## Disaster defense project for county nearing completion

In the event of a disaster in the heavily populated townships in Lincoln County — with disaster being broken down into four components: fire, civil disorder, natural disaster and search and rescue — there's a plan to cope.

Reason I'm so smart is: I've been eavesdropping during meetings of the Disaster Defense Task Force (DDTF) — a concerned group that has been meeting nearly every Friday evening the past fourteen months.

Every organization must have its mainstays . . . and in this one it's Bill Seelbach, chairman; Ron Strassburg, Virginia Spall of the Red Cross, Bob Wagenfehr and Ranger Ray Page of the Forest Service and Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul M. Lukens. And who takes the notes . . . completes them . . . writes letters . . . et cetera? Mrs. Paul (Judy) Lukens. Of whom Seelbach says, "Without Judy and the countless hours she devotes to our program, we wouldn't even have it off the ground."

To date this group has compiled a listing of telephone numbers of everyone in Lincoln County who would be called into service in the event of disaster — any, or all, of the four. And they've got radio communications lined up that you wouldn't believe . . . they can blanket New Mexico's "official" radio frequencies instantly . . . they can summon help from several states. It's fantastic. The contact list includes law enforcement, fire department, US and State Forest, Mesquero Apache Reservation, utilities and citizen's band radio personnel. Why, they have people on this emergency list that they might not have known could do a job for them until just a few months ago.

With some variations, the basic operation includes a command center, field staff, communications center, law enforcement, evacuation, medical aid and sustenance

and an identification system that will permit authorized personnel access to any disaster area.

The fire plan was unveiled Wednesday and, with the exception of clearing up a few loose ends on the communications system, is 100% complete . . . and, in the event of fire, forest or otherwise, could be augmented immediately.

The other three segments — natural disaster, search and rescue and civil disorder — are in the final wrap up stage. All that remains is to go over the plans with a fine tooth comb . . . microscope . . . common sense . . . and polish 'em up a bit, then wrap 'em up.

Wrappin' 'em up consists of getting the information assembled into booklet form . . . put into books . . . and ready for distribution . . . with this to be accomplished by late fall.

This plan concerns the Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs - Alto - Ski Area and the like?

No!

This plan is being developed for all of Lincoln County and the MAT reservation . . . and representatives of DDTF will . . . soon . . . be contacting concerned citizens in each of the communities in the county . . . and they'll show them they have a workable disaster plan . . . and that each community can tie into it . . . become a part thereof . . . and give and receive help as needed.

Due to the radio communications situation . . . with the Smokey Bear Ranger District, Lincoln County Sheriff and Ruidoso PD officers being the only available 24-hour-a-day operations . . . the initial plan was developed with the Carrizozo-Ruidoso area, as the nucleus to test its fitness and application . . . and . . . way these folks figure . . . if it'll work out here . . . it'll work out anywhere.

For example . . . in the event of forest fire . . . this group has figured out every possible escape route . . . every possible access route for fire fighting equipment and personnel . . . and every possible point for traffic control.

They know the plan'll work . . . they've been picking the best brains in the county and state . . . and each and every phase . . . and, they've had cooperation you wouldn't have dreamed possible.

Why? 'Cause they've got something . . . something these holders of important positions could ascertain immediately . . . and once they'd grasped the essence of the plan . . . they got to work on their contributions to this effort.

You see . . . there's been hundreds of people . . . people who know their business . . . people with answers . . . involved . . . and they've spent many meetings discussing just . . . say . . . control of electrical power . . . how to cut it off and in . . . where . . . when. Same procedure for all phases. It's fantastic.

Why, the scope of the overall DDTF plan boggles the mind.

DDTF is lined up like a battle plan . . . with as little being left to chance as is humanly possible . . . and the DDTF'ers aren't sitting back on their duffs, waiting to be congratulated . . . they're keeping right on plowing into their problems . . . repeatedly concentrating on minute details as well as major steps . . . polishing . . . revising . . . compiling . . . and . . . by fall, in the event of disaster . . . they'll be a plan to follow . . . to cope with the disaster . . . to keep loss of life and property at a minimum!

