

Village water pumps put in

The delivery of flanges, valves and other connections Tuesday to Baker Construction of Las Cruces, installers of the new pumping system to provide an additional 7,500,000 gallon storage of treated water for Ruidoso, signaled the near-completion of the project that has been drastically delayed by shipping problems.

The delay, according to Wayne Baker, owner of Baker Const.,

contractors for the new pumping system, was two-fold. "We ordered two pumps for each of the stations, with one pump to serve as standby, June 20, 1973. The four pumps were delivered in mid-May of this year.

"The fittings could not be ordered until after receipt of the four new pumps because all fittings must be made to order for the individual pumps. "The arrival of the fittings, Tuesday, after numerous shipping delays, means that we will have the new pumping system installed and functioning by this weekend," Baker said Tuesday.

Under present water conditions, after checking the system and erecting it which will take about a week. "It will take an extended period of time," village engineer Jack Kannady said Wednesday. "to fill the storage tanks," meaning three weeks to a month from the time pumping begins into the tanks. "If we could run the 700-gallon a minute pumps around the clock, we could fill the tanks in just five days," Kannady added.

Once storage pumping is started, Kannady said, "water from the new system will be available on a demand basis, with no interference to present supplies."

Lincoln to install new water system

Installation of the \$124,800 water system for the village of Lincoln was assured May 30 with the signing of the work order by Paul Pacheco, chairman of the Lincoln County commissioners and H. T. Pillingim, Jr., Lincoln County manager. EDA and FCRC grant approvals stipulate project construction is to commence on or before June 10, with completion within 150 calendar days or by Nov. 10.

Southwest Utilities, Inc., of Las Cruces was awarded the construction contract with engineering by Mann Engineering Co., of Roswell. Dignitaries present for the signing in addition to Pacheco of Arabela and Pillingim of Carrizozo, included county commissioners J. O. "Bud" Payne of Carrizozo and W. A. "Bill" Hart of Ruidoso; project attorney Bill Payne of Carrizozo; Ed Penfield of Lincoln, president of the Lincoln Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Ass'n.; and an additional \$9,300 from Lincoln County, through the commissioners.

Included in the project will be a new well, a 100,000 gallon storage tank for treated water; chlorinator, pumps, 5,110 feet of six inch and 580 feet of four inch pipe, 4,410 feet of two inch service pipe and seven fire plugs.

Project research was initiated by the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, working with Lincoln County and Lincoln County Commissioners to secure the Economic Development Administration and Four Corners Region Commission grants. After the signing, Penfield water association vice president Cy Salas of Lincoln and District 50 state representative John Bigbee. The signing took place in front of the almost century old Tunstall Store and Lincoln Post Office.

Financing, to upgrade the system installed in 1957 utilizing WW II surplus pipe, was obtained through a \$76,000 EDA grant, \$25,900 FCRC grant, a loan of \$16,000 from the Lincoln County Commissioners and Lincoln Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Ass'n., and an additional \$9,300 from Lincoln County, through the commissioners.


Futurity trial run highlights coming action at Downs

In Friday's action, 26 New Mexico-bred hopefuls will fight it out in the four-furlong spins. The top three finishers from each dash will earn a berth in the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity booked for June 16. Horses being mentioned in these trial runs include Deed A Day, Limponin, Gypsy Be Good, Doc Boy, Stack's Jet, I Have Heard, Go, Glenda Rae and Truly A Card. In Saturday's tango, Choice Bait has been tabbed at 118 pounds with Frank Henning calling the plays. Other hopefuls contesting under allowance conditions over the 5 1/2 furlongs include Honey Jug, Little Hot Talk, Speedy Spirit, Skip Bo, Navispirit, Small Gun, Calico Dot, Blues Special and Bold Driver. In Sunday's Aspen Stakes, Foolish Edition, who was recently named best three-year-old thoroughbred at Sunland Park, has been handed down the top weight of 120 pounds. The rest of the field, with assigned weights, includes: Alice From Dallas 119, Winabux 119, Cheyenne Cosper 118, Daddy's Little Man 115, Chidara 113, Scenic Dancer 113, Pres Again 113, Lu Ven 108, and El-Tasador 107. 



