

# Easy Date wins \$330,000 in A-A Futurity

Easy Date, owned by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Okla., nosed out favored Tiny's Gay in the 16th running of the \$1,030,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Don Knight was in the saddle in the 440-yard thriller which was worth a winner's prize of \$330,000.

For Tiny's Gay it was a real heart-breaker. The rags-to-riches colt went into the All-American looking for his 13th straight win and the final jewel of the Triple Crown of quarter horse racing.

Backed down to a 6-5 favorite, Tiny's Gay slipped slightly on his first step but quickly got in high gear and took off like a shot. Before the half-way point, the sleek colt was edging into the clear. Easy Date was never far off the pace.

A couple of outsiders, David Capri and Sheswright, were also full of run in the early going, but Tiny's Gay, urged on by John Ward, kept pouring on the steam.

The complexion of the money-laden race turned suddenly as Easy Date began moving with a tremendous charge on the outside. The filly was only a few feet from the wire when she stuck her nose out in front. Tiny's Gay was fighting back grimly, refusing to give ground. But he just didn't have enough power in those quick strides to

resist Easy Date's crushing advance.

The stewards took a long look at the photo-finish picture. The standing-room crowd, estimated at 13,720, waited in silent suspense. When Easy Date's number (9) was flashed on the board, a tremendous applause went up. The Merrick camp broke into bedlam.

A huge throng poured into the All-American winner's circle in the infield for the victory ceremonies. Easy Date calmly allowed herself to be swallowed up in the crowd and waited patiently while her picture was taken repeatedly. The trophy presentation was made by New Mexico Governor Bruce King.

The winning time was 21.60 seconds, on a fast track, which equaled the top qualifying time set by Easy Six.

Easy Date got away as the third favorite and returned \$9.60, \$3.60 and \$3.20. The victory pushed the filly's career record up to six wins and a second out of seven starts. Her total earnings climbed up to \$411,628, which put her close to the top of the list of all-time money-winning quarter horses.

Tiny's Gay, the superstar who was originally purchased by California breeder John Colville for a price of \$3,000, handed out dividends of \$3,200 and \$3,000. The runner-up nurse


of \$139,000 lifted the colt's career's bankroll up \$444,720, which put him in fourth place on the all-time money list, just a shade behind Easy Jet, \$445,721.

Easy Date, who is by Easy Jet out of Spot Cash, became the first All-American winner to be sired by an All-American winner.

David Capri came in third to grab \$64,000 for owner F. J. Heden of Houston, Texas.

Here's the way the rest of the field finished up: 4th — Easy Six (owned by the S. B. Burnett Estate of Ft. Worth), earning \$45,000; 5th — Heza Charer (Ronald Houseman of Madill, Okla., and Alonzo Stanley of Anna, Ill.), \$36,000; 6th — Maskro Lad (Billy Underwood Sr. of Dallas), \$34,000; 7th — I Can Go (Ethel and Charles Bird of Midland, Texas), \$31,000; 8th — Chautos (Fildon and Lois Black and Roy Forkner of Quidado, Texas), \$31,000; 9th — Sheswright (W. L. Edwards of Ruidoso), \$29,000; 10th — Little Blue Sheep (L. R. French Jr. of Odessa, Texas), \$27,000.

### COUNCIL AUTHORIZES ACCEPTANCE OF GRANT

## Airport refinishing set

The Ruidoso Village Council Aug. 29 accepted the apparent low bid of Armstrong and Armstrong to refurbish the Ruidoso Municipal Airport. The project, including resurfacing of the runway, ramps and taxi strips, will begin Sept. 9 and the air-

port will be closed until Sept. 23. Financing for the \$111,000 project includes an FAA grant of \$90,219.52, \$9,000 from the NM State Aviation Department and \$11,780.48 from village funds.

Approval of the low bid by the FAA is expected shortly. To insure the project, the council passed Resolution 74-12 under which Mayor Lloyd Davis will accept the federal grant.

Joseph Aleka, Albuquerque, of the FAA, presented the awards and grant documents to the council.

