

PGA tourneys are his forte . . . but he doesn't golf



BOB GREEN

A Ruidoso man (a Roswell) knows the world's top golf courses like a politician thinks he knows his constituents . . . is on a first name basis with present day golfing greats . . . is in on the action at a minimum of 45 Professional Golfers Association tournaments a year . . . and . . . to quote him . . . "never plays the silly game."

Bob Green is the man . . . Ruidoso's Black Forest is his home . . . and he is the only sports writer in the U. S. at least, who is assigned, full time, to cover PGA tournaments. And he doesn't play golf.

Bob knows what the pros know . . . that his job is to report facts . . . and nothing more. Bob respects the pros. The pros respect Bob. It's taken Bob six long years to establish this rapport. It pays off.

Remember the hassle about Lee Elder . . . golf's first black to become eligible to play the Masters? Well . . . a bunch of eager beaver reporters took Elder's words literally . . . something to the effect, "I don't know if I'll play in the Masters" — you recall Elder's struggle to win that right . . . privilege? — Well . . . Bob followed Elder out of the room after that news conference . . . and he said, "Lee, what's this business about maybe you won't play in the Masters?" Lee Elder stopped . . . turned . . . looked into Bob's eyes . . . "That was just a remark . . . I'll play."

Bob Green said, "Thanks." And the next day, the AP carried an account of that press conference in which Bob Green had the truth . . . that Lee Elder would play in the Masters. It's this way. The pros know Bob Green . . . they trust him . . . they confide in him . . . they know Bob Green never sells them short . . . never takes a direct quote . . . possibly interpreted . . . without checking with the golfer making the statement.

Bob Green sleeps well nights. As to the glamor of being an AP correspondent, and all those fabulous golf courses . . . from Pebble Beach to the horrendous monster layouts swept by tricky winds and torrential rains that the Scots call golf courses . . . it's not all that glamorous.

Bob works a seven day week, when on tour. Monday is travel day . . . from 3 to 15 hours . . . often across international time zones . . . which foul up his bodily functions. Tuesdays he checks into the golf course, gets his communications lined up, writes his Wednesday story. Wednesday he gets out a "program piece", plus color articles for the Thursday morning papers and features for the afternoon and evening editions. Thursday he writes the early lead stories, wrap ups of the day's action and stories for the early Friday morning editions. Friday is a repeat of Thursday . . . except for the days of publication. Saturday he gets the early leads out and a wrap up for the late editions. Sunday finds him pounding out the early lead, another wrap up and optional features (demanded by his boss) for the Monday editions. In his spare time he knocks out special articles on the golfing greats, writes a

golfing column, gets out advance features, gets his Sunday sports editors, gets his Sunday features in the mail and, as occasion demands, writes special human interest articles. There's more than meets the eye, when Bob's apparently lazily around in the special press tent overlooking the 18th hole on the Firestone Country Club when Jack Nicklaus sinks a tournament winning putt.

Bob Bob is sneaky. After the opening round he has Mrs. Green compile the statistics on the opening round's 144 golfers . . . next, she gets the figures on the remaining 72 and even the last 36. Which helps. Bob, that is.

And in the midst of dealing with these golfing greats, Bob has taken the time to learn that "ALL of these men . . . the greats . . . near greats are just human . . . like the rest of us."

It's a glamor life Bob and his wife lead . . . they get to places the average pasture pool devotee fantasizes over . . . and to them it's a way of life . . . dealing "with great people" . . . and they wouldn't have it any other way . . . ever for 45 or more weeks a year.

But occasionally, as Bob and his wife fly over Ruidoso, en route to another golf tournament, his comment on that experience is, "It almost makes us cry."

RUIDOSO'S STEADY GROWTH IS CONTINUING

Building permits top \$7 million

The steady growth of the village of Ruidoso is reflected in the statistical comparison of the many departments reflecting that growth, released Wednesday by village manager Jim Hine.