The responsibility to be assumed by many of the persons to be pressed into service in the event of a disaster is difficult to comprehend . . . but each has stepped forward . . . guaranteeing to do the best possible job in the least possible time.

And one day maybe . . . Capitan . . . Carrizozo . . . down in the valley in the sprawling flats . . . or high up in the mountains . . . wherever . . . disaster will be minimized because of the planning accomplished by the members of DDTF.

## 'Water Users' list 'beefs'

Over 100 users of water in the Ruidoso Valley met Thursday night, June 12, in the Hondo Gymnasium, to discuss the adjudication of water rights on the Ruidoso stream system, in response to a call by Orlando Lucero, of San Patricio.

Jim Tulley, Glencoe, chaired the meeting, assisted by Bill Shreeengost, Lincoln. Shreeengost was there, by request, to give what information he could as a result of experience in the adjudication of the Bonito, as proceedings were started there first.

Most of the concern was that the thirty-day period given by the State Engineer for an answer by a water user did not allow sufficient time to make a legal protest, and that the water rights had been cut to 2 1/2 acre feet.

Mr. Tulley advised he had called the Roswell office and been referred to the Santa Fe office; where he was given a commitment by the Special Assistant Attorney General for the State Engineer Office, Richard Simms, that the thirty day period allowed for filing a protest would be waived. Mr. Tulley also said he had been told there would be no measuring devices, and amount of acreage will be corrected, if the hydrographic survey is in error.

The group voted to reactivate the Ruidoso Water User's Association, which was originally formed in 1916, and has been active at intervals since. There was some confusion about the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley. It was explained that the

Ruidoso stream system is entirely separate from the Hondo, which begins where the Bonito and Ruidoso join.

Jim Tully was elected President of the Association; Harry Bonnell, V. President; James Sanchez, Secretary.

## Longshot wins Kansas Futurity

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N. M. — Chick's Deck, a medium-priced longshot, expertly ridden by Richard Bickel for G. R. Russell of El Paso, came out of the gate like a shot and elicited an easy victory in Sunday's 25th running of the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The first leg of the Triple Crown — televised live to a 14-state audience of some 6 1/2 million — ended with Chick's Deck clearly in command. The well-bred colt was a safe 1 1/2 lengths in top at the wire.

The Kansas, one of the richest quarter horse classics in the nation, packed a top heavy purse of \$406,646. First place came out to a thumping \$132,582. Jake Pletcher was the winning trainer.

Chick's Deck returned mutuels of \$21.30, \$18.20 and \$11.20 in the lucrative 350-yard scramble. He zipped over the course in 18.02 seconds — which was an improvement over the 18.16 clocking he recorded two weeks ago while racking up the sixth-best qualifying time.

Bugs Alive In 75, piloted by Jerry Burgess as an 8-5 favorite, ended up second and collected \$55,342. The betting prices were \$3.40 both to place and show. The classy colt, who accepted only the second defeat of his career, is owned by Ralph Shebestor of Wynnewood, Okla.

Mr. Breakthru, with Don Tyre at the helm, turned in a magnificent job while getting up for third. He was a head behind Bugs Alive at the wire. Mr. Breakthru is the property of Dr. H. D. and Margaret J.

Hall of Ada, Okla. The show payoff was \$4.60, and the third-place purse was a hefty \$25,879.

Jockey Bickel did an alet job of getting Chick's Deck off and flying. The colt grabbed an early lead and gradually fattened up his advantage. At the midway point of the sprint, Chick's Deck was clearly in command, still moving with authority. Bickel used the whip smartly to keep the pacemaker on his toes.

In the final yards, Bugs Alive In 75 was closing with a tremendous rush. He made up plenty of ground, but was unable to menace the winner. The latter still had plenty of zip in his stride as he flashed under the wire.

Bugs Alive In 75 got off to a troubled start, and there was plenty of bumping in the middle of the track. The Bug stumbled, and veered toward the outside. At the same time, Tall Cotton broke toward the inside. The result was a squeezing action which plainly victimized Go Fantacia, a 45-1 outsider. That just about cook-

ed the filly's goose.

Bugs Alive In 75, much to his credit, managed to pick himself and swung to the inside. Before he got rolling, he lost about two or three lengths. But he began picking up horses in quick order and was gaining with every long-reaching jump when he ran out of ground.