Project engineer Earl Cook, of Gordon Herkenhoff and Associates of Albuquerque, presented the overall airport improvement plan to the council. The entire project, including striping all coated areas, will take an estimated 45 days to complete.

Tom Mann of Mann Engineering Co., Roswell, submitted a formal contract proposal for the proposed dam and raw water reservoir to serve the village, and for a second storage area in the Upper Canyon area. Action was deferred on the proposal.

In other action, the council: Accepted the bid of Sierra Blanca Motors of \$3,498 for a pickup truck for the street department and a bid of \$5,057 for a pickup truck for the water department.

Went on record to notify the bonding company insuring Baker Construction Co., of Las

Cruces, that legal action will be taken by the village if the current water facility improvement project is not completed by Sept. 10.

Requested village engineer Jack Kannady to prepare a call for construction bids on two proposals to revamp the entrance from Sudderth Drive into Paradise Canyon. The plans, with cost estimates, are to be submitted to the council later.

Received an application for a dispenser's license from Herbert H. and Elizabeth Blankinship, Javon Blankinship, Wendell B. and Patricia Blankinship for the license presently owned by Diamondback Corp., operators of the Billy The Kid Hideout. A hearing on the application will be held within 90 days from Aug. 29.

Received a letter from the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce regarding the unanimous vote by the board of directors, Aug. 19, in support of the Oct. 8 \$5,000,000 water bond election. In part the letter said, "We feel the passage of this bond issue is imperative to the continued benefit and prosperity of our area residents."

Received a report from the Chamber of Commerce that \$6,198.31 in Lodgers' Tax was collected during August.



### PRICE PAID FOR MS. TOP ROCKETTE HIGHEST ON RECORD

## Filly sold for \$151,000

Ms. Top Rockette, a filly by Tiny Charger out of Top Rockette, drew a record price of \$151,000 in the closing session of the All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs.

The price was the highest ever paid in the history of quarter horse yearling sales.

The winning bid was submitted by Sherman Crane, an agent. The name of the buyer was not disclosed. Outstanding breeding and conformation were the two factors which centered plenty of buyer interest on Ms. Top Rockette. The filly's dam, Top Rockette, won \$217,923 and 17 major stakes and feature events in her heyday. Ms. Top Rockette was consigned by Mr. and Mrs. Z. Wayne Griffin of Los Angeles.

The All-American Sale wrapped up with quite a bang as the final session drew sales totaling \$1,175,800. This was the second \$1 million session in the history of quarter horse sales. (The first \$1 million session was established in the All-American Sale a year ago.)

The venue also finished up with total transactions of \$3,183,000, surpassing last year's previous record of \$2,906,900. All together, 403 head went under the gavel in the '74 sale. The average price was \$7,923, second only to the \$7,948 average established with 259 head in 1972.

Last year, the average price on 392 head was \$7,415. Here are other highlights of the '74 sale:

### Tiny's Gay top quarter horse

The colt, who came within a hair of copping the Triple Crown of quarter horse racing, was named the quarter horse champion of the '74 Ruidoso meeting. The balloting reflected the sentiments of members of the press and track officials.

Tiny's Gay, owned by John Colville of Paramount, Calif., carved out seven victories at the meeting — including the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities. But he was barely edged out in the All-American Futurity by the brilliant filly, Easy Date.

Nevada Phil, owned by Delbert Basden of Amarillo and Bob Arnett of El Paso, was picked the top thoroughbred of the campaign. Nevada Phil won three major events — the Inaugural Purse, the Governor's Handicap and the Billy The Kid Handicap. The gelding was also named best Handicap Horse and Best Router.

Scenic Dancer, a former claimer, was the hands-down winner in the vote to decide the top three-year-old thoroughbred. Scenic Dancer's key win came in the Ruidoso Derby. Geboor, who ran off with the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, was named the best two-year-old in thoroughbred circles. Babers Baby was named the top juvenile filly.

