

Motor vehicle re-registration will be by mail

The New Mexico Department of Motor Vehicles has issued a memorandum advising drivers of changes in the laws governing re-registration and licensing of motor vehicles, effective immediately for 1975.

—Billings for 1975 re-registration will be mailed out thru Nov. 22. (The DMV stressed the fact that several mailings will be made.)

—In cases where vehicle owners do not receive billings for their vehicles by Dec. 1, 1974, these owners are to fill out a blank billing form and mail it to the Department of Motor Vehicles, Bataan Memorial Building, Santa Fe, N. M. 87501, with their most current registration certificates and appropriate checks or money orders.

—Blank billing forms are available in Ruidoso at Security Bank of Ruidoso, Ruidoso State Bank, Hollywood Station, Ruidoso, Downs and Ruidoso Post Offices and at Village Hall.

—Drivers needing a first-time title on out-of-state new cars can obtain 1975 license tabs, etc., at Ruidoso Village Hall.

—New Mexico title transfers on newly purchased vehicles that are not licensed for 1975 may be obtained at Ruidoso Village Hall. Licensing of such vehicles will be handled at the same time.

—All licensing fees are printed on the back of the blank billing forms.

The 1975 vehicle re-registration billing forms state:

—If you acquired a vehicle after Oct. 14, 1974, the title work is still in process and you

will not receive a billing for same; in this case, we will have one generated within 15 days and mailed to you. We may have omitted a billing for a vehicle that you have owned for quite some time; in this case, obtain a billing form from your local department of motor vehicles field office, post office, bank or vehicle dealer, transcribe the data from the 1974 registration certificate to the new 1975 billing form and attach a copy of the 1974 registration certificate and mail to the department with money order for total amount.

—If you have any questions regarding the 1975 registration procedure, contact your local department of motor vehicles field office at your earliest convenience. (In Ruidoso the office is located at Village Hall.)

C of C raises manager; leases auto

The board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday evening approved the leasing of an automobile for the use of the chamber and also a \$30 per month raise for Richard Cothrun, chamber manager. Cothrun was commended for his work on behalf of the chamber.

Approval was given for the exclusive selling of a directory for the village, which will be ready about January 1, and it was noted that the selling price would be \$25 per copy of which the chamber will retain \$7 per copy. The directory will be

available at the chamber office. In a report on the membership drive now underway, it was noted that membership now stands at over 400 with the addition of 19 new memberships to date in the drive. The drive is slated to continue through this week.

A proposal to sponsor luminaries down the middle of Sudderth Drive was disapproved. In the chamber manager's report, Cothrun pointed out that about \$7,000 will be spent in advertising in December, mostly in Texas publications such as TV Guide, the southwestern

edition of the Wall Street Journal and various Sunday supplements. Cothrun also reported that Ski Pac activity is now underway with some reservations already made. The board voted to hold the December meet at the Cothrun home, following an invitation to do so.

Chamber president Mike Larkey reported that practice had begun for the basketball game set for Nov. 26, which will be free and is sponsored by the chamber. Local players will make up the "Turkeys" and the "Pumpkins" in the game.

Larkey also gave brief details

concerning the state Chamber of Commerce meeting slated for Ruidoso next year.

Total bank balances for the chamber amounted to \$6,722.30 as of November 18.

A statement of cash receipts and disbursements for the quarter ending August 31 prepared by Dean and Mound was presented to members of the board. The statement shows an expenditure of \$21,453 (exclusive of \$35,500 in lodger's tax).

Budget for the year is \$54,350 in memberships and fund raising projects.

The Village Council will award the engineering contract for the evaluation study and construction of the new trapping plant and distribution system at a special meeting in the council chambers at 1:30 p.m., Nov. 26.

The council will also hold a budget review at the special meeting Tuesday as requested by the NM Local Government Division. The review is necessitated due to the receipt of CETA funding of \$3,400 for a Police Department secretary and a Highway Safety Grant of \$3,000 for Police Department salaries. These funds

SCMRA DEVELOPING WASTE DISPOSAL PLAN FOR LINCOLN COUNTY

Landfill site study underway

A landfill site study, to serve seven Lincoln County communities, is currently underway as a project measure of South Central Mountain Resources Area (SCMRA), project coordinator Howard Abercrombie has announced.

The study, to provide landfills for Nogal, Lincoln, Honda, San Patricio, Pecos, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, was authorized

at the Nov. 12 SCMRA meeting in Alamogordo.

Brown Edwards, of the NM Environmental Improvement Agency office in Ruidoso, set forth the needs for sanitary landfill sites and suggested that the SCS and Forest Service be asked to cooperate with EIA and SCMRA in determining convenient sites.

Lewis Merritt of Yesso, of the

NM NRCO Committee, said "A landfill site study, to determine where small communities in the county could best dispose of refuse" is indicated because "what is really needed is a modified landfill which needs to be covered only periodically" for the villages in Lincoln County to be served.

Other items on the agenda included:

—A report from David King, director of the State Planning Office, on basic issues of state government, state funding and the SPO role in working with district government.

—Instructing Abercrombie to catalog SCMRA projects eligible for funding.

—Capitan village trustee Dick Beck noted that funding will be required for maintenance and

operation of Capitan Park if it is to serve as a memorial to Smokey Bear. Beck noted a survey is underway to obtain opinions as to the method of disposal of the bear, when the time comes.

—The boundaries on Capitan Cemetery have been established and a link chain fence will be installed. It was noted that additional financing will be needed.

—The Pinon Pipeline can be financed through a \$400,000 FHA loan at 5% interest and SCMRA will request from the State ASCS that agriculture money be utilized for this project.

—SCMRA will request that all NM counties be included in the 4-Corners Region; in a letter to incoming governor Jerry Apodaca, with copies being sent to other interested officials.

The next meeting of SCMRA will be Jan. 7 in Carrizozo.

Week day ski package inaugurated for season

A Monday through Friday ski package ripping an estimated 25% off the weekend cost of skiing has been announced for the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort and Ruidoso lodging facilities, according to Richard Cothrun, Chamber of Commerce manager.

The mid-week package is available to skiers now through the end of the season. The plan, a cooperative effort by almost every Ruidoso business and Sierra Blanca, offers motel, cabin or condominium lodging, breakfast and supper (a \$8 cash value, which can also be used at a Ruidoso grocery market);

skis, boots, and poles; and an all-day lift ticket, all for \$23 to \$28 per person, per day, tax included.

The price range, Cothrun said, varies according to lodging facilities. Also, there is a minimum of 48 hours notice of cancellation before deposit can be returned.

The Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, with an eight state WATS line (800/545-7822), can make reservations and give the latest ski reports. The Sierra Blanca WATS for New Mexico is 800/432-7871.

Children under 12 are half-

price, and Sierra Blanca Resort is noted for its fine handling and teaching of youngsters.

The Sierra Blanca Ski Resort was the first ski area in New Mexico to start-up this season, counting a total of 20-inches of snow through the weekend of November 8 — one of its earliest starting dates.

Roy Parker, manager of the Mesalero Apache sports complex, said an estimated 1,500 skiers used the Sierra Blanca slopes that opening weekend.

"The beauty of the Monday through Friday package extends beyond the lower prices," said

Cothrun. "For example, the car traffic is a lot less, there are fewer skiers on the slopes, and accommodations are naturally easier to obtain."

The magazine Business Week in a recent edition and under an article entitled, "Budget Vacation This Winter," ran a color photo of a Sierra Blanca ski slope, reporting that the resort "has ski prices that are 25% lower than at Aspen."

The Ruidoso ski package is sold Saturdays and Sundays, November 28 and 29, and December 20, through January 5, 1975.

