WINNER'S SHARE \$165,000 OF \$495,000 PURSE FOR 440-YARD DASH

All-American Derby Sunday

Vin And Vigor, a filly owned by Dorothy and Clarence Scharbauer of Midland, TX, gets a chance to square the record with the great Easy Date in Sunday's All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs, with \$165,001.50 up for grabs as the winner's share.

The 440-yard dash, enriched to the tune of \$495,500, is the world's second richest race. The only race with a bigger purse is Ruidoso's \$1 million All-American Futurity on Labor Day.

Vin And Vigor will go into Sunday's Derby with the top qualifying time of 21.87 seconds. Easy Date, with a clocking of 22 seconds flat, ended up as the fourth-best qualifier. The last meeting between Vin And Vigor and Easy Date came in the \$362,890 Rainbow

Derby July 6. Easy Date won with great authority, while Vin And Vigor was pushed into seventh-place at 22-1 in the

betting. Last year, Vin And Vigor proved she can run by posting a 3-3-0 mark and earning

\$69,367. One of the best performances was chalked up in the rich Rainbow Futurity, which she lost to Tiny's Gay by a nose.

In last week's trials, Vin And Vigor won by nearly two lengths. Keith Asmussen got the riding assignment from trainer H. Don Farris. The filly's career bankroll now stands at \$88,842.

Even though Vin And Vigor set the top qualifying time, there's no doubt Easy Date will again get away as the public choice in her relentless drive to become the industry's first millionaire. The brilliant filly, owned by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Okla., goes into Sunday's showdown with 21 wins from 24 starts. Her bank account is up to \$753,402, which makes her the richest quarter horse of all time — by far.

A sizeable hunk of her income — \$330,000 — came in last year's All-American Futurity, when she nosed out the previously unbeaten Tiny's

Gay. Here's a complete look at the All-American Derby qualifiers: Vin And Vigor, 21.87; Chautos, 21.90; Little Blue Sheep, 21.97; Easy Date, 22 flat; Goetta Miss, 22.02; Pine's Easter Jet, 22.04; Easy Six, 22.05; Sompin Lika Jet, 22.09; Jet Comanche, 22.09; and Three Lit, 22.10.

Indicative of the tremendous quality in the Derby is the fact the total earnings of the field amounts to \$1,365,551.

The second-biggest breadwinner is Easy Six, an Easy Jet colt who's also trained by H. Don Farris. The owner is the S. B. Burnett Estate of Ft. Worth. Easy Six has collected \$168,943 so far.

Another top cash-producer is Chautos, the property of Ed and Lois Black and Roy Forner of Lubbock. Another son of Easy Jet, Chautos has amassed \$103,057. He looked especially sharp while flashing to a half-length win in his elimination trial.

Sunday's agenda also includes the Derby Consolation. The amount to be split up is \$77,298, with the winner getting \$15,380. Here's the field for the Consolation: Bo Rax, 22.11; Rebel Rainbow, 22.11; David Capri, 22.15; Maskeo Lad, 22.16; Vittorio, 22.18; Classic Moon, 22.17; Sheswright, 22.20; Showum Jet, 22.23; Mongo Jet, 22.23; Howdy Sis, 22.24.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors, Monday evening, voted to require all donations be brought before the board at a regular meeting. The action came following a report that funds set aside for donations for 1975-76 had been completely used within the first three months of the fiscal year. It was noted that the chamber is a non-profit organization and that a huge number of requests had been made for assistance from various groups.

In an attempt to interest doctors in the Ruidoso area, Betty Patton was named to represent the chamber at the annual New Mexico Health Days meeting set for Albuquerque on Sept. 12 and 13. The representative will answer questions of prospective physicians concerning the area.

Tom Loudon, representing the dissolved Cathedral of the Pines corporation, presented plans drawn for an outdoor auditorium in the Mon Jeau area and noted the need for such a project. He asked that

Lincoln County Fair runs Friday-Saturday

The Lincoln County Fair will open Friday with judging beginning at 10 a. m. and continuing through the day.

The fair building will open at noon Friday and close at 9 p. m. Saturday's fair building hours are from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Market hogs, calves and lambs will be judged first Friday, followed by rabbits and poultry, Junior Home Economics, Open Home Economics, flower show, art show and open horticulture exhibits. The 4-H horse show opens at 7 p. m. with the junior horticulture judging as an evening event.

