## Fire closure is in effect

The fire closure, prohibiting all outside burning within the corporate limits of the village of Ruidoso, is in effect until further notice, Fire Chief Red Farus, announced Friday.

"There has been some misunderstanding about this fire closure," Farus said, "that I am empowered by law to put into effect if such closure is so ordered by our fire department."

"The fire closure means that it is against the law to do any burning outside of a residence or place of business, whether it be pine needles, debris, grass or anything else."

The sole exception to the closure will be to permit the use of charcoal grills outside a residence or place of business.

"The restriction to the use of charcoal is simply that the coals must be left in the burning unit until they are completely out and it is the suggestion of the Ruidoso Fire Department that the coals be completely submerged in water, for a considerable time, to insure that the fire is out."

Farus specifically noted that if any person dumps live charcoal ashes or remains on the ground and starts a fire, the violator can be fined \$300 and sentenced to serve 90 days in jail.

Last week, he said, a person was fined \$100 in municipal court for burning rubbish in violation of the fire closure.

"We intend to prosecute all violators because of the high fire danger," he said.

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## Miss Curbin wins Inaugural

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N. M. — Miss Curbin, considered the "weaker" half of a two-horse entry, came flying around the turn for home and winged to victory in Saturday's Inaugural Preakness at Ruidoso Downs.

The six-furlong chase was viewed by an excellent turnout of patrons, who wagered a whopping \$26,792 on the 12-race program and created the biggest opening-day handle in the track's 28-year history. The handle on opening day last year was \$288,864.

Miss Curbin toured the oval in 1:15.5 seconds, winning by 1 1/4 lengths and returning moneys of \$6.80, \$3.40 and \$2.60. Flashy Country, a 6-1 shot piloted by Carlos Rivas, ended up with a good closing rush and finished second. The payouts were \$4.60 and \$3.40. Third went to Trid Driver, who got away at 3-2 under Gordon Weaver and paid \$2.60.

Saturday's program — staged on Ruidoso's completely-reconditioned racing surface — drew solid marks from horsemen and jockeys. "No doubt about it," one rider commented, "the track is in the best shape it's ever been in."

One of the big events of the Memorial Day weekend at Ruidoso Downs is Sunday's renewal of the Kansas Quarter Horse Derby.

The 400-yard thriller is booked for Sunday, and offers a gross pot of \$72,250. It's also the first stop on Ruidoso's "Triple Crown" journey for three-year-old quarter horses.

The second and third jewels of the Triple Crown are really big ones — the \$350,000 (est.) Rainbow Derby on July 6, and the \$520,000 (est.) All-American Derby on Aug. 24.

Racing over the Memorial Day weekend covers a five-day span, Thursday through Monday. First post each day is 1:30 p. m. Action on Thursday and Friday will be restricted to qualifying trials for the upcoming \$375,000 (est.) Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity.

On Sunday, it's the Kansas Derby, and on Monday (Memorial Day), three-year-old thoroughbreds will be fighting it out in the Memorial Day Handicap over 5/8 furlongs. The purse is \$50,000 added.

The top qualifier in the Kansas Derby is Mongo Jet, a Jet Deck colt trained by Jake Casco for Bess N. Fish of Houston. The colt was tabbed as the betting choice in last week's trials and won by three quarters of a length on a sloppy track. He covered the 400-yard distance in 20.27 seconds.

Mongo Jet is used to keeping top company, and has already shown good propensity for making money. Last year, he racked up a fine 4-1 mark out of 12 tries and hauled in nearly \$40,000. So for this year, he banded out two wins and a second from three spins.

One of his best performances was a close third — only a head away from victory — in a consolation of the \$1 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso last summer.

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N. M. — Favorites gobbled up both ends of Sunday's twin divisions of the Top Deck Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The first installment of the Three Shaker, who led from start-to-finish under Frank Henning, the crowd of 4,620 made Three Shaker an odds-on favorite, and he got home by a neck.

In the second division, Chicosy Moon — who ought to get the ownership papers to the Top Deck Stakes — built his way to a half-length win. Once again, he was the darling of the betting public. Launched as an overwhelming 1-5 favorite, he dishied out menger returns of \$2.60, \$2.40 and \$2.20.

The heavy conditions from intermittent rains slowed Three Shaker's winning time down to 18.13 seconds. Chicosy Moon, ridden by Jerry Burgess, got the job done in a smart 17.96 seconds. Each division carried a gross purse of \$41,000, with the winner's slice amounting to \$2,460.

# Ruidoso water rights adjudication to begin

Service of process for adjudication of water rights on some 200 water users along the Rio Ruidoso will begin, probably the last week in May, according to Special Assistant Attorney General Richard A. Simms.