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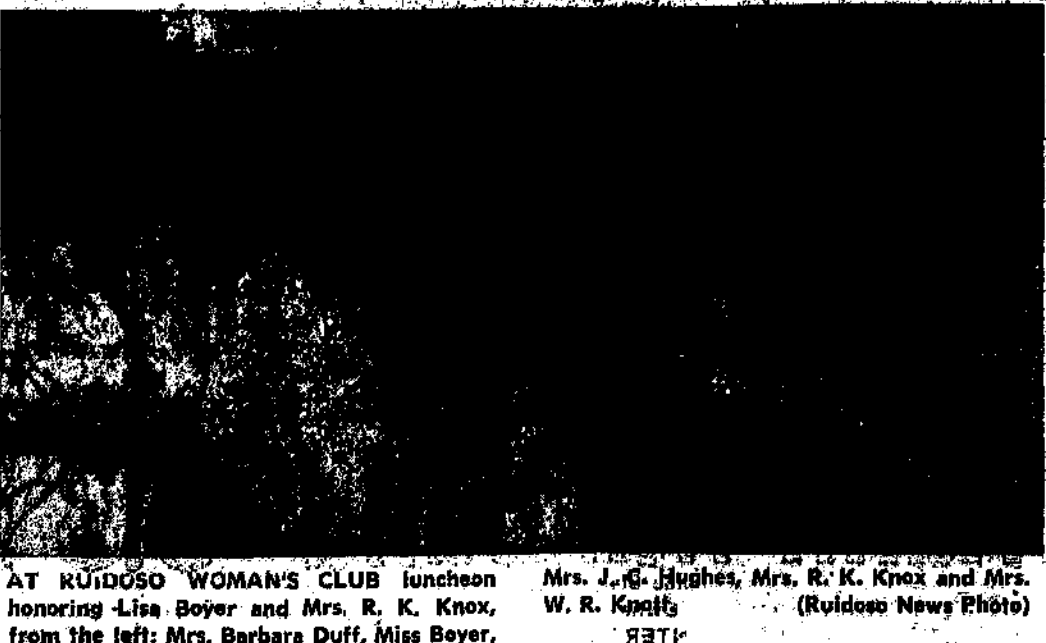

The regular meeting of Amaranth will be Tuesday, Nov. 26, with supper at 6:30, at the Eastern Star Hall.

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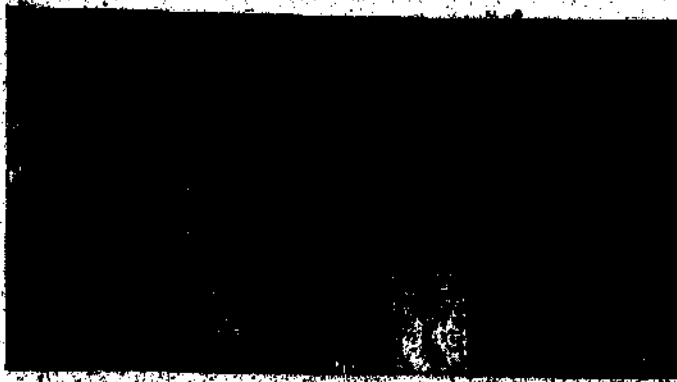

