## MAYOR DAVIS BLASTS HUD ON GRANT DENIAL

# Trustees OK wage study

The Village Council Mar. 27 authorized village manager Jim Hine to submit a tentative salary adjustment schedule for all village employees, for consideration prior to submitting the preliminary budget to the Local Government Division at Santa Fe, May 1.

Employee turnover for higher salaries, Hine noted, is

especially prevalent among those who are trained at village expense and whose jobs require skill and accuracy in their performance.

Examples of projected salaries to be studied by the trustees include: secretary, bookkeeper, billing clerk, cashier, begin at \$425 with \$600 in five years; crew chief, mechanic's helper, meter reader, begin at \$475 with \$625 in five years; a PD secretary would go from \$425 to \$550 with a patrolman from \$550 to \$750 in the five year period; in the same five years a fireman would go from \$475 to \$625 and an electrician from \$550 to \$700.

"These salary increases will be based strictly on merit," Hine said.

The funding of the new wage scale, Hine said, "is feasible and if the employee justifies the increased salary by becoming more efficient, then the raise will benefit everyone. Under the proposed scale, we can replace certain employees if it becomes necessary."

To implement Hine's suggestions, trustee Don Riley moved "to accept the proposed salary schedules, as submitted, and that every effort be made by the council to include them in next year's budget." The motion passed unanimously.

The denial by HUD of Dallas of community development grants for needed improvements in Ruidoso, after the preliminary applications had been submitted in accordance with Southeastern NM Econo-

mic Development District personnel, under established guidelines, was protested by Mayor Lloyd David Jr.

Mayor Davis, with the council's unanimous approval, instructed village manager Hine to write a letter to "Four Corners, or whatever it is, to SNMEDD in Roswell, HUD in Dallas and to our U. S. Senators and Representatives" taking exception to HUD's action, "after they asked us to submit applications."

"This is a bunch of BS to put out," Davis said. "They (Community Development Grants) were screaming and moaning for applications and I want all of those people to know that we'll stand for no more of that until they have something to offer."

In other action, the council: — Rejected all bids received for the operation and maintenance of the Sanitary Land Fill. Hine noted, "The Village can save an estimated \$9,000 over the present system, if it is operated by the Village."

— Was told by George Shoemaker and John Payne that there is a move underway to put the minimum runway length of the proposed new airport at a minimum of 10,400 feet to accommodate 727's and DC 9's, instead of an initial length of 8,600 feet to 9,600 feet that would handle only business jets - with from six to eight passengers. Site selection, they said, is tentatively set for late in April or early May.

— Authorized village attorney John Thompson, administrative assistant Frank Potter and air port manager Tim Morris, to make a study of ordinances to govern the operation of the Ruidoso Municipal Air Port. "We must put the airport in shape to pay its own way," Payne said. "The village must get control of the hangar," Shoemaker said. Trustee Riley moved, "Whoever is renting the large hangar at the air port should be given notice, in whatever time is involved, to evacuate." The motion passed unanimously.

— Discussed Alpine Aviation's use of the hangar and heard a proposal from Virgil Hemphill of Blackhill Charter

Service of Alamogordo, pertaining to providing charter air service here.

— Authorized village engineer Jack Kannady Sr., to survey the area behind the Evening Lions Hut so that a picnic and general use area could be defined.

— Authorized a call for bids to re-cover the roof of the swimming pool, and ordered village inspector Chuck Brown to draw up the specifications.

— Registered a "no objection" vote to the proposal that the Noisy Water's liquor license be transferred to the Featherstone Steak House, to be located on Sudderth Drive, as long as the new business meets all zoning and parking regulations.

— Received the report from Animal Control Officer Jim Rowin that he captured 73 animals, impounded 56, had 15 claimed or adopted, received 10 animal calls and that 171 animal days were handled for him by the Humane Society between March 1 and 26.

— Authorized a letter of support for the expansion of Highway 70 between Las Cruces and Amarillo, after the request of such an endorsement was made by Chamber of Commerce manager Richard Cothrun.

— Accepted a letter of resignation from Ruidoso PD Lt. Jerry Foster.

