The hearing is required by the Federal Highway Administration as part of preparation of an environmental impact statement. After the hearing the SHD will submit a report on the meeting and an environmental impact statement to the federal agency.

Championship Indian dancing at Mescalero June 20-22

Plans for the Mescalero-Ruidoso All American Championship Indian Dances, to be held June 20-22 at the Mescalero Apache Ceremonial and Rodeo Grounds, were finalized at a Tuesday committee meeting.

The purse of \$10,000 is the largest ever offered for championship Indian contest dancing and entries have been arriving from tribal dancers from across the nation, the committee reports.

A highlight of the three day celebration will be the Memorial Princess Contest being sponsored by the Sadie Duffy family. Entry blanks, with contestants to be between 15 and 18 years of age and at least one-quarter Indian blood, are available through the Mescalero-Ruidoso Executive Committee, PO Box 698, Ruidoso.

An added attraction will be the Indian crafts and art booths and exhibitions on the ceremonial grounds. Exhibitors must obtain written confirmation from the Executive Committee, as above, to be allowed a display booth. All exhibitors must be at least one-fourth Indian blood. The number of booths has been limited to 60 with 40 for tribal use and 20 designated as commercial.

CONTEST DANCING will include Men's Northern and Southern Style Fancy, Men's Straight, Ladies' Northern Shawl, Ladies' Southern Clot; Dress, Ladies' Northern and Southern Buckskin and a Junior Division for boys and girls. The emcee will be Edgar Monetatche, a Comanche Indian from Lawton, Okla.

Special events will include flag raising and color guard ceremonies, full costume grand entries and religious services.

Of particular interest to visitors will be the tepee village that will be located near the dancing site.

THE MANDAREE SINGERS of North Dakota, an outstanding drum group that has gained renown throughout the northern tier or states and across Canada, will be performing throughout the ceremonial.

This group's proud heritage stems back to their grandfather, Young Bear, a member of the Hidatsa Tribe of the Three Affiliated Tribes of Fort Berthold Reservation, who was noted for his singing ability.

These artists perform the traditional grass dance as well as the contemporary songs typical of the culture of the plains Indians.

The Grass Dance stems from ancient times when young warrior-age men carried a wad of very dry grass and flint in a bag suspended from their waist, to use for fire making, especially when they were on adventure and exploratory trips. These warriors were recognized as members of the Grass Society.

The Hidatsa Tribe, more than 100 years ago, adopted the dance from the Santee Sioux; called the Tail Feather Ceremonial Dance by the Sioux. After the Hidatsas started performing this dance the Grass Society emerged and the songs used became known as Grass Dance songs.

The Grass Dance is the dominant dance among the northern plains Indians and is often called, in some areas, a War Dance, which the Hidatsas say was the work of an archaeologist. The ceremonial portion of the dance is no longer performed and, though it is not intended to entertain viewers, it does give them an opportunity to watch the individual dancers express themselves. It is in providing music for this dance that the

Mandaree Singers have become famous.

The Mandaree Singers are instrumental in polishing, perfecting and adding to the art of Indian singing. The songs they have created, patterned after the old traditional songs, are used by other singing groups throughout the northern plains.

THE HEAD SINGER for this outstanding ceremonial will be Ralph Kotay, a Kiowa Indian, of Apache, Okla., who

will be accompanied by his group of singers.

Kotay, a head singer for more than 20 years, has been a featured performer at all of the major Indian ceremonials in Oklahoma and in addition has appeared in Pow Wows at Dallas, Tex., Wichita, Kansas, Window Rock and Scottsdale, Ariz., and received the accolade of being invited to appear at a Washington, D. C., Pow Wow.

Bids for athletic equipment were opened and given to the athletic department for their recommendations with further action slated at the next meeting.

Calls for bids were issued for the Building Trades House and fencing material for the baseball diamond at White Mountain School. Bids on the house will be opened at the

Red River is adopting Ruidoso C-C operation

The village of Red River, following a presentation to the village council by Richard Cothrun, manager of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, will soon employ a full time manager for their C-C.

Cothrun, who was invited to appear before the council by the motel and hotel owners of Red River, explained the details of a full time chamber operation and also the methods employed in handling C-C promotions in Ruidoso.

"After I'd answered their questions, and they had plenty of them," Cothrun said, "the village dads voted to earmark \$15,000 in Lodger's Tax and \$12,500 in village funds to establish a functional C-C office."

Red River, Cothrun said, offers skiing as a tourist attraction and also "has everything Ruidoso and area has during the summer, except horse racing."

