RHS accreditation study completed

A group of twelve New Mexico educators completed the required evaluation of the Ruidoso school system for the North Central Accreditation Assn. and gave a brief review at a meet held last Wednesday in the school administration offices. Dr. L. V. Payne presided at the meet and gave the critique for the benefit of school board members and high school faculty members.

He reported that maintenance of the facilities was good and that the school was receiving maximum utilization of the plant. He noted that the crowded condition of the plant was the most critical point in the evaluation and stressed the importance of a master plan for buildings in the whole school system.

In discussing the staff, Dr. Payne commented on the spirit of cooperation throughout the school as one of the major points of strength in the system. He also noted the good relationship and cooperation between the town and the school and referred to it as "wonderful". He suggested more in-service training for the staff.

He did point out that staff members were required to use too much time for preparation due to the heavy load of classes carried by many members of the faculty — he stated that some teachers had to prepare for as many as 4 or 5 classes. He cautioned on the high rate of faculty turnover but said that there was no evidence of ill effects from the turnover.


He encouraged the continued use of curriculum guides and noted the planning, administration and smooth operation in the 72 course areas of the curriculum. The need for more effort in curriculum leadership was stressed and Payne advocated more mixture of boys and girls in the vocational programs, such as Home Economics and shop. He suggested that a part time counselor or aide be added to the Counselor's office.

The library staff was commended for good relationships with both faculty and students but the addition of more audiovisual aids was recommended. The cafeteria, he pointed out, did not have the support of students and leaves something to be desired. Payne stated that there was a common problem and deserved consideration for a solution.

noted teamwork on decision-making. He urged very careful planning to prevent pupil-teacher ratios from increasing and more administrative assistance. To board members he suggested more careful planning of agendas for meetings and that the board stick to the agenda. He noted that the board's job was not administration but policy making and that if the board felt the administration was not doing its job adequately, they should be replaced but that its duties should not be usurped.

The last evaluation of the school by the North Central Accreditation Association was held seven years ago when Ruidoso joined the group. The overall picture given at the exit interviews was quite good for the Ruidoso Schools.

Downs gets flood insurance

The announcement was made to the Ruidoso Downs village board of trustees last Monday evening that the village has been accepted in the federal flood insurance program. This step means that, in flood endangered areas of the village, a federally subsidized insurance program will be available.

Ruidoso Downs, the National Flood Insurance Association (NFIA) has announced, is eligible for residential and non-residential property insurance against flood. Damages from flooding, NFIA noted, is not covered in standard insurance policies.

The new flood coverage is being offered in accordance with requirements established by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under the terms of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973. The government also participates in the flood program through premium equalization payments, so that subsidized cost will be in the range of the average insured's pocketbook.

The federal act requires that communities interested in becoming eligible for flood insurance must take action to restrict unwise land use in flood-prone areas. They must ask

HUD to arrange for detailed studies of the flood hazard in the community so actuarial rates can be established.

The amount of flood insurance available at subsidized rates under the government's emergency program is limited to \$25,000 for single-family residences, with maximum of \$100,000 on all other types of residential and non-residential properties. Low-cost flood insurance for contents is limited to \$10,000 for all residential property and \$100,000 on non-residential properties. Tenants may insure contents separately.

The NFIA advises that anyone who is interested in buying the flood coverage should contact his regular agent or broker for further assistance and information rates, policy limits and conditions and other important details.

Coverage for Ruidoso, under NFIA, has been in effect since July 28, 1974.

The board voted to accept a lease-purchase bid from Rust Tractor for a grader for the village street department and to the purchase of an additional vehicle radio for use in village vehicles.

A discussion of the financial needs of the volunteer fire de-

partment was held and it was noted that the department has such a small budget that it is having difficulty in operating. It was pointed out that calls for fires outside the village did not legally have to be answered but always were and that many insurance companies would pay a fee, if notified. The suggestion was made that the department attempt some fund raising projects, such as the Bonito fire department.

A report was given by village clerk Jerry Howden on a joint meeting with Ruidoso for Community Development projects, as reported in The News last week.

Several occupational licenses were approved for village businesses. The board has agreed to review each application for the occupational licenses before their issuance.

Neil Chapman presented a plat for a new subdivision, just outside the village limits, for approval with a request also that the property be annexed. Mayor J. J. DiPaolo vacated the chair to Jim Roberts because of his interest in the property and the council approved the plat contingent on the approval of the village planning and zoning commission. No action will be taken on annexation until the plat has been approved by planning and zoning.