## Ski-Tee on again

Ski-Tee, the annual benefit ski-golf competition to help finance the junior ski racers of Ruidoso, is scheduled to kick off Friday, after being cancelled last week end when 18 inches of snow blanketed Cree Meadows Country Club.

All events, including the fun flight that is new this year, will run as previously scheduled, with practice sessions on both categories underway today, skiing competition Saturday and golf matches Sunday.

Trophies, including championship and B flight, will be awarded Sunday afternoon following the golf finals.

## Area man killed in highway crash

A Roswell man, Larry G. Fairbanks, 44, was killed early Friday morning in a semi-truck car collision .3 of a mile inside the Lincoln County line on Highway 70.

Clarence E. Robertson of Amarillo, Tex., was driving the trailer rig, which was towing, NMSP officer P. J. Darden said, "a pup". The truck, while attempting to pass another vehicle, fishtailed on the snow packed road, Darden

said, "then jack-knifed into the path of the Fairbanks' vehicle."

Treated at Ruidoso Valley General Hospital following the 6:55 a. m. accident were Mrs. Fairbanks (Maureen) and her three children, Michael, for a broken left leg, Margaret and David, after which all four were transferred to a Roswell hospital, in care of their family physician.

## Ruidoso Day set at Sunland Park



## Ruidoso's precipitation averages 21.70 per year

Annual precipitation recorded at Ruidoso's Municipal Airport has averaged 21.70 inches from June of 1945 through February of 1975, according to figures released by Earl Biann of the USDA Forest Service.

**New Mexico History**

In the beginning, the crowd of emigrants, stricken with "western fever," generally used covered wagons, but as time went on, the means of transportation changed to stage coaches.

The gold excitement in California brought to a head what had been going on for some twenty years. The history of transportation in New Mexico extends back into antiquity when goods were carried on human backs. Still later, the dog became the beast of burden. After Coronado's conquest, the horse, mule and burro were introduced. Then came the pack train, later the carreta, with solid wooden wheels and ox timbrils (huge two wheeled carts).

In 1858, the stage line to the Pacific Coast from St. Louis to San Francisco was established on a schedule of twenty-five days each way, with a system of stations and relays. The company brought the stage through on schedule but three times in its history.

On November 30, 1878, the first track of the Santa Fe railroad was laid into New Mexico, crossing the state line in the Raton Mountains. On July 1, 1879, the tracks were laid into Las Vegas, from there to Santa Fe in 1880 and into Albuquerque April 22, 1880. Almost simultaneously with the building of the Santa Fe, the Denver and Rio

In 1889, the Pecos Valley irrigation system with artesian wells was operating.

In 1875, the first barbed wire was sold in New Mexico.

In 1889, the University of Albuquerque, a College of Agriculture at Mesilla Park, and the School of Mines at Socorro were provided for by the Legislature. Las Vegas Normal opened in 1897, and New Mexico Military Institute in 1898. (to be continued)

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
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
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

last day of March. The wind is blowing down the vale, cool off the snowy mountain. A typical March day. And yet little signs are everywhere for the arrival of April.

The little tame cottontail rabbit and the chipmunk, and three robins are out drinking at the metate at the west of the yard, in the long evening shadows. The little rabbit has been lonesome in the snow and seems happy with his company.



### Social security number verification

The Internal Revenue Service in cooperation with the Social Security Administration is making a nationwide effort to correct and update some Social Security number files for income tax purposes.

Mr. William B. Orr, IRS District Director for New Mexico, indicated that the IRS will send questionnaires to New Mexico residents if a spouse's social security number is not shown on the income tax return or the number does not agree with the name on the agency's records.

Updating of the Social Security files will help ensure that spouses receive credit for making estimated and other tax payments, and for having filed a tax return.

"Although a taxpayer may receive a questionnaire," Mr. Orr said, "it will not slow processing of the return or delay any refund due. We are simply trying to validate all social security numbers which are used to identify tax accounts."

Many name-number mismatches occur because women who obtained social security numbers before marriage did not report the change from their maiden to married names to the Social Security Administration but used their married names on tax returns.