At the present the C-C in Red River is being operated by an executive secretary.

"The local skiing season will end Sunday," Cothrun said,

"and with it, the Ski-Pak promotion ceases for this year. It will be appreciated if every business establishment holding Ski-Pak tickets will turn them into the Chamber office before 5 p. m., April 11, that our final accounting may be made."

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New Mexico History

Lawlessness in New Mexico during the period from the Civil War until the turn of the century was unparalleled in the history of the United States. It was an era when stealing, killing and lynching were so common as to be hardly worthy of mention in the press. Such an extensive collapse of law and order must be attributed principally to the lack of civil authority. New Mexico was an orphan among the nation's territories and not considered worth defending. Men came who chafed under restrictions of a more civilized area. These men were frequently misfits who were seeking a new opportunity to make their mark regardless of the legality and methods used. The quest for law and order was a long and tedious one in almost every community in the territory. Frequently lawlessness was just common murder and political assassination. One such example was the slaying, at the La Fonda, of John P. Slough, Chief Justice of the Territorial

Supreme Court, in 1867 by William L. Ryerson.

The Colfax war was a controversy over the Maxwell Land Grant. Dona Ana had her full share of lawlessness, and we all know of the infamous Lincoln County War. There were such legendary gunmen as Joe Fowler, Clay Allison, Black Jack Ketchum and those who became folk heroes such as Ellego Baca, second only to Billy the Kid.

Lincoln County lawlessness was due to a new element, drifting into the Pecos Valley from the south and east, composed of restless cattlemen from western Texas, accompanied by the usual quota of hard characters.

Colfax county became the favorite retreat for the criminal element drifting in from southeastern Colorado.

Dona Ana, in the southwest, received her full share of the same type population. One of the Dona Ana unsolved crimes was the disappearance of Albert J. Fountain and his 12-year-old son while enroute to Las Cruces from a session of court in Lincoln, February 1896.

Emerson Hough said, "Southeastern New Mexico for twenty years after the Civil War was without a doubt as dangerous a country as ever lay out doors."

Being a sheriff in New Mexico was a hazardous occupation. Yet if a list were made of peace officers deserving honorable mention, it would be a long one. Taos County would record Dick Wooten; San Miguel would point to several members of the Romero Clan; Santa Fe county would offer Romulo Martinez; Grant County would be sure that Harry Whitehall ought to be honored; Eddy County's "Les" Dow was a martyr in the Seven Rivers rustler cleanup; but Pat Garrett would probably be elected the one because of the length and usefulness of his career (Other than the Billy the Kid affair).

Open dates on dairy foods

The New Mexico Department of Agriculture reminds consumers that open dating of dairy products became effective on April 1, 1975, in New Mexico.

"Open Date" as it refers to dairy products means that numerals or letters and numerals will appear in a prescribed way on the package. Most importantly, the dating means the "pull date" or the last day the item can be offered for sale. In effect, dating reserves part of the shelf life for customers.

The open dating regulation covers all containers of milk, non-fat milk, lowfat milk, flavored milk, skim milk, half and half, and creams.

The date may appear as "Apr. 1" or "04 01". On paper-board cartons, the pull date appears on the top, where cartons are sealed. Usually the date will be pressed into the carton, but in some cases ink will be used.

In glass and plastic containers the open date will appear on the cap, or around the sides of the package.

Dairy processors have been open dating their highly perishable products for the last few years. The change which the new regulation brings to the marketing of dairy products is the uniformity of time allotted dairy processors in which to market these items.

It is this standardized time that the New Mexico Department of Agriculture urged. Now, shoppers are given plenty of time to use the food while of top quality.

Products such as cottage cheese, buttermilk, or dairy sour cream are not required to be open dated. If the processors decide to date, the regulation applies to these foods, too. For instance, the date appears on the bottom of tubs of cottage cheese, yogurt, and dairy sour creams.

Under the open dating regulation there is a fourteen day maximum on products offered for sale. And, according to how they date, some dairies will be giving more shelf life to the shopper.

Here's how it goes, suppose the dairy packages on Mar. 1,

his open date will be Mar. 15, but he may choose to mark the open date as Mar. 10.

That means if you purchase the products with the Mar. 10 label, you have five more days before the end of shelf life.

Open dating doesn't guarantee quality but time is an important factor in the quality of dairy foods and an established shelf life will help the consumer in today's marketplace.

Estimated cost of the proposed project is \$650,000. The Hobbs health facility is owned by Humana of New Mexico, Inc.