The next regular meeting of the board will be held at the village hall at 7 p.m. on Monday, March 10. The meetings are open to the public.

of Capitan, approximately 10 miles to the 7 Cabins exit on Hwy. 48 leading to Roswell.

North Base Road roughly parallels Hwy. 48 on the south boundary of the Block Ranch and ingress and egress routes have been closed off across the ranch, making John Goodwin of the NM Game and Fish Department, said, "access to prime hunting grounds on US Forest Service land" generally difficult for hunters.

Bill Montoya, area G&F officer, noted that "\$4,800 and 16 hours of grader work" would put North Base Road in good enough condition that it wouldn't require four-wheel drive vehicles to traverse it.

Warriors trounce Lake Arthur to meet Jal Friday





New Mexico history

The story of the discovery of New Mexico by the Spaniards, as recounted by Castaneda, starts with Nuno de Guzman, Governor of New Spain, in 1528, who had in his possession an Indian called Tejo, who told of finding feathers for ornaments. They brought back large quantities of gold and silver, and saw seven towns so large they could be compared in size to Mexico

City and its suburbs, and that in them were whole streets occupied by silversmiths. These settlements were to be reached by "traveling northward between the seas", and "across a grassy desert for forty days." Guzman, with four hundred Spaniards and twenty thousand Indians of New Spain set out in December 1529 to find the fabled Seven Cities. He became lost and wandered up the Pacific Coast, returning to Mexico in 1531.

In April 1538, a group of four almost-naked men walked into the village of Culiacan. Their leader, Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Vaca had started out from Spain for Florida in 1527. The expedition met with much misfortune and all its members except de Vaca and a few companions were lost at sea or killed by Indians. They had wandered for several years from the coast of Texas to the Gulf of California,

passing near New Mexico's alleged Seven Cities of Cibola, or Zuni.

The story of de Vaca's experiences was the first definite word to reach Mexico City about the region later to become New Mexico. Antonio de Mendoza sent a small exploring party, with Marcos de Niza as its leader, and Estevan, the Negro who had been with de Vaca as a guide. Friar Marcos set out in March 1539. He sent Estevan on ahead to explore and report back to him. If the country was unusually good, Estevan was to send a cross two hands long; if it was as rich and populous as New Spain, a still larger cross. Four days later an Indian messenger returned with a very large cross — as tall as a man! Marcos pressed forward but did not overtake Estevan, who had reached the Zuni pueblo and was killed there. Friar Marcos did not turn back until 1540, after he had beheld the Zuni pueblo from the top of a nearby mesa. The city was shining in the sunlight and he mistakenly thought it was made of gold. His tale of Cities of Gold lured Coronado's expedition in 1540 — to find only a town of mud houses. The pueblo contained no wealth but an abundance of provisions.

In 1567, Francisco Ibarra led an expedition from the western coast across the mountains to Casas Grandes, in northern Chihuahua near the southwestern border of modern New Mexico. He liked the country so well he described it as "un otro Mexico" or a New Mexico. Following the Rodriguez expedition in 1581, the name was used permanently, appearing in the Gallegos account of that expedition written in 1582.

The first white woman to come to New Mexico was Catalina, wife of Miguel Sanchez Valenciana, a soldier with the Espejo expedition in 1583. The Valencianas had their three small sons with them. Coronado brought the first domestic cattle to New Mexico in 1540. The first cattle drive across New Mexico was in 1850 by Oliver Loving Sr., and his partner Charles Goodnight.

Bruce Griffin — The Man With Music In His Soul

Back through my childhood — far back as I can remember — I listened to the lullabies and one or two original compositions sung by our mother. And also about 50 or so songs sung to us by our father.

These songs were sung to the accompaniment of a little pump organ that has been to Alaska twice, down to Mexico — and is here in the little sun room beside me now.

For a long time I have been wanting to make recordings of some of these songs; because I wonder sometimes if I am the only one who remembers some of them.

Anyhow I asked Bruce Griffin if I could record them on his recording machine, and he said to come up any time.

The other evening, the 18th, Bruce called me up and said he had a "little surprise for me."

So the next day I went up to Bruce's "Castle in the Sky." He had the machine all set up, and he handed me a beautiful guitar.

"Here, Dannie," said Bruce, "I brought this for you from Mexico — a hand-made guitar." Bruce had heard that certain things had happened that had left me without a guitar. I played a few chords on this beautiful instrument and it sent forth a beautiful tone. After giving me lessons on how to run the machine I recorded some songs playing my beautiful new present.