Saturday, following a 7 a. m. breakfast for all junior exhibitors, the judging of breeding beef cattle and breeding sheep starts at 8:30. Trophies will be awarded at 10:30 and lead sheep class judging is set for

the chamber do anything possible to continue the project. Two members of the board were appointed to investigate the possibilities.

Dave Parks and Don Swalander, representing the Ruidoso Municipal Schools board of trustees, were present to explain possible uses of funds from the proposed school bond issue. Tennis chairman Kenneth Buckley pointed out that the annual Tennis Tournament is slated to be held September 5-6-7 this year and that entries are coming in good flow.

It was announced that many motels are already filled for the Aspencade, scheduled for

the first weekend in October and that inquiries are being received in increasing numbers for information on the event.

Cothrun also pointed out that the Chamber WATS line had increased to a tremendous load and would require a serious look before next summer. He said that the three chamber employees were spending almost all their time on the line.

Bank balances of the chamber show \$12,049.05 in general accounts and a total of \$6,000 in certificates of deposit.

The next regular board meet will be held at the Ruidoso Village Hall at 7 p. m. on September 15. Meetings are open to all members of the chamber and visitors are welcome.

Mescalero cattle sale successful

Beef producers, buyers and a film company expressed keen interest in the 14th Annual Mescalero Cattle Growers Sale held Aug. 16, says William Ljungdahl, Extension Livestock specialist at New Mexico State University.

The average selling price on 1975 steer calves was \$38.65 per hundred weight, 750 heifer calves averaged \$30.90 and 30 old bulls brought \$25.50. The 200 old cows claimed the lowest dollar, averaging \$18.60.

Buyers from New Mexico included J. D. Hance, Clovis, H. Nicholas, Kenna, and D. Johnson, Roswell. Texan buyers were Black Estate, Granbury, Bill Bradley, Littlefield, Buck Jackson, Pecos, B. Draper, Tahoka, and H. Belcher, San Angelo.

A-A trials Friday

A total of 194 hopefuls will be fighting it out in Friday's elimination trials for the \$1 million All-American Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Twenty trials will be staged, starting at the mid-morning first-post of 10:30 a. m. Each trial will cover 440 yards, and each offers a purse of \$2,500.

The top 10 finishers, as determined by the clock, will advance into the Labor Day spectacular which will again be televised from coast-to-coast. Friday's trials will also firm up the fields for the First, Second and Third Consolations of the All-American.

With such an abundance of top-flight talent, it's hard to single out one pre-race favorite. In fact, the story of this year's juvenile crop is the fact no horse has loomed heads-and-shoulders above the rest. But there's a handful which surely have super-star potential.

One such candidate is Chick Called Sue, the filly owned by Aubrey Stokes of San Angelo. Last time out, Chick Called Sue raced to a stinging half-

length win in the \$315,140 Rainbow Quarter Horse Futurity — the second leg of the industry's famed Triple Crown. Chick Called Sue pocketed \$103,276 in that one. She drew into Friday's 15th race. Frank Henning will be back in the driver's seat.

Chick's Deck, the winner of the Kansas Futurity — the first leg of the Triple Crown — gets his shot at the All-American in the sixth race. The colt was owned by Rlp Russell of El Paso. The colt's Kansas victory yielded \$132,582. But his apperance was upset in the Rainbow Futurity, when he wilted to third and had to be content with a paycheck of \$25,741.

Bugs Alive In 75, the long-reaching standout who finished second in both the Kansas and Rainbow, drew into Friday's ninth race. The colt, with a bankroll of \$100,000, is the richest two-year-old so far this year.

Dash For Cash, who holds a perfect six-for-six record, makes his bid in the eighth race. The colt has won just over \$100,000. His main win came in the rich Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park. Minor leg injuries put him on the sidelines for a bit. But he looked razor-sharp while posting two Ruidoso wins.

The highly touted Rocket's Maggie makes his mountain debut in the 12th race. The colt is undefeated in five starts, and has looked sensational, according to advance reports. He's been running in Louisiana and Florida.

Another newcomer with big

credentials is Sold Short, the colt who drew a plump \$100,000 pricetag in last summer's All-American Yearling Sale at Ruidoso. The colt won four out of his first five starts and hauled in \$142,254. Sold Short came into the big time with wins in the Bay Meadows Futurity in Northern California, and in the recent \$161,000 Golden State Futurity at Los Alamitos.