The health facility capital expenditures review which will be conducted by the Committee is authorized in Section 1122 of the Social Security Act. The program is to assure that Federal funds are not used to support capital expenditures for unnecessary and duplicative health care facilities such as hospitals, nursing homes, or health centers. The capital expenditures covered are those which are over \$100,000, add or terminate a service, or add or subtract bed capacity.

Under the program each state has a designated planning agency which reviews all health facility capital expenditure proposals and submits its recommendations to the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. If the expenditure is made by a facility without approval of the planning agency, the law authorizes the Secretary to withhold related Federal payments from the facility under the Maternal and Child Health, Medicare, and Medicaid programs.

In New Mexico, the designated planning agency is the State Health Agency, and reviews are conducted in its behalf by the State Comprehensive Health Planning Council, headquartered in Santa Fe. The latter is a 38-member volunteer group appointed by the Governor. Wesley Quinn, Clovis, will preside at the April 12th meeting. Others of the District 6 Review Committee are:

Rebates set to begin with May 9 mailing

The first of 78 million tax rebate checks will be mailed on May 9. Mr. Victor Z. Billington, Acting District Director for New Mexico, said. The bulk of the mailings should be completed by the end of June.

Mr. Billington said taxpayers who filed returns the earliest will receive rebate checks first. The payments stem from enactment of the Tax Reduction Act of 1975 which provides for a rebate on 1974 taxes between \$100 and \$200 for most taxpayers, Mr. Billington added.

The IRS will automatically compute all rebates.

Any rebate adjustment made by the taxpayer on a return will only serve to delay processing and issuance of the rebate, Mr. Billington said. Such adjustments could also delay any refund due.

Approximately 67 million taxpayers, Mr. Billington said, will receive checks reflecting the rebate only. These

include: 1. The current or projected community need of health services as measured in health plans developed by the state and local Comprehensive Health Planning Agencies; 2. Whether the proposed project can be adequately staffed and operated; 3. Its economic feasibility—whether the expenditure will result in unreasonable increases in charges to patients; 4. Improved efficiency and productivity fostering cost containment through such factors as ambulatory, preventive, or home health care, and design and construction economies.

The April 12th meeting will be an open hearing with the public invited to attend. It will convene at 2:00 p. m. in a nursing classroom at Llano Estacado Medical Center, Highway 18, Hobbs.

BLM releases Impact Study

The Bureau of Land Management New Mexico State Office released for public comment a draft environmental impact statement on timber management on BLM-administered national resource lands in other states. The statement was issued to conform to requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act. It examines BLM's use of public forest land, its timber management program and its effects on other resources.

The statement also considers possible alternatives under various levels of forestry management. It covers all timber practices presently conducted by BLM from reforestation to harvest.

include taxpayers who have already received their refunds for 1974 or whose refunds are already in process at IRS.

The other 11 million taxpayers will receive checks combining their refund with the rebate. These checks will show how much is refund and how much is rebate, Mr. Billington said.

Under the new legislation the maximum rebate is 10 percent of the tax liability up to a maximum rebate of \$200, reduced by one percent of adjusted gross income in excess of \$20,000, up to \$30,000. Taxpayers with adjusted gross incomes in excess of \$30,000 will receive a rebate of \$100, Mr. Billington said. Those who had a tax liability of less than \$100 will receive a rebate equal to the tax liability.

He pointed out that married persons filing separate returns will not get a larger rebate than those filing jointly since, under the law, the maximum rebate for a married person filing separately is \$100.

In New Mexico, the Bureau of Land Management is responsible only for a very small timber acreage which has yielded an annual commercial harvest in the past of about 1.5 million board feet.

Annual harvest from all BLM lands located in ten western states averages approximately one billion board feet.

C. 20240. Comments must be submitted on or before May 7, 1975 to be considered in the preparation of the final environmental impact statement.

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

Did you ever notice how few poems are written about snow? We see poems of sunset, nightfall, twilight, rain and sunshine, rainbows, winter, country summers, love and romance, etc.; but not many to describe the beauty and sheer loveliness of our last snow. I suppose there are no words one can apply. We just have to resort to the artists and photographers.

The Columbia Viking Encyclopedia gives: snow, a form of precipitation, hexagonal ice crystals, produced by condensation of vapor about a dust particle at below freezing temperatures. Well, we knew there were many dust particles in the air, from the severe winds everywhere; therefore enough to cause our heavy snow.

Maybe, because snow is associated with so many hazardous conditions and tragedies of the world, that poets had rather think of more milder subjects to write about.

