## VILLAGE TO COLLECT OCCUPATIONAL TAX

# Downs council eyes water plan

The village council of Ruidoso Downs has called for a special open meeting of the board to explain the proposed village water improvement program at the next regular meeting, Jan. 27, 7 p. m. At that time plans for the project and details of the purchase of Denton Field will be explained to village residents. Under the proposal, the village has applied for a loan from FHA for \$50,000 for the purchase of the property and has made application for grants from FHA, the Environmental Improvement Agency and the Four Corners Regional Commission for \$100,000 to complete the water system. The application calls for a new 118,000 gallon storage tank, the moving of the 50,000 gallon tank to Denton Field and various pumps and lines to complete the system.

Approval was given plans submitted by Quentin Daniels, village engineer, for the project grant application. It was noted by Daniels that, if the grants are approved, the system would not cost the village anything.

The board, following the yielding of the chair by Mayor J. J. DiPaolo to mayor pro-tem

George Hancock, voted to enforce the village ordinance for the collection of occupational taxes immediately. The ordinance calls for a tax of \$.11 per \$1,000 of gross receipts for the occupational license with no limit but a \$5 minimum. In the past the village had charged a maximum of \$101.

The board heard a lengthy presentation by Gaylord Bird, Dona Ana Animal Care and Control Administrator, who offered advice and suggestions for an animal control ordinance. Bird offered the help of his department in the training of animal control officers for this area. He noted that a good ordinance and public support for it were essential to have good control.

Yassar Thompson, a village resident, asked that a dedicated road that is adjacent to his property be maintained or vacated. He pointed out that there had been an encroachment on his property line. The council advised Thompson to have the property surveyed.

A presentation was made by Rust Tractor on the purchase of a used motor grader and the council agreed to try the machine while an estimate is made

for the repair of the old machine.

Approval was given for the hiring of an additional patrolman for the police department. The new officer will be Fred Bernard, formerly with the state police.

The council voted to subscribe to a special legislative bill service through the municipal league. Copies of the bills before the legislature will be available to citizens of the community at the village hall.

Approval was also given for village holidays.

Albert Salcido, sanitation department, was granted a raise in pay.

The board approved the transfer of revenue sharing monies from a certificate of deposit to an open savings account to make the funds available for equipment repairs now underway.

A co-operative agreement for an animal control officer with Ruidoso was tabled for further study.

The next regular meet will be the open meeting set for January 27 at 7 p.m. in the village hall. Residents interested in the village water system are urged to attend.

# Water bond sale successful

The Ruidoso village council opened bids Jan. 9 on the sale of the first \$1 million in General Obligation bonds to finance construction of the new 1,108 million gallon water reservoir and distribution system to serve the village and received, A. D. Fowler of Stern Brothers and Co., financial consultants for the village, said, "a very favorable interest rate" in the bid of 5.971447 per cent from United California Bank of Los Angeles; Underwood-Neuhaus Co., of Houston, Texas, and Ruidoso State Bank.

The winning bid breaks down to 3% interest for 1976 and 1977, 6% for 1978, 7.75% for 1979 through 1982, 5.90% for 1983 and 6% for 1984 through 1988.

The net interest from 1976 through 1988 amounts to \$437,

Other bids submitted included Zener and Co., Kansas City, Mo., 6.1646%, \$451,150; Quinn and Co., and Associates, Albuquerque, 6.4089%, \$475,614.44; and Stern Brothers, 6.550606%, \$479,383.

"Technically, the bonds are issued," Fowler told the council, "and as soon as the bonds are printed, they can be delivered to the purchaser and within four or five weeks you should have the cash in the bank."

The original cost estimate per \$1,000 of assessed valuation to Ruidoso property owners was \$5.42 based on a projected interest rate of 7.25%. The 5.97144% rate will put the tax per \$1,000 of assessed valuation at or very near \$5.00, Fowler told The News Friday morning.

In connection with the proposed dam-site on ski run road, Tom Mann of Mann Engineering of Roswell and holder of the construction contract, notified the council that no objections

were received from the State of New Mexico concerning impounding the water at the chosen location. Mann previously notified the council that core testing will begin about April 1, 1975, depending on weather conditions.

The present bond selling schedule calls for the sale of \$2 million as Series B in 1976 and \$2 million in Series C in 1978, to round out the \$5 million financing overwhelmingly authorized by Ruidoso voters Oct. 8, 1974.

The council was polled on the approval vote with trustees Don Driver, Sherman Atwood, Ab Gunter and Don Riley voting "aye", following which the mayor or Lloyd Davis Jr., requested that his "aye" vote also be recorded.

The Planning and Zoning Commission was returned to full strength with the reappointment of L. C. "Cowboy" Stokes to a three year term and the appointment, also for three year terms, of Earlene Phillips to replace

John Payne and Mike Taylor to replace Don Swalander. These terms will expire in November of 1977. Stokes, Phillips and Taylor were mayor Davis' recommendations to serve on P&Z, with trustees Riley and Gunter voting "aye", trustees Atwood and Driver, "no"; upon which the mayor cast the tie-breaking and decisive "aye" vote.