Sold Short is in the fifth race. Terry Lippman has the field.

Another one to keep an eye on is He Flies in the 13th race. The colt, a supplemental nominee at \$15,000, looked like gangbusters while eclipsing a track record set by Tiny's Gay at Tumbleweed Downs in Washington.

First post both Saturday and Sunday is the regular 1:30 p. m. Saturday's topper is \$9,000-added Ruidoso Sprint Championship at six furlongs. On Sunday, the great Easy Date goes in the \$495,500 All-American Derby at 440 yards.





The Future As Fact

Science Fiction And The Future

Science Fiction foretells the future. Sometimes, anyhow. More often, it does not. Most science fiction does look at what might happen in some kind of future. A good many science fiction writers are pretty good at it.

The inventor of futurology, in fact, was a science fiction writer. He was H. G. Wells, who was writing such novels as the "War of the Worlds," "The Invisible Man," and "The First Men in the Moon," in the years from 1895 to 1900. He had been a student under Thomas Henry Huxley, the chief spokesman for Charles Darwin, who was too shy to stand up for his new theory of organic evolution.

Wells had learned biology and evolutionary theory from Huxley. In his first novel,

"The Time Machine," he projected the evolutionary process far into the future to show the end of the human race and the final death of earth.

With that for a start, Wells went on to develop the new science of futurology. He announced his methods in 1902, in a little book called "The Discovery of the Future," pointing out that in some ways we can know the future almost as well as we do the past.

Most science fiction, however, is not meant to be accurate forecasting. Fiction writers are trying to amuse, to surprise, sometimes to warn or to shock, to reveal human character and arouse emotion. Though most science fiction does look at possible futures, the writers often choose the less likely alternatives, not the most likely.

Wells himself turned gradually from fiction to social reform. He spent most of his life trying to alert and educate the human race to avoid the hazards he had foreseen. As early as 1913, he was writing about the dangers of atomic war.

A good many more modern writers have had the ability and knowledge to make serious social forecasts. Among them are Isaac Asimov and Robert Heinlein.

In the beginning he was a critic of technology and progress, though he later turned to promoting socialistic utopias. Most science fiction forecasts, I think, have been more pessimistic than reality justifies. Fiction has to grab and hold the reader. For its purposes, shock and horror work better than truth and light.

In these columns, we will consider some of the alternative possible scenarios of things to come, both those from the science fiction writers and from the professional futurologists.

We will be pointing out that the news from tomorrow is not entirely bad. The next century will doubtless see tragedy and disaster as any earlier century.

But there will be good news too. Dr. Jack Williamson, English professor, Eastern New Mexico University.







Inside The Capital

SANTA FE—A Judicial Council subcommittee is studying criminal code provisions on sentencing of defendants.

Subcommittee members are Rena Rosequist, Taos; Rep. Boyd Scott, R-Farmington, and Sen. Ted Montoya, D-Sandoval-Bernalillo-Rio Arriba. Rep. H. B. Barnard, D-Clovis, sponsored the memo-

rial ordering the study. Barnard's memorial said: "Penalties for violation of the law may be too light to deter potential criminal activity." It also said New Mexico judges were given great discretion in sentencing convicted persons, causing disparities in sentencing over the state. The memorial added: "The rate of crime has increased substantially in the past few years."

The Judicial Council will report on the study to the 1976 Legislature in January.

The State Finance Dept. sent \$3.7 million this week to 95 New Mexico cities in a legislature-ordered distribution. Among the distributions: Belen, \$19,484; Carrizozo, \$2,795; Clayton, \$8,090; Clovis, \$142,087; Eunice, \$9,250; Fort Sumner, \$3,816; Jal, \$24,739; Lordsburg, \$20,078; Los Lunas, \$5,134; Milan, \$4,218.

Also, Questa, \$2,033; Red River, \$6,896; Ruidoso, \$52,791; Ruidoso Downs, \$5,305; Santa Rosa, \$9,222;

Springer, \$2,946; Taos, \$17,787; Texico, \$2,597; Truth or Consequences, \$19,336, and Williamsburg, \$1,419. The distribution was \$2.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

An infestation of range caterpillars prompted Gov. Jerry Apodaca to declare an emergency in parts of Lincoln, Colfax, Union and Harding Counties. An infestation spans 49,240 acres in northeastern Lincoln County. An added 83,545 acres are affected in Colfax, Harding and Union Counties in an area where county borders meet.

