

DRIVER OF DEATH CAR CHARGED

Shafer arraigned

Patricia H. Shafer, 48, of Queen Route, Carlsbad, was arraigned before Judge Austin Pritchett in Magistrate's Court, Ruidoso, Monday at 11:30 a.m., and pleaded not guilty to three counts in the death of Bradley Dean Phillips, 13. The Phillips youth was struck by a car driven by Mrs. Shafer the afternoon of Aug. 7, on Hwy. 37 near Mt. Vuo Theatre.

Sendenaw of Alamogordo, and Atty. Mel O'Reilly of Ruidoso, Ms. Shafer posted a bond of \$5,000 on the charges and was released to her attorney on her own recognizance.

In a warrant issued by Judge Pritchett last week, she was charged with: "Drive while under the influence of intoxicating liquor; Drive in a Reckless Driving manner; Cause the death of Bradley Dean Phillips by striking him with a vehicle." The complaint was issued Aug. 7 by Jerry Foster, Detective Lt., with Ruidoso PD and the warrant was served by Foster.

Original citations issued in the incident were for DWI and Reckless Driving, by Lt. Jerry Russell and Sgt. James Nesmith. These citations were issued immediately after the accident.

A preliminary hearing on a homicide - by - vehicle charge will be held at a later date; at which time trial will be held on the DWI and reckless driving charges.

VILLAGE COUNCIL SEEKS \$5 MILLION FOR WATER IMPROVEMENTS

Bond vote set for October 8

Ruidoso property owners will vote October 8, 1974, on a \$5 million bond issue to provide additional water storage and service lines into existing facilities.

The village council August 8 unanimously adopted Ordinance 74-13, appearing on another page of this issue, setting the voting date on the proposed project.

In general terms the ordinance calls for construction of an earthfill dam to impound some 1,100 million gallons of raw water. The site currently favored is near the mouth of Kraus and Flume canyons. Also included in the plan is a gravity flow system to transport water

to a new treatment plant, and from the tanks into the present storage plants serving the village.

Under "Plan H", submitted to the council by Mann Engineering Co., of Roswell, the "preliminary figures" call for a dam 160 feet high and 950 feet long that would back water up for approximately one mile.

Finalization of plans is dependent upon passage of the bond issue.

The council named Darrell Fowler of Stern Brothers Investments of Albuquerque, "Financial Advisor."

Procedures put into effect by Fowler include publication of Ordinance 74-13 in this week's

Ruidoso News and publication of the Notice of Election for four consecutive issues, beginning this week.

Voter eligibility includes:

- (1) Residents of the Village of Ruidoso owning property within the corporate limits of the village;
- (2) Property owners living outside of the village, but within Lincoln County, who own property within the corporate limits of the village.

Registration for qualified electors, as defined in (1) and (2) above is:

- (a) Village residents may register with the village clerk until 5 p.m., Sept. 13.
- (b) Non-village residents may

register with the village clerk until 5 p.m., Sept. 23.

Any qualified elector, as outlined above, may vote in this election if they register within the deadlines in (a) and (b) above.

Beginning Sept. 3, following receipt of the assessed valuation for the Village of Ruidoso from Lincoln County, preliminary figures on the cost of the bond issue to individual property owners will be compiled and released to the public.

The cost figure will be projected into the future, based on the rate of increase in assessed valuation that can be forecast from the present and past growth of the village. The high-

er the assessed valuation becomes, the lower the cost to the property owners. One indication of village growth is the installation of an average of 300 new water meters annually in the past several years.

The council, with all members present, was polled to obtain the unanimous vote to adopt Ordinance 74-13, after which Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., directed that the minutes contain the notation that the "was in accordance" with the proposal.

