Disaster could hit Lincoln County... right? When disaster strikes, people need help... right? Help like first aid... first aid administered by knowledgeable people... right? That's what the Disaster Defense Task Force (DDTF) has been organized for... and that's why DDTF is now in the final stages of polishing their

plans to perfection... to help people in the event of disaster. Comes now Mrs. Virginia Spall... the boss lady for medical aid and sustenance under the DDTF plan. She needs a reliable crew, in the event of disaster. This is where you... if you'd like to be able to help people as you'd like to be helped if you needed aid, assistance and first aid care... come in. There'll be an organiza-

tional meeting at 7:30 p. m., Aug. 7 in the council chambers of Ruidoso Village Hall... a meeting to organize volunteers to serve on the DDTF's first aid disaster team. — Have a desire to be of help to people who might require first aid in the event of disaster in Lincoln County. THE DEAL IS, Mrs. Spall, safety program director for DDTF, needs to form a staff to be called the Emergency Medical Action Group... this staff must be qualified... must be willing to step in when and if disaster strikes... to give their fellow man a helping hand. You see, Mrs. Spall as Ruidoso's "Red Cross lady" has many responsibilities... and, as far as DDTF is concerned, she's charged with directing all first aid operations, with liaison between other emergency medical agencies, and has the authority to feed and house evacuees... among other responsibilities. See, now, why she needs some trained, dedicated, available assistants? As to when you'd be called to duty... as a member of the

DDTF first aid team... it'd be in the event of fire [forest or other] where there'd be injured, flood, riot, any disaster. And it follows, if the plan is to work, that those called would have to know the score... and how the game plan works. And that... briefly... presents the problem. The opportunity is yours to join a first aid team to provide a solution to any problems arising from disaster. You can get in on the ground

floor... and, if disaster strikes, you can pitch in, without hope of fee or reward... to provide first aid to disaster victims. IF YOU'RE READY, willing, able... trained or untrained... to be of service if disaster disrupts the tranquility everyone enjoys in Lincoln County... step forth to be counted at that Aug. 7, 7:30 p. m. meeting. Oh, yes... you'll like working with Virginia Spall.

# Rainbow Futurity Sunday

**CHASING THE RAINBOW** — The probable betting choice in Sunday's Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs is Bugs Alive In 75. The colt, who has all the makings of a champion, has won 8 out of 10 starts so far and collected \$130,984. He's owned by Ralph Shebester of Wynnewood, Okla. The colt is shown off above by Mrs. Shebester and her daughter, Mona. The Rainbow Futurity will be televised live throughout the Southwest.

Chick's Deck, owned by G. R. Russell of El Paso, will be entertaining a dream of a Triple Crown sweep when the Rainbow Futurity comes due on Sunday at Ruidoso Downs. The 400-yard thriller carries a purse of \$315,140. Of this amount, the winner gets \$103,276. The Rainbow will be televised live by the All-American Network to a 14-state audience of nearly seven million. Earlier in the meeting, Chick's Deck got away as a 10-1 outsider in the Kansas Futurity — the first leg of the Triple Crown — and raced to a solid 1 1/2-length victory. The heavy favorite, Bugs Alive In 75, got off to a crooked start in the Kansas, but came flying at the end and nailed down second. Nevertheless, Chick's Deck looked extremely impressive while breaking alertly in a straight-as-an-arrow path. He won with great authority. In the two qualifying rounds for the Rainbow Futurity, Chick's Deck continued to make a big impression. He won his first-round assignment by a nose at 90 cents on the dollar. Two weeks ago, he made the qualifying cut for the finale by banging out a length win as a topheavy betting choice. If Chick's Deck can prevail

on Sunday, his next assignment for the Triple Crown sweep will be the toughest of all — the \$1 million All-American Futurity. But Chick's Deck isn't exactly in for a picnic in the Rainbow. He'll face such crackerjack competition as Bugs Alive In 75 and Windy Ryon, and probably won't even get away as the betting choice. With a career record of 5-1-1 from seven starts, he holds a bankroll of \$144,025, and that makes him the richest member of the Rainbow lineup. Here's the way the field looks in order of qualifying times (career earnings are in parenthesis): Bugs Alive In 75, 19.91 (\$130,984); Windy Ryon, 19.92 (\$2,460); Chick Called Sue, 19.96 (\$15,935); Go Gred Breeze, 20.05 (\$1,606); Chick's Deck, 20.06 (\$144,025); Hyjonijet, 20.07 (\$5,673); Delilah Go, 20.14 (\$7,008); Irish Abby, 20.15 (\$7,013); Chick's Image Girl, 20.18 (\$19,128); I'm Sincere, 20.18 (\$6,227). Bugs Alive In 75, who's won 8 out of 10 starts so far (including the \$215,000 West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park). He looked better than ever two weeks ago while zipping home with a length lead in the top-qualifying time. The brilliant colt is owned by Ralph Shebester of Wynnewood, Okla. Windy Ryon, the property of Anne and B. F. Phillips of

Frisco, Texas, looks like a tremendous prospect — despite the fact he's been to the race only twice. The colt broke into racing on July 11 and carved out a neat 3 1/4-length win at a relatively low 6-5 in the mutuels. The triumph came in the first-elimination round of the Rainbow. In the final round, Windy Ryon went against much tougher competition, but he showed his mettle by digging in and racing to a head win as an odds-on favorite. First post through Saturday is 1:30 p. m. On Sunday, in deference to the Rainbow telecast, activities will get underway at the early starting time of 1 p. m.

