## Commissioners redistrict Lincoln County

The Lincoln County Commissioners, by an unanimous vote, Friday approved redistricting Lincoln County, for voting purposes, to comply with the "one man, one vote" law to become effective July 1.

Commissioner W. A. Hart moved the adoption of redistricting, according to the lines on the accompanying map, with the second by Commissioner J. O. (Bud) Payne.

Under redistricting, Township 11, Range 13 East (Ruidoso) will be District III (Commissioner Hart). Commissioner Payne's District II was increased to include Township 10, Range 13 East

(Alto and Angus) with Commissioner Nunez's District I adding Township 9, Range 13 East (Nogal) and Township 11, Range 14 East (Hollywood and Ruidoso Downs).

The commission adopted divisional lines that followed township boundaries, in preference to adhering strictly to hard-to-define boundaries that would have given a more even voter distribution.

Prior to Friday's action, according to the July 1, 1974 census estimate, the population was: District I, 2,216; District II, 3,050 and District III, 3,150.

Under redistricting, the approximate population distribution will be: District I, 2,600; District II, 2,800 and District III, 3,000, totaling about 8,400.

Redistricting was indicated due to Ruidoso's estimated 44% population increase since 1970, with Ruidoso Downs' increase being pegged at 22%, to cause an imbalance in the voting population; with the redistricting increasing the number of voters to be served by commissioners of Districts I and II and putting the voter representation in District III at the approximate level of the other two, while maintaining township lines as boundaries.

Ms. Nancy Knight, president of the Carrizozo Municipal Hospital Board, on behalf of the board, notified the commission that plans to re-open the Carrizozo hospital have been abandoned due to financial problems.

Ms. Knight then announced that it was the hospital board's decision to open a community Health Care Delivery System (HCDS) that would include 36 beds for care of ambulatory patients, an emergency room with laboratory and X-Ray and two beds for overnight intensive care.

Leslie Olson, county manager, noted that a "one time investment" of between \$22,500 and \$28,500 would provide doctor's offices, emergency room facilities to operate as a diagnostic and treatment center, ambulance service and, if necessary, shuttle service for prescriptions.

Figures presented to the commission indicates that operating HCDS at 85% capacity would produce revenues of \$201,960, based on a \$550 per month patient charge. Expenses of \$134,948 in salaries, \$7,894 in Social Security, \$32,850 for food and \$15,050 for operations were estimated to

leave HCDS with, Olson said, "Approximately \$10,000 per year" that could be funneled into improvements and additions.

"After this facility is operational," Ms. Knight said, "the board might not be interested in a subsidy." She added that the board was requesting direct financial support this year for the one time expenses to open the new community medical service. She noted that a survey disclosed a potential of over 4,000 persons could be served in HCDS's medical trade area.

Commissioner Hart moved, seconded by Commissioner Payne, to leave the \$25,000 in the budget earmarked for the facility. Ms. Knight then went on record as requesting a concession "an open door for more money" should the need arise, with the commissioners taking no action on her request.

Olson announced that Bob Frankalucci, chief of the NM Licensing Division of Santa Fe, would inspect the existing facilities this week, after which "We'll have a go or no go on opening the HCDS." Olson added, "We think that 85% capacity is taking the conservative approach", in indicating that HCDS would operate successfully.

In other action the commission:

—Deferred action on a request by Dr. Ernst Steinhoff of the NM Research Institute of Alamo for \$3,750 that, Commissioner Payne said was "budgeted but not appropriated", for a continuing study of coal and water resources and development in Lincoln County.

—Accepted a contract amendment from Transwestern Pipeline Co., of Roswell, deleting the word "snow" from maintenance of the road through Capitan Gap to the radio transmitter site.

—Approved, as an emergency purchase, the expenditure of \$750 for tax receipt forms, "To permit," Olson said, "the treasurer to work on tax receipts without delay."

—Approved a \$30 membership in the Interstate Association of Public Land Counties.

—Took no action, due to lack of cost figures, on a request by the Ruidoso Hondo Valley General Hospital for 1,325 square yards of black topping

for a parking area including 100 square yards for a helicopter pad.