In other action the council: —Accepted the bid of J. H. Cooper Agency, in the amount of \$2,230, to insure the 61 vlt (Continued on Page 3)

Ruidoso Downs council changes garbage ordinance

The Ruidoso Downs Village Council adopted changes in the municipal ordinances dealing with the collection of garbage at the regular meeting of the board held last Monday evening at the village hall. Following a report by Trustee Jim Roberts, a rate of \$2.75 per unit for mobile homes with individual garbage cans in mobile parks was accepted with the specification that those with dumpsters would be charged at a rate of \$15 per dumpster and a limit of 15 homes per dumpster. Mobile home parks will be required to give a count of the number of units occupied at the end of each month for billing purposes.

and up-date at the second meeting of the month. It was noted that many of the ordinances needed to be re-written.

A report of the village beautification committee showed that the project still owes about \$475 for supplies and the funds had been exhausted. A contribution from the Ladies' Auxiliary was made to the funds, with the proceeds of the ice cream social, held recently, in the amount of \$50. It was also reported that an application for \$5,000 for the project had been made but that it is doubtful that the grant will be approved. The council voted to pay the balance of the bills from the village street fund.

A representative of the village planning and zoning commission noted that the group recommended the passage of a resolu-

tion approving the Federal Flood Insurance Program. He pointed out that the village was required to have a building inspector to participate in the program and that the village would not be eligible for Disaster Relief if such a flood occurred without passage of the resolution. The board passed a resolution based on one previously passed by the village of Ruidoso.

Bids were opened on a pick-up from the village water department and the high bid of \$150 from Andy Miller was accepted.

A brief discussion of the purchase of an iodinator from the state for use on the Denton Field water well was held but the matter was tabled.

Post office addition ok'd

The 2,300 square-foot addition to the main branch Ruidoso Post Office was officially accepted a few days ago by Fred Salazar, U. S. Postal Service real estate officer of the Albuquerque District Office.

The addition offers patrons a choice of all sizes of boxes from the 1,300 new ones available and in addition the structure provides needed room to process mail, plus several distribution cases and a cancelling machine, Ruidoso Postmaster Mannie Badillo announced Wednesday.

"The size of the addition was based on a survey of the needs of Ruidoso for the next ten years," Badillo said, "and we now have the room to expand our service and to add any needed equipment" to handle the projected growth and demands

for increased service.

Badillo stressed the convenience of the 110 x 150-ft. blacktopped parking area at the rear of the building, offering access to the new lobby area through the door in the southeast corner. "This should solve our parking problems for some time to come," he said.

The old building, completed in 1961, contained 2,500 square feet and offered 1,130 boxes. "We almost doubled the size of our building and more than doubled the number of boxes," Badillo said. "We were really bulging at the seams around here before this addition was completed."

The new work area has, Badillo said, "speeded up the processing of mail."

Badillo served as a postal clerk 23 years before being named postmaster three years ago. "When I started here we had a postmaster and two clerks and were doing \$15,000 of business a year. Today we're a first class post office with an annual cancellation of \$150,000." Badillo now supervises a staff of six clerks.

Badillo requested a survey of the post office earlier this year and it included "checking into the number of water meter users, business and residential growth and numerous other factors" to determine the size of the addition.

"The size of the post office and the volume of mail handled is one of the best barometers to indicate how fast the village is growing," Badillo said.

School Board accepts contract with Mescalero Apache Tribe

The 1974-75 Johnson-O'Malley contract between the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the Ruidoso Municipal School system was signed Tuesday evening at the regular monthly board meet. The board will receive \$29,490 for the school year under the contract. The approval was granted subject to acceptance of the state board attorney.

Resignations of Ronald Strassburg and Gerald Montez were accepted and the board approved the hiring of Elizabeth Barber to teach 5th grade and Dixie Wilson as school nurse.

Calls for bids will be issued for milk products and also for water heaters for Nob Hill and high school cafeterias and the high school gymnasium board

noted the corrosive effects of water from the wells in the Gateway area as the reason for the softeners.

Approval was given for the extension of an agreement for the National Lunch Program. Price for lunches this year will be 50¢ per meal and the board noted that better food would be expected from the increase. The schools have been notified that there will be very little food and cereal products available from commodity warehouses this year and that they should plan to purchase these supplies from other sources. There will be more meat provided by the federal program. The board voted to have one member per

A-A Derby trials begin

In Friday's trial heats for the \$500,000 (est.) All-American Derby, to be run Aug. 25, Time-to-Thinkrich, the richest quarter horse of all time with winnings of \$519,207, figures to attract plenty of attention.