Recipients should not attach social security cards or other official documents to validate the information submitted on questionnaires.

"By providing the information requested on the questionnaire," Mr. Orr said, "taxpayers and their spouses can also avoid potential problems at a later date when they apply for social security benefits."

## Landfill closure noted by EPA

At this time the Environmental Improvement Agency has taken what steps it can to close the sanitary landfill located just east of Ruidoso Downs. According to the contract drawn up between McCarty Construction Company and the Villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, the landfill will be covered properly before being abandoned.

Any person caught dumping in the area of the old landfill hereafter will be prosecuted.

The new sanitary landfill is located on state land just north of Ruidoso off Gavilan Canyon Road. Since it is located on state land, it will be operated and maintained as a sanitary landfill should be. If it is not operated in a correct manner, the State Land Office and the E. I. A. will terminate the site.

After July 1, 1975, the E. I. A. will have stricter regulations controlling the operation of sanitary landfills throughout the state. This will be a big help in controlling the problems involving solid waste.

We do appreciate the concerns shown by the citizens of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs of how a sanitary landfill should be maintained. Much helpful information has been passed on to us because of your interest.

The E. I. A. and the Villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs would appreciate everyone's cooperation in making the new sanitary landfill a success. With positive attitudes and willingness to cooperate with your civic government and each other, we can make this Sanitary Landfill one to brag about, not be ashamed of.

**High blood pressure; control pays off**

Controlling high blood pressure is a lifetime job. If you work it right, it can earn you a longer life.

W. Sterling Edwards, M. D., President of the New Mexico Heart Association, emphasized the importance of identifying and controlling high blood pressure as a means of reducing the risk of heart attack and stroke.

"High blood pressure," he said, "can take years off your life. It's a disease within a disease, and is a contributing factor in 500,000 of the more than 600,000 deaths in this country each year from heart attack and stroke. That's why its control is so important."

The very nature of the disease doctors sometimes call hypertension makes it essential that patients get regular blood pressure tests and follow their doctor's advice to control it.

Dr. Edwards pointed out that high blood pressure is a silent disease because there are no usual symptoms — you can have it and still feel healthy. And that it is a mysterious disease because, in 90 per cent of the cases, doctors don't know the cause.

"But that doesn't mean you should worry unnecessarily," he said. "It can easily be detected through an inexpensive and painless medical examination. And once diagnosed, it can usually be controlled with your cooperation."

Dr. Edwards emphasized that there is "no room for apathy where high blood pressure is concerned." And he cites facts and figures to prove his point:

"High blood pressure, among other things, is a major contributor to two of the nation's major killers, heart attack and stroke. And it also plays a significant role in heart and kidney failure. It's a pervasive disease. Of the 23 million Americans who have high blood pressure, at least half don't know it. And half of these aren't being treated adequately or at all."

He noted that in 1975 alone, heart and blood vessel diseases will kill more than a million Americans. That's a 52 per cent of deaths from all causes in the U. S.

But Dr. Edwards reported that local Heart Association, in cooperation with the American Heart Association, conduct screening programs to find hidden hypertensives.

**US Army says "Glad you asked"**

Secretary of the Army Howard H. Callaway has urged the Army-wide adoption of his "Glad You Asked" communications policy. Local Army representative Phyllis Durose explained that the policy is based on "communication pride, candor and openness in responding to all inquiries."

The "Glad You Asked" policy acknowledges that the Army serves, that it requires the continued support of the people it services, that the people have a right to know how the Army spends tax dollars, and that "we will deserve their support only as long as our personal and institutional integrity is flawless," Secretary Callaway said.

Durose observed that Secretary Callaway believes adherence to his policy does not mean the Army must discount its past record as incorrect. On the contrary, he said, the policy encourages the Army to apply the lessons of past experience to improve current efforts.

Secretary Callaway stated that in the decision-making process there usually is a choice between several basically correct courses of action.

