## All American Championship Indian Dances open Friday

Indians from across the nation, officially representing their tribes, are at Mescalero from Friday through Sunday, participating in the Mescalero-Ruidoso All American Championship Indian Dances. The dancers will be competing for the world's richest purses—more than \$10,000 is up for grabs in prize monies—at the Mescalero Apache ceremonial and rodeo grounds. The contest dancing will feature the Mandaree Singers of North Dakota with the Northern Drum and Bobby Baker

as head singer; and the Oklahoma Singers with the Southern Drum and Ralph Kotay as head singer. Dancers, in full ceremonial regalia, will be contesting in Men's Northern and Southern Style Fancy Dancing; Men's Straight Dance (no bustle); Ladies' Northern Shawl; Ladies' Southern Cloth Dress and Ladies' Northern and Southern Buckskin dances; Boys and Girls will contest in junior and tots division and there will be several traditional dancing groups.

7:00 p.m. — Introduction of dignitaries, Flag Song, entry parade, round and war dances.  
8:00 p.m. — Memorial Princess contest sponsored by the Duffy family of Mescalero. Contest dancing for entrants up to eight years old.

**SATURDAY—**  
1:00 p.m. — Flag Song, entry parade, introduction of tribes and dignitaries. Round and war dances, special group dances and introduction of drum groups, head dancers and princesses. Boys, girls and ladies contest dancing, honor dances and special attractions.  
7:00 p.m. — Flag Song, entry parade, introductions. Round, war and special group dancing. Ladies Northern and Southern Buckskin contest dancing.  
9:00 p.m. — Honor dances and featured entertainment.  
**SUNDAY—**  
1:00 p.m. — Flag Song,

entry parade, war dances and announcements.  
2:00 p.m. — Men's Northern Fancy, Straight and Southern Fancy contest dancing.  
3:00 p.m. — Prize awards ceremony and a final performance by the winning dancers.

## Chamber winds dance plans up

Final preparations for the Indian Dance Contest were explained to the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce board of directors at its regular meeting held last Monday evening at the village hall. Barbara Duff, chamber chairman for the event, introduced members of the Mescalero Apache Tribe who also serve on the committee and called for volunteers to help with the project. She noted that a total of 40 arts and crafts booths would be set up in the Mescalero area during the week end event.  
After hearing a presentation by J & R Map Co. of Midland, Texas, the board voted to sponsor an area map, with advertising by local merchants, for a period of three years

with the chamber receiving 10% of the income from the project. The company will furnish the chamber with maps free of charge, and have guaranteed that the map will be up-dated before printing. Chamber manager Richard Coltrun was authorized to sign the contract and was given the responsibility of proof reading copy before the map is printed. The representative noted that the chamber would receive \$1250, if all ads are sold for the map.  
Mike Taylor, chairman of the Arts & Crafts committee, reported that a total of 144 applications had been received for inclusion in the annual event and would be reduced to 120 for the show. He noted that, from pictures received

with applications, this would be the best show yet. A total of \$7,488.50 has been received to date for reservations. A meeting was held on Tuesday to work out final details of the fair.  
Coltrun asked board approval for releasing information to a reporter for the El Paso Times that would be used in a feature story in a Sunday edition. The request was approved. He also noted that the city directory would go on sale in the near future through the chamber office.  
Chamber bank balances were reported at \$5,768.35 in the Ruidoso State Bank; \$290.00 in Security Bank; and \$1,000 in Certificates of Deposit.

## Ruidoso water users advised on summons

In response to a request from the Ruidoso Water Users Association, a Special Assistant Attorney General, State Engineer Office, has sent a letter to defendants of the Rio Ruidoso section of the Rio Hondo Adjudication advising:  
"Each defendant in the lawsuit has received a summons directing him to serve a pleading or motion in response to the complaint within 30 days after service of the summons. Technically if a defen-

dant has not responded within thirty days he is in default, and a default judgment could be entered against him. As a practical matter, however, it takes considerably more time to conduct a lawsuit, especially one involving six or seven hundred defendants. Consequently, please be advised that neither the State nor the Pecos Valley Artesian Conservancy District will approach the court in order to obtain default judgment at this time."

## SCMRA meets

The annual meeting of the South Central Mountain Resource Area (SCMRA), including election of officers, is slated for 1 p.m., Tuesday in the Carrizozo Recreation Center. Chairman Bill Gage will give the annual report, including coverage of the 17 project measures completed the past year. A key project was the assigning of three Soil Conservation Service soil scientists to complete a standard soil survey of Lincoln County.  
Lee Pittard, Lt. Gov. Bob Ferguson's administrative aide, will attend.  
The executive committee will meet from 10 a.m. to noon.