The mighty colt, owned by the Vessels' Stallion Farm of Los Alamitos, Calif., will go in the 10th race — which is one of the eight trials for the up-the \$500,000 (est.) All-American Derby.

Each of the trials will be run at 440 yards, and each will offer a purse of \$2,500. A total of 72 head, representing

without question the finest sport-homore talent in the nation, will be angling for starting berths in the world's second richest race.

The top 10 qualifiers will advance into the grand finale on Aug. 25, while the second 10 will get into the consolation. The latter is also booked for Aug. 25.

Saturday's program will be spotlighted by the \$7,500-added Three Bars Handicap at 400 yards. On Sunday, a standout collection of sophomore thoroughbreds will clash in

1 1/16 miles.

The Los Angeles Times, one of the largest newspapers in the world with a daily circulation of more than one million, will be sending a staff writer to Ruidoso to cover the All-American Futurity. Bob Herbert, the long-time turf reporter for the Times, will spend seven days at Ruidoso researching material for a lengthy article which is scheduled to appear a day or so before the big race. Herbert will also write a wrap-up story on the \$1 million race.

The project resulted from a

letter written by Dick Alwan, Ruidoso publicity director, to the Times sports department.

With Ruidoso Downs' daily betting average near the \$290,000 watermark, horsemen got another purse boost. All purses (except stakes) have been increased \$100 which means the minimum purse is now up to a record \$1,900. Allowances purses have been fattened up by as much as \$200, so the new condition book, which covers the eight-day period beginning on Thursday, includes allowance purses as fat as \$3,400.

Ruidoso Garden Club Flower Show - Aug. 20

ECHOES OF THE PAST — Our Southwestern Heritage is the theme of the Ruidoso Garden Club's Third Annual Standard Flower Show, which will be at the Cherokee Village Community Room, Tuesday, August 20, from 2:30 to 8:00 p.m.

Mrs. Hal Yoder is chairman of this show, which is sponsored by the Ruidoso State Bank. Mrs. C. E. Neuhaus is the club's president, and Charlotte Jarratt is publicity chairman.

General rules and information concerning various arrangements were published in The Ruidoso News last week (Aug. 9). Following is more information regarding awards in Division I — Horticulture and Division III — Educational:

1. Awards are given only for quality. The Standard system will be used.

2. First (blue), Second (red), Third (yellow) and Honorable mention (white) may be awarded in each class or subdivision of a class.

3. AWARDS OF MERIT (orange ribbon) may be given in the Horticulture Division, to the named exhibits scoring the highest (95 points or above) in Sections A through H.

4. ABORREAL AWARD (2 ribbons combined, different shades of green). To promote recognition of beauty in horticultural specimens, their usefulness in landscape design and flower arrangements, and to encourage the hybridization or improvement of existing varieties, Exhibits in these Sections (E and F) may be eligible for Aboreal Award. The specimens may be shown for beauty of flower, fruit or foliage. Must score 95 or higher.

5. AWARD OF HORTICULTURAL EXCELLENCE (3 ribbons combined: green, orange and blue) may be given to a named exhibit judged to be the finest in the Horticulture Division. Must score 95 or higher.

6. TRI-COLOR AWARD (red, yellow, blue combined). To a blue ribbon winner in the Artistic Design Division, Section I, with an entry worthy of that high award. Must score at least 95, but need not be highest. Exhibit must consist of all of fresh cut plant material. One or more accessories permitted — emphasis on plant material.

7. AWARD OF DISTINCTION (Brown rosette with gold lettering). To a blue ribbon winner in Artistic Design Division, Section J, with an entry worthy of that high award. Must score at least 95, but need not be highest.

8. CREATIVITY AWARD (Purple rosette with ribbons attached). To a blue ribbon winner in Artistic Division, Sec. G, with an entry worthy of that high award. Must score at least 95, but need not be highest scoring. Exhibit must include plant material fresh and/or dried. Dried materials may be treated if so specified in schedule. Designer's choice. Artificial flowers and foliage not permitted. Accessories may be used.