Handing me a little box, Bruce said,

"Dannie, I am giving you a tape here with a few of my songs."

A few! On the list there were thirteen songs.

"You mean to tell me," I asked Bruce, "that there are more songs beside these?"

For years I have been hearing Bruce sing his songs, most notably "Sleep Lincoln Town" with which he used to open the show at The Last to Escape of Billy The Kid in Lincoln. But I did not realize that Bruce had composed so many great songs.

One of his numbers that hits us where we live is "Old Dan" the ballad about a beloved saddle horse.

Another well beloved favorite is "Sage Brush and Sand", a song that would be appreciated by that great lover of the desert, Zane Grey. One of Bruce's fa-

hundredth birthday. The time will pass quickly this year, and our Two Hundredth Anniversary will be here before we are fully aware.

New Mexico history

by Della Hale
(Part III)

The story of the discovery of New Mexico by the Spaniards, as recounted by Castaneda, starts with Nuno de Guzman, Governor of New Spain, in 1528, who had in his possession an Indian called Tejo, who told of going northward with his father to trade feathers for ornaments. They brought back large quantities of gold and silver, and saw seven towns so large they could be compared in size to Mexico

City and its suburbs, and that in them were whole streets occupied by silver mines. These settlements were to be reached by "traveling northward between the seas," and "across a grassy desert for forty days." Guzman, with four hundred Spaniards and twenty thousand Indians of New Spain set out in December 1529 to find the fabled Seven Cities. He became lost and wandered up the Pacific Coast, returning to Mexico in 1531.

In April 1536, a group of four almost-naked men walked into the village of Culiacan. Their leader, Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Vaca had started out from Spain for Florida in 1527. The expedition met with much misfortune and all its members except de Vaca and a few companions were lost at sea or killed by Indians. They had wandered for several years from the coast of Texas to the Gulf of California,

passing near New Mexico's alleged Seven Cities of Cibola, or Zuni.

The story of de Vaca's experiences was the first definite word to reach Mexico City about the region later to become New Mexico. Antonio de Mendoza sent a small exploring party, with Marcos de Niza as its leader, and Estevan, the Negro who had been with de Vaca as a guide. Friar Marcos set out in March 1539. He sent Estevan on ahead to explore and report back to him. If the country was unusually good, Estevan was to send a cross two hands long; if it was as rich and populous as New Spain, a still larger cross. Four days later an Indian messenger returned with a very large cross — as tall as a man. Marcos pressed forward but did not overtake Estevan, who had reached the Zuni pueblo and was killed there. Friar Marcos did not turn back until 1540, after he had beheld the Zuni pueblo from the top of a nearby mesa. The city was shining in the sunlight and he mistakenly thought it was made of gold. His tale of Cities of Gold lured Coronado's expedition in 1540 — to find only a town of mud houses. The pueblo contained no wealth but an abundance of provisions.

In 1567, Francisco Ibarra led an expedition from the western coast across the mountains to Casas Grandes, in northern Chihuahua near the southwestern border of modern New Mexico. He liked the country so well he described it as "un otro Mexico" or a New Mexico. Following the Rodriguez Expedition in 1581, the name was used permanently, appearing in the Gallegos account of that expedition written in 1582.

The first white woman to come to New Mexico was Casilda, wife of Miguel Sanchez Valenciana, a soldier with the Espejo expedition in 1583. The Valencianas had their three small sons with them. Coronado brought the first domestic cattle to New Mexico in 1540. The first cattle drive across New Mexico was in 1850 by Oliver Loving Sr., and his partner Charlie Goodnight.



Your Social Security

A record \$220.4 million was paid out in social security cash benefits to residents of New Mexico in calendar year 1974, according to Mr. Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative.

Of this amount, \$134.1 million went to retired workers and their dependents and \$58.6 million to the survivors of workers who have died. Another \$36.7 million was paid to severely disabled workers and their dependents.

Nationally, social security cash benefit payments in 1974 total-

ed \$58.5 billion. This was about \$7.1 billion higher than in the previous year. About 31 million men, women, and children are receiving monthly social security benefits. This number has increased by over a million during the past year.

Legislation enacted in December, 1973, provided for an 11 percent increase in monthly benefits effective with last June, with 7 percent of this amount payable for March 1974 through May 1974. Benefits will increase automatically in future years if the cost of living continues to go up. The first possi-

able increase in benefits under this provision would be reflected in the July 3, 1974, checks.