## MAT recreation area to open in May

The Mescalero Apache Tribe's recreational complex on Cienciga Creek Reservoir — now scheduled to open May 1, 1975 — will be, a spokesman said, "A resort hotel in the classic sense."

The main lodge will be located between two guest room sections, offering 140 rooms of which 14 will be suites. Each of

the rooms and suites will look out over the 100 acre foot lake and on to Sierra Blanca.

An interior convention room, accommodating up to 500, is designed for partitioning into smaller rooms. In addition small meeting rooms, with a view, will be available.

Facilities will include three dining rooms, a snack bar and

five bars including a Hideaway Loft on the upper floor. Elevators will be employed in the main lodge.

Boating will be restricted to sail boats, row boats and canoes with the use of electric outboard motors permitted.

The lake is being stocked with rainbow trout, for the 1975 season and during 1975 Mescalero

cutthroats will be introduced. The lake will permit natural spawning, the spokesman said.

Recreational facilities, in addition to hiking, horse back riding and area bus tours, will include a swimming pool, tennis courts and, the spokesman said, "a challenging 18-hole golf course."



## 25 Years At the Hospital Ago

September 2, 1949

Saturday night at the Ceremonial Grounds of the Mesalero Apache Indian Reservation, for the first time in the history of the tribe, a group of sixty Apache Indians will present for the public a program of dances, sacred to the people of this tribe. The program will be presented later all over the Southwest, in an effort to raise funds to build the Mesalero Memorial Gymnasium. This is a community project directly sponsored by American Legion Post No. 48 of Mesalero which numbers most of the veterans on the reservation as members.

The program will be performed outdoors using tipis as background and a huge bonfire for lighting. All the numbers will be presented by different groups in full Apache costumes and appropriate tom-tom music and chants will be used with each number.

The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department announced that construction has begun on a vitally needed new fire house. The building will consist of an equipment room, living quarters, bath and storeroom. It will be constructed of cinder blocks and will be a permanent fire-proof and freeze-proof building to properly house about \$20,000 worth of equipment.

Not only is this the largest purse ever paid to horsemen between Chicago and Los Angeles but it is also the largest purse ever paid in the history of racing.

The All-American is the epitome of competition that started years ago in the wild west when every rancher tried to out-run the other one with his best cow pony. Eventually as these men became more affluent they would go East, buy a short running thoroughbred and breed it to their best cold blood mare in order to try and win the holiday races.

From this humble beginning has grown an industry that today is captivating the Southwest.

**Nicodemus No. 1 jockey; Werner is best trainer**

When the dust settled for the '74 season at Ruidoso Downs, jockey Jerry Nicodemus and Trainer H. C. Werner came away with their respective titles.

Nicodemus, who had 1991 start to finish in the '74 season, capped the season with a full 10 wins ahead of his nearest rival, Jerry Burgess.

Nicodemus' final tally came to 68-57-36 from 333 spins and shows an excellent win average of 20.4 percent.

Perhaps his finest victory came a couple of weeks ago when he turned in a brilliant win aboard Pass Over in the \$519,300 All-American Derby—the world's second richest race.

Jerry Burgess, who pulled in a second, also had quite a meeting. From a total of 351 trips, Burgess posted a record of 59-43-45. His win percentage topped out at 16.5.

Frank Henning put forth a relentless drive in the final weeks and finished third. Henning collected five wins over the final weekend and chalked up a '74 record of 53-49-38 from 382 starts.

Leroy Coombs posted six wins over the closing weekend and nailed down fourth place.

Willie Lovell, who captured the crown last year, turned on the heat toward the end of the season but couldn't quite catch up. He finished fifth, one victory behind Coombs.

On the trainer side of things, the seasonal crown went right down to the wire. But it was Werner who came out on top.

Werner finished two wins ahead of J. B. Montgomery and three victories in front of Bubba Cascio. Both Montgomery and Cascio failed to score in the final four days of racing.

Werner's '74 record came out to 39-22-14 from 178 starts. His finest win came in the rich Rainbow Derby earlier in the meeting with Azure Teen.