9. THE NATURE, ART AND INDUSTRY AWARD (Metal award with red, green and purple ribbon attached) may be given to a blue ribbon winner in Artistic Division, Sec. L, with an entry worthy of that high award. Must score at least 95 but need not be highest. Material may be of designer's choice. Contrived, man-made discarded forms or combination of these may be used but some plant material, either fresh and/or dried,

must be included. No artificial flowers or foliage may be used.

10. SWEEPSTAKES (Rosette ribbon of green and white). To winner of the greatest number of blue ribbons in a Division. There will be two Sweepstakes Awards; one in the Horticultural Division and one in the Artistic Division.

DIVISION I — HORTICULTURE

1. All entries in Horticulture classes must be grown by the exhibitor and must be correctly named as to variety, whenever possible. Entries must be grown in this area to be eligible for awards. Other entries may be entered for exhibit only.

2. Potted plants shall have been in the hands of the exhibitor at least three months.

3. The exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired, but is limited to one specimen of each variety or color in each class or sub-division of a class.

4. Specimens must be well groomed and free of dirt, water spots, diseases, insects and spray residue; no dressings such as polish, oils, etc., allowed on foliage of any exhibit.

5. Containers will be provided for the Horticulture specimens.

Section A — Roses:

Subdivided as to class, variety and color.

Class 1 — Hybrid tea, grown disbudded; a. one bloom; b. three blooms, same variety; c. three blooms, different varieties.

Class 2 — Floribundas — a. one bloom; b. one spray.

Class 3 — Any rose not listed above.

Section B — Annuals or Grown as Annuals:

Each class will be sub-divided as to variety and color.

Class 4 — Bells of Ireland — one specimen.

Class 5 — Marigold—a. Small — 5 blooms, same variety; b. large — 3 blooms; c. large — 3 blooms, different variety.

Class 6 — Petunias—a. single — one spray or 1 stem; b. double — 1 spray or 1 stem.

Class 7 — Snapdragon a. one specimen; b. three specimens of one variety; c. three specimens of different varieties.

Class 8 — Sweet Peas — a. collection of five specimens of one variety; b. collection of five specimens, different varieties.

Class 9 — Zinnia—one bloom.

Class 10 — Any other annual.

Section C — Perennials (or Grown as Perennials) and Biennials:

Each class will be sub-divided as to variety and color.

Class 11 — Carnation — one specimen.

Class 12 — Daisy — one stem (shasta, gerbera, gloriosa, etc.)

Class 13 — Foxglove — one specimen.

Class 14 — Geranium — one stem (shown with attached foliage).

Class 15 — Hollyhock — one stem.

Class 16 — Pansy — one specimen.

Class 17 — Any other.

Section D — Bulbs, Corms, Tubers, Tuberous Roots:

Each class will be sub-divided as to kind, variety and color.

Class 18 — Dahlia — grown disbudded — one stem.

Class 19 — Gladiola — one specimen.

Class 20 — Any other — one specimen.

Section E — Flowering Shrubs, Trees, Vines:

Each class sub-divided as to kind and variety (cut to show beauty, not to exceed 30 inches).

Class 21 — Flowering shrub — one branch.

Class 22 — Flowering tree — one branch.

Class 23 — Flowering vine — one branch.

Class 24 — Foliage vine — one branch.

Section F — Evergreens:

Each class sub-divided as to kind and variety (not to exceed 30 inches).

Class 25 — Broad-leaved evergreens (Holly, Pyracantha, Boxwood, etc.)

Class 26 — Short-leaved evergreens (Yew, Juniper, Hemlock, etc.)

Class 27 — Conifers, cone bearing (Spruce, Pine, Hemlock, etc.)

Section G — Potted Plants:

Each class sub-divided as to kind and variety and size of pots

Took no action on an Alpine Village annexation request, nor a request to establish a water assessment district within Alpine Village.



AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMISSION TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED, RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, AND THOSE ELECTORS WHO ARE NON-RESIDENT MUNICIPAL ELECTORS, AS DEFINED BY THE 1965 MUNICIPAL CODE, AT A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON OCT. 8, 1974, THE QUESTION OF AUTHORIZING THE INCURRING OF A GENERAL OBLIGATION INDEBTEDNESS FOR AND ON BEHALF OF AND UPON THE CREDIT OF THE VILLAGE, BY ISSUING THE NEGOTIABLE COUPON BONDS OF SAID VILLAGE, IN THE AMOUNT NOT EXCEEDING \$5,000,000, FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING, ENLARGING, IMPROVING AND EXTENDING THE WATER SYSTEM, AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, it is necessary in order to preserve, provide for and protect the health, safety, comfort and welfare of the citizens of said Village; to construct, enlarge, improve and extend the water system in the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, and that the question of authorizing the necessary indebtedness therefor by the issuance of bonds should be submitted to the electors of said Village; and

Section 1. That a special municipal election shall be held on Tuesday, the 8th day of October 1974.

Section 2. That the following question relating to the creation of municipal indebtedness and the issuance of general obligation bonds of the Village shall be submitted to the following classes of electors, to-wit:

(a) Qualified, resident, registered electors of the Village; and

(b) Non-resident, municipal electors as defined by the 1965 New Mexico Municipal Code.

The votes by each of said classes of electors shall be cast, counted, returned and canvassed separately. It is hereby declared that the purpose of holding the election in such manner is to ascertain arithmetically: (a) the aggregate number of votes cast at the election "FOR" and "AGAINST" said PROPOSITION by qualified, resident, registered electors of the Village, and

(b) the aggregate number of votes cast at the election "FOR" and "AGAINST" said PROPOSITION by non-resident, municipal electors as defined by the 1965 New Mexico Municipal Code. Each elector shall be entitled to vote once, in accordance with the foregoing PROVISION.

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, be authorized to incur an indebtedness for and on behalf of said municipality, and upon the full faith and credit thereof, by issuing its negotiable, coupon general obligation bonds, in one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$5,000,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the purpose of constructing, enlarging, improving, and extending the water system of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, with said bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with law?

Section 3. That the following polling places shall be open between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M., and 7:00 o'clock P.M., and shall be used for the conduct of the special municipal election, as follows:

SANTA FE — New Mexico Democrats and Republicans said Richard M. Nixon's resignation as president boosted GOP candidates' election chances.

But New Mexico politicians say the economy is the overriding campaign issue and this will hurt Republicans.

Rep. John Bigbee, R-Guadalupe - Torrance - Lincoln - DeBaca, said of Nixon's resignation: "It will help to kind of clear the air. People will be ready to rally behind the new president and get on with the business of the country."

"All we've heard about for two years is Watergate." An Encino rancher, Bigbee said he could support President Gerald Ford for a GOP 1976 presidential nomination although he has backed California Gov. Ronald Reagan previously.

Sen. Bill Lee, D-Lovington, said: "Republicans will be in better shape because Nixon resigned rather than drag out the impeachment ordeal."

But Sen. Lee added: "The economy is the top issue. The status of the economy will hurt Republicans. People are concerned about inflation."

A rancher, Sen. Lee says Republican governor candidate Joe Skeen is far out in front of Democrat Jerry Apodaca in Lea County. Lee says: "I expect to see some vocal Democratic support for Skeen. But many Democrats will quietly support Skeen."

A Lincoln County rancher, Skeen was set to campaign in Jal Wednesday and Truth or Consequences Saturday.

Sen. Lee is chairman of the agricultural land use subcommittee of the Land Use Advisory Council which met in Santa Fe. Lee said: "The subcommittee is looking at methods of applying property taxes to agricultural land. The subcommittee is concerned the Greenbelt

Law principle be retained — that agricultural land should be taxed on the basis of productivity."

Monticello rancher Ruben Pankey is on the council's land use inventory design subcommittee. Pankey said specifications will be sent to seven prospective bidders on a design study for a New Mexico land use information system.