"Social security is not only a program for the elderly as 24 percent of all beneficiaries are under age 60, with 15 percent under 22," Lunsford concluded. Mr. Lunsford may be contact-

R. W. Shipe, New Mexico State University Admissions director and chairman of the program's travel committee, said 10 New Mexico colleges and universities are participating in programs being conducted throughout the state.

AQHA tells statistics for equine count

A record eight million horses inhabit this country according to estimates from the American Horse Council in Washington, D. C., and the number is increasing rapidly.

The horse population has more than doubled since 1960. In fact, there are more horses now in the United States than before the birth of the automobile, when horses were used as a primary source of transportation and power.

Again from American Horse Council estimates, equine events drew over 105 million spectators in 1973. And in a 1970 survey, sixty percent of all horse-owning families made less than \$9000 annual income.

Part of the growth is explained in an announcement from the U. S. Extension Service, which administers the nation's 4-H program. At the end of 1974, 320,767 4-H members were enrolled in horse projects, compared to 160,846 in beef cattle and 106,526 in swine. This compares to 30,000 horse projects 15 years earlier.

The 12 largest breed organizations recorded 36 percent more horses in 1973 than in 1960.

Don Jones, Executive Secretary of the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA), the world's largest and fastest growing equine registry, explains the growth in this way. "Many people are searching for sources of recreation, an 'escape' from the everyday routine, or perhaps a new business venture. Our society has a great deal of affluence and leisure time to offer the individual, and, likewise he desires to get away from the hustle and bustle of the modern, mechanized world. This outlet, more than ever before we are pleased to say, is becoming the horse."

Growth in the American Quarter Horse Association is exemplary of all breeds of horses. AQHA year-end figures illustrate the phenomenon.

On November 8, 1974, the AQHA officially registered one million American Quarter Horses, which is quite a feat for an association only 34 years old. The AQHA closed out the year with 1,038,559 horses recorded in the Stud Book, registering 76,559 new animals in 1974 alone at the headquarters office in Amarillo, Texas.

Transfer of ownership, considered as the barometer of any industry, also reached a new

high in 1974, with 153,286 American Quarter Horses changing hands.

A total of 51 foreign countries have imported the American Quarter Horse, but a large percentage of them are being purchased by people in the upper midwest and along the Eastern seaboard. Thus, the American Quarter Horse is returning once again to the place of its origin. For it was in the early 1600's, in the Carolina and Virginia colonies, that settlers developed this animal, by crossing horses brought from England with those left in America by the Spanish Explorers. These animals, known as "Quarter Fathers" were raced against each other by the colonists at distances up to a quarter of a mile.

Now racing has grown in this country to become the number one spectator sport. During 1974, Quarter Horses competed for over \$18 million in purses at over 100 tracks throughout the United States. Pari-mutuel wagering on Quarter Horse races was an astounding \$173 million, up nearly \$10 million from the previous year.

Equally popular in the Quarter Horse industry are approved shows and performance events for both youth and adults. Over 3000 of them were held in 1974 and 500,000 entries participated. While the parent AQHA has a membership of over 75,000, the American Junior Quarter Horse Association lists 5700 members.

Surprised? Statistics don't lie, so don't be shocked if a son or daughter soon poses the question, "Can I get a horse?"

Yes, horses are big business these days. Not even Henry Ford could overcome man's love and devotion to the horse. Perhaps it's only fitting that the Model T's engine, and all subsequent auto's thereafter, were measured in horsepower!

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE PUBLIC FROM HENRY BLOCK OF H&R BLOCK REGARDING INCOME TAX REBATES.

Following the announcement of President Ford's proposed income tax rebate plan for individuals, I recommended an alternate plan to both the President and Congressional leaders. I believe my plan is more equitable and would maximize the economic impact. Here's how I compare the two plans:

While the relationship between the English and the Americans was deteriorating rapidly, the opposite seems to be true in New Mexico. Spanish settlers in the region seemed fairly content with the Spanish authorities. Apparently, Governor Mendinueta was doing as good a job as could be expected with his limited resources. Letters to the governor from Viceroy Bucarell in Mexico praised Mendinueta for his loyalty and his diligence in protecting the province from the raids of Native Americans.

