ELEVEN MEMBERS OF ADVISORY COMMITTEE NAMED

'Good Sam' home site sought

Members of the advisory committee to the pending Good Samaritan Nursing Home for the Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs area, Monday night appointed Barbara DiPaolo and Chuck Brown to compile a list of possible building sites.

Brown enlisted the aid of Ruidoso realtors, at their Tuesday breakfast meeting, in the site quest.

The requirements of 'Good Sam' dictate that the plot be reasonably level with all utilities available. The size of the tract, depending upon the type of structure, is variable, with the advisory committee understanding, 12 acres as optimum size for future development.

'Good Sam' stipulates that the community install all utilities to within five feet of the building site with a six-inch water main being mandatory to service the automatic sprinkler system that must be incorporated in the edifice.

Facilities operated by 'Good

Sam,' numbering about 180 in the U. S., vary from one floor ramblers to multi-storied structures, indicating that the location of the nursing home is somewhat dependent upon travel distance to the hospital and shopping areas.

Representatives of the Sloux Falls, S. D., firm are expected, advisory committee president Charlotte Jarratt announced Monday, "to contact us shortly, possibly within two weeks, to discuss building sites, and, if we have a suitable one then we can get down to the business of raising funds at the local level."

At Monday's committee meeting, Wayne Stewart, president of the First National Bank and of the Betty Dare Memorial Foundation, both of Alamogordo, discussed all phases in the planning and development of the 'Good Sam' home, now under construction in Alamogordo.

"All of our dealings, so far, with 'Good Sam' have been," Stewart said, "to our complete

satisfaction."

Stewart said that Alamogordo's contribution, in addition to the site and utilities, included providing, in cash, "20 per cent of the cost of construction," with upwards of \$200,000 being raised through subscription. He noted that the Betty Dare Memorial Foundation provided "\$50,000 for a nursing home in Alamogordo," that was included in the funds raised. "When our home is ready for occupancy, we feel we are looking at a \$1 million improvement to our community," he said.

Alamogordo's costs, above cash raised, included \$30,000 for land, \$11,000 for site preparation and, Stewart said, "I think maybe \$15,000 to \$20,000 for utilities."

The Ruidoso advisory committee will decide, shortly, which avenue to pursue to make all contributions tax deductible. Alternatives include forming a tax exempt corporation, in which the committee, is looking at a minimum

of six months of legal maneuvering, or making the solicitations under the tax exempt status of the Good Samaritan Society. "In either case," Mrs. Jarratt said, "all contributions, land or cash, will be fully tax deductible."

Any resident of the Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs area, providing the land can be easily serviced by utilities, desiring to offer acreage for the proposed nursing home is asked to contact Mrs. Jarratt, or any member of the advisory committee, "as soon as possible," Mrs. Jarratt said.

Members of the advisory committee, announced by Mrs. Jarratt, include, Emilia Maes, Chuck Brown, Sarah Lee Beumer, Orby Neatherlin, Barney Waldrop, Barbara DiPaolo, Preston Issacs, Suzanne Clear, Murrell Holbert, Billie Clarke and Roland Walsh. "We expect," she said, "that there will be some additions to this committee named in the near future."

Laverne Cole named to RD Council seat

Ruidoso Downs Mayor J. J. DiPaolo, at a special meeting Tuesday at 11 a. m., appointed Laverne Cole to fill a vacancy on the Ruidoso Downs Council created by the resignation of George Hancock. Hancock noted that he was forced to resign because of ill health. Mrs. Cole is a resident of Ruidoso Downs and the operator of the Ruidoso Gibson's Discount Center. Her appointment was approved by the board and she will be sworn in at the July 23 meeting of the board.

The emergency meeting of the board was called due to a lack of a quorum for the regular meeting on Monday evening. A budget transfer resolution was required with a deadline set for Tuesday. The resolution was passed by the board.

In other action the council voted to withdraw the \$50 per

month that had been paid to the Humane Society until further information could be obtained on the control of animals in the village by the society.

A brief discussion was held on a change in charges for commercial (2 inch) water taps in the village. The board voted to set such tap fees at \$600.

Billie Surrnick, village clerk, reported that the FHA loan on the Denton Field property would be closed on July 23. The \$100,000 loan was negotiated for the purchase of the 10 acres, including a water well, for additional water supply and recreation area. She also reported the village funds invested in Certificates of Deposit had been re-invested in CD's with both local banks.

One occupational license was not approved because of the lack of a state tax number by the business.

Postal Service considers RD Post Office change

Bennie Matlock, Roswell, acting director of customer service of the U. S. Postal Service, was in Ruidoso Downs this week visiting with businessmen and postal patrons concerning the changing of the Ruidoso Downs Post Office to a station of the Ruidoso Post Office. It has been announced that Dorothy Parnell, Ruidoso Downs Postmistress, will retire on July 31 and the survey is being conducted to determine if a new appointment to the post will be made.

Matlock explained that no changes, other than the lack of a postmaster, would result from the proposed change. He noted that mail service between Ruidoso, Hollywood Station and the Ruidoso Downs office would be improved since mail from the office would not be required to go through the zip center, as it now does.