The emergency declaration opens the door to a spraying program with the state and federal governments and landowners dividing costs.

A Felix Trujillo memorial scholarship will be established at New Mexico State University. Trujillo was State Highway Dept. maintenance engineer when he died in a traffic accident. He was a NMSU graduate. A memorial scholarship fund has so far received \$3,000 in contributions.

Gov. Apodaca named Mrs. Betty Hamilton of Albuquerque to the board of Carrie Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children at Truth or Consequences. Mrs. Hamilton's term will end Jan. 1, 1977.

State Liquor Chief Carlos Jaramillo approved transfer of a liquor license from Moses Sanchez, doing business as El Chiflo Lounge, 2.5 miles north of Questa on NM-3, to Alfonso Vigil of Ranchos de Taos.

A voter purge chopped 103,304 names off registration lists in 29 counties with San Miguel, Quay and Sandoval unreported. Decreases in voter registrations after the purge, compared with totals Jan. 31, included: Colfax, down 791; Curry, 3,163; DeBaca, 245; Hidalgo, 724; Lea, 5,236; Lincoln, 811; Sierra, 157; Taos, 1,816; Union, 565, and Valencia, 5,644.

Gov. Apodaca blew the whistle on an announced reorganization of the State Corrections Dept. Corrections Secretary Howard Leach had presented the reorganization at a Corrections Commission meeting.

In the reorganization Bob Marrs, superintendent of the State Boys School at Springer, was set to become juvenile institutions division director. Deputy Director Jack Newton of the Boys School was slated to be the school's director.

Gov. Apodaca said he wants prior review and approval of the reorganization. He said later announcement of changes without consulting him "is a clear example of people not understanding this administration."

A \$1.5 million appropriation by the 1975 Legislature under the Water Supply Construction Act was used in part to fund \$100,000 for Belen. Corona received \$16,000.

Gov. Apodaca said he hopes the Game Commission will

consider his recommendation for a state game director and two exempt deputy directors when retiring Game Director Ladd Gordon's post is filled. The deputy directors would be assigned to administration and field operations. Gordon will retire Nov. 30.

Mastercrafts, Inc., Belen, was chartered here to engage in retail sales. Incorporators are Alan D. Nofsker, W. R. Nofsker Sr. and Susan Reidy Nofsker of Belen. Franklin Hood Inc. of Lordsburg was also chartered for a general merchandise business. Franklin Hood is incorporator and statutory agent.

The Livestock Barn at the Lincoln County Fair Grounds has been enlarged so that a larger number of livestock

can be shown at the Lincoln County Fair August 22-23, 1975 in Capitan. Market animals will be weighed and classified on Thursday August 21 from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. The judging will start at 10:00 a. m. with the Swine, Jim Sachse and Wallace Cox of New Mexico State University will judge the livestock.

Range caterpillars have been found on about 35,000 acres in the northeast part of Lincoln County. The ranchers in this area met last week and decided to spray for this range pest. Surveys have found as many as 100 range caterpillars per square yard. Five per

square yard will eat or destroy as much as a cow on a section. This will be a cooperative spray program with federal, state and ranchers each contributing one third of the total cost. The range caterpillar has been found in Lincoln County and seems to be spreading northeast more each year. This worm has spines on each segment. These spines act similar to stinging nettle when the animal touches them with its nose. They often refuse to graze in heavily infested areas.



The Arts & Crafts Fair is held annually in August under the sponsorship of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.





In Passing Food stamps, anyone?

Concern increases daily about the problems faced in the food stamp program and figures recently released by Congressman Harold Runnels make interesting reading. A chart of figures for New Mexico shows a total of \$39,000,000 for fiscal year 1974. Only one county in the state (Los Alamos) has no commodity distribution program. (unheard of isn't it?) Lincoln County comes in with a whopping \$314,000 for 1974. Total for Lincoln County in 1972 was \$147,634 and for 1973, \$216,240. No figures were released for the number of people on the stamps. The Lincoln County figure, based on a population of 8,500 (nearest estimate for county), would amount to \$36.94 for every man, woman and child in the county.

Following is a quote from Runnel's newsletter:
There has been a growing concern about the Federally sponsored food stamp program and the increasing number of people that are participating.