The goal: Computer-based central data storage of all information on a New Mexico land use inventory. Sample data: County-by-county soil classification, land ownership patterns, property tax assessment patterns, population and major crops grown.

Rep. Bigbee is chairman of the council's taxation subcommittee.

Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, said he may run for House Democratic whip against Rep. Bennie Aragon, D-Albuquerque, who holds the job now. Aragon seeks reelection to the party post.

Rep. Luna, 42, a roofing business owner, seeks election to his third House term. He said his general election opponent, Los Lunas Republican Daniel C. Goodman, withdrew.

Rep. Luna says: "My main project this year is to try to renovate three old crowded dormitories at Los Lunas Hospital and Training School." He will seek renovation funds from the 1975 Legislature.

Rep. Luna whacked State Corrections Secretary Howard Leach and Prison Warden Felix Rodriguez for not spending enough money at Los Lunas Correctional Facility. "Too much money is being diverted to other State Corrections Department units," Rep. Luna charged.

Luna is chairman of an interim legislative committee on election law reform. The committee's first meeting will be Sept. 5 in Santa Fe.

Clory B. Tafuya, Los Lunas Elementary School principal, and Rep. Luna attended the annual meeting of the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education in Spokane, Wash., Tuesday through Friday. Luna is on the Los Lunas school board.

Your Social Security

"Over 95 disabled workers in Lincoln County are getting \$18,870 in monthly payments as the social security disability program begins its 17th year this month," Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative stated. "In addition, benefits are payable to the eligible family members of these workers."

"Only disabled workers between 50 and 65 were eligible when the first social security disability benefits were paid in July, 1957. Today, workers of any age under 65 have this protection. In addition, since July of last year, Medicare benefits have been available to disabled people who have been entitled to social security disability payments for 24 consecutive months."

"An insured worker becomes eligible for payments if he has a disability which is expected to keep him from working a year

Carpenters' Union was extended one year July 1.

The institutions are State Miners' Hospital, Raton; Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School; Fort Bayard Hospital and New Mexico State Hospital, Las Vegas. Sen. Montoya said former President Nixon "saved a great deal of turmoil by not going through the impeachment process." Montoya was on the former Senate Watergate Committee.

or longer. Payment begins for the 6th full month of disability. "Generally, a worker who becomes disabled in 1974 must have worked 5 1/2 years in employment covered by social security to be insured. Five years of this work must have been during the 10-year period before the disability began. Young workers, however, may be eligible for disability payments with as little as 1 1/2 years of work, depending on their age and when they became disabled."

"For New Mexico residents, physicians and other disability experts in the Disability Determination Unit in Albuquerque decide whether the worker is disabled under the social security law," Mrs. Graves concluded.





BEWARE OF RESTRICTIONS

The courts permit property owners to put in deeds to buyers reasonable restrictions on the use of the real estate being transferred. It might be looked upon as zoning on a very personal basis. From the point of view of the buyer, it is preferable that the agreement enumerate any and all restrictions. The point is this: If there ARE restrictions, bring them out in the open and let the advice of your Realtor or attorney before going any further. It's for your own protection. For example, a home in a commercially zoned area may have a restriction against use for any commercial purpose. This may be OK for the first buyer who plans to live in the house, but a lending institution may refuse to loan any money on it because commercial use may be the only reason for a new purchaser to buy it. 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

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

Excerpts from Milk and Honey

I have already mentioned how mother learned to make bread from her German neighbor. This bread was rather hard to make and naturally, she was careful with it. I have seen her work, or knead it for hours, after she had let the yeast rise all night. She made this yeast of hops and potato water somehow. After she had a large pan of bread worked up, she set it on a chair without a back in a warm place, to rise almost all day. Usually, it was baked in time for us to have a hot roll or two, when we came home from school.

