

# New Senior Citizen Center opened Monday in Ruidoso

The Lincoln County Senior Citizen's Center opened Monday, with an informal open house, in the center's new quarters adjacent to the Ruidoso Library on Sudderth Drive.

Regular office hours of 8:45-5:30 will be maintained from Monday-Friday. There are two telephones, 257-4565 and 257-5171. The business office, Charlotte Jarratt, director, said "will be partitioned to permit full utilization of the floor space for expansion of the programs we will be initiating in our new building."

Programs to be added immediately include ceramics, lapidary, wood and leather working, quilting and rhythm band with a player piano and; after the official opening tentatively set to coincide with the dedication of the new library, several other activities will be introduced, Mrs. Jarratt said.

four aims of being of assistance to our senior citizens," she said, "transportation, to assist our members in any way possible; recreation, to offer diversified and interesting activities; education, to bring more pleasure into their lives; and information and referral, to assist our people in any way they desire."

She noted that present services include a "telephone reassurance" program in which daily calls are made to members at their homes and also that the center is assisting with transportation needs, including participating in programs.

The program, she said, has been funded in the amount of \$35,844 which will take care of all operational expenses. "I certainly want to thank the Ruidoso village council," Mrs. Jarratt said, "for making the federal grant possible by matching the federal money, dollar for dollar, or a full 50 per cent. And so, thanks to our governing body,

we're fully funded for another year."

A special event is planned at the center, Nov. 15, to aid St. Jude's Catholic Church of San Patricio in their drive to repair and replace objects recently vandalized. "We'll have dancing, for our senior citizens, from 7-10 p.m.," Mrs. Jarratt said, "and for this cause, we'll be accepting donations of \$1 or more from those at the party. Of course, if anyone else wants to help out, we'll be only too happy to accept the contributions, which can be mailed or left at our office."

St. Jude's, she said, has been used by the senior citizens as a center for satellite programs.

Mrs. Jarratt said that the center's current membership is 534 and that during the first project year there were 5,282 participants, that 457 out of town visitors were registered and that 1,576 hours of labor had been volunteered by members.

More than 500 students from White Mountain, Nob Hill and the high school are participating in a Thanksgiving theme contest to decorate 23 Ruidoso business houses, or one for each home room in the schools.

"Business houses will be selected for this program on a first to call the Chamber basis until we have 23 with the deadline to enter being 5 p.m., Nov. 11," chamber manager Richard Cottrun said.

The attraction that will make this plan a success, chamber president Mike Larkey said, "will be the free basketball game in the high school gym

at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 26, in which the Western States Telephone Co. "Turkeys" will play the Community Public Service Co. "Pumpkins".

Fifteen member teams, selected by lot from owners, managers and employees of C-C member firms will play as the climax to the decorating contest. "At half time," Larkey said, "we'll announce the winners and then we'll auction off 23 turkeys, as prizes to the students, with proceeds to be divided 60% to White Mountain, 30% to Nob Hill and 10% to the high school, based on the number of classes in each school participating."

"I want to thank principals Mike Gladden, Sid Miller and Tom Hansen for their cooperation, without which this promotion to involve our young people in the affairs of the community wouldn't have been possible," Larkey said.

All of the hides, Ruidoso exalted ruler Bill Taylor says, "are taken to an Albuquerque firm for tanning, after which leather is given to our disabled vets. This program enables them to generate a feeling of accomplishment and satisfaction."


The barrels, painted green and labeled "deer hides" will be placed at the Ranger Station, Frontier Motors and Gibson's in Ruidoso, at Capitan, Tinnie, Bonita Lake Turnoff and Nosker's Meats in Glencoe.

Don't throw that deer hide away, McCowen cautions, or drag or mutilate it. "Remove the head and shanks so the hide doesn't spoil and leave it at one of our collection points, or bring it to our club room."

The local Elks, McCowen said, "have set a goal of 300 deer hides from this area this season and we know, if we can just

get the word out to hunters, all that we'll have no trouble getting that many, no trouble at all."

And remember, at no cost to yourself you will make life a little more pleasant for our disabled vets who gave so much for their country."

"I will continue all of the services Potter has instituted," Morris said, "and carry out the present plans for improvements that are underway."

In other action the council: Requested additional information on NCR office equipment, the village could acquire, from San Angelo, Texas.