Other P&Z members are Stormy Edwards, George Shoemaker, Wm. Morrison and Betty Patton, who was recently appointed. The terms of these four commission members expire in November of 1975.

In other action, the council:

— Authorized village attorney John W. Thompson to negotiate the lease of 15 acres of State owned land near Bog Springs for a landfill, providing the cost does not exceed \$400 annually. Thompson noted the land in question is valued at approximately \$800 an acre. The site, Thompson said, would be adequate for "from three to five

years" in noting that the lease on the present disposal site expires in February of 1975.

— Authorized purchase of a car wash building, to be dismantled and, as soon as possible, erected adjacent to the village shop. The price is to be negotiated, with payment authorized to be made Aug. 1, 1975.

— Authorized trustee Atwood to work out an agreement and present the council with a solution to the existing animal control problem.

— Decided, after a report by attorney Thompson, to take final action on enactment of the Ruidoso Municipal Code, following receipt of the re-certified ordinances, at the Jan. 30 meeting.

— Authorized submitting a bid of \$1,026 to the City of Artesia on a 1971 Ford van, not equipped as an ambulance, suitable for use as an emergency vehicle. (Village manager Jim Hine was notified January 15 that Ruidoso was the successful bidder.)

# Advanced class in first aid and emergency care

This class, of local law, fire and USFS personnel, will complete 60 hours of rigorous advanced training in first aid and emergency care Saturday evening. Instructors include Chief Paul Lukens, Det. Lt. Jerry Foster and Sgt. M. L. Simon of Ruidoso PD.

Participants, upon completion

of the program, will be qualified as ambulance attendants.

The course includes classes on respiratory emergencies and artificial respiration, wounds, poisoning, specific injuries to head, trunk and extremities; Drowning, water accidents and resuscitation, dressings and bandages, drugs and their abuse,

burns, exposure to radiation, cold and frostbite;

Heat stroke, cramps and exhaustion, bone and joint injuries, first aid for specific fractures on upper body, hip and thigh, kneecap, lower leg, ankle and foot;

Bone and joint injuries, dis-

locations, strains and sprains, sudden illness, emergency childbirth, emergency rescue and transfer with and without assistance;

Emergency rescue and transfer using stretcher, litter, backboards and vehicle transfer, extrication or removal from an automobile and solving of problems in field testing.

# 1974 village fire loss estimated at \$46,000

Property loss due to fire in the village during 1974 totaled an estimated \$46,000, according to the Ruidoso Fire Department's annual report.

This compares to estimated losses of \$84,250 in 1973, \$18,500 in 1972, \$41,900 in 1971 and \$28,325 in 1970.

Volunteer firemen logged a total of 1,535 man hours actual fire fighting time during 1974 with only two firemen and one civilian being injured.

To keep abreast of the latest

fire fighting techniques, department members devoted 2,044 man hours to training and, in the course of the year, held 36 fire drills.

Statistics for known causes of fire was headed by carelessness, pegged at 23 per cent. Next in line was electrical at eight per cent, gasoline also eight, LP gas three and lightning three per cent.

The cause was determined to be unknown in 42 per cent of 1974's fires.

On 17 per cent of the fire calls, the fire was out by the time department personnel arrived at the scene.

Of the time spent on call, 16 per cent was standing by in the event another department needed help fighting a fire, or standing by at the scene of an accident.


Grass fires, at 41 per cent, headed the list of calls during the year, followed by automobiles at 23, houses 21, smoke eight and trailers seven per

cent.

Present department membership total: 23, of which four are paid and three are junior members, attending high school.

Department equipment includes three 750 gallon per minute pumps, one 500 gpm and one 200 gpm pumps, all carrying wet water to fire calls and an estimated 3,600 feet of hose.

A new 400 gpm pumper truck is in the final stages of completion.

Johns-n-O'Malley budget planning meet had been set for January 22 at the school and that the North Central Evaluation of the Ruidoso school system would be held February 17-18-19.

Detail of the annual ski program, which had been previously approved, were announced and it was noted that the program would begin on January 21.

The question of desks for some students at the Nob Hill School was brought before the board and board members were invited to the school to check on the situation. Principal Sid Miller reported that he knew of no case where a student did not have a desk.



# The 'hows' of a bond sale

The sale of \$1 million in General Obligation bonds is an involved process, entailing detailed figures and statistics to enable prospective bidders to determine if the purchase will be a worthwhile investment.

The figures used in connection with the sale of the first \$1 million of the \$5 million bond issue, that must be sold to finance Ruidoso's new water reservoir and distribution system, are enlightening and indicative of the sound financial status of the Village of Ruidoso.

The News is presenting some of these figures, with other pertinent information contained in the prospectus and notice of sale, that the taxpayers of the village, who will be paying for these bonds will have a better understanding of the sale, and of the growth of the village that makes Ruidoso a sound investment risk.

The first issue of \$1 million will be in bonds of \$5,000 denomination, dated Feb. 1, 1975. They will mature serially Dec. 1 of each year from 1976 thru 1980. The bonds will mature on this schedule: \$75,000 in 1976, \$50,000 in 1977 and 1978, \$75,000 in 1979, \$100,000 in 1980, \$120,000 in 1981, \$110,000 in 1982, \$125,000 in 1983-84-85 with \$45,000 due Dec. 1 of 1986.

