



### New Mexico History

In the 1880s, when settlement was going on rapidly, the older and larger counties were broken into smaller units. Sierra County was so named because of the mountainous region of which it was made. San Juan River. Chaves was named in honor of the Chaves family, so conspicuous in New Mexico history. Eddy was named for Charles B. Eddy, a noted upbuilder of that section. Guadalupe was named for the patron saint of Mexico, Our Lady of Guadalupe; Union, queerly named to show that the county was made in response to the "union" desire of those in adjoining sections of three older counties; Otero, named for Miguel Otero, governor at the time; McKinley, named for President McKinley. Twelve other counties have been made in the twentieth century: Luna, named for Solomon Luna, a prominent citizen whose ancestors have lived in New Mexico since early in the 16th century; Quay, named for Senator Quay of Pennsylvania; Roosevelt, named for President Theodore Roosevelt; Sandoval, named for the Sandoval family which was prominent in the region included in this county; Torrance, named for F. J. Torrance, one of the promoters of the building of a railroad in that part of the territory; Curry, named for Gov. Curry; DeBaca, named for Gov. Esquivel Cabeza de Baca, the second state governor, who died while in office; Lea, named for Capt. J. C. Lea, one of the early settlers in the Pecos Valley; Hidalgo, apparently named for the town of Guadalupe Hidalgo, near Mexico City, where the peace treaty for the Mexican War was signed; Catron, named for Thomas Catron, a prominent politician, who was for a time U. S. Senator; Harding, named for President Harding; and last was Los Alamos, named for the Los Alamos Ranch School for Boys.

In 1848, the American army was practically in charge of New Mexico with headquarters at Santa Fe. People were ruled as if by martial law and army officers assumed the functions of the various civil officers.

New Mexico suffered a long struggle for statehood. In 1850, 1872, and 1888, state constitutions were drawn up but rejected. It was not until 1911 that a state constitution was adopted. No other state has fought so vigorously to be admitted to the Union nor had so many setbacks. Scarcely a congressional session between 1849 and 1910 was without a bill providing for statehood. In all, some fifty acts were introduced during the sixty year struggle. Many of the failures are attributed to conditions within New Mexico itself. Mining interests, large merchants, railroads, big landowners opposed statehood because it would mean higher taxes.

That statehood was finally granted should perhaps be credited to the efforts of Albert B. Fall. On a visit in Albuquerque by President Taft, no expense was spared in an effort to impress the President. Many speakers of both parties advised the President of the cultural, economic, political and social attainments. Governor George Curry had selected Fall to give the key address. Fall surprised everyone by reviewing the long history of broken promises of statehood and stressed "that the territory had a right to statehood and that it was the duty of the United States to grant it."

After constitutional conventions in Arizona and New Mexico drew up acceptable constitutions, Congress passed the Flood Statehood Resolution, which provided for statehood for the two territories on August 18, 1911; and President Taft formally announced New Mexico statehood on January 6, 1912. The long, long struggle was over and New Mexico was in the Union!



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**Letter to Editor**

[Editor's note: The following is a letter received by a local member of the National Rifle Association and is reprinted, in part, to inform our readers about proposed ammunition and gun control legislation].

Dear Mr. Wright:  
Since you received your NRA membership card in July, the anti-gun lobby has proposed the most drastic and devastating threat to gun owners that I have encountered in all my years of association with the National Rifle Association.

What would you say, if local or Federal agents suddenly appeared at your door with this demand:

"Under the new Federal law, Mr. Wright, you are required to surrender all pistols, rifles, shotguns, antique firearms, black powder and ammunition that you once legally owned. Your alternative is arrest and jail."

Sounds fantastic? 1984? Impossible in America?

Less than a year ago I would have agreed. But today under the new anti-gun proposals, we are rapidly approaching the day when our firearms and ammunition could be confiscated and never returned.

Are we going to let the anti-gun lobby write laws that will confiscate our legally owned guns and ammunition? And let state and federal legislatures blindly vote "YES" to the end of our constitutionally protected gun ownership?