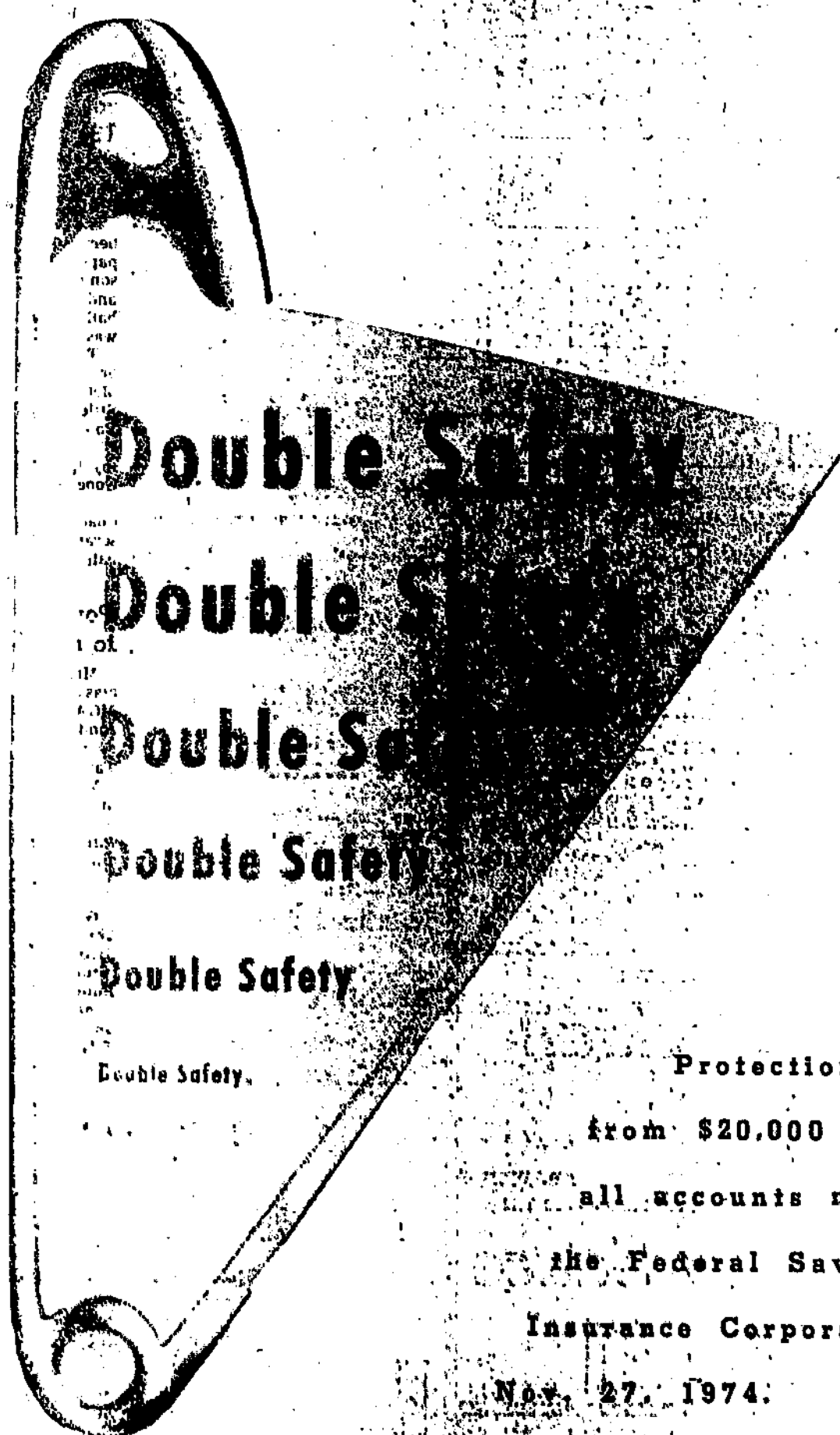

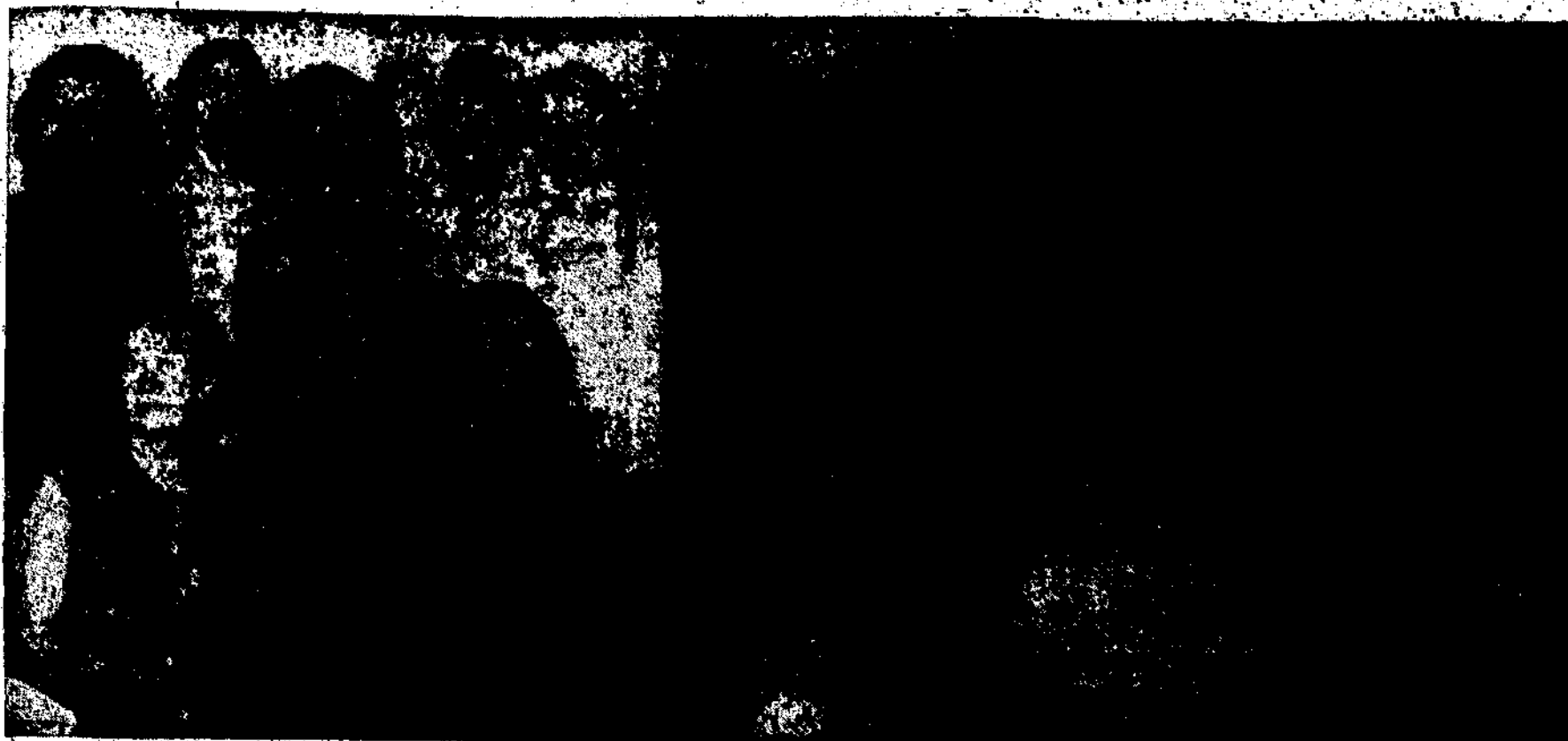

Discovery approach method workshop conducted here

A group of area teachers Monday, covering a student range from kindergarten thru grade seven, participated in a Lawrence Hall of Science (LHS), University of California, Berkeley, program designed to instill a discovery approach to science education in the students.

Mauri Gould, assistant to the director of LHS, demonstrated to Cloudercroft, Hondo, Alamogordo and Ruidoso faculty members the LHS precept that "children learn best through a discovery and inquiry method; by asking questions and finding answers through experimentation."

In one experiment, after an extreme by brief explanation of what was to be accomplished, Gould distributed little wooden boxes, sans batteries, out of which wires protruded and, if all connections were made correctly, a small electric bulb

Club reports record attendance

The theme of Monday night's program was "The Supreme Ruler — the MOUTH" which Mrs. Craig represented with a large open mouth drawn on the blackboard. "You do not take on pounds through your eyes, nor through your ears or your nose, — and very little, if any, is absorbed through your skin. Only your wide open mouth being stuffed full at frequent intervals, puts the pounds on your body — and usually in the places where it is least wanted," states Mrs. Craig. She cited the example of the woman in England, and several here in the United States, who have had their jaws wired shut for a period of time in order to lose weight.

"Courage to change the things I can — mainly the fat deposits on my body" is the constant prayer of Weight Watchers. Men and boys who are overweight and who want to help to do something about the problem are invited to join the Weight Watchers of Ruidoso. Weight Watchers has a program especially designed for youth and men as well as for women. Each program is different for each group.

Meetings are held every Monday night at 7:30 p.m. with "Weight-In" time from 6:30 to 7:30 during which time new members are also taken.

Postage required Thanksgiving... for mail delivery

The U. S. Postal Service, area postmasters announced, has discontinued, as of Nov. 17, the practice of delivering mail, on which there is no postage, to the addressee on a postage due basis.

The new policy means that letters without postage will be returned to the sender if there is a return address. If there is no return address, the letter will be sent to the dead letter office where postal officials will attempt to locate the sender of unpaid mail and return it for a slight fee.

A correct return address, in the event stamping a letter is overlooked or if the stamp comes off prior to cancellation, will insure that the letter will be stamped and delivered.

Officials estimate the cost of delivering unstamped mail at \$18 million annually and in announcing the new policy, Postmaster General E. T. Klassen said, "It is unfair to burden the vast majority of mailers with costs created by the few who mail without prepayment of postage."

RABIES QUARANTINE
The most important aspect of the laws, rules and regulations governing dogs, cats and pets is CITIZEN RESPONSIBILITY and CITIZEN CONSIDERATION for the safety and privacy of their neighbors and other community residents. Laws protecting owners of dogs and cats and non-owners can be enforced effectively only if the citizens themselves know and understand the law, support and assist in their enforcement. Lincoln County residents must assist the County Government, animal control staffs, municipal veterinarians and humane society representatives, district health officer and Sheriff in safeguarding animals and protecting the citizenry from vicious animals and abandoned or stray pets and above all from rabies.

If every citizen assumes his appropriate responsibility — either by tying his pet or reporting vicious, stray and abandoned animals, the governmental authorities will be effective in safeguarding the residents and preventing rabies.

Though the rabies problem is serious the most effective and economical approach to enforcing the law governing dogs and cats is citizen awareness and active assumption of their responsibility to tie their dogs and cats. If this is accomplished then the Sheriff and Municipal authorities will have a better opportunity to control stray and abandoned dogs, the number of which does not at this time warrant the establishment of a County dog and cat control staff, costing thousands of dollars. The Sheriff and his deputies can most likely respond to the need to control and disposal of abandoned and stray animals. However, the government authorities cannot assume responsibility that by law rests with the owners of dogs and cats.

At this stage in the quarantine declaration, efforts should be made to inform the County residents of their legal responsibilities.

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abilities of protecting their community neighbors and other residents from their dogs and cats. Many people may not realize New Mexico state law requires all citizens to vaccinate, tag and tie or confine their pets. Also Lincoln County citizens may not realize that the Sheriff may dispose of the animal after a reasonable effort to encourage a dog or cat owner to tie his pet has failed. To tie or confine a dog or cat or not to tie or confine a dog or cat is not a free choice of the pet owner. The law requires it!

On October 18, 1974, the Regional Health Director, Dr. David L. Michaels issued an order establishing a rabies quarantine for Lincoln and Otero Counties. The authority to establish the quarantine is section 47-1-2.6 N. M. S. A., 1963. Below is cited the State Law governing cat and dog ownership and responsibilities by agency, government unit and citizen and respective legal references:

47-1-2.5/47-1-2.6/47-1-8/47-1-9 Responsibilities — County and Sheriff.

47-1-2.6: Responsibilities — County Health Officer.

47-1-2.4/47-1-3/47-1-9: Responsibilities — Veterinarian.

47-1-2.3/47-1-2.4/47-1-2.5/47-1-3/47-1-9/47-1-4: Responsibilities — Citizen.

47-1-5/47-1-6: Responsibilities — Municipal.

47-1-2.6 QUARANTINE — Any district health officer may declare a quarantine against rabies within the health district of his jurisdiction when in his judgment rabies exists to the extent that it is a danger to public health. Upon such declaration, all dogs and cats within the health district shall be confined on the premises of the owner or keeper, in a veterinary hospital, commercial dog and cat kennel or in a municipal animal shelter. After reasonable effort to apprehend any dog or cat running at large and uncontrolled by its owner or keeper during a period of quarantine, any peace officer may kill the dog or cat and properly dispose of the body. A quarantine shall not be removed except on order of the district health officer.

Dr. Michaels Quarantine Order requires Lincoln County pet owners citizens to:

a. Securely fasten pets upon a leash at all times.

47-1-2.1 — VACCINATION OF DOGS AND CATS REQUIRED — Any person who owns or keeps a dog or cat over the age of three (3) months in this state shall have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies annually with a vaccine approved by the director of the health and social services department. All anti-rabies vaccine shall be administered by or under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian.