In explaining the need (Purpose of Issue) for the bonds, the prospectus said: "Water for the Village of Ruidoso has continually been contingent on snowfall and early rains. Each July water supply becomes a critical problem. There are now inadequate facilities to store raw water during the heavy run-off periods for use in summer months. This issue of bonds is the first increment of a total authorized issue of \$5,000,000 voted on October 8, 1974. The total authorization will be issued over a period of three years to construct a dam and lake for holding raw water, a new treatment plant and transmission lines."

The Village financial statement included the following:

Actual Value (estimated) \$53,049,300.  
Assessed Valuation (1974) \$17,083,100.

The Net Direct Bonded Debt of the village as of Dec. 1, 1975 will be \$2,933,944. This includes previously outstanding GO Bonds of \$1,600,000, the \$1 mil-

lion in water bonds, less \$16,056 in the Sinking Fund.

The overlapping bonded debt for Ruidoso School District, based on an assessed valuation of \$22,584,124 is \$345,000 of which Ruidoso's share is 79.1 per cent or \$272,895. Lincoln County's assessed valuation stands at \$47,602,038 with an outstanding debt of \$910,000 with Ruidoso's share being 37.5 per cent, or \$341,250. The village's overlapping debt totals \$614,145.

The population figures in the prospectus placed Ruidoso's estimated permanent population at 3,500 with a standing summer growth to 15,500 which jumps on weekends to 30,500.

Based on 3,500 population the per capita direct bonded debt stands at \$738.26 with the direct and overlapping bond debt figure pegged at \$913.73. The ratio to the assessed valuation is 14.4 per cent on the direct bonded debt and 17.88 per cent on the \$913.73.

The 1974 assessed valuation for Ruidoso's three major taxpayers put Western States Telephone Co., first with \$481,854, followed by Community Public Service with \$420,887 and Ruidoso Gas Co., with \$81,526.

The village's fund balances, as of Dec. 1, 1974, totaled \$999,738, including Utilities, \$49,301; General, \$98,327; Fire, \$7,382; Sinking, \$16,056; Interest, \$48,672 and all other funds, \$780,000.

In addition to Ruidoso's population increase from 2,300 in 1963 to 3,500 in 1974 it was noted that Lincoln County's growth over the same period ranged from 8,000 to 8,500.

Ruidoso's bank deposits, were \$5,233,700 in 1963, \$7,235,791 in 1966, \$12,401,826 in 1971 and soared to 25,435,049 during 1974.

Building permits issued by the village totaled \$821,332 in 1963; \$690,859 in 1966, \$1,218,000 in 1971, and climbed to \$7,021,231 during 1974.

The growth in water meters has been continuous beginning with 1,856 in 1963, 2,939 in 1966, 2,537 in 1971 and reaching 3,281 in 1974.

Growth in use of electrical meters has been even higher beginning with 1,954 in 1963, 1,972 in 1968, 3,155 in 1971 and reaching a total of 5,122 in 1974.

During the same period of time the assessed valuation of the county stood at \$19,809,877 in 1963 compared to \$47,602,038 in 1974. The village's assessed valuation was \$4,212,708 in 1963, \$5,398,929 in 1966, \$6,852,069 in 1971 and then increased sharply to \$17,883,100 at the end of 1974.

The record of tax collection is high, standing at 99 per cent and over from 1964-71, 98 per cent in 1972 and 96 per cent

in 1973. Taxes for 1974 are in process of collection from Dec. 1.

Through fiscal year 1987-88, the village's general obligation debt, including the \$1 million in water bonds, shows outstanding GO bonds of \$2,083,057 with \$1 million in principal, \$488,525 in interest (based on an estimated rate of 6.5 per cent) and the total debt service at \$3,569,582.

(Editor's note: These statistics

are highlights of the prospectus and notice of sale for the \$1 million bond issue as presented in part, prove that Ruidoso is growing, and consistently progressive, village and indicate, with the completion of the project to insure an adequate supply of water, that the village can look forward to a continued growth, instead of fighting an uphill battle to ward off slipping into oblivion.)

**Manure Garden Now**  
Home vegetable gardeners who want to get even better results from their 1975 gardens than they had this year may find a good idea to apply manure now instead of next spring. Many gardeners complain, for example, that their carrot roots branch out as they grow. Research shows this seems to be caused by applying fresh manure in the spring just before carrot

planting time. Another complaint is the tops of beets and radishes growing too big at the expense of the roots. That also comes from using too much fresh manure at planting time. So the best idea is to put manure on your garden now rather than next spring. Leave it on the surface of the garden over winter and turn it under next spring. You could have the best crop of vegetables ever.

**Check Gas Appliances**  
Cold weather brings an added danger of carbon monoxide poisoning. To reduce the danger, you should check gas furnaces and other gas appliances for safety. Replace filters on furnaces and space heaters. Make

sure all vents are clean and properly vented. Do not use unvented space heaters. Check pilot lights. Flames should be blue; a yellow flame indicates improper combustion and increased carbon monoxide. Clear all debris from chimneys.