Probably all of those involved know this is the outgrowth of two consolidated cases originally filed to adjudicate the water rights in the Roswell Artesian Underground Water Basin.

January 10, 1975, upon joint motion of the State of New Mexico, ex rel., S. E. Reynolds, State Engineer and Pecos Valley Artesian Conservancy District, the District Court for Chavez County entered its order reopening

the consolidated cases to finally adjudicate all of the water rights in the Roswell Artesian Underground Basin and the Rio Ruidoso Stream System — it having been determined the latter is a tributary to and a major source of recharge to the basin.

The Rio Bonito users were served first. Rio Honda users will be served sometime this summer.

Once users have been served, they will have a certain time to respond. Included in the papers served will be an Offer of Judgement, "a legal instrument whereby the Plaintiffs offer to recognize the nature and extent of a given water right." The defendant can settle his water

rights by executing the Offer. If he disagrees with the rights described in the Offer, he should contact Mr. Simms, in Santa Fe, or the personnel of the State Engineer Office in Roswell. If an error is found in the survey, appropriate corrections will be made and the Offer of Judgement amended.

If no agreement can be reached, the individual defendant should "retain counsel or enter an appearance on his own behalf to have the matter resolved by the Court."

Mr. Simms advised they would be glad to conduct a public meeting in Ruidoso in order to explain the nature and purpose of the lawsuit, if there is need.

## County aid asked in bid to reopen Carrizozo hospital

Nancy Knight, president of the Carrizozo Municipal Hospital Board, was the sole representative of the board to appear at the Lincoln County Commissioners' meeting in special session Thursday to consider a request from Ms. Knight for county financial support to reopen the hospital to operate under a limited license.

Commission chairman Roman Nunez, after about two hours of discussion in which nothing financially concrete in the possibilities of successfully operating the hospital was presented by Ms. Knight, said, "We will postpone any action for more study. I think we can come out with something here," before noting that the request would be considered at the May 29 meeting of the commissioners.

Ms. Knight told the board, "Give us one year, gamble with us one year, and if we can't make it (the hospital) work, we'll forget it."

At one point in the discussion Commissioner Bill Hart said, "I don't think we can anticipate \$50,000 a year in income (while it was operating) never hit \$50,000."

"We'll make every effort to get as many donations as possible to lighten the load," Ms. Knight said, and "I think we can get some outside money to help us."

County manager Leslie Olson pointed out that the proposed budget for the hospital wasn't accurate and that "The cost will probably be around \$20,000 more" due to recent regulations for the operation of a hospital that became effective after the budget estimates were compiled.

Ms. Knight also said, "The financial outlook is not good." "The financial problems in operating the Intermediate Care Facility, (ICF) in the annex, were briefly aired, with no action taken until after the commission makes a study of Ms. Knight's summation."

Olson noted that even if the ICF were to operate a full capacity that the facility would still be plagued with financial problems.

"We can't focus on one area in the county," commissioner Hart said, "We must provide service for the whole county, but we will study the situation."

**New Mexico History**

Today a visit to New Mexico is a visit to another world, another time, another way of life. The past still lives in New Mexico in the geologic formations of towering mountains, in time carved mesas, in deep fantastic caverns. It is a story written by ancient seas, relentless winds, rushing rivers, or by volcanoes that shook the earth. The past may be seen in ceremonial dances, bullet scarred walls, or heard in the Spanish spoken, the thunder of hooves of cattle or the unimaginable sound of the Atomic explosion at Trinity site. The past may still be seen in the arts from the pictographs on sandstone walls, made by some Indian, to the pottery making, basket weaving, carving, jewelry making, which are all a part of daily life among the Indians. New Mexico has contributed generously to the idiomatic speech of the United States. These various language influences were effective during the colonization by Spanish conquistadores and the influxes of the French and Anglo-American trappers, traders, trail blazers, pioneers, miners, as well as the Indian words.

The music of the early Indian is nowhere better preserved than New Mexico where it has been handed down by rote from generation to generation from prehistoric times. The first music teacher was Fra Cristobal de Quinones and he is credited with having brought the first organ into the United States at the San Felipe Pueblo.

Almost anywhere in New Mexico one's foot might turn up from the earth potsherds with fragments of design still visible. These are the ancient remains of the art of the Pueblo Indians who developed the art of decorating and firing clay pottery. It is believed that the Navajo women learned to weave from the Pueblos, even as the men learned silversmithing from the Spanish colonists; but long ago they outgrew their teachers and forgot them, and today, the arts of weaving and silversmithing are Navajo arts. To supply the love of the colonists for religious art, paintings were done under the direction of the missionary priests. They were painted on hand hewn wood or on skins with earth colors and vegetable dyes. The saintly images called Santos were primitive. The bultos were carved of soft wood and coated with gesso and colored. The retablos were paintings on wood.