47-1-2.2 — VACCINATION CERTIFICATES AND TAGS — The veterinarian who administers anti-rabies vaccine to any dog or cat shall issue to the owner or keeper of the dog or cat a serially numbered vaccination certificate containing the name and address of the veterinarian, the type of vaccine used, the name and address of the owner or keeper of the dog or cat, a description of the dog or cat vaccinated, the date of vaccination and the expiration date of the period of immunity. The veterinarian shall also furnish the owner or keeper with a metal tag bearing the certificate number and the expiration date of the period of immunity. The tag shall be affixed by the owner or keeper to a collar or harness and shall be worn by the dog or cat for which the certificate is issued.

47-1-2.3 — VACCINATION OF DOGS AND CATS BROUGHT INTO STATE — Any dog or cat brought into the state shall be securely confined by the owner or keeper until vaccinated against rabies, which vaccination shall be administered within one (1) week after entry into the state unless the owner or keeper has a certificate of vaccination issued by a veterinarian in another state or foreign country and such vaccination conforms to the requirements of this state.

47-1-2.4 — NOTICE TO HEALTH OFFICER OF ANIMAL BITE — CONFINEMENT — A. When any person is bitten by an animal, it is the duty of such person or his parent or guardian and of the owner or keeper of the animal to immediately notify the district health officer. Except as provided in subsection B of this section, the owner or keeper of the animal immediately and at his own expense shall confine the animal in a place designated by the district health officer. Every physician, shall, within twenty-four (24) hours after his first professional attendance upon a person bitten by any animal, advise the health officer of having rabies, report to the health officer the name, age, sex and address of the person bitten.

B. If the person bitten is killed by a dog and if the owner of the dog produces a valid and unexpired certificate of vaccination for the dog issued under section 47-1-2.2, the health officer shall, within at least three (3) weeks prior to the bite, then the owner shall

be permitted to keep the dog at his own premises for the required period of ten (10) days. During confinement shall be permitted by the district health officer if he has declared his area of jurisdiction a rabies-free area. No animal may be released from confinement except by a person designated by the district health officer.

47-1-2.5 DOGS OR CATS BITTEN BY RABID ANIMALS. — Any dog or cat bitten by an animal known or proved to be rabid shall be killed immediately by its owner or by a peace officer. Provided that any dog or cat which has been vaccinated at least three (3) weeks before being bitten shall be confined for ninety (90) days. At the end of the confinement period the dog or cat shall be released if declared free of rabies by a licensed veterinarian. If as determined by the veterinarian, the dog or cat develops rabies during the period of confinement, the owner or keeper shall have it killed and properly disposed of.

47-1-3. VICIOUS ANIMALS — RABID OR UNVACCINATED DOG AND CATS — PROCEDURE FOLLOWING DEATH FROM RABIES. — It is unlawful for any person to keep any animal known to be vicious and liable to attack and injure human beings unless such animal is securely kept so as to prevent injury to any person. It is unlawful to keep any unvaccinated dog or cat or any animal which has shown any symptom of rabies except that, if such animal has bitten a human being, it shall be confined for a ten (10) day period. If the animal dies during the confinement period, the head shall be immediately sent to a laboratory by the district health officer.

The head of any animal suspected of having died of rabies shall be immediately sent to a laboratory designated by the health and social services department under such procedures as specified by the department.

47-1-4. FAILURE TO KILL — PENALTY. — It is the duty of any person who is the owner or keeper of any animal, the keeping of which is unlawful, to cause such animal to be killed. Failure to comply with this section, after knowledge by the owner or keeper of the fact which renders such keeping unlawful, shall subject such owner or keeper to a fine of ten dollars (\$10.00) and costs, and each day's failure to comply is a separate offense.

47-1-5. RUNNING AT LARGE IN MUNICIPALITIES. — Each municipal corporation shall make provision by ordinance for the seizure and killing of all dogs and cats running at large and not claimed or harbored by any person on their premises.

47-1-6. ENFORCEMENT. — Municipal corporations may provide enforcement of sections 47-1-2 through 47-1-7 N.M.S.A. 1953 by ordinance.

In any area where dogs and cats are not controlled by ordinance, the sheriff or any peace officer shall provide for the disposal of any unvaccinated dog or cat not under ownership and control.

47-1-9. ABANDONED DOGS AND CATS — NOTICE TO OWNER — DISPOSAL WITHOUT LIABILITY. — A. As used in this act (section), "custodian" means the owner or operator of a veterinary clinic or hospital, a doctor of veterinary medicine, a kennel, grooming parlor or other animal care facility.

B. Any dog or cat placed in the custody of a veterinarian, kennel, animal clinic or hospital, grooming parlor or other animal care facility shall be deemed to be abandoned if, after the term of any agreement for board or other care has expired, the dog or cat has not been reclaimed within ten (10) days after written notice has been given the owner or his agent by registered or certified mail.

C. Any dog or cat deemed abandoned under the provisions of subsection B of this section, may be disposed of by the custodian if not reclaimed. Notice of the intent to dispose of a dog or cat shall be given to the owner or his agent by registered or certified mail. Such notice when sent to the address given to the custodian by the owner, shall relieve the custodian from all liability to the owner or his agent for the disposal of the dog or cat.

D. The custodian may turn over an abandoned dog or cat to the municipal or county animal control center, pound or shelter for disposal by them. Nothing in this act shall affect the holding time or notice procedures regarding any municipal or county animal facility which is owned or operated by, or is under contract to franchise to, a municipality or county.

E. Nothing in this act shall relieve the owner of a dog or cat for the payment of all reasonable charges for medical or care services rendered to the dog or cat while in the custody of a veterinarian, kennel, animal clinic or hospital, grooming parlor or other animal care facility.

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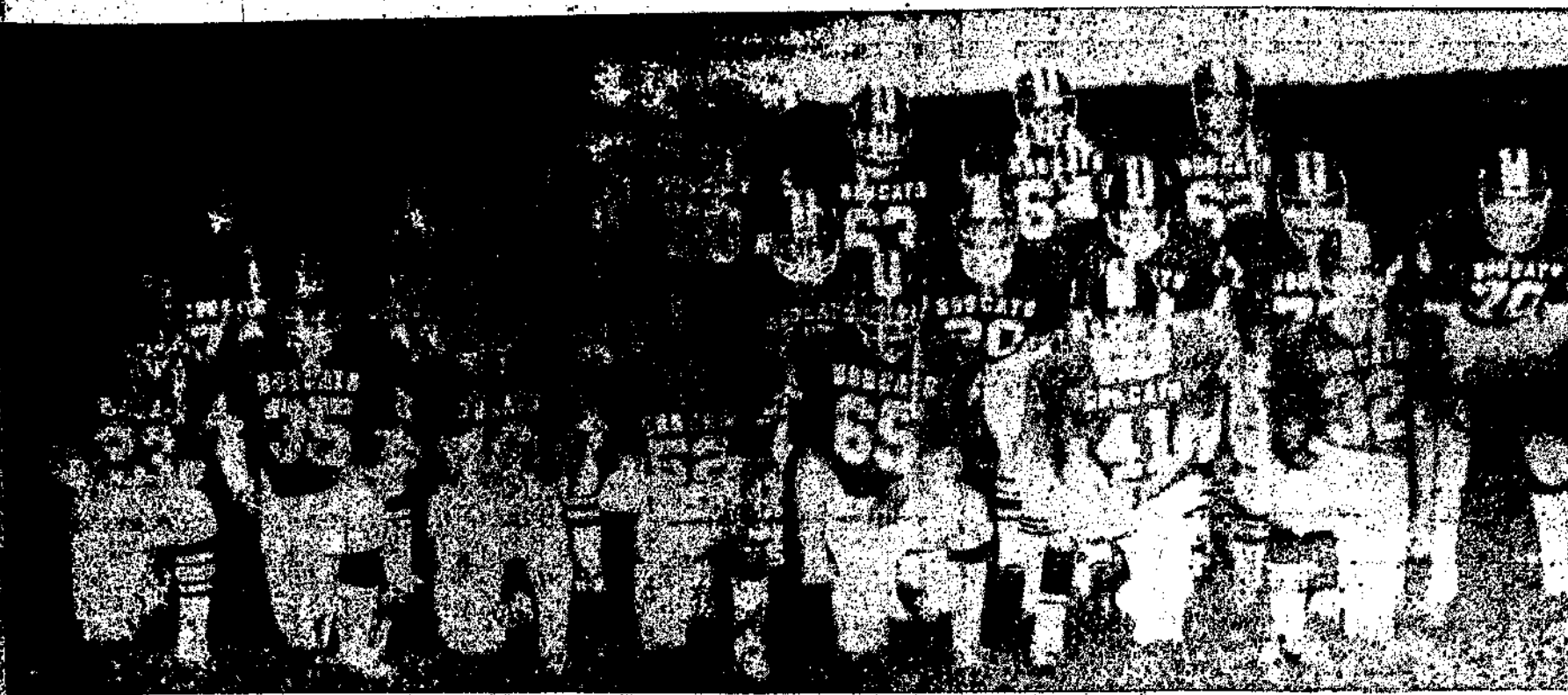

in Northern New Mexico. But Sen. Lee says: "Social legislation will not be a solution to the basic problem in New Mexico. It would only alleviate little spots in the state."