**Rabies Shots For County Pets**  
Dogs and cats that run free can get rabies from wildlife and pass it on to livestock. That's another good reason to have farm and ranch pets vaccinated for rabies.



# Ruidoso quint's sweep first county tournament

Ruidoso's basketball teams made a clean sweep of the first annual Lincoln County Basketball Tournament at Capitan, played Jan. 9-11, with the Warrior boys edging Hondo 46-41 and the Warrior girls downing Capitan 52-23 in the championship tilts Saturday night.

The boys championship dragged through the first three quarters with the tally knotted at 8-all at the quarter and 19-all at the half. In the third quarter the Warriors gained what proved to be the winning edge

by building up a 33-28 lead at the buzzer.

The fourth quarter turned out to be a barn burner with Hondo applying a tough full court press and displaying bursts of speed that seemingly dazzled the Warriors. Hondo players repeatedly stole Warrior passes and upset the local offensive, timing to the point where Hondo grabbed a 35-33 lead with 4:33 remaining on the scoreboard clock.

The Warriors, trailing by two, gradually settled down and

worked the ball into Stiles who tied the count at 35-all, with 4:10 left.

Lucero dunked a pair of free throws at 3:47. Montoya came back to sink two gift shots to tie the score and on the Hondo move down court the Warriors stole the ball and at 3:15, Perryman moved the Warriors into a 39-37 advantage.

Play was cautious on both sides until Herrera knotted the score at 39-all with 1:59 left. At 1:40 Stiles hit a field goal and Hondo kept control of the ball until 1:11 when Candelaria closed out Hondo's scoring from the floor to knot the count at 41-41.

The Warriors then took command with a defense that kept Hondo from working the ball in and with 0:58 Stiles put the Warriors in front 43-41, and at 0:27 Eubank netted his only tally of the period to extend the lead to 45-41 to ice the game. Hondo put on a desperation rush during which Stiles was fouled with 0:04 on the clock. He missed his first toss but slipped the second one through the hoop to give the Warriors a 46-41 win and the championship.

"In the championship game, I'd have to single out Kirk Eubank for doing an outstanding job all around," coach Thurman Sanchez said, "and I feel his contribution was largely responsible for our win."

The Warrior girls moved out to grab a 10-2 first quarter lead over Capitan in the championship game at 8:30. Capitan worked the ball into the hoop well, but just couldn't score.

During the second quarter Capitan's shooting picked up and they tallied 15 to 14 for Ruidoso, to trail 24-17 at the half. Play during the third period was fairly even with Ruidoso leading 38-29 at the buzzer.

In the fourth canto the Warriors settled down, solidified their defense and tallied five field goals and five of six free throws, while holding Capitan to nine points to grab the championship 53-38.

"The girls went into this tournament with an 8-3 record on the season," coach Merri

Beth Ries said, "and after losing to Capitan 50-49 the Saturday before winning the championship trophy from the same team, 53-38, was a big thrill."

High point scorers Tricia Tully, 20, and Diana Padilla, 13, were named to the all-tournament team, "leading," coach Ries said, "a real fine playing team to the title."

The girls are now 10-3 and "with two more games left this season," coach Ries said, "they should rank high in their district and be a real contender in the district playoffs in February."





## THE PICTURE OF HEALTH

**The Importance of Pap Tests**  
When was the last time you had a pap test? As a woman, did you know that this simple test is one of the best ways to detect cervical cancer which is curable if caught early?

National statistics show that your chances of getting cancer are one in four during your lifetime, and that the disease will strike two of every three families over the years. Cervical cancer is one of the most common forms of the disease in women.

In New Mexico alone, some 280 cases of cervical cancer are detected every year. The relative survival rate of 85 percent has been attributed to early diagnosis in three-quarters of the cases through pap tests and proper medical treatment. Like other forms of cancer, cervical cancer strikes women of all ages and cultural backgrounds.

Does the word "cancer" seem mysterious and frightening to you? Almost everyone has had a friend or relative who had had it or died from it. Although there are many different kinds of cancer, all are marked by an abnormal growth and spread of cells. If this process is not controlled by medical treatment, the person will eventually die.

Why is early detection so important? Most cancer processes usually begin as a "localized" disease. At this stage, just one or a few of the tiny body cells change and become a cancer cell. This cell, a malignant cell as it is called, reproduces itself by dividing into two cells which again divide and the process continues. All of these cells are related to the original cancer cell so they are also malignant. This is how cancer grows.

Most cancers begin on the surface of a tissue like skin, the surfaces of the uterus, the lining of the mouth, stomach, intestines, or elsewhere. Such cancers usually remain in the lining or wherever they started for a period of time. At first they are visible only under a microscope, but later they grow into a mass which can be seen with the eye.

In advanced stages of cancer, cancer spreads to other parts of the body and death becomes certain. This is why it is important to detect any cancer in its early stages. Cervical cancer can be detected by a pap test and cured if diagnosed early enough.