Or are we going to fight now while we still can... to protect our Constitutional right to own pistols, rifles, shotguns, antique firearms, black powder and ammunition?

Let me tell you exactly what the anti-gun lobby is doing right this very minute to confiscate our firearms and ammunition.

The "Committee for Handgun Control, Inc." has won a court order which requires the Federal Consumer Product Safety Commission to decide if handgun ammunition is a "hazardous subject" and should be made illegal.

This ruling would affect every single handgun owner in all 50 states.

Can you believe it? Ammunition illegal?

How much will a handgun be worth if the owner can't buy ammunition? Worthless. Totally and absolutely worthless.

Maybe you don't own a handgun, but this is only the beginning. Handgun ammunition includes .22 caliber rim-fire small bore ammunition. Next the anti-gun lobby will go after large bore ammunition. And then shotgun shells. And then black powder.

And when government bureaucrats and outfits like the "Committee for Handgun Control, Inc." have outlawed ammunition, it won't be long before our guns are confiscated and never returned.

As Executive Vice President of your NRA, I never thought that I would have to write a letter like this.

I never thought that I would have to come into your home with news so incredibly bad that I would have to ask for your financial help.

But the threat to our legally owned firearms... our own private property... is so very real that I have no choice but to ask you to make an emergency contribution to stop this new threat to our private property... our guns.

NRA has gone to court to fight the proposed anti-amunition ruling. We think we have a chance of beating the anti-gun lobby... this time.

But what about next week? Next month? State legislatures are meeting today in your state... what new anti-gun bills will be presented to them for their vote?

You and I both know that the anti-gun lobby will never quit until they have confiscated every single gun and every single bit of ammunition in the United States.

Even if the Federal Consumer Product Safety Commission rules in our favor this time, the anti-gun forces can still go directly to the Congress and to your state legislature to get guns and ammunition outlawed.

But then it could be too late to fight. The Second Amendment could be destroyed. Our

firearms and ammunition could be confiscated, never to be returned.

What are the chances for new and even more restrictive anti-gun laws from Congress? The chances are more than likely, according to the Boston Globe, one of the biggest anti-gun newspapers in America.

Just recently this newspaper gleefully noted that every Congressman who sponsored anti-gun legislation was re-elected in 1974. But even worse, 27 Congressmen who supported bills favorable to gun owners were defeated in the last election.

It's crucial that you as an NRA member help spread the alarm. Don't be the weak link in this chain. Let me know how many extra postcards you need and I'll rush them to you immediately.

And we must continue to meet the high cost of legal research, court battles, lawyers' fees, and publicity for our cause.

Each month it will cost \$41,666 for NRA to carry on this vital work for you, me and our fellow NRA members.

Each month! And this is just the bare minimum. \$41,666 is what NRA will need each month just to hold the line. It does not include any room for expanding our fight against the anti-gun lobby.

Each minute that you delay brings us closer to the day when local or Federal agents confiscate our firearms and ammunition.

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
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
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**Doris Day named chairman for Humane Ass'n. event**

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**Your Social Security**

Interrupted social security or supplemental security income (SSI) payments because of failure to report a change of address continues to create hardships for people eligible to receive either or both kinds of checks. Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative, said that of course the person should immediately notify his post office, but he should also notify the social security office by letter, phone, or in person. Lunsford pointed out that failure to include the "claim number" on the notice to social security will cause delay in getting checks coming to the new address. Everyone who receives a social security green check or an SSI gold

colored check should tell the social security office his claim number — the one shown on his monthly check — when he moves. For an SSI check, this number is always the person's own social security card number. For someone receiving social security checks, however, the claim number may be his own social security number or that of some other person (such as husband, wife, or parent) on whose work record the payments are being made. Social security claim numbers always have one or more alphabetical letters or numbers, such as A, B, C2, HA, HAB2, etc., at the end. For example, 000-00-0000-A indicates a retirement claim; 000-00-0000-C2 shows that this is a child's claim.