Lee adds: "Until we get to the point where we can provide jobs with a satisfactory wage in comparison with the rest of the nation we're not going to be addressing ourselves to the real problem that confronts us."

A longtime conservationist, Sen. Lee does not want to destroy New Mexico's natural beauty, clean air and water. But he says: "We're going to have to encourage industry to come into New Mexico — the kind that we want and can live with, to provide jobs for the new New Mexico people."

Sen. Lee would give cities the opportunity to generate revenue from within cities to provide needed services. He says: "Municipalities will have to solve their own problems. The legislature should give them this opportunity."

Legislative Finance Committee Chairman C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, accused State Police of usurping the legislature's authority to vote money. State Police borrowed \$218,000 from a special fund to pay bills for last fiscal year. The funds were used from a special \$400,000 appropriation voted by the 1974 Legislature to buy police cars. State Police said the use was necessary to meet spiraling inflationary costs. Part of the \$218,000 has been absorbed via economies.

Gov. Robert Mondragon, House, said he wants an appointment in a bid for the U. S. State job in the Apodaca administration.

Scribner re-elected to conservation district

Bob Scribner of Alto was recently re-elected to serve a three-year term as a supervisor for the Upper Hondo Natural Resource Conservation District. Running against B. B. wore Preston, Monte of Capitan and C. H. (Sonny) Wood of Ruidoso.

Bob has previously served two terms on the Upper Hondo Board, having been first elected in 1968. He has also served as vice-chairman since 1970.

Bob has carried out a careful conservation plan on his High Mesa Ranch near Alto for several years. He has installed livestock water facilities and planted over 130 acres of permanent pasture on fields which were once cropland.

He will work with other board members: Bert Pfingsten of Hondo, L. Wayne Peters of Capitan and Ernest McDaniel and Harvey Bonnell of Glencoe, to direct conservation activities of the Soil Conservation Service.

Inside the Capital

SANTA FE — Rep. H. B. Barnard, Clovis Democrat, ordered research on a special appropriation by the 1975 Legislature to raise substandard New Mexico highways to minimum standards with \$7 to \$10 million.

Rep. Barnard, re-elected unopposed, says: "Hopefully, we would make this one of the priority items against the big state surplus." The money would pay for highway widening and overpass.

Barnard says: "If we're spending large sums to attract tourists to New Mexico, we should not ask them to drive over substandard highways."

Barnard also favors handing authority to the governor to remove State Highway Commis-

sion members. SEC members can only be removed now via State Supreme Court proceedings. If his proposal fails, Rep. Barnard says, he will propose a constitutional amendment to elect the five highway commissioners for 4 or 6-year terms. The governor appoints commissioners now for overlapping 6-year terms.

Barnard says: "There is not a fair and equal distribution of highway construction or maintenance funds among the 5 highway districts now."

Barnard charged some House committees are "stacked" and realignment is needed. House Majority Leader David Salzman, D-Buena Vista, denied House committees, appointed by Speaker Walter Martinez, are "stack-

ed." Salzman contends most House committees are well-balanced except for Agriculture, composed mostly of farmers and ranchers.

Rep. Barnard said: "How is loading the House Corporations and Banks Committee with bankers and insurance men justified? The Labor Committee? the Agriculture Committee? How is this kind of action justified in the light of the hue and cry for campaign reform?"

Rep. John Hays Jr., D-Clovis, will propose a constitutional amendment to exempt homes of senior citizens from the property tax. The legislature will meet Jan. 21.

Rep. Hays would also grant retired military personnel a \$3,000 exemption on the state income tax. Retired civil service employees receive the exemption now. Rep. Hays also supports repeal of the state gross receipts tax on prescription drugs and medical bills. Support is strong for the repeal among legislators.

Among bridges tentatively set for replacement next fiscal year by the State Highway Department are spans on NM-6 in Valencia County just west of Los Lunas 16.2 miles west of the US-85-NM-6 junction and on Perico Creek on US-56 in Union County 25 miles east of the NM-120 junction.

Much social legislation is expected in the lawmaking session. Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, and Sen. Robert McBride, D-Albuquerque, are competing for Senate majority leader to replace Tibbo Chavez, D-Belen.

Both Trujillo and McBride claim enough Democratic senator votes to win. Senate Democrats may not pick a majority leader until January. Replacements for Sen. Jerry Apodaca, D-Las Cruces, the governor-elect, and Sen. Bob Ferguson, D-Artesia, the lieutenant-governor elect, will be appointed before the Democratic caucus acts.

Sen. McBride is regarded as a close associate of Apodaca. But Apodaca could endanger his legislative program as governor if he exerts any muscle in the majority leader scrap.

A Valencia County grand jury called on the State Correction Commission, Corrections Secretary Howard Leach and Warden Felix Rodriguez to show more concern for the operation of Los Lunas Correctional Center. The grand jury reported six recommendations to improve the center's operations.

Sen. Apodaca defeated Lincoln County rancher Joe Skeen narrowly for governor in complete, unofficial returns. Republicans looked into election returns in the governor's race in Rio Arriba and McKinley Counties. Skeen filed a request for a recheck of the 41 voting machines in Rio Arriba. The Rio Arriba canvass was set for completion early this week.

Skeen, a former state senator, carried his home Lincoln County by 881 votes, a margin of

nearly 2-1, in unofficial totals. Apodaca carried Guadalupe County by 944 votes — 2-1. Skeen nipped Apodaca in Hidalgo. Skeen won Sierra handily by 590 votes. Apodaca's Taos County margin was almost 3-1. Skeen won Union by 423 votes. Apodaca's Valencia County margin was nearly 2,500 votes. Skeen won DeBaca — 588-426. Skeen edged Apodaca in Colfax, 2,128 to 1,909, in unofficial returns.

U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque Republican, won a fourth term over Lt. Gov. Robert Mondragon, Nambé Democrat, by some 36,000 votes. Mondragon carried his native Guadalupe County, 1,164 to 1,005, in unofficial totals. Mondragon also won Taos and Sandoval. Lujan carried Union, Colfax and Terrell. A big Lujan margin in Bernalillo decided the race.

U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels, D-Lovington, swamped Portales Republican Don Trubey, 34 to win a third term in U. S. House District 2. Runnels carried all of the heavily Democratic district's 18 counties.

Rep. Hoyt Pattison expects a huge total of 1,700 bills in the legislature session opening Jan. 21. Pattison, a Republican, represents a Curry-Roosevelt-Lea district. He says: "There are requests for about \$100 million in new spending which would be very much out of line." The total does not include the public schools appropriation which accounts for 52 per cent of the state general fund.

Rep. Pattison is on the Legislative School Study Committee reviewing school problems. He says: "With our \$90 million in surplus funds, we definitely should give taxpayers at least one time tax relief and try for continuing tax relief."

He says removal of the state gross receipts tax from prescription drugs and medical bills "is a definite possibility." State income tax relief may also be possible.

An agricultural engineer, Rep. Pattison said the State Education Department has had no vocational agriculture director at least four months. He said: "The SED has apparently let this function degenerate to almost nothing when in many of our rural school districts it's a real important offering."