# Downs water project set

Mayor J. J. DiPaolo reported to the Ruidoso Downs Council Monday evening that the FHA loan for the purchase of Denton Field had been closed on July 23 and that the village would pay the loan back at the rate of \$641 per month for the next 40 years on the project. He explained the uses of the property and funds for the water expansion program and noted that it should be completed in about 3 weeks. A minimum monthly rate for water users of \$8.50 has been recommended for the repayment of the loan. DiPaolo also noted that it was expected that bids for land for the village sewer project would be called this fall and that a survey was now being conducted for a location of the plant. Laverne Cole attended her first meeting on Monday and was welcomed to the board of trustees. DiPaolo appointed Noel Mullins mayor pro-tem and the appointment was approved by the board. Police chief Lynn Martin

asked the council to replace a stationary radar system with a moving system and noted that the lease-purchase price on the unit would be \$80.15 per month as opposed to the present cost of \$47 per month. He pointed out that the State Police has asked to use the unit, if the change is approved. The matter was tabled until the next meeting of the board. The council accepted a bid of \$3,408.60 from Daniels Engineering of Alamogordo, for the preparation of an aerial map of the village. The bid was accepted pending an opinion of the village council on the legality of the acceptance. A bid of \$202 from Melatone Sanchez for the old police car was accepted. A resolution calling for the changing of the Ruidoso Downs Post Office to a Ruidoso substation was tabled pending further study. Lincoln County Humane Society president Joe Truitt was a visitor to the meeting and reported on activities of the society. He noted that, in the last 30 days, the society had handled a total of 94 dogs and cats, 24 of which were brought to the shelter by the Ruidoso Animal Control Officer. 49 animals were adopted out and there were 30 boarders at the shelter. A \$2 per day boarding fee is charged. He stated that only eight animals were claimed by their owners. There are now 28 animals on hand. The shelter capacity is 60. He also explained the procedure used in cases of dog bites. The council approved a resolution calling for new bank signature cards. Names to appear on the cards are: Mayor J. J. DiPaolo, clerk Billie Surmick, and mayor pro-tem Noel Mullins. DiPaolo reported that the village had been offered the purchase of water rights from the Ruidoso River and that the cost of the rights would amount to about \$30,000. Such a purchase would necessitate a bond issue. He noted that the village would need additional water in the future and would never be able to purchase such water rights cheaper. An attorney representing Rosemary D'Elia was present at the meet with a request that the village vacate a dedicated road in the Ruidoso Gardens Subdivision that is not in use. He stated that a release from the only affected party had been obtained. After a brief discussion, the matter was tabled for further study. A request for a water bill adjustment was denied by the council. DiPaolo reported that the village water superintendent had been relieved of his duties and that the assistant water superintendent was now acting in that capacity. Two occupational licenses were approved after considerable discussion. The next regular meeting of the board will be held at the Ruidoso Downs Village Hall on August 11 at 8 p. m. Meetings are open to the public.

# Summer Horse Sale totals \$455,850

The third annual Select Summer Sale of Thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses at Ruidoso Downs put 137 head through the auction ring and accounted for total sales of \$455,850. This figures out to an average of \$3,327. Last year, 80 head brought \$245,250, an average of \$3,178. The sale topper this time was the unnamed chestnut yearling by Walker's out of Oriental Girl. The colt, consigned by Rancho Jonata of Buellton, Calif., brought \$21,000. The successful bidder was Leo Villareal of El Paso. The second-high price of \$16,000 went to Native Ruler, a seven-year-old mare consigned by W. R. Hancock of Paducah, Ky. Agent Grady Stowe submitted the successful bid. Walter Merrick, the well-known horseman from Sayre, Okla., picked up the well-bred sorrel mare, Sea Nymph Go, for \$14,000. Sea Nymph Go is by Go Man Go out of Sea Nymph. The consignor was Grafton Moore of Holly, Mich. Here are the other high-points of the sale: —\$14,000 paid for Dresden by Agent Rex Jordan. Dresden, by Buxx Bar out of Custus Liz, was consigned by Mr. and Mrs. Lou Tuck of Littleton, Colo. —\$12,000 paid for Fentress [SEE PAGE NINE]



**THESE DAYS**  
An AP article says Governor Jerry Apodaca has created, by executive order, a Council of Economic Advisors, with "five university professors and nine other experts" on the panel, with a staff of two full-time paid persons. This Council is to keep the governor advised concerning pending legislation, assess economic impact of government decisions and plan the State's economic future.  
Interesting thing — the way the expenses of this council are being paid. It is claimed the University of New Mexico Bureau of Research set up an account with a zero balance, which now shows a deficit of around \$63,000! Assistant to the Chairman, Alvin Baca, is quoted as saying, "The UNM is paying us out of the goodness of their hearts in expectation of being reimbursed." — There seems to be some vagueness about how they expect to be reimbursed. Shouldn't take a college professor to tell the governor what the economic impact of that kind of financing will be on the state. We think this might be called more aptly "the Spondonomics Council".  
Then — among the attempted explanations for the failure of the crime rate to rise in Albuquerque while the police were on strike, Police Captain Lane Vance is quoted as saying, "Hoods have no rights without police protection." — That is not to say the police WANT to protect hoods. That's what our lawmakers seem to want.  
According to Jonathan Wolman, Associated Press writer, one Ron Pollock, director of the Food Research and Action Center, "spends much of his time suing the U. S. Department of Agriculture to force extension of federal food assistance." And, the U. S. Circuit Court, in Washington agreed with FRAC that the Department of Agriculture "has been in violation of the law in not assuring recipients are able to obtain a nutritious diet."  
What is that great, big, bureaucracy, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare doing? When will our government set up another bureaucracy for Nutrition for the Individual? They could have representatives in all the grocery stores to make sure everybody buys what the government dictates would balance his diet correctly. Cost to the taxpayer shouldn't matter — not in this day of "spondonomics".