## Bets, purses set record at Downs track

It was the biggest season, by far, in Ruidoso Downs history.

The daily wagering average for the 63-day meeting soared up to \$317,538, which was a thumping gain of 15.4 percent over last year's average of \$275,157.

The current daily average set a new record. Total wagering for the same season was \$20,004,876. This was a gain of 13.6 percent over last year's record meeting which produced \$17,610,086 with 64 race days.

Average-betting-per-race hit \$25,947, which was up 16.25 percent over last season's comparable figure of \$22,319.

The season-closing Labor Day meeting reflected a handle of \$825,285, highest in Ruidoso history. The previous high of \$791,517 was established on Labor Day a year ago.

Another new record went into the books when the Labor Day crowd wagered \$172,420 on the All-American Futurity. This was the highest one-race handle in the history of New Mexico racing. The previous mark was \$154,644 wagered on the '73 All-American Futurity.

The total attendance for the meeting was 329,300, an average of 5,227. Last year, 328,102 fans turned out, averaging 5,127 per day. The current figure is a gain of 1.95 percent.

Total purse disbursement for

the 1974 season at Ruidoso Downs reached a resounding \$4,326,356, according to General Manager Al Rosa. This was the highest purse disbursement in the track's history. In 1973, the figure was \$3,523,770. In '72 it was \$3,237,154.

## Inside the Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

**SANTA FE** — The general election campaign officially opened Labor Day with Democrat Jerry Apodaca leading Republican Joe Skeen in the governor's

race. Lincoln County rancher Skeen, a conservative, was ahead in the early going. But Sen. Apodaca of Las Cruces, boasting excellent organization, has moved in front.

Skeen's campaign was being revamped. Strong Republican Party leadership will move in to help Joe. State GOP Chairman Murray Ryan will assist. House member Ryan represents Sierra and Grant Counties.

Sen. Apodaca released much material on voting records in 1967-70 — the period Apodaca and Skeen served together in the Senate. Sen. Apodaca classifies himself as a progressive with a proven record of support for key social legislation.

At Alamogordo Skeen whacked Apodaca's alignment with organizations pushing collective bargaining for public employees and teachers. Skeen says public employee collective bargaining would impose an intolerable burden on cities, counties and school boards because they depend heavily on the legislature for money.

The New Mexico AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education (COPE) endorsed Sen. Apodaca for governor to no one's surprise.

Apodaca underlined his proposal for regional vocational schools. He said: "We need to upgrade the skills of our workforce so that we can attract new and clean industry and increase the wages of our workers."

At Los Alamos Sen. Apodaca called for a statewide inventory of natural energy resources. He supported promotion of energy research and advocated a permanent commission to assure just compensation for energy development.

Apodaca is backing a superb person-to-person campaign in Skeen. Big, affable Joe wins friends wholesale in one-on-one contacts. Both Apodaca and Skeen enjoy a wide acquaintance in the state.

Lt. Gov. Robert Mondragon says he is closing the gap between him and U. S. Rep. Man-

uel Lujan Jr. Mondragon says he trailed Lujan, an Albuquerque Republican, by 11 per cent in a recent poll. A Democrat, Mondragon ran far behind Lujan in a June poll.

Mondragon lives in Nambé, Santa Fe County. He was born in Guadalupe County and attended Santa Rosa High School. Sen. Odor Echols, D-Clovis, says a Curry County survey showed Skeen and Apodaca in a close race. Skeen is generally accorded an edge in conservative Curry. Sen. Echols said the undecided vote was high in the survey.

Echols will favor three basics in the 1975 Legislature — tax relief, more education funding and aging-health projects increases. He says: "All this can be done and still have money left."

Sen. Echols is state Democratic Party treasurer. The party's major campaign fundraiser will be an Albuquerque dinner Sept. 13. U. S. Rep. Peter Rodino, the House Judiciary Committee chairman, will be the speaker.