A week doesn't go by without someone asking questions about the program and why so many are able to walk into a grocery store and purchase items with food stamps that they themselves can't even afford.

I share this concern and for this reason I am a co-sponsor on legislation which is aimed at helping those truly in need of help.
When Congress first established the present program in 1961, it was designed to assist the legitimately needy plus assist in the problem of disposing of agriculture surpluses. But a lot has happened in just the past ten years. First let's look at it as a national program. In fiscal 1965 we spent \$36.4 million for the program—ten years later it is up to \$5.2 billion, an increase of 14,000%. In addition, it has been estimated that at present, one-fourth of the American population is eligible to receive food stamps. There is no doubt that the program has gotten out of control.

Last year the Health and Social Services Dept. in New Mexico reported that over one-fourth of those receiving food stamps were found not to be eligible for assistance. The report went on to state that 40% of the recipients had been

We recently received a letter to the editor informing us that we are not taking the proper attitude toward the food stamp program. We will readily agree that such a program is necessary — but — we will also be the first to note that it is much abused. Any time that money is taken from the working people of this country to help feed those who do not want to work, something is terribly wrong. We will also disagree that there are many in the Ruidoso area that have to have food stamps. Almost any merchant in town will tell you what a hard time he has finding employees — and the pay is not all that bad.

Any time I see a mid-20 year old not working I am pretty sure that he wouldn't take a job if one were offered. If we are to continue the program, it must be made clear that if the recipient is capable of work, he will have to work to get the stamps. The sick and elderly should have no problem getting the assistance needed — in fact, I would suggest that they get more. Usually they have too much pride to accept more than the essentials.

I can remember when the only foods available for food stamps were the necessary staples — flour, sugar, milk and the like. But now I see pop, candy, cookies, prepared foods of all sorts going into the carts of those with food stamps. Sometimes things that we taxpayers can't afford.

Quite frankly, I feel that anyone who is too lazy to try to find work should go hungry. That has always, in the past, proved a good incentive for the people of this country. Instead of penalizing the working people of this country to feed the dead-beats, let's try to encourage everyone to contribute his part to make it great.

After learning about this, I set out to evaluate the program on my own. I was surprised to learn that at that time a complete review of the national program had never been conducted in the 14 years of the operation. The study showed that officials were justified in pointing a finger at complicated procedures used to determine a person's eligibility for food stamps. The program last year cost \$39 million in New Mexico with 33,000 families participating in the program.

Meaningful reform in the most complete and analytical sense possible is long overdue. The legislation which I am co-sponsoring, in my opinion, in-

gives a wrong amount. In dollars and cents the errors represent \$3.8 million or nearly 10% of the total federal cost of the program in our state. The blame for errors has been firmly placed on complex federal laws and regulations.

Travis Hicks Returns
 From Boys Camp Meeting
 Travis Hicks returned Mon-
 day, the eleventh of August,
 from the Boys Camp Meeting
 down in the Davis Mountains
 — looking ten years younger
 and wonderfully renewed in
 spirit.

Mr. and Mrs. Hicks have
 been going to the camp meet-
 ing since 1947 and have not
 missed one of the four-day
 events since that date.

The Boys Camp Meeting
 was started in 1889, the first of
 several cowboy camp meet-
 ings that later came into being
 in the southwest and west.

Back before 1889, a few
 families would get together
 for religious services, travel-
 ing by horseback or in wagons
 or buggies. In 1889 a few fam-
 ilies down at the present site of
 the Boys meeting decided to

make the gathering an annual
 affair. The minister was a
 Presbyterian named Bloys.
 And the present day meeting
 bears his name.

These Cowboy Camp Meet-
 ings were something that ap-
 pealed very deeply to people
 — what with preaching and
 singing and old time dinners
 on the ground — with the re-
 sult that today there were
 around four thousand people
 present, from all over Texas
 and several other states.

Today there are more than
 eleven camp meetings in the
 west, patterned pretty much
 after the Boys Camp Meeting,
 including our own Noyal Cow-
 boy Camp Meeting located on
 Noyal Mesa, one of the most
 inspiring spots to be found
 anywhere.

Some of the pioneers who
 helped begin the Boys Camp
 Meeting helped develop the
 others, among these were the
 late and beloved Joe Evans,
 well known to Ruidoso and
 Lincoln County folks.