He appeared before the Ruidoso Downs Village Council on Tuesday and asked their opinion on the subject and was told that a resolution would be [See Page 7]

Dr. E. V. Stalzer heads NM doctors

Edward V. Stalzer, M.D., of Ruidoso, took over his duties Tuesday as president of the NM chapter of the American Academy of Family Physicians, during the 18th annual Ruidoso Summer Clinic that ended at noon today at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Named with Dr. Stalzer were Dr. Nelson A. Smith of Alamogordo, president-elect; Dr. Malcom Morrow of Springer, vice president and Dr. David R. Holten of Albuquerque, secretary-treasurer. Dr. J. A. Rivas of Belen and Dr. U. S. "Steve" Marshall of Roswell were re-elected as delegates to the national AAFP convention with Dr. Hubert D. Teague of Albuquerque, alternate. Dr. Byron L. Beddo of Albuquerque, immediate past president, automatically became a director of the state chapter.

Registration figures released Tuesday by Bob Reid of El Paso, convention director, showed that 163 doctors, 14 public health officers and doctors in residency and 15 speakers, doctors, for a total of 192 were in attendance. Last year's registration, Reid said, was 118.

Major topics on the agenda included battered children syndrome, common skin problems, breast cancer, heart attacks and prenatal diagnosis of fetal problems.

Roen Coen, M.D., UNM pediatrician, told the doctors Monday that the term "premature birth" has nothing to do anymore with the weight of the infant, "but is based on

such things as crib position, wrist reflex, foot creases and other indications of how developed the baby really is."

He gave the family physicians the toll free telephone number of the newborn intensive care unit at Bernalillo County Medical Center in Albuquerque, which is a primary teaching hospital for the UNM Health Sciences Center. He said that the physician who delivers the baby is the "guy on the front line", and urged them to call the medical school number whenever they had a newborn in trouble. "We're just there to help you," Dr. Coen said.

Out-of-state guest speakers, at the convention included Dr. Harry Davis of the University of Texas Medical School, Galveston, and Dr. Larry Hebert of Louisiana State University. The delegates set July 19-22 as the dates for the 1976 convention with The Inn of the Mountain Gods as the site.

41 MILE RACE TO BE RUN AUGUST 2 FROM WHITE OAK TO LINCOLN

Pony Express to carry the mail August 2

The rhythmic beat of galloping hooves and the gentle slap of saddle bags loaded with mail will ring through the 41 miles of draws separating White Oaks from Lincoln August 2, as contestants in the annual Pony Express Race hit the trail at 7:30 a. m., for the jolting two hour ride to Lincoln.

All riders will carry first class letters and anyone desiring to have a letter post-marked with the two-inch Pony Express Seal must:

—Mail all letters to be carried by riders to: Pony Express, Box 217, Carrizozo, NM 88301, by the July 31 deadline.

—Affix a 10 cent stamp to each letter to be carried by

Pony Express and include 25 cents, for each letter, for handling.

—As many letters as desired may be mailed to Carrizozo in one package.

The White Oaks-Lincoln route is through the Capitan Gap, with the winning rider due at Lincoln between 9:30 and 10 a. m. As the rider crosses the finish line he must dismount and deliver his mail pouch to the Lincoln postmaster on foot.

Contestants, either individually or as a team, must ride shod horses, wear western attire, and, if under 14 years old, have written parental consent.

Prizes and trophies will be

awarded to the first three places.

The race is sponsored by the Lincoln County Development Association and information and entry blanks may be obtained by writing: The Pony Express Committee, Box 146, Lincoln, NM 88338.

This race is one of the highlights of the weekend action at Lincoln, with the annual Billy the Kid Pageant to be presented daily. This production portrays the last escape of Billy the Kid in a highly dramatic manner, with "The Kid" jumping from the courthouse

landing to make good his escape.

An added attraction will be a street parade, with entries now on file from throughout this area.

Details of the weekend celebration at Lincoln will be announced later.

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

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Inside The Capital

SANTA FE — Rep. John Bigbee, R-DeBaca-Lincoln-Guadalupe-Torrance, says an interim lawmaker committee will review special state funding for public schools with low enrollment.

A rancher, Rep. Bigbee is on the Legislative School Study Committee. He says: "We will review the sparsity factor to see if it is providing funds necessary for education." Many low enrollment schools are in the 11 school districts Bigbee represents — Carrizozo, Hondo, Ruidoso, Capitan, Corona, Santa Rosa, Vaughn, Encino, Estancia, Moriarty and Fort Sumner.

Bigbee adds: "Another problem the LSSC is really concerned with is long, rural school bus routes, how bus contractors will make it with increased operating costs, especially higher gasoline prices."

Rep. Bigbee says: "I'm still hopeful Ronald Reagan will enter the presidential race. This country has got to have a conservative leader." But he will back President Gerald Ford if Ford is the 1976 GOP nominee.

