## COUNCIL BEGINS WORK ON 1974-75 BUDGET

Discussion of the upcoming 1974-75 fiscal year budget for the Village of Ruidoso was the prominent business of the council April 11.

Village manager Jim Hine made a number of requests of the council, among them the inclusion of six new employees for the village and an overall five percent pay raise for the 66 persons the village now employs.

In making the request for the preparation of the new budget, Hine told the council that each of the village departments had requested at least one additional man for the new fiscal year. Leading these requests was the police department which had requested three more officers and a clerical assistant.

Paul Lukens, police chief, told the council that the additional personnel are needed if the force is to operate on the 40-hour week the council approved last week. He also mentioned that the clerk is needed to help reduce the time officers now spend doing reports.

Hine's request to the council recommended two additional officers for the force, a full-time, accredited librarian, certified water plant operator and a village clerk.

Regarding the clerk, Hine said that the duties of keeping the budget, overseeing the operation of the village departments and dealing with state officials on grants and other business was leaving no time for him to serve as clerk. He asked that he continue as manager and treasurer of the village but that an additional person be hired to handle his duties as clerk.

The accredited librarian is a state requirement which the village will have to provide once the new library is completed. The water plant operator, certified by the Environmental Improvement Agency, is also required by the state with the completion of the current water project. Both employees were stipulated by the state in connection with grant monies received on the two projects.

Hine noted the skyrocketing cost of living and the need to reduce employee turnover as the reasons for requesting the blanket five percent salary increase.

Hine told the council that the cost of the five new employees, including fringe benefits offered by the village, and the salary increase would cost the village approximately \$72,000 more on the new budget.

Mayor Lloyd Davis, Jr., told Hine that the council would prefer to withhold approval of the requests since Trustee Don Driver was out of town. He advised Hine to go ahead with his recommendations and present the completed budget to the full council at the next meeting.

Hine said that he would have the preliminary budget completed by April 19 and send a copy to each of the members of the council that day, for their study before the April 25 meeting. At that meeting, he hopes to have it approved for submission to the state for review by the required date of May 1.

The village will also grow by about four and one-half acres in the near future, following the approval of annexation petitions from two property owners in Carrizo Canyon.

The tracts, belonging to Alfred Gonzales and Rae Luck, adjoin the village. Jack Kannady, representing both parties, said that the two parties hoped to have their property annexed so village water would be available to them to build homes.

Chuck Brown, village inspector and member of the planning and zoning commission, again presented an ordinance for the control of travel trailer parks and parking in the village.

The ordinance, presented and tabled by the council last summer, would give the village some control over the parks within village limits.

Brown pointed out that now, the village has no way to prevent fire and safety hazards

that arise in the parks due to overcrowding during the peak seasons.

The council took the ordinance for study and review by the attorney.

Joe Roberson visited the meeting and told the council that many of the trees in Ruidoso's two parks and along right of ways were in need of care, and some even needed to be taken down.

He advised the village to begin a plan of replacing some of the older trees that are dying, as well as caring for some of the younger ones which might be in trouble.

The council agreed and gave Roberson approval to begin spraying some of the trees in the worst condition at approximately \$2.50 per tree sprayed. They told him that the village's summer parks superintendent would pay special attention to the trees this summer.

Lukens requested the permission of the council to construct approximately a 10' x 10' evidence storage room in the Boy Scout room of the municipal building. He told the council that going through the Scouts. (See Page 5)

### Army Deserter Apprehended Here

An Army deserter was apprehended here Sunday and jailed in Ruidoso pending the arrival of Military Police from Fort Bliss, Texas, Tuesday, to return the soldier to his military base to face charges of desertion.

Raymond C. Sanchez of Ruidoso Downs was arrested Sunday by Lynn Martin, Chief of Police of Ruidoso Downs and Jeff Darden, of the New Mexico State Police, and charged with speeding, careless driving and operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating beverages.

Sanchez appeared in Ruidoso Municipal Court Tuesday morning and pleaded guilty to the three offenses before acting judge Hugh Stiles, who fined Sanchez \$124 on the three counts, sentenced him to five days in jail and the loss of his driver's license for one year.

In other action Dick Mound was named chairman of the budget committee with Richard Cochrun, Chamber manager, to serve with him. Frank Sayner and Johnny Jarratt were named co-chairmen of the membership committee.