U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya said the Senate Agriculture Committee approved a resolution to return Smokey Bear to his native Capitan Mountains after his death. The black bear cub was found by forest fire fighters almost 24 years ago in New Mexico's Capitan Mountains. He was placed in the National Zoo in Washington and became the living symbol of forest fire prevention.

Federal grants totaling more than \$2.5 million were awarded to New Mexico public school districts and private organizations. The purpose: To assist in financing of programs intended to improve Indian children and adult education.

Among grant recipients will be Taos, Los Lunas, Espanola and Pojoaque school districts. At Albuquerque U. S. District Judge Howard Bratton denied a motion for a preliminary injunction that sought to halt construction of pollution control equipment at a planned Phelps Dodge Corp. smelter in Hidalgo County.

Plaintiffs sought the injunction. They said more effective technology is available to reduce emission levels further at the plant. Dr. Robert Bennett, an area rancher, and environmental groups filed the action.

Oil and gas activity in New Mexico is spurring. State government's semi-annual payment of federal mineral leasing money was up \$3.2 million over 1973. The state's 37½ per cent share was \$10.8 million, a whopping 42 per cent gain. Part of the money will be used for free textbooks in public schools.

The Four Corners Regional Commission approved more than \$800,000 in grants at Santa Fe. Among the grants: Daniel Fernandez Park, Los Lunas, \$15,000; water system at San Cristobal, \$13,000, and a Moriarty area economic study, \$15,000. The study relates to an effort to retain a Santa Fe Railway spur line. The State Highway Commis-

The term leukemia refers to a group of cancerous blood diseases of unknown cause. The white blood cells of a person with leukemia remain immature and increase greatly in number. Under normal conditions, these white blood cells would fight infections in the body.

The immature white cells associated with leukemia do not function normally and their uncontrolled growth harms the body. The great numbers of these cells increase so much that they fill the bone marrow cavities and may affect other organs of the body.

When the bone marrow becomes full of these useless cells, it is unable to form red blood cells, platelets, and normal white cells which are necessary for healthy blood. People with leukemia may become anemic, bleed easily, and develop an infection. Unless treated, leukemia is always fatal.

In recent years, advances have been made in treating the disease. Doctors have found that use of a combination of medications will make all signs of leukemia disappear. This is called a remission.

Even though a person with leukemia may have a remission, the cancerous cells still remain and it is important to continue treatment during this time. If therapy is stopped, the disease is almost certain to come back.

A relapse occurs when the disease becomes apparent again. If this happens, a new combination of medications often is used for treatment.

What can you do to aid the fight against leukemia? First, watch your own children for signs of unusual tiredness, easy bruising or bleeding, and paleness. Secondly, if you know a family with a leukemic child, try to be the best friend you can. Friends can help most by being good listeners rather than ignoring the situation. Mothers may need extra help with the rest of the children in the family.

As increasing knowledge is found through medical research on this tragic disease, the futures of leukemic children are becoming brighter. (Written in cooperation with Dr. John Saiki, UNM School of Medicine.)

With mounting impatience, Walters drove for 15 minutes behind a slow-moving truck on a winding road. Finally, the truck driver waved him a go-ahead signal.

In due course, he filed a lawsuit against the trucking firm. "Their driver gave me a 'bum steer' when he waved me on,"

Walters charged in a court hearing.

"But it was an innocent mistake," countered the company. "He was just trying to be helpful. Besides, Walters still had the final responsibility for his own driving."

However, the court granted Walters' claim. The court said that the truck driver, having once undertaken to give directions, had to do so with caution.

Courts generally agree. It is worth noting, however, that Walters had no real chance to see the danger ahead. If he had and took a chance anyhow, he might well have been found negligent himself, regardless of the misleading signal from the truck driver.

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
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### Young farmers set to speak at Roswell

Young farmers and ranchers from Chaves, Eddy, Lea and Lincoln counties will be in Roswell Sept. 10 to compete in a district discussion meet beginning at 7 p.m. in the Roswell Savings and Loan Building at West 4th St. and Pennsylvania Ave.