Senate Majority Whip Odis Echols, D-Clovis, says he will seek reelection in 1976 in Senate District 27 spanning two-thirds of Curry County. Echols is president of Spanish Television of New Mexico Inc., owner of new ultra high frequency Channel 23-KMXN, Albuquerque. The station is set to begin telecasting Aug. 10. Senate Majority Leader C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos, is vice president of the corporation.

Santa Fe District Judge Thomas Donnelly upheld State Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo's rejection of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick A. Smith for a state

liquor permit at a motel site at Williamsburg near an Interstate 25 exit.

Jaramillo rejected the application June 19, 1973, because two existing liquor licenses are in Williamsburg's 5-mile buffer zone. Licenses in an incorporated municipality's buffer zone are counted against its quota. With a 1970 federal census population of 367 Williamsburg is eligible for one liquor permit. None are inside Williamsburg's limits.

But Asst. Atty. Gen. Scott MacGillivray, who is counsel for Jaramillo, noted buffer zones of Williamsburg and Truth or Consequences are almost coterminous. MacGillivray said 13 liquor licenses are in Truth or Consequences or its buffer zone. Santa Fe lawyer John Donnell, representing Mr. and Mrs. Smith, could appeal Judge Donnelly's ruling.

Albuquerque Democrat Rich Sims, 45, running for his party's 1976 U. S. Senate nomination, named these regional campaign coordinators: Mrs. Artie Kaiser, Belen; Jim McDermott, Truth or Consequences; Lyle Oldfield, Clayton; Victor Ruybalid, Santa Fe; Mrs. Mary Madlin, Aztec, and Othel Olsson, Artesia. Sims is a distinct long-shot seeking to oust heavily favored incumbent Joseph M. Montoya, Santa Fe Democrat.

Sims says Atlas Davis, Truth or Consequences businessman, and Jim Hall, Ruidoso artist, are co-chairmen of his campaign finance committee.

To qualify to seek designation from the state pre-primary nominating convention candidates for statewide offices must gather petitions with signatures equal to one per cent of the 1974 party governor primary vote statewide. Within this total must be signatures equal to one per cent of the same vote in at least 10 counties.

The statewide requirement is 509 signatures for Democratic candidates. The minimum 10-county requirement could be met with a total of only 91 signatures in DeBaca, Hidalgo, Sierra, Union, Catron, Guadalupe, Harding, Mora, Lincoln and Torrance Counties.

Federal grants totaling \$6.3 million for various phases of wastewater construction projects were announced by the

State Environmental Improvement Agency. Among the grants: Fort Sumner, \$384,525; Williamsburg, \$199,740; Carrizozo, \$24,000.

Also, Eunice, \$30,000; Jal, \$33,000; Lordsburg, \$16,500; Clovis, \$85,500; Questa, \$22,500; Texico, \$58,420, and Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs, \$39,262.

A hearing by Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo was set Monday (July 14) at Alamogordo on Mescalero Apache-Tribe's request to move its liquor license from Apache Summit to its new \$15 million Inn of the Mountain Gods recreation complex. The proposed new site is in Ruidoso's 5-mile buffer zone. State law apparently bans transfers into the zone.

Attorney General Toney Anaya has been asked by Carlos Jaramillo, state liquor director, if the area or part of the area, within the five mile zone of Ruidoso, is within the reservation of the Mescalero Tribe and without the control of the City of Ruidoso or the County of Lincoln, may the license be transferred from a location in Otero County beyond five miles from an incorporated city, town or village within the reservation to another location within the reservation and within the same county but within the five mile zone of Ruidoso, which is incorporated. The opinion was asked in a letter sent on Monday.

The State Racing Commission suspended trainer Johnny A. Goodman, HI Johnny, a horse trained by Goodman, showed a positive urine test for ritalin, a prohibited drug, after it finished second July 6 at Ruidoso Downs in the major Rainbow Derby.

Goodman can ask for a Racing Commission hearing on the length of his suspension. Also under investigation was the disappearance of urine samples taken from 14 horses who raced July 6 at Ruidoso Downs. The samples disappeared from a Ruidoso bus depot the night of July 6.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca appointed Dr. Robert C. Vandermeer of Las Vegas to the State Board of Optometry. Dr. Vandermeer replaces Dr. Harold McDonald of Clovis.

Clovis Mayor Charles M. Taylor Jr. was set to discuss a cooperative agreement today (Thursday, July 17) with the

State Highway Commission at a SHC meeting in Santa Fe.

One constantly hears politicians and clergy men discussing America's future; many (including evangelists) are pessimistic. They have reason to be.

More moral courage from members of Congress and the White House would help. The best example in recent weeks of a lack of moral courage among U. S. leaders was the action of the House Ways and Means Committee in approving an increase in the national debt of eighty-five billion dollars!

Lawmakers spending lavishly for new help, new office buildings, new social programs, foreign aid, etc., are now ready to increase the already excessive national debt by \$85,000,000,000 in one jump.

Formerly, increases were smaller.

That will make the national debt about \$15,000,000,000. That means taxpayers of this country will be paying money lenders about \$60,000,000,000 in interest every fiscal year! That will be about a fifth of total tax collections, the total budget. And the nation will get nothing for this, except the enrichment of the money lenders.