Reps. Pattison and Colin McMillan, DeBaca-Chaves, are candidates for House Republican leader. House Republicans will caucus Saturday. Rep. McMillan, a Roswell geophysicist, is House GOP whip now.

Sen. John Conway, an Alamogordo lawyer representing a Lincoln-Otero district, is set for reelection as Senate Republican leader.

Rep. John Bigbee, R-Torrance-DeBaca-Guadalupe-Lincoln, expects heavy pressure for spending in the 1975 Legislature. An Encino rancher, Rep. Bigbee believes the incoming Jerry Apodaca administration is committed to big state department budget increases.

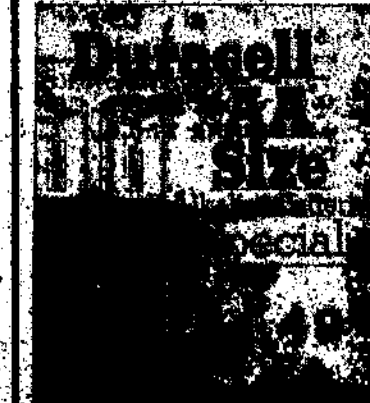
Bigbee says part of the state surplus should be returned to taxpayers in an income tax cut. He also favors the gross receipts tax exemption on prescription drugs and medical services.

Rep. Bigbee will look into absentee voting laws. He says: "In some cases, there is misuse of the intent of absentee voting law. Some people are voting absentee who could make it to the polls."

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MEDEX member to join local health care team

The Ruidoso health care team will soon welcome a new member, Dr. Ronald Annala of Ruidoso and the Utah MEDEX Project announced that one of fifteen Medex currently in training at the University of Utah College of Medicine in Salt Lake City will join Dr. Annala's staff in March of 1978.

The Medex are former military corpsmen, nurses, and other individuals with similar medical experience, who are presently undergoing extensive additional training to prepare themselves to assist overworked physicians in providing better health care to their patients.

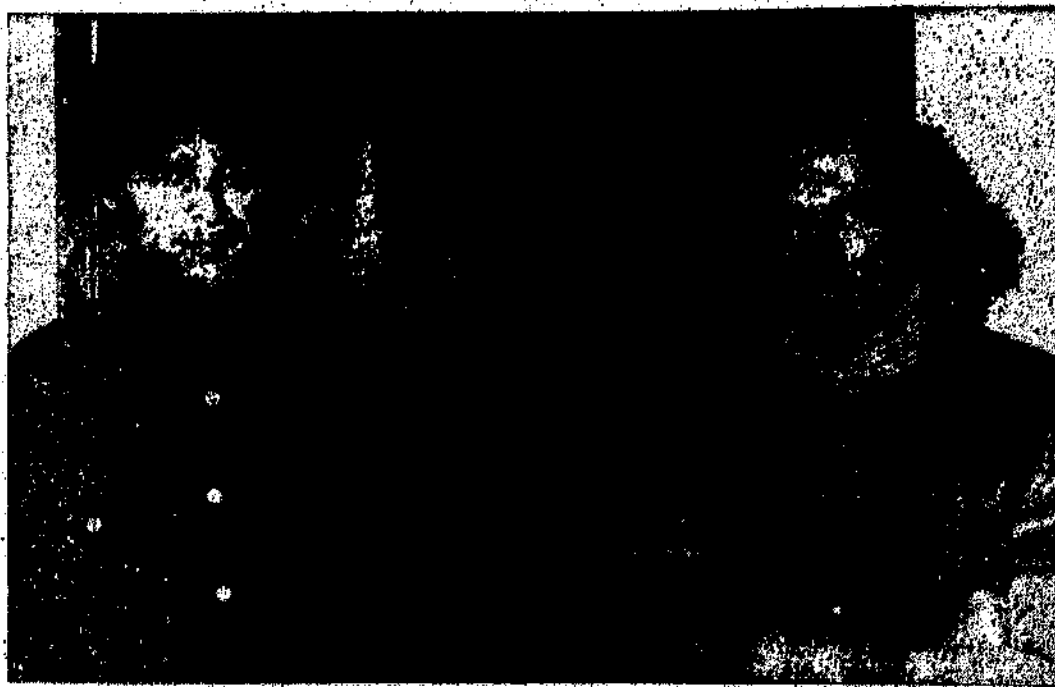
During the next few weeks, Dr. Annala will interview several Medex who have expressed a particular interest in moving to Ruidoso, training under Dr. Annala, and remaining in the community to work after the Medex's husbands or wives will accompany them on their visits. Dr. Annala noted that many of the Medex are originally from rural areas in the West and that all want to work and live in the Intermountain Region.

The 15 members of the current class are the fifth such group to be trained by the Utah MEDEX Project, which was established at the University of

Utah Medical Center in June, 1977, under the joint sponsorship of the College of Medicine's Department of Family and Community Medicine and the Utah State Medical Association. More than 50 Utah MEDEX Project graduates already assist physicians in seven Intermountain states.

Members of this year's Medex class were selected from over 2,000 applicants and have accrued up to 4,000 hours of previous formal medical training. The majority were trained for "independent duty" in the armed forces and many were stationed at combat duty stations, isolated radar sites, on small submarines, and in similar locations where they were the only medical personnel available. Other Medex acquired equivalent or additional medical experience as nurses or specialized medical technicians.

The MEDEX training program is 12 months in duration and is divided into two phases. A four to five month classroom phase at the University of Utah Medical Center emphasizes the demands of civilian medical practice and the Medex's acquisition of skills and knowledge not obtained through previous training. The final seven to eight months consist of closely supervised practical training in the practices of primary care physicians, who serve as "preceptors" to the trainees. Dr. Annala explained that he

EPILEPSY

The very sound of the word "Epilepsy" provokes a fear of the unknown for many people who know little about it. Sometimes it is a possession by demons, many Spanish-speaking people refer to it as "Mal

will be the preceptor of a current Medex trainee and will instruct and supervise his Medex as they work together to deliver health care services. He will receive an official appointment as a clinical instructor to the faculty of the University of Utah College of Medicine.

The Medex, for his part, will extend Dr. Annala's capacity to treat patients by taking patient histories, performing parts of physical exams, suturing minor lacerations, making laboratory tests, assisting at surgery, and completing numerous other medical tasks for which he has been trained. The Medex will perform these tasks only under the direct order and supervision of Dr. Annala.

At the end of the preceptorship period, Dr. Annala may decide to permanently employ the Medex to assist him in his practice, thereby adding a pair of skilled hands that will function under the physician's constant supervision. The Medex will have been trained for general practice, but more specially for the particular requirements of Dr. Annala's practice and the medical care needs of Ruidoso.

Utah MEDEX is part of a nationwide network of MEDEX projects which to date have trained over 500 Medex who now aid physicians in 34 states. Other MEDEX Projects are located in Seattle, Washington; Los Angeles, California; Washington, D. C.; Grand Forks, North Dakota; Charleston, South Carolina; Hanover, New Hampshire; Hershey, Pennsylvania; and Honolulu, Hawaii. The Utah MEDEX Project has been fully accredited by the American Medical Association as a program to train primary care physician's assistants.

Ojo" or the Evil Eye. Some four million Americans have epilepsy, and over one million children between the ages of five and 17 have some form of it. The Epilepsy Foundation estimates that there are some 25,000 epileptics in New Mexico alone.

Epilepsy usually develops in childhood, and nearly 69 percent of all epileptics have their first seizure before they are 14. Some people wrongly think that epilepsy is a contagious disease and that people with the affliction should be avoided.

Just what is epilepsy? A great deal of medical research has been done on epilepsy during the past 50 years. Studies show that epilepsy is not one disease, but a group of conditions characterized by convulsions. There are approximately 100 different kinds of epilepsy. However, the three most familiar forms of seizures are Grand Mal, Petit Mal, and psychomotor convulsions.

Grand Mal convulsions which means "great sickness" in French, are serious seizures and four out of five epileptic children have them. A person who is having such a seizure will become tense and fall to the floor unconscious. The seizure, or convulsion, may last from 20 seconds to an hour. A person who has had this type of seizure regains consciousness in a confused or drowsy state, but is otherwise all right.