**THESE DAYS**  
An AP article says Governor Jerry Apodaca has created, by executive order, a Council of Economic Advisors, with "five university professors and nine other experts" on the panel, with a staff of two full-time paid persons. This Council is to keep the governor advised concerning pending legislation, assess economic impact of government decisions and plan the State's economic future.

Interesting thing — the way the expenses of this council are being paid. It is claimed the University of New Mexico Bureau of Research set up an account with a zero balance, which now shows a deficit of around \$63,000! Assistant to the Chairman, Alvin Baca, is quoted as saying, "The UNM is paying us out of the goodness of their hearts in expectation of being reimbursed."

Shouldn't take a college professor to tell the governor what the economic impact of that kind of financing will be on the state. We think this might be called more aptly "the Spondonomics Council". Then — among the attempted explanations for the failure of the crime rate to rise in Albuquerque while the police were on strike, Police Captain Lane Vance is quoted as saying, "Hoods have no rights without police protection." That is not to say the police WANT to protect hoods. That's what our lawmakers seem to want.

According to Jonathan Wolman, Associated Press writer, one Ron Pollock, director of the Food Research and Action Center, "spends much of his time suing the U. S. Department of Agriculture to force extension of federal food assistance." And, the U. S. Circuit Court, in Washington agreed with FRAC that the Department of Agriculture "has been in violation of the law in not assuring recipients are able to obtain a nutritious diet."

What is that great, big, bureaucracy, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare doing? When will our government set up another bureaucracy for Nutrition for the Individual? They could have representatives in all the grocery stores to make sure everybody buys what the government dictates would balance his diet correctly. Cost to the taxpayer shouldn't matter — not in this day of "spondonomics".



**WAR GAMES**

Military strategists should and do play "litty" war games. They speculate what we should do if Russia did thus and so. For instance if Russia were to march on Western Europe our forces and NATO's would be overrun in days or weeks unless we used nuclear weapons.

Morris Udall and Terry Sanford had denounced first use of nuclear weapons as "outrageous" and "irresponsible," but I submit that if we were to let Russia conquer all of Europe simply because we didn't have enough manpower there to stop her, that would be "outrageous" and "irresponsible."

It would be better for the United States to regain military superiority over the Soviets and reaffirm John F. Kennedy's 1961 statement to Congress that we will use whatever weapons are appropriate. But, if we are not going to regain our military superiority, then it would be best for Americans to assure Russia we won't be the first to use nuclear weapons. Millions of Europeans would die in a European Pearl Harbor, but it might wake us up in time.

**Army Notes**

Medics, chaplains, a shotless battle, a volunteer General, and aviation. All were important during this week in history.

The U. S. Army Medical Department celebrates its 200 birthday on July 27. Although established in 1775, it was not until 1818 that the title Surgeon General was officially adopted. The history of the Army medics is not only one of heroic efforts in wartime, but of extensive contributions to the health of this nation in peacetime.

President Kennedy said to Congress on March 28, 1961: "In the event of a major aggression that could not be repulsed by conventional forces, we must be prepared to take whatever action with whatever weapons are appropriate."

The use of nuclear weapons on the invading armies, but not Russian cities, would be justifiable, reasonable and responsible. It would be the only alternative to accepting an unacceptable alternative—communist domination of all of Europe.

If we were to assure Russia that we would not use nuclear weapons first under any conditions, Russia would probably conquer Europe within the next twelve months.

Solzhenitsyn has said that when Russia is five or ten times as strong as we are it will be too late. She will then take over the rest of the world at whatever pace suits her. And she will dare us to stop her with the threat of annihilation if we lift a finger.

As you come into Mescalero  
either from the east or west,  
your heart is uplifted, just by  
the looks of the mountains and  
valleys—the way they come  
together in a way to make you  
want to return to this spot  
again, and again.  
When first you arrive at this  
enchanting little capital of the  
Mescalero Apaches, the  
thought comes to you that  
surely this is a sacred place.  
Then, suddenly, all your  
eye-sight and your attention  
are drawn to one of the most  
beautiful land-marks to be