In view of the need for this new borrowing, the rebates recently voted by Congress were utterly immoral. The budgets projected by President Ford for this and next fiscal year (deficits of 35 and 55 billions) are also immoral. Tough as it might make things for a year or two, the proper

path for the nation, which requires moral courage, demands we live within our means and not again vastly increase the national debt for our own comfort and ease at the moment.

Within a year the first working, although crude, instrument was born. Even in its early years when telephone sets in homes were a rarity, they could be a nuisance. The lucky owner of a telephone

frequently acted as a neighborhood communications link, handling calls — usually of an emergency nature — for people who had no phones.

That is not the case today. With 350 million phones in the world, the instrument has become more one of convenience than emergency. But it has not lost one quality it has possessed from the beginning a century ago. When the telephone rings, there are not many people with the courage to ignore its call.

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Two-Wheeled Traveler

by Galen Farrington
I have been often asked, "Where do you carry your gear when you travel by bike?" For those of you contemplating a bicycle trip in the near future (it's nearer than you think!) here are some ideas (I will make the basic assumption that you and your bike are "in shape" for such an undertaking).

Usually the first cycle tour is of the overnight variety. This is easily accomplished if a friend or relative lives within your range—Alamogordo is a good destination. Such a trip requires simply that you carry necessary overnight items and a little money for some food and drink along the way. These few items can easily be tied to a rear carrier. If you know no one in that town, add a sleeping bag and tarp (to make a lean-to in the event of bad weather) and camp at the KOA.

Weekend trips like this give one the taste of freedom and excitement that biking supplies and with successful over-

nights in the legs, one is ready for vacation tours and this is where carrying the load becomes extremely important and bike tripping comes into its own.

First you must mount a good rear luggage rack to your bike. The most common and easily obtained is the Pletscher (\$5.50). There are many copies of this rack, most are sturdy enough to do the job of carrying your pannier bags. "My what?" you say!

Pannier bags are similar to the saddlebags used when traveling by horse in that they are carried on either side of the rear rack and hang down to about the wheel axle. These bags come in an unbelievable shape and size assortment. For the novice, Kangaroo (Dept. C7, 232 E. Gutierrez, Santa Barbara, CA 93101) offers quality bags ranging in price from a basic two compartment standard set for \$16 to their cross-country bags with six compartments for \$39.50. If you are handy with needle and thread

(or know someone who is), the best thing going are the Frost-line Kits (Dept. RI 035, 452 Burbank, Broomfield, Colorado 80020). This company has a wide selection of sew-it-yourself kits including down filled parkas, sleeping bags, tents, and raincoats.

The bags referred to are made of lightweight, waterproof nylon. If you go for some sort of canvas, be sure your gear is waterproofed either with a plastic liner or spray waterproofing directly on the canvas.

The pannier set-up permits the cycle tourist to strap his sleeping bag and shelter (tent or tarp) on top of the rack. This system should provide enough room for anything from a week to a month on the road. If you insist on more space, handlebar bags, are also available from the same companies. Be sure you do not put too much weight in a handlebar bag because it may cause instability on fast descents. Likewise, when packing the rear, be sure the weight is equalized from right to left.

Total weight for full camping gear and other items for a lone cyclist must not exceed 35 pounds for an enjoyable trip. If you choose not to cook you

can get by easily with 25 pounds of gear.

With all the extra gear you'll be carrying, two points concerning riding technique are in order. One, the extra weight will cause greater down hill speeds so be sure your brakes are functioning properly. Two, this same weight will make going uphill somewhat more difficult so you'll need low gear ratios.

If you haven't got a bike or are considering a trade for a new one, two bikes stand out as exceptional buys in this inflated world: the Schwinn "Le Tour" (\$159) and the Raleigh "Grand Prix" (\$159). These bikes come with wide range touring gear ratios which are suitable for anyone embarking on a tour of this nature. There are other bikes on the market which sell for less but don't waste your money if you want something to travel on.

When you are on the road traveling under your own power, remember that you are subject to the same laws that auto drivers are subject to, a point which should be emphasized in any kind of driver's education because it seems to me that the vast majority of auto drivers suffer from the "toy bike syndrome" thinking a bike is a toy therefore should

get off of the street which is in direct violation of every state's vehicular code (I also think most auto drivers who "honk" in attempts to get you off the road suffer from territorial domination complexes similar to those studied in dogs). You should also give hand signals whenever you turn and there is a car within sight (rolling or parked — it is amazing how quickly one can be eaten by a sleeping auto!).

Finally, if you plan a tour, TAKE IT. Unless an emergency situation (rain is NOT an emergency!) interferes with your start, don't postpone it. Procrastination is the thief of the best planned tours. Plan your trip so that you don't cover as many miles as you think you are capable of during the first three days. After that—fly. I can remember my first extended tour. Two of us planned the trip through Vermont and New Hampshire—500 miles in six days. Two weeks before ride off date, my partner gave the signs and excuses and finally backed out 10 hours before departure time. I went without him and he is STILL planning his first tour.

