Ruidoso Village Council Thursday directed all Village employees to strictly enforce the provisions of Ordinance 68-4, pertaining to keeping the premises free and clear of litter.

The Council's directive, issued following a unanimous vote approving enforcement of the ordinance, means that a general cleanup of business and residential areas is being ordered to include removal of debris, fire prevention practices and garbage collection.

The directive, once certain conditions have been determined at the May 9 Council meeting, will be in force on a continuing basis and not as a one-day, once-a-year activity, the council action dictates.

The ordinance gives the Council authority to give 30 days notice in instances of non-compliance, after which the Village will clean up the premises in violation and file a lien against the property for costs incurred.

The specific problem of suitable garbage containers for both downtown and residential Ruidoso will be resolved at the May 9 meeting of the Council.

The Council, in view of the village's water distribution problem, ordered an inquiry into the status of the pumps to be installed by Baker Construction Co., of Las Cruces.

Jack Kennedy, Sr., Village engineer, reported Tuesday morning that the pumps had been ordered last June but that production problems had delayed shipment, without fault to the contractor. Kennedy added that Baker crews will arrive this week to install pumps to service the Gavilan Treatment Plant and Indian Hills Country Club Estates and that it is anticipated the work will be completed within a week.

In other action the council: —Withdrew action on a proposal to install water softening equipment on the Hollywood well, pending a study of existing as well as to be constructed water storage facilities. The maximum storage potential is yet to be determined.

—Ordered Village manager James L. Hine to order 500 new water meters to replace faulty units currently in service.

—Accepted the bid of Photo-Graphics Supply, Inc., of El Paso, in the amount of \$3,000 for cabinets and storage space in the Police Department's photo processing and evidence room. Other bids received included Donald G. Whiting Co. of Albuquerque, \$3,233, and Don J. Cummings Co., of Albuquerque, \$3,348.40.

—Referred the bids of Sierra Blanca Motors, \$3,920 and of Sutton-Brock Motors, \$3,703.96 for a cab and chassis to the Ruidoso Fire Department for study.

—Commissioned the firm of Dean and Mound, CPA, of Ruidoso, to conduct the annual audit of Village accounts at a cost of \$2,756.

—Approved the report of Richard Cothran and Mike Taylor on the Chamber of Commerce's contract with the Sanders Agency of El Paso to handle public relations for the Village. The promotions will be financed through the use of 25% of the Lodger's Tax with the understanding that the \$300 per month cost be within the 25% provided by the Village. The first advertising promoting Ruidoso and area is scheduled to be released May 5.

—Authorized Joe Truitt of the Humane Society to meet with Village Attorney John Thompson to draw up an ordinance covering animal control that would be enforceable and non-controversial.

—Acknowledged notification of an additional \$10,000 grant toward the Library Center Project and the receipt of \$20,400 from the Federal Water Pollution Control Commission as reimbursement for Village programs being carried out under the commission's authority.

—Gave the Ruidoso Women's Club permission to upgrade their meeting facilities, at no cost to the Village.

SCM Resources Area Discusses Consolidation Plan; Hears Report

ACC Is Offering Scholarships For Academic Seniors

work because the government would then have to hire investigators to investigate the investigators, and later conduct an extensive survey to determine why the plan did not work."

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
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
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

In addition to the SPECIAL EVENTS listed, Lincoln County offers many permanent attractions for tourists. Museums and historic exhibits at Lincoln Town, Ancho, Capitan, Ft. Touring the countryside is a pleasure any time, from the heights of Sierra Blanca at 12,000 feet to the desert of the Tularosa Valley.

Two workmen digging at a construction site were buried to the waist by a sudden cave-in. A doctor, passing nearby, rushed to the scene and give lifesaving first aid until they could be rescued by other workmen.

But the doctor himself suffered painful injuries. Was he entitled to collect damages from the construction company, on the ground that its negligence had caused the cave-in?

In a court test, the company said it was not liable.