—Tabled a funding request from the hospital at Ruidoso for \$22,500 plus \$8,000 as interest to meet note payments as the present one-half of a three-quarter mill levy doesn't produce the required amount.

—Approved installation of a second sump pump in the courthouse basement in the amount of \$300.

—Approved payment of \$168 for culvert material.

—Granted Paul Payton \$500 towards printing a county brochure, with Nunez moving and Payne seconding, "If we can find the money."

—Deferred action on a request from the Carrizozo Community Association of the Performing Arts that the county purchase the Lyric Theatre for two payments of \$4,000, one in 1975 and the second in 1976.

—Following a closed door personnel discussion, approved the hiring of new employees at recommended salaries, including Rafael Romero as criminal investigator at \$700 per month and Chuck Rominger, as Appraiser III, at \$774 per month. The appointment of Romero Klein as probate appraiser had previously been approved.


—Approved a subdivision change in Gavilan Canyon, sought by Aubrey Dobbs, to redraw a plat to include 20 feet of right of way.

—Approved an increase in boarding fees from \$3 to \$5 for boarding "all other than county prisoners" in the Lincoln County Jail.

—Appointed Tommy Perrett of Ruidoso and Pat Rooney of Ruidoso Downs to the county Planning and Zoning Commission and declared the seat held by Hugh Stiles to be vacant.

—Ordered the county road department to immediately install adequate traffic control signs on Gavilan Road.

—Authorized county manager Olson and environmentalist Brown Edwards to negotiate the acquisition of landfill sites with Hart noting that "after July 1 the county must pass an ordinance creating a landfill department." Olson and Edwards were also authorized to prepare a master plan for developing a landfill system.



## Burglars in Ruidoso are getting their day in court

The Ruidoso PD Criminal Investigation Department, with the cooperation of interested citizens and the Patrol Division, has been making life interesting for burglars bungling their burgle in Ruidoso, beginning with starting out a morning before Magistrate Austin Pritchett in Magistrate's Court, after which they are given the opportunity to view the facilities of Lincoln County Jail from the inside.

"with a free hand under the direction of Chief Paul Lukens," have been instrumental in solving several burglaries here.

"It is only through the cooperation of the chief," Jarvis said, "and the help of private citizens and our patrol division, that CID is functioning so effectively and, with this continued cooperation, we'll do an even better job."

The gist of recent solved burglaries, as reported to The News by Lt. Russell and Det. Jarvis: Sitzmark Chalot—Warrants have been issued for John P. McShane on embezzlement of a vehicle and writing hot checks. "Mrs. Miranda loaned him a vehicle," Jarvis said, which was not returned but was recovered in Steamboat, Colo. In due time McShane will have his day in court.

Perteet-Parks—Office on Hwy. 37. John Youse Jr., and Randall O. Cecil broke in through the front door and removed expensive items including a TV, adding machines and a movie camera. A citizen noted something suspicious transpiring in a local trailer court, called the PD and at the scene the two men, armed, surrendered peacefully. Both were convicted and are now on parole.

Hollywood Lumber—Juan Gamboa has been through the courts on several charges including stealing a truck. Lt. Russell has been in Presidio, Tex., in connection with warrants pending on other suspects and to arrange extradition proceedings. May 8 Gamboa, after being returned to Lincoln County by Russell, received a suspended one-to-five year sentence on auto

theft and was placed under one year's probation. Two other charges were dropped.

Residential burglary—Vernon Simmons was jailed, on evidence compiled by Jarvis, on charges of theft of credit cards, fraudulent use of credit cards and residential burglary. Simmons broke into the Newton residence on Meander Drive, removed the credit cards from a purse and then used them at Cordova's and Hollywood Inn.

Residential burglary—May 20 patrol officers Lt. M. L. Simon and Patrolman Richard Coons were alerted, through a

citizen's phone call, that a possible burglary was in progress at the Gene Horn residence.