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## Good Samaritan feasibility study is encouraging

The results of a feasibility study, completed Tuesday, indicate that the Good Samaritan Society (GSS) of Sioux Falls, S. D., will consider, in depth, the possibility of building a nursing/sheltered care facility in Ruidoso.  
William H. Clapper, GSS consultant, told The News, "I'm recommending a 60 bed nursing home and 20 sheltered care units to the board."  
Clapper was in Santa Fe Wednesday looking into "Comprehensive health plan-

ning" at the state level. "I'll submit my report to the Good Samaritan Society this week. It will take about two weeks for the office to put the study together and act on the proposed facility for Ruidoso."  
Pending approval of the project, Irv Schell of GSS will schedule a meeting in Ruidoso in "from six to eight weeks", Clapper said. The architect would attend this session and the cost of the facility, including local participation, would be thoroughly aired.

"The prime purpose of the next meeting," Clapper said, "will be to decide the area's commitment and to settle on a definite building site." He noted that the site must include all utilities and that the location was over and above the community's actual dollar participation. "We'll be able to talk money at the next meeting, because we'll have the cost figures."  
A local advisory committee will be formed to meet with GSS representatives.



It is collapsible and loads into ambulance or helicopter, the hospital's primary transport sources. Complete accessibility to the patient is provided. The device, being inspected by Andy Anderson, emergency room head nurse and inhalation therapy consultant, provides an extra margin of safety in the care of sick babies. — (Ruidoso News photo)

I have talked to him a plenty about you — and when I told him you were to be in

town he expressed a desire to meet you. I have assumed your willingness, and sent him a letter of introduction. He is very bright entertaining and decidedly worth while. — Incidentally — it may help statehood along. For if you meet any of his artist friends, they may be convinced that all New Mexicans are not physically blighted, as they persistently depict them in the magazines. — I wish, however, that I could see you myself and have a big talk over old times and new.

The news of old friends was pleasant hearing. I will answer that part of your letter when you get back home. You will be busy now. Sorry indeed to hear of disaster to Schmidt and Charley Stury. Both good men and Stury one of the best.

### Traffic citations are valid

More and more drivers, Ruidoso Municipal Judge Sam Nunnally says, "are forgetting" about being issued Village Traffic Citations (Uniform Traffic Citations) and are finding themselves being brought into court on a warrant.

Judge Nunnally notes that a signed traffic citation "is merely an agreement between the driver and the police officer issuing it to appear in court at a specified time; signing the citation in no way implies guilt."

In the event a cited driver does not appear — from the date of issuance of the citation sometime within five days, at the driver's convenience, is the usual time limit for appearance — the office files a Village Complaint for failure to appear on the original citation and Judge Nunnally then issues a warrant for the driver's arrest.

Upon issuance of the arrest warrant, bond is set at the maximum permissible for the offense charged, plus an additional \$10 for the failure to appear charge, and after the arrest, the driver is then brought into court to face two charges. Teen-age drivers, Judge Nunnally said, "are most likely to 'forget' a citation" but the warrant procedure applies to all drivers and it is being enforced in Ruidoso. "It'd simplify things if cited drivers would come to court with their citations, as agreed when they sign it... and all their signature does is attest to this agreement to appear in court."

**Meat Prices Up The Least**

In 1974 the average price for all foods went up 14.2 percent while meat alone increased only 2.4 percent. For 1975 food prices are expected to increase an estimated 10 to 15 percent while meat prices are predicted to increase only 6 percent, with pork and poultry climbing faster than beef.

**LAS CRUCES**—It is ironic that as our nation prepares to celebrate the bicentennial of its independence and liberty that each individual citizen, business and organization finds they have less and less independence and liberty.

Where has all our freedom gone? While we've been opening our front door to the welfare state our freedom has been slipping out the back.

Roger A. Freeman in his "The Growth of American Government: A Morphology of the Welfare State" wrote: "With the continuing expansion of government has come a contraction of freedom."

One of the cancers that has affected our freedom and independence is government by regulation as ordained by Congress. With little foresight Congress has created a vast number of tax-supported agencies designed to watch each one of us closely.