devoted Indian followers.  
I think I remember hearing  
Father Braun telling me that  
an old stone mason who had  
worked on churches for the fa-  
mous and revered Father  
Junipero Serra of the Califor-  
nia missions—that this elderly  
stone worker had come to  
Mescalero to help with the  
stone work and give some  
pointers out of his long experi-  
ence. I wish somebody would  
tell me the name of this man.  
During World War II the  
church stood half finished for  
the four years that Father  
Braun was a captive in a  
Japanese prisoner of war  
camp.  
After the war Father Braun  
returned and finished the  
church. And today it stands on  
a high point to the South of the  
village looking out and down  
casting its sacred influence  
constantly upon the Mescalero  
people, and reminding them  
always of their beloved Father  
Braun.  
Today it is especially beau-  
tiful after the July rains. The  
pink tile roof and the stone  
with a light pink cast make the  
church shine forth like a  
great glowing jewel set in the  
bright emerald cast of the  
mountains and valleys.  
**Honored For Sixty  
Years A Priest**  
Just the other day I received  
in the mail a section of the Ariz-  
ona Republic with a story  
about Father Braun, by Rob-  
ert Greiff. Father Braun,  
now eighty-five years old, was  
honored at a mass held in the  
Sacred Heart Home in Phoen-  
ix for his sixty years' in the  
priesthood.  
(I do not know the name of  
the person who sent me the  
paper. It was sent from some  
small town in Arizona. There  
was a box number. But now I  
have lost the wrapping, and I  
wish the one who sent the ar-  
ticle would write me telling his  
or her name so I can write and  
say how much I appreciate the  
article.)  
The story went on to say that  
Father Braun still is active in  
the church, working as a fam-  
ily and marriage counselor

among the poor. He took part  
in the mass held in his honor.  
The article mentioned that  
Father Braun saved many sol-  
diers from starving in the pris-  
on camp by obtaining food  
any way he could. And I know  
he kept the morale of the sol-  
diers by his great spiritual  
strength, and thus helped  
them to survive.  
**Pruning Trees  
In Priestly Robes**  
Just after World War II, I  
used to visit the reservation  
and go over and see how Fa-  
ther Braun's church was pro-  
gressing. He assured me that  
the large structure would  
surely be finished. I still am  
filled with admiration and al-  
most surprise at the marvel  
this great church now stands  
as a victory for Christianity,  
through the faith and never-  
ceasing hard work of a man  
and his faithful followers.  
One time down below Mescalero,  
also just after World War II,  
I saw Father Braun out in an  
orchard down below

# Hoofbeats

Liz Devine, Ruidoso Downs nominations secretary, reports \$1,144,200 is already in the till for the '75 All-American Futurity. That's quite a boost over last year, when \$1,082,000 had been plunked down at this time. A good hunk of the current inflow resulted from 15 supplemental nominees at \$6,250 each. Last year, there were 10 such late-nominees. Since the All-American Futurity now carries a \$1,030,000 limit, the excess funds go into the following year's All-American Derby. The current surge means the '76 Derby could reach the \$660,000 range. The '75 All-American Derby is projected at \$520,000.

Master Salls came from off the page for a 1 1/4-length victory in Saturday's ninth race and became the first five-time winner of the meet. The five-year-old horse, owned by Maude Carter of Houston, has just about made the distance rounds. He won in allowance company at 5 1/2 furlongs; picked off the Mesalero-Apache and Governor's Handicaps at 6 1/2 furlongs; and scored in the Billy The Kid 'Cap at seven furlongs. Saturday's bout in allowance company was at 870 yards. He's trained by George Cosper. Jeff Thrasher is the regular rider.

A couple of quarter horses approached records during Saturday's program. Mongo Jet whipped three-year-old allowance-competition by one-half length in the 400-yard third race. He stopped the clock at 19.91 — just .26 seconds over the track record. Twin Jet held a two-length cushion while winning the 550-yard fifth race. His time of 26.95 seconds was just .30 slower than the track mark.

Lesfer's Te Time is earning his keep for Trainer Perry Walker. The gelding was tracked twice last weekend. He finished first against \$2,250 claimers and sixth in \$3,500 company. This week he came back for a neck victory in \$3,000 competition.

Jockey Leroy Coombs made a clean sweep of the last three races on Saturday. Coombs won by three lengths on Feliz Navidad — a 15-1 longshot — in the 10th race, then guided

Bar Dearie to a head win in the featured Zia Stakes and rode Youbettwill to a two-length victory in the 12th.

An early starting time of 1 p. m. — in deference to the 14-state telecast of the Rainbow Futurity — will be in effect on Sunday, reminds General Manager Al Rosa. First post through Saturday is the regular 1:30 p. m. And, as in past seasons, the advance wagering window on the Rainbow Futurity will be open in the grandstand from Thursday through Sunday's seventh race. Advance wagers in the amounts of \$2, \$5 and \$10 — win, place or show — will be available.

New York publishers, Farrar, Straus and Giroux, Inc., recently contacted Starter Dean Turpitt in reference to an article which appeared in The New Yorker last year. The article, written by John McPhee and recently included in the book "Pieces of The Frame", shows Dean as a key figure in the story of Ruidoso's All-American Futurity. It seems a film company is now interested in producing a film with a quarter horse background. Much of the filming will be done at Ruidoso Downs. One of the fictional characters, according to tentative plans, would be modeled after Turpitt.

Without Hesitation chalked up his fourth win at the meet in Sunday's eighth race. The gelding nosed out a claiming field after .350 yards. That boosted his season record to four wins and two seconds from six starts.

Easy Date added her fourth straight victory at the meet in Sunday's \$65,815 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic. The filly left little to the imagination, crossing the wire 1 3/4 lengths ahead of the pack as a heavy odds-on favorite. That upped her career earning by \$32,907 to a whopping \$751,595 — more than any other quarter horse in history.