The officers saw candlelight through a window and apprehended an adult and two juveniles at the scene. Items stolen in a previous burglary were recovered from a pickup parked near the Horn residence, taken from the Van Witt residence. The adult, L. J. Hazel, after being confronted with the evidence, rendered a statement of confession to Jarvis, including admissions of guilt on other burglaries. Hazel has had his day in court. "In this case,"

Jarvis said, "the patrol officers made a good arrest, or I'd have had nothing to work with."

In another CID action, Lt. Russell with Lt. Guy Bowers and Chief Lynn Martin of Ruidoso Downs PD, and NMSP officers Sgt. Jack Johnson and Patrolmen Ken Waller and Jeff Darden, apprehended Douglas Elmore King, Donald Keith Phillips and Pat Stevenson in the Hollywood Inn, on warrants issued in Gaines Co., Tex., on the attempted theft of approximately \$30,000 worth of new oil field pipe. The three were individually charged with theft of over \$10,000 and

conspiracy shortly after their capture May 20 and the trio was taken to Lincoln County Jail May 21.

Chief Paul Lukens, in noting the success of the CID in these cases, said to The News, "While it is impossible for our PD to stamp out burglaries, it couldn't be done if we had a force of 1,000 officers, we can, if we get the cooperation of the people here, make good arrests that will result in jail time, and it won't take long for the word to get around that burglaries are a risky business in Ruidoso because that's how the grapevine operates and in giving the CID a free hand, we'll keep making good arrests and that's the name of the game."

## Easy Six grabs Kansas Derby win

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N. M. — Easy Six, a colt who's turned into quite a cash register for the S. B. Burnett Estate of Fort Worth, added another gold chunk to his account with a thin victory in Sunday's Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The chestnut colt, guided by James Breyer, led from start-to-finish in the 400-yard scramble over a purse of \$72,250. But Easy Six was under pressure all the way and held off the fast-closing Mongo Jet by a nose.

Get-Swinging tossed a mighty salvo in the final yards and was moving at a rapid clip when he hit the wire. The winner collected \$36,125 and handed out \$6.20 to win, \$4.60 to place and \$3.60 to show. This pushed his career bankroll up to \$160,500. H. Don Farris was the winning trainer.

Nicodemus as a 12-1 outsider, ended up a nose out of the place slot and returned \$4.20. Third yielded a paycheck of \$7,225. Get-Swinging is owned by Anne and B. F. Phillips, Jr. of Frisco, Texas.

It was quite an afternoon for the Ruidoso management as a hefty crowd of 7,570 turned out for the 12-race program and pushed a solid \$432,576 through the mutual equipment. Indicative of the interest of the Derby was the fact the event attracted an excellent handle of \$45,772. The holiday crowd couldn't

pick a standout favorite in the classy Derby field, and finally launched Easy Six at a little over 2-1. Mongo Jet, the top qualifier, was just under 3-1.

Easy Six got away quickly from the rail post, but he appeared to be sliding into hot water when he drifted toward the middle of the track. The lateral movement didn't take much speed out of his early strides and he found himself a half-length to the good when he zipped over the half-way point.

Mongo Jet didn't have any real excuses at the break, but

he was perhaps a split-second off stride. It took a little while for the colt to find overdrive, but when he got in gear he took off like a shot. In the final 50 yards or so, he came on like gangbusters.

But Easy Six, moving like a champion, plainly refused to toss in the towel and held on for all he was worth. That final determination appeared to make the difference. The colt remained on course for the second half of the race.

Six Six covered the distance in a brisk headwind clocking of 20.37 seconds. Swift Chino

ook, a 36-1 outsider, slipped badly on the first jump, just about dug his nose into the turf, and was wiped out of contention.

Here's how the also-rans checked in: 4th — I Can Go, earning \$5,057; 5th — Lit and She's A Go (deadheat), each earning \$3,251; 7th — Velox Man, \$2,167; 8th — Tex Oh, \$1,445; 9th — Shesaruler, \$722; 10th — Swift Chino, \$722.

The co-feature at 870 yards went to the perennial sprint champ, Norgor. The eight-year-old gelding, ridden by Willie Lovell, ended a long

vacation and came through with a galloping 274-length lead. He paid \$4.20 as the people's choice.

An unfortunate aspect of the race was the fact the stakes sprinter, Wit N Wisdom, broke down during the backstretch run. He was taken off the track by the horse ambulance.