A Restful Place
 The Boys meeting place is
 up in the Davis Mountains in
 the Big Bend of Texas, sixteen
 miles from Fort Davis.

Travis said the main taber-
 nacle will accommodate about
 two thousand people.

Travis and Mrs. Hicks have
 had a cabin at Bloys for years;
 and there are now 275 cabins
 there. Many of the worshipers
 come in campers and with
 trailers. And the meeting lasts
 four days, from Tuesday til
 Sunday.

The schedule for the day in
 the adult group is Bible Study,
 nine o'clock; preaching at ele-
 ven; preaching at three in the
 afternoon; prayer meeting at
 five in the evening; and
 preaching at eight at night.

The services are divided in-
 to four groups, each with its
 own tabernacle and its own
 preacher. These groups are
 adults over twenty-one;
 seventeen to twenty-one;
 twelve to fourteen; and the
 smaller children.

Good Old-Time Cooking
 Travis was high in the
 praise of the good food: Bar-
 becued beef and pork, old

style hot biscuits, camp style
 coffee. In the large ovens, the
 baking pans hold seventy-two
 biscuits each.

There are six cooking estab-
 lishments formerly called
 "Cook Shacks", but they have
 grown far beyond this. Each
 has its walk-in refrigerator;
 and meat is bought by the
 truck load.

Everything is on a free will
 offering basis. There is a rule
 that nothing can be bought or
 sold. No collection is taken,
 but each person contributes
 what he feels is best. From
 this free will offering the
 Boys meeting has grown year
 by year so that the number of
 people who will be reached by
 its blessing is beyond the im-
 agination.

There is something typically
 American about the Cowboy
 Camp Meetings. They strike a
 chord in the hearts and souls
 of the American people.
 Everyone from far and near is
 most cordially welcome.

Evidently there is some-
 thing of the spirit of our pio-
 neer forefathers guiding us in
 these meetings, and the won-
 derful support they are re-
 ceiving is greatly encourag-
 ing.

Travis said he came away
 from the meeting inspired, re-
 freshed and encouraged.

"Our country is still on its
 way forward," Travis said.
 "There is much in our country
 for which we can be very
 much encouraged."

It was good to hear all this
 good news from Travis Hicks.
 People are turning more and
 more to God. And our Blessed
 Lord is bringing us more
 blessings each day.



Area students attend language program

The nation's first Spanish language Upward Bound program, initiated at The Claremont, Calif. Colleges two years ago, drew more than 75 high school students from throughout the Southwest this summer.

The seven-week program, which ended August 13, is funded by a \$100,000 grant from the U. S. Office of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Its intent is to demonstrate the importance of the use of their native language in the classroom for Spanish speaking secondary students, according to Manuel Ortiz, administrator of the Institute.

"For many Spanish surnamed students this was their first positive formal learning experience," Ortiz said. "By the time they leave the seven-week program, it is expected

they will have learned a great deal about the unique culture and history of the Southwest."

Students were recruited from Upward Bound programs in California, Texas, Arizona, Colorado, and New Mexico. For most it is their first time out of state.

They studied and lived at Pomona College, one of The Claremont Colleges, under the direction of Spanish-speaking teachers, counselors, and tutors. The curriculum included language, history of the Mexican-American in the Southwest, Caribbean history, Mexican-American literature, anthropology, and Mexican music, dance, and drama.

Attending from the Hondo area were Beatriz Sanchez and Gloria Sanchez. From Ruidoso Downs was Pauline Sanchez.

Before I started this article, I thought I would write an essay on the fly; but since they are few and far between these days, I will do it later.

Because I have read some articles lately on food for the aged, I just have to comment on them. One article gave menus for a month and — get this — pound cake is to be served nineteen times in thirty days — if I counted correctly; and I have never seen so many turnovers. One may easily get in a rut 'turning over turnovers.' Now I think, after I have eaten pound cake at least three times, it would choke me; much less trying to eat the entire cake.

In this same magazine, there are suggestions on how to keep active, which are good. But one in particular states: 'Make out menus for a week, never repeating a food, and include something new at least once a week. Learn to prepare it well.'

But you say, 'What in the world will I do with a large 5 egg pound cake?' There are delicious and wholesome ways to use up a pound cake and never know you have eaten it.