Everett's Cole streaked to a five-length victory in Thursday's 870-yard 12th race as the heavy favorite. Owner-trainer George Salcos became the new owner by shelling out a \$2,000 claiming price to Charles Hanson. In other claiming action, You Rascal

You, who finished second in the 550-yard seventh race, went to Joe Schindler for \$5,000. The previous owner was J. R. Shaw. Limponin finished out of the money in the 9th race but he was worth \$4,000 to R. L. Battles. The previous owner was S. E. Gutierrez.

After 42 days of racing, 219 different trainers have taken part in 498 races. A total of 122 have made the winner's circle trip at least once.

Texas Man seems to have found his right distance. The two-year-old started at four furlongs three times and could only manage an eighth as his best. Thursday he went 5 1/2 furlongs against \$5,000 claimers and won by a nose in the first race.

Spy Glass scored his third win of the meet in Friday's seventh race against some pretty hefty claimers. The colt licked \$15-20,000 company by a length after 400 yards. Previously he'd scored against \$10,000 claimers and in a trial for the Rainbow Futurity.

Kleburg's Intent notched his second straight victory in Friday's second race. The four-year-old gelding stretched an early lead against claimers to 1 1/2 lengths at 440 yards. That was his first effort since March when he won in allowance company at Midland Downs, Texas.

Admiral's Blade, the recent winner of the \$212,000 Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park, scored the biggest victory in Saturday's trials for the Land Of Enchantment Futurity at Raton. But the colt finished second and had to make the finale by luck of a draw. The Brooks Claridge-trained two-year-old has amassed a tidy \$151,000, scoring five wins and two seconds from seven career starts.



The American people need to wake up and realize that the U.S. farming industry is the agricultural marvel of the world — bar none. The U.S. farmer — whose hayseed stereotype is usually depicted on TV — is dumb like a fox. He has outsmarted the brainiest captains of industry in this most industrialized of all nations. He has made state supported farmers in socialist nations all over the world look like a bunch of turn-of-the-century sharecroppers.

The Japs are outproducing and underselling us in electronics. The West Germans now skin us alive in steelmaking. Hong Kong and a multitude of other low labor cost centers of the world now dominate our textiles. Big Oil, America's great contribution to world commerce, has had to go international to survive.

But the U.S. farmer, that marvelous, inventive, hard-working chap, has no peer elsewhere on earth. He is in a class by himself. He's the only thing we've got left who can stand up to foreign competition and thumb his nose at the best they've got. Lately he's singlehandedly been holding up our balance of trade. # Two-Wheeled Traveler

Motorcycling in Mexico during the apparent monsoon season is, at the minimum, interesting. We left for our Mexico meander Monday the 14th and burned a 1,200 mile path in three days on the ole Yamaha 500 to meet with some friends in Mazatlan, Mexico. Our route took us over the U. S. Interstate to Douglas, Arizona the first day. The second day began our unique traveling experience as we left the U. S. and entered the Sonora desert.

At this point I'd like to venture that 400 miles a day on a bike may be pleasurable to some who thrill solely on the riding experience but I'd rather cut the distance and see the sights — after all, that's what it's all about. But we had a schedule to keep until we met with our non-schedule friends.

It became instantly apparent that narrow two-lane highways lent themselves to the cycling experience. And the high price of gas (over a dollar for unleaded — their good stuff with an octane rating of 92) played havoc on the pocketbooks of auto drivers.

Obregon was our destination for a motel night in Mexico, being careful to avoid the "touristas." We brought our Halizon and Clorox but decided bottled water and sodas were a safer bet — but not safe enough! Kapectate to the rescue on no less than three occasions in ten days.

The road through the desert to Obregon was, in a word, HOT. It was so hot in fact that Chris and I soaked our denim jackets in water until they were saturated and then put them on. It was like air conditioning for about ten miles when they were almost bone dry. People sure looked at us funny but it felt great. Little did we know that we would miss the sun the very next day.

Leaving Obregon under an overcast sky, we hoped to make it to Mazatlan with no rain but with 430 miles to our destination, our hopes were later shattered. With 415 miles on the odometer we felt a sprinkle and put on our rain,

Ten miles from the Holiday Trailer Park and we thought we were going to Hawaii via open submarine. It had rained so hard in Mazatlan that the water in the streets was one third of the way up to the wheel axles! Heaven forbid that you should roll into a pothole — you'd drown and wash out to sea before you had time to hit the kill button!

We pulled into the flooded trailer park, found our friends, and promptly checked into a motel for five nights. Our three-man mountain tent was not suitable for underwater camping. We spent five days in Mazatlan with our friends enjoying some beach and sun between the rainy sightseeing before we all decided to return for various reasons which is another story in itself.

Our stay in Mazatlan gave our gluteus maximus muscles a much needed rest and we were ready to ride Monday the 21st. Retracing our route through a little rain toward the middle of the day but dry by Los Mochas we had a bike failure. On the school grading scale, for one hour straight the 500 received a "F" minus as a friendly Mexican mechanic and myself attempted to re-start the bike. It was a unique experience for me. We were riding and then we weren't. No sputter — just dead.

The first thing we checked were the spark plugs and they appeared to be functioning. After an hour we were at the replaced them — instant start! It was only then that I realized that half of the population of Los Mochas was watching when the smiles and whistling alerted me. It was as if everyone were holding their breath as I pushed the starter button in one last attempt. I have since been led to understand that the gasoline they serve eats spark plugs for dinner.

Finding the ground too hard to put our stakes in at the Los Mochas Trailer Park, the attendant let us pitch our tent on the lawn in front of the restaurant which was closed for the season. More rain and a campsite in Guaymas where we met two couples traveling by bike — one on a '69 Harley

Sportster, the other on a '72 Hondo 750.