Cochrun reported the acceptance of five new members of the C. C.: Hair Affair, Woodland Ridge Apartments and Southland Corporation (7-11 Stores) all of Ruidoso, Sanders Company Advertising, Inc. of El Paso and Ginsberg Music Co., Roswell.

### Mescalero Man In County Jail

Harvey Marden, 51, of Mescalero, appeared before Judge Austin Pritchett in Magistrate's Court Wednesday morning, charged by Ruidoso Police with Criminal Trespass and Criminal Damage to Property.

Marden, who pleaded guilty to the misdemeanor charges, was sentenced by Judge Pritchett to ten days in jail and \$100 fine on each of the charges. Marden is in custody at the Lincoln County Jail in Carrizo.

Marden was apprehended by the Ruidoso Police in the John P. Ivey residence at 9 p.m. April 16. A telephone tip alerted police to the incident. Marden apparently broke a window to gain entrance to the home. Damage to the home amounted to less than \$100 the police stated.

### Local Man Facing Six Traffic Counts

A local man is facing six traffic counts, filed by the New Mexico State Police, in connection with a truck-motorcycle accident about 7 p.m. Saturday near the intersection of State Roads 48 and 37.

Michael Chaves of Ruidoso, driver of the motorcycle, was hospitalized in Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital with multiple abrasions of the arms, legs and abdomen, following the accident. His condition was reported as good by the hospital Tuesday morning.

A passenger on the motorcycle, Rex Chavez of Captain, brother of Michael Chavez, reportedly suffered no injuries.

Cesar Montoya Garcia of Ruidoso, driver of the truck, appeared before Judge Austin Pritchett in Magistrate's Court Monday morning with counsel, Atty. Mel O'Reilly, and posted a \$1,000 personal recognizance bond. Garcia will be free under this bond until a trial date is set.

Charges filed against Garcia include leaving the scene of an accident involving death or personal injuries, careless driving, driving on the wrong side of the road, failure to stop and give information at the scene of an accident, failure to notify police of an accident and following too close.

The investigating officer was Fred Bernard of the New Mexico State Police.

Ross Schwarz, circus chairman, announced that proceeds from the event will be used for such local projects as Operation Red Ball.

King Brothers Circus has thrilled generations of circus going Americans and this year's edition features the best circus acts from the United States and abroad. Trained domestic and wild animals including a herd of performing elephants are with the show. Acres of billowing canvas tents, including the huge big top, the old time circus side show, the dining department and miscellaneous smaller ones — dressing tents and stock tents, will be erected early circus day at the circus grounds west of the Villa Inn, where performances will be given at 4:00 and 8:00 p.m.

### Power Cut-off Slated For Wed., April 24

The Ruidoso News is asking the cooperation of advertisers and residents in getting their ad copy and stories to us early next week due to the power outage set for next Wednesday afternoon between 1 and 4 p.m. Our machines will require about two hours after power is restored to be ready for operation and, therefore, we must get our work done Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning.

According to Community Public Service officials, the power will be cut off by the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation to repair lines and stations between Tularosa and Ruidoso. Area residents are asked to make their plans for the outage early.

### Dub Williams to be Replaced As School Athletic Director

The Ruidoso Board of Education voted three to two, last Tuesday evening, to name Doyle Howell Athletic Director for the high school to replace Dub Williams. No reason was given for the change. This proved to be the only time that recommendations of the administration were not followed in the hiring of teachers, principals, superintendents, and non-certified personnel. Two teachers' contracts will be brought before the board at the May meeting for final action.

A 15% across-the-board increase in salaries was granted to all school employees and it was noted that some of the non-certified personnel would probably get more, to stay in line with the minimum wage law. Johnson - O'Malley personnel will also be hired at a later date when budget figures are available.

Principals were put on a 10-month contract for the 1974-75 school year. In addition to the salary increase approved by the board, 60% of health insurance premiums for teachers will be paid by the school system. Previously 30% had been paid by the district. The salary increases were approved pending approval of the State Board of Education.

The estimated budget for 1974-75 stands at \$1,095,353 (excluding transportation). The budget hearing will be held May 22.

Approval was denied, after one board member who had abstained from voting, voted no, for a Career Education Mobile Unit, to be funded totally by the federal and state aid in the amount of \$41,700, for Carrizozo, Capitan, Hondo and Ruidoso. The unit would have spent 9 weeks at each school for sixth grade students, and would have been administered by the Ruidoso District.