Here's the remaining order of finish, with purse-money earned: 5th — Girl O' My Dreams, \$14,731; 6th — Rain Onya, \$13,138; 7th — Easy Jet Doll, \$13,138; 8th — Rule The Roost, \$12,740; 9th — Send 'Er, \$11,944; 10th — Go Fantacia, \$11,148.



## Water improvement project is underway

According to Ruidoso Downs Mayor J. J. DiPaolo, construction on the \$200,000 village water improvement project is expected to be completed within 90 days by Burns Construction Company. Work on the acquisition of Denton Field well was begun last summer after the village experienced a severe water shortage and was forced to use the well to supplement water

from the village spring, that had previously been the only source of water for the village.

Financing for the project comes from an FHA loan of \$100,000 for the purchase of Denton Field and a portion of the new water storage facilities and distribution lines; an EIA grant of \$65,000; and a 4-Corners Commission grant of \$35,000.

In addition to the acquisition of Denton Field, two new storage tanks will be installed, the old tank cleaned and painted, additional water lines will be installed and also a pump to force water from the Denton Field well to the high storage tanks above the village.

Work is now underway by Village officials establishing additional claims to water rights from the Denton Field well.

The 10 acres acquired by the purchase of Denton Field will be used by the village as playgrounds, ball parks and other recreational activities.

Engineer for the water improvement project is Quentin Daniels of Alamogordo.

August is slated as the probable completion date of the project.

The Crisis Line board of directors is hoping to be able to continue service in the fall and will remain active.

## Village water service projects nearly done

Water users, in three troublesome areas in Ruidoso, will shortly receive an even, regular supply, thus ending a long period of pressure and volume problems, the village council was informed Thursday.

The Upper Canyon-Black Forest section, benefitting from the \$134,000 improvement project, will be serviced by the new 500,000 gallon storage tank, probably before the end of June. Chlorination of the storage tank and a few minor details are all that remain before this distribution service will be put into use.

Ponderosa Heights will, probably by mid-July, be receiving water through an eight-inch main from the 5,000,000 gallon storage tank on Alto Hill. The installation of a pressure reducing station, awaiting receipt of parts, will reduce the present 218 pounds to 125 pounds. The new line will provide water in addition to the present six-inch main from the Gavilan facility, Cherokee Village and Pine-

cliff are due to be hooked up to a 500,000 gallon storage tank by mid-July. Work on reconstructing the pumping system is nearing completion, after which the hook up will be affected.

With these new connections and service lines, the Village Water Dept. doubts that it will be necessary to use the Hollywood Well this summer, a situation, a spokesman noted, that is dependent upon the amount of rainfall received between now and fall.

On other matters, the council:

- Awarded Sierra Blanca Motors the contract to provide two vans for the Lincoln County Senior Citizens Center, on the low bid of \$11,864, subject to the approval of the NM Finance Office. Other bids were Gene Brock Fork, \$12,851.08 and S. W. Dodge Inc., \$12,172.70. The monies are available from Ruidoso's \$13,065 share of federal and state grants, with the local center being one of only 12 in New Mexico to qualify.

- Advised Atty. Mel O'Reilly, representing Bob Neergaard on the Second Supplement to Paradise Canyon Subdivision, that annexation would probably involve establishing a special assessment district to obtain water, sewer and paving.
- Approved a building control measure, submitted by Mike Mulholland, reading: "Before issuance of a commercial building permit, the applicant may be required to submit to the Architectural Advisory Committee of the Planning and Zoning Commission: (1) A plot plan of the proposed construction depicting the location of all proposed buildings, boundaries of proposed parking areas, and location of all existing trees of six inch of greater caliber. (2) Preliminary drawings of the proposed structure (s) showing all exterior elevations with a description of exterior materials and roofing material."

Excerpts from Milk and Honey

We were right in the edge of the beautiful little town of Bentonville, Arkansas. The streets were lined with tall trees and the yards full of just any kind of flowers. Our neighbors across the fence, Mr. and Mrs. Litrell had the most wonderful garden — tomatoes as large as saucers, on vines running up fence posts — beets just as large, under the broad leaves, veined with fuchsia — acres and acres of berries.