Better reflecting the continuing trend, is the compilation for building permits in preceding fiscal years: 1968-69, \$1,077,383; 1969-70, \$859,056; 1970-71, \$1,617,728 and 1971-72, \$2,645,523. Roughly, the building permits issued during 1972-73 and 1973-74 both totaled more than all of the building permits issued during the four preceding periods.



The board of trustees of the village of Ruidoso Downs heard a letter of resignation from board member Neil Smith at the regular meeting last Monday evening at the village hall. The resignation was accepted and Mayor J. J. DiPaolo appointed James H. Roberts to fill the unexpired term of Smith. Smith noted that his reason for resigning was "due to a personal obligation".

A discussion of flood control was held but no action was taken.

Subject material for the scientific sessions includes goiters, eye injuries, coronary artery disease, rheumatoid arthritis, drug interactions, anti-microbial therapy, disc problems, and childhood speech and hearing problems.

The village will make application for matching funds for recreation projects. Deadline for the application has been set for July 15.

Considerable discussion was held on the subject of garbage collection rates with further study planned before any decision is made on changes.

Mayor DiPaolo gave a brief report on the beautification project in which he stated that all planning had now been completed and that maintenance must now be continued with some re-planning necessary. He noted that the village would probably be able to obtain a grant of matching funds to assist with the completion of the project.

The board passed a resolution calling for the transfer of funds to make a sewer bond payment now due and also approved an intrabudget transfer to balance the 1973-74 budget.

Maxine Francis, president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, asked the council about funds for the repair of the community building and was told that no funds had been budgeted for the project. The council noted the lack of funds available for such a project but gave the ladies their full support in any fund raising events for the work. Mrs. Francis announced that a social get-together, an ice cream social, had been scheduled for July 30, 7:30 p.m. for the entire village at no charge.

DiPaolo announced that a \$40,000 grant for the airport study had been approved. A thank you note from Mrs. Rose DiPaolo was read to the board members.

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
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

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

A QUICK LOOK at the Ruidoso Downs mutual picture, with 30 racing days, shows the total handle is \$7,955,926 for 1974, compared to the 1973 total of \$6,990,124. The Independence Day weekend at Ruidoso Downs produced a set of remarkable mutual figures. Total betting for the four days reached \$1,737,736, which was a stunning increase over the same weekend last year when five race days resulted in a handle of \$1,582,934. The average handle for the last four days was \$434,434. This also marked the first time in Ruidoso history when the betting topped the \$420,000 plateau on four straight days. The holiday momentum pushed the current daily average up to \$265,197. At the same point last year, the average was \$232,937. Inside the Capital

(Nearly 60 per cent of the proposed fiscal 1975 U. S. Department of Agriculture budget would be spent for "welfare"-type programs, John Augustine, Las Cruces, executive secretary of New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, underscores burgeoning federal government spending in this guest column for vacationing Fred Buckles.)

LAS CRUCES — American taxpayers looking for any kind of relief from their tax burdens can find little comfort in what they read in the President's proposed budget to operate the U. S. government for fiscal year 1975 now under consideration in Congress.

According to that rarely understood document, during the upcoming year Americans will pay \$129 billion in individual income taxes — up \$11 billion over 1974.

And that's without any increase in rates. Higher incomes brought about by inflation and increased productivity automatically mean higher tax bills.

Add to personal income taxes the expected receipts of \$48 billion from corporations, \$86 billion from social security taxes and \$32 billion from such things as gift, estate and excise taxes, and one comes up with \$295 billion — the amount the treasury expects from taxpayers during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

That's a lot of money, but, according to the budget, it's \$9.4 billion less than planned spending in the year.

At this point, most taxpayers are apt to say "Whoa!" One million dollars is enough to boggle the minds of most, let alone trying to grasp the significance of a budget calling for spending \$304.4 billion in one year. With a billion being 1,000 million, that means under the proposed budget the federal government would spend \$304,000 millions.

For starters, \$190 billion would be spent for "income security" — social security payments, food stamps, basic welfare and related items.

That amount represents more than total federal spending in any one year until 1962. It also represents more money than the

present federal spending which many do not understand or recognize.