Who should have a pap test? Every mature woman, beginning in the childbearing years, should have a pap test as part of her annual checkup. Medical

# NM Criminal Procedure

## NO. 2 OF A SERIES GRAND JURY — AN ALTERNATIVE PROCEDURE

**1. GRAND JURY PROCEEDINGS:** A Grand Jury is perhaps the most powerful tool in the American Criminal Justice system. In New Mexico, the rule of "Prosecutor's Choice" prevails, as set forth in our Constitution. Generally, this means that a criminal proceeding may be initiated by EITHER the complaint-preliminary hearing-information process, or by grand jury indictment.

a. In this district, a grand jury is called only in Otero County; the smaller caseload of Lincoln County does not justify calling a grand jury there.

b. When a grand jury is used there is no need to present a complaint to a magistrate; however, where an arrest warrant is initially required, a complaint is sometimes filed, and then the matter is presented to the Grand Jury, which takes the place of a preliminary hearing. An indictment is then filed in District Court, and the complaint is dropped. As long as the time limits are not violated, the Courts have held that this method of proceeding is proper.

c. As a matter of policy our office presents a fairly complete case to the Grand Jury — we attempt to make the procedure quick but complete. Since defense counsel is not present, no lengthy cross examination of witnesses takes place, and thus it is possible to present considerable evidence in a short period of time.

d. Grand Juries consist of 12 citizens who serve for up to 6 months, headed by a foreman. A majority of 8 jurors is required to return a "true bill" — an indictment, accusing a person of committing a crime.

e. Grand Jurors are selected in Otero County from a special panel of jurors, drawn from the voting lists from the last election. The selection is by a New Mexico State University computer, and is done at random. The special panel is interviewed

by the District Judge, who may excuse jurors who cannot serve, and then the jurors actually sitting are drawn from the panel by lot, usually with alternates also available.

f. Duties of the Grand Jury include examination of all cases presented by the District Attorney, or by citizens; inspection of jails within the county; and investigation of allegations of official corruption or misconduct.

**2. INDICTMENTS:** These are the official accusations returned by a grand jury. They serve as the basis for a criminal case, and state what crime the defendant is accused of. They must be filed within 24 hours of being voted upon. This involves submission to the District Court Clerk, who sets up a file and in turn submits the indictments to the District Judge, who then issues either a summons (an order to appear for arraignment in District Court), or an arrest warrant — called a "bench warrant". Bench warrants must state relative conditions on them, so a defendant may obtain immediate release.

**3. RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS:** Grand Jury proceedings are secret in order to protect persons falsely charged with crime and which the Jury chooses not to indict. However, a record of all proceedings is taken. The record of the testimony of particular witnesses is made available to defense counsel if that witness testifies later at trial, or is unable to do so. He tells the same story later in preparation of preliminary hearing transcripts.

### INITIAL DISTRICT COURT PROCEEDINGS

**1. INFORMATIONS:** After a preliminary hearing, where that procedure is used, an information must be prepared and filed in District Court within 30 days of the end of the preliminary hearing. This is a basic accusatory document stating the essentials of the crime charged, and it lists the witnesses on which it is based.

**2. ARRAIGNMENT:** Within 15

days of the filing of the information or indictment, or 15 days of arrest, whichever is later (to cover situations where the Grand Jury indicts someone who flees before arrest), the defendant must be arraigned in District Court.

a. The Judge first reads the defendant his rights as to counsel, trial by jury and so on.

b. Although the defendant is supplied with a copy of the information or indictment prior to arraignment, he is ALWAYS provided with still another copy at the time of arraignment. Usually the document is also read to him at this time.

c. The defendant is then required to enter a plea of guilty, not guilty, or not guilty at this time. The plea may be changed to one of not guilty by reason of insanity within 20 days of the arraignment, or later if the Court allows it. Withdrawal of a guilty plea, however, requires some showing of violation of the defendant's rights; on a proper showing the Court may allow withdrawal. As a plea is entered in this district unless counsel is present, the defendant is informed of what to do anything, the plea is entered.

**3. RELEASE** course, the District views the conduct at the time of the defendant. The defendant has been jailed on a warrant, the Court uses the conditions set; if no relative is usually allowed, set at this time, and are until every 24 hours, the Court of a single issue are allowed.

**PLEA BARGAINING:** Because of the difficulty of the complexity of crime victims, all present in plea bargaining involves an agreement between the prosecutor and public defender who would handle most of

rights). Generally, these are entered when it becomes obvious that proceeding further would be unsuccessful or useless. Thus, they appear when the prosecutor finds that essential evidence cannot be used because of illegal seizure; when necessary witnesses are no longer available or refuse to testify, and their testimony is not otherwise available; and so on.

**MOTION PRACTICE AND DISCOVERY** Motions are specific request to the Court to take some sort of action in a criminal case. There are a great variety of these, and in addition, some variants have been added in recent years to change the procedure somewhat.

**1. MOTIONS TO SUPPRESS:** These are formal requests by the defendant made to the Court to stop the State from using certain evidence. Usually, they involve illegally seized evidence, invalidly obtained confessions, and improperly conducted line-ups. In most of these, a lengthy hearing is required, with presentation of evidence as to how the prosecution came by the evidence questioned — and the Court rules on whether or not the evidence may be used at trial.