**25 YEARS AGO**

After leaving the oil fields, where her husband was a drilling contractor, to move to Ruidoso where he was an insurance salesman for High Country Agency at his retirement about a year ago, Mrs. Mosley "found the rapport with the faculty excellent, different, enjoyable and I decided to stay with teaching."

In Mrs. Mosley's opinion, "The present educational trends are an improvement, much better than previously, over when I started here. The students are freer to say what

they think, and I don't know whether that's good or not, but it's working out and that's the important thing."

Of her three children, two are teachers, Beth Hogan in Seminole, Okla., and Joe in Richland Community College, Dallas. A daughter, Sue Mosley, is employed with a Dallas insurance firm.

"I returned to teaching in Lubbock, after all those years," she said, "because there was an opening for a substitute teacher and as I'd just received my BA, I jumped at the chance. The teacher I was to substitute for quit and I was called on for full time and I've been at it ever since."

And now, as June 6 approaches, Mrs. Mosley isn't too sure about joining her husband "In his gardening and yard" activities, but, she's re-finished "a piece or two of furniture", during the past years, "and I've a few pieces I'd like to do, with my problem being, I'm not certain if it will prove to be a hobby or a chore."

Mrs. Mosley was wearing a silver and turquoise necklace Friday morning, a gift of appreciation from faculty members attending a coffee in her honor Thursday and her guest-of-honor corsage was being proudly worn at her left shoulder and she was concentrating on her teaching duties, answering and asking questions — except for the occasional moments, between dealing with students or her subject, when she seemed to have other things on her mind — like, maybe, Midland, and Bill and retirement.



**Information available for IRS retirement plan**

Agreement forms for starting an individual retirement account with financial institutions such as a bank, a savings and loan association, or a Federally-insured credit union are available from Internal Revenue Service offices, Arturo A. Jacobs, IRS District Director for New Mexico, said today.

As a result of recent legislation, generally all employees not covered by a pension or retirement plan can contribute to an individual retirement savings program and deduct from gross income up to \$1,500 a year, or 15 percent of their compensation, whichever is less. The money can be put into various investments such as a savings account, mutual funds, or special U.S. Individual Retirement Bonds, Mr. Jacobs said.

Persons requesting agreement forms from the IRS should ask for Form 5305 for setting up a trust account, or Form 5305A for a custodial account. "Once an individual has the forms," Mr. Jacob said, "he or she should take them to a financial institution where this type of account can be established and the necessary agreement concluded.

"Because this is a retirement fund," Mr. Jacobs said, "your savings, generally, remain on deposit until you reach age 59 1/2 when you can withdraw either the entire amount or begin to receive periodic payments without penalties." Mr. Jacobs continued: When withdrawn, the money becomes taxable but you probably would be in a much lower tax bracket.

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**Attorney General issues warning**

A warning has been issued by the Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's Office for consumers, especially elderly residents owning older homes, not to hire a group of individuals who may be traveling through New Mexico soliciting business door-to-door to waterproof roofs, driveways, foundations and basements with an aluminum spray-on substance.

Mrs. Beverly G. Ortiz, Director, issued the warning after receiving word from the Iowa Attorney General's Office that four members of this group were arrested this week for violating the Iowa Door-to-Door Sales Act.

The four, Leo Frank, 33, Miami, Florida; John Frank, 39, Sharon Hill, Pennsylvania; Steven Mitchell, 24, and Peter Alex Mitchell, 28, no address; pleaded guilty. They were fined \$500 each, given a thirty day suspended sentence provided they leave Iowa by "sundown," and ordered to make restitution to their customers, according to Iowa Assistant Attorney General Douglas R. Carlson.

Carlson said he has reason to believe that the group, numbering about 300, has dis-

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
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


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

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**Inside The Capital**

SANTA FE—A Construction Industries Commission investigative unit cracked down on unlicensed contracting in New Mexico, especially in border cities.