Voting delegates of member state Farm Bureaus at the recent annual American Farm Bureau Federation meeting said in part: "Deficit spending by the federal government and programs and policies which increase the supply of money and credit faster than production are basic causes of inflation."

"We support legislation now before Congress which is designed to bring about significant reforms in appropriation and expenditure processes of Congress and the executive branch. Plans must be made for an orderly reduction of the federal debt."

As presented by the President, the budget is excessive and it proposes further deficit spending. Congress is serious about major budget reform. Farm Bureau has presented Congress with a document showing how the President's budget can be balanced.

Taxpayers need to let their elected officials know how they feel about spending. Urgency of this expression becomes more evident because the federal government spends nearly \$1 billion each day.

SANTA FE — Traffic and the traffic toll are mounting on a 5.3-mile US-84-285 stretch with no less than 142 residential and commercial driveways connecting directly to the busy highway.

The State Highway Department has done little to ease the critical problem since the project was built in 1963 for \$1 million. Injury accidents jumped from 9 to 15 from 1971 to 1973. Property damage accidents mounted from 11 to 15.

Two deaths occurred last year and one in 1971. The rebuilt highway extends from the northern Espanola city limits north to the US-285 junction, the highway to Ojo Caliente.

Average daily traffic volume at the southern terminus jumped from 4,800 vehicles in 1971 to 5,300 last year. At the US-84-285 junction volume climbed from 2,750 a day in 1971 to 3,000 last year.

Only two short service roads are in the busy 5.3 mile stretch. The highway is well above nearby homes and businesses. The Highway Department notes the big difference in grade. The SHD also says costs would have been high to acquire right-of-way for service roads to the entire area.

The department also says traffic volume was projected only 10 years ahead in 1963. Twenty-year projections are made routinely now. But the high-volume stretch is dangerous with the multitude of direct driveway connections onto the major highway.

Gov. Bruce King's blue-ribbon Highway Department task force recommended many changes in its final SHD study report. The big road agency said it has already begun implementation of part of recommendations.

Assessed property valuation — the basis for ad valorem taxes — climbed \$907,251 over the 1973 total for El Paso Electric Co. The total was up from \$22.6 million to \$23.5 million. The firm owns property in Sierra, Valencia, Luna, Dona Ana, Otero, Bernalillo, San Juan and Socorro Counties.

The State Property Appraisal Department assesses property of corporations. New assessments will be certified to county assessors before Aug. 1. Southwest Public Service Co.'s new assessment for electrical and water property was up \$1.6 million to \$20 million. The utility owns property in Curry, Roosevelt, Chaves and Eddy Counties. New Mexico Electric Co. (Lea and Eddy Counties) was down \$72,248 to \$5.5 million.

General Telephone Co.'s assessment was down \$729,000 to \$5.3 million. The phone company serves Eunice and Jal. Penasco Valley Telephone Cooperative was up \$25,000 to \$259,553. Leaco Telephone Cooperative, Lovington, was up \$21,000 to \$220,000.

Western States Telephone Co. Inc. was up \$743,185 to \$5.2 million. Among gas utilities Keeth Gas Co. (Guadalupe County) was up \$49 to \$7,871. Ruidoso Gas Co. was up \$3,947 to \$124,000. Jal Gas Co. was down \$1,900 to \$47,000. Eaton Natural Gas was up \$4,700 to \$88,000.

New assessed valuations among rural electric coopera-

tives: Springer, up \$18,000 to \$947,170; Central Valley, up \$209,000 to \$2.4 million; Otero County, up \$114,427 to \$1.6 million; Roosevelt County (Roosevelt, DeBaca, Curry and Chaves Counties), up \$100,830 to \$1.8 million; Kit Carson, Taos, up \$182,901 to \$1.6 million, and Central New Mexico, up \$86,138 to \$1.2 million.

Some State Boys and Girls Schools teachers were angry at State Corrections Secretary Howard Leach. They received a 5 per cent salary boost July 1 but contended Leach did not keep a pledge to effect pay hikes up to 12 per cent. Leach said available funds would not permit salary increases bigger than 5 per cent now.