These "super agencies" include among others: EPA (Environmental Protection Agency); OSHA (Occupational and Health Administration) and if Congress insists, although polls show 81 percent of the public opposes the idea, the CPA (Consumer Protection Agency).

Big Brothers all, but is Big Brother looking out for you or is he controlling you? How many Big Brothers can we afford? How can we survive economically the unrealistic, uninformed, uninvestigated regulations imposed upon individuals, businesses, industry and agriculture by Big Brother?

An example of economic impact is the catalytic converter farce. This device, now discredited, was installed in 1975 automobiles as directed by EPA. New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau and Western Farm Bureau Insurance Co. purchased 1974 models for our 1975 fleet.

Why? We were skeptical about the performance of the catalytic converter and concerned about the supply of lead-free gas in some of the remote areas of the state. Our employees would have ordinarily been driving 1975 models.

Multiplying our reaction by millions of businesses, organizations and individuals across the U. S., is it possible that the effect upon the automobile industry helped to spark our presently depressed economy? OSHA has also had its share of farces.

Regulation by super agencies without realistic investigation has resulted in expenses businesses could not afford. You read about the results in the newspapers—businesses closed, jobs gone.

The Federal Power Commission recently ruled, in effect, that heated swimming pools in California are more important than growing food in New Mexico and Arizona.

These super agencies have developed a wide credibility gap. A recent EPA radio news service tape charged that "hundreds of thousands of farm workers are made ill every year from misuses of pesticides" and "hundreds of these workers die." EPA's claim is a repetition of irresponsible statements discredited many times.

The California Department of Food and Agriculture released findings of a year-long pesticide study in California Jan. 4, 1974. California accounts for 20 percent of all pesticides used in the U. S. for agricultural purposes.

The study, made with the California Department of Health, revealed that no farm worker died from pesticide poisoning in 1973 and that only 156 cases involved farm workers among 1,474 pesticide illnesses reported among workers of all types.

Challenged by the American Farm Bureau Federation to prove its claims, EPA admitted its statement could not be backed by proven statistics.

But wait, if there is anyone left who doubts that Big Brother government is looking over our shoulders, these doubts can be dispelled. Big Brother EPA is installing a tax-supported, toll-free informer system as a method of gathering evidence.

You are urged to report to EPA misuse of a pesticide by your neighbor and your employer.

As we look forward to our bicentennial year, celebrating our freedom and independence, Big Brother is initiating an informer system contrary to our democratic form of government.

Abraham Lincoln once said you can fool some of the people some of the time, and all of the people some of the time, but you can't fool all of the people all of the time.

Lincoln would have been amused at a recent news item. A man was forbidden by a government agency to build a log cabin.

The log cabin, according to the federal agency, wasn't safe.

## In Passing

We note here, with pleasure, that the Garden Club—and various other organizations—add a bit of beauty to the village. The Garden Club has planted the patios of both the hospital and the library and now have flowers, shrubs and trees growing. Both patios can really be places of solitude for those wishing a time alone.

Other clubs have helped by contributing to the program. With such groups as the Garden Club, the Pink Ladies, Altrusa, the Woman's Club and many others not mentioned, we can be sure that we will have a much prettier village.

The need for more traffic control along Sudderth Drive becomes more apparent daily with accidents and a tendency for drivers to speed. It is time for the State Highway Department (who controls Highway 37-Sudderth Drive) to take a close look at the possibility of additional traffic lights along the street. We would suggest such a light at the Paradise Canyon Road, especially. The light would help slow traffic and give motorists using that route a chance to get onto Sudderth.

**Rockwell print show set for Pioneer Savings**

A collection of art by Norman Rockwell, America's most beloved artist, is being shown in the offices of Pioneer Savings & Trust, June 23rd through June 27th. The public is invited to view the exhibit between 8:30 a. m. and 4:00 p. m. The collection is composed of 82 full color prints by Mr. Rockwell, plus 10 signed copies of prints on loan from the Hall Gallery, Lubbock, Texas. A portion of the showing will be held at the City Library in Ruidoso on Tuesday through Friday from 11:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. Gift prints will be presented to those attending the showing at the office of Pioneer Savings & Trust located at Sudderth and Chase.

In America, Norman Rockwell is the best known artist who ever lived. His subject is average America. He has painted it with such benevolent affection for so many years that a truly remarkable history of our century has been compiled. Millions of people have been moved by his picture stories about the awkwardness of youth and the comforts of age, about pride in

country, history, and heritage, about reverence, loyalty, and compassion.