CIC Executive Director John Block said the problem was especially severe along the East Side—Hobbs, Portales, Clovis, Eunice and Jal. A new, 4-member investigative unit filed charges of unlicensed contracting and trades work in Belen and Albuquerque. CIC Deputy Executive Director Harrison Smith says: "We're going to cover the whole state. We will be in areas with most construction in them first."

Public School Finance Director Harry Wugalter says school districts with low pupil-teacher ratios are hiring more employees with new state money despite declining enrollments.

Among them are House, Logan, Roy, Mosquero, Mora, Floyd, Vaughn, Springer, East Las Vegas and others. Besides, Wugalter says, school districts have not previously included unassigned teachers—band, music, resource room and physical education—and federally-funded teachers to compute pupil-teacher ratios.

Wugalter is requiring the 88 New Mexico school districts to include all instructional personnel to compute pupil-teacher ratios for the first time. He says pupil-teacher ratios are dropping dramatically because of use of new state money to hire more employees. The 1975 Legislature voted \$30 million more for schools in basic state support.

Five Ojo Caliente School District parents complained to the State Education Board against the Ojo Caliente School Board and administration. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Proctor, Mrs. Ruby Gallegos and Mrs. Lisa Torres of El Rito and Mrs. Gail Carroll of Ojo Caliente ticked off a long list of complaints. They said they were not allowed to speak at Ojo Caliente Board meetings unless they were on the agenda five days in advance.

The State Education Dept. has sent a 15-member team into the Ojo Caliente District more than 30 man hours in the present school year to try to solve problems. A steering committee of parents, teachers, students and administrators was formed. It has met regularly.

Picacho rancher Joe Skeen, the 1974 Republican governor candidate, is looking closely at a 1976 U. S. Senate race. Skeen lost by only 3,742 votes last year to Democratic Gov. Jerry Apodaca.

Our soundings of Republican leaders recently showed Skeen is their odds-on choice to oppose U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya next year. Montoya, a Santa Fe Democrat, is already campaigning hard for another term.

Taos Town Administrator Nestor Gallegos says the new federal revenue sharing allotment reduced Taos' share from \$56,000 to \$51,897. Gallegos asked Local Government Chief Al Romero to look into the \$4,103 cut. Gallegos gave the proposed Taos 1975-76 budget to Romero. A hearing is set on the budget June 30 in Taos.

Gallegos says Taos proposes two paved parking lots at combined cost of \$255,000.

Kent Nowling Construction Inc., Albuquerque, was low bidder on two Union County US-56 projects totaling 10.265 miles. Bids were \$2,029,884 on 5.265 miles and \$1,698,677 on 5 miles east of the Colfax-Union County line. Both apparent low bids were below engineers' estimates.

State general fund revenues in April dipped below projections for the third successive month. April collections totaled \$40.1 million, up 7.6 per cent over \$37.29 million in April last year but below the estimate of \$42.2 million. But the state general fund gain for July-April was 16.1 per cent, slightly more than the 15.4 per cent increase expected for the entire fiscal year ending June 30.

The State Game and Fish Department said public hunting and fishing on the Costilla Grant ended Saturday. A Game and Fish Department agreement with owners of the 89,000-acre grant to permit hunting and fishing on the land expired.

The state agency is negotiating with the grant owner, Rio Costilla Cooperative Livestock Assn., to renew the agreement. Located in Taos County, the grant includes the nine high country Latir Lakes and other lakes and creeks. It was also a popular deer and elk hunting area.

Changes in scheduled public school budget hearings were announced. The revised schedule: Taos County—Ojo Caliente and Taos, June 18; Pecos and Questa, June 19, all at Taos.

The State Hospitals-Institutions Department plans to spend \$1.3 million voted by the legislature for plant deficiencies. Among planned sprinkler system improvements are Fort Stanton, \$100,000; Los Lunas Hospital and Training School, \$60,000; Fort Bayard, \$430,000, and New Mexico State Hospital, Las Vegas, \$450,000. Alarm system improvements are also scheduled.

U. S. Sen. Montoya says he may hold hearings in Clovis to muster support in an uphill battle to get two highway segments on the federal interstate system—US-70 from Amarillo via Clovis, Tularosa, Roswell and Portales to Alamogordo and US-54 between Alamogordo and El Paso.