"We admire his courage," said the company, "but anyone who ventures voluntarily into danger does so at his own risk." However, the court said the doctor was indeed entitled to a damage award. The court said the company should have foreseen not only that workmen might be trapped but also the rescuers might rush in and get hurt too. As one judge put it:

"Danger invites rescue. The cry of distress is the summons to relief. The wrong that imperils life is a wrong to the imperiled victim; it is a wrong also to his rescuer."

Generally speaking, the law pays due respect to the heroic impulse. In fact, most courts will favor a rescuer even when the danger is merely to property, not human life.

Thus, a man injured while trying to stop a rolling automobile was awarded damages later from the car owner, who had failed to set his brakes. The court said saving property, although less urgent than saving life, is nevertheless a laudable course of action.

Still, the law does not condone outright recklessness. Another case involved a woman who was killed by a freight train while trying to pull her dog off the tracks. She had leaped over even though the train was in plain sight, bearing down fast.

Under these circumstances, a court ruled, her family could not hold the railroad responsible for the tragedy.

"A person is not excused from the consequences of his own acts in exposing himself to danger," said the court, "where the peril is so obvious."

Your Social Security

"Persons who make application for the new federal supplemental security income (SSI) benefits must prove financial need." Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative, explained recently. "In addition, proof of age, disability, or blindness may be necessary. "To assist us in establishing eligibility for the SSI payment, the following items should be brought in to the social security representative at the time application is made.

1. The social security card of the applicant
2. Proof of the applicant's age, if he is age 65 or over.
3. For any real estate owned, bring a copy of the last property tax "declaration" filed with the County Assessor's office.
4. Any life insurance policies owned.
5. A record of "liquid assets" on hand — such as cash, bank books, check books, bonds, etc.
6. The title or license registration of any automobiles or trucks owned.
7. If disabled or blind, information about medical treatment, doctors, hospitals.
8. Any medicare card issued through the New Mexico Department of Health and Social Services.
9. If not born in the United States, naturalization certificate or alien registration card will be needed.

"If the applicant is married and the spouse is either age 65 or disabled, the spouse should come in also," Mrs. Graves concluded. Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the Ruidoso City Hall on May 14 from 10 to noon and 1 to 2.

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Mental Health Unit Asks Purchase Grant

On April 15, the New Mexico Comprehensive Health Planning Council received a proposal from Southwest Mental Health Center, Incorporated, Las Cruces, to purchase three sites currently being leased by the Center. Total purchase price is estimated at \$181,264.

The Council is the Designated Planning Agency for review under Section 1122 of Public Law 92-603 which relates to reimbursement under Titles V,

XVII and XIX, Social Security Act, for services furnished in a health care facility. Federal reimbursement of expenses which relate to capital expenditures, such as depreciation and interest on borrowed funds, require approval by the appropriate local and state health planning councils.

Southwest Mental Health Center, serving a 7 1/2 county area in the Southwestern part of the state, operates three service centers, two in Las Cruces and one in Alamogordo, in connection with their work in mental health, alcoholism and drug abuse.

A public hearing on this proposal will be held in Las Cruces at a time and place to be announced later.

Moving-Expense Tax Deductions

Prior to 1970, your moving expense tax deduction was limited to the cost of transporting your household goods and family transportation costs (including meals and lodging).

Now, in addition to these costs, you can also deduct travel expenses for pre-move house-hunting trips. Also deductible now, are temporary living expenses (up to 30 days) at the new job location. In addition, expenses such as real estate commissions, mortgage costs, and similar items incurred in buying or selling your home, or settling a lease are now deductible. The maximum deduction for these newly added categories is \$2,500. No more than \$1,000 of this can be for house-hunting and temporary living expenses. These benefits now apply to the self-employed as well as to employees. To qualify for these deductions, your new job site must be at least 50 miles away. The old requirement was 20 miles.

SANTA ROSA-CLOVIS — Guadalupe County Democratic Chairman Frank Encinias blasted Democratic Gov. Bruce King for not recognizing county chairman.

Encinias also told the State Democratic Executive Committee at Alamogordo: "I have spent 63 of my 83 years in Democratic Party ranks. I have never seen anything so badly disorganized between county chairmen and the state party officials as I have seen today."

Santa Fe County Democratic Chairman Louis Valdes supported Encinias' stand. Valdes said relations are poor between county chairmen and all elected state officials. All of the 10 officials are Democrats.