The first and simple way, is to slice part of your pound cake and use alternate layers of cake and firm ice cream, packed in a square container or foil. Put in the freezer for future use and just slice off when you so desire. Pour fruit juice over when serving.

Of course you know you can freeze your cake and slice it off as you need it. Then use: Fine chopped oranges between layers of cake, and pour undiluted orange juice and powdered sugar over top and let set until ready to serve.

Or make Orange Delight: Make a custard reserving the whites for meringue. Line a shallow baking dish with thin slices of pound cake. Cover with chopped oranges and over this the meringue, mixed with some grated orange peel and sprinkled with coconut (opt) and brown in slow oven.

Honey Dew Pudding is made by omitting oranges from recipe of Orange Delight.

A delicious Boston Cream Pie, can be made by lining a pie pan with thin slices of cake; fill with cooked custard, either from 'scratch' or a package of pie mix. Cover this with another layer of cake and top with whipped cream and a few shavings of chocolate. The topping may be omitted if too rich, and just use milk or fruit juice when serving.

The quick recipe of Peach Surprise is a wholesome treat. Turn peach halves filled with brown sugar and nuts (opt), upside down on pieces of pound cake. Dribble juice over all.

When you bake cornbread for dinner to eat with your greens or beans, save out a white egg. Beat this into a meringue using a little sugar and a spoon of left over fruit juice to flavor. Spread this over frozen thin layers of cake and brown in oven while cornbread is cooking. Here you have Baked Alaska without the cream.

Then there are Josephines: Cover thin squares or rounds of pound cake with whipped cream, then another layer of cake and top with whipped cream and coconut (opt), or any nuts or fruit may be added. (Save crumbs to dry out for future use).

Jim-Jam Gems
Line greased muffin tins or custard cups with thin slices of cake; fill with any jam, marmalade or applesauce. Bake just long enough for all to congeal. Serve with whole milk or fruit juice sauce.

Spread layers of pound cake with thick apple sauce and bananas, then more cake and apple sauce. Cover with whipped cream, flavored with vanilla and almond extract. Chill at least 5 or 6 hours. May be garnished with any left over fruit.

Quick Apricot Babas—
1/2 C. apricot preserves.
3 tbs. water
2 tsp. lemon juice.
2 tsp. rum flavoring

Heat all and pour over slices of frozen cake in dessert bowls. Let stand to cool, mixture will soak in. Before serving, top with a scoop of vanilla ice cream.

Prune Whip Mold—
Prepare custard, adding 1 tbs. gelatin to hot mix and one cup chopped cooked prunes. Cool. Fold in stiff beaten whites and a little sugar. Put ample blobs on slices of pound cake and let set until

firm. Serve with custard sauce or milk.

Then if you are expecting a guest, Pineapple Topper, is luscious and quick.

Spread hot or cold pound cake with a mixture of: 1/4 cup butter, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup coconut, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, 1 cup crushed, drained pineapple. (Save juice for future use). Broil 3 inches from burner, until frosting is bubbly and brown. Be careful not to burn.

Then there are the old-fashioned Trifles.

Use alternate layers of cooked vanilla pudding, thin cake slices and fruits such as: drained apricot halves, pineapple chunks, Queen cherries, (no bananas), and whipped cream for top layer. Sprinkle with chopped almonds and

chill over night. This will keep several days. (All juices may be stored and used later).

To make a festive dessert: Make meringue of egg whites, fold in finely crumbled, dried pound cake. Shape into rounds or romantic heart shapes, on a greased(?) cookie sheet and bake in a slow oven until brown. (Make cup in center of each). When cool, fill each with a dip of strawberry ice cream and top with a berry.

This famous Pineapple Delight is served on the West coast.

Cover slices of pound cake with scoops of vanilla ice cream, then drained pineapple chunks (save juice) and a few green grapes. Top with brandy flavored whipped cream and garnish with dots

of red currant jelly. Of course this is even delicious enough without the topping.

Well, while I have been busy typing recipes, I have forgotten my own lunch and have nothing but pound cake. Ha! No matter, I will fix a 5 minute pudding, with a slice of cake in a bowl; pour on some left over fruit (any kind), sprinkle a few marshmallows over the top and slide under the broiler a minute or until brown. I will never know I had my cake.

And, Chantilly is made of 1/2 cup jelly and 1 egg white, beaten in top of double boiler, until mixture foams up. Remove from burner and beat a minute longer. This can be used in place of whipped cream, makes a good topping.