The question of auditors for the school books was tabled until a later meeting.

It was noted that a grant of \$1,593 had been made by the state for books in the school district, and that Title I application had been made for about \$4,427.

The board adopted a resolution to comply with the open meeting law that sets the first Tuesday of each month following the tenth as regular meeting day. May through September, the board will meet at 8 p.m. and the rest of the year at 7 p.m. Three days notice will be given on regular meets, 24 hours on special meets and no time limit was set on emergency meetings.

Bids were opened for a new sound system for the high school and the apparent low bidder, E-Z TV of Ruidoso, got the bid for \$4,142.60 for the system and service for one year on an hourly basis. There were five bidders on the system.

The school calendar was approved for 1974-75. (The calendar will be printed in The News next week.) Mileage rates for travel were increased from 10c per mile to 12c per mile and out-of-state per diem to \$36. Substitute teachers pay was raised from \$12 to \$15 per day for those without degrees and \$15 to \$18 for those with degrees.

A motion was made to drop the ceding agreements with the village of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, but died for lack of a second. Superintendent Pat Valliant noted that approval had been obtained from the state for the levy.

The board voted to send a letter of protest concerning the cut-off of power next Wednesday and also voted to dismiss school early, after the students had spent an hour or two cleaning up school grounds.

A letter of resignation from basketball coach Gary Giannoni was accepted before the board

### CIENEGITA WATER SUIT RESOLVED

## Chino States His Position on Water

The pumping of Rio Ruidoso waters to fill Cienegita Creek Reservoir will begin, Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, told The Ruidoso News in an exclusive interview, "when impounding work is done."

The dismissal of an injunction to delay the acquisition of water to fill the planned recreational reservoir Monday, by District Court Judge Joa Angel in Santa Fe, will permit development of the recreational site on schedule. "We are planning to open the facility early in the summer of 1975," Chino said.

In statements concerning the court decision and its effect on tribal plans, Chino said: "My office and our council made every effort to try to reach some agreement with the state, and it was an extreme disappointment to me that no agreement could be reached without having to go to court. 'The State people preferred

legal channels to challenge the Mescalero Apache Tribe's rights to waters that rise, traverse and border the reservation.

"I regret very much that the representatives of the State were not inclined to work out a satisfactory solution.

"I maintained, from the inception of the recent suit, that we intend to defend the water rights of the Mescalero Apache Tribe . . . and we have . . . and we shall continue to do so."

"I believe the resort project is vitally important to the social and economic development of the members of the Tribe. In addition we recognize the economic impact our development will have for our area.

"The State's action left us with no choice but to confront the law suit by the State.

"The rights of the Mescalero Apache Tribe to govern itself, to protect all of the rights of the members of the tribe, is acutely recognized by myself and the members of the Council.

"If at any time we see, or know, there is going to be an infringement upon these rights, we intend to defend and protect these rights.

"I repeat my pledge not to dry up this creek, because I recognize the fact people are dependent on waters that flow off the reservation.

"The Tribe will use the galtonage, or acre feet, to fill the dam as rapidly as possible and when that initial requirement is met, we will not interfere with the natural flow of the stream as water from the reservoir will flow back into the stream.

"I consider our treaties with the U. S. government as valid and as binding as any agreements the government makes with any other country or people.

"We have demonstrated to Ruidoso and valley people that we do have concern for others and we expect these same people to recognize our rights . . . our privileges.

"People have been skeptical that we would employ non-Indians but we demonstrated our good faith by employing many non-Indians.

"I don't know how much more anyone could ask for."

The proposed plan of conversion must be approved by at least a majority of the votes eligible to be cast by association members at a meeting at which the plan will be submitted for their approval. A proxy statement setting forth more detailed information with respect to the proposed plan of conversion will be sent to association members prior to the meeting of members.

Existing proxies held with respect to voting rights in Roswell Savings will not be voted regarding the conversion, and new proxies will be solicited for voting on the proposed plan of conversion.






**Bunt, Forestry Technician, Offers Fire Prevention Ideas**

The danger of forest fire, caused by camp fires, barbecue grills and fire places can be virtually eliminated by adopting sound safety practices, Ken Bunt, Fire Prevention Technician with the Smokey Bear District of Lincoln National Forest said Tuesday.

Cooking fires, where water is unavailable, can be extinguished by smothering the ashes, or coals, with a generous amount of dirt.