Heard offers from several engineering firms relative to the \$5 million water improve-

Adopted Resolution 74-15 to appoint the NM Municipal League to act as village agent for Community Development Funds, to provide an estimated \$24,750 at a cost to the village of \$320, with the funds to be used for public improvements.

Officially accepted the Library-Senior Citizen's Center and directed village manager Jim Hine to prepare a call for bids for furnishings and equipment. Hine advised the council that four qualified applicants are awaiting interviews for the position of librarian.



The medals, as medallions, key chains, or coins are available in bronze, antique silver and silver to individual Elks and in group orders to lodges.

The medals are designed so that the lodge number can be engraved on the front and the member's number on the back. "I don't like to brag about

this major achievement for our small lodge," Taylor said, "but I'm doing it... because I'm extremely proud of the way our members got behind this program that is resulting in a lot of publicity for Ruidoso, N. M."

The coins bear the Elks symbol on one side, the official centennial emblem on the other.

# Ski here now

The Sierra Blanca Ski Area opens Friday at 9 a.m., with skiing under "generally fair conditions," general manager Roy Parker announced Wednesday.

The gondola and T-bars will be in service to the beginner, novice and intermediate runs, Parker said, "all of which have been machine packed at least once."

"The chair lift," Parker said, "is being completely renovated, with much of it replaced with new equipment, and we anticipate having this service in use before Thanksgiving."

The snow reporting recording service has not been put into use yet pending final installation work by Western States Telephone, Parker said.

The slopes have received 23 inches of snow, in the past 10 days, as of Wednesday, he said, "and we're ready for the skiers with all of our facilities open to the public from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., daily."

## Rash of felonies committed here

Three suspects, in a series of felonies committed since about Oct. 16 in Ruidoso, are to face charges at preliminary hearings at which dates are to be set.

Appearing before Magistrate Austin Pritchett Oct. 31 were: Thomas C. Phelps of El Paso, charged with three counts of burglary and one count of criminal trespass. The charges involve incidents alleged to have occurred between Oct. 21 and 26 at the residences of Frank W. Fisk, Hugh A. Polly and Roger Wyler, all of Ruidoso, and were filed by Robert Jarvis of the Ruidoso PD CID; Phelps will be represented on the four felony charges by court appointed attorney James J. Weldon.

Charles Frank Dobson, address unobtainable, charged with fraudulent use of a credit card in the name of Charles E. Greene, with intent to defraud, and that Dobson "did intend, and without consent of the owner, take the vehicle of

Joseph C. Reynolds". The charges were filed by Gary S. Cook of the New Mexico State Police. Dobson has requested a court appointed attorney.

Appearing before Otero County Magistrate Robert Bradley, Nov. 1, was Robert C. Hume of Lewisville, Texas, charged with aggravated assault on an officer. Hume was arraigned before Magistrate Bradley. (Chuck Shaw, assistant district attorney said, "because none of the Lincoln county magistrates were available.")

Hume was arrested following an incident in Ruidoso's Brady Canyon Nov. 1, in which Wayne B. Simonton of the Ruidoso PD has charged that Hume, pointed an automatic pistol at him, and that later also fired a shot that came close to Simonton's head.

Officer Robert Jarvis said, "The State," Shaw said, "will request a mental evaluation of Hume at Santa Fe."





Eric Tortilla died Nov. 4 in Alamogordo. Funeral services were held in St. Joseph Mission, in Mesalero, Nov. 6, with Father Justin officiating. Burial was in Mesalero Cemetery with Clarke's Chapel of Roses in charge.  
 Mr. Tortilla was born in Mesalero in August 1893; and was a member of the Tribal Council for some forty or fifty years. He was a graduate of Carlisle Indian School in Pennsylvania — where he proved himself to be a leader among outstanding Indians from all over the United States. When Father Albert Brain came to Mesalero as a young priest in 1916, he felt that, though most of the Indians spoke English, they would get more out of his sermons if they could hear them in their own language — so Eric Tortilla became his interpreter. Mr. Tortilla went with Father Albert to parts of the reservation, accompanying him with the Indians, as well as interpreting when necessary. It has been said that it was his suggestion that sparked the idea of building St. Joseph's Mission. He was a member of the church.  
 He is survived by his wife, Beatha Good Tortilla; one son, Reynald Tortilla; two daughters, Diane and Adeltha; seven grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; nephews, Wendell, Frank and Riley Chino, Roscoe and Pete Tortilla; and nieces, Rhoebe Kinehole, Elsie Chino and Lucille Williams.