Petit Mal, or partial seizures, are most common in children and they last only five to 20 seconds. Some of the symptoms are: small twitching movements, rapid movement of the eyes, or apparent staring. This is often mistaken for daydreaming and the child rarely knows that he's had a seizure.

Psychomotor seizures are the most complex of the three types. Such a seizure might include chewing, lip smacking, walking around, repetitive hand and arm movements, confusion and dizziness. This seizure may last from a minute to several hours.

What can you do if someone has an epileptic seizure? First, keep calm. There is nothing to be frightened of because these seizures are symptoms of a common nervous system disorder. No emergency treatment is usually given for Petit Mal or Psychomotor seizures and most often they are controlled by regular medical attention and treatment.

There are first aid techniques which you can use for Grand Mal seizures. Again, keep calm and lower the person to the floor and loosen his collar. You can't stop the seizure, so don't try to restrain or revive the person. Do remove hard, sharp, or hot objects that could hurt the person, but don't interfere with his movements. Don't try to force anything between the

person's teeth; he will not swallow his tongue and you could only cause an injury or get bitten making such an attempt.

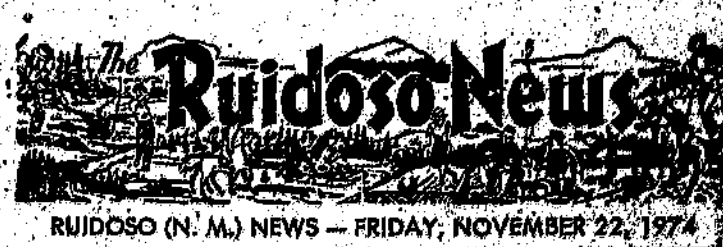
If you can, turn the person on his side, or turn his head to one side, to release the saliva or drool, and place something soft under his face. When the person regains consciousness, let him rest if he wants to. If the seizures last for more than ten minutes, or if the person seems to go from one seizure to another without regaining consciousness, call for medical help. This rarely happens, but the person should receive immediate attention if it does.

So, the important things to remember are to keep calm, move the person to the floor, remove dangerous objects, turn the person's head to one side, and afterwards let him rest if he wishes. Your positive attitude in handling such a situation can help many people put aside their fears of the epileptic.

There is no known cure for epilepsy. Anti-convulsant medication is used to control the seizures in about 50 percent of

the cases, and partial control in another 30 percent. Epilepsy is in no way contagious. Doctors generally agree that epilepsy can be a result of brain injury before, during, and after birth. It can also result from head wounds, cerebral parasites, poor nutrition, high fevers, and some poisons.

People with epilepsy are normal, just like everyone else, except for their condition.

distinguished Alumnus by the
Medical University of South
Carolina. He was chosen for this
honor by a special committee
of faculty and alumni and was
presented the award by the
President of the Medical Uni-
versity during the Sesquicentennial
Founders Day Banquet on
November 1, 1974 in Charle-
ston, South Carolina.

Doctor Bell and his wife,
Mary Carter Hunt Bell, estab-

since 1971.

Doctor Bell was born and
reared in Edfield, South Caro-

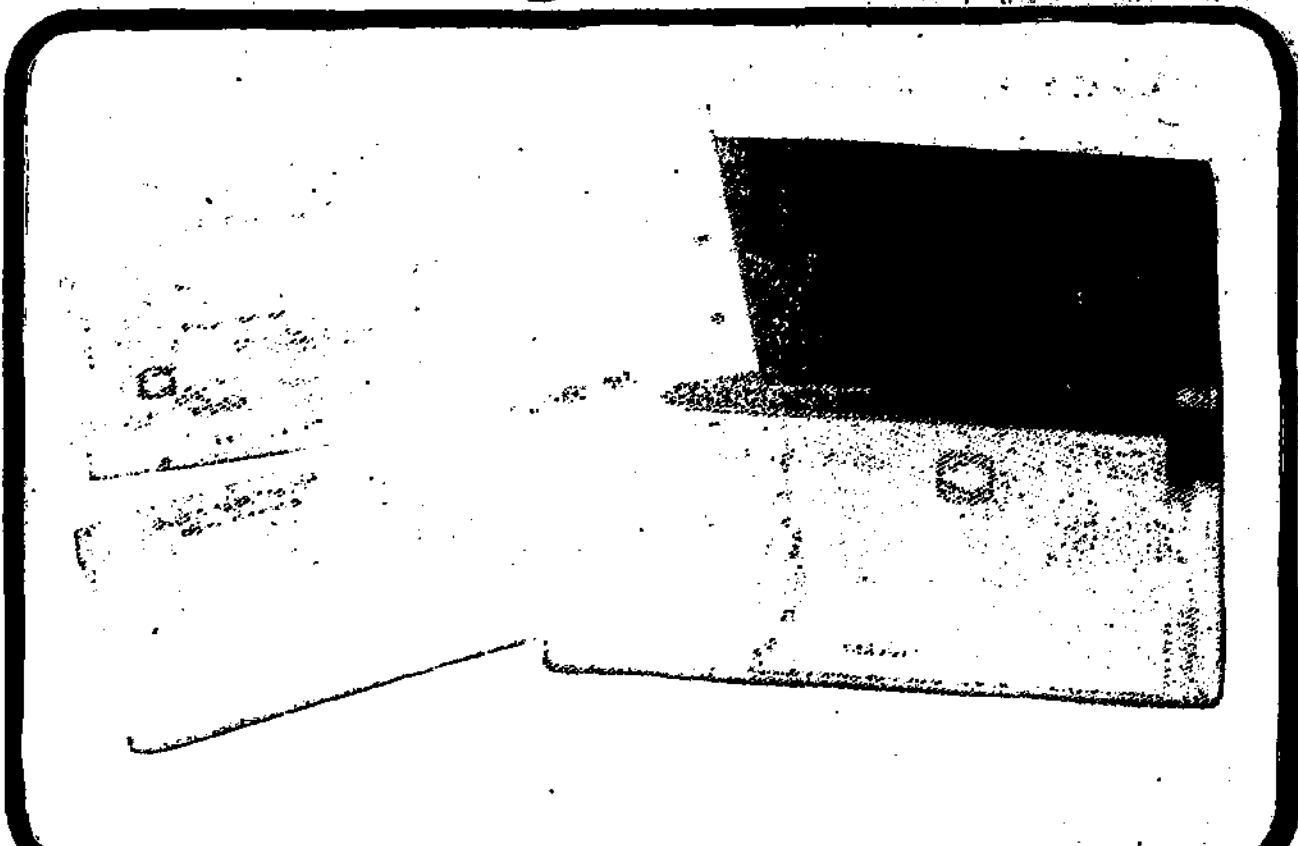

The rate filing will result in rate increases for all of Otero's customers. The proposed tariff will also contain a fuel and purchased power cost adjustment in accordance with General Order No. 28. The rules and regulations filed by Otero will also result in changes in operating procedures.

These rates will go into effect on December 11, 1974 unless suspended by the Commission.

The Commission FINDS that the new rates should go into effect without a public hearing concerning their lawfulness and should be suspended for a nine month period beginning December 11, 1974 unless all or any part of such rates are earlier approved.

The Commission ORDERS:

A. A public hearing will be held on Tuesday, December 17, 1974 at 9:30 a.m. in the offices of the Commission, Bataan Memorial Building, Santa Fe, New Mexico, to determine whether or not Otero should be allowed to place into effect its Revised NMPSC Sheets 75 through 97. The purpose of the hearing is to take testimony in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed rate increases.

B. Any interested person may examine the tariff schedules, together with any exhibits and related papers that may be filed in the offices of the Commission, and any interested person may appear at the time and place of the hearing and be heard.

C. No person may become a party to the proceeding unless he shall have filed a formal petition in intervention pursuant to the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure as set forth in the Commission's First Revised General Order No. 1. A copy of these rules may be obtained from the office of the Commission.

D. A copy of this Order is to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation in Otero, Lincoln and Chaves Counties, New Mexico. Such publications must be made at least twenty days prior to December 17, 1974. Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., shall pay the cost of the publications.