"I believe there are alternatives to brownouts and blackouts, and alternatives to homes without heat and factories without power. I believe there are alternatives to foreign domination of our major energy resource, and alternatives to broad-scale social and economic disruptions. And I believe these alternatives need not be at the expense of a livable world. To the contrary, I believe they may insure a livable world for the future." — Mr. Wayne E. Aspinall, former U. S. Representative from Colorado.

formation on heart disease. Dr. Edwards suggested that interested persons wishing material call the Heart Association at 256-7335.

"We want to help you help your heart," Dr. Edwards said. "One way is to find out if you have high blood pressure. If you do, get it down and keep it at a safe level. Another is to help your Heart Association with a generous contribution."

"We select the course we believe is best for the Army and the country, and 99 times out of a 100 it will be the right choice," the Secretary said. "If in the 100th we err, 'Glad You Asked' permits us to cover up, no weasel-worded denial, nor any hesitancy to say, 'We goofed but want to make it right.'"

**Shop Early For Army Jobs**

High School seniors who are considering joining the Army and making a choice of career or job training schools are urged by local Army representative Doug East to start looking now for next summer's post-graduation job.

East said the volunteer Army has been so successful in reaching its recent manpower goals that it is not always able to satisfy a job choice in more popular occupational fields, except under the Delayed Entry Program which allows advanced job reservations.

"Many high school seniors are enlisting now in the Army, guaranteeing the training of their choice, while not actually entering into active duty until say June, July or August of this year," East continued.

He pointed out that all Army enlistees are on a "first come, first served" reservation basis for job training schools. As graduation time nears, spaces for the more popular Army schools are filled up.

East advises those seniors who may be interested in an Army job after they graduate to start the application process soon at the local Army recruiting office located at 310 1/2

N. Richardson, Roswell, New Mexico.

Because of widespread unemployment in civilian jobs, East believes 1975 will be a particularly competitive year for many Army jobs.

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
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

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

**More insect damage predicted in forest**

Forest Service scientists are predicting heavy tree losses from insects in the forests of Arizona and New Mexico this year as an effect of severe drought during the first half of 1974, but no new massive outbreaks are anticipated.

A year-end report by the insect and disease management office, Forest Service, Southwestern Region, said drought-killed and weakened ponderosa pines on National Forests and other forested lands triggered scattered bark beetle infestations. The beetle damage in 1975 is expected to equal that of last year and possibly exceed it in some localized areas.

The report said populations of the western pine beetle and the pine engraver beetle occurred on the Apache-Sitgreaves, Prescott and Tonto National Forests in Arizona and on the Cibola and Lincoln National Forests in New Mexico. The roundheaded pine beetle caused scattered mortality of pole sized ponderosa on the Lincoln National Forest and on the adjoining Mescalero Apache Reservation. Further tree mortality was

caused by the mountain pine beetle in the ponderosa pine stands of the Kaibab Plateau in Arizona.

The western spruce budworm caused localized defoliation of Douglas-fir in the northern forests of Arizona and New Mexico, but only light defoliation was forecast for this year. The Douglas-fir tussock moth defoliation of ornamental spruce, white fir and Douglas-fir increased in Santa Fe, Los Alamos and Ruidoso, New Mexico in 1974.

The report also announced that pollution survey plots set up to monitor sulfur dioxide damage to forest vegetation were reduced from 47 to 7 after studies showed no apparent widespread pollution damage in New Mexico or Arizona. The seven remaining plots are near major sources of sulfur dioxide where some damage has been observed in the past.

If every taxpayer paid only an annual income tax, and sat down once a year to write a single check for his total bill, the effect of staring at that huge sum would be galvanizing. Might even start a revolution.

Most taxpayers in New Mexico do not seem to realize that our sales tax is actually a "gross receipts tax" and not a transaction tax at all. The person or firm which takes in the money must pay a 4% tax on its total receipts, period. The state doesn't care where the person or firm gets the money. The tax need not be passed on to the consumer, and the consumer does not have to pay it. It is only by common agreement that the tax generally is added to the price rather than being figured into the original price. — The New Mexico Independent, Albuquerque.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca has advanced a philosophy which we commend to every public official in the state and members of the news media as well.

The chief executive says the news media and persons in political office must maintain adversary roles for the public interest.