# Tiny's Gay down ...but he isn't out

Tiny's Gay, the quarter horse superstar, who won 12 out of 13 starts this year and earned some \$440,000, is now recovering from a leg operation.

That's the word from John Colville, the California businessman who acquired Tiny's Gay as a yearling for a miniscule \$3,000. As Tiny's Gay knocked off big-league futurities like ducks in a shooting pond, Colville himself emerged as one of the best known figures in the industry.

The way Colville now sees the situation, Tiny's Gay may be down — but he's hot out. "He came out of the All-American Futurity with a fracture of the upper splint bone in his left front leg," Colville said. "The fracture was big enough to put your finger through. I guess he first did it in the All-American trials, then really cracked it in the finals. After the All-American, his leg was pretty swollen." The famous colt recently underwent surgery, and three screws were placed in the injured bone to hold it together. (The splint bone extends from the knee to the ankle.)

So far, Tiny's Gay is mending well, and Colville hopes to zero him in on next year's major sophomore races around the country. The two primary objectives will be the \$350,000 (est.) Rainbow Derby and the \$500,000 (est.) All-American Derby, both at Ruidoso Downs.


"With those screws in his leg, there's no reason for a fracture to re-occur," Colville said. "Of course, if it doesn't heal the way we think it will, Tiny's Gay will be retired."

The tentative battle plan calls for a return to action early in '75, either at Bay Meadows or Los Alamitos. Then it'll be on to Ruidoso for the two big ones.

Tiny's Gay became something of a TV personality while winning his first 12 starts. The dozen triumphs included the first two legs of the Triple crown — the Kansas Futurity and the Rainbow Futurity. Both events were televised to a regional audience of some 5-6 million. Tiny's Gay got his first defeat — by the length of a nose — when he was overtaken by Easy Date on the last jump of the All-American. The heart-throbber was beamed to a TV audience of about 20 million.

So after you race a horse like Tiny's Gay, what do you do for an encore? The answer is simple — Tiny's Delight. That's a full-jured brother to Tiny's Gay. "She's got the stubbornness of her mother and the kindness of her brother," Colville says. Which adds up to quite an endorsement.

So it seems the Colville camp is planning quite a seige on the quarter horse Triple Crown at Ruidoso Downs this summer. This may be a case of a dream coming true — again.







potential will be pushed in the legislative session. New Mexico is among states with greatest energy potential in oil, gas, coal, geothermal, uranium and other natural resource reserves.

Judicial reforms will be another legislative battleground. A recent citizens conference on courts in Albuquerque recommended nonpartisan, appointed judges. A series of other judicial reforms were also supported by the conference.

In the recommended procedure judges are initially appointed by the governor from a list submitted by a nominating commission of mostly non-lawyer, non-judge members. After a period of service judges face the electorate running on their records alone. If voters reject a judge, the nominating process is used again.

Rich Sims, 44, of Albuquerque campaigned at Democratic rallies in the general election campaign for the party nomination for U. S. senator in 1976. A former Guadalupe County resident, Sims is an announced candidate for U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya's seat.

Our travels over the state in the general election campaign showed the economy was the major issue with voters. Despite much demonstrated concern over the cost of living, inflation and possible unemployment we found many New Mexico areas with solid economies.

Farmington expects to triple its population in 10 years. The Lordsburg-Deming, Las Cruces, Raton, Santa Fe, Silver City, Belen, Clovis and other sectors also seemed to be healthy economically.

Watergate and related problems turned off many voters, especially Republicans. General discontent with politicians, public officials and government was expressed by voters in the campaign.

If the legislature is responsive, it will adopt tough election campaign and conflict of interest laws in the coming session.

SANTA FE — The 1975 Legislature will receive a host of proposals to cut your taxes.

The most likely tax relief bills: Removal of the state gross receipts tax from prescription drugs, medical bills and food; property tax benefits for senior citizens on fixed incomes; a state income tax reduction.

Also, extended benefits for low income groups in the present tax credit. The credit is applied to the state income tax but a host of factors are considered to compute the credit. The 1975 Legislature will be under heavy public pressure to adopt election campaign reforms. A major campaign reform bill died in the Senate in the 1974 Legislature. All major office candidates in the general election campaign supported campaign reforms.