Take time out from the rigors of the everyday existence and follow the advice of Peter







Every Single Second
 If someone asked you what costs \$1,000 a second, you might think of a number of things like the last time you talked to your lawyer, your accountant, a car salesman from whom you bought your last automobile or maybe the real estate man that sold you your home. You might be close to the mark in all four cases, but there is something else that is pretty expensive too and that is paying the interest on the national debt. It amounts to about \$55 thousand per minute — close to \$1,000 every second.

The federal debt is expected to pass the \$500 billion mark this fiscal year and may hit \$508 billion by June 30, 1975. As things now stand, that thousand-dollars-per-second adds up to \$29.1 billion, or 65 percent of all the corporate taxes collected every year. All of that money being spent by government adds to the demand for goods and services by increasing the number of dollars circulating, even as it depreciates their value.

The American people just elected a new Congress. May it exhibit the understanding and the guts to bring spending levels under control and pursue effective, if not always popular, measures to tame the scourge of inflation.





Benjamin Franklin and Unity
Two hundred years ago this week Benjamin Franklin became the focus of attention in two matters.

The first was in the question of continental unity. Franklin had been concerned for many years about the need of the colonies to act in a unified manner. Twenty-one years earlier in 1754 during the French and Indian War he had proposed the so-called "Albany Plan of Union" that would have created a limited continental government. It had been rejected by both the British and the colonial governments.

Now in 1775 Franklin again

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believed that a continental government was needed since the Continental Congress was the only existing framework. Franklin explained that it was only a rough framework that needed refinement. Congress received his suggestion buttable it immediately. In truth, Franklin was still ahead of his time— in this instance by about a year.

The second matter in which Franklin was involved was the establishment of a continental postal system. Congress recognized the need for some system that could convey messages from one end of the continent to another as rapidly as possible. During May Congress had appointed a committee headed by Franklin to study the matter. On July 26, Congress accepted the report and created a postal department with Franklin named as postmaster general. This was an appropriate appointment since he had served in a similar capacity under royal control.

Another pressing need was the matter of caring for wounded American soldiers. On July 25, Dr. Benjamin Church was named the first Surgeon General of the Continental Army. Congress approved the hospital organization and the positions within it. As chief physician Church was to name his subordinates. Church was a capable surgeon, but his

chief distinction, unfortunately, came from his passing of army secrets to the British. Later, on October 4, 1775, he was court-martialed with Washington presiding and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Spanish New Mexico, in the meantime, was still struggling to supply itself with an adequate number of animals. Prices generally did not change much in the eighteenth century except for horses. Because they were so important, prices in the 1780's varied from twenty to fifty pesos on the open market when the official government price was listed at eleven and one-half pesos. Furthermore, the Commandante - Inspector of Chihuahua constantly complained that New Mexican traders always returned home with more horses than they paid for. Obviously, the horse was a valuable commodity in Spanish New Mexico.

THIS REMOTE CARDIAC MONITOR is located in the nurse's station in Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital. It is connected to two cardiac monitors in the intensive care unit and from these bedside monitors provides instant knowledge of a patient's heart condition. Prior to the installation of this system, condition changes were obtainable only by doing an electrocardiograph tracing, which could not be run continuously. By applying four wires to the patient and connecting them to the cardiac monitor, changes in heart function may be observed instantly. Alarms are built into the system to alert nursing personnel to any changes in heart rate, or failure of the heart beat. This unit is in almost constant use. Dr. Edward Stalzer is shown monitoring a patient's heart beat.

Will The U.S. Back Down?
Russia backed down during the Cuban missile crisis for the plain and simple reason that we had superior military strength.
We no longer are superior. Russia has better ABM protection than we do, she has more ICBMs, and her leaders are in firm command of the Russian people.
Our people are demoralized by a war we never fought to win. In the beginning of that war most Americans were in favor of containing communism. Now the principles of isolationism prevail.

Russia will precipitate another crisis as soon as her leaders feel that the time is ripe. When this time comes, will our president stand up to Russia or will he back down?
If he backs down, our enslavement or destruction becomes a certainty, for our avowed enemy would never give us time to rebuild our strength.
If he doesn't back down, one of four things will happen:
(1) Russia may back down again— but this is wishful thinking if she has sufficiently greater strength and is capable of destroying us.
(2) Russia may ignore our protestations and proceed with whatever takeover produced the crisis— and we will have neither the will nor the power to stop her.
(3) Russia may attempt to destroy us with an overwhelming first strike.
(4) The doves, the peace

mongers, and the faint of heart may clamor so loudly for surrender that the voices of freedom and justice cannot be heard. Our president will lose his determination and back down, or the enemy will have sufficient assurance of our lack of will to resist that she will proceed with our enslavement or destruction. We must regain our lost military superiority before the next crisis occurs or the freedom so many of our finest have fought and died for will be lost for many generations to come. That they were lost because of our desire for peace will make their loss no less painful.
If we have military superiority and are willing to use it, we will never have to use it. This is the way to peace.
If we are weak our enemies will try to subjugate us. This is the way to war.
Write your congressman, your senators and the president. Tell them whether you want America to be weaker or stronger than Russia.