It is possible to be in adversary roles and still be friends, he believes. "God forbid the day both should be on the same team. The real loser is going to be the citizens," Apodaca says.

And properly, he adds: "The media should be fair, honest and objective."

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

Since I do not have any hope of traveling to foreign countries, I try to journey to them in books. I came across one of my granddaughter's books on Africa, "Cry, the Beloved Country," by Alan Paton, that astounded me and held me spellbound until it was finished. Not because it is so different from our country, but because it is very much like it. They had, and I suppose still have, the same problems we have: racial, economic, political and crime.

When this book was published in 1959, South Africa had a population of about 15,000,000. Three million are white, 1 1/2 million are colored (mixed), and the rest are Africans or natives (no one knows how many). This was truly South Africa.

The author himself, was born on the east coast of Natal. His father, a Scot, went out to South Africa as a civil servant just before the Boer War. His mother was of English stock but was third generation South African. Paton's schooling was South African, and it was the life he lived, taught and wrote about that prepared him to write the book about his passionately beloved country.

He had a reverence for the soil as well as the people. These are his words:

"Stand unshod upon it, for the ground is holy, being as it came from the Creator. Keep it, guard it, care for it, for it keeps men, guards men, cares for men. Destroy it and man is destroyed. And this is one of our problems, as it is in our country. The rich live on the best land and the poor inhabit the poor soil. Women scratch the soil that is left, and the maize hardly reaches their height. There are old men and old women of mothers and children. The men are away, the young men and the young girls are away. The soil cannot keep them any more."

This is a moving story of the lost and disbanded tribes of natives; and a personal search for a beloved son and other relatives, that have left their homes (or huts) in search of the bright and wealthy city; for Johannesburg is one of the richest cities in all of Africa. Rich because of gold and diamonds. The glitter of the city entices the young natives and many become corrupt with the white man's way.

One cannot help but drop a tear when the son is found, to be lost forever, bringing great sorrow to the father.

Quoting the author's last paragraph in parts:

"Yes, it is dawn that has come

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

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### ANTI-SLAVERY ACTIVITY

Two hundred years ago this week the American colonies were only a short step away from the beginning of war with Great Britain. However, other events were also occurring that would have far-ranging implications.

For some people to proclaim that their rights were being infringed upon by the British, a serious contradiction appeared in their thinking. Most colonial Americans were concerned only about the rights of white people. Yet, at the same time, there were approximately one-half million black slaves (not counting a considerable number of free blacks) in America compared to approximately four million whites. By and large, the rights of this significant portion of the population were ignored. There were some, however, who were concerned. Thomas Paine, who would later gain much fame, published his first article in 1775 in a Philadelphia newspaper. Entitled "African Slavery," it denounced slavery, demanded its abolition, and suggested that blacks be given land and economic opportunity.


On April 14, 1775, the first abolition society in America, "The Society for the Relief of Free Negroes Unlawfully Held in Bondage," was established in Philadelphia by Benjamin Franklin and Benjamin Rush. Although this was the first formal organization, anti-slavery activity in the colonies dated from a much earlier time. Almost from their first arrival in the colonies, Quakers had been actively engaged in fighting the institution.

Among some, at least, the revolutionary rhetoric being used all over the colonies seemed totally inconsistent if it were not meant to apply to all Americans.

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cans, whatever their color. As the Revolution continued and independence became more of a reality, several of the northern states did make their actions consistent with their philosophy by abolishing slavery. More will be said about this later.

In the meantime, in the Spanish province of New Mexico, the government was concerned about the souls of the native inhabitants. Some critics may say that they were treated similar to the slaves in the English colonies; but even if they were, there was more official concern about their spiritual well-being.

For example, the missionary at the pueblo of Zuni in 1775 was Fray Silvestre Velez de Escalante, one of the most devout and tireless workers among the Franciscan order. In early May, Governor Mendinueta reported to Viceroy Bucarell in Mexico City that Fray Escalante had brought into the faith two Navajo families totalling some thirteen persons. They had also been established as residents of Zuni. Mendinueta was so pleased that he stated to Bucarell: "May God move the rest of this nation to follow this good example . . ."