Which reminds me, one of my little friends and I undertook to can some beets. We gathered them, cut them up, packed them in cold water in glass jars, sprinkled a little sugar over the top, screwed the lids down tight and set them along the side of the wood shed so the sun could shine through them. They were very pretty and we were proud of our work; but several days later the jars started popping and Mr. Litrell thought someone was shooting at him. Finally when he ventured out he discovered what it was. Mother's jars were ruined and Mr. Litrell was minus some beets.

We soon made many new friends. Once they had a Sunday School picnic, and mother let my brother and I go. A long wagon with hay in the bed came for us. After mother telling us repeatedly not to go in any water, she waved us goodbye and we started down the mountain, to the picnic place by the stream.

After we arrived I noticed most of the other children brought old clothes to go swimming in. Every one was having so much fun, I just could not resist when the girls started begging me to go in with them. I had on three white frilly petticoats so I thought up a plan to pin one around my shoulders and one around my waist; then I still had one left to wear home under my dress. I just had not thought what I would do with the wet ones when I went home. I rolled the soiled petticoats up in a small bundle.

On arriving home I slipped upstairs with the bundle and hid it in the farthest corner of the closet, under the quilts. Now, as I have already mentioned, my mother is the smartest person, as well as being the most beautiful — which I will tell you about later. She seemed to know my petticoats were hid in the closet and ran across them in a few days. You can guess what happened; besides my white petticoats being badly stained with mildew and sandy creek water. They never were white again. Oh well, might as well start learning young that we have to pay for stolen pleasure.

One thing I have not mentioned: we lived near the railroad and enjoyed watching the trains go by. But there were plenty of hobos walking down the track too. We had some guineas and I loved to hear their 'pot-rack, pot-rack', but when a stranger came around the place, they would raise a terrible fuss. So, every time the guineas started 'squawking', mother would start preparing a plate of food, as most likely it would be a hobo asking for something to eat.

One day one came to the door and said he would chop wood for some food; but mother thought he looked rather thin, so she told him to eat first, then he would feel more like working. A few minutes later she looked out the window and the empty plate was setting on a stump, but the hobo was nowhere in sight, and no wood chopped. They never asked for anything but food.

Once we were on a picnic and discovered a recluse in a cave, or it was more of a protruding cliff. The old man had rolled stones in front of it, until he had a very nice shelter. There was an old ragged quilt hanging up in the doorway. Father seemed not to be afraid to go up and talk to him, but we children stayed behind always. He ask the old man what he did about food and would he not rather live among people? The man said, what was the use when the mountaineers would feed him and no one bothered him. He had a long white beard and was barefooted, with dirty ragged pants, legs torn off at the knees. I remember my younger brother thinking he was Rip Van Winkle, and ask father if he had just woke up. He had a long bladed knife and whittled all the time he talked.

Tradition has it, that Arkansas has some of the best whittlers in the world, and today, a little town has been 'dubbed' the 'Whittling Capital of America.' They never talk or try to make any kind of deal without whittling — never carve out anything — just strike a match to their pile of shavings when the pile gets too high. I guess that is why my grandfather enjoyed staying with us while we were there. He would take a daily walk down town and whittle with his cronies.



**Letter To Editor**

[Editor's note: The following letter to the editor was in a Conrad, Montana newspaper and was given to us by Newton Keck with a request to reprint it. We feel that there are several points well taken in the letter.]