**2. ALIBI DEFENSES:** If the State demands, the defense must disclose an alibi defense and the witnesses supporting it, no later than 10 days prior to trial. 5 days later, the State must supply the defense with a list of witnesses intended to be used to oppose the alibi.

**3. CHANGE OF VENUE:** If either party believes that the residents of the county in which the crime was committed are in some way prejudiced about the case (adverse publicity, etc), the case may be shifted to another county, preferably of the same district. This hearing with

**4. INSANITY:** This category involves a variety of matters. A variant of this defense is "reduced responsibility" — mentally incapable to form the specific intent to commit the crime in question. Another variant is present incapacity — the defendant is presently too incompetent to know what is going on in a trial. When any of these issues are raised, the following happens:

# NM Criminal Procedure

NO. 2 OF A SERIES  
GRAND JURY — AN  
ALTERNATIVE PROCEDURE

1. GRAND JURY PROCEEDINGS: A Grand Jury is perhaps the most powerful tool in the American Criminal Justice system. In New Mexico, the rule of "Prosecutor's Choice" prevails, as set forth in our Constitution. Generally, this means that a criminal proceeding may be initiated by EITHER the complaint-preliminary hearing-information process, or by grand jury indictment.

a. In this district, a grand jury is called only in Otero County; the smaller caseload of Lincoln County does not justify calling a grand jury there.

b. When a grand jury is used there is no need to present a complaint to a magistrate; however, where an arrest warrant is initially required, a complaint is sometimes filed, and then the matter is presented to the Grand Jury, which takes the place of a preliminary hearing. An indictment is then filed in District Court, and the complaint is dropped. As long as the time limits are not violated, the Courts have held that this method of proceeding is proper.

c. As a matter of policy our office presents a fairly complete case to the Grand Jury — we attempt to make the procedure quick but complete. Since defense counsel is not present, no lengthy cross examination of witnesses takes place, and thus it is possible to present considerable evidence in a short period of time.

d. Grand Juries consist of 12 citizens who serve for up to 6 months, headed by a foreman. A majority of 8 jurors is required to return a "true bill" — an indictment, accusing a person of committing a crime.

e. Grand Jurors are selected in Otero County from a special panel of jurors, drawn from the voting lists from the last election. The selection is by a New Mexico State University computer, and is done at random. The special panel is interviewed

by the District Judge, who may excuse jurors who cannot serve, and then the jurors actually sitting are drawn from the panel by lot, usually with alternates also available.

f. Duties of the Grand Jury include examination of all cases presented by the District Attorney, or by citizens; inspection of jails within the county; and investigation of allegations of official corruption or misconduct.

2. INDICTMENTS: These are the official accusations returned by a grand jury. They serve as the basis for pleading in a criminal case, and state what crime the defendant is accused of. They must be filed within 24 hours of being voted upon. This district involves submission to the District Court Clerk, who sets up a file, and in turn submits the indictments to the District Judge, who then issues either a summons (an order to appear for arraignment in District Court), or an arrest warrant — called a "bench warrant". Bench warrants must state release conditions on them, so a defendant may obtain immediate release.

3. RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS: Grand Jury proceedings are secret, in order to protect persons falsely charged with crime and which the Jury chooses not to indict. However, a record of all proceedings is taken. The record of the testimony of particular witnesses is made available to defense counsel if that witness testifies later at trial, in order to ensure that he tells the same story later. Costs are about the same as those in preparation of preliminary hearing transcripts.

INITIAL DISTRICT COURT PROCEEDINGS

1. INFORMATIONS: After a preliminary hearing, where that procedure is used, an information must be prepared and filed in District Court within 30 days of the end of the preliminary hearing. This is a basic accusatory document, stating the essentials of the crime charged, and it lists the witnesses on which it is based.

2. ARRAIGNMENT: Within 15

days of the filing of the information or indictment, or 15 days of arrest, whichever is later (to cover situations where the Grand Jury indicts someone who flees before arrest), the defendant must be arraigned in District Court.

a. The Judge first reads the defendant his rights as to counsel, trial by jury and so on.

b. Although the defendant is supplied with a copy of the information or indictment prior to arraignment, he is ALWAYS provided with still another copy at the time of arraignment. Usually the document is also read to him at this time.

c. The defendant is then required to enter a plea of guilty, no contest, or not guilty at this time. The plea may be changed to one of not guilty by reason of insanity within 20 days of the arraignment, or later if the Court allows it. Withdrawal of a guilty plea, however, requires some showing of violation of the defendant's rights; on a proper showing the court may allow withdrawal. As a matter of policy, a plea is never entered in this district unless defense counsel is present. In addition, if the defendant is in any way unsure of what to do, or doesn't say anything, the court automatically enters a plea of not guilty.

3. RELEASE: As a matter of course, the District Court reviews the conditions of release at the time of arraignment. If the Defendant has previously been jailed on a magistrate warrant, the Court usually continues the conditions previously set; if no release has been previously allowed, conditions are set at this time. Again, defendants are entitled to review every 24 hours, and appeals to the Court of Appeals on this issue are allowed.