Their trip started grinding to a slow turnaround in Guaymas from their first day out of San Francisco when the Harley ate a cam. Two days for repairs then the Honda's "Harley conversion wheel" started spitting spokes — seventeen in all. By this time they were in Hermosillo, Mexico and this is where they learned the same lesson we learned in Obregon — no work is done on anything but the Mexican "Islo" brand — everything else must be fabricated in a shop. And so with his spokes.

But all was not well in heaven that day. As he rode from the machine shop on his newly laced rear wheel, a beer can hit his front tire with a death hold and locked it when it jammed the fender causing him to spill and grind the side cover of his engine off. Another day lost locating the owner of the only 750 Hondo in town. And he agreed to take the cover off of his engine with the promise one would be sent to him!

The next morning we got up and made tracks for Nogales where the seven of us spent over an hour at customs and then on to Tucson. Our one day of no rain didn't last as we motored into Deming a dust

storm which turned into a rainstorm to Las Cruces but cleared up to give us a cold night ride into Ruidoso.

Big motorcycles draw the crowds of youngsters in Mexico because the largest thing sold there is a 350 single cylinder Islo two-stroke. The bike becomes an instant conversation starter — if you speak Spanish and Chris would just rattle on to the men while I sat drinking orange sodas. But don't expect service. We couldn't get a replacement screw because the Yamaha was metric threads — a standard the world is seeking. The only four stroke engines are Honda 90's (sold under the Islo name) and Police Harley-Davidsons which are trucked to Tucson for repairs. I don't know how the situation is in Mexico City but it is too far when you need a spark plug! So my advice based on this limited experience is to carry some spare replaceables (points, plugs-two sets, clutch cable, brake cable if your bike is not disc-equipped, and an assortment of nuts and bolts. This would seem minimal to me). Be prepared.

You would think three thousand miles in the saddle with a fair portion of that in the rain would relegate us to the car for awhile. But being the nuts

we are, Sunday when we were invited to bike to Lincoln for the best quality Indian silver lunch we straddled the machine and took off in search of the sun. And I'll give you one guess as to what happened!







# Inside The Capital

SANTA FE — Gov. Jerry Apodaca unveiled his loan executive program today and the idea has much merit.

Executives in New Mexico businesses will be loaned by their employers to state government for short terms for specific projects. The businesses will pay their salaries. The first two loaned executives will labor in the Revenue Bureau and Motor Vehicle Department, one for 30 days and the other for two months.

Gov. Apodaca believes business can contribute to state government to make it more efficient. Business critics state government if it does not operate well.

Now Apodaca is giving business a chance to take part in state government and have a stake in its effectiveness. Loan executives will be used on specific projects state agencies cannot perform themselves.

The program will be continued through the Apodaca administration. It will reach into many state agencies. Jerry Geist and Joe Zanetti of Albuquerque set up the program for Apodaca. Zanetti may become fulltime liaison for the plan.

The plan can be productive. State government can benefit from business expertise. Business, which often shuns government and politics, can learn the nuts and bolts of the Santa Fe operation.

In Minnesota and Texas the value of executives loaned to state government reached millions of dollars.

The state computer agency is shaping agreements with state departments to install two-way terminals in their offices at \$18,120 annual cost per agency.

Data can be sent from terminals into the state's central computer. Information can be retrieved via the same route. The State Automated Data Processing Center has agreements from the Health-Social Services Department and Game-Fish Department.

Agreements are being shaped with the State Education Department and state auditor's office. Deputy Director Fred Ellis of SADPC says: "What we're providing is an opportunity for an agency to build up a computer system on its own."

Ellis says service will be much faster. "The idea is to make each programmer more productive," he says. "They could ordinarily achieve in one day what would usually take at least a week."

The rental cost for the International Business Machines equipment is formidable however. Ellis says the terminals will be extended to other state agencies. The state already pays IBM \$36,000 a month to rent computers at its central data operation.

Ellis says more agencies could be served with 25 to 30 more employees. The waiting list for new or expanded service spans the Revenue Bureau, SDE, Game-Fish Dept., purchasing agent, HSSD, State Transportation Pool, State Museum and Property Tax Department.

Weldon Bason, 26, of Santa Fe, a systems analyst on the court administrator's staff, was fined \$25 by Santa Fe Magistrate Eugene Romero for careless driving in a state car.

Bason pleaded nolo contendere (no contest). A driving while intoxicated charge was dismissed. A State Police officer cited Bason April 1 on

Airport Road in Southern Santa Fe.

Court Administrator Larry Coughenour placed Bason on 90-day probation ending Aug. 24. Formerly of Las Cruces, Bason has been on the staff since Jan. 20. Coughenour says Bason was preparing for a trip on state business when he was cited.

First year experience with the public school finance formula disclosed problems in funding minimally handicapped special education students, bilingual education remedial and enrichment classes, vocational education and the teacher training and experience factor.

Dr. Larry Huxel, assistant chief of public school finance, will look closely at the year-old formula for possible adjustments by the 1976 Legislature. Dr. Huxel attended all of the 90 annual school budget hearings.

He found parents objected to their children being sent to special education classes as minimally handicapped students because they believed a stigma was attached. To serve these children minimally handicapped money may be placed in basic state support.