There is an appealing sense of tradition in being a Rockwell watcher, of seeing man-land on the moon through the eyes of an artist who recorded Lindbergh's flight across the Atlantic in 1927 and sketched Admiral Dewey's warships steaming into New York harbor in 1899. Another attraction in Rockwell is accuracy. He is not interested in conveying the idea of a thing, he wants to paint from the thing itself, an actual specific example that he selects with the greatest care.

And people, millions of them, enjoy his point of view. It is their point of view, full of things they remember or can imagine or would like to imagine. He does not try to change things; he invites people to chuckle, not to despair; to join the gang of regular fellows, not to stand alone; to reminisce, not to prophesy. He does not mean to confuse or challenge us; he certainly does not want to shock or offend; he rarely even raises a question.

The assigned subjects Rock-

well now accepts are big and important and challenging. Rockwell meets them with enthusiasm and imagination. But he has not changed. He still paints Christmas and funny-sad stories and spring-time. He still likes his edges well defined and, in spite of outer space, he likes his backgrounds close in and parallel to the picture plan.

IDAHO FALLS, IDAHO FARMER: "And then one day we came upon this particularly appropriate jingle from The Wall Street Journal: Are those who love the birds and bees, willing to sit in the dark and freeze? If the distinction between realism and the viewpoint of ardent environmentalists has been more effectively expressed than in this couplet, we haven't come upon it. For the present this tells the story."

**Profile of an artist . . .**

"Sometimes I wake up at night with a black and white image in my head, and I know I have to get up and photograph it. Something in me says, 'Make an image.' I don't always understand it, but it forces me to get off my tail and do something about it." This early-morning observation, spoken softly through the rising fog of a coffee cup, echoes what life is for a man who lives photography as Frank Armstrong does.

Armstrong, who currently has the central, one-wall show at Dave Wilson Photographics' Focal Point Gallery, was once described by a colleague as "one of the best photographers around and one of the least known." It's hard to imagine how a man standing more than six feet and 200 pounds can go unnoticed, but this gentle obscurity is a mark of Frank Armstrong's style. His presence is not sensed in his images, but rather one sees his sense of wonder and respect for the world he finds before his lens.

An appreciative audience for all the imagery that passes before him, Armstrong considers himself a "photogeneralist" with no one special interest. As chief photographer for The University of Texas at Austin's News and Information Service, he is involved with all forms of photography: documentary, studio portraiture, and photojournalism. On his own time, often in the gentle first morning light that reflects his personality so well, he turns to forms of self-expression, a distinctively ironic style of street photography using extreme wide-angle lenses on unobtrusive 35mm cameras and landscape photography

executed with a variety of equipment, from 35mm to 4x5" view cameras. Armstrong's landscapes are the main images on view at the Focal Point Gallery. A close friend of gallery owner Dave Wilson, he shares with him a deep interest in promoting photography as an art form. Armstrong's interest in photography started while in the Navy in the Aleutian Islands. "Frank's experiences in Alaska put him close to nature and made an immense impression on him, an impression that carries through to his photographic images," Wilson

(That is if it does not rain between now and the time this message hits the streets of many states in the union, and maybe some foreign countries. I know there are some subscribers in Alaska, but I am not sure about the foreign countries, how many there are. Lots of folks are becoming interested in reading about this part of our country.)

Let's see... I got off on a little side trail there. Like we say, it is dry. But that is the way with June. Just think of it: I have been here one-fourth of the age of our beloved country. God is certainly good, to let me be here so long, with just a hand-full of years in other places.

This is being written on the afternoon on Monday, June the sixteenth. It is ninety-four in the shade, but there is a strong breeze which takes the sting out of the heat. The breeze is heavily loaded with the fragrance of the wild grapes blooming heavy along the creek — with the beloved essence of the cedar, pinon and pine baked out into the air by the warm sun.

I have a way of losing my way for a while in the heat. When I was a boy in Oregon, just at the last of school in late May, it was so hot that I lost my way home. An Alaska snow bird is not much for hot weather.

To tell you the truth, this is one of many places where an Alaska snow bird can feel at home. I remember when I lived in Juneau, Alaska it was hot in the summer, but we all welcomed the warm weather for the growing of the fine gardens, the beautiful wild flowers, and the wonderful wild blue berries.

It has taken me a long time to get to this, but the Yucca, our State Flower, is going to be more beautiful this year than at any time I can remember.