Dear Sir:  
I think it is about time the common people of this country spoke up and said a few things about what should, and should not, be done by the government. I wonder how the President found the authority to bring these hundreds of thousands of refugees to this country? This man wasn't even elected by the people. We have given 56,000 young American lives and many more wounded for these people and for their country, and they raised soldiers who run off and leave a billion dollars worth of our equipment behind. They raped and robbed their own people on the transport ships getting out of there, and the corrupt politicians of their country took us for every dime we would give them . . . like charging the American planes to land with free rice for their own poor. The newsmen said, "Charging Santa Claus to land." Besides paying their men to fight, and the politicians demanding a rake-off from the soldier's pay. How can we even consider giving people like this refuge in this country? Were the people here asked if they would like to have 156,000 more on the welfare rolls? Do we feel that we owe them a living for the rest of their lives? Why should we give them food stamps, welfare, housing, and probably an education so they can compete for the few jobs there are? And all this in the midst of a fuel and energy crisis! These are the worthless pieces of humanity that wouldn't even fight for their own country, even with our equipment, men, and money. We helped to pay an army who trampled old people to death in their hurry to escape on the planes, and who ditched thousands of dollars worth of helicopters in the ocean. These are people with no honor, self-respect, decency, and they have no business in our country. They are also the ones who felt they could gain more by being on the side of the U. S. and working for us, or they would have been on the other side. How far does this charity go? We went far enough by bringing plane loads of orphans over here to support and care for. Many, many sick and diseased children that the "humanitarians" here were so anxious to run out and adopt. I think this was the biggest farce of a long time. These people could have helped some of the poor, and orphaned of our own country, if they had extra love and money, and were anxious to give it away. Somehow people have the idea that the people here don't seem to matter. There are thousands of our own children who need homes, and someone to care for them. These people could have taken in some of the unadoptable children, who are merely too old, or have been born with birth defects, or to unwed mothers. I think charity should begin at home, and not with a sickly Oriental. The children here are Americans, but they won't get the help or homes they need, because no newspaper will give the humanitarians a lot of publicity for helping them.

I think it is also time to stop importing more things besides people. I think the imports of foreign meat, when the cattle market is in the worst shape it's been for years, is traitorous toward our own people. I think the importing of foreign cars is something that should be stopped when the population of Detroit is out of work. I think the things stamped "made in Taiwan" and "made in Japan" should not be imported. And if they are, let's not buy them. I think it should be made an act of treason to send a trainload of coal to Japan for a "test burn" when we are in the middle of an energy crisis.

This morning's news report said that the Vietnamese had received many offers of land so they could begin farming . . . some more of the humanitarian policies of the people of America. How many poor people here would like to have a few acres of land to raise something to eat on? I didn't notice any free land being offered to our own people.

I think our "give-away" programs should be brought to a screeching halt. It's about time we began to help our own people. If we spent just a little of what we spend on foreign aid to aid our own we would have a pretty well-fed bunch of people living in the rat-infested slums. I wonder how many little children we have right here who are hungry? No one really knows, or cares, and I think the people who adopted all the Orientals should start their caring right here at home. I am willing to bet that they have friends or neighbors that could use a helping hand, and that they had orphan children within 500 miles of their own home they could have helped. Why not help out an American for a change?

I feel that the politicians who make decisions like this, make them because they know it will never affect them personally, in any way. They will never have to deal with them, or live with them, or even pay taxes to support them. Why

not ask the people in California, Florida and Arkansas if they would like to have them there, to support, and live around? Why couldn't it be their decision? They are really the ones who will have to deal with living with these worthless pieces of humanity, who have no honor, self-respect, or dignity. I think it's about time one man quit making all the decisions for all the people. How does he even know what they want? He had no legal right to import these people, and I wonder how the people of this country can even begin to stop it.

Why can't we stop this? We are the ones who pay the taxes, and pay the politicians to represent us. Don't we have anything to do with it except pay through the nose for everything they decide to do? I think it is time we did.

This is the time to stop the imports of all the worthless junk, including people. I think

56,000 American lives was enough to give them, and I don't feel we owe them any more.





**The Wanderings of Home Made Fiddle**  
One of the treasurers of my life is the beautiful and sweet-toned fiddle made practically with his bare hands by the wonderfully gifted artist in wood, Joe Graham.

I have been practicing with this fiddle quite a bit, but I began to wonder if I need some help in getting started right, holding the instrument correctly and so on. So Shady and I went up to see our friend of many years, Marie Rooney, who is a great singer and violinist. Here we had a grand visit with the Rooney family, and Marie showed me some valuable pointers in violin playing and we went our way

happily on up the creek. A few days before this I was talking to our good friend, Mr. George Fredin, who is the desk clerk at the Chaparral. I told Mr. Fredin that he was a very sunshiny fellow and that he always gave me a lift, and that folks like him are valuable in the world. Mr. Fredin said,

"Let me give you something," and with that took a small piece of paper and began writing.