If you serve all of these recipes in one month, you will have your cake and eat it too.

TOP JOCKEY—Wayne Gee rode six winners to cop Jockey-of-the-Week honors at Ruidoso Downs. The work boosted his totals to 23 victories from 187 rides and put him in with the Top Ten in seasonal standings.

Gee won two on Thursday, one on Friday and added the last three on Sunday. On Thursday he drove Holme's Okay to a 5/4 length victory in the second race as a 15-1 longshot. The fourth race was equally impressive. Paprok got the jump at the start of the 5 1/2-furlong maiden venture and stretched the lead to five lengths at the wire as the favorite.

Sunday's big one was Booray Joe in the sixth race. Gee was aboard the gelding for the first time and led from start to finish. That was the third victory in a row for Booray Joe. Gee's work was good enough to boost him into the top 10 in over-all standings — the first time he's been on the list this meet. He now sports 23 wins from 187 rides.

Gary Sumpter's six upped him to second place — just two off the pace setter, Willie Lovell. Trainer Cliff Lambert started the weekend off in high gear and stayed there to nab the weekly trainer honors. Lambert sent 13 to the track. His charges brought back five wins, two seconds and two thirds. He joined the ranks of the top ten. Bubba Cascio is still in the lead with 37.

Racing resumes on Thursday at the regular 1:30 p. m. Five trials for the upcoming \$60,000 (est.) Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity hold the spotlight.

On Friday the program will get rolling at an early mid-morning first post of 10:30 a. m. to accommodate trials for the \$1 million All-American Futurity.

Saturday and Sunday action gets back on the regular 1:30 p. m. schedule. Three-year-olds and up will decide the Ruidoso Sprint Championship over six furlongs on Saturday while the topper on Sunday is the finale of the \$495,000 All-American Derby.

School bus safety urged for motorists





RESOLUTION CALLING A SCHOOL BOND ELECTION AND NOTICE THEREOF

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, met in full conformity with law and the rules and regulations of this Board; and

WHEREAS, said Board has determined and does hereby determine and deem it advisable to hold an election on the question of issuing bonds in the amount not exceeding \$1,650,000 for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to, and furnishing school buildings and improving school grounds for said District, on the Board's own motion without there having first been filed with the Board a petition asking for the calling of an election for such purpose; and

Section 1. That a special election for said purpose shall be held in said District on the 7th day of October, 1975.

"Shall the Board of Education of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, be authorized to incur an indebtedness for and on behalf of said District, and upon the credit thereof, by issuing its negotiable, coupon, general obligation bonds, in one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,650,000, for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to, and furnishing school buildings, and improving school grounds for said District, said bonds to be payable from the general (ad valorem) taxes and to be issued and sold at such time or times upon such terms and conditions as the Board may determine?"

Section 3. That said election shall be held at the High School Library, High School Campus, Ruidoso, New Mexico, and for the purpose of this election said District shall constitute one voting precinct which boundaries coincide with the boundaries of said District. Said polling place shall be open between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 7:00 P. M., and the following election officers are hereby appointed to serve at said election:

JUDGES: Herbert H. Brunell, Mrs. Dale H. Wynn, Mrs. Carl Jorren.

CLERKS: Mrs. Leon Farrah, Mrs. John D. Quinn, Mrs. Robert S. Gaston.

The Registration Books shall be closed by the County Clerk at 5:00 P. M., on the forty-second day immediately preceding the date of the school election, being 5:00 P. M., on August 26, 1975.

Section 4. That absentee voting shall be conducted by the Superintendent of Schools, in accordance with Sections 77-5-21 through 77-5-34, N.M.S.A.

Section 5. That the County voting machines shall be used for said election. The Superintendent of Schools is hereby directed to prepare and obtain, and to arrange safe delivery, of all election materials, supplies and equipment to the polling place as more fully set forth in Sections 77-5-10 and 77-5-11, N.M.S.A. The ballots and instructions for the bond election shall be printed in the English language only. The ballot for all of the electors shall be the same, and shall all be substantially in the following form, to-wit:

"Shall the Board of Education of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, be authorized to incur an indebtedness for and on behalf of said District, and upon the credit thereof, by issuing its negotiable, coupon, general obligation bonds, in one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$1,650,000, for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to, and furnishing school buildings, and improving school grounds for said District, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes and to be issued