All farmers and ranchers between the ages of 18 and 35 years old in the four-county district are invited to attend the event which is sponsored by the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau.

The program will begin with introductions and a discussion of the role of the young farmers and ranchers program in meeting the needs for developing farm bureau leadership. Ken Cheatham and Eldon Schnoor of the American Farm Bureau Federation will lead the discussion.

Bob Storey will outline the New Mexico Young Farmers and Ranchers program following the meet.

Participants in the discussion meet must be familiar with two topics.

Those topics are: "How can land use planning influence agriculture?" and "What should

be the role of government in agriculture in the future?"

The winner of the discussion meet will represent the district in the state contest to be held in Albuquerque at the annual farm bureau meeting in December.

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**Emergency loans available from FHA**

The Farmers Home Administration has a new emergency livestock loan to assist farmers and ranchers in New Mexico. The recently passed Emergency Livestock Credit Act provides authority where the FHA will guarantee up to 80% of any loan made to a rancher or farmer by a private lender to help him restore normal operations on his ranch or farm.

Eligible loan purposes include: purchase of replacement livestock; purchase of livestock

feed; payment of grazing permits, use of farm buildings, pasture land or land for producing feed crops; hire, repair or replacement equipment necessary for livestock production; transportation of livestock; building or repairing fences or holding pens; refinancing of livestock debts under certain conditions; repair or improve livestock water supplies; payment of veterinary fees and livestock medicines; cost of hired labor for livestock production; payment of operating expenses essential to livestock production.

Maximum guarantee loan limit is \$250,000. Applicants must be ranchers or farmers who devote the major portion of their time to livestock production and earn their major income from livestock sales.

Livestock feeding corporations or partnerships may qualify if a majority interest in the business is held by livestock men. Each loan will be scheduled for repayment over a period not to exceed 3 years from the date of the note. Interest rate will be the legal rate agreed to by the borrower and banks or other legally organized private lenders who will fund and service the loans.

Mr. Richard Floyd, local County Supervisor in Roswell, said that local livestock producers are urged to discuss their problems with their lending institutions who will then process applications. The lender in turn will ask FHA for a loan guarantee. Loans in some circumstances may be renewed for two years from the maturity date of the original loan. Each loan must be adequately secured. Each applicant must certify he cannot obtain financing without a loan guarantee. The new one-year livestock loan guarantee program expires on July 25, 1975.

County Supervisor Floyd will be happy to explain the program to livestock men and their bankers if they contact him at the local office in the Roswell Federal Building.

**BLM pays state share of federal land lease**

The Bureau of Land Management sent the State of New Mexico a check for \$11,082,250 this week covering the State's share of revenues from federal lands for the first half of 1974. The total was an increase of \$3.2 million over the same period last year.

Added to a payment of \$7.1 million last January, the check brought the State's allocation for 1974 to \$18.6 million, compared with \$14,982,236 for all of 1973. The money was paid to the State Treasurer, who apportions it as he sees fit.

Of the 1974 total, the largest portion, \$10.7 million, came from sales of leasable federal minerals, oil, gas and potash. Revenues from public land grazing and other sources returned \$280,765.

**Alamo Hall of Fame gets Little Joe**

A complete "Little Joe" rocket system is among 7,000 tons of space artifacts that will be made available to the International Space Hall of Fame by the Smithsonian Institution Space Museum, officials of the Space Hall of Fame have been advised.

Ways and means of financing the transportation, erection, insurance and maintenance of such artifacts to be displayed in a rocket park at the site of the Space Hall just east of Alamogordo are being explored by members of the Governor's Commission on the International Space Hall of Fame, of which Dwight Ohlinger of Alamogordo is chairman.

Dr. John Stapp, retired scientist, researcher and medical doctor, a member of the ISHF commission, and Col. U. W. Hess, executive director of the commission, received encouraging response from Fred Durant III, assistant director of the Smithsonian Space Museum, and Louis Purnell, curator for space articles, during a recent trip to Washington, D. C.