From the vantage point of a broad survey extending throughout four hundred years, New Mexico inevitably appears as a region that is unique. To me, I do not find it so, only the state I am proud to call home. I never tell my age, but it is a pleasure to brag that I am the only person born in Ruidoso the year New Mexico was admitted to statehood. In closing, may I give you a poem written by Pauline Morgan, of Deming.

New Mexico  
God gave to each state its portion  
of beauty no artist's brush can match.  
He painted the sky and the ocean —  
The trees and the mountains too,  
And when He came to the desert  
He pondered the best thing to do.  
The brown He gave to the sand dune,  
Topped in pink the cactus blade,  
And the Chameleon, that can change colors,

Till you've visited New Mexico.




**Hughes graduates from Lackland**







at Crown Point and St. John's a few days later, the Congress was somewhat stunned. Whatever the individual reactions, the importance of these events was soon clear. For one thing, much needed military supplies were taken by the Americans. More important, however, was the fact that the way had been cleared into Canada if Congress were to decide that acquisition of Canada was a desirable objective. That question proved to be a very troublesome one in years to come.

The victories over the British were exhilarating although few could say what ultimate importance they might have.

Meanwhile, in Spanish New Mexico a serious raid was made on Taos by a group of Comanches. Described in detail by Governor Mendinueta we know that the attack was planned as a surprise by Comanches who came to Taos under the pretext of trading with the residents. The plan was frustrated when local residents came out in the morning armed to hunt wolves. Thus, their unexpected preparation made it possible to resist the Comanche attack.

Such episodes continued so that life was very uncertain for many of the Spaniards and Pueblos who could never be sure when they might face an enemy.

**BICENTENNIAL NOTEBOOK**



**Donald Whisenhunt TICONDEROGA AND OTHER BATTLES**  
As the Second Continental Congress assembled on May 10, 1775, two men later to be-

come controversial figures carried the war to the British. Late in April after the battles of Lexington and Concord, the Massachusetts Committee of Safety authorized Benedict Arnold to raise 400 soldiers and to attack the British post at Fort Ticonderoga on Lake Champlain. However, in the meantime, Arnold discovered that Ethan Allen and his "Green Mountain Boys" of Vermont were planning a similar campaign. Arnold's forces joined those of Allen, but Arnold's attempts to take command failed. Instead the two forces operated together to surprise

the 42 British soldiers at Ticonderoga and to capture the post with only one minor casualty. Ethan Allen later claimed that the British surrendered when he demanded it "in the name of the great Jehovah and the Continental Congress."

Two days later Crown Point, just north of Ticonderoga, was also taken by the Americans. On May 16, St. John's across the Canadian border, was captured by Benedict Arnold and

his forces.

Even before Congress received news of the capture of Ticonderoga the members had decided that they must act to defend themselves against British forces. Therefore, on May 15, a resolution was adopted to put the colonies in a state of defense even though few had any idea yet of how that might be accomplished.

When the news of Ticonderoga arrived in Philadelphia on May 17 and the actions



Commencement Speaker

The Commencement Address at Capitan High School will be given by Dr. Eldred Harrington of Albuquerque, N.M.

The list of activities and accomplishments of Dr. Harrington is long indeed. He has earned about 700 semester hours of formal college credit and in the process has earned degrees in Civil Engineering, Geology, Secondary Education, Physical Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics. He has a Ph.D. in Physical Chemistry.

Major activities in New Mexico alone have been head of the Science Department, Albuquerque High School, 1930-1934; Director of Secondary Education for the Albuquerque Public Schools, 1934-1936; Instructor in Albuquerque Academy since 1936; taught in all of the state colleges and universities of New Mexico, teaching fields have been in Civil Engineering, Geology, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, and Education.

Positions in Engineering in New Mexico have been with Sandia Corporation, Santa Fe Railway, New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology. Dr. Harrington was chosen as Engineer of the Year for New Mexico in 1963. He is a free-lance writer with six text books and five historical volumes, and more than 250 magazine articles in print. He also writes some western stories under an assumed name.

Dr. Harrington has been associated with a number of firsts in education. One was the Dawn Patrol which was a class of students who met at 5:30 a.m. for additional work in their classes.

Another first was a tutoring

service that he started in 1924. It is unusual on three counts: it meets at unusual times (5 a.m.); it has been going on for 46 years; and it is free. To date more than 700 people have been a part of this program.