State Personnel Director

Jerry Manzagol said he would study the possibility of setting a separate pay scale for correctional school teachers. The 52 State Boys and Girls Schools teachers were placed under the State Personnel Act July 1 under a 1974 law and received routine 5 per cent pay raises. Statewide public school teachers received average 12.5 per cent increases.

Democratic governor nominee Jerry Apodaca sharply criticized the Senate record of Republican Joe Skeen, his general election opponent, on education legislation. Lincoln County rancher Skeen, a conservative, was a senator in 1961-70. Apodaca has been in the Senate since 1967.

Sen. Apodaca said of Skeen:

"Joe Skeen was too negative and he was not overly interested in assisting public education. By and large he failed to support the proper appropriations on education and he exhibited little leadership for the Republican Party." Joe was Senate GOP leader.

In the GOP governor primary campaign Skeen called for more emphasis on program, a return to fundamentals — reading, writing and arithmetic — and said plowing more money into schools has been overemphasized.

Skeen's busy general election campaign schedule this week calls for campaigning in Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Los Alamos and Las Cruces.

The federal Environmental

Protection Agency approved \$30,000 to build a water treatment plant at Red River. The New Mexico American Revolution Bicentennial Commission has received applications for money for \$17,500 for two Colfax County bicentennial projects, for \$11,500 for three Kit Carson Memorial Foundation projects at Taos and for \$4,000 to landscape US-70 at Ruidoso Downs. The project application deadline is July 31.



Bird season set by game commission

The State Game Commission met June 28 to establish the 1974 seasons for teal, pigeons and doves.

Teal season runs from Sept.

21 through Sept. 29, and pigeon season from Sept. 1 through Sept. 20 in the area north of U. S. Highway 60, and Oct. 12 through Oct. 31 in the area south of the highway. Dove season is also split and will run from Sept. 1 through Sept. 30 and Nov. 23 through Dec. 22.

Setting of the lesser sandhill crane season was postponed until the next commission meeting, scheduled for Aug. 9 in Santa Fe.

The commission also approved a license form modification to accommodate possible future restrictions limiting big game hunters to one type of hunt (bow, muzzle-loader or regular rifle). Such limiting action has not yet been taken, and would be taken only after input from sportsmen's groups.

In other action, the commission approved establishment of

a regulated shooting preserve at a ranch near Abiqui and authorized the department to pursue negotiations for purchase of 187 acres of land adjacent to the department's present Bernardo Wildlife Area.

Vendor fees are now paid by the buyer over and above the cost of the bird licenses, which

are \$5.00, \$9.00, \$12.00 and \$17.00 respectively for resident bird, general hunting, general hunting and fishing and non-resident bird licenses. Vendor fees are charged at the rate of 25 cents for licenses and stamps costing less than \$5.50 and 50 cents for licenses costing more than \$5.50.





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
Barrel racing at Mesalero rodeo July 4

School's "Long Arm"
Big-Eddie, an oversized teenager, liked to bully the girls on their way home from school. When several parents finally complained to school officials, Eddie was placed on probation.

But at that point, his own parents decided to take a hand. Filing a lawsuit against the school, they claimed their son's punishment was illegal.

"All of these incidents happened after school, away from school grounds," they pointed out. "Therefore, the whole matter was outside the school's jurisdiction. Problems of this kind ought to be handled by the parents, not by the school."

However, the court upheld the probation order against Eddie. The court said schools have a "long arm" reaching any misconduct by students, even away from school, that disrupts the educational process. Said the judge:

"The true test (is) not the time or place of the offense, but its effect upon the morale or efficiency of the school."

Still, to justify disciplinary action, the harm to the school must be substantial.

Thus, another court voided the suspension of a high school athlete who had been found in a car containing several bottles of beer. The bottles were not his. He had not been drinking. And the incident took place during vacation. The court said there was not enough harm to the educational process to justify the penalty.

In a third case, two students were suspended for publishing an "underground" newspaper, which they had distributed off school premises.