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
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


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
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**CPA announces new president**



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### BICENTENNIAL NOTEBOOK

**Chatham Defends Colonies**  
Throughout the month of January two hundred years ago the Parliament in London continued to debate the future of the American colonies. Actions had already been taken a year earlier to punish Bostonians for their unruly actions, especially the destruction of the tea in Boston harbor.

Debate continued concerning additional punishments since the colonies had not given in to British demands, and had, in fact, further defied British authority in the Continental Congress. The hostile attitude of George III, already well-known, was especially reflected in the House of Lords.

In official circles the colonies had always had their defenders, but none was more eloquent in this crucial period than Lord Chatham. A close friend of Benjamin Franklin who was still in London, he attempted to convince the House of Lords that the Continental Congress should not be condemned, but was instead "the most honorable assembly of statesmen since those of the ancient Greeks and Romans in the most virtuous times."

He appealed to Parliament to remove the army from Boston, to limit the claims of absolute authority over the colonies, and to make every effort to reconcile the differences with the colonies for the good of the British Empire. He accepted the American claims that Parliament had no right to tax the colonies who were unrepresented in that body.

On one occasion he took Franklin onto the floor of the House of Lords while he appealed for sanity to prevail in the colonial policy. Chatham was not the only defender of the colonies, but on this occasion he was the most outstanding, despite his failure to carry the day.

When the vote was finally taken the opponents of the colonists won by a vote of 68 to 18. The king who considered this a victory that would force Americans into submission was nonetheless distressed to learn that his brother, the Duke of Cumberland, had voted with the Americans.

Chatham may well have been prophetic in this debate when he predicted that a non-conciliatory attitude would lead to ruin for Britain. He may not have realized how correct he was when he said, "We shall be forced ultimately to retract; let us retract while we can, not when we must."

From the vantage point of hindsight one might conclude that world history would have been much different had Parliament heeded Chatham's advice.

- Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation** — Can be entered in the recreation area west of here or you may visit at Mescalero on U. S. Highway 70.
- Bonito Lake, Bear Canyon** — Scenic mountain lake offering a wonderful drive through the mountains. Several abandoned gold mines with tumbledown buildings and the caves can be explored.
- Nogal Lake, Nogal Mesa** — The mesa is the scene of the annual Summer Cowboy Camp Meetings.

- White Oaks** — Old ghost town once thickly populated and once having newspaper, stores, saloons.
- Children's Playlands** — Several commercial playlands offering a variety of rides and recreation for children of all ages.
- Climate** — The most wonderful in the world — you will especially enjoy our autumn season when fall foliage is a riot of color.

I suppose you know by now it is my hobby to seek out unusual places to eat or things to see. The food may not be any better than most places, but there are other things of interest to those who have never been there.

This place we found in Lubbock, Texas, The Big Texas Steak Ranch, has everything that one may never see in the homes again. One can browse around for hours and not see all the authentic — not copies — of furniture, kitchen ware, articles — even faded posters of infamous outlaws that were popular back before and after 1900.

Some of these things were being used, such as: old tables, dining chairs, benches, hanging lamps and old dishes. Even the iron and brass bedsteads were used as backs for benches. And to carry out the western theme, the wagon with bows was loaded with large pots and kettles full of vegetables and salads; as the salad bar.

I went all through, looking for their kitchen with the old time range, as I had a feeling it belonged with all this; but the only stove was only a long grill, which was just about the only modern thing there. I was told the manager had spent most of his life going over the country, gathering up these antiques.

As for the food, they are all prices; and the menus are on a large board the shape of Texas. After our order is served by boys dressed in early period costumes — including sleeveholders and 'galluses' — we were serenaded by musicians with string instruments and singing the old time songs, or any request they had.

The old coffee grinders, dishes, churns, stone crocks, plaques, desks, marble top bureaus and music boxes all brought back a nostalgic feeling of long ago. It is worth seeing these things and showing them to the children, even if you are not hungry for their 'big Texas steaks.'

Then there is this quaint little village of Wickenburg, Arizona. I had been through there several times and never stopped; but it seemed different from the usual small places, in the middle of the desert. I wondered what was so remarkable or unique about it; so I determined to find out and here are some of the things I came up with.