Disposition of the big state surplus will be a key issue in the 1975 lawmaker session. Gov. Bruce King estimates the total of state reserves and surplus will be \$100 million when he leaves office Jan. 1.

Tax relief could take part of the surplus and reserves. But increased budgets for state agencies and capital improvements will also account for a large share.

The influential Legislative Finance Committee is considering burgeoning state agency budget requests for fiscal 1975-76. The LFC and the new governor will send separate proposed executive budgets to the legislature in January.

The big State Hospitals-Institutions Department proposes a \$28.3 million budget next fiscal year, up a husky 33 per cent. In state general fund appropriations alone the DHI wants a \$7.5 million increase.

The controversial State Highway Department proposes a fiscal 1975-76 budget of \$131.148 million, up \$5.4 million. Within this total the SHD seeks \$78.825 million in state funds alone, up \$14 million. Federal funds for the SHD would be \$56,733 million, down \$1.5 million from the current fiscal year.

Environmental legislation will again occupy part of lawmakers' time in 1975. The 1974 Legislature repealed the requirement for environmental impact statements on state projects.

Legislation to restore the requirements will be introduced in the coming session. It will be opposed by industry and other conservative groups.

Inflation is considered mostly a federal problem but the legislature will receive measures intended to curb inflation. New Mexico's vast, varied energy potential received much emphasis in the general election campaign.

More coordinated effort to develop this state's energy po-

**HUNTING ACCIDENTS**

Some 100,000 hunters will be taking off for the New Mexico wilds this season to stalk deer, elk, antelope, turkey, ducks, quail, dove and pheasant. Every year, at least a few hunters become the victims of senseless death which is usually the result of carelessness.

Although the hunting season varies around the state, each hunter must have a valid, stamped New Mexico license. If he wishes to hunt in a special area, such as an Indian reservation, he must obtain another permit from the proper authorities.

What are common hunting dangers? Some accidents are caused by such simple things

as not taking the proper warm clothing, the neglect of using heavy footwear, socks and gloves to avoid frostbite. Do take warm clothes and dress appropriately.

What are common hunting

accidents? The more serious include the careless use of guns. These include accidental firing while clearing, loading, or unloading a gun; carrying a loaded gun in the car or truck; shooting at noise in a bush; shooting in a direction that a road (which is illegal), carrying a gun the wrong way, or even dropping a firearm.

Other causes include using an uncocked rifle, or handling a rifle which has not been unloaded. Shooting a rifle with both hands, shooting illegally at night, or shooting while in the wrong position also cause accidents. The best way to avoid these kinds of accidents is to use common sense and not be careless.

Another common cause of trouble is getting lost while hunting. If you get lost, try to stay in one place. Don't panic. Use a mirror or matches to start a fire. Use extra ammunition to signal for help by shooting three rounds into the air in quick succession, wait five minutes and repeat. Carrying a compass can help avoid getting lost in strange country.

Good preparation for your hunt is important. Leave an information sheet with your family or a friend that outlines where you are going to hunt.

Include how many days you will be gone; where the main camp will be; make, color, and license plate number of your vehicle; and who you are going with. If you are going to stay in a motel, list its name, address and telephone number.

When you are packing your supplies, be sure to take enough food to last an extra day. Special types of food, like candy, canned tomatoes and spinach are especially good. Go light on the starchy foods. Since you hunt early in the morning and late in the afternoon, eat a big hot breakfast with lots of protein. Be sure to take enough water. Be wise — don't hunt and drink alcohol at the same time.

Be sure to pack plenty of matches in water proof containers such as old plastic pill bottles. Take flashlights, mirror, compass, map, extra socks, gloves

and ammunition. Pack a first aid kit to take along. In other words, make a list of everything you'll need and check it off as you pack.

Here are some good hunting tips. If you see a storm building up, head back to base camp immediately. Be sure to tell your hunting buddies approximately where you will be and stick to that area. If you are hunting on foot and you walk up on another hunter who does not see you, start whistling a tune so that he won't turn suddenly and shoot you.

Remember, never shoot at a deer or any target that is too far away. Don't hunt in areas where there are domestic or farm animals. Don't shoot across any heavily used road, and do make sure you close any gates you go through. If you hunt on private land, make sure you have the owners' permission first.

Hunting is a satisfying sport, but keep it a safe one. Use your common sense, pre-plan what you are going to need, handle your gun carefully, and you'll have many hunting seasons to enjoy.