One day she baked her bread and turned it out on the table to cool, while she went over in the field to help my father with something. When she returned she found three or four loaves of bread missing. The first thing she thought of was: the

dog had gotten in somehow and eaten the bread. She became very angry at the dog; so she took my father's shotgun from its rack and went out in the yard to shoot the dog. The dog thought she was going rabbit hunting, so he would run along, jumping over sage and grass, looking for them, too. When mother fired at the dog, he would jump up to see if she had hit the rabbit. No, mother never learned to shoot straight. Months later we heard of a teenage cousin, living a good ways from us, who had run away from home; he just wrapped up the bread and took it along. We later learned he went to Oregon and never came back.

My father had to be away so much, or wanted to work late in the field; so mother, as many women did in those days, milked the cows and did the chores in the evenings. She would take all of us children to the barn with her, set the babies in the feed trough, while the older ones would try to help all we could. Old Dolly had a baby colt and once I walked too close behind it. I have a scar of a little hoof under my chin today and had to eat only soup for a week or more.

My brother hitched up his pony to a sled with a box on it, went to the field and cut it full of fresh corn stalks, ears and all. This, with the mash father kept soaking in a barrel just inside the barn door, was fed to the stock. This mash was made of corn shorts, oats, barley, wheat and water; soaked until it fermented. I have often smelled this same odor since; but not in the feed barrel and it always brings back my childhood memory of the mash barrel.

I do not know where I acquired the idea that I must give someone something or do something for one to get them to like me. I suppose it was because I knew I was not as pretty as some of the other little girls. I had no ringlets or long curls; just straight, almost cotton hair, that my mother braided in two long pig-tails, with a string or ribbon on the end. Also, I knew my teeth were not as even as they should be. Nevertheless, I had the idea, and I could not shake it off, even in later years; but it got me in a peck of trouble many times.

Every time father went to a far away town he brought back something for us. Once he brought back a stalk of bananas. Now I think bananas were rare then and I cannot remember ever seeing any before. Anyhow, if he had ever brought any he had not brought a whole stalk. We were very proud of them, as not one of our little friends had ever owned an entire stalk of bananas.

Mother hung the bananas in the lean-to room and let us take one in our school lunch each morning. I wanted so badly to take some to my little friends at school, who I thought, did not like me as much as they should. I wore a sailor blouse with a draw string in the bottom, tied around my waist. I slipped into the lean-to while mother was fixing the lunch and filled my blouse with bananas.

According to Mr. John T. McCarty, assistant to the Chancellor of Pepperdine University in California, "Too many Americans seem willing and eager to seek solutions to our problems from those wonderful people on the banks of the Potomac River who are responsible for managing the Post Office, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the District of Columbia itself, including their new subway system which has been under construction for years."

She asked me at once, what I had in my blouse. She took the bananas and also left the one out of my lunch as a punishment.

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THE PICTURE OF HEALTH

These are all remedies that you can do at home.

Sometimes a child or adult will experience a large swelling in the area which was stung. This swelling develops over a period of several hours and can cause worry and discomfort especially if it's on the face or near the eyes. The large swelling is thought to be caused by an unusually large amount of poison in the bite. Some people may react to a venom or poison more severely than others.

Mothers sometimes take their children to the doctor when a bite swells. The doctor usually explains why the child reacts in such a manner. He may suggest putting cold compresses on the area, and he may prescribe an antihistamine pill or give the child a small shot.

Any sting or bite can become infected by other germs. If this happens, the bite is treated, like any other infection, by cleaning the wound, using an ointment-type antibiotic, and protecting the area with a band-aid.

Infection in a bite or sting can be prevented. Any insect parts should be removed from the skin and the area carefully washed with soap and water. Stingers can be removed with tweezers. Ticks that burrow into your skin can best be removed by soaking them in a heavy oil. The insect feels smothered by the oil and pulls himself out. Pulling them out or burning them with a cigarette leaves the stinger behind as a starting place for infection.

The most serious insect bites can cause system reactions. These are the "sick all over" situations when things happen to the body in places away from where the bite occurred. Such reactions can include: all-over itching, swelling, wheezing, coughing, nasal discharge, shortness of breath, and a tightness in the chest. These symptoms can range from being barely noticeable to life threatening, and they usually become evident within an hour of the sting.

These system reactions are caused by allergies to the insect poison rather than its strength. They occur most often after bites or stings from ants, bees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets.