I have just come back from outside looking at the yucca buds. You can almost see them grow. Every plant has a fine healthy stalk with a large cluster forming. The buds are touched with linings of purple-pink and the new flowers have still a green tint, showing the great vitality of the plant.

Even though it is dry, Dear Mother Earth has a lot of strength left from the good winter and good rains late last fall. And, almost as if to make a celebration of our two-hundredth birthday the yucca are drawing heavily with their deep roots upon the stored up strength of Mother Earth, so as to put on a beautiful display, which very soon should be showing up near and far a long way.

Early Spanish Explorers Delighted with the Yucca The name "Velas De Dios," candles of God, was given to the Yucca by the early Spanish explorers of the southwest because of the way these clusters of pearly white blooms catch the rays of the moonlight and shine forth in the night.

This is an unforgettable sight and will be in its full glory very soon. Because the moon is beginning to round out to the full, and the moon will be at its brightest just about when the yuccas are in full bloom.

It was wonderfully pleasant outside a minute ago, and I knew the thermometer must be wrong. I had it partly in the sun. It is in the shade now and


I moved in with the Ridge Runner at the age of two months. That must be about thirteen years ago.

**Reaction To Lexington**  
In the week following the battles at Lexington and Concord, word spread like wildfire and the reaction was swift. On April 23 the Provincial Congress of Massachusetts authorized the raising of 13,600 men, named Artemas Ward as commander-in-chief, and appealed for aid from other colonies.

From New England the response was almost immediate. Revolutionary groups in that area planned action, but it was often too slow since individual citizens often took up whatever arms they could find and marched toward Boston.

Since news moved more slowly to the South, radicals in these areas did not respond as rapidly. They did offer their support, however, when they were informed. In some instances Southerners were already moving on their own.

In South Carolina, for example, Charles Pinckney was concerned enough to organize a committee of five to provide a defense for the colony. On April 21, just two days after Lexington, men of Charleston without disguise took possession of all the powder in public

magazines and seized weapons and supplies held in royal arsenals.

On the western frontier the settlers in Kentucky were very much pleased to hear of American resistance. In honor of April 19, they named their major settlement Lexington. Today it is a major city in Kentucky and the seat of the University of Kentucky.

All in all, the response was very encouraging to those who were resisting British policies. Even though some still had hope for reconciling the differences between England and the colonies, such a possibility became more and more unlikely.

In the meantime, a state of constant warfare continued in New Mexico between the Spanish settlers and the native inhabitants. Particularly, the Spanish had been unable to establish good relations with the nomadic plains Indians of New Mexico as they had been able to do with the Pueblos. The result, especially in the eighteenth century, was a state of almost constant warfare. Very often this took the form of raids by Navajos and other groups against Spanish settlements and those of the Pueblos.

For example, Governor Mendinueta was pleased to report to the Viceroy that Pueblo Indians from Jemez and Cochiti had captured five Navajos who had with them three stolen horses. He stated that he was holding the five prisoners until their chiefs arrived to make peace.

The level of warfare in New Mexico was not as intense or wide spread as that which was

Some of the folks arrived before it is finished, and most of them are musicians; therefore as soon as they are awake the music starts, either the piano or high fidelity. I suppose they are like me 'about my writing — they can do it better early in the morning.

I haven't had a chance to get out in the woods lately and I think one gets hungry for it, just like they crave a certain kind of food: that trait was given us by our Maker.

John Keats had the thoughts completely, in his 'A Thing of Beauty' and this is only found in the greatest of poets, and is rare even then, his words:

A thing of beauty is a joy forever—

But still will keep a bower quiet for us,

And a sleep full of sweet dreams, and health, and quiet breathing.

Therefore, on every morning, are we reathing a flowery band to bind us to the earth,

In spite of despondence, of inhuman dearth—of gloomy days,

Of all the unhealthy and o'er-darkened ways—Yes in spite of all—

Some shape of beauty moves away the pall From our dark spirits—

Keats seemed to find beauty in all things, young and old, small and great, far and wide.

Even the lowly grasshopper and cricket, to the far reaching Saturn and 'On the sea' to 'Ode to Melancholy'.