Jockey didn't give up

"The third time's a charm," so the saying goes. And that's the way it seems to be working for Ruidoso Downs Apprentice Jockey Robert Thompson.

Robert has been riding at Ruidoso since the start of the current meeting. But it's not the first time he's been to the mountain track. In fact, he's been here two years previously — both times as an apprentice.

"Something always went wrong for me," says Thompson. "The year before last I couldn't do anything right. I don't think it had so much to do with the quality of mounts I was riding. I just couldn't get the ball rolling. I gave up and went back to Gatesville, my home in East Texas."

Last year Robert tried it again. "I came up after the Rainbow Futurity to ride the rest of the meet and then continue from there. Everything went alright at Ruidoso, but when I got to the State Fair at Albuquerque, something went sour again. I was winning a race by about three lengths on Donna My Dear when she flipped. I went sailing into the rail and wound up with a broken collar bone and a cracked shoulder. That laid me out for the rest of the year."

This year Robert seems to have found the right combination. With a half of the meet over, Thompson has been riding a winner in just about one out of every six trips, and has climbed into the top 10 in the

standings. And that doesn't say anything for the second or third places he's gathered.

Where did the young reinsman get his start? You might say he literally busted into the horse business — bronc busting, that is.

"I've always been around horses. I used to break and train ranch horses for my uncle at his ranch there in Gatesville. It was more fun than work."

"I went pretty easily from that to riding in the youth rodeos in East Texas — 4-H and school-sanctioned affairs. There wasn't any pay. The prizes were usually buckles or sometimes a saddle at the bigger events, but it was fun and quite a challenge."

"I tried a little of everything from bareback riding to roping and considered myself pretty good at it. I made the finals one year and even won a saddle. You hear about all those people getting hurt riding in the rodeo but in the three years I rode, I was never injured seriously."

Robert even thought about going on the professional rodeo circuit at one time, but that was before he got hooked by the horse race business.

"I learned a lot from the rodeo — things like understanding a horse's temperament and how to handle him. It was all good experience. The rodeo is still with me a little. I like to break a few horses during the winter now and then just to

keep my hand in it. But racing is my business now. I love it and wouldn't think of doing anything else."

Robert got his first taste of racing through an East Texas trainer, Jimmy Arilo. Jimmy was running the bush circuit around Columbus, Goliad and Laredo. Jimmy's son was doing all the riding but he needed someone to help gallop. Robert took the job.

"I galloped for about 1½ years before I actually rode a race. Then I spent another 2½ years riding the bush circuit in Texas. I won two or three small futurities and a derby. I think it's probably one of the

best places for a jockey to break in. But there's a world of difference between those tracks and a recognized track like Ruidoso. The bush track isn't nearly as well maintained generally but the rules and operations are exactly the same. The competition can be just as rough, too."

Thompson would probably still be riding the East Texas bush if it hadn't been for one of Ruidoso's top trainers, C. W. "Bubba" Cascio. "Bubba saw me jockey a few races and asked me if I wanted to ride for him. It was probably one of the best breaks I've had in my life. He and Jerry Nicodemus

(one of the top jockeys in the Southwest) have been very patient and taught me a lot."

Thompson hasn't become disenchanted with all the hard work, and there's plenty of that. "I found out real quick it wasn't just riding races. We're out there before the races, after the races — seven days a week, 365 days a year come rain or shine. There's not even a break between meets. When one track closes down, another one is opening up."

Robert's future plans are a little uncertain but he's eyeing a possible riding commitment for a West Coast stable. Whatever the plans, the 19-year-old's "come-back-and-try-again" determination should take him a long way.

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

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What to do for an encore for Easy Jet

After you have an Easy Jet, what do you do for an encore? The answer is Easy Date, a three-year-old filly who's already earned \$717,035, and has all the makings of the first millionaire in quarter horse history.

The filly took a big step toward millionaire status—and looked the very picture of crushing superiority—while winning the \$362,890 Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs. She led from start-to-finish as an even-money favorite in the five-star field.

All of which is something of a dream coming true—again—for Walter Merrick of Sayre, Okla. Merrick's a tall and slow-talking Westerner who talks in the methodical, precise way of a man who knows exactly where he's going. Perhaps the best way to describe Merrick is to say he could pass for the perfect John Wayne sidekick in a Hollywood movie. He also happens

to have a touch of genius when it comes to producing and racing quarter horses.

First of all, take Easy Jet—that colossus of the late 1960's who bowled over the quarter horse industry with wilting speed and a hungry demand for stakes races. "When we developed Easy Jet, it was like a dream coming true," Merrick said. "Of course, we had planned our breeding program in that direction, and we always felt we could come up with a really big horse. Easy Jet earned \$446,000, which made him the richest quarter horse at that time. He was also the first superstar in quarter horse racing."