Democratic county chairmen have leveled strong criticism at the King administration previously, claiming too many Republicans are in state jobs and not enough Democrats have been hired.

Our soundings on a Guadalupe County campaign trip April 22-23 showed Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, Belen, leading the Democratic governor primary. Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces, is second. Encinias actively supports Apodaca although Encinias is county Democratic chairman. Party rules ban party officers from pre-primary support of candidates.

Other Democratic governor contenders will get little Guadalupe County vote — Sen. Odie Echols, Boston Witt, Drew Cloud and Bobby Mayfield. The county population is some 87 per cent Spanish surnamed.

Encinias supports Sen. Robert Ferguson, Artesia, for the Democratic dinner staged by nomination in Guadalupe. He says an Apodaca-Ferguson general election ticket would offer

ethnic and geographical balance. Ex-Senate Minority Leader Joe Skeen, Picacho, Lincoln County, holds a big lead in Guadalupe in the Republican governor primary over Jack Eastham, Albuquerque lawyer and also a former Senate GOP leader. Skeen's ranching background and long party service appeals to the small Guadalupe Republican vote.

Democrats outnumber Republicans 2.5-1 in Guadalupe. A turnout of about 1,000 Democrats and 300 Republicans is expected in the primary June 4. Sen. Apodaca campaigned in Guadalupe April 22-23. Apodaca says 35 per cent of the primary vote would carry Guadalupe for him.

U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya told 500 at an all-candidates Democratic dinner staged by Otero County Young Democrats in Alamogordo that he deplores lack of confidence by citizens in government. He said Democrats in Congress "are going to restore this nation to the people."

In the 1970 reelection campaign more than \$200,000 of unreported contributions were collected in Washington for Sen. Montoya's campaign. Atty. Gen. David Norvell, formerly of Clovis, held in a long opinion Montoya's contributions were not required to be reported then.

Sen. Echols estimated a Glen Campbell show in Albuquerque Wednesday (May 1) would gross \$30,000-\$35,000 and net \$25,000-\$30,000 for his campaign expenses. Famed entertainer Campbell and five of his company artists staged the show to boost Echols' campaign efforts.

Show tickets were \$5.50 and \$6.50, Echols said. He said 375 tickets at \$50 each were sold to Saturday, April 27, totaling

\$18,750, to special after-the-show cast party, also to raise funds for his campaign.

Our campaign soundings in conservative, prosperous Curry County on an East Side swing: Home county candidate Echols will carry Curry with Tibo Chavez a strong second and ex-State Rep. Mayfield, Albuquerque attorney, third.

Skeen will carry Curry County in the GOP primary over Eastham. Three other GOP governor candidates will trail badly. Skeen, a sheep and cattle rancher, has good rapport with the big Curry County farming population.

An all-candidates Curry County Republican Women's Federation dinner attracted 100. All of the five GOP governor candidates attended, a rarity in the current campaign: Skeen, Eastham, former Vietnam prisoner of war James Hughes, Santa Fe; Albuquerque insurance agency owner Hamilton Rogers and Santa Fe businessman Walter Bruce.

Eastham predicts 25,000 votes will win the GOP governor nomination in a total of about 55,000. He says he will win 12 counties. Among them with Eastham's predicted vote are Taos, 800; Sandoval, 700; Valencia, 1,100, and big Bernalillo, 18,000. Eastham's home base, Jack says he will win half of the Curry vote, 475, and will split Guadalupe with Skeen.

Tibo Chavez campaign staffers claim Tibo leads Apodaca by 7 per cent in a statewide poll completed 10 days ago. They say Echols and Mayfield are 8 per cent behind Apodaca and Cloud and Witt trail far behind. But a big 45 per cent of the vote in the poll was undecided.

Our own soundings showed these leaders in other counties: Quay — Echols and Skeen; San Miguel — Chavez and Apodaca and Skeen; Otero — Chavez, Apodaca and Mayfield and Skeen; Los Alamos — Chavez, Echols and Witt. Skeen built an early base in Los Alamos, but Eastham is eroding Joe's strength here.