"Anaphylactic" reactions are the most severe allergic responses to insects bites. They

include all of the "sick all over" symptoms plus rapid heart beat, sweating, a fall in blood pressure, weakness and paleness. They can rapidly progress to coma, and sometimes death for very sensitive people.

People who know they are extremely allergic to insect bites can take a medication to desensitize them over a long period of time. Doctors can also effectively treat a person with a severe reaction with antihistamines which prevent the body from over-reacting to the insect bite.

Those who have had a severe reaction to an insect bite should carry an insect bite kit which contains medications to be taken immediately after any sting.

Chances are good that you'll never have a serious reaction to an insect bite. But if you should, don't hesitate to contact your doctor or clinic for appropriate medical treatment.

THE FAMILY LAWYER
The "I Was Drunk" Defense
"Yes, I did beat up my wife," acknowledged the repentant husband in court, "but I was drunk at the time. The whiskey loosened my inhibitions, so I just wasn't myself."
But the court threw out this defense and found the defendant guilty of assault and battery. The court said:
"Although the use of intoxicating liquors does to some extent blind the reason and exasperate the passions, yet, as a man voluntarily brings it upon himself, he cannot use it as an excuse for crime."
This is a widely accepted rule of law, rejecting intoxication as an across-the-board defense against criminal charges. Nor is it an excuse that the defendant drank to "nerve" himself for a deed he would not have done if sober.
As another court put it:
"All that the crafty criminal would require for a well-planned murder would be a revolver in one hand to commit the offense and a quart of liquor in the other to build his defense."
Nevertheless, most courts will take intoxication into account if the crime is one that requires a specific intent — to see if that intent was really there. Consider this case:
A man was accused of stealing an automobile. He had sat down drunk in the parked car of an acquaintance, noticed the keys in the ignition, and commenced to drive home.
There was no doubt that he had taken the car without permission. But the court said he

could not be convicted of theft if he had been too drunk to have any notion of stealing it. Furthermore, intoxication may be a good defense if it was not voluntary.
Suppose, for example, that a man committed a crime after innocently imbibing a "Mickey Finn." If the drink was potent enough to put him out of control, he could not be found guilty. In these circumstances, says the law, neither the intoxication nor the crime itself was truly his own act.

BELLEVILLE, KANS., TELESCOPE: "Considering inflation, a revision of the minimum wage certainly is in order. But consider what else Congress has done. It has extended coverage to millions of workers not under the minimum wage. One Kansas editor points out that for example, persons employed in the home will be covered though not at a full rate... Also to be covered as domestic help will be baby-sitters. Imagine what sort of a wrench this will toss into the economy of working mothers. Instead of helping persons who do this type of work, it will throw a lot of them out of work and result in larger use of day-care centers. What really puzzles us is this. Just where in the U.S. Constitution do Congress and our federal government get the right to set wages of a baby-sitter, a maid, a gardener or the kid down the block who mows lawns to earn a little spending money?"

New rights and responsibilities

While all women in America are in the midst of a legal revolution, women in New Mexico find themselves at the forefront. With the federal Equal Rights Amendment still stumbling through state legislature, the voters of New Mexico have already adopted their own Equal Rights Amendment. The New Mexico constitution now says that "equality of rights shall not be denied on account of the sex of any person."


The New Mexico amendment affects state laws and state action. Because of the Amendment, state agencies are forbidden to discriminate on the basis of sex. In response to the amendment, the New Mexico legislature has changed residency laws, has declared the legal age for marriage without parental consent to be the same for men and women, has neutered the criminal laws, and has passed the "Community Property Act of 1973."

The amendment is not all-inclusive; it has no effect on private actions. It does not operate in the areas of private employment; it does not force a private organization like the League of Women Voters or the Lions Club to accept members of the opposite sex if they don't wish to do so.

The "Community Property Act of 1973" has brought new rights to women. It has also brought them new responsibilities. Now, women — and men too — need to know the meaning of this law. The next four articles will explore the general effect of the "Community Property Act" on wife Jane and husband John.