Santa Fe—The Legislative Health and Aging Committee received four proposed medical malpractice insurance bills that set maximum patient recovery limits on claims.

An advisory committee member and insurance agent, Rep. H. B. Barnard, D-Clovis, is inclined at present to favor a \$100,000 maximum patient recovery plus attorneys' fees and creation of a new patients' compensation fund. All health providers would pay amounts equal to one-third of annual malpractice insurance premiums into the fund until it reached \$5 million. Patient awards up to \$100,000 would be paid from the fund.

Dr. Fred Holzworth, Clovis orthopedic surgeon and president of the Curry-DeBaca-Roosevelt Counties Medical Society, detailed proposed malpractice legislation, shaped by the areas' health providers, for the interim lawmaker committee.

Sen. Ray Leger, D-DeBaca-Guadalupe-San Miguel, and Rep. Bobby Duran, D-Taos, both committee members, back formation of a patients' compensation fund financed by health providers' contributions.

Sen. Leger will revive his effort to legalize substitution of generic name drugs for brand name drugs. Generic name drug prices are usually much lower. Sen. Leger is chairman of a Health and Aging Committee subcommittee that will weigh the generic drug substitution proposal Aug. 15 at Albuquerque. Similar legislation by Leger cleared the Senate in the 1975 Legislature and a House committee but died on the speaker's table.

State Agriculture Director William P. Stephens assigned a team late last week to check a 100,000-acre reported grasshopper infestation in Union County near the Cimarron River on range and hay production land. Also checked was a reported 50,000-acre range caterpillar infestation in Union County's Folsom-Des Moines-Sofia area. Affected ranchers, farmers, state and U. S. Agriculture Dept. officials were set to meet Monday (July 28) at the Union County Courthouse in Clayton on a possible spraying program to curb the outbreaks.

The State Revenue Bureau said only 20 of 95 incorporated New Mexico cities adopted the new .25 of one per cent municipal gross receipts tax, effective next Jan. 1. Among the cities, the Revenue Bureau said, were these municipalities with estimated first year collections: Questa, \$9,000; Raton, \$100,000; Red River, \$16,000; Cimarron, \$7,500; Taos, \$105,000, and Chama, \$14,500. The Revenue Bureau was revising esti-

dated income downward from the new local tax authorized by the 1975 Legislature.

The New Mexico American Revolution Bicentennial Commission approved a \$5,000 Taos project for cultural awareness and an expression program for youth.

State Motor Transportation Commissioner Ruben Miera said construction of a new double port of entry on Interstate 10 at Lordsburg is on schedule. The \$133,100 port, being built by Clay-West Development Corp., Las Cruces, and designed by the Santa Fe architectural firm of Ross and Luna, is set for completion Sept. 2. The MTD may also install a sophisticated computer system at the Lordsburg port, linked to the MTD here.

Sen. Bill Lee, D-Lovington, attended a Southwest Regional Energy Council meeting June 13-15 in Baton Rouge, La., at \$343 cost to taxpayers. Senate Majority Whip Odie Echols, D-Clovis, attended meetings of lawmakers in San Francisco, St. Louis and Phoenix at total cost of \$887 to taxpayers.

Federal money will pay 80 per cent of the cost to buy buses for elderly and handicapped persons in 13 New Mexico communities. Taos is among them. Local funds will pay the balance of costs. Grants will be allocated to non-profit organizations.

A State Highway Department team will conduct studies of the Santa Fe Railway

crossing on Prince Street in Clovis. SHD Urban Highway Engineer John Winton, said a new underpass, an overpass and other alternates will be weighed. Clovis area citizens' comments are requested.

U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., R-Albuquerque, set open office hours from 9 to 11 a. m. Wednesday, Aug. 6, in Des Moines, and 2-4 p. m. the same date in Cimarron.

Gov. Jerry Apodaca will name El Prado Democrat Grace Parr to the State Human Rights Commission for a term ending Dec. 31, 1978. Apodaca named Taos Democrat Rena Rosequist to the State Judicial Council.

The SHD invited interested Lordsburg and Silver City bicyclists to discuss a proposed statewide bikeway network at a Silver City meeting Tuesday (July 29). A similar meeting for Truth or Consequences area bicyclists was scheduled at Truth or Consequences City Hall Wednesday (July 30).

New Mexico irrigation farmers fighting Federal Power Commission action lowering natural gas priority for irrigation from No. 2 to No. 3 won a round in their battle. FPC law judge Curtis Wagner Jr. ruled Southwestern farmers dependent on natural gas for irrigation "deserve a higher No. 2 priority. Rep. Hoyt Pattison, R-Curry-Lea-Roosevelt, an irrigation farmer, is pushing hard for the higher priority. The State Game Com-

**Accommodation And Entertainment Map Of The Ruidoso Area**



## Baha'is seeking Israeli recognition

Rex King, spiritual leader of Orthodox Baha'is throughout the world, is currently in Israel seeking recognition of that faith by the Israeli government.

King, who resides at El Rancho de los Reyes near Manuelitas, New Mexico, is the Regent of the Orthodox Baha'i Faith whose world headquarters are located in that mountainous setting northwest of Las Vegas.

King began his trip on July 14 when he flew from New York City to Madrid. His journey has also taken him to Rome and Florence, where he was scheduled to meet with U.S. dignitaries. In Florence he

visited the grave of the first Regent of the Orthodox Baha'is, Charles Mason Remey, who appointed King, as his successor.