Smithsonian and other national officials have noted that such artifacts can be preserved much easier and maintenance will be much less in the dry atmosphere of New Mexico than on either the East Coast or West Coast. The space displays can be preserved for a much longer period of time here.

**IRS toll free number available to people**

Since May of this year, all correspondence that New Mexico taxpayers receive from the Internal Revenue Service contains an IRS telephone number to call if they have any questions about the letters or notices sent to them.

William B. Orr, IRS District Director for New Mexico, said that, in many cases, calls to the IRS may be toll free, as they were during the tax return filing season.

He said that, whenever possible, the IRS will answer the

taxpayer's questions immediately. If the question requires research, an IRS employee will return the taxpayer's call after obtaining the necessary information.

Generally, IRS correspondence to taxpayers includes notices of mathematical errors on returns, replies to inquiries, letters requesting additional information, notices of audits, or bills for tax due.

Personally prepared letters to taxpayers include the name of the writer and his or her telephone number.

In most cases, form letters and notices printed by computers include a slip of paper listing IRS telephone numbers. Taxpayers are able to select a toll-free number from the list provided. Other computer-printed letters contain IRS Service Center telephone numbers which may involve toll charges for those calling the IRS, Mr. Orr said.

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





## Carlsbad Caverns Tells new hours

Carlsbad Caverns National Park Superintendent Donald Dayton has announced that new visitor hours will go into effect for the fall and winter season at the Caverns, following the Labor-Day weekend. Starting on September 3, the Visitor Center will open at 8:00 a.m. and trips into the main cavern will be offered from 8:00 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. daily. Bat flight programs will be continued throughout the month of September, and the Visitor Center will remain open until 6:00

p.m. each evening for as long as the bat flight talks are continued. Following the fall migration of the bat colony, which usually occurs in late October or early November, the Visitor Center will close at 4:30 p.m. Concession facilities at the park, which include the restaurant, gift shop, nursery, and kennel, will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 4:30 p.m. daily under the new schedule.

Superintendent Dayton stressed that visitors desiring to make the complete three mile trip through the Caverns should plan to enter the natural entrance no later than 2:00 p.m. once the new schedule goes into effect in order to have sufficient time for the Big Room portion of the trip.

Superintendent Dayton added that the fall season is usually an excellent time to visit the park, since groups are smaller,

### Kennecott's Acid Plant Model To Be Shown at State Fair


In a major effort to remove sulfur dioxide and dust particles from smelter stack emissions to meet State and Federal ambient air regulations, a new acid plant has been constructed by Kennecott's Chino Mines Division in southwestern New Mexico.

The completed project, including acid plant, electrostatic precipitator, in-plant facilities and railroad cars to ship acid, will cost approximately \$32 million.

A large model of the acid plant will be on display at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque September 11 to 22.

In brief, the plant captures sulfur-bearing vapors from molten copper and transforms them into sulfuric acid. The highly complicated process involves use of coolers and scrubbers, heat exchangers, mist precipitators and a catalytic converter.

The plant was specifically designed to control sulfur oxide emissions from smelter copper converters to meet air regulations.



**Your Social Security**  
 Is Social Security for children? The answer is obviously "yes," since 205 children here in Lincoln County are now receiving monthly social security benefits, according to Mrs. Christine Graves, social security field representative.  
 Benefits can be paid to children when one of their parents retires, becomes disabled, or dies. Of course, the parent must have worked a sufficient amount of time in employment covered by social security.  
 An unmarried child can be paid monthly benefits if the child continues in school as a full-time student, he may be paid until age 22.  
 Mrs. Graves notes that one time of children's benefits that

is paid is for children who were disabled before age 22. This means, of course, that there is no age limit on this benefit if the disability occurred before age 22.  
 A child may be disabled as a result of a physical impairment, a mental impairment, or a combination of both.  
 The Social Security Administration normally pays benefit checks for a child to a parent or other relative with whom the child is living. Other times, checks are paid to someone else who has a strong interest in the child's welfare. In other instances, a legal guardian or representative of an institution, or non-profit agency is named to handle the funds.