Evidence in a court hearing indicated that the newspaper did indeed contain criticism of the school. But the criticism was not

- 1) libellous;
- 2) inflammatory; or
- 3) obscene.

The court thereupon lifted the suspension, saying that school authorities had overreacted. They should have been particularly wary, said the court, of infringing on the constitutional rights of freedom of press.

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County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

Mites are causing problems in the orchards and around the home. The mites cause a browning of the leaves.

The clover mites are not only on clover but the trees in the area. They do not make any webbing and can be seen without the use of a hand lens. The adults are dark reddish brown color.

The McDaniel or two spotted mite is smaller than the clover mite and usually feeds on the underside of leaves in colonies. They produce a lot of very fine webs which collect dust.

These mites can be controlled with Kilthane or Dazanon. A delayed dormant spray in the spring is the best means of preventing an injurious build-up.

For more information on mite control as well as other garden insects get the bulletin "Home and Garden Insect Control Guide" from the County Extension Office in Carrizozo.

R-R-D

In spite of the drought, screw-worms are on the increase in the Southwest this year. With depressed prices and poor range conditions, producers can ill afford any losses from this costly pest. The three steps that have worked well in the past are still the best means of control.

(1) Treat all wounds. (2) Ob-

serve livestock frequently for possible infestation. (3) Collect samples from the infested area and submit for identification.

Kits for submitting samples may be obtained from your County Agent, Livestock Board Inspector, or Veterinarian.

Control now is very important because when rains come, the problems will be much worse.

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SO YOU'RE BEING AUDITED!

July 5, 1974

Your federal individual income tax return — Form 1040 — has been selected for audit, and you're wondering why.

According to the Internal Revenue Service, the most likely reason your return and many others have been chosen for a further review is simply that they appear to contain errors.

All individual and small corporation income tax returns go through a sophisticated processing system called "Discriminant Functions" (DIF) as they pass through the IRS computers.

DIF hasn't always been a part of the IRS processing system. In fact, it has been in use at the service centers only since 1969.

At one time the Internal Revenue Service relied on the "eye-ball" method to pick out returns for audit. Large numbers of examining officers scanned and selected returns on the basis of their content and the officers' experience in spotting those needing a closer review.

Later the IRS enlisted the aid of computers, programming them with criteria based on past experience of examining officers. Under this method the computers would sort out returns for possible audit and then the examiners would review them to double check the reasons for the selection.

The use of the computers was soon found to be a step in the right direction, since it saved time and provided greater uniformity in the initial selection of returns for audit. However, this initial system of criteria developed from examiner experience still did not ensure that IRS audit manpower was being spent on those returns with the greatest need for examination based on the probability of change in the tax reported.

After considerable research the IRS found it could determine the relative importance of each significant return characteristic as it related to the frequency of tax error. Eventually, this study led to assigning weights to these return items and their inter-relationships.

That is the basis for DIF.

The DIF system today weighs the relationship of all of the key return items and produces a score for each taxpayer's return. Those returns having a high score are identified as having the greatest probability of tax errors.

In other words, under DIF, relationships between return characteristics and past results of audits of similar types of returns are what count. Whether or not items reported are higher or lower than average amounts is of no consequence. How the items go together to make up the overall picture and whether that composite tax return image looks error prone are what tip the scales.

Screening by IRS classifiers determines whether returns selected by the computer really need auditing. For example, DIF, which is a nationwide system, cannot take into account unique local conditions. Screeners can identify local variations such as when a state's real estate taxes are high.

Returns found to need audit by both the computer and humans are ultimately selected for examination.

In addition, returns not selected for audit by DIF may be

selected at random, as a means of checking the system. Or returns may be related to returns already undergoing examination, such as those of partners in a business. Some returns are identified for audit when IRS matches associated documents, such as Forms W-2 and 1099 with information reported on the 1040.

But whatever the means for selecting your return for audit, the purpose remains the same — to correct those returns with apparent errors so that only the tax due is paid the government.

Last year, according to the IRS, 1.8-billion audits ended with \$2.1-billion in additional revenue to the government, and 275.7-million in reduced taxes or refunds for taxpayers.
