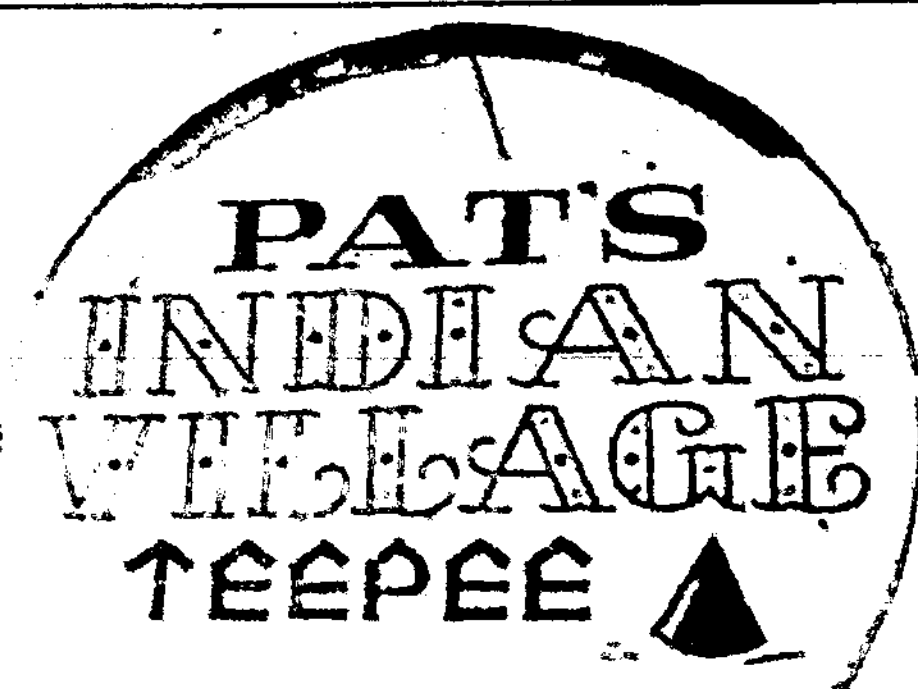