I read an account or description of the climb and death of some men on their fateful expedition to conquer Mount Everest, the highest summit in the world, by James R. Ullman.

Paragraph after paragraph described our lovely white snows as vicious: 'locked in savage, blizzard-driven winter — a death trap of snow and sleet — the wind tore at them relentlessly — the wind shrieked, the snow drove down in almost solid mass — started by a deep rumbling sound — an ominous explosion — seemed to shudder along its entire face. An ocean of soft, billowing snow poured down upon them, knocked them from their feet and swept them away — To this day their bodies lie entombed in the snow and ice.'

But as to poems: Mary Morgan Hamilton writes about a Winter Sunset — 'And down the lane, borne on the wind, come whirling flurries of snow' — while John Greenleaf Whittier's early American colonial life induced him to write the poems of Snow Bound.

And Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote: 'Announced by all the trumpets of the sky, Arrives the snow' — in The Snowstorm.

Then Emily Bronte wrote: 'I shall smile, when wreaths of snow blossom where the rose should grow.'

Algernon Swinburn, in 'When the Hounds of Spring,' only hinted in part:

'For winter's rains and ruins are over,
And all the seasons of snow and sins —
Blossom by blossom the spring begins.'

And a few lines from 'To a Snowflake,' by Francis Thompson:

'God was my shaper. Passing surmised,
He hammered. He wrought me
From curled silver vapor.
To lust of His mind —
With His hammer of wind,
And His graver of frost.'

In "Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening", Robert Frost wrote:

'Whose woods these are I think I know.
His house is in the village though;
He will not see me stopping here
To watch the woods fill up with snow.'

In Wallace Stevens', "Poems of Our Climate", 'Clear water in a brilliant

Mrs. Kelsey (Ginny) has served the local Chamber of Commerce as reservationist and corresponding secretary the past 18 months.


Frances Vigil Baca

Old Hearst plane now in Plainview

The plane is a UIC single engine four-place Waco whose original owner was newspaper tycoon William Randolph Hearst who purchased it in 1933.
 The plane is now owned by Ralph Brown, Hale County farmer who purchased it from Pup Thomas of Lubbock who had acquired it in the 1930s.
 Nowell, who won the Lubbock Civil Air Patrol Pioneer Aviation Award in 1974, was an auto mechanic at Brownfield in 1933, at the time the Hearst interests owned a cattle feeding operation at Brownfield and a big ranch in Mexico.

The brief log notations conjure up memories for Nowell — memories of people who were passengers on the plane when it stopped at Brownfield.
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 Private flying was mainly a rich man's hobby in those days, but the log quotes bargain basement prices for gasoline purchases as low as 18 cents a gallon, oil at 20 cents a quart, and a \$2 charge for one night's storage for the Waco at an El Paso airport.

The landing strip at the ranch in Mexico was marked off on a mesquite flat, and the log notes that truck tires were inserted as liners in the landing gear tires and two tubes of "Neverleak," a popular puncture remedy of the day, were put in the tires to seal leaks caused by cactus spines picked up on the runway.
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 In his opinion, there's nothing more satisfying than making airplanes fly safely, and after more than a quarter of a century at his present job, he's convinced "there is no better place to work at the job than right where I am."

Inside The Capital

By FRED BUCKLES

SANTA FE — Gov. Jerry Apodaca underscored problems with a proposed \$9.1 million state income tax cut inserted by the legislature in the general appropriations bill in a special session.

Apodaca said the bill's language allows the Revenue Bureau to adjust the income tax rate up or down, depending on the general appropriations level. He said: "There is no lid on spending. As we understand it, the revenue would be adjusted to spending."

He added: "I'm not so sure we can afford the pleasure of draining the money from state revenue until we see what the economy is going to do." Apodaca also said pointedly an income tax cut was not in his call for the 4-day special legislative session.

Apodaca signed a bill appropriating \$239,300 for capital improvements at Carrie Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children, Truth or Consequences. He also signed a bill appropriating \$585,000 for a new State Health-Social Services Department building at Taos.

He signed a bill by Senate Majority Whip Odie Echols, D-Clovis, revising New Mexico sexual crime laws. The new legislation seeks more convictions for rape. It also updates present law.

Apodaca signed a bill by Reps. Von Rue Crawford, R-Hidalgo-Luna, and Murray Ryan, R-Sierra-Grant, amending the law on county street and road repair assessments. Only Luna and Lincoln Counties are affected.