Bunt suggests that home or camp cookout fires, including barbecue grills using charcoal, be extinguished by:

- (1) Shoveling a portion of the cooled ashes into a metal container and dousing these ashes with sufficient water to cover them; and to continue with layers of ashes and water until the ashes have been inundated.
- (2) Stir the ashes in the metal container until they are muddy.
- (3) Cover the container tightly.
- (4) Let the container cool (two days is the suggested minimum time) then put the ash container with the garbage cans for disposal in the village landfill.

... and pouring water on succeeding layers of ashes until the ashes are inundated, after which the receptacle should be tightly covered.

Posted areas presently designated for camp fires include Cedar Creek, Oak Grove, Sky Line, South Fork, Nogal Lake, Baca Camp Ground at Capitan, Three Rivers and the Saw Mill Site at Pine Lodge. Water, Bunt noted, as usually available at these sites.

Bunt warns that if any smoke is visible from supposedly dead ashes that fire is still present in the ashes.

In the use of fireplaces in the home or portable stoves in or near forested areas, Bunt suggests that spark arresters be used regardless of whether the unit is fired by solid or liquid fuel.

It is suggested that spark arresters be made of a 5 1/2 to 5 8 inch copper bearing steel or the equivalent size, strength and corrosive resistant screen of 14 gauge wire.

Sheet metal rain caps should be built of 20 gauge galvanized steel or the equivalent.

The spark arrester, with rain cap, should be bolted together with 3/16 inch stove bolts and washers.

Details on constructing suggested external stove pipe and chimney spark arresters and internal stove pipe spark arresters are available at the Smokey Bear Division office in Ruidoso.

A charcoal grill, Bunt said, is classed as an open fire.



he ended up dealing with a district official in Roswell who flatly denied the request.

He pointed out that the only alternative was staying in the basement where the evidence could be destroyed by water when it flooded.

The council approved the request, noting that an attempt was being made to find the scouts a new and more suitable place to meet anyway.

Hine told the council that after a study by a state sanitation expert and the local sanitation officials, some of the commercial rates for trash pickup would have to be raised. He said that the study had shown the cost of operating the service was 20 cents per minute and some of the charges were far less than the time expended on certain pickups.

He read a letter to the council that would be sent to those businesses whose rates would be increased, stating the reason and the additional charge.

Ross Schwarz, Ruidoso's Culigan Man, gave the council additional cost figures on the proposed water softener for the Hollywood and Cherokee wells. The council declined to make a decision until Driver returned.

he would cover it the next day. Hine noted that trash could be collected over several days or weeks and staged prior to the dump day.

A date for such a clean-up was not established by the council.

Hine announced at the meeting that according to village records, the 25 year franchise with Western States Telephone Company will expire on April 22. Attorney John Thompson told the council that they might want to change some of the details of the old franchise and the company should be contacted to draw up a new franchise ordinance.

Thompson also recommended that the village hire a team from the New Mexico Municipal League to codify the village ordinances.

Thompson noted that the village had been passing ordinances since incorporation in 1946 and that many were now outdated with state and federal law, as well as being repetitive with newer ordinances.

Thompson said that he could

With Spring in the mountains again, talk of cleaning up the village is again in the air.

Davis recommended that the village provide some kind of litter containers for the heavily traveled walkways of Ruidoso. He also proposed some kind of alteration in the sanitation ordinance that would require all residences and businesses to put their trash and containers in some type of animal and windproof holders that would eliminate most of the trash now scattered all over the village.

His proposal included establishment of a list of acceptable solutions to the problem as well as a village project to supply one kind to residents who wished to have the village do it for them. He said the initial cost could be borne by the village, under a contract, and residents would repay the village in installments.

The council took no action on the suggestion but did take the proposal under consideration.

Davis also suggested that the village try to work up some system for the collection of pine needles from residents.

He noted the unkempt appearance of several areas under the control of the village. He gave the traffic circle at the top of Sudderth Dr. as an example. He suggested that the village take over maintenance of such areas rather than leaving the responsibility up to civic organizations in town.

Hine mentioned that while the council was discussing a clean-up, Bill McCarty had offered, and the environmentalist approved the use of a piece of his property near the airport for a landfill.