(Held From Last Week) CARLSBAD - FARMINGTON — Impressions on the campaign trail: Sen. Tibo Chavez, Belen, leads the Democratic governor race but his margin is narrow. Gov. Bruce King's help will not nominate Tibo. King is unpopular in some areas. Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las

Cruces, is running second in the Democratic governor race. Sen. Odie Echols, Clovis, is the unknown quantity. Odie might charge through to grab the lead in the remaining campaign segments.

Bob Mayfield of Albuquerque, an ex-House member, will not win. Gov. King switched his support last fall from Mayfield to Chavez. Some cynical observers foresee a King switch-back to Mayfield in the closing campaign weeks.

Albuquerquean Drew Cloud and Santa Fean Boston Witt will run far behind the leaders. Cloud says he depends on volunteer support. Witt is spending much campaign money.

In heavily Democratic Eddy County Tibo Chavez and Jerry Apodaca split organized labor support. The Eddy County labor vote has been ineffective in recent elections. Mayfield, a lawyer, leads in San Juan County.

Probably Sen. Chavez will ultimately win an edge in Eddy County which is 5-1 Democratic over Republicans.

Lincoln County rancher Joe Skeen, 46, of Picacho has clear leads in Eddy and San Juan Counties in the Republican governor primary. Skeen's conservatism and open style of campaigning win support.

But Skeen has campaign organization problems. His scheduling is sometimes confused and his transportation arrangements are kinked too often. Skeen probably leads ex-Sen. Jack Eastham of Albuquerque and three other candidates in the Republican governor primary.

But the pivotal area for Republicans is the vote-heavy Albuquerque Heights. Eastham says he leads Skeen 2-1 there. Big, affable Joe must chop in to Eastham's Albuquerque lead to win the GOP governor nomination. Bernalillo County casts 43 per cent of the total Republican primary vote.

Democrats are tearing themselves apart in the governor primary. Chavez and Apodaca may dilute their strength opposing each other and another candidate may win the party nomination.

Gov. King has not built a state party organization so there is little base for the general election campaign effort. Six hard-campaigning Democratic governor candidates in the primary may soak up most available campaign funds and leave only a small potential for the main event.

U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, subject to reelection in 1976, says he is uncommitted in the Democratic governor primary. But Montoya's friends are generally supporting Tibo Chavez.

Will Gov. King oppose Sen. Montoya in 1976 in the Democratic primary? King is ineligible for reelection this year. We are unconvinced that Bruce will go back to his ranch in January. King has been in politics 20 years.

Bruce will build a home in the Santa Fe area. He could stay in the public eye and try to unseat Sen. Montoya in two years.

Sen. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts will not run for president in 1976. If Kennedy announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination, he would be a target for another political assassination.

Kennedy could easily be the Democratic presidential candidate in 1976. If he does not run,

Oktoberfest Meet Set For Tularosa

Fabian Chavez, Director of the Tourist Division of the Department of Development, will be the guest speaker at the kickoff meeting for the Planning Committee for the 1974 Oktoberfest. The meeting will be held at noon, May 3, at Henry's Restaurant in Tularosa.

Oktoberfest is a joint effort on the part of communities in the south central portion of the state to promote tourism. In 1973, some 75,000 visitors took part in festivities which included rodeos, an international fair,

beer drinking contests and a golf tournament. The events were held in the towns of Alamogordo, Cloudcroft, Ruidoso Downs, Tularosa and Carrizozo.

Other special events of the month-long fest included pedestrian hikes through White Sands National Monument, tours of the Trinity bomb site, apencades and rallies for motorcycles and four-wheel drive vehicles.

According to Mary Myers, head of resort development with the Department of Development, several new events being considered for the fourth annual Oktoberfest this fall include community theater productions, bowling tournaments, Indian dances and a greased pig contest for small fry.

One new event firmly scheduled for October is a Liars Banquet to be sponsored by the Otero County Wildlife Federation.

Further information about the May 3 meeting can be obtained from Buzz Zink of Alamogordo, acting chairman of the Oktoberfest Committee. His telephone number is 437-3835.