OUTDOOR PLANT POISONS
 With the first breath of spring children are anxious to be out of the house to play in the yard or nearby fields, and to sniff or even taste and swallow newly budding plants. What most of these children don't know is that many of these plants can be killers.
 More than 700 different kinds of plants are known to be deadly poisons; every year an estimated 12,000 children eat plants which their parents didn't even know were dangerous.
 Although large amounts of most dangerous plants must be eaten to produce a serious or fatal poisoning in an adult, the situation is a little different with children. Small children are very curious and will chew on anything within reach. Eating a small amount of a poisonous plant can make a child seriously ill, or even kill him.
 The seeds and leaves of many plants are most dangerous to children. The stinkweed, which grows almost everywhere, causes more poisonings than any other plant. This plant grows from two to five feet tall, and has large leaves and white, funnel-shaped flowers that look like morning-glories.
 Another danger to children are the small pretty berries on plants. These berries often look like tasty fruit, but their juice may be deadly. Parts of fruit trees, such as the twigs from a cherry tree or the leaf of the peach tree, are dangerous poisons that are attractive to children.

Result: a collision with a car coming along the other street. Was Alex guilty of negligence? He insisted that he was not, pointing out in a court hearing that he had brought his car to a full stop at the sign. "That's all the law requires," he said, "I stopped, looked and listened at the designated place."
But the court found him guilty of negligence anyhow. The court said a "blind" corner imposes an extra duty on motorists — regardless of stop signs or traffic signals — to proceed with caution.
The law does recognize, however, that caution is a matter of degree. For example: Another man also entered an intersection that he could not see because of shrubbery. But this time, the man edged forward at a small's pace, glancing in both directions. Even though he still got in the way of an oncoming car and caused a collision, a court ruled afterward that he could not be held legally liable.
"The law does not require the impossible," said the court. "One cannot be held guilty of negligence because he is unable to see through impenetrable objects or to bend his vision around them."
What about the responsibility for making the intersection blind in the first place? Unless a special statute so provides, the local government ordinarily cannot be held liable for this kind of hazard.
However, courts have occas-







Your Social Security

"The 3rd of each month is a significant date in the lives of over 30,000 social security beneficiaries in southeastern New Mexico. Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative, stated today, "This is the day that social security checks are normally received."

"Most of the social security checks in southeastern New Mexico come from Kansas City. However, as more retirees move in from the north and east, an increasing number of checks come from New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, etc. Although all checks are scheduled to be mailed in order to reach local post offices for delivery on the 3rd, delays sometimes occur. However, most of these delays 'wash out' within two or three days."

"For this reason, no action is taken by the local social security office until the 6th of the month." Mrs. Graves pointed out. "Therefore, if a check is late the beneficiary should wait until the 6th to contact the social security office. That office will then use every means at its command to report the missing check and attempt to get it delivered to the beneficiary as rapidly as possible."

"Checks are sometimes delayed because the beneficiary has moved. To help prevent this the social security office should be notified immediately when a change of address occurs," Mrs. Graves emphasized.

Mrs. Graves may be contacted at the Ruidoso City Hall on June 11 from 10 to noon and 1 to 2.




State Game & Fish officers clamping down on violators

The fishermen, not the fish, were caught in the net. State Game and Fish Department officers, continuing an intensive patrol technique that caught 35 fishing law violators two weeks ago, swept more than 120 violators into court over the Memorial Day weekend.

Ted Burt, chief of the Department's Law Enforcement Division, said about 90 percent of the citations were issued for fishing without a license. "Indications are that fishing without a license is on the increase," Burt said, "and we'd like the public to know that our patrols are going to increase accordingly."

Utilizing unmarked cars, plain clothes officers and long-range spotting equipment, some 15 game department men patrolled the Elephant Butte-Caballo Lake-Rio Grande area around Truth or Consequences, Snow and Quemado Lakes and the Gila Wilderness. Smaller teams patrolled other fishing waters throughout the state.

"We concentrated on the Truth or Consequences area this weekend," Burt said. "Our experiments with the plain-clothes officers and unmarked cars two weeks ago in the Borio Lake area showed that we could increase markedly the number of violators caught. Citations issued during the Memorial Day holidays bore this out."

"We're going to continue using the technique, hitting different waters at different times with the intensive patrols, in addition to our usual patrols by uniformed officers."

The intensive patrol teams checked some 3,000 fishermen on Elephant Butte and Caballo reservoirs, 23 along the Rio Grande below Caballo, 27 on Snow, Wall and Quemado lakes, and 20 in the Gila Wilderness.

Burt noted that the increased cost of trout fishing — the \$5 trout stamp — apparently is not the cause of the increased violations.

"Most of those arrested didn't have any license to put a stamp on," he added. "With few exceptions, licensed fishermen checked in areas where the special stamp is required had a trout stamp."


Most of the violators cited for fishing without a license offered no excuse or only flimsy excuses, Burt said.

"People simply are not buying licenses. They're going to have to realize that if they're going to fish, they're going to have to pay their share of the cost of raising fish and planting them."