On his Ode To Autumn: Conspiring with Him how to load and bless

With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eaves run;

To bend with apples the mossed cottage-trees,

And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core;

To swell the gourd, and plump the hazel shells

With a sweet kernel;—later flower for the bees—

For summer has o'er-brimmed their clammy cells—

It was a \$1 million weekend—with plenty to spare—so far as the betting was concerned. Total handle for the four-day period zoomed up to \$1,120,855. Lela Barnes Bug, the winner of the \$58,000 event, and The Third One, who finished second, are both owned by Ada residents. Lela Barnes Bug is owned by Marvin and Lela Barnes and The Third One is owned by Dr. H. D. and Margaret Hall. Tall Cotton and Mr. Breakthru, two other members of the Hall stable, reached the Kansas grand finale.

Longshots made a pretty good dent in Saturday's program. Takrok was the most impressive. The filly raced to a three-length maiden victory in the first race and paid \$35.60. Other generous win payoffs were Edd's Bug (\$25) in the third, You Rascal You (\$43.40) in the seventh, Permoyle (\$39) in the eighth and Kinnibold (\$48.40) in the 11th.

Gary Sumpter had a short walk back to the jockey's room in Saturday's first race. Sumpter's mount, Turnawhirl, bumped him off in front of the paddock during the running of the six-furlong event. Turnawhirl continued around

the track with the rest of the field. Sumpter was not injured.

Eight of the youngsters qualified by finishing first or second in Friday's trials. 
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

**Letter To Editor**  
June 12, 1975

Dear Editor:  
I am a 63 year old retired Naval Commander and a resident of Ruidoso for eight years, who has three times traveled around the world, but who has never witnessed before the "Barney Fife" charade portrayed by the Ruidoso Police Department last night in a Ruidoso night club. Checking identification for legal age requirements is most assuredly in police line of duty; however, flashing high powered lights and disengaging the band during their inspection are not. (Net result of their Nazi-like tactics was one patron, age 20, sipping a soft drink). The Ruidoso police "officers" most unusual behavior reminded me again of my 39 month encampment in a Japanese prisoner of war camp, where similar tactics, including flashing of lights in the prisoners' eyes all hours of the night, were in use.

Later, on the same evening of the "Barney Fife" raid, while I was walking my dogs (which is usual), I was arrested by the same "officers", frisked, humiliated, treated like a common criminal, and after an hour's harassment, released with obviously no charges. For a community, which approaches the highest per capita burglary rate in the state, I strongly recommend the police efforts be directed more toward the prevention of crime rather than to the petty "Barney Fife" heckling which appears to be the present police department policy.

Therefore, I should strongly recommend to all my friends in Ruidoso that a close look be taken at what once was an outstanding police department and determine what has really gone wrong.

**Benefit requirements  
fold by commission**

Workers who leave jobs voluntarily for reasons not related to their work will be disqualified for receipt of unemployment benefits until they establish a new connection with the labor market, Florentino Montoya, New Mexico Employment Security Commission Director for Unemployment Insurance, announced. The new rule was passed by the 1975 legislature as an amendment to the New Mexico Unemployment Compensation Law and becomes effective June 22.

The law as amended also gives employers the opportunity to make voluntary payments to their businesses' unemployment compensation accounts in addition to their normal tax payments. The provision, already in effect in ten other states, makes it possible for a firm to build an adequate account balance in relation to payroll and thereby maintain a favorable tax rate during periods of layoff or business expansion.

Under the old law, workers who left jobs without good cause could be denied benefits from one to thirteen weeks. On benefit claims filed after June 22, a disqualification will continue until the claimant returns to work and earns wages equal to five times the weekly benefit amount that would otherwise have been paid.

**Farm Census**

We recently received a news release from the United States Department of Commerce, Social and Economic Statistics Administration, Bureau of the Census (at least two of which we could well do without) appealing to New Mexico farmers to return farm census report forms which had been mailed in January. The letter notes that response to the census is mandatory by law and that all information about individual farms is confidential. Only 64% of the forms in New Mexico have been returned.

From what good we have seen done by the Washington statisticians, we feel that a great deal of money and time could be saved by the total elimination of the farm census. We have never yet heard of crop predictions being correct — they are generally much over-estimated (helps depress farm prices), and then adjusted after crops have been sold or contracted. We are sure the census does help the economy — after all it takes hundreds of people on the payroll in Washington and provides massive rentals on all those buildings to store the forms.

We can't help but believe that it is a sheer impossibility for federal employees to read all of the thousands of individual forms that are mailed as regular as clockwork to Washington. The census letter even notes that the form must be completed by "even those not actively engaged in farming, such as landlords or those no longer farming."

The myriad of forms now required by "law" continue to astound us and we feel that it is time that we get back to the essentials and allow our farmers and businessmen to do their work instead of the government's.