PLEA BARGAINING

1. NATURE OF PLEA BARGAINING: Because of the complexity of criminal cases and the difficulty of obtaining convictions, all prosecutors engage in plea bargaining. The process involves an agreement by the defendant to plead guilty to ei-

ther a lesser offense than that originally charged (or only a part of the offense charged), or the prosecutor agrees to recommend lighter sentencing than would be possible under the original charge.

Very few people except criminals really approve of plea bargaining. However, all persons involved in the criminal justice system agree that it is necessary, because there simply are not sufficient resources to allow 55 to 100% of the cases to go to trial. All prosecutors are in favor of eliminating the use of plea bargaining, but only if society is willing to do so successfully; any other approach would merely add to the more criminals loose than is presently the case. The magnitude of funds required is very considerable — such as the four times as much for prosecutors and public defenders, who would handle most of the load; twice as much for Judges and their staffs and three times as much for corrections (probation, parole and penitentiary) so that they could handle the new load.

2. PLEA AND DISPOSITION AGREEMENT PROCEDURE: Recognizing the necessity and the Supreme Court has issued rules governing the procedure. Generally, the agreement must be reduced to writing, signed by the Defendant, defense counsel, the judge, and the prosecutor. If the judge disapproves, he may order the case to proceed to trial. A plea agreement may be entered at any time during the proceedings in a case up to the time of verdict.

REFUSAL TO PROSECUTE

1. NOLLE PROSEQUI: A technical term, meaning that a prosecutor refuses to prosecute further with a case. It may be entered at any time during the beginning of trial without creating double jeopardy (i.e., the case may be re-commenced without violating the defendant's

rights). Generally, these are entered when it becomes obvious that proceeding further would be unsuccessful or useless. Thus, they appear when the prosecutor finds that essential evidence cannot be used because of illegal seizure; when necessary witnesses are no longer available or refuse to testify, and that their testimony is not otherwise available; and so on.

MOTION PRACTICE AND DISCOVERY

1. MOTIONS GENERALLY: Motions are specific requests to the Court to take some sort of action in a criminal case. There are a great variety of these, and in addition, some variants have been added in recent years to change the procedure somewhat.

a. Motions must be filed by either side at the time of arraignment, or within 20 days of arraignment. Usually they are filed with the Court Clerk with copies to other counsel involved in the case.

b. A formal hearing is required on each motion — usually involving legal arguments and sometimes presentation of testimony. The court then rules on the motion orally, and a written order is later entered, prepared by the party obtaining the favorable ruling.

2. DISCOVERY: The other broad category of activity taking place between arraignment and trial is discovery — finding out what the other side intends to do at trial.

a. Discovery of the State's case: This is very broad under modern rules. The Defendant need only file a request for information on the prosecutor; a formal reply is then required, stating to the witnesses to be called by the State, scientific tests to be conducted, testimony of witnesses, and so on. In order to avoid difficulties over this sort of thing, one office usually makes its discovery available to the defense in all cases; attorneys need only check them out and copy what they need.

b. Discovery by the state of the defense case: This is much more limited. A surprise is a defendant's device used by defense attorneys to obtain an order from the Court requiring dis-

closure of defense material evidence, scientific reports, and names of witnesses — but NOT statements by witnesses made to the defense, or statements of the defendant.

3. MOTIONS TO SUPPRESS: These are formal requests by the defendant made to the Court to stop the State from using certain evidence. Usually, they involve illegally seized evidence, invalidly obtained confessions, and improperly conducted line-ups. In most of these, a lengthy hearing is required, with presentation of evidence as to how the evidence came by the evidence questioned — and the Court rules on whether or not the evidence may be used at trial.

4. INSANITY: This category involves a variety of matters. First, the defendant must, as noted, notify the State and the Court within 20 days of arraignment if the insanity defense is to be used. A variant of this defense is "reduced responsibility" — mentally incapable to form the specific intent to commit the crime in question. Another variant is present incapacity — the defendant is present but incompetent to know what is going on in a trial. When any of these issues are raised, the following happens:

a. The Court usually orders the defendant to the Forensic Unit of the State Hospital — a unit specializing in the diagnosis of criminal, insanity and treatment.

b. Once reports are obtained, the Court may rule on whether the defendant is competent to stand trial; if not, the Court proceeds to determine whether the defendant can be returned to competency, usually by Forensic Unit, or if not, whether he is subject to commitment for his

own protection (it is possible to be criminally insane, and still safe to have on the streets — the issue is one of responsibility for one's acts).

c. Of course, the defense may have the defendant evaluated by its own experts — disclosure of those findings to the State are limited.

d. If the defendant is presently competent, insanity at the time of the offense is a jury issue. If the jury, at trial, finds the defendant not guilty by reason of insanity, the Court again determines whether civil commitment is appropriate — it need not do so, if the facts do not support such a commitment.

5. ALIBI DEFENSES: If the State demands, the defense must disclose an alibi defense and the witnesses supporting it, no later than 10 days prior to trial. 5 days later, the State must notify the defense with a list of witnesses intended to be used to oppose the alibi.