Wickenburg is in the heart of the old mining and semi-desert country; in the foothills of White Tank, Harquahala and Harcuvar mountains; with beautiful giant Saguara, cacto, walking stick cactus and ocotillo candle wood — rich with spring blossoms.

Its elevation, 2,100 feet; population 2,648 in summer and around 6,000 in the winter; temperature: mid-summer, 57 to 99 degrees; winter season: 35 to 70. Sunny days (with no smog) average 345. They claim the altitude and year round dry sunny air are kind to people who are touched with arthritis, heart or respiratory conditions. Situated at the junction of 60, 89 and 93, it is a direct route from Phoenix to California.

The man for whom Wickenburg is named, was born Heinrich Heinsel, in Germany; but he changed his name to Wickenburg upon landing in San Francisco. It is said he was a natural mineralogist and discovered a coal mine on his father's property — to have it confiscated by the German government. He became bitter and decided to come to the new country to seek his fortune.

His wanderings took him to the banks of the Hassayampa. He was following his donkey and picked up a rock to throw. He thought it was unusually heavy, then discovered it was gold. A vulture flew down and lit on a bush and Wickenburg instantly christened his find, 'The Vulture'; which became Arizona's most important gold strike. It is estimated that \$30 to \$50 million in bullion was produced by the Vulture; and there were other mines too numerous to name.

But all of the wealth did not bring happiness to the native German. He was involved in litigation over the discovery, but in the end won. He became weary of it all and sold out; settling in a little shack on the bank of the river, to brood. At the age of 88, he was found lying on the spot where he found the first nugget, with a bullet through his head.

It is unbelievable, in 1858, the U. S. Congress accepted a report about the Arizona desert, which stated: 'The region is altogether valueless. After entering it, there is nothing to do but leave.'

But when the gold played out, some did not leave. Some of the prominent men set up ranching and irrigation; therefore the history of how the town was founded is very interesting.

Wickenburg is in the heart of Arizona's dude ranch country; and each winter their guest list is long, and, so great is the tourist traffic, that twenty-five or more motels are required to accommodate them during the season.

There are special events, such as: the famous Desert Caballeros Ride into the mountains and the Las Damas Trek (for women only), free bi-weekly rodeos, square dances, Saddle Club Gymkhanas; lectures, the 'Melodrammer' of the Desert Stagers and the Cattle Rustler's Ball.

Wickenburg has a weekly newspaper, The Wickenburg Sun; a radio station KSWW; more than a dozen churches and any kind of business one may want. A 'swimming hole', a nine-hole golf course; beautiful community and civic buildings and a new airport — Wellik Field.

Every February, thousands of visitors come to Wickenburg for a three day celebration of the Gold Rush days. Placer gold is hauled in and people can actually pan for gold and keep what they find. Cities and towns join in a grand parade and pageant of the Old West. This is the town which keeps the best of the West alive in the midst of modern living.

Many of God's simplest creations can inspire you suddenly with a message of the love of Our Heavenly Father. And there is something special about an apple tree in bloom. As you are held spell-bound by their beauty and breathe their fragrance, you are for a moment in spiritual communion with many a loved one who stood beside a blossoming apple tree long, long ago, and you feel the blessed presence of all your loved ones ever near.

### Birds Love The Apple Blossoms

All the song birds are in the spring time joy among the apple blossoms. The orange and black of the oriole, and the red and gray of the finch, the navy blue of the plover jay all are flashing as the birds fly among the apple trees.

And the blue birds! They have a special love for the apple blossoms. They will perch among them, their silken blue coats gleaming in the morning sun. Then there will be a flash of blue among the pink and white as they fly to another tree.

I think Arbor Day has come and gone. I always forget which day it is in New Mexico. Mostly it falls in April. The old saying goes that you can plant a tree in any month with an "R" in it. However, since this is a late spring, you still have a little lee-way. Also the nursery folks have trees in congenial benediction into the home so that you can plant them most any time of the year. 