The Viceroy understood that conditions in New Mexico were far from ideal and that the governor worked under serious handicaps. Therefore, he was pleased generally with conditions in New Mexico. Bucarell told Mendinueta in February 1775, "I repeat to your lordship that I have confidence in your well-taken and suitable measures for the remedy of the difficulties which afflict the province, as I have indicated to the king." Certainly, the situation in New England was much different from that in New Spain.

N. Mex. Health Day termed successful

Representatives from Ruidoso and approximately 40 other communities from around the state helped make the first New Mexico Health Day at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine a "resounding success."

Four Lincoln County 4H members will be Legislative pages at the New Mexico State Legislature this week. They are Terrie Webb, Patricia Tully, Tammy Tadlock and Carlos Pacheco. They will serve at Committee meetings as well as the Legislative session. They are sponsored by Representative John Bigbee, Maurice Hobson and Senator John Conway.

While at the session they will observe first hand the way bills are started, amended by committees and presented to the Legislature. Accompanying the group will be Ralph R. Dunlap and Mary Ellen Payne.

Douglas Bryant, Extension Horticulturist, reviewed a new approach to frost prevention in fruit trees for the Hondo Valley growers at a meeting at Tinnie recently. He cited the results of work in Utah where they sprinkled trees in the spring after the tree had completed its rest period. Sprinklers were used in 1974 from April 4, until late April when the other trees started blooming. They were able to delay the bloom for two weeks and could have delayed it longer if they had continued sprinkling. The trees are sprinkled when the daytime temperature gets above 45° F., and continued as long as the temperature remains above 45° F. Evaporation from the fruit buds keeps them dormant until the main frost period is past.

They found that in Utah the fruit ripening was delayed for about a week or half the time the blooms were delayed. Douglas Bryant suggested that fruit growers try sprinkling a few trees this year and see how it works.

Every small town in New Mexico won't have all of the doctors, nurses and other health personnel they need as a result of the Feb. 23 get-together, but a lot of new communication has been established between future health professionals and the communities. The students told the area representatives what they are looking for in a place to live and practice. The communities responded with descriptions of what they have to offer, and graphic illustrations of their very real needs for health care.

In panel discussions, students pointed out some of the problems: their educations in larger towns with facilities they and their spouses have become accustomed to, their apprehension about trying to be the town's only physician, and the satisfaction of their families. The community representatives were adamant in pointing out the needs of their communities: physicians who are limiting their practice because they are so overworked, older physicians who are retiring, and ratios of one doctor to 3,000 residents instead of the national goal of one per 1,000 people. The communities offered guaranteed salaries, free clinic facilities, and even the possibility of paying for a student's education, especially in family medicine, if he would pledge to practice in their community. Communities were urged to invite medical students, and especially members of the UNM house staff, to come with their families for several days or a week visit to a community

of 3/8 blood wool. If a lot of wool has a mixture of several grades of wool, the buyer is likely to make a low bid. He will presume that the entire lot is mixed and require the extra cost of grading and have too many of the coarser fleeces. In a basically fine wool herd, the grower needs to separate the very short fleeces, yellow fleeces and the occasional coarse fleece so that the major part of the clip will be uniform. A few bags of wool in an off sort lot can make the entire clip look better.

This can be done by sorting these sheep out prior to shearing or sorting the fleeces on the shearing floor. A uniform lot of wool, no matter the grade, always gets a better price than a mixed lot.

Some figures recently released through Harold Rannels' office make interesting (and disgusting) reading. You will be pleased to hear that the top ten spenders of the record deficit of \$52 billion are (wouldn't you know) the Department of Health, Education and Welfare with a whopping \$18.4 billion (there must not be over ten of us left in this country working), followed by the Department of Defense, \$9.7 billion; the Treasury Department, \$4.4 billion; Justice Department, \$2.6 billion; Veterans Administration, \$1.6 billion; Department of Transportation, \$1.0 billion; Department of Agriculture, \$9.7 billion; Department of Housing and Urban Development, \$7 billion; Presidential agencies, \$8.6 billion; and Energy Research & Development Administration, \$3.8 billion.

Another pleasant note in the picture is that the \$52 billion indebtedness is a conservative figure and that the increase in the national debt could run as high as \$70 billion.

Those receiving Social Security will be pleased to note that the Social Security program is lumped with federal retirement, unemployment and public assistance. Funny, but I had always thought that we citizens had paid into Social Security for our future retirement and that the money was to be used only for that purpose. Now we find that these funds have been spent by our elected officials and must be paid from funds now being received. THAT builds confidence?