Rep. Murray Ryan of Silver City told an Eddy County Republican audience: "We've had four years of drifting and dreaming and doing nothing in the executive branch."

Ryan, state Republican chairman, pointed his remarks at Democratic Gov. King's administration. Ryan represents Sierra and Grant Counties. He is opposed for reelection.

Rep. Ryan said: "We've had about all of the 'good old boy' syndrome that we can stand." Ryan said he was amazed at the "torpedoing" that has been under way against President Richard M. Nixon.

Ryan told 200 Republicans at Carlsbad: "It's a time for us to stand extremely solid, not to panic." He said he is active in politics "because of an ingrained belief in the two-party system."

Skeen, 46, says he wants to poll 25,000-30,000 votes in the Republican governor primary. He disdains labels but says he is a conservative. Skeen emphasized a need to underscore programs in public schools in talks at Carlsbad and Farmington. He says the stress has been on more school money for years.

Sen. Chavez issued a position paper on eight basic issues. They are good jobs, the energy shortage, quality of life, education and training, economy in government, taxation, cost of living, crime and drug abuse.

Sen. Apodaca said his campaign bought a plane because planes of friends were often unavailable for use for campaign trips. Jerry is responsible for the obligation. The plane will be sold after the campaign ends.

Order of Closure Issued for State And Private Lands

Due to the extremely dry fuel conditions and the high fire hazard prevalent throughout the Southern portion of the State, and in accordance with New Mexico Statutes annotated 62-3-11 the State Forestry Conservation Commission has placed a closure on all State and Private Lands within the below listed Counties.

All open fires for the purpose of recreation on State and Private nonmunicipal lands are prohibited. Fires for the purpose of maintaining a livelihood such as: branding fires, sacaton burning for feed, cactus burning for feed, etc., are permitted only when they are under the direct supervision of the landowner on whose land they are ignited.

All other non-recreational open fires are prohibited. The Counties involved in this closure as of this date are: Bernalillo, Catron, Chavez, Colfax, Curry, De Baca, Dona Ana, Eddy, Grant, Guadalupe, Harding, Hidalgo, Lea, Lincoln, Luna, McKinley, Otero, Quay, Roosevelt, Sierra, Socorro, Torrance, Union and Valencia.

As vegetative cover in the above mentioned Counties ceases to be a critical fire hazard the closure will be lifted on a County by County basis. The closure will stay in effect in each remaining County until lifted.

For all general purposes the effective area of closure will include all State and Private nonmunicipal Lands South of State Road 44 and Interstate 40 and the Northeast Plains.



HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE
 High blood pressure, also known as hypertension, is as common among middle-aged Americans as measles are to pre-schoolers.

But, high blood pressure can be much more serious than measles because it is damaging to your whole body and sometimes is a symptom of another disease. High blood pressure makes you more subject to heart attacks, strokes and kidney problems.

The fact is that high blood pressure has become such a serious problem for so many people that it has been rated as a national health priority for research and treatment.

Just what is high blood pressure? The amount of force the blood puts on the walls of the arteries and veins in your body determines your blood pressure. If a great deal of pressure is exerted, your blood pressure is said to be high. Your doctor can measure your level with a blood pressure cuff which he simply wraps around your arm for a few seconds.

How do you know if you might have high blood pressure? Symptoms of high blood pressure vary, usually are vague, and those that occur might be due to many causes. Symptoms associated with high blood pressure could include headaches in the morning before you get up, ringing in your ears, blurred eyesight, difficulty in breathing, and having to go to the bathroom more than once during the night.

Who is most likely to have high blood pressure? Your

chances of having high blood pressure are increased if you are over 40, or if other members of your family have it or have had a stroke, heart or kidney disease. You may also be subject to high blood pressure if you have had frequent urinary tract infections or any kind of kidney disease, including kidney stones.

Also susceptible are women who had high blood pressure while pregnant, as well as those who take birth control pills. Others include people who are overweight.

If you think you might have high blood pressure, it is your responsibility to go to your clinic, or your doctor for a quick and painless check. Blood pressure clinics will soon be available in New Mexico communities. Remember, high blood pressure can be successfully treated.