A bill by Rep. H. B. Barnard, D-Clovis, appropriating \$59,000 for capital improvements for Bruce King State Office Building at Clovis was signed. Apodaca signed a bill act sponsored by Rep. John Bigbee, R-DeBaca-Guadalupe-Lincoln-Torrance. Bigbee is an Encino rancher. The law revamps statutes on inspection and regulation of apiaries.

The legislature appropriated \$1 million for state parks improvements. Among listed projects in the bill is \$54,000 for Kit Carson State Park, Taos. Gov. Apodaca signed a




Landfill is open

Ruidoso's new sanitary landfill, operating under EIA regulations governing the operation and dumping of refuse, is now under village management.

The site will be manned from 8 a. m.-5 p. m., Monday through Saturday, to direct traffic to the proper dumping area.

The fee, for private haulers, has been set at \$1.50 per cubic yard which is the equivalent of a half-ton pickup load. "All users," village manager Jim Hine says, "are to take preventative measures not to lose refuse en route to the pit."

CLIPPED COMMENTS

The recent state legislature voted substantial pay increases for a large number of elected officials, for terms to which they had already been elected. The raises go into effect July 1.

Certainly public officials feel inflation like everyone else, but it seems unwise to make these pay raises effective during an incumbent term. Each of the elected officials ran for the office, knowing full well what that job paid. It would seem much wiser not to authorize any increases during a term of office.

Regardless, here are the new raises as authorized by the 1975 legislature.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca, a pay hike of \$9,000 a year, up to \$35,000. He also receives \$48,000 a year in unaudited monthly payments for expenses. Land Commissioner, Phil Lucero, a \$10,000 hike to \$30,000; a \$5,000 raise for Attorney General Toney Anaya, also up to \$30,000; and \$4,000 raises for the secretary of state, auditor, treasurer

- 1 cup cream style cottage cheese
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 cup finely chopped pecans
- 1/2 cup Karo dark corn syrup
- 36 pecan halves

Dark corn syrup

Mix together margarine and cheese. Stir in flour; shape into ball. Chill about 1 hour. Stir together chopped pecans and 1/2 cup corn syrup. Divide dough into thirds and roll out each portion on lightly floured surface to rectangle 1/4-inch thick. Cut into 3-inch squares. Place 1 teaspoon nut mixture on each square. Fold in corners overlapping in center. Seal each with a pecan half (dip bottom into corn syrup and press lightly into center). Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake in 350° F oven 25 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes 3 dozen.

THE FISHERIES ISSUE

On March 30, 1775, King George III signed another act of Parliament that further punished the New England colonies for their defiance of British authority. It was during the debate on this bill that Franklin gave up hope of reconciliation and returned to America.
The bill forbade the New England colonies to trade with any nation except Britain and the British West Indies and barred New Englanders from the fishing area of the North Atlantic. On April 13 when news of their ratification of the Continental Association reached London the provisions of the bill were extended to New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and South Carolina.
The bill had first been introduced on February 27. During the interval friends of America such as Lord Fox and Lord Camden spoke against it. The most brilliant speech, lasting some three hours, was made by Edmund Burke. Despite his eloquence a majority of three to one Parliament voted for it with the belief that the Americans would not dare resist.
As will later be seen this was only one more act in a series of acts that inflamed passions

on both sides of the Atlantic. Those with cooler heads and with a desire for compromise were losing out on both sides.
An interesting sidelight is that during the serious and consequential political discussion other activities continued. For example, in 1775 the first pianoforte made in America was produced by John Behrent in Philadelphia. Thus, while the clouds of war were forming, life went on in other ways as well.
While English America was in turmoil a quieter attempt at reform was underway in the Spanish Empire. When Spain had first developed her empire in the 16th century the country was ruled by the Hapsburg dynasty. However, shortly after the beginning of the 18th century the ruling family of Spain changed to the Bourbon dynasty, the same family that ruled France.

Under Charles III in the 1770's and 1780's a series of changes in colonial policy began that became known as the "Bourbon reforms." Essentially, this was an effort to make the colonial system more efficient and more profitable. Under the last of the Hapsburgs the colonial administration had deteriorated badly. New Mexico, being as it was on the outer fringes of the empire, had suffered from this neglect.
Many of the attempted reforms were too ambitious or too late, but some of them were successful. We will look more closely at them in later columns.

Mild early in week with major storm developing Wednesday and recurrent snows continuing northern sections thru Friday and southern areas through Saturday. Precipitation reports up to 1.15 inches at Silver City and 2.60 at Ruidoso. Very cold weather throughout State last half of week with temperatures generally averaging 5 to 10 degrees colder than late March normals.

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