He volunteered it on a one day, one-shot basis and said that




## Judicial Council Sets Las Cruces Meeting

The public is invited to air its observations and suggestions of how to improve the New Mexico court procedures during a meeting to be held by the New Mexico Judicial Council. The Council created by the Legislature in 1969, is making continuous reviews of procedures in all New Mexico courts. It also recommends improvements to the Governor, the Legislature and the Supreme Court. Public meetings are held around the state and this was the first in a series planned for 1974. On April 18, 1974 at 10:00 a.m. the public meeting with all council members was held in the courtroom of District Judge E. Forrest Sanders in the Courthouse in Las Cruces. The purpose is to give all citizens an opportunity to express criticism of their ideas for improving justice in New Mexico.

The Council is interested in receiving any observations, recommendations or criticisms of our state court systems at this meeting. Council members include: LaFol E. Oman, Associate Justice of the New Mexico Supreme Court, who formerly practiced law in Las Cruces. Appeals Court Judge William R. Hendley; District Court Judge, Edmond H. Kase III of Socorro, Harry Stowers of James A. Maloney of Albuquerque; Attorney General David Norvell; Dean Fredrick M. Hart of the UNM School of Law;

HOWARD, S. D., MINER COUNTY PIONEER: "In just two short years, America observes the 200th Anniversary of its founding. This event is not intended to just be a grand and glorious birthday party, but rather a time to reaffirm our American beliefs, reevaluate our present course, and accept the challenges of living in this century. 

## In Passing

By AL LANE

Since reading an article in the Sunday supplement "Parade", we have been interested in the extraordinary powers conferred on the office of President of the United States by declaring national emergencies. There has now been formed a committee for the termination of the national emergency by the U. S. Senate. Co-Chairmen Frank Church (D-Idaho) and Charles McMathias, Jr. (R-Mo.), had this to say in the forward of their committee report:

"Since March, 1933, the United States has been in a state of declared national emergency. In fact, there are now in effect four Presidentially proclaimed states of National Emergency. In addition to the national emergency declared by President Roosevelt in 1933, there are also the national emergencies proclaimed by President Truman on Dec. 16, 1950, during the Korean conflict, and the emergency declared by President Nixon on March 23, 1970 and August 15, 1971. These proclamations give force to 470 provisions of federal law. These hundreds of statutes delegate to the President extraordinary powers, ordinarily exercised by the Congress, which affect the lives of American citizens in a host of all-encompassing manners. This vast range of powers, taken together, confers enough authority to rule the country without reference to normal Constitutional processes. Under the powers delegated by these statutes, the President may: seize property; organize and control the means of production; seize commodities; assign military forces abroad; INSTITUTE MARTIAL LAW (editor's emphasis); seize and control all transportation and communication; regulate the operation of private enterprise; restrict travel; and, in a plethora of particular ways, control the lives of all American citizens."

Executive orders become law immediately after being published in the Federal Register and it is estimated that there are now about 50,000 such EOs. The Special Committee came into existence when it was realized that nowhere in government was there a complete index of all the statutes that contained some form of emergency power, and that no one had the slightest idea of the enormity of their collective strength — or possibilities for abuse.

**THE PICTURE OF HEALTH**

**SMOKING: WHAT HAPPENS?**  
If the people of the world could be divided into two groups, smokers and non-smokers, to which group would you belong?

If you are a smoker, you have probably turned a deaf ear to all you have heard about the dangers of the habit. But, have you ever really thought about the fact that your smoking can hurt others?

The addicted smoker realizes that it would be difficult for him to quit. He has been told repeatedly that smoking is a serious danger to his health because it increases the risk of heart disease, cancer and emphysema.

But what the smoker doesn't usually realize is that his smoking can be harmful to those around him. For example, a survey in Detroit homes showed that smoker's children were sick more often than non-smoker's children. Apparently the presence of tobacco smoke in the home can make people less healthy. Smokers do have the right to smoke, but not the right to harm others.

Non-smokers can be thankful that they will probably not have cancer, lung disease and heart disease. As a non-smoker, you have the right to firmly tell smokers not to smoke in your presence. You also can take action through legislative channels, social pressures, or any other means to prevent or discourage smokers from polluting the air you breathe. Some non-smokers strongly feel that smokers should smoke on

**Menace Of The Crowd**  
"Far from the madding Crowd," wrote the poet Thomas Gray, life can be beautiful.

It can also be a lot safer. Crowds have built-in dangers, and the law requires those in charge — if anyone is — to take reasonable precautions against accidents.

Consider this case: Moviegoers came swarming into the lobby of a downtown theater, determined to get good seats at the next "break." But they pushed so hard against the restraining rope that an elderly woman in front suffered a broken rib.