He handed me the slip of paper and on it was written this little verse:

"I'll tune up my fiddle  
I'll rosin my bow,  
I'll make myself welcome  
Wherever I go."

I had lost the little piece of paper and the exact words of the little rhyme had slipped my mind, so back to the Chaparral I go, and Mr. Fredin wrote me the verse again. I could not help asking George: "How did you come to write such a nice little verse? Are you a poet?"

And he answered, "No. I spent a great deal of my life playing the violin."

He went on to say that he had played all over Chicago and Los Angeles in symphony orchestras and other groups, among them Ted Fiorito's Orchestra.

I then asked Mr. Fredin if he would show me how to hold a violin and the bow so that I could get started right, and he said,

"Sure."  
So I went out to the pickup and got the beautiful Joe Graham violin and brought it inside. After tuning the fiddle

George began playing some of the most beautiful music I have ever heard. It was a classical selection full of double-neck strains. The Joe Graham instrument responded under the master's touch to music that had folks all over the lobby and even outside listening with delight. Out in the pickup Shady Logan held up his coyote ears and his tail wagged as he broke into his wide coyote grin as the magic strains of music floated out his way.

This piece of music "touched your heart" as the Spanish-speaking people say, and I asked the violinist what was its name and he said it was "Caprice Venwa" by Fritz Cristler.

He then played "Souvenir" by the composer Dridla, almost heart-rending in its sad beauty, and I was reminded of a cowboy guide in Monument Valley of Utah telling of the beauty of a sunset that it was "Plumb Painful."

Then with the violin artist's intuition, George changed the mood in an instant by playing one of the liveliest and happiest numbers of all time, "San Antonio Rose."

Never did you hear such true, such melodious emotion-filled music in your life.

After giving me some valuable pointers out of a life-time lovingly devoted to violin music, Mr. Fredin went on to tell me he had studied eight-and-a-half years of classical training under the great musician, Henry Steen, and that he had taught music for over twenty years in violin and Hawaiian guitar. Also, George said that he had played hundreds of violins to test the perfection of their tone and carrying power.

"That is a good violin," said George, "Take good care of it." So I thank God that I had forgotten the words of the little rhyme, for if I had not forgotten and gone back, I may not have had the good fortune to hear this master violinist. And I look forward to hearing his great music many times again.

M. Boys School), Fort Stanton, New Mexico.

This rate schedule will go into effect on June 14, 1975 unless suspended by the Commission.

The Commission FINDS that the new rates should not go into effect without a public hearing concerning their lawfulness and should be suspended for a nine month period beginning June 14, 1975 unless all or any part of such rates are earlier approved.

**The Commission ORDERS:**  
A. A public hearing will be held on Tuesday, July 22, 1975 at 9:30 a. m. in the offices of the Commission, Bataan Memorial Building, Santa Fe, New Mexico, to determine whether or not the Respondent should be allowed to place into effect its Revised NMPSC Sheet No. 71. The purpose of the hearing is to take testimony in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed rate increases.

B. Any interested person may examine the tariff schedule, together with any exhibits and related papers that may be filed in the offices of the Commission, and any interested person may appear at the time and place of the hearing and be heard.

C. No person may become a party to the proceeding unless he shall have filed a formal petition in intervention pursuant to the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure as set forth in the Commission's First Revised General Order No. 1. A copy of these rules may be obtained from the office of the Commission.

D. A copy of this Order is to be published once in newspapers of general circulation in Lincoln County, New Mexico. Such publication must be made at least twenty days prior to July 22, 1975. Capitan-Carrizo Natural Gas Association shall pay the cost of the publications.

E. Pending the hearing and decision of the Commission herein, the operation and effectiveness of the rates shown by the rate schedule filed by Respondent shall be suspended for a period of nine months from and after June 14, 1975 or until the effective date of the Commission's final order in this matter, subject to further order of the Commission.

F. A copy of this Order shall be mailed to Capitan-Carrizo Natural Gas Association, Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, Sierra Blanca (N. M. Boys School), and their attorneys.