King arrived in Israel last week for what should be a nine-day stay. He said the visit's main purpose was to seek recognition by the Israeli Government of the Orthodox Baha'is, currently a separate group from the Baha'i World Faith, which is known there. He explained that there are several shrines throughout Israel that are sacred to all Baha'is and he hopes to secure visitation privileges for the Orthodox Baha'is.

The shrines in the Baha'i Holy Land include the burial places of the Twin Founders of the Faith, the Bab and

Baha'u'llah. He is scheduled to meet with the deputy minister of religions in Israel for this purpose.

King will also be making contact with the second Guardian of the Baha'i Faith during his stay in the Holy Land.

The national center for the Baha'i World Faith is in Wilmette, Ill. King told of the difficulties the Orthodox Baha'is have had in visiting the Baha'i Temple there and the shrines in Israel, which are under the control of Baha'i World Faith members.

Although membership numbers of the Faith are not made public by Baha'is, the Orthodox Baha'i Faith is found in several countries throughout the world, a spokesman said.

"It is a good idea to call the social security office before going in. A lot of social security business can be handled by phone, and a call may save

you a trip," Hassen suggested.





## BANKING IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS



### Travelers Checks — High Value, Low Cost

Once you have saved, borrowed or otherwise acquired the money to pay for a long-dreamed-of vacation, the question arises: How will you carry it? Cash is too dangerous, credit cards not useful in all circumstances and personal checks almost useless — especially in a foreign country.

Obviously, you want a means of exchange that will provide both wide international acceptance and protection against loss, and nothing fits that bill better than travelers checks. Available to vacationers since the end of

the 19th century, these self-identifying money orders are widely accepted by hotels, merchants and restaurants because they include a guarantee that they will be honored by the issuer if proper cashing procedures have been followed.

Protection against loss is provided by the bank or issuing company itself, provided that you have agreed to and met certain conditions stated at the time of purchase. Specifically, you must be able to provide positive identification of yourself and supply the receipt or the numbers of the lost or stolen checks, or at the very least the name and address of the bank or place where you bought them and the date on which they were purchased.


Then too, you must strictly follow the signature identification system. When you purchase travelers checks, you will sign them once in the presence of the seller and leave behind a sample of your signature for the files. When you cash one of the checks, you sign it again in the presence of the person accepting it so that the two signatures can be compared. Normally, this is the only identification required.

Travelers checks may be obtained in various denominations, usually \$10, \$20, \$50 or \$100. In recent years, they have also become available in the U.S. in some foreign currencies. The fee to purchase them is nominal — normally about one per cent of face value, or \$1 for \$100 worth of checks. In some cases, they are free to bank customers.

Some final tips for safety and quick refunds when checks are lost or stolen:

- Carry your checks in an inside pocket or money belt and keep them in your possession at all times.
- Keep the purchase receipt in locked luggage or the hotel safe, but do not keep it with your checks. If they are lost or stolen, the receipt would also be gone. You might even want to keep a list of the check numbers at home.
- Keep a record of the numbers of the checks you cash, when and where you cashed them and the amount involved so you will know which ones were lost or stolen. And finally,
- Do not sign the checks the second time until the moment you are ready to cash them. If your lost or stolen checks have been signed twice, you will probably have difficulty in obtaining a refund.

At the present time, Frank J. Murray is busy with his third career, running the Indianapolis City Market. The Mayor appointed him to the post in January, 1968, when Murray was 73 years old.

But as a political appointee, Mr. Murray knows his job is not the most secure in the world. So he is preparing for any eventuality.

"I started a real estate office about 18 months ago," Mr. Murray said. "Right now my niece and her husband run it, but if there are any political changes, then I will be ready to move in."

At 80 years of age, Mr. Murray wants to be ready for any new opportunities in life.

If Mr. Murray gets in that real estate office full time, it will be a return to his first career in Indianapolis. He opened a real estate office there in 1915 after serving a year in the Marine Corps.

In 1931 Mr. Murray launched career number two when he started a taxpayers' association. He ran that association until 1968 and during that time kicked up a fuss lobbying in the state legislature.

Then there were some side activities. "I was a political boss for a while, won three elections," he noted with a touch of pride in his voice.

In addition to his work with the Market and the new real estate venture, Mr. Murray finds time to work on a project raising funds for a multicultural education program in a local school.


"This is what we need to learn so we can live together in this country," Mr. Murray said. "It will take twenty years but it could cure the racial controversy."

**Law change requires immunization**  
During the 1975 Legislative Session, Representative Pena, Bernalillo County, proposed a change in the existing School Immunization Law. The law change alters a provision that followed a 30-day grace period for a student to receive the necessary immunizations following enrollment, to a mandatory requirement that a student have the necessary immunizations before registration will be allowed. A record of immunizations from a physician, county health department, or other health facility must be presented at registration. If a student has not received the necessary immunization they will be referred to their physician or the county health department. Once they receive an immunization, registration will be allowed.

Children that are enrolled in school but do not complete the immunization series become in violation of the law. A directive to school superintendents from Mr. DeLayo, Director, Education Department, and Dr. Zalma, Director, State Health Agency, endorses the suspension of students that have not provided proof of immunization, with tentative plans for suspension after November 15th.

Dr. Zalma also stated that county health departments throughout the state will be open during registration to assist parents in qualifying their children for registration by providing the necessary immunizations, but strongly urges parents to avoid the last minute rush by getting immunizations done now.