6. CHANGE OF VENUE: If either party believes that the residents of the county in which the crime was committed are in some way prejudiced about the case (adverse publicity, etc.), the case may be shifted to another county, preferably of the same judicial district. This usually requires a hearing with witnesses and so on.

7. DISQUALIFICATION OF JUDGE: If either party believes that the judge sitting in the District (or the Magistrate, in preliminary hearing stages of the case) is in any way prejudiced, he may file a declaration of that belief to the court early in the trial (by arraignment, usually). Once our regular judge is disqualified, the parties may elect

to agree on another judge, or, after 10 days, the Supreme Court will appoint one to hear the case. Since it is often difficult for a judge to leave his home district to hear a case elsewhere, disqualifications are the single greatest factor in delaying cases around the state.

8. TECHNICAL MOTIONS: There are a great variety of these possible, and usually have to do with the sufficiency of the indictment or information, the validity of the preliminary hearing, and so on.

9. TIME LIMITS: Motions not argued within 30 days are deemed denied, unless the Court states otherwise.

10. PRE-TRIAL CONFERENCE: Although new to criminal procedure and not yet used much in this district, it is possible for a pre-trial conference to be held. This single hearing disposes of all outstanding motions, establishes how the case is to be tried, and iron out difficult problems of evidence in advance, so that the trial will go smoother.



ORDINANCE NO. 74-15 AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AND EMPOWERING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,000,000 OF GENERAL OBLIGATION, NEGOTIABLE, COUPON WATER BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, PRESCRIBING THE FORM OF AND OTHER PROVISIONS CONCERNING SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE EXECUTION THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY AND COLLECTION OF AD VALOREM TAXES FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF SAID BONDS AND THE INTEREST ACCRUING THEREON; PRESCRIBING OTHER DETAILS IN CONNECTION WITH SAID BONDS AND TAXES AND RATIFYING ACTION TAKEN IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

WHEREAS, the bonds hereinafter authorized were lawfully and favorably voted at an election duly held in said Village on October 8, 1974; and WHEREAS, none of the bonds voted at said election has been authorized, issued, or delivered; and WHEREAS, it is necessary and advisable to authorize, issue, and deliver an installment series of said bonds; and WHEREAS, the bonds hereinafter authorized and designated were voted and are to be issued and delivered pursuant to the general laws of the State of New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Ruidoso (herein sometimes designated as the "Village" or "Municipality") in the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico (herein sometimes designated as the "State"), is a legally and regularly created, established, organized and existing municipal corporation under the laws of the State; and

WHEREAS, the Village now desires to issue the bonds authorized at said election; and WHEREAS, the life of all the improvements to be acquired with the proceeds of said bonds, all as herein authorized to be issued, will be at least thirteen (13) years from the date of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to due notice, sealed bids for the purchase of said bonds were received and publicly opened on the 9th day of January, 1975, at the hour of 8:00 p.m., M.S.T.; and WHEREAS, at this meeting the Board of Trustees received bids for the sale of the proposed Series 1975 Bonds, and determined a purchaser for same.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO: Section 1. That said Village's bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,000,000, for the purpose of constructing, enlarging, improving and extending the water system of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico.

Section 3. That said bonds shall be dated February 1, 1975, shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 each, shall be numbered consecutively from one upward, and shall mature serially on the maturity date, in each of the years, and in the amounts, respectively, as set forth in the following schedule:

Section 12. That this Ordinance shall be and remain irrevocable until the principal of and the interest on the Bonds authorized to be issued by this Ordinance, and in fact actually issued, shall have been fully paid, satisfied and discharged, as provided herein.

Section 13. That all Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances, inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any Ordinance or any part of any Ordinance heretofore repealed.

Section 14. If any section, paragraph, clause, or provision of this Ordinance for any reason shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause, or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 15. That the Village covenants to and with the purchasers of the bonds that it will make no use of the proceeds of the bonds at any time throughout the term of this issue of bonds which, if such use had been reasonably expected on the date of delivery of the bonds to and payment for the bonds by the purchasers, would have caused the bonds to be arbitrage bonds within the meaning of Section 103(d) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or any regulations or ruling pertaining thereto; and by this covenant the Village is obligated to comply with the requirements of the aforesaid Section 103(d) and all applicable and pertinent Department of the Treasury regulations relating to arbitrage bonds. Section 17. That notice by the Board of Trustees of the time, place and purpose of the meeting at which this Ordinance was adopted is hereby found to be reasonable notice to the public in accordance with Chapter 91, Laws of New Mexico, 1974, and said notice that has been given is hereby ratified and approved by the Board of Trustees as notice given on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, and that such meeting was open to the public, and that these minutes of the Board of Trustees are open to the public's inspection.

Section 18. That it is hereby declared that this Ordinance is an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need, and it shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication, and that the Mayor, by signing this Ordinance, declares an emergency and that an immediate danger to the public health, safety and welfare of the Village's inhabitants, and that the bond proceeds are needed as soon as possible in connection with constructing, improving, enlarging and extending the Village's water system.