Eleanor Hampson of Colfax County was named to the new state Republican executive committee which met Saturday in Albuquerque.

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


Then, all of a sudden, he has voided military commitments to small nations in trouble.

The thing which most miffs us is: (1) The American lives lost in Vietnam were WASTED; and (2) The South Vietnamese who befriended us are either homeless or dead.

The United States must de-

cide on one policy and stick with it! It's downright stupid to get involved in a brush war, make commitments to that nation, waste our young men's lives and our finances, then pull out and allow the communies to take over. Victorious North Vietnamese were riding through the streets of Saigon in American jeeps.

You never enter a game playing by the other man's rules!

This no-win, defensive battle is naive. If we get involved, let's do so with planes and bombs. If not, let's stay home!

From the time Presidents Eisenhower and Kennedy committed us to "aid" South Vietnam until that nation's fall to total communism last week — through the administrations of Presidents Johnson, Nixon and Ford — our policy has been one of constant change. Do we know today whether our official position is "world policeman" or "isolationist"?

Did the United States suffer a defeat in Vietnam? Perhaps! Certainly we did not win a military victory.

Confidence in our leadership was shaken. It was a costly experience, in lives of our young men, in wounded and suffering, in national morale and from an economic standpoint.

But what if the U.S. had won the "battle of Vietnam"? A friendly government would be in power today, one which would have required our economic and military support from here on, since it is

### BICENTENNIAL NOTEBOOK



#### Donald Whisenhunt

During the last week in May two hundred years ago, a message sent by Massachusetts to Arthur Lee, its agent in London, was circulated widely throughout Great Britain. This document described the events at Lexington and Concord on April 19.

The news of this event shocked England and created mixed reactions. Friends of the colonies were dismayed that blood had been shed. Several military officers resigned their commissions rather than to face the possibility of service in America where they might be forced to fight their countrymen.

On the other hand, those who had taken a hard line against the Americans were convinced by the events of Lexington and Concord that their original judgements had been correct. As far as they were concerned the Americans were rebels who would have to be handled with force. It would have to be done quickly and decisively.

In the meantime, on May 25 British reinforcements arrived in Boston with Generals Howe, Burgoyne, and Clinton in command. Such new forces would provide the manpower, so the hardliners thought, to force the Americans into submission if they did not come to their senses soon.

During the latter part of May, the Continental Congress also made its first decision about Canada. Even though the way had been opened into Canada by the military victories earlier in the month, Congress decided not to pursue a military course to bring Canada into the newly-forming union.

Instead, on May 29 Congress approved an address to the people of Canada asking them to join the Americans as "fellow sufferers" of British tyranny. Later Congress would reverse itself and decide on an attempt to take Canada militarily only to face defeat in the venture.

Meanwhile in New Mexico, Spanish Governor Mendinueta was continually concerned about military defenses. As already noted earlier, he never had adequate weapons, horses, or soldiers to protect the residents properly. Therefore, he spent much time in futile chases in trying to recapture stolen property and in a vain attempt to punish the Plains Indians for their raids.

An example was the raid made on the pueblo of Nambe on May 27, 1775, by a party of sixty Comanches. They took two girls captive and carried off most of the horse herd. The two captives were rescued, but a two-day chase accomplished little more than the regaining of a few horses.

Such were the frustrations of life in New Mexico for Spaniard and Pueblo alike.

MONTEZUMA, CALIF., LEDGER: "It was discouraging, even for optimists, when the United States wrote off a few billion dollars 'loaned' to India to feed the starving people, and even more discouraging when Madame Ghandi (the peacemaker) used the money to develop an atomic bomb. People wondered, 'Why can't we have charity begin at home?'" Well, in a way we have. Recent dispatches have it that Spiro Agnew has agreed to pay the government \$1,100 in settlement for \$175,000 in improvements made to his home in Kenwood, Maryland, while he was Vice President. Feel better...?"

#### The Sacredness of Motherhood

Henry J. Taylor, the brilliant columnist, wrote a beautiful article which was presented to the world two days before Mother's Day. In this inspired writing, Mr. Taylor brought home to us the sacredness of Motherhood.