In due course, she filed a damage suit against the owner of the theater. At the trial, the owner protested:

"Crowding is one of the risks of going to see a popular picture. We can't help it if people have bad manners."

But the court granted the woman's claim. The court said the management had no business allowing more people into the lobby than it could safely control.

In another case, a publicity-seeking store created a crowd on purpose by not opening its front door in time. When the door was finally thrown open, the resulting scramble left two customers injured. For its negligent role in this affair, the management was later held liable.

Still, not every crowd-caused injury is preventable. Another woman was injured in an elevator when too many people tried to squeeze in. Was this, too, the responsibility of the management? Demanding damages, the woman said it was.

But a court disagreed, seeing no one at fault in such an odd, impromptu mishap. Said the judge:

"How could the owner of the building either foresee a possible accident of the type described or forestall it?"

Smoke-filled rooms can cause problems. Smoke particles and invisible gas may irritate the eyes and nose, and may even trigger allergic reactions.

The smoke from a cigarette sitting in an ashtray is twice as dangerous as exhaled smoke since 85 per cent of the chemicals and particles, and 50 per cent of the carbon monoxide stay in the smoker's lungs.

Inhaled gases decrease the action of the small hairs which sweep waste particles out of the lungs. When this happens, harmful chemicals and particles stay in the lungs to cause damage.

If you smoke, be considerate of others. If you are interested in quitting, there are special smoking clinics which can help you stop. If you are a non-smoker, don't be afraid to speak up for your rights for clean air to breathe.

**TAKING OVER A GI LOAN**

VA loans are partially guaranteed by the Veterans Administration and hence like FHA loans, involve less risk for the lenders than conventional loans and carry lower interest rates. Many low-interest VA loans have been made with little or no down payment, which makes them real bargains to assume when buying a home financed in this manner.

A veteran can now normally transfer a GI loan with no strings attached if the VA approves the new owner's credit, and the new owner assumes the veteran's loan obligation. But there are legalities to

observe and pitfalls to avoid. For example, shifting the debt to the new owner doesn't automatically erase the seller's responsibility for repayment of the loan in case of default. **Domenici Reviews**  
U. S. Senator Pete Domenici has dispatched his Southern District fieldman, Cecil Daniels of Roswell, to review damage to Weed and Sacramento in the wake of a major forest fire. Domenici returned Saturday from a tour of four states stricken by tornadoes. He is ranked minority member of the Senate Disaster Relief Subcommittee.  
Latest report to the senator from the fire area indicates that 21 homes have been destroyed and between 150 and 200 persons left homeless, in addition to a part of the old Weed High School and Postoffice at Sacramento having been damaged severely.  
Senator Domenici wired Gov. Bruce King Monday offering assistance if the Governor chooses to ask President Nixon to declare a major disaster in the area.  
"If a major disaster is declared," Domenici said, "the area would be eligible for a wide range of federal help."  
Senator Domenici said that he has notified the federal District Assistant Administrator in Washington, D. C. of the fire damage.



 Trees use carbon dioxide in air and return oxygen. They trap dust and other particles of matter people shouldn't breathe. And trees filter out unwelcome light and noise associated with more people living in an area. Under a shade tree the air temperature is 10 to 20 degrees F. cooler than surrounding air. When trees are placed so they shade a home, the inside temperature is lowered. Generally, trees properly placed around the house will shorten the time by 60% when

 Considering gardening? — then get the publication "A Guide for Home Vegetable Gardeners," 400 H-5, available from the county extension office in Carrizozo. It will help you get the most out of your garden.

An important consideration when choosing vegetables to grow is the planting date. That's because garden vegetables have different requirements for optimum growing temperatures and growing days to maturity. The planting dates will vary depending on what part of Lincoln County you live in. The gardening guide provides a zone map indicating the three general growing areas of the state. The growing season varies from 40 to 210 days in different parts of New Mexico, based on the average date of the last killing frost in the spring and the first killing frost of the fall.

Cool season vegetables, those that should be planted during early spring, include such crops as radishes, lettuce, peas, spinach, cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, beets, onions and

potatoes. These cool season vegetables grow best in the cool mountain areas. Warm season crops, which should be planted after danger of frost is over, will include such crops as tomatoes, sweet corn, squash, cucumbers, green beans, peppers and melons. Tomatoes and melons are slow to develop in the cool mountains.