"They're also going to have to realize that if they fish without a license, their chances of getting caught and paying a



Painting Tips

Top quality paint jobs start with quality paint brushes. To get the finest performance from pure bristle brushes, pre-conditioning is of prime importance. Here's how it's done:

1. Remove as many loose bristles from the brush as possible without damaging it. A good technique is to roll the bristle end of the brush gently between your palms.
2. Rewrap the bristles to protect their shape. The wrapped brush should be suspended in linseed oil for a minimum of 24 hours before using — longer if possible. This prevents the bristles from absorbing paint pigment, and makes them flexible.
3. Before using the brush, carefully remove the oil by dipping it out over the lip of the can. Then roll the brush handle between your palms, roughing up the surface, such as raw taking care to avoid splattering the oil on your clothes or walls.
4. To insure all oil is removed, wash the brush in thinner or turpentine. Work out most of the thinner. Before painting, allow the brush to dry thoroughly.
5. When you start painting, working it out over the lip of the can. Then roll the brush handle between your palms, roughing up the surface, such as raw taking care to avoid splattering the oil on your clothes or walls.



Inside the Capital

TAOS — Democrats face a rugged task uniting for the general election campaigning in a reading, 6-man governor primary fight.

Albuquerquean Drew Cloud, a gubernatorial candidate, said in mid-May at Las Cruces in the heat of the battle: "The Democratic Party is badly split right now. The primary job will have a tremendous job to pull the party back together without personality clashes and vindictiveness."

Drew successfully steered the Democratic Party to victory in 1970 as state chairman. He said he could restore unity better than other gubernatorial contenders. Cloud said: "I conducted a positive campaign. I did not criticize other candidates. I believe they are friends of mine."

Behind a pledge of clean campaigning, taken at the State Democratic Party convention in Albuquerque, some gubernatorial candidates sharply criticized their primary opponents with questionable tactics.

A final weekend campaign rally at Taos attracted 70 voters and four Republican gubernatorial candidates — James Lindberg Hughes, Joe Skeen, Walter Bruce and Hamilton Rogers.

Hughes said he is the only non-politician in the field. Skeen said more vocational and bilingual education is needed. Bruce told ward and precinct GOP officials: "You are probably more important politicians than those sitting up here" at the speaker's table.

Rogers said: "I'm supporting the President. I don't think the President has done anything wrong." Rogers' comment sparked heavy applause. Speaking for Jack Eastham, Bill Cortez said a change is needed in the state Democratic administration. Cortez said Eastham is well-qualified with long legislative experience to be governor.

Taos County GOP Chairman Rudy Pacheco presided at the Saturday rally.

Lincoln County rancher Skeen of Picacho reported \$98,259 in campaign contributions to May 30 — \$88,074 cash and \$10,184 in-kind.

Among major cash contributions to the Skeen campaign were Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Edwards, Lincoln County, \$250;

Mr. and Mrs. Dean Fite, Socorro County, \$200, and James Buttrick, Curry County, \$200.

A Skeen Lincoln County dinner raised \$4,569. In-kind contributions included \$500 for billboards from Richard Zanotti, Albuquerque.

Skeen ended his primary election campaigning Monday with tours of Clovis and Roswell. He expects to carry Curry and Chaves Counties.

Mrs. Leyla Torres, Skeen Socorro County chairman, disputed Eastham's prelection claim he would win Socorro County over Skeen with 600 votes. Mrs. Torres said: "I don't think Holm Bursum will be able to pull it off this time."

Bankers Holm Bursum Jr. and Holm Bursum III of Socorro backed Eastham strongly in the GOP gubernatorial primary. Mrs. Torres indicated Eastham would be defeated by Skeen in Socorro County. Her husband, Steve Torres, is a New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology board of regents member. She said Torres was not allied with the Skeen campaign.

The State Highway Department might save taxpayers much money by adjusting upward its right-of-way acquisition offers. In at least five Hidalgo County Interstate 10 right-of-way acquisitions the Highway Department offered property owners far less than the owners said they would accept.

The cases landed in district court condemnation suits. Judgments awarded landowners much more than property owners were willing previously to accept in most cases.

The Highway Department acquired property owned by Franklin Hood, Ed Bowman, City of Lordsburg, Hidalgo Area Development Corp. and the Mesa Noche Estate.

The Highway Department will open bids June 21 on a 13.2-mile overlay in the Hidalgo County line southwest of plant mix bituminous pavement is specified.

Governor-running Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces Democrat, reported his campaign raised \$156,481 and spent \$155,492 to May 30. Sen. Apodaca said 2,083 persons donated an average of \$10.70 to his campaign in the April 15-May 30 period.

Jerry listed \$47,000 in loans among campaign contributions — \$20,000 from himself and a \$24,500 loan on a note signed by Apodaca and co-signed by 49 members of his Bernalillo County campaign committee.