The divine quality of Motherhood can be seen and felt all through life whether in the birds nesting near the house, or the creatures of the fields and the wilderness.

This time of year it is an inspiration and a joy that grows with the years to little new-born calves following their mothers along the hillsides, or the two lying quietly together in the shade beneath a pinon tree on a little flat half-way up the hillside.

Cows are such wonderful mothers, and the calves such good little children.

**The Calf Hospital**  
Just south east of the house here on what I call Sun-Rise Hill there is a little flat half-way up the mountain where many of the little calves come into the world. You might call this spot a calf hospital. Here with God's help the beautiful little creatures, such a delightful tiny copy of their mothers, with their bright eyes first behold the light of day.

These little flats are not too far from water, so that the mother can go back and forth to the calf, not leaving the little creatures too long while she stays hid under a bush. The mothers know how to hide them so well that you can walk by them within a few feet and never know they are there. The little fellows know how to hide, and their mothers have somehow, with one gentle loving call, told them to lie still — or in an extreme emergency to let out a cry for help which will bring the mothers running.

These calf hospitals also offer many an escape route for mother and calf: up hill, down hill or off to the sides. And it is located in a place where other cattle are grazing all around, so that the calf may run to one of the other cows until its mother can come back.

Often times on these little "Half-way grounds" half way up the mountain you may see one of the most charming sights in the world: several little calves lying asleep or dozing together under a tree, while one cow lies near by watching, from time to time, turning its head looking and sniffing in different directions.

**Little "Snow Flake Junior"**  
**The First Calf**

There is a favorite young cow here on the place that I call "Snow Flake" because she is black with a white spot on her forehead resembling a snow flake, and also because she was born amidst a snow storm.

This is being written on Monday, May the twelfth. Yesterday evening I saw the whole herd winding up the trail to the calf hospital. I had seen Snow Flake several days before with her new born calf, the first for this year.

Day after day passed and I did not see them, and could not help but worry, though I should have known better.

How happy I was then to see Snow Flake's familiar face among the pinon and cedar tree trunks going up the trail, followed by a tiny exact copy of herself.

Shady Logan, the Storm

Ranch Collie, wagged his tail and grinned his Coyote grin at the sight. A strange thing is that the mothers of new born calves are gun-shy of Shady Logan. They do not want him to get too close to their calves. Shady knows this and keeps his distance.

And yet the little calves are not the least bit afraid of Shady. Little "Snow Flake Junior" a handsome little bull, stopped in his tracks and looked calmly over towards us out of his beautiful amber-colored eyes. Then he walked straight over to Shady.

A first calf is lonesome for little calf play-mates, and the little first calf acted as though he thought Shady was a calf like himself. The calf seemed to say,

"Whoever you are, I am glad to see you." After a bit, his mother gave a gentle call, and little Snow Flake Junior turned and went on up the trail.

**Unusual Beauty of the Oak Brush This Season**

This is the greenest Spring I have ever seen here in the Vale. And the oak brush on the hillsides is in its spring glory.

After following the cows half way up the hill, Shady and I began to pick our way down the steep trail. By now it was dusk, and White Mountain and all the horizon was outlined in gold. On the side of Sunrise Mountain, as we walked down the trail, the cedar and pinon branches were all in the shaded colors of night time. But the Oak Brush growing in between the trees was brightly lit as it caught the half-light of the sun which still lingered high in the sky. The delicate oak brush leaves transparent and glowing were like countless little evening lanterns guiding the way down the hill.

**The Purple Yard**

In this once-in-a-lifetime Spring season, all the plant life is in great strength and beauty. Ferns which usually grow a foot high are already three feet.

The purple wild verbena, a pride and joy among flowers of the Southwest, is unusually plentiful, colorful and fragrant this year.

The yard here about the house is covered with its glorious purple. You can lie down on your side and look along the tops of these flowers, meanwhile inhaling the fragrance, and you are cast into a spell of dreaming that you are in a world of purple and the foot-high flowers are a forest of towering purple-flowering trees.

Spend all the time you can out doors, and each day will bring new inspiration during this glorious Spring time.