E. Pending the hearing and decision of the Commission herein, the operation and effectiveness of the rates shown by the rate schedules filed by Otero shall be suspended for a period of nine months from and after December 11, 1974 or until the effective date of the Commission's final order in this matter, subject to further order of the Commission.

A copy of this Order shall be mailed to Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., at its office, P.O. Box 1717, Roswell, N.M., and shall become effective from and after the date shown below.

The SILVER LINING

Well, Well. Only a week or so with no word between us, and it seems like a long time. It just shows you what these little messages between us mean to me. What would I do without them? I would be lost, over here across the creek. And Shady Logan, too, and Jack Frost. These two fellows like to keep in touch with you by sending a note once in a while. Remember, if you do not hear from us, we are still thinking about you. Let us see? Where shall we begin?

The Great Gift of Our Eye-Sight

You know, I have been thinking here the last few days that there comes a time in each of the four seasons when we send up a prayer of thanks to God for our eye-sight.

The fruit blossoms and early delicate flowers of Spring like violets and daffodils; the glorious green and bright flower colors of Summer; the white world of Winter, holding everything in sight in a snowy spell, the happiness among the falling flakes, and the sunshine all golden on the snow — these sights bring home to us how grateful to God we are for our eye-sight.

Autumn and Winter Side by Side

More Laws — or Positive Thinking

We have become so inured to the loss of freedom in our great country, we think the only way to solve a problem is to legislate it away.

Wage controls, surtaxes, along with the graduated income tax make it much harder, if not impossible, for the average person and the poor person to have any hope of ever realizing the "American dream". He is dangerously close to being confined forever to the financial plane upon which he is caught when his vote no longer counts — because he didn't use it wisely. Price controls seem more

like price fixing. Even the ungreedy, can hardly be blamed for thinking, "I'm only allowed to make so much — better make as much as the law allows."

As for gasoline rationing — that speaks for itself. All controls cost more taxpayer's money to operate. More expensive bureaucrats have to be hired to keep the taxpayer trying to prove he is innocent of breaking laws and regulations. Consider the extra red tape type paper work!

As for tax loopholes; if no credits were given for giveaway programs and cluttering, paper wasting coupons, maybe the merchants who use those things would get back to competing price-wise instead of price-wise and there would be a chance for prices, in the grocery stores, at least, to come down.

If our senators and congress-

men would take the money they waste on expensive junkets and what seems to the taxpayer to be ridiculous research — like into the mating calls of South American frogs, etc., and all the other unnecessary things, and put it into subsidizing plants for the recycling of garbage all over the country, they might solve a lot of problems. Apparently the technological know-how is there. What is needed is money and knowledgeable people to get plants into operation. Garbage which threatens to bury us should be turned into useful and needed things and might be a source of energy we should be tapping while research is in progress to find other means of harnessing energy.

For the love of liberty, let's let our lawmakers know we expect them to try solving our problems with a little positive thinking instead of forever compounding them with more laws, mired up with a lot of unrelated subjects. 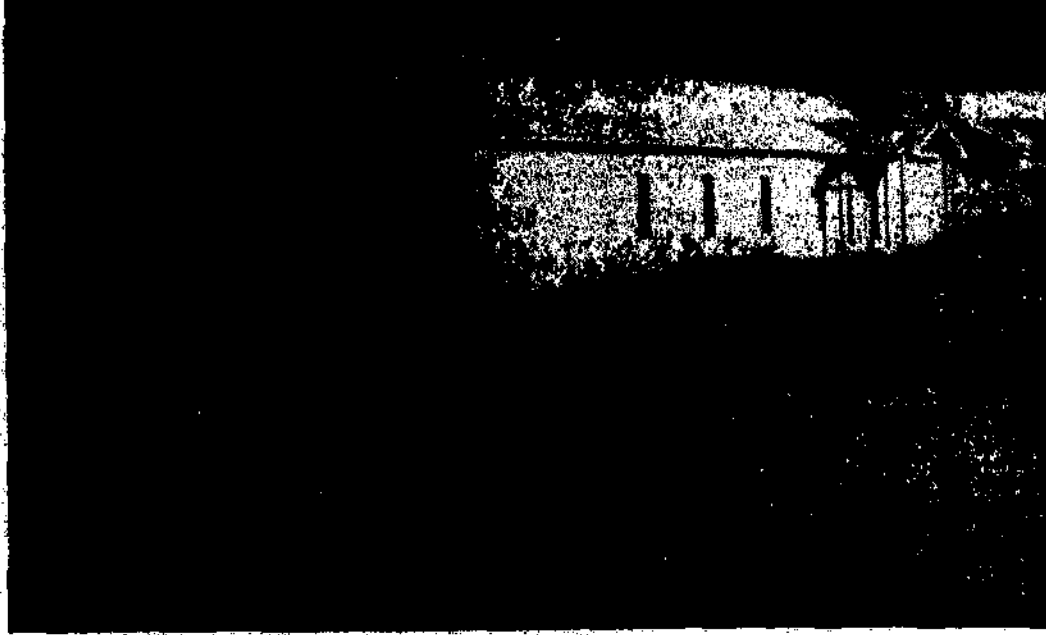

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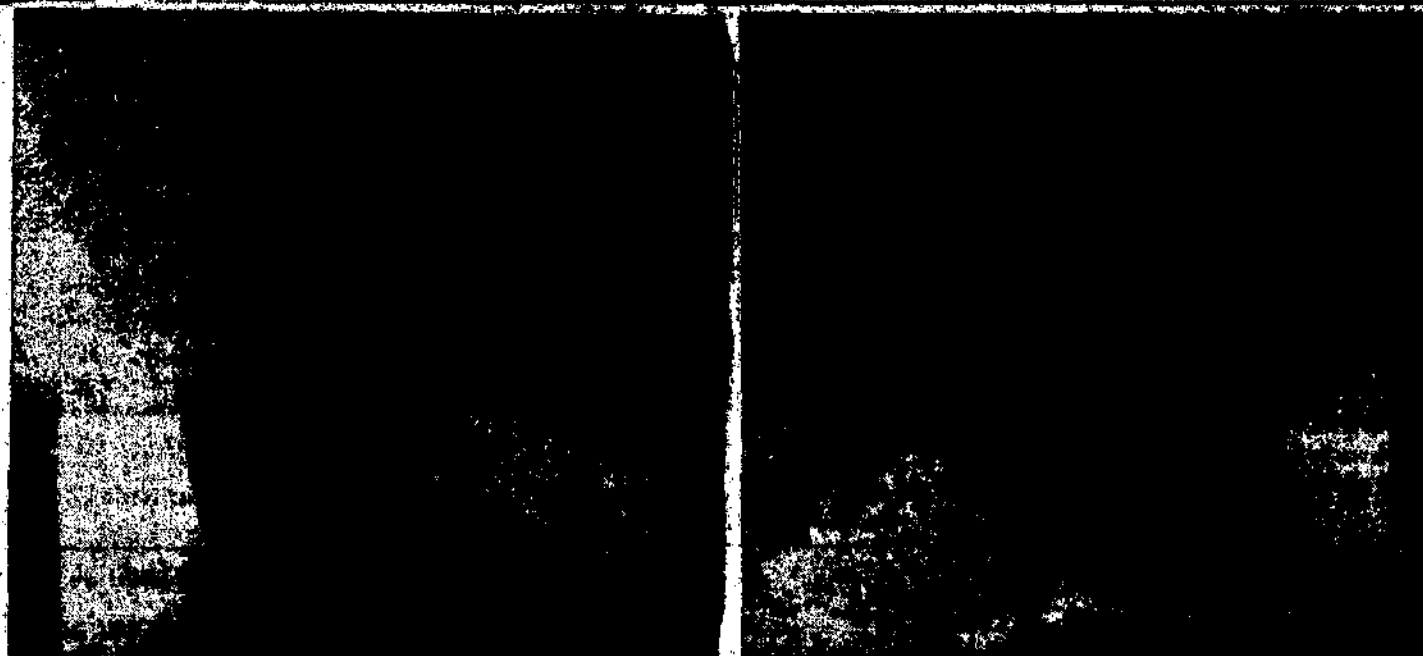