The way Merrick sees it, Easy Jet is something of a money-making machine. Merrick sold a half-interest in the stallion to Joe McDermott of Houston. Easy Jet's reputation as a sire is now growing by giant steps. Each year, he serves 50 to 70 mares. And with a fee of \$10,000, that's almost like having a license to mint money.

It takes a lot of work, a lot of trial and error, a lot of big dreams to come up with an Easy Jet. And now there's Easy Date (a daughter of Easy Jet, of course), and Merrick and his crew are back on the whirlwind again, back on that dizzy climb to the top of the quarter horse world.

The question Merrick is often asked is this: "How do you compare Easy Date with Easy Jet?" And he replies: "She's just as fast as Easy Jet"—although he supposes most people are hoping he'll say Easy Date is the swifter of the two.

For one man to produce both Easy Jet and Easy Date is almost too much to believe. That's like expecting Joe DiMaggio and Babe Ruth to be brothers.

Even though you have proprietary rights to Easy Jet, that doesn't give you future champions on a silver platter. Merrick says: "After we had Easy Jet, we still had to put in lots of planning and hard work. You can never give up. You have to be constantly planning your breeding program. If you don't, someone else will breed ahead of you. There are so many other people around with excellent mares who are breeding to Easy Jet, so you're always racing against his foals. Just because you own Easy Jet, that doesn't mean you have it all sewed up, by any means. You're always studying pedigrees, looking for those bloodlines which will 'nick' to produce the champion you're after.

One would think a person of Merrick's magnitude and success would have literally hundreds of yearlings to choose from each year. But that's a far cry from the way it is. Merrick, in fact, starts each year with just a handful of hopefuls—which somehow makes the coming of an Easy Date even more improbable.

"We breed 20 to 30 mares each year, and we sell half the foals," he says. "The other half we put in training, and we finally wind up with about 12 to 15 horses we take to the races."

Naturally, Easy Date is the prima donna of the Merrick stable. The man who's closest to her is James McArthur, Merrick's trainer. "He's handled her all through her career, and he's done a tremendous job," Merrick went on. In a way, Easy Date has become something of McArthur's pet.

"I guess we've spoiled her quite a bit," Merrick admits. "She's a little temperamental, and she feels like she's the boss. We always let her have her way, and we never rough her up, or try to correct her. Before a race, she gets a little nervous. She's eager to go ahead and run. But she's gentle and even-tempered. This is the kind of temperament, it seems to me, that quality race horses have."

Easy Date's accomplishments are approaching legend. She's won 18 out of 21

starts. The feathers in her cap include the \$1 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso, the \$210,000 Golden State Derby at Bay Meadows, the \$58,528 Fall Futurity at Sunland Park, the Miss America Futurity at Santa Fe Downs, the Kindergarten Futurity at Los Alamitos, the La Chiquita Futurity at Tucson. Her \$600,000 bankroll makes her the richest quarter horse in history.

"A lot of people probably don't realize what a horse like this is worth," Merrick says. "If we ever decided to sell her, I'm sure a syndicate would be formed pretty quickly to acquire her. I haven't given much thought as to the price tag we'd put on her, but I suppose it would be around \$1 million."

Easy Date is obviously following in the money-bags tradition of Easy Jet, whose current worth is now in the \$4 million range—and picking up steam in view of the fact his offspring, in just two years of racing, have accounted for winnings of well over \$2 million.

How's Your Staying Power?

Public opinion surveys have indicated that most of the American people reacting to President Ford's original economic program felt that he did not go far enough or ask for enough sacrifices. Many expressed willingness to reduce the use of their car and even work harder. Some want rationing and wage and price controls.

What finally happens to the Administration's plan to fight inflation in areas of federal budget cutting and other matters requiring legislative action will depend on what Congress does. Indications are that some of the economic restrictions that are making credit scarce and raising levels of unemployment, are tending to dampen the fires of inflation. But as unemployment figures continue to rise, political and public pressure will inevitably increase for government to boost the money supply and federal spending too rapidly.

The President's economic adviser, Mr. Alan Greenspan, expresses the view that, "If we have patience and good

sense, I believe we have a good chance of gradually working our way out of our present unstable, inflation-ridden situation." It is to be hoped that the opinion polls are right and that the American people are willing to make some sacrifices. If they are not, this country may really be in trouble.

Ruidoso Downs, N.M. — It was a big weekend for Jockeys Don Knight and Jerry Nicodemus at Ruidoso Downs. Both riders booted home seven winners — all except for one of Knight's were in trials for the upcoming Rainbow Futurity.

Jockey-of-the-Week went to Don Knight based on the number of seconds. Knight had two. Nicodemus only had one.

Knight's big day was Thursday when he scored five times from six rides. His winners were Charlie Bird in the seventh race, Spy Glass in the eighth, Irish Abby in the 11th, Easily in the 12th and Diamond Priss in the 13th. Three of those qualified for the final eliminations — Easily, Irish Abby and Charlie Bird.

Knight returned on Friday to win and qualify aboard Lo-

va Native and then added the last on Saturday aboard Talking Picture in the sixth race. He now stands at nine wins, two seconds and three thirds from 20 rides for the season.