Rannels states that, even if Congress failed to authorize a single penny this year in new funding authority, the executive branch would have \$493.9 billion in the pipeline that could be spent without further Congressional permission. 

Inside The Capital

SANTA FE — Rep. Von Rue Crawford, R-Hidalgo-Luna, opposes general branch banking introduced by Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas.

Rep. Crawford opposes legalized gambling proposed by county option by Rep. Bobby Duran, D-Taos. Crawford is on the House Taxation-Revenue Committee considering tax relief bills and tabling them for action after the state's money condition is known.

Rep. Crawford proposed an increase in the fresh meat dealer's license fee from \$2.50 to a \$10 maximum. He says the New Mexico Livestock Board will actually set the fee at \$7.50. The fee-setting bill will be reviewed Wednesday by a House committee.

Crawford sponsored a bill allowing placing of a special county road maintenance tax of one cent per linear foot on 55,000 subdivision sites in Luna County in the same statement with the property tax bill. The average of the special tax is \$1.12 a lot.

Sen. Odis Echols, D-Clovis, proposed \$100,000 for a port of entry at Texico. The bill was in the Senate Finance Committee. Sen. I. M. Smalley, D-Luna-

Hidalgo-Sierra, proposed \$20,000 for Williamsburg State Park. The bill was also in the Finance Committee.

Rep. Duran's proposed legalized gambling constitutional amendment would provide revenue for education and local government needs. County local option elections would be held. Elections could not be held more than once every five years. The legislature would provide by law for the regulation and taxation of gambling.

Smalley, Senate president pro tem, proposed a 27 per cent boost in the oil and gas severance tax from 3.75 to 4.75 per cent of taxable value of products. The bill was in the Senate Finance Committee.

Sen. Echols introduced a water research, conservation and development act. Echols said the bill "is meant to provide means to seek solutions to New Mexico's most serious problem, water shortages."

Sponsored by Sen. Kenneth Schlientz, R-Curry-Quay, a witness immunity act cleared the Senate 25-15. Schlientz called the bill a tool to help to curb crime in New Mexico.

Rep. John Hays, D-Clovis, introduced a bill to help troubled cattlemen. An existing mortgage would be eligible for a loan to the maximum amount of the mortgage without the mortgagee redrawing laborious paper work. The bill is in the House Corporations-Banks Committee headed by Rep. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen.

Rep. Hays also proposed a special license for motorcycle

operators. Hays says: "This would be a third class of license because the energy crisis and gasoline prices have pushed motorcycle prices so very high." The Motor Vehicle Dept. would set license fees. The bill is in the House Transportation Committee. Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, is on the HTC.

Another Hays bill seeks to overturn a writ of mandamus issued by District Judge Joe Angel in a Clovis case against Dist. Atty. Fred Hensley, Asst. Dist. Atty. David Bonem and Clovis Police Chief Nelson Worley involving Public Defender Chet Walter. The issue is over public defender contact with prisoners held in jail.

House GOP Leader Hoyt Pattison, Curry-Lea-Roosevelt, opposes general branch banking and legalized gambling. Pattison said the funding level set by the House Appropriations-Finance Committee for the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission "is too low."

Rep. Pattison said all of the General Appropriations Act "needs to be given a real close look in open hearings." Pattison sponsored a bill adding four public members to the State Water Quality Control Commission. Pattison said several bills were being pushed by House Republicans "to promote good legislation."

Pattison said: "The purpose is to unite behind good bills introduced by Republicans or Democrats. This is better than making a partisan issue out of something that really needs to become law."

Rep. Luna opposes legalized gambling. Luna said of his general branch banking bill: "There is a lot of support for it. But we may just let it die in committee." Rep. Luna introduced a bill for Gov. Jerry Apodaca for \$15 million in public schools capital improvements. Luna is sponsor of a bill for \$1,575,000 in capital improvements at Los Lunas Hospital and Training School.

Sen. Ray Leger, D-Guadalupe-DeBaca-San Miguel, and Sen. C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, co-sponsored a bill removing language from a 1974 law saying disbursement of state funds is contingent on use of federal funds for construction of Montezuma Veterans' Home. Sen. Leger voted against general branch banking previously. Leger has no strong feelings on legalized gambling but says: "It might be a good idea to let the people go ahead and vote on it so we can get a feeling for it."

Rep. Dan Berry, D-Eunice, introduced a bill banning compensation for public school employees while they serve in legislative sessions. Berry co-sponsored a bill by Rep. John Bigbee reinstating property tax ceiling.