Nicodemus recorded all seven of his on Friday. Six of those qualified for the finals. They were Windy Ryon — who set the top qualifying time — Go Fantacia, Rain Onya, I'm Gorgeous, Rule The Roost and Country Mama. His work kept him in third place overall with 34 wins from 148 rides.

Jerry Burgess managed to snatch the top spot from Willie Lovell, riding six winners. That boosted his record to 36 victories from 203 mounts. Lovell dropped to second.

H. Don Farris copped the

trainer honor. Farris sent 18 to the track and bagged eight victories — five of those in trials for the Rainbow. He moved up from sixth overall, to second — just eight away from the leader Bubba Cascio with 27 wins — this week.

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
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Hoofbeats

Members of the management and staff at Ruidoso Downs were deeply saddened by the passing of Wendell Cumley. Wendell, who ran the photo-finish camera for three years at both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park while attending the University of Texas at El Paso, died of injuries in a car accident last Thursday. George Taylor, another member of the Ruidoso and Sunland Park staff, was also in the mishap. He's reported to be recovering at William Beaumont General Hospital in El Paso.

Thursday racing had its high and low spots. Nearly everybody collected in the daily double when two top-heavy favorites — Watch A Native (30 cents on the dollar) won the first race and Confederate Jet (70 cents on the dollar) scored in the second. The payoff was \$4.80 for the seasonal low. Then to balance the situation there were only six quinella players who correctly matched Oh Who (35.80) and Granny Carrett (62.20) in the third to collect the \$1,187 high Quinella payoff of the season.

Despite the intermittent rain on Thursday and the duck-soup track on Friday, some amazingly fast times were recorded in the first round of trials for the upcoming \$350,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity. Windy Ryon streaked the 400 yards in the top clocking of 19.89 seconds. That's only 24 seconds slower than the track record. It was the first trip in competition for the Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Phillips, Jr.-owned and Bubba Cascio-trained colt.

OTHER TRIAL NOTES: Jockeys Jerry Nicodemus and Don Knight accounted for almost half the trial wins during the two days. Knight knocked out five victories on Thursday aboard Charlie Bird in the seventh, Spy Glass in the eighth, Irish Abby in the 11th, Easily in the 12th and Diamond Priss in the 13th. Three of those — Easily, Irish Abby and Charlie Bird — qualified for the final elimination round. Knight came back on Friday to win and qualify aboard Lova Native. Nicodemus won an unprecedented seven races on Friday. Six of those qualified — Windy Ryon, Go Fantacia, Rain Onya, I'm Gorgeous, Rule The Roost and Country Mama. Chick's Dimples 3 was his only winner that didn't make the list. Jockey Tomy Zarate scored his first victory on a recognized track Thursday aboard Bottom's Up and just as important, qualified the filly for the final elimination round. Bubba Cascio fielded the most qualifiers. He had two on Thursday — Girl O' My Dreams and Masked Bug — and five on Friday — Windy Ryon, Hyjonjet, I'm Gorgeous, Rule The Roost and Country Mama. The surprise qualifiers were Oh Who and Granny Garrett who ran first and second respectively in Thursday's third race. Oh Who went off at 17-1 and won by 1 1/4 lengths. Granny Garrett was pegged at 74-1. Anne and B. F. Phillips, Jr., who own Windy Ryon, the fastest qualifier of the trials, also own Dash For Cash, the winner of the Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park. Bugs Alive in 75 chalked up his seventh career victory, winning Friday's 11th race trial. The Bug has only been beaten twice — once in the Sun Country Futurity and the other in the Kansas Futurity. Seven of the 10 finalists of the recent Kansas Futurity made the qualification cut. They were Girl O' My Dreams, Rule The Roost, Bugs Alive in 75, Chick's Deck, Rain Onya, Mr. Breakthru and Go Fantacia.

Curragh Maich found the mad to his liking and took the long board meeting.

Saturday's eighth race. The gelding won the six-furlong claiming event by 1 1/4-lengths and paid \$74.80. Curragh Maich and Without Hesitation (3-2) in the eighth race matched with Azure Dee (8-1) and Mr. Easy Go (1-1) in the ninth race paid eight lucky Big Q ticket holders a generous \$2,642.

Roktak, a first-time starter, showed more experienced maidens how it's done in Sunday's first race. The filly came from off the pace to a half-length victory in the 5 1/2-furlong affair. She paid \$14.60 and Mike Meador had the ride. Twin Jet made up for his loss to Chicory Moon by a nose in last week's Jet Deck Stakes. The four-year-old won Sunday's 400-yard fourth race by a nose. Scenic Dancer, one of the standouts of the '74 Ruidoso meeting, established himself as a major threat for the Billy The Kid Handicap on July 20. In last Sunday's co-feature, Scenic Dancer made up plenty of ground with an impressive three-length win. LeRoy Coombs was up.

Accommodation And Entertainment Map Of The Ruidoso Area







Accommodation And Entertainment Map Of The Ruidoso Area


